## Double Start Line for Class B races

#### Rationale

- The start line is very congested at the state meet, making it difficult for a fair start. As this is a championship race, we want to have an even playing field for teams and individuals competing for titles. Cross country has grown tremendously in the past decade, both in number of teams and athletes. (see attached) Most of the growth is coming from the small schools. We want to keep the sport growing while still providing a fair start for the race.
- Currently, Jamestown is the only site that can hold the Class B boys race due to the sheer number of athletes. There are other non-golf course sites that are interested in hosting and have shown the ability to host a large race. Jamestown course management has stated that they feel 24-28 boxes makes for slightly larger boxes along with a better start vs the 39 they currently use. Even with the current number of boxes, multiple schools are grouped together in some of the boxes due to space constraints.
- A double start line was used at some meets during COVID with success. Some runners that ended up on the back line stated they were able to move forward immediately with the gun rather than waiting for their group of teammates to move, giving them a better start.

## Proposal

- The start line will consist of 24 boxes on the front line. The boxes on the front line will be filled with the top 10 teams from each region meet along with 4 boxes for individuals. There will be 2 individual boxes for the top 10 individuals from each region that were not on a qualifying team. Boxes will be randomly drawn as they are now. Individual athletes will be put with others from their region.
- There will be a 2<sup>nd</sup> line 3 meters behind the first line. All teams that are not on the front line will be placed in a box on the second line, randomly drawn.

# Other issues

- Concerns have been brought up dealing with seeding from a non-sanctioned meet. This is currently in place for Region duals for wrestling, as well as Region softball and baseball, so there is a precedent in place already.
- Concerns were also brought up about athletes starting behind other athletes at the start. At state track in the distance races, athletes are placed behind others at the start when numbers require it, such as the 3200 (ex. - lane 7C).
- There has been discussion on using a time standard. The B West schools are opposed as many of their courses are significantly hillier than anything in the east.
- There has been discussion on 7 runners per school as in other states. Even with this, the B boys race would still be over 260 runners, the B girls over 220.

- With the current proposal, there would be a maximum of 220 athletes on the front line.
  - Using this year's region results, there would be 187 girls runners on the front line (92 East Girls teams, 75 West Girls Teams, 20 individuals). Any girl that ran 22:26 or faster would be on the front line.
  - For the boys, there would be 201 runners on the front line (96 East Boys Teams, 85 West Boys Teams, 20 individuals). Any boy that ran 19:23 or faster would be on the front line.
- In Class B, there is support across the board. We started discussing this amongst the coaches in 2016, but the numbers have really jumped since then. The schools contending for titles like a smaller front line for a fairer start. The smaller schools that are driving our growth are still able to compete at a state competition.
