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In Back of Book

The League Calendar

1. All League memberships expire at midnight, Saturday, September 30th. This means specifically two things:—

(a). All schools that have been members continue as such automatically until that date; and must not enter into any inter-school athletic or other contests, except when represented by fully eligible participants.

(b). It means on the other hand that after midnight, September 30th, any school whose dues are unpaid, is no longer a League member and must not be played with by League members.

NOTE:—It is not the privilege of any school to consider itself a non-member during the football season in order to use ineligible players, and then later join the League for the basketball season, even tho it plan to use only eligible basketball players.

(c). NOTE:—

Your school is not eligible to renewal of membership if you have not made a complete Eligibility Exchange Sheet report on every athlete who represented the school in basketball and also in football if you played inter-school football.

Be sure to report every player, however poor, or for however short a time he may have played in any game, without regard to whether it was on a first or second or 'steenth team.

2. Dues are \$3.00 for towns over 2000 population; \$2.00 for towns with population between 1000 and 2000; and \$1.00 for towns under 1000 population.
3. Several schools have found their annual Fall Athletic Assembly to be of special interest to all students. In addition to pepping up the morale of the school, it gives a fine opportunity to stress the ideals of sportsmanship for which the League stands, and to bring before the student body the League rules as well.
4. A Stag Meeting for boys only and the men of the faculty has a particular appeal, both as a mixer and as an opportune way of presenting the athletic ideals of the year;—together with the League rules. No high school lad should be given the slightest chance to say he "didn't know the League rules".
5. The 20 year rule must have careful attention again this year. There have been a few slip-ups. These can be avoided only by most careful and conscientious scrutiny. You cannot trust to a lad's memory, even though you have full confidence in his truthfulness. Nor can you trust school records or census reports alone. Trace every questionable case to final proof, before the season is advanced. Be sure to write to the State Census Bureau at Bismarck. This saves much embarrassment.

OCTOBER

1. Your membership expired last night, Saturday, September 30th, 1933, midnight.
2. **Is Your School Eligible for Renewed Membership?**
NOTE:—Unless your school sent to the Secretary a complete Eligibility Exchange Sheet record of every athlete who represented your school in basketball, and also in football (if you played inter-school football) your dues will not be received and your membership cannot be renewed.
Rush the reports in now, without delay.
3. You must not compete with a League member until you have rushed your dues in to the Secretary.
4. Be careful not to play with a non-member. By using the League Contract Forms and by exchanging the Eligibility Sheets, you can always readily discover whether or not the other school is a member in good standing. Remember you are the school to be penalized if you play with a non-member.
5. Is the habit entirely fixed now?—Do you check, yourself, man by man, the eligibility of every player?
6. Remember:—An ineligible student cannot represent your school on any kind of team—second, third or 'steenth.
There is no State Football Championship.
7. Why not use the League record cards and keep an accurate record of all games?

NOVEMBER

1. The ANNUAL LEAGUE MEETING is held this month in connection with the N. D. E. A. Bring your problems for discussion.
2. When the football season is over send to the Secretary the complete ELIGIBILITY EXCHANGE SHEET record for every football participant, regardless of how small a part of a game he may have played, or whether it was on the first or second or 'steenth team. Make the record complete.
3. Remember this year you fully intended to start a real Financial Accounting System for your athletics. Have you started yet? Do it.
4. Now that football is over, you are starting your Basketball season. Write the League Secretary about any proposals you have in mind for change in your District location; improvements of the Spring Tournaments and so on.
NOTE:—Always prepare duplicate contracts for your home games, and demand the League contract for away from home games.
NOTE:—Always exchange the ELIGIBILITY EXCHANGE SHEET with the other school, sending it well in advance of the game.

DECEMBER

1. Special Sportsmanship Assemblies have proven of marked success in some schools. Have you tried one?
2. It might be well to get your Tournament Entry Fee in right now to your Tournament Committee. It is \$2.00. It doubles after the middle of next month.

JANUARY

1. The Tournament Fee sent to your Tournament Committee Chairman amounts to \$2.00. It is delinquent after January 15th, and is then doubled. You may certify any number of players, tho' only eight players may participate in the games.
2. Smoking Rule:—With the re-opening of schools after the Holiday Recess, the non-smoking rule goes into effect for all contest activities that normally have their beginning from now on—such as track, music, and the like. Check these contestants now, just as carefully as you do the football and basketball men at the opening of the first semester.

FEBRUARY

1. Your Tournament Entry Fee is now \$4.00 since you did not pay it prior to January 15th. If you do not send it in by the 15th of February, your team will not be eligible to play in the Tournament. Don't overlook it any further.
2. With basketball at its height, you cannot afford not to maintain a continuous check on the eligibility of all players.

MARCH

1. This is the Tournament month. Why not write to your Tournament Committee in advance of the Tournament and make some wholesome and tactful suggestions. They are trying hard to make the Tournaments successful. Helpful suggestions in advance mean more than criticisms thought of afterwards—and are more sporting.

APRIL

1. The Annual Spring Meeting of the League is held at the University at the H. S. Conference time.

MAY

1. All high school students who participate in track and field events, or in music contests or other forms of inter-school contests must maintain a strict eligibility record, just as do the basketball and football players.

Summary of Important Dates

September 1st:—First day of school:—Meet with your athletes and go over all eligibility rules with them. Give special heed to the non-tobacco rule; and age rule.

September 30th:—All memberships expire at midnight.

NOTE:—Your membership may not be renewed if you have not sent the Secretary the complete **ELIGIBILITY EXCHANGE SHEET** record of every football and basketball boy who represented your school last year.

January 1st:—Basketball Tournament Entry Fee due—\$2.00.

January 1st:—First day of school after the holidays:—All eligibility rules, including non-tobacco rule, go into effect for all contestants who may represent the school in events that begin from now on, as track, music, etc.

January 15th:—Your tournament entry fee is doubled (\$4.00) after this date.

January 15th:—League memberships may be received after this date, but schools will not be considered eligible to enter Tournaments.

February 15th:—Your tournament entry fee will not be accepted after this date at all.

Meetings of the H. S. League

ANNUAL FALL MEETING OF THE N. D. H. S. LEAGUE

Time:—N. E. A. Convention time.

Place:—Room No. 205, H. S. Building, Grand Forks.

Presiding:—B. C. Tighe.

Present:—About 60.

1. Minutes of previous Annual Meeting.

Motion by Rogers of Carrington, seconded by Dominick of Wahpeton, that the reading of the minutes be dispensed with, since they have already been published and scattered thruout the state in the Annual Handbook. Carried.

2. B. C. Tighe reports as special committee member concerning the insurance plan for protection of school athletes. He refers to the experience in Wisconsin where the Association has made an experiment, and also to some new form of insurance covering the same type of protection being developed under Prof. Fowler of the University Wisconsin. Iowa was reported as having attempted some tie-up with an Old-line Insurance Company, as have a few other states. But Mr. Tighe's report does not make it apparent that much can be expected as yet from old line insurance companies. Rates seem much too high, and the protection is rather limited. Wisconsin reported 123 requests for insurance payments, with 103 allowed, totaling a cost of \$6,010.92 which apparently was borne by the Association almost exclusively. However Wisconsin has a large fund on hand as has also Illinois. Data at hand shows the latter state for instance having \$99,750.00 in reserve, \$24,726.83 in checking account, and a small additional account of \$425.00. Apparently such states are in good condition to make this form of experiment, while perhaps other states should undertake later to profit by their example and experimentation.

Motion:—Moved by Quam of Oakes, seconded and carried that the chair appoint a Committee to make specific recommendations on the insurance matter, such report to be made at the Spring Meeting.

3. A nominating committee was appointed to name nominees for the Board of Control office left vacant by the expiration of the term of L. A. White, the term being for three years. Quam, Rogers, Gilbertson, Kain and Reitan are named as such.

4. DISCUSSION OF A AND B TOURNAMENTS.

In keeping with previous direction from the H. S. League, the Board of Control proposed plans for the establishment of separate A and B Tournaments, in basketball.

Mr. Tighe proposed that there should be 8 new Districts established for A schools; centers being at Fargo, Jamestown, Valley City, Bismarck, Mandan, Grand Forks, Devils Lake and Minot. While these specific towns named become automatically the Class A Schools, any other town in that new District may upon declaration become a Class A School for the given year, all other towns automatically becoming Class B Schools. Such B school or schools as decide to be Class A schools for the year would at an appropriate time compete with the assigned Class A school of the District and with each other, to represent the new District at the Class A State Tournament, and would not be eligible to participate in the Class B Tournaments. Class B Tournaments are to be conducted just as are the present Tournaments, i. e. with District and Regional and State, except that here and there according to judgment there may be some changes of the assignments to Districts. After the close of the Class A State Tournament and the Class B State Tournament, there may be a play off between the two winners. It was proposed that the two tournaments be held at different places altho possibly at the same time. It was planned that any net proceeds from either State Tournament be used to defray any loss from the other State Tournament, if necessary.

Mr. Gould proposes a somewhat similar plan, except that Williston and Dickinson be added to the list of eight schools, and all "The Big Ten" be automatically included in the Class A State Tournament.

Motion by Dominick, seconded by Ide that the plan as outlined by Tighe, be adopted. Motion carried.

Motion by Dale of Lakota, seconded and carried, that any surplus of either State Tournament be used to apply upon any deficit of the other; all net proceeds thereafter going to the State Treasury as heretofore.

5. REPORT OF NOMINATING COMMITTEE.

Gilbertson reported for the nominating committee, placing the name of L. A. White in nomination to succeed himself for the three year term, and moves the adoption of the report. There being no other nominations, Ide seconds the motion which was carried and the chair announces White as duly elected.

6. REPORT OF SECRETARY-TREASURER.

**Note:—The Mandan Farmers State Bank closed last spring, and the League holds Receiver's Certificate No. 503 in the amount of \$601.88, as above recorded. This amount is reported above as "resources" on the ground that the Bank will recover.

Motion by White, seconded and carried, that the report of the Secretary-Treasurer be accepted, and approved subject to the report of the Audit Committee.

7. Wakefield of LaMoure, Ide of Harvey and Smith of Langdon were appointed as the Audit Committee.

8. Motion by Rice of Velva, seconded by Gilbertson of Kenmare, that hereafter the Secretary-Treasurer hold to the credit of any given District such net proceeds as may have resulted from the District Tournament, such accumulations from such Tournaments never to total in excess of \$300.00, except that such net proceeds shall first be applied to make up for any deficit in the Regional Tournament in which that District participates. Carried.

NOTE:—Heretofore net proceeds were to be used in such manner that if one District made a profit and the other District suffered a loss, the net proceeds of the one helped counterbalance the loss of the other; and then further were to be applied upon the Regional; and only thereafter were to be added to the State Treasury. This new ruling maintains complete autonomy of each District as far as the other is concerned, although it would give assistance to the Regional Tournament game or games. Then credit would be given to the given District up to a total of \$300.00 accumulated, to apply upon any possible deficit of that District in subsequent District Tournaments of other years. Sums above \$300.00 would be credited directly to the League.

9. Audit Committee:—Met after the adjournment of the League and placed their official signatures upon the books of the Treasurer, checking account of \$575.85; other resources \$6036.70, total, \$6612.55 as printed in the mimeographed report. Signed by Harold Wakefield and H. P. Ide.

Comment was made upon the many checks the Treasurer makes upon the accuracy of the records:—The monthly balance is maintained and reconciled with the bank balance. For all moneys received a duplicate receipt is shown, record is made by number in the treasurer's book, the deposit is shown with date in the treasurer's book and on the bank pass book and the monthly bank statement. For all expenditures made a voucher is shown, record is made in the treasurer's book showing the number of the check and the check book and corresponding check are shown.

Receiver's Certificate No. 503 and signed statement of the Custodian of the Union National Bank and Trust Company Safety Deposit Vault showed resources as above stated—\$6036.70.

ANNUAL SPRING MEETING H. S. LEAGUE

The time of the H. S. Conference in the Spring, is by Constitution of the N. D. H. S. League the assigned time for the second semi-annual meeting of the League.

But inasmuch as the Conference was cancelled this spring, there was of course no meeting of the League.

Meetings of the Board of Control

(a). Winter Meeting, Gardner Hotel, Fargo, January 3, 4, 1933.

Present:—Tighe, Gould, Robertson, Dominick, White.

1. Non-use of 3 second and 10 second rules in basketball.

Motion by Dominick, seconded by Gould, that the 10 second rule be inoperative during the current basketball season. Carried.

2. Motion by White, seconded by Dominick, that the 3 second rule be inoperative during the present basketball season. Carried. White, Dominick, Tighe voting aye; Gould and Robertson voting no. In the discussion reference was made to the fact that South Dakota, Wisconsin, Illinois, New York and perhaps several other states had declared one or both rules wholly or partially inoperative for the season. Reference was also made to the recommendation of the N. D. Coaches Association, which, following a questionnaire throughout the state had recommended that both rules be suspended for the year.

3. Motion:—Concerning Harvey lad.

Moved by Gould seconded by Dominick and carried "that while the data presented by the Harvey school officials seems to establish the year 1913 as the birthyear of Ludvig Grose, conflicting records in county censuses and school reports make it appear that the evidence is insufficient to establish May 31 rather than May 1st as the birthday."

4. Case of Chester Laney of Tower City.

Similar to the Cavett lad, previously discussed, Laney had sufficient credits to graduate last spring, but refused the diploma and returns to school for more high school work, desiring to play this year as an undergraduate.

Motion by Dominick seconded by Robertson, that Chester Laney shall be considered ineligible until such time as he shall deliver to the Secretary of the Board of Control his partially unsigned diploma (as an evidence of incompleting graduation.) Carried.

5. Definition of "GRADUATE."

Motion by Gould, seconded by Dominick that the word "graduate" in Section VI of the Rules of Eligibility shall be interpreted as meaning any person who has participated in the graduation exercises as a member of the Senior Class. Carried.

5. Phone call to New Rockford to see if the gymnasium there would be available as the locus of the Class B State Tournament, and if the school management would be interested.

6. Class B Districts Established.

Moved by White, seconded by Dominick that Gould's plan as shown by maps and distributed thruout the State, be adopted as the basis for the Class B Districts. Carried.

7. Appointment of Class B District Tournament Committee.

8. Change in District Assignments.

Agreed without motion that for the year New England be retained in District No. 4, to maintain a better balance between Districts No. 4 and No. 11.

And agreed that Enderlin be placed in No. 2 instead of No. 1.

9. Concerning Track and Field Meets.

Coach West of U. N. D. meets with the Board. Agreed by the Board of Control, based upon recommendations and suggestions from Coach West that upon application, the Board of Control will okay any OPEN meet in which as many as six teams are entered consisting of eligible players from schools that are League members, such Meet to be directed by an official approved by the Board of Control, which official shall make a report on the blank to be especially provided by the University, the report to be sent to Coach West of the University, and said Meet to be run after the order of events and manner as outlined by the University authorities; when such Meets are given such official approval by the Board of Control all entrants who win first or second place, provided they meet a certain minimum standard of time or distance as set by the University, shall be eligible to enter the State Meet at the University; provided further that the University authorities shall have authority to receive and pass upon petitions for other entrants.

10. Mr. West describes the value of slow motion pictures, for coaching. He proposes that the Board of Control might purchase one or more projectors to place at the disposal of the Extension Department, who would direct the sending of the films and machines thruout the State. The matter is to be discussed further at the Bismarck Board meeting.

11. Mr. West, representing President Kane, raises the question of the advisability of holding the Music, Debate, Declaration and other contests in the Spring as usual. The University authorities wanted the re-action of the Board members. While individual Board members indicated in several instances that their own schools would send few if any contestants, it was agreed that it would seem best judgment to continue the well founded tradition of the Spring Contests, even though the attendance should be materially reduced. Mr. West stated that the plans called for the contests to be held on Thursday, Friday and Saturday; and the Track Meet on Saturday.

12. Mr. Brown, football coach of Fargo, appears with data to establish the birthdate of two athletes. Records of the one are at the City Hall on file and seem unquestionable. The birthdate of the other seems fully established by a passport, the only question being that in the school records the birthdate year had been given as 1913 and also 1914. The lad explained the discrepancy by stating he had purposely misstated his age one time to take over a paper route.

13. League members may also play in Consolidated League Tournaments, if they are members of both Leagues, according a motion by Gould, seconded by Robertson, carried. This settles the question of the Barnes County Meet and the Consolidated Tournament, as raised by Litchville, in a letter of November 17th.

14. Moved by Robertson, seconded by White, that the Class A State Tournament be held at Bismarck in acceptance of an invitation given in the letter of November 14th from the Bismarck Chamber of Commerce. Motion carries. Gould voting no, other members voting aye. H. O. Saxvik is named manager.

15. Class B schools changed to A may revert to B by January 15th.

Moved by Dominick seconded by Gould that Class B schools that have changed to Class A, may be privileged to revert to Class B, provided such change is made on or before January 15th. Carried. This day was rather automatically determined by the fact that January 15th is the date for the payment of the Tournament Entry Fee.

16. Play Off between Class A and Class B Champions, Optional.

Reference was made to the arrangements provided by the League last fall, that a play-off between the winners of the two State Tournaments may be arranged by challenge from either side, the other team being required to play or forfeit the title to the State Championship; but such challenge is not obligatory.

17. Dates of Tournaments.

It was agreed that the Tournaments should be held as follows:

Class A District or Preliminary Games, March 10 or 11.

Class B District Tournaments, March 10 and 11.

Class B Regional Tournaments, March 17 and 18.

Class A State Tournament, March 17, 18.

Class B State Tournament, March 24, 25.

Agreement was made by long distance, with Physical Director Spalding of S. T. C. at Valley City that the Class B State Tournament be held there Friday and Saturday, March 24 and 25; there being no guarantee of expenses; all net proceeds to be pro rated among the

teams participating; any excess to be turned over to the State League; Board of Control to provide the officials, they being Cy Holgate of Aberdeen, and F. L. Blume of St. Paul.

19. Tighe makes report at annual meeting of National Federation at Chicago.

20. Purchase of Dubow balls for Tournaments.

Moved by Gould, seconded by Robertson, that the required number of Dubow basketballs be purchased from Colborn School Supply Company of Grand Forks at the quoted price of \$8.80 to supply the needs of Districts No. 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16 for District and Regional Tournaments (about 15); all other Dubow balls to be purchased from Northern School Supply Company of Fargo at the quoted price of \$8.80. Motion carries; Dominick voting no.

21. Districts were paired respectively as follows to form Regions A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H:—1 and 2; 3 and 4; 5 and 6; 7 and 8; 9 and 10; 11 and 12; 13 and 14; 15 and 16.

22. Officials for State Tournaments.

Moved by Tighe, seconded by Dominick, that Richard Holzer of Moorhead and W. E. Wyttenbach of Aberdeen be secured for the Class A Tournament at Bismarck at \$85.00 and expenses. Carried.

Moved by Dominick, seconded by White, that Cy Holgate of Aberdeen and F. L. Blume of St. Paul be secured as officials for the Class B Tournament at Valley City, at \$85.00 and expenses. Carried.

23. Moved by Dominick, seconded by Robertson, that the Secretary be instructed to secure Surety Bonds to cover the League Savings Accounts, and checking account or else purchase registered Liberty Bonds with the proceeds of the Savings Accounts. Carried.

24. Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick, that four trophies be purchased for the Class A Tournaments, such to be duplicates of those purchased last year, and to be marked "Class A"; and all other trophies to be marked "Class B" and used in Class B Tournament, the total cost of the newly ordered four plaques to be \$76.00, as quoted by the Josten Manufacturing Company. Carried.

25. Cavalier and Ineligible Player.

Moved by Gould, seconded by Robertson, that Cavalier be suspended from the H. S. League because of the fact that the coach had wilfully violated Eligibility Rule No. 8 in playing Walter Ault after receiving official notice from the Secretary of the League that said player was ineligible, such suspension to be in force until the end of

the basket ball season, or until such time as the following conditions are met:—

(a) The forfeiture of all games in which the player has participated.

(b) Constant use of Eligibility Exchange Sheets; Uniform Contracts and all other League forms, and the absolute meeting of all League requirements.

(c) The personal direction of all athletic management (aside from coaching) by Superintendent Smith alone.

(d) Statement from the school, signed by the coach and countersigned by the superintendent that all League rules and requirements will be given full compliance, said statement to be filed with the League Secretary.

26. Adjournment. Tighe and Gould remaining to complete the order for needed individual awards for the State Tournaments.

BISMARCK MEETING BOARD OF CONTROL

March 16, 17, 18, 1933.

All members of the Board of Control, except Dominick.

Motion concerning St. Leo's School, Minot.

Moved by Gould, seconded by Robertson, that the resignation of St. Leo's from the N. D. H. S. League be not accepted. Carried.

NOTE:—St. Leo's School played and won two rounds in the District Tournament at Velva. About an hour before leaving Minot to play the third and final round, they received word from Chicago, inviting them to enter the National Catholic Tournament. In a quandry because of the conflict of dates between the Regional Tournament and the Chicago Tournament, tho not then aware of any questionable propriety in entering the Catholic National Tournament, they went on and won the District Meet, and subsequently tendered their resignation from the League, thinking this the solution to the problem.

Motion by Robertson, seconded by Gould, that St. Leo's be suspended for the remainder of the school year from membership in the N. D. H. S. League, for causing District No. 13 to lose its representation in the Regional Tournament. Voting aye, Gould, Robertson and Tighe. White voting no.

Attention was called to a previous ruling of the Board of Control that in the event a given winner of a District could not enter the Regional Tournament, that District would otherwise not be represented.

Motion by Gould, seconded by Robertson that since it is reported that St. Leo's School has been invited to attend the National Catholic Basketball Tournament at Chicago, a Meet not sanctioned by the National Federation—the Secretary be instructed to call to their attention the resolution of the Board of Control adopted on March 21, 1930, covering participation in an unsanctioned Meet (recorded on page 25 of the 1930 (Sixth) Handbook.) Carried.

NOTE:—At that time Bismarck having won the State Meet, was eager to enter the National Tournament but in spite of considerable local agitation the local school officials accepted the spirit of the National Federation ruling, and did not enter the Stagg Meet at Chicago. Since that time the Stagg Meets have been discontinued.

NOTE:—While no penalty was decided upon by motion, an appropriate conclusion of the matter according to discussion seemed to be that in the event St. Leo's should attend the National Catholic Meet, they should be withheld from entering the District Basketball Tournament next year.

Discussion:—Some discussion Thursday evening of the "Char-bonneau Case", Gould presenting to some extent the Mandan viewpoint. Reference was made incidentally to the lad's birthday occurring on the Saturday of the Tournament, but primarily to the question just recently brought up, about the lad's playing five seasons, based upon whether or not participating on a team of the Training School at Mandan should count as participation.

A breakfast meeting Friday was held, at which time the Char-bonneau case was further discussed. Two points were under consideration:—(a) His birthday being on Saturday, March 18th, the question arises as to when he becomes ineligible to play; and (b) If he played three years at Rolette, and last year at the Training School, does this year at the Mandan High School constitute his fifth year? Gould was not present and did not participate in this discussion. The previous evening it had been agreed with Mr. Gould that Mr. Sauvain as a previous long time Secretary of the League, and Judge Christianson be asked to sit with the Board for the fourth and fifth members in the places of Dominick and Gould.

The forenoon was spent in conference with Judge Christianson, Judge Nuessle, E. J. Taylor and Nelson Sauvain, at scattered intervals. It was finally concluded to set up a series of questions whereby to judge whether or not the Training School maintained a high school and whether or not the basketball they played at the Training School could be called "inter-high school contests".

It was agreed that since the credits of the Training School are accepted at other high schools and at the University for entrance; and since Commencement exercises are held, with diplomas given, etc., the School is in all essential respects a high school.

In determining whether or not the games played by the team of the Training School could be called "inter-high school contests", the following questions were agreed upon by the three members of the Board and subsequently submitted to Mr. Sauvain and Judge Christianson:—

1. Who makes the arrangements for the games—the lads independently or some representative of the Training School?
2. Who decides who may play upon the team?—the lads themselves or someone not connected with the Training School, or some representative of the School? Who does such coaching as is done? Who tells a substitute to enter the game, and another player to come out, etc.?
3. Who provides the suits and balls; who finances the games?
4. Are games played with other high schools? Where and in what conditions? If the boys go away from the school, do they go independently of under school direction and chaperonage, as at other schools?
5. Are score records kept? Are games played by regular quarters and halves? Are there interruptions for coaching? In other words are the games of the "practice game" type, or are they regular games?
6. Is there an admission fee, are there any crowds, any publicity, any write-ups of who wins, any payment of expense money to the other team?
7. Do other high schools that play the Training School consider the game or games, as part of their regular schedules?

Inquiry by several long distance calls made it evident that in some instances at least, the games are played in practically all respects like other high school games:—Admission fees are charged; regular officials; time by quarters and halves; official scores kept; no interruption for coaching; write-ups indicating who won and lost; fees paid (when played at Mandan); the Training School provides whatever finance and coaching and direction there is apparently as other high schools do. In some respects the team is not just like a high school team (for example, this year one lad not even in the Training School is a team member, and some of the games are more like practice games—as with the Mandan High School. But careful consideration of all

data made it appear that the school is a high school, and many of the games are practically equivalent to "inter-high school contests" in the meaning of the League rules, and the three Board members and Mr. Sauvain and Judge Christianson so ruled unanimously.

By phone Mr. Tighe and Mr. Sauvain conversed with Mr. McClelland and Mr. Gould presented the Mandan viewpoint several times. There was no formal hearing otherwise, as there seemed to be no question about the data, but merely a question of interpretation.

The question of the lad's playing on his birthday was laid aside since he was declared ineligible otherwise.

Saturday morning meeting.

It was agreed that at all Tournaments the winners should get the basketballs. Thus, in the final evening games of the State Tournaments, the six teams participating shall each receive a ball when six balls are provided, the winners receiving the balls used in the final games. In the District Tournaments the two balls go to the winners of the final game.

Motion by Tighe, seconded by White, that the Jamestown lad, James Berry, who played a game of Independent Basketball under an assumed name, be disbarred from all participation in interscholastic and intermural participation and practice for the remainder of the school year, it being understood that the Jamestown school authorities immediately dropped him from the basketball squad after his illegal participation. Carried.

Discussion. Lakota and Cooperstown played a game of football, the former according to report insisting upon bringing a second official, the later objecting. It is reported that the assistance of the second official was not satisfactory ("the ball was brought back after five touchdowns") and before the close of the game the referee (local man) declared "No Game" and the game ended.

Query:—Can the referee so declare; and does Cooperstown owe Lakota for the game under the circumstances, the game being played at Cooperstown.

Board Decision:—Since the Lakota team did not stop the game, the Board rules that they should be paid their guarantee. Whether the referee has power to declare "No Game" comes under the province of the official Rule Book and not for the Board of Control. Hence, Cooperstown is directed to pay Lakota the guarantee, and urged to make Official Contracts hereafter.

Interpretations

(a) Two Scranton lads—Seniors—passed two subjects only, last Fall semester, but at the same time were doing make-up work—not offered in regular classes—in subjects they had previously failed. Can the two subjects taken in regular class work, plus the work made up by exams and otherwise count for the equivalent of three or more subjects passed in the Fall Semester.

Conclusion:—Okay, on the ground that it was not the lads' fault if there were classes organized in the subject matter they needed. As long as the school granted the credit and the records show three subjects or more completed at the close of the Fall Semester, the Board accepts these as okaying a lad for the Spring semester.

NOTE:—This is not to be confused against the stringent ruling of the League against "make up work" counting as of the preceeding semester.

(b). A lad attends the Park River High School but made no credits. Next year he enters the Walsh County Ag. H. S. Is he immediately eligible as a Freshman, like other Freshmen?

Answer:—No. Having attended a semester [10 days being sufficient to constitute a semester) he must show at least three credits, according to Rule No. 8.

(c). A lad transfers from a parochial school in Langdon to the public high school. Is he immediately eligible?

Answer:—Yes. According to a previous interpretation of the Board of Control, there being a difference of opinion among the Board members however.

(d). Can Lee Grant of Mott enter the Hettinger school and immediately be eligible for athletics?

Answer:—The Board of Control was presented facts as follows: Lee is a Senior; he plans to enter the University of Minnesota next fall; he must be assured a full term of school. His home town of Mott could not give assurance, and Hettinger could. Acting upon these data the Board of Control ruled the lad immediately eligible the same as it would if he had been unable to get the subjects required for graduation in keeping with our rules.

(e). A Garrison lad left school at the end of the first semester and did not return until the second semester of the following year. Is he eligible?

Answer:—Yes if he were passing in three or more subjects at the

close of his first semester, i. e. his last preceding semester of attendance. Semesters do not have to be consecutive.

Suppose he fell below a passing mark for the past six weeks, but his semester work as a whole to date were passing, would he be eligible?

Answer:—Yes for the grade is to be computed from the beginning of the semester, according to specific rule, of the League.

(f). An Osnabrook lad living in the country attends the Osnabrook high school. His parents move to Montana; then move back again. When is he eligible?

Answer:—Immediately, since there is no high school in the farm District where his parents return. It should be noted that while in Montana the lad attended a high school there, but that does not alter the conclusion.

(g). Indian boys of Belcourt having no high school there, attend at Rolla. To get home each night in the government bus, they must leave directly after school hence cannot play in the Rolla gym, and get coaching in basketball at Rolla. Can they be coached at their own home town of Belcourt by a teacher of the Belcourt schools, be transferred to games under Belcourt supervision and play, representing the Rolla high school?

Answer:—The Board of Control okays this. Mr. Wilson, the Indian Director of Education, keeps a close contact with the lads that attend the Rolla high school. This may be judged from the fact that during a six weeks period when roads to Rolla prevented the lads from attending school there, the Belcourt teachers, who are college graduates, some with advanced degrees, gave the lads their regular high school instruction in the Belcourt school. The conditions seem quite different from usual. The lads are Rolla high school lads in every respect and meet all League requirements except that their coach is a Belcourt teacher.

(h). Assumption Abbey of Richardton in addition to having a high school department maintains a small junior college. To maintain a football team for the older students, it is necessary that some of the high school lads participate in the same team. Is this okay, or will it affect their standing as having participated on a team representing an institution higher than secondary?

Answer:—The boys' standing would be jeopardized if they play on the junior college team.

(i). A Hannaford lad last year after the basketball season was over played on a "brothers' team". Does this in any way affect his standing this year?

Answer:—No. Our rule provides that a player shall not play in the same season on any other team in the same sport; but after the season is over, he may play on other teams.

(j). A Garrison lad takes algebra and fails. The next Fall he takes a state examination in algebra and passes. The second semester he carries four subjects but fails in two. May the algebra completed the first semester count as a third subject, for the second semester on the ground it is a full year subject?

Answer:—Certainly not. Our rules provide that three subjects must be earned and recorded at the end of a given semester and that a lad must be passing in three at the time of playing.

Board adjourns.

THE VALLEY CITY BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING March 24 and 25.

All members present.

(a). Discussion of the Class B Tournament Funds, and methods of balancing losses.

Motion by Gould, seconded by Dominick, that the Secretary-Treasurer be authorized to draw a check for \$500.00 to F. C. Spalding as director of the Class B Tournament, as an advance payment on the anticipated deficit. Carried.

(b). Discussion of advisability of presenting by a referendum certain proposed changes in wording of several eligibility rules that have caused most difficulty. The referendum would be equivalent according to our Constitution to the first reading, hence definite action could be taken at the Spring Conference Meeting.

Conclusion:—Better not hasten it thus, for the Spring Meeting may have a small attendance.

NOTE:—It is recalled that the Spring Annual Meeting of the League was subsequently cancelled since there was no Spring Conference.

It was proposed that the Secretary in a News Letter call attention of League members to certain specific problems, and seek their best judgment and consideration in order that at some subsequent meeting the League can re-arrange the wording and phrasing.

(a). Is there any way to prevent a Senior from flunking and thus returning for a further athletic season? Or is there any way of preventing his arranging his course in such a way that while he may have sufficient credits in number, he fails of graduation because he has not completed all his "requirements"?

(b). Should North Dakota adopt a rule somewhat similar to that of Minnesota whereby a student becomes ineligible after nine semesters of attendance provided he is then beyond 18 years of age?

(c). Or becomes ineligible after 10 semesters?

(d). Or should the age limit be reduced to 19?

(e). How can the age limit rule be phrased and worded so as to avoid varying interpretations?

(f). Should the wording of our rule No. 9 be changed to read:—"He shall not compete under an assumed name"?

Adjournment.

NOTE:—The League also holds Receiver's Certificate No. 501 acknowledging the deposit of \$601.88 in the Mandan Farmer's State Bank. Since this is of

uncertain value, the bank having closed a year ago, it is not listed as a specific resource. However, a dividend payment of 10 per cent was received on May 15th; and it is to be hoped that further dividends will be received subsequently.

(b). At the present time, these resources are as above, except that the Savings Account No. 785, listed as No. 1 above, has been cashed, and \$2,100.00 was invested in Liberty Bonds.

And Savings Account No. 5886, listed as No. 2 above has been cashed and will be invested in whole or in part in Liberty Bonds.

This action is done at the direction of the Board of Control, who has directed such purchase in the event the Treasurer was unable to secure appropriate Surety Bonds to protect the League accounts.

Item No. 3 listed above, (Time Certificate No. C 688 on Northern Trust Company, Fargo) apparently cannot be cashed until the time of maturity in January.

When this latter Certificate is changed, the Board of Control feels it has given full protection to the League's resources.

ATHLETICS FOR GIRLS

The North Dakota High School League has as yet never taken any decided stand on the moot question of inner-scholastic contests for girls.

In the larger high schools, intra-mural sports for girls seem to solve the problem; but in many schools throughout the state, there continues a rather elaborate scheduling of basketball inter-scholastic contests, on a plane somewhat equivalent to that provided for boys.

A few years ago a study was made throughout the country, and it was found that there was a decided reaction against inter-school contests in public for girls. In fact several states prohibited such contests.

In Illinois a Girls Athletic Association, as an integral part of the State Athletic Association, has been developed, with a special secretary, part of the office staff of the Illinois Association. This girls' organization fosters and encourages all sorts of athletic activities for girls but with the three fold purpose of "standardizing physical education in the schools of the state; to discourage and eliminate inter-school competition and to encourage intra-mural athletic programs for girls.

During the past year resolutions concerning girls' athletics have been adopted by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the Society of State Directors of Physical and Health Education.

Excerpts from "Policies, Regulations, and Standards for the Accrediting of Secondary Schools" adopted by the North Central Association:

- (a) The program of interscholastic athletics in high school should

be so organized and administered as to contribute to the health, leisure time, citizenship, and character objectives of secondary education. The aim should be to develop sufficient skill in one or more sports among all its pupils to provide an enjoyable form of recreation in later life.

- (b) All athletic competition should grow out of and form an integral part of the physical education program of the high school.
- (c) The administration of all athletic contests should be entirely controlled by properly constituted school officials.
- (d) The Association recommends that girls do not participate in any form of interscholastic basketball or tournaments.

Resolutions adopted by the Society of State Directors of Physical and Health Education:

The principle that girls should participate in athletics is wise and good, but the problem is one of control and conduct.

Girls should not imitate the men's and boys' activities. They should have programs of activity based on their interests and needs.

The program should include more than basketball. It should be a varied program of all kinds of sports including volley ball, captain ball, dodge ball, field ball, soccer, swimming, hiking, etc.

Girls should have a program of activities that is broad and the environment in which they play and compete should be conducive to their health and well being, and no one but trained women leaders should be in charge. The great need, therefore, is for a right program under scientific leadership.—(April, 1932, Michigan Journal of Physical Education.)

Every high school should secure a copy of a dozen-page pamphlet entitled "Athletics for Girls" published by the Department of School Health and Physical Education of the National Education Association.

Recommendations and discussions of significant questions concerning girls athletic activities are quoted from such authorities as

the two foregoing whose resolutions are given; the Committee of Athletics of the National Association of Secondary Principals; the Sixth Yearbook of the Department of Superintendence (1928); California Department of Public Health; California State Board of Education; Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association; and others, together with individual opinions of representative authorities.

In addition to this, a bibliography of nine worthwhile books dealing with the subject is given, with the names of publishers and costs.

ATHLETIC BENEFIT INSURANCE

While the present economic crisis has probably put a quietus on any immediate development of benefit insurance for athletes in our state, it is well that our members keep informed about this very newest development in insurance.

Three or four years ago, there was no such insurance. But the states of Wisconsin and Illinois, both of which had developed large Association bank accounts—well over \$100,000.00—found themselves in a position to experiment with athletic insurance.

Under the original plans, the Associations laid aside a certain number of thousands of dollars, and then asked the local high schools to pay a certain amount for each boy participating in athletics. Of course it was quite largely a "guess" as to what amount should be charged, and what amount of protection should be granted.

The types of injuries covered have been these:—Entire loss of sight in one eye; both arms broken above the elbows; both legs broken above the knees; both bones of either leg broken between ankle and knee; both bones of either arm broken between wrist and elbow; either leg broken above the knee; either arm broken above the elbow; either bone of either arm broken between wrist and elbow; either bone of either leg broken between ankle and knee; collar bone; broken nose; broken jaw; dental injuries; broken bone in hand; broken bone in foot.

CERTAIN TRENDS IN ATHLETIC INTERESTS

The Wisconsin Association Bulletin has recently pointed out several specific trends, which seem to be characteristic of athletic interests.

One trend is toward a closer tie-up of physical training and athletics, with an ever increasing emphasis on intra-mural work.

Another trend is toward a larger protection to participants in athletics. In its simplest terms it means ample suits, guards and pads

in football for instance; better playing quarters in basketball; better attention to wounds and avoidance of infection; and so on and on. Further it means the very recent development and experimentation in insurance for athletes' benefit.

A trend is seen toward the reduction of the prolonged schedules, especially in basketball. In some place this involves shorter tournaments, with several pairings of near-at-hand teams as preliminary means of elimination.

Passing mention has been made toward the marked trend toward a greatly enlarged intra-mural program—not only for the "big boys", but for all boys of all sizes and ages,—even in elementary schools; and for girls of all sizes as well. Tournaments of all sorts, indoors and out; before and after school hours, as well as during the gym periods—have come to a means of answering the demand for lively competition within the school circles. The trend is toward every student enrolled in one or more kinds of sport.

Another trend is toward such enlargement of the place of extra-curricular activities of all sorts, not on the "put-up-with-it" basis, but with the encouragement basis, as to bring about a demand for honor letters and awards of all sorts. There is a tendency toward letter and honor awards not alone for the major sports, but for minor sports, and academic and other honors.

CONCERNING DUBOW BALLS

The N. D. H. S. League as such has no more direct connection with the J. A. Dubow Company of Chicago, than it has with any of the other several athletic supply companies.

However the National Federation of State Athletic Associations, an organization made up of the majority of the Associations of the nation, has taken over considerable responsibility for the encouragement of the Dubow ball, inasmuch as this is the company that responded to the Federation's request for some company to prepare a much cheaper ball of standard quality, for high school use.

It was obvious to the school men of the country that high school boys were everywhere having a hard time to finance their high school athletics, and to pay the listed price of \$21.00 for a basketball seemed quite out of proportion to the income of most athletic associations in high schools.

The report from the Wisconsin Association, indicates that the ball has been widely used, and well received thruout that state. It has

been used exclusively in sixteen state tournaments. "Excellent reports have been received on the balls, not alone from the tournaments, but throughout the season. The few balls that were not wholly satisfactory were replaced at once, as the Dubow balls are fully guaranteed. A percentage of balls of all manufacture are defective."

"The National Federation Approved Balls are manufactured by the Dubow Company, but each ball is inspected by an expert employed by the Dubow Company before it is given the stamp of approval of the Federation."

The foregoing paragraphs are not written to advertise the Dubow balls, but rather to explain the interest the National Federation—and consequently the State Associations and Leagues—take in this product. There is little question about it—according to the viewpoint of the Federation—; the making of the Dubow ball has saved the high schools of the many states, a very large sum of money by being a factor in reducing the costs of basketballs and footballs.

At the present time, there may be other "buys" on the market that are as good or better. That is, of course, for each school to decide for itself.

A FOOTBALL INQUIRY

Finding that considerable interest was shown in the problem of "time spent by pupils away from school, playing inter-school contests", the Secretary prepared a questionnaire, inquiring into the distribution of games at home and away; games on Friday and Saturday; use of lighted fields for night games; amount of time lost from school and so on.

The following tabulation shows the replies from the schools that made use of the questionnaire.

It would appear that No. 8 (number of half days missed from school) may have been misunderstood, for the Secretary recognizes certain inaccuracies in these reports on this question.

There seems to be some tendency toward increasing the Friday games. This probably ought to have close consideration, as any marked increase in the loss of school time, may eventually react somewhat unfavorably toward school athletics.

There are as yet no marked evidences that night games are the immediate or permanent solution of financial problems. In some instances they have represented an investment rather out of proportion and have not brought in commensurate increases in revenue.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION OBJECTIVES

FOR

SECONDARY SCHOOLS

BY ARTHUR E. MORR, CAMDEN, NEW JERSEY

1. To establish conditions which will provide greater opportunity for those pupils whose physical capacities are low and for those who are unable to secure adequate exercise away from school.
2. To develop more fully the kinesthetic sense in order that the body, in addition to the acquisition of poise, may move with speed, ease, and grace and in harmony with the most efficient laws of body-mechanics.
3. To provide sufficient exercise to assist in the proper elimination of harmful substances from the body.

4. To promote a desire for maintaining sufficient energy, strength and skill necessary for the proper functioning of the neuro-motor system at all times.

5. To provide means whereby motor skills may be developed during adolescence in order to assure interest in recreational activities of value in later life.

6. To inculcate abiding interests in and for play activities, so that as adults they will provide more suitable recreational facilities for the proper up-bringing of boys and girls.

7. To create situations that will arouse and control anger, fear, hate, joy, love, gratitude, timidity, and jealousy.

8. To develop through physical fitness a desire to maintain more practical health habits throughout life.

9. To create situations which provide for wise selection of activities which are not and will not prove harmful to their physical well-being.

10. To develop in the pupils such traits as courage, leadership, loyalty, fair play, dependability, honesty, and steadfastness in order that they may be better equipped to perform the duties required for good citizenship.

11. To provide suitable opportunities for developing teamwork and co-operative play in early years, so that "group-consciousness" will carry over into adult life.

12. To develop health attitudes that will in later years make the pupils more sympathetic toward movements which make for a more healthy community and particularly better facilities in the schools for developing "physical fitness."

CONCERNING THE CLASS A AND CLASS B PLAN

While no organized study has been made to secure the final judgment of the men of the state over the results of this year's experiment, there seems to be a widespread and general approval.

That no change was necessary in the playing schedule was a relief to many, for some had understood that they would be limited to play with schools of their class alone.

The change in districting seemed on the whole to meet with approval.

The plan of an enlarged local autonomy within the District seems to have been well accepted.

The several tournaments were about as well attended as ever, notwithstanding unprecedented financial circumstances. The incomes from the tournaments were below those of other years, partly due to a lower admission fee.

The Class A Tournament was a marked success in every way. It was a "natural" to have Bismarck and Mandan draw different brackets, and then present such strong and well coached teams as to win their ways to the final. A total attendance of well over eight thousand is the estimate for the total series of games. The final game brought a capacity house, with a thousand extra seats put in for the special occasion. The Class A Tournament showed a handsome profit, as will be noted by the financial report.

The Class B Tournament was a good success from the standpoint of contests, most of which were close. There was everywhere evidenced a good spirit of sportsmanship, and all details of management were well carried out. Financially however, as was expected, the Tournament not only left much to be desired, but left much to be paid. The Tournament cost more than did the Class A Tournament, since there were no teams near, as were Bismarck and Mandan. The income was just about equal to the fees and expenses of the two officials, and the balls.

However as long as the League can meet its annual expenses, there is no reason why the experiment should not be continued as long as it is giving good satisfaction. Whether in other years the Class A Tournament can be sufficiently remunerative to meet the losses of the Class B Tournament is somewhat problematic. It may be that the income this year for the Class A Tournament was greatly increased by the fortunate success of the two home teams—Mandan and Bismarck. There is more likelihood of a decreased income for other years, than for any increase.

On the other hand there is little basis for hope that other years will see much increase in Class B Tournament income. The larger cities that have the larger gyms cannot draw an attendance. Whether there is a fairly large gym (fairly large as far as audience capacity is concerned) in some accessible town, that might draw and hold a larger attendance than is likely at Valley City, remains to be seen. It rather looks as though the experience of the Consolidated School Tournament and the Independent Tournament, and the Class B Tournament gives little grounds for expecting the Class B Tournament ever to meet its own expenses.
