NOTE PARTICULARLY:-

ALL MEMBERSHIPS EXPIRE September 30th, and are renewed only by specific payment of dues.

The fee is \$1.00 for towns under 1,000 population; \$2.00 for towns between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for towns over 2,000.

BUT IF dues are not paid by November 1st they shall be increased by \$5.00; and if not paid by December 1st, they shall be increased by \$10.00. Further, dues are to be accepted only after there has been filed with the Secretary, a complete listing of all athletic participants for the preceding year, on appropriate Official Eligibility Blanks. Further, no memberships shall be accepted after January first. AND:—Dues cannot be accepted if your OFFICIAL ELIGIBILITY BLANKS FOR FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL HAVE NOT BEEN FILED WITH THE SECRETARY.

What To Do In

SEPTEMBER

- (a) Why not hold an athletic rally or special assembly presenting League Eligibility Rules together with a Pep Meeting to start the year right, and develop an atmosphere of Good Sportsmanship. One specific thing upon which many schools are working is the reduction-to-a-minimum of "booing" at basketball games. Our state as a whole is singularly and pleasantly free from it. But the radio is being influential in showing the prevalence of "booing" in prize fights; and this distressing custom is not unknown in State Tournaments in some adjoining states according to reports.
- (b) Why not see to it personally that EVERY SINGLE candidate for athletic positions is specifically eligible under every League Rule. Watch particularly for all lads who are approaching the twenty year limit. Check up on all 4 year players, to make certain that this may not be the fifth year.
- (c) Give especial attention to the "tobacco rule" and get it into action from the first day of school.
- (d) And remember that the Board of Control interprets the drinking of beer as breaking the "intoxicating liquor" rule.

OCTOBER

It costs an added \$5.00 if you do not get your League membership fee in to the Secretary before October is over. Rush it in now while you think of it. Most schools pay their fees in September of course.

There is no Official Football Championship under League direction.

NOVEMBER

The Annual H. S. League Meeting will be held at N. D. E. A. time. One matter of prime importance is the completion of plans for putting into operation some form of Athletic Insurance.

In getting ready for a heavy basketball season why not start at once with (a) constant and never varying custom of exchanging the Eligibility Exchange Sheets with the other schools, and (b) the like custom of using the Uniform Contracts, inserting some penalty to cover possible breaking of contract, if you so desire. The blank has provisions for that very thing.

Bring to the League meeting an ample supply of suggestions for strengthening the basketball season, and particularly the Basketball Tournaments.

Note particularly:—If you have still forgotten to pay your Membership Fee, hurry it into the Secretary for next month it will cost your school an extra \$10.00 while this month the added cost is only \$5.00.

DECEMBER

Note:—That Membership Fee! It cannot be accepted at all after the end of this month. It now costs you an extra \$10.00.

Note Particularly:—Get your Tournament Entry Fee of \$2.00 sent in this month, to your Chairman of your District Tournament Committee. Why not hold a Special Assembly this month dealing again with Good Sportsmanship; and more particularly with the application of the Non-smoking-and-drinking rule. The Board of Control has ruled that for contests which begin in the Second Semester—such as track, music, declamation and the like (not including basketball of course) the Non-tobacco-and-liquor rule goes into effect with the beginning of the Second Semester. Further it is ruled that the drinking of beer is a violation of Eligibility Rule No. Eleven.

Note also:—All girls representing your high school in basketball, or music or any other form of inter-school contests must be eligible under all League Eligibility rules just the same as the boys. League rules apply to ALL FORMS of inter-school contests.

Note particularly:—By action of the Board of Control any Class B School may challenge any one of the three nearest Class A Schools for entrance into the State Tournament. Such challenge must be before January 1st.

JANUARY

Remember your Tournament Entry Fee of \$2.00. If you get to your District Chairman after the 15th of this month, the fee is doubled and becomes \$4.00. Don't overlook it. Be economical.

With the basketball season on in full swing, better make a personal check up on all eligibility problems.

FEBRUARY

Hurry. Your Tournament Entry Fee is now \$4.00 but your District Committee Chairman can accept it up to the 15th of this month. Thereafter, you're out of luck, so far as entry into the Tournaments is concerned.

MARCH

Tournament Month. Class B State Tournament the third week end in March, with Regional and District Tournaments the two week ends preceding. Class A State Tournament the week end following Class B Tournament.

Why not write in advance, any worthy suggestions to your Tournament Committee. Chairmen are eager to make their District Tournaments the best possible.

APRIL

Annual Spring Meeting of the League at University Conference. Check up on all track and field athletes; and on all music and declamation and all other contestants. All must be eligible under League rules of Eligibility.

MAY

Track and Field contest month. Music, Declamation, Debate et al. Let's build up these contests all we can.

Summary of Significant Dates

September 30th. All memberships expire at midnight.

October 31st. Memberships paid after this date cost \$5.00 additional.

November 30th. Memberships paid after this date cost \$10.00 additional.

December 31st. No membership can be received after this date. Dead line! Tournament Entry Fee of \$2.00 is due. Pay it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman. Class B Schools' Challenges to

Class A must be made on or before this date. Dead line!

January 15th. Tournament Entry Fee doubled to \$4.00 after this date.

February 15th. Tournament Fee not accepted after this date. Dead line.

- 1. Introductory remarks and greetings by President Tighe.
- 2. Report of the Secretary-Treasurer.

This in spite of the fact that the Class B tournament resulted in a net loss of \$1,025.20.

Moved by Elstad and seconded that the report of the Secretary-Treasurer be accepted, subject to approval of Audit Committee. Motion carried.

- 2. Appointment of Audit Committee:—Supt. Carl Gilbertson of Kenmare, Supt. E. A. Quam of Oakes, Prin. A. A. Elstad of Jamestown, whose subsequent audit shows checking account as per bank statement \$376.43, plus \$2.00 in stamps not deposited but received as dues, minus \$12.05 in outstanding checks, a total of \$366.38 to agree with the Treasurer's report, together with a signed statement from the custodian of the Union National Bank Safety Deposit Box Vault, showing other resources as above listed, in the amount of \$5,880.60, and a complete total of \$6,246.98 as above reported by the Treasurer.
- 3. Appointment of Nominating Committee:—Grindstuen of Beach, Abrahamson of Mohall, Arneson of Leeds, Ottem of Langdon, and Urness of Williston. These subsequently report the names of Zimmerman of Grafton, Dominick of Wahpeton, *Peterson of Bisbee and *Swenson of New Rockford, with comments on the desirability of having other Class B towns represented on the League Board of Control.

The subsequent election shows 49 votes for Dominick, 35 votes for Zimmerman, 27 votes for Peterson, 23 votes for Swenson; and Dominick is declared re-elected to succeed himself and Zimmerman to succeed J. C. Gould, both for a three year term. The election returns also show 1 vote for Robertson; who was already a member of the Board, and not a candidate.

*Note:-Swenson and Zimmerman were nominated from the floor.

4. Supt. Gilliland of Devils Lake makes a very complete report for the Committee which had been investigating possibilities of Athletic Benefit Insurance. He analyzed the advantages and disadvantages of Standard Insurance Companies' Plans, of School Co-operative Plans of compulsary and non-compulsary types, and closed with a summarized report herewith attached, expressing a belief that nothing should be done until after the more extensive study being made by W. R. Reitan who is working on a master's thesis on the subject, then made a motion that was seconded and carried, that the report be accepted and placed on file for future reference.

- 3. Of the plans presented in the report do you prefer insurance by regular insurance companies or by function of the state association? Answer. By state association.
- 4. Of the mutual assistance plans presented, which one do you prefer? Answer. Wisconsin plan.
- 5. Should the insurance be compulsory for all schools? Answer. Yes.
- 6. Should the premium be included in the state dues if the plan is to be compulsory for all schools? Answer. Yes.
- 7. How should the premium be alloted? Check one or more than one if no particular preference.

5. Dominick speaks representing Board of Control, recommending the continuance of the Class A and Class B Tournaments, on the same plan subject to such changes as may be suggested to the Board of Control.

He makes such motion, seconded by Gilliland; it carries.

- 6. Tournament dates for 1934 are set as follows:-Corresponding to last year. Class B Final State Tournament, March 23, 24, with Class B Regionals and Districts the preceding weeks respectively; and Class A Final State Tournament, March 16 and 17.
- 7. President Tighe makes a strong plea for clean and controlled language on the playing field by coaches and players, with special reference to swearing.
- 8. Discussion led by Dahlen that after the State Tournaments are completed, either team be free to challenge the other for Final State Honors. The Secretary points out that such is the case, and refers to the printed Handbook covering this point on page 17, 1933 Handbook.

The motion that it be left optional with the challenged team to accept or reject was lost for want of a second.

Urness moves and Payne seconds that if such final Playoff Game is held, it shall not be at League expense, and that the League shall not be responsible for either profit or loss therefrom. Carried.

Note:-The discussion made clear that such a game does not seem desirable, hence if the League is not responsible for financing it, there is less likelihood that the teams would rush into the game, careless of expense.

- 9. Moved and seconded that such Playoff games be abandoned. Carried.
 - 10. Adjournment.

Meetings of the Board of Control

MINOT MEETING OF BOARD OF CONTROL Minot, Nov. 3, Friday Noon, Leland Hotel (LaPlaza)

Present:-Tighe, Robertson, Dominick, White. Absent: Gould.

- 1. Basketballs. Agreed to use Dubow balls. Kimball of Northern School Supply Co., quotes \$9.00 price on Tournament balls. Agreed to divide in same proportion as last year:-Colburn School Supply Company 1/3 approximately, and Northern two-thirds, if Colburn Company gives same price.
- 2. Newton of Josten Co., discusses trophies and charms briefly, indicating some raise in price due to N. R. A., perhaps 10% on charms; uncertain about change on trophies for which we have contract, but apparently N. R. A. can set such contracts aside or consider them subject to change.

No action taken.

- 3. Reference also made to Bismarck Trophy, i. e. trophy to be placed in Bismarck Memorial Hall, whereon could be placed names of annual State Champions, beginning back with first Tournament, and carrying on to about 1950. Such trophy is to be "looked into" by Newton, and price quoted. Board inquires of possibility of Bismarck providing such trophy.
- 4. Carpio and Lansford ask to be changed from last year's District to No. 14. Board willing if No. 14 is agreeable, and Lansford reports suck okay from Gilbertson representing No. 14.
- 5. Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick, that St. Leo's (High School of Minot) because of entrance in the National Catholic Tournament contrary to the spirit of the National Federation of State H. S. A. A., it shall be suspended from the N. D. H. S. League during the first semester. Carried.

Note:-It is understood the semester closes at 4:00 (or other regular closing time of the 1st day of the semester and that the school be eligible for regular play thereafter.)

6. Interpretation of Age Limit Rule.

Moved by Dominick, seconded by Robertson that it be the intention of Eligibility Rule No. 7, that a high school lad may not play on the 20th anniversary of his birth, nor thereafter. Carried.

Note:—The National Federation states a corresponding rule thus: "A pupil shall not have reached his 20th birthday."

The intention of the Board is to do away with legal or other quibbling about this rule. If a lad's birthday is on Saturday, he may play Friday, but not thereafter.

7. Interpretation of Transfer Rule.

Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick, that "a pupil who has enrolled in a high school in any city and transferred during the school year to any other high school in the same city shall not be eligible during the same school year", such to be a clarifying interpretation of Rule No. 10. Carried.

Note:—The discussion, with some difference of opinion, indicated a conclusion that such pupils might change from high school to another in the same city without application of the semester's ineligibility, provided such transfer is not made after the opening of either of the schools affected. A pupil's attendance at one school in June and another in September is okay, in the same District.

- 8. Reference to invitation from Bismarck to hold both Class A and Class B Tournaments there (State Finals), without guarantee of the latter.
- 9. Discussion of the 3 and 10 second rules in basketball; of Secretary's proposal to print special Eligibility Report Blank for use at time of payment of dues; of the "Basketball Play Situations" pamphlets; of the mandamus threatened by Hettinger. No action taken on any of these items.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Friday, 6:00 P. M.-Office of Board of Education, Minot

Present:-Tighe, Robertson, Dominick, White.

- 1. Robertson moves the re-election of B. C. Tighe as president of the Board of Control, seconded by Dominick, and re-election of L. A. White, as Secretary-Treasurer. Carried.
- 2. Moved by Dominick, seconded by White that C. L. Robertson be named vice-president. Carried.
- 3. Reference made to letter to Tighe from Lemmon, S. D., indicating that Niccum had been used by the Hettinger School on Friday, October 20th. Also that Grafton had used Whalen from Cando. No action taken, pending further information.
- 4. Robertson who had been appointed to look into the new 3 and 10 second rules in basketball, reports that it seems best to use the rules "as is". It is so moved and carried.

Note:—Reference at the time was made to the Coaches' Association who subsequently by questionairre inquired into the state wide preference on the proposed rules.

5 Reference was made to the advisability of a new committee in District No. 14 proposing Howard Peterson, Paulson of Bottineau, and Arneson of Leeds.

Adjournment.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

February 10, 1934-Fargo North Dakota

Present:-Tighe, Dominick, Robertson, Zimmerman, White.

I. Three Class B Schools elect to become Class A.

Wahpeton will play Fargo.

Dickinson will play Mandan.

St. Mary's will play Bismarck.

A. Agreed that representatives to two schools get together to make all arrangements for challenge games. In case they cannot agree, they are to call in a third man to help settle the matter, and if they cannot agree upon a man, the Board of Control will appoint the third member. Carried unanimously.

B. Finances of challenge games.

Moved by Robertson and second by White that financially the challenge games be governed by the same rule as B district games, whereby any surplus of revenue over expenses be placed in a fund to be credited to the Class A district, except that only \$100 reserve be allowed instead of \$300. The money is understood to be League money. All money is to be sent to the League secretary-treasurer.

II. STATE TOURNAMENTS.

A. Officials:--Wyttenbach, Holzer, Nichols, Holgate.

Moved by White, seconded by Robertson, that these four men be notified of their selection to officiate at A and B State Tournaments at \$75.00 and expenses; Wyttenbach and Holgate to officiate at Class A Tournament; Nichols and Holzer to officiate at B tournament. (Since Holgate was found to be unavailable at the time of the Class A tournament, he and Holzer exchanged positions). Carried unanimously.

B. PLACE OF TOURNAMENTS.

Moved by Robertson and seconded by Dominick that the invitation of the Bismarck Chamber of Commerce to hold the Class A State Tournament at specified terms be accepted. Carried unanimously.

Moved by White and seconded by Zimmerman that we accept the offer of the Valley City S. T. C. to hold the Class B State Tournament at the College with provisions of a guarantee of \$600.00 income and the banquet for competing teams. Unanimously carried.

C. AWARDS.

- 1. Moved by L. A. White and seconded by Robertson that the Board of Control maintain its contract with the Josten Mfg. Company for state and district placques accepting whatever raise in price might be necessary under the NRA. Carried unanimously.
- 2. Moved by Dominick and seconded by Zimmerman that Balfour be given order for ten sets of "All-State" individual awards at \$2.30 a set.
- 3. Moved by Dominick and seconded by Zimmerman that sixteen gold basketballs and sixteen silver basketballs for championship and runner-up teams be ordered from Fargo Jewelry Company at \$3.75 per set, as well as the ninety-six "participant" awards at 50c apiece.

 - B. PROTEST OF BERTHOLD relative to State Independent Tourney Conflict.

Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick, that Secretary writeto President of State Independent League, asking that another year,

arrangements be made to avoid conflicts in dates of tournaments; and to write Supt. Olson of Berthold, giving him authority to hold tournament at other than regular dates. Carried unanimously.

IV. INTERPRETATIONS.

- A. Wahpeton boy transferred to Colfax by order of court to live with his brother, but not adopted. Board held that the transfer rule could not be waived for obvious reasons by rule of eligibility of the transfer rule. Board rules boy ineligible under transfer rule.
- B. Howard Evanson of Underwood-transfer; father travels; lives in Underwood. O. K.
- C. Mandan boy played a little against another school on second or third team. Not eligible under Section 2.
- D. Official eligibility record in the office of the Secretary shows Alvin Graf of Linton to have been born in 1914, but the school claims this was a high school error and offers proof that 1915 was the correct birthdate. The Board carefully studied all available testimony and accepts the correction.
- E. Velva lad-parents dead; has lived with uncle, attending school at Columbus; now living with another uncle near Velva. Ruled ineligible under Section 10.
- F. Cando boy transfers to Grafton. School authorities testify that preliminary adoption papers have been made out and that this is a bona fide case of legal adoption. The Board rules the boy eligible but with the understanding that if subsequent developments show there is any error in the auctual adoption the case must be reopened and the school considered to have jeopardized its League standing by playing an ineligible athlete.
- G. Moved by Dominick, seconded by Zimmerman, that Hettinger be suspended from the High School League for the interscholastic football season 1934 season because of playing George Niccum after he had been officially ruled ineligible by the Board. Unanimously carried.
- H. Neighboring school claims Marmarth played Niccum, now of Hettinger, last year on two credits. Marmarth makes satisfactory explanation, showing that while he failed in the first semester of the given year, he passed three subjects in the second semester, thus becoming eligible for the following fall.
- I. Sanish boy goes to Plaza to get certain subjects he wants. Apparently no other strong reason. Not eligible until semester's attendance under section 10.

- J. Monogram earner found guilty of drinking. School inquires it they are justified in giving him a monogram. Reply: Your own jurisdiction.
- K. Ray boy—home broken; left Montana school for Ray to live with grandparents. Not eligible until after semester's attendance under section 10.
- L. Calvin school proposes an athlete as having played three seasons and half of another and therefore should be eligible to play half of the present season. The Board rules that the player is not eligible inasmuch as there is no such thing as a half or whole season since participation in even part of a game on any team must count as participation for that season. In other words, if a boy plays three full seasons, playing in all or most of the games and then plays only a small fraction of one game in a fourth season, he still is not eligible to participate a fifth season.
- M. Carrington lad transfers from Absakara for school in Carrington since he cannot get studies he wants to prepare for dentistry. Not eligible until after a semester's attendance, under section 10.
- N. New England lad takes two high school subjects and reviews eighth grade arithmetic. Ruled ineligible under section 5, the Board having previously ruled that a student who carries two or more high school subjects shall be considered a high school student and all high school students are required to complete three high school subjects.
- O. Calvin lad passes two subjects and gets a condition. Not eligible under section 5.
- P. a. Oakes lad entered High School in St. Paul in fall; comes back to Oakes, his parents not having moved at all. Ruled eligible under section 10 inasmuch as his parents have not moved and it is his privilege to attend his own high school.
- b. Similarly Pembina boy goes to Milwaukee high school, his parents do not move, and he returns to Pembina. Eligible.
- Q. New Salem lad a senior from Leal. Now makes his own home in New Salem but does not live with his parents. Not eligible until after a semester's attendance under section 10.
- R. St. James Academy (Grand Forks) lad attends CCC camp; missed school. When eligible? Answer: when he has attended as many days as absent and makes up work under sections 1 and 5.
- S. Enderlin boy drops out of school before close of semester. Will he be eligible next semester? No, under section 8.

- T. Under new law, Minnesota will pay tuition for certain boys to attend Fairmount, North Dakota, high school. Are they eligible for first semester? No, under section 10, until after a semester of attendance.
- U. a. Can Golva play Montana schools? League members may play schools of other states by using the specified participation blank and always employing only fully eligible players according to all eligibility requirements.
- b. As a consolidated school, can they join our League? Consolidated schools giving four years of High School and with standards at least equivalent to those of third class classified schools may be granted annual membership by special action of the Board of Control. About a dozen of such schools are League members.
- V. Is Grant eligible at Hettinger this year, having transferred last year from New England on the grounds that that school might not have a full term of nine months? The Board of Control last year ruled Grant eligible to transfer from New England to Hettinger and participate in athletics even though his parents did not move on the grounds that it then seemed certain that New England would not have nine full months of school. The understanding of the Board that Grant would be a senior subsequently was found to be a misunderstanding and the Board having ruled him eligible could find no basis for considering him ineligible this year, since he is no longer a transfer pupil and section 10 does not apply.
- W. St. Mary's in New England is a four-year high school, not classified. Can League members play with it? Section three of article 5 prevents League members from competing with non-League members, provided the latter are eligible to membership, but since St. Mary's is not a classified school, it is not eligible to League membership and there is therefore no objection to such contests.
- X. Edmore boy takes part in practice Independent B. B. contest during holidays. If this were a regularly scheduled game with admission fee and advertising and regular officials and full-time periods and scores kept, etc., the player then is not eligible under section 3. If, however, it was only a practice game, he may be considered eligible, but in this and similar cases a full description of the game and conditions under which it was played should be presented to the Board of Control that they may distinguish between "regular" game and "practice" game.
- Y. Jamestown plays ineligible man through error. What about it? Several weeks after contest, Jamestown finds it has played an athlete

in the final football game with Fargo who was not up in three subjects. He was put in the game for a short time, not to strengthen the team but since he was a senior, and this was the last game of the year, to give a chance to earn a letter. Upon discovering the situation, Jamestown school reported it to the Board of Control. The Board ruled that the game should be declared forfeited and publicity be given thereto and further rules that a letter of criticism be sent to the Jamestown school to be read in a special assembly, calling attention to this unfortunate breaking of the League rules, urging a more careful attention to both the spirit and the letter of the League rules and a continuance of the spirit that has so regularly characterized the Jamestown High School; and giving public censure to the player himself in the event the school authorities find that he was aware of his own ineligibility.

- Z. Neche business men will furnish sweat outfits which school cannot afford, but insist on having firm names on backs. This is within the jurisdiction of the school, if they are to belong to the school henceforth, and not to the players.
- A1. Arnegard boy did passing work last semester of last year but did not attend first semester of this year. Now enrolled; if he does passing work in three half-units of work this new semester, is he eligible? O. K. "The last semester" does not of necessity need to be the preceding semester.
- A2. Bowesmont boy quit last March so did not take final exams or graduate, though it was the eighth semester. What of his eligibility this year? The lad is not eligible since he was enrolled in the new semester more than ten days but did not complete three or more studies.
- A3. Langdon boy passes two subjects plus Bible study; is he eligible? And continues in the new semester to pass same two subjects plus Bible Study. What is his status? (Bible Study is taken in keeping with the State Syllabus). O. K. Bible Study taken under state requirements should be given full credit the same as any other listed in the manual.
- A4. Hettinger boy played independent basketball last fall when not in school. Now back in school and wants to play basketball. Eligible this semester? Is eligible inasmuch as he was not a member of the school at the time he played this independent basketball.
- A5. Elgin boy stopped school at Christmas time last year; started again this Christmas, completing subjects started last year. O. K. after the end of the semester if he completes the subjects he had previously studied.

- A6. Mohall boy passed all eighth grade subjects except two which he is now taking in high school along with three regular high school subjects. The player is eligible so long as he passes in his three high school subjects and both of his eighth grade subjects.
- A7. Can Carrington boy, placed on all-state football team, accept trophy or ring as gift from business men? The League prohibits the acceptance of any award whose monetary value is greater than one dollar.
- A8. Washburn boy passed two subjects and band. Band is regular daily work for which one full credit is given for the year. This represents an unusual situation and it is irregular for so much credit to be given for one kind of music work. However, the Board of Control will approve his eligibility if J. A. Page, director of Secondary Education approves the credit.

V. MISCELLANEOUS.

- A. Some consideration is given to the problem of "drinking" as proposed from one corner of the state. It is apparent that the new beer is making the situation considerably involved.
- B. Some consideration of correspondence showing criticism of the situation at St. Mary's school at Bismarck with three letters protesting against holding the State Tournament in that city because of those local conditions.
- C. Eckelson and Svea (Litchville) request entrance into the High School League, both of which are accepted in spite of the late date.
- D. Discussion of Track and Field Meets. After considerable discussion the following conclusions were reached:
- 1. The track and field meet at the University is designated as the State Meet for 1934, with Coach C. A. West named as manager.
- 2. Any Open Meet with six or more League schools entered shall be considered a qualifying official meet.
- 3. In such meets every event having four or more entrants from League schools shall be considered a qualifying event and winners of first and second places shall be eligible to enter the State Meet.
- 4. The manager of such meets shall be an official approved by the Board of Control, which official shall make a report on the blank to be especially provided by the State Manager, the report to be sent to the Manager of the State Meet, each such meet to be run after the order of events and manner as outlined by the State Manager; when such Meets are given such official approval by the Board of Control

all entrants who win first or second place in events having four or more entrants shall be eligible to enter the State Meet; provided further that the State Manager acting as a representative of the Board of Control shall have authority to receive and pass upon petitions for other entrants.

MEETING OF BOARD OF CONTROL

Valley City-March 23-24, 1934

Present: B. C. Tighe, M. B. Zimmerman, Leo H. Dominick, C. L. Robertson, L. A. White.

- A. Agreed that an honorarium of \$50 be given Professor F. C. Spalding as manager of the Class B tournament, together with an expression of appreciation and approval.
- B. Agreed that \$500 shall be turned over to Professor F. C. Spalding as an advance payment to make up the deficit of the Class B tournament.
- C. Moved by Dominick and seconded by Zimmerman that the Board of Control recommend to the League that any Class B team may challenge any one of its three nearest Class A teams to determine who shall enter the Class A tournament. In the event of controversy as to distance, the Board of Control will determine the "nearest three". Carried.
- D. Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick that the Class B State Tournament be held on the third week end of March and the Class A State Tournament be held the following week, thus reversing the order of the two tournaments. Carried.

The discussion leading up to this motion indicated the belief that this plan would gain better attendance for the Class B tournament.

- E. Moved by Zimmerman and seconded by Robertson that the challenges by B teams must be made not later than January 1. Carried.
- F. The secretary was instructed to confer with other states as to the length of time of their tournaments. Subsequently he found that South Dakota is making similar investigations and arrangements were made to secure the results of the South Dakota questionnaire.
- G. The secretary was instructed to get word to the towns of the state likely to have meets, informing them of the plan for making such meets official meets by such arrangements as were developed at the Fargo Board of Control meeting.

- H. It was proposed that the secretary give some news item to the AP explaining how the finances received from the State A tournament were divided and handled.
- I. Moved by Dominick seconded by Robertson that consolidated school members of the State High School League shall not be considered eligible to enter the High School League tournaments if they have entered the consolidated school League tournament. Carried.
- J. Moved by Dominick, seconded by Zimmerman that the membership fee be increased by \$5.00 if not paid by November 1; increased by \$10.00 if not paid by December 1; and that no membership fees be accepted after January 1; and that such membership fees are acceptable only in the event the Eligibility Reports of the preceding season has been sent to the secretary at his office. Carried.

Motion to adjourn carried.

MEETING BOARD OF CONTROL

· March, 1934—Bismarck

Present:-Tighe, Zimmerman, Robertson, White.

Several meetings were held for informal discussion of pertinent topics, but no action taken. The Board discussed local tournament problems with Bismarck representatives concerning behavior, co-operation of local and state officials, "the beer situation", and other matters.

The following motion was made and carried:—That it shall be the interpretation of the Board of Control that the spirit of Rule II is broken by the drinking of beer. Carried.

SPRING MEETING, N. D. H. S. LEAGUE

Grand Forks, May 17-Merrifield Hall

Present:—Representatives of 12 schools. Not a quorum, 20 being required for a quorum.

Mr. Tighe discusses a proposal for an experiment in athletic insurance, proposing that \$1,000.00 League money be set aside for the purpose, and schools pay some minor fee—perhaps 50c per athlete to be insured—at the end of the year report to the Board of Control the extent of the injuries of these insured athletes, and let the Board divide back to the schools their proportionate part of the sum from the Insurance Fund.

Members present seemed fully inclined to adopt some such proposal, but action was deferred because of want of an official quorum. However the president was authorized to ask Mr. Gilliland and his in-

surance committee of last year to continue in action and present at the Fall Meeting, a specific plan to operate next year for the basketball season. Motion by Dominick, carried.

The Secretary-Treasurer presented the year's membership list, and financial statement, audited and accepted, as herewith attached.

The "insurance" plan was given encouragement because of the flourishing condition of the State treasury.

Moved by Mr. Payne, seconded and carried that the report of the audit committee (Payne and Lindgren) and the financial and membership report of the Secretary-Treasurer, be accepted.

There was some discussion of the meaning of the transfer rule. It is the contention of some that the latter clause of the transfer rule is to apply only after a school year has once started, hence the words, "for the remainder of the school year"; but does not mean that a boy changing schools in the same town as to or from Model, Parochial, Public, should be penalized two semesters if he enters the new school at the beginning of the school year. There is recognized much merit in the interpretation and this should be entirely in keeping with the thought of the Board of Control that there should be an easy transfer between parochial and public schools—(and perhaps also with Model Schools). No action was taken.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL Thursday, May 17, 1934—Ryan Hotel, Grand Forks

Messrs Legault, Jackson and Schuler of Hettinger appeared before the Board of Control (Dominick being absent) to present certain affidavits and explain that the playing of Niccum in the Lemmon S. D. game was done without knowledge or thought that such play was either illegal or improper. Mr. Legault felt that since the S. D. team played a lad who was inelligible under N. D. rules (being 21) it would be all right to play Niccum whom he thought would have been eligible under S. D. rules. Note:—This was an error since Sections 15 and 17 of Article X of the S. D. H. S. A. A. makes clear.

Impressed with the sincereity of Mr. Legault, and believing there was no open intention of abrogating the rules of the League or action of the Board, the Board reversed its decision whereby at the Fargo Meeting it had ruled Hettinger suspended for the time of the football season in 1934, and made the penalty thus:—

- (a) The Lemmon game is to be forfeited.
- (b) A special high school assembly is to be held in which the superintendent or other official shall explain the breaking of the League rules.

- (c) An official communication from the Board of Control addressed to the faculty and students shall be read at the Assembly.
- (d) And the penalty of suspension shall be withdrawn pending the year of complete and conscientious support of the rules and regulations of the H. S. League.

Motion covering the above substitute penalty made by Zimmerman, seconded by White and carried. White not approving the addition of point (d), it was left to the Secretary to add the given point (d) or not according to subsequent circumstances. The point at issue concerned the advisability of giving publicity to the given point.

There was some discussion of a possible rewording of the "transfer rule" and of the "20 year" rule, with the interpretations of which, considerable question has been raised throughout the state. No action taken.

The N. D. H. S. League also holds Receiver's Certificate No. 501 acknowledging the League deposit of \$601.88 in the Farmers State Bank of Mandan. On this, two 10% dividends have been paid. While the complete payment is still problematic, in all likelihood further payments may be made from time to time. The present balance is \$481.88.

Of Athletic Interest Generally

To maintain the League office records at a point where they may really be of service, the Board of Control has ruled that until a school shall have filed the Official Eligibility Sheets, it is not eligible to membership. Forty five schools had not made their reports at the end of the school year.

The Board of Control has directed a committee to make specific report looking toward the establishment of Athletic Protective Insurance to begin with the 1934-35 basketball season.

Income for both Class A and Class B State Tournaments was increased over last year. District and Regional Tournaments do not as yet "bear their own weight". The three "challenge games" were all profit making, net proceeds reverting to the League Treasury with the

provision that up to \$100.00 shall be accredited to the Class A District in which the schools played.

For next year, any Class B school may choose any one of the three nearest Class A Schools to challenge, but such challenge must be issued before December 31st shall have passed.

After the end of October all League memberships cost \$5.00 additional; and after November is over the increase is \$10.00; and none can be had after December is past.

Once in a while North Dakota League schools feel the Board of Control does not take as "liberal" an attitude toward rule infractions as it might. What would be thought of the action of Michigan in suspending Menominee for using Major John L. Griffith to officiate in one of its games. The "penalty was due to the fact that Major Griffith was not "registered" in the Michigan League as an official. The suspension was applauded by the Illinois Association Journal.

Indiana considered a rule that has been adopted by Texas, namely that a transferred pupil shall not be eligible to represent the new school, no matter when he transferred, until after he shall have been in the new school a full calendar year.

In Ohio spring football practice is not legal, the schools may begin fall practice ae early as August 20th. North Dakota has no restriction on football practice.

It is generally known in our state that the North Central Association in March, 1931, adopted Recommendation 8 e, "The association recommends that girls do not participate in any form of interscholastic basketball games or contests."

Illinois schools in the N. C. A. used 16 as the median number of interscholastic basketball games for a season, exclusive of Tournament play. Of 339 schools, only 35 played 20 or more. A schedule of 20 games is usually regarded as too much for a single team.

The Illinois Athletic Association last year with its budget of \$24,050.00 paid \$14,110.00 for salaries and \$3,630.00 for office expenses, not including \$550.00 for travel expenses or \$500.00 for Board of Control expenses. That Association is well-to-do receiving \$5000.00 a year from "investments", \$2,150.00 from dues and \$15,000.00 from Meets and Tournaments.

The new "stream-lined" football and the smaller (29½ inch) basket-

ball probably both merit general approval which seems to be given them in secondary schools.

* * *

The National Federation of State H. S. Athletic Associations has a Committee on Football Rules and Basketball Rules, and this Committee has recently completed some changes that propose to make the games better adapted to younger athletes.

The South Dakota H. S. Athletic Association has recently completed a study of State Basketball Tournament plans as follows:
