The League Calendar

NOTE PARTICULARLY:-

ALL MEMBERSHIPS EXPIRE September 30th, and are renewed only by specific payment of dues.

The fee is \$1.00 for towns under 1,000 population; \$2.00 for towns between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for towns over 2,000.

BUT IF dues are not paid by November 1st they shall be increased by \$5.00; and if not paid by December 1st, they shall be increased by \$10.00. Further, no memberships shall be accepted after January first. AND:—Dues cannot be accepted if your OFFICIAL ELIGIBILITY BLANKS FOR FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL HAVE NOT BEEN FILED WITH THE SECRETARY.

What To Do In

SEPTEMBER:

- (a) Pay the dues at once; secure all League blanks thereby, including Six Man Football book.
- (b) Join the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, to protect your school, and your boys.
- (c) Have a physicial examination of all boys preparing to participate in athletics.
- (d) Secure written parental permission for all boys who are to participate in athletics.
- (e) Begin at once to check all player's eligibility:—Age, semesters of attendance, seasons of attendance, and scholastic records the past semester particularly.
- (f) Get an early start on the SIX MAN FOOTBALL.
- (g) Give special attention to the tobacco and beer rule, right from the start.
- (h) Why not a special "For-the-good-of-athletics" assembly, early in September.
- (i) See News Letters for the Six Man Football Tournament Plans.

OCTOBER:

- (a) Hurry and pay the membership fee. After October 31, there is a \$5.00 penalty.
- (b) What of the Six Man Football Championships?
- (c) A good time now to think about the Accident Benefit Fund, for Basketball.

NOVEMBER:

- (a) At N. D. E. A. time, the Annual Fall meeting is the Big meeting of the League year. This is the time to bring in all sorts of well thought out plans and suggestions.
- (b) Start your plans from the first, for the never-varying custom in all contests, and particularly in basketball, of (a) exchanging Eligibility Sheets; and (b) Contracts.
- (c) Be preparing your data for the Official Eligibility Exchange Blank-but do not send it to the Secretary's office, until it is specifically called for.
- (d) If your dues are still unpaid, HURRY UP, for after the last day of November, there is a TEN DOLLAR PENALTY to be added to your dues. Too bad, too.

DECEMBER:

- (a) If your membership fee has not been paid before the end of this month, you are out of the League.
- (b) Class B schools better send in their Tournament Fees now, for it has to be doubled after the 15th of next month. You might forget it.
- (c) With basketball right on us, why not check again every possible representative of your school on all eligibility points; complete the physicial examinations; really secure parental consent; protect the boys with the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund; hold a special assembly to talk about all eligibility rules, with special bearing on the tobacco and beer rule.
- (d) Yes, the League has adopted a Committee Report, urging against interscholastic competitive contests for girls. It is not prohibited however, by our League as has been done in some states.
- (e) See the News Letters for the "Challenge Games" Plans.

JANUARY:

- (a) Too late to join the League now.
- (b) Pay up your Tournament Entry Fees (Class B Schools) before the 15th, and save the \$2.00 penalty. Send it to your District Tournament Chairman.
- (c) Did you actually complete—the physicial examination; parental permission for participantion; athletic assembly; membership in A. A. Benefit Fund-and other good resolutions-or are you merely paving some more (with good intentions).

FEBRUARY:

(a) Entry fee is doubled now (\$4.00), but still can be received by the 15th. Hurry it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.

- (b) Avoid that end-of-the-season embarrassment to your school and team, by making certain before the Tournaments are any nearer, that there is no possible eligibility question about any of your contestants.
- (c) Why not write to your Tournament Committee, giving suggestions for tournaments.

MARCH:

- (a) The Tournament month. News Letters will give specific dates. By tradition the closing Tournament of the season is held about the third week end of March, with other Tournaments coming respectively one, two and three weeks prior to that time. Unless other plans are announced by News Letters, the Class A Tournament will be held during the third week-end in March.
- (b) With the closing of the basketball season, you are preparing your data for the Official Eligibility Report, whereon you list the record of absolutely every lad who has represented your school in any inter-scholastic basketball contest, however unimportant, on any team (whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd or other) for any length of time however brief, and regardless whether he was in Grade school or junior high school or senior high school (provided only that the team was not made up of players all of whom were below ninth grade).

APRIL:

- (a) Track time begins. The League is making a strenuous effort to develop track and field work. Get your lads in as many meets as you can. It is a fine spring sport.
- (b) Unless otherwise notified, any Track Meet large enough to have 6 League schools entered, if an open meet, automatically becomes an Official Qualifying Meet for any subsequent State Meet. Qualifying events must have at least 3 contestants; and 1st and 2nd place winners are eligible for the "State" Meets.
- (c) Have you considered the Athletic Accident Fund protection for your track and field boys? It has frequently saved some school embarrassment, and helped lads pay injury bills.

MAY:

(a) Classified High Schools, whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd, of whatever size in enrollment must be League members to participate in any kind of Inter-scholastic contest,—athletic, music, declamation, etc.—whether held in a County Festival, or a State University or elsewhere. Lines are to be more rigidly drawn than heretofore.

Summary of Significant Dates

September 30th. All memberships expire at midnight.

October 31st. Memberships paid after this date cost \$5.00 additional.

November 30th. Memberships paid after this date cost \$10.00 additional.

December 31st. No membership can be received after this date.

Dead line! Tournament Entry Fee of \$2.00 is due. Pay it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman. Class B Schools' Challenges to Class A must be made on or before this date.

January 15th. Tournament Entry Fee doubled to \$4.00 after this date.

February 15th. Tournament Fee not accepted after this date. Dead line!

The 1935 Annual H. S. League Meeting

Bismarck, N. D.

November 7, 1935. H. S. Building.

One of the largest Annual Meetings in the history of the League. Presiding officer:—B. C. Tighe, Fargo, President Board of Control.

- (1). President's Address, B. C. Tighe.
- (2). Report of Secretary, Minutes of last meetings:—Readings dispensed with inasmuch as they have been printed in Handbook complete.
- (3). Report of Treasurer. Mimeographed reports were distributed, and approved by the League subject to report of the Audit Committee. See Treasurer's Books, and Treasurer's Report.

Note:—Audit Committee of Gilliland of Devils Lake and Abrahamson of Mohall approved the report of the Treasurer with recommendation to the Board of Control that a C. P. I. be hired to make a more careful audit than they felt prepared to make, inasmuch as they did not wish to devote sufficient time to checking all items. Conference with the Treasurer brings his hearty endorsement of the proposal.

The Treasurer's report shows a checking account balance of \$2358.40 and Savings Account of \$3256.05, and U. S. Treasury Bonds of \$3850.40—a total of \$9,464.45, exclusive of the problematic \$461.88 in the Mandan Farmer's State Bank at Mandan, now in Receiver's hands.

Report of Football participation in the A. A. B. Fund:—636 boys @ 75c total \$477.00. At present time reports of accidents too incomplete to be significant.

(4). Special Committee Report. Supt. Quam of Oakes reports for the Committee on Girls Physical Education and Athletic Participation, making special emphasis on the importance of having well trained and prepared instructors of physical education.

(5). Special Report. Supt. Olaf Nelson of Rugby reports on a prosposed "Official Approved List of Athletic Officials."

His general recommendations are followed by specific recommendations from a group of coaches, such recommendations not being turned over to the Secretary. However several points were these:—32 towns listed as centers as nuclei for organizations of coaches and officials for study of sports rules. The coaches to take the initiative in such organizations. Discussions and meetings to be weekly. 16 Districts to be developed for special meetings, said meetings to be on certain assigned dates. Last year District basketball tournament locations to be the loci for the 16 Districts. Moved by Nelson, seconded by Wakefield that the above report be accepted. Carried.

McMahon of Mandan reports that 21 of the coaches of the state contacted, approve the idea of Schools of Instruction in sports rules asp roposed above.

Abrahamson of Mohall proposes that some League moneys be expended to send some qualified man around the state for "athletic clinics." It was also proposed that perhaps some movie films showing outstanding plays of important games could be purchased or perhaps a movie machine purchased; or rented with operator and sent through the State.

Smith of Devils Lake proposed that such 'athletic clinics' be developed with financial expenditures.

Motion:—By Day of Alamo, seconded by Berg of Dickinson that the Board of Control be authorized to allocate not to exceed \$500.00 divided as nearly equally throughout the state as possible, for the development of the proposed 'athletic clinics'. Carried.

(7). Appointment of Gilliland and Abrahamson as audit committee, who subsequently report in writing in the Treasurer's books; as reported above.

(8). Nominating Committee appointed:-

Thompson of Grand Forks; Grindstuen of Beach; Schrum of Bowman; Ingvaldson of Ellendale; Elster of Hillsboro.

In their subsequent report they present the name of L. A. White of Minot, to succeed himself as a member of the Board of Control for three years. There being no other nominations, the acceptance of the Committee's report was ordered and so recorded.

(9). Concerning Class A and Class B in basketball. Supt. Day of Alamo speaking for the N. W. Missouri Conference resubmits his plan of a year ago, namely that all schools enrolling 250 high school pupils or more should automatically be named as Class A Schools; and that the Board of Control work out appropriate plans for the Class A Tournament including some plan of "challenges" as before. Class B Tournaments to continue as at present.

Discussions were rather long and involved.

Motion by Day, seconded by Murdock of Lidgerwood that schools having an enrollment in high school of 150 or more on November 1st, be listed as Class A Schools.

Motion by Abrahamson, seconded by Gilbertson that the above motion be laid on the table. Motion lost.

Motion by Gilliland, seconded by Dominick that the above motion be amended by striking out the word "250" referring to enrollment and empower the Board of Control to designate the 12 largest high schools in the state as Class A Schools, and permit the 4 places left for a 16 team Class A Tournament be filled from among the winners of the Class A District Tournaments, permitting any of the 16 winners to 'challenge' and thus enter Class A. Motion lost.

Original motion called for. Carried.

Motion by Murdock, seconded by several:-

That the question of 'challenge' for entrance into Class A be left to the Board of Control without reference to their previous rulings. Carried.

Amendment Carried.

Second reading, for action of the amendment proposing to change Section 12 of Article 6 to read as follows:—

No student having attained the 18th anniversary of his birth shall participate in any interscholastic contest after his 8th semester in high school, or after the seventh semester if his eighth does not follow consecutively after his seventh.

Motion carries, and constitutional change is ordered, motion by Elstad, seconded by many.

Note motion:—by Bergene, seconded by several, that the above amendment shall apply only to athletics. Motion carried.

Note:—The constitutionality of this proposed interpretation is likely open to question.

Motion:—by several, seconded by several. That the above Amendment shall go into effect with the beginning of the basketball season and shall not apply to the remaining few football games that may yet be incomplete. Carried.

Amendment Lost.

The amendment proposing that a player shall not be eligible after his eighteenth birthday was lost.

Amendment carried:-

The amendment changing the words "intoxicating liquor" to "alocoholic beverage" in Section 7 of Article 6, carried.

Addenda report by "Committee on Approved List of Officials" presented by Nelson of Rugby and Dahlen of Fairmount:—

The Committee recommends:-

That the Board of Control adopt and inaugurate a plan for the annual certification and recommendation of officials for football and basketball, and that

in the development of the plan, information be solicited from the various coaches throughout the state and that

the Board of Control plan for the training of officials at League expense at convenient points in the state.

The president of the Board of Control, recognized a representative of the committee of the coaches and there were presented their recommendations which had been presented to their Association thus:—

- 1. That the 32 towns listed below be designated as the nuclei for the formation of organizations of coaches and officials:—Crosby, Williston, Watford City, Beach, Dickinson, Reeder, Mohall, Stanley, Minot, Rugby, Buelah, Bismarck, Mandan, Linton, Langdon, Cando, Grafton, Lakota, Devils Lake, Carrington, Cooperstown, Valley City, Jamestown, Ashley, Oakes, Grand Forks, Hillsboro, Fargo, Wahpeton, Harvey, Steele, Bottineau, Edgeley.
- 2. The high school coach in each of these towns shall be responsible for the formation and operation of this organization.
- 3. Weekly meetings be held in the designated towns to discuss rules and interpretations.
- 4. District meetings be held at each of 16 districts, three times during the year. A football meeting to be held the 3rd week in September and basketball meetings the first week in December and second week in February. These meetings to be held at the site of last year's district tournaments. The coaches of these towns to be responsible for calling these district meetings.
- 5. Schools outside these towns should affiliate themselves with the organization in the nearest town.

Meeting adjourns.

Meetings of the Board of Control

November 6-8, 1936

Several brief meetings of members of the Board of Control were held during the convention time. Tighe, White, Robertson and Dominick having been together at various times, several items of business were discussed, a number of them preparatory to the Annual meeting.

An important meeting was held Friday noon at The Inn, when representatives of most of the Class A schools (under the new proposal) were present and discussed possible best plans for handling the Class A list. It seemed clear that the majority preferred a 12 team tournament if there were to be 12 such 250 enrollment high schools. In the event of 'challenges' it was definitely proposed that two challengers should 'play it off'; while three or more would create a tournament in which the Class A teams would have to participate. A definite proposal was made that the Board should create Districts such that there would be one of the Class A schools in each District, and challenges are to be made within that District. Such was a motion made by Urness, and approved by a bare majority.

At one meeting of the Board, it was proposed that Dominick be sent as official representative of the League to the National Federation meeting at Chicago, though no one knew definitely much about such meeting this year.

A few points of eligibility were discussed at one meeting, with special reference to the Alexander lad who was "on his own" and moved to Williston to attend school, his parents continuing to live on a farm. The Board had been unanimous in its ruling that he was not eligible.

Plans were laid for the annual Holiday-time meeting of the Board at Fargo, probably between Christmas and New Years.

ANNUAL MID-WINTER MEETING OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL

Gardner Hotel, Fargo, N. Dak., Jan. 2-3, 1935.

Present:—B. C. Tighe, Leo H. Dominick, M. B. Zimmerman, C. L. Robertson, L. A. White.

1. Tournament Ball:

Moved by Robertson, seconded by Zimmerman that the Dubow Ball be named the Official Tournament Ball. Carried.

2. Challengers May Withdraw.

Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick that the schools that challenge Class A Schools may have the privilege of withdrawal on or before January 15th. Carried.

All Class A Teams Eligible for State Tournament—Not a Precedent:

Moved by Robertson, seconded by Zimmerman that for this year all 12 Class A Teams except any defeated by challengers shall be accepted equally eligible to enter the Class A State Tournament with the understanding that this action does not establish a precedent for such good years.

4. Class A Three-Day Tournament:

Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Robertson that the Class A State Tournament shall be a Three-Day Tournament held on March 19th, 20th, and 21st. Carried.

5. Committee on Drawing Appointed.

C. L. Robertson during the month of February is appointed to represent the Board of Control at a Bismarck meeting to arrange for the drawing of places for the State Tournament and arrange for the order of the play. The Committee is to consist of the Governor of the State; the State Superintendent, Chairman of the Board of Administration, and Superintendent Saxvik as Manager of the State Tournament.

6. Tournament Officials' Fees.

Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Dominick that the fees for the State Tournament shall be as follows::—Class A Three-Day Tournament \$85.00 plus expenses. Class B Two-Day Tournament \$75.00 plus expenses. Carried.

7. Class A Officials:

Moved by Robertson, seconded by Zimmerman that Dick Holzer of Moorhead and Cy Holgate of Aberdeen be named as the Class A Officials. Carried.

8. Class B Officials Names:

Moved by Dominick, seconded by White that F. E. Whyttenbach of Aberdeen and E. L. Bersagel of Aberdeen be named as Class B Officials. Carried.

9. Consolation Games Officials:

The Board considered the names of a group of capable State Officials who will probably attend the Class A Tournament with the understanding from among them should be selected two men to work the Consolation Series at approximately \$7.50 per game.

10. Valley City Boy Declared Eligible.

The Board considered the following case:—A Valley City boy moves with his parents to Mandan; fills out enrollment cards on Wednesday in Mandan High School but attends no classes either then or later, is disappointed because he can not continue Manual Training; on Friday goes to Bismarck to see Valley City Principal, who is attending N. D. E. A. Meeting there, is informed that it is all right for him to return to Valley City High School. The same day he hitch-hikes to Valley City and upon his return is established assisted by the coach in finding a job, the coach being unaware of the boy having had any thought of returning.

Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick that the boy shall be considered immediately eligible at Valley City. Since there was no attendance his enrollment was considered incomplete and consequently he was not "transferred pupil." Carried.

In the discussion it was pointed out that in many schools an "enrollment" is made in spring time so far as filling out cards and selection of courses is concerned and yet this is not interpreted as attendance for the following fall. It was further pointed out that if a boy should "enroll" so far as filling out cards is concerned on the first day of school then remain away from school for a week or two he would be considered ineligible until he had attended as long as he had been absent. Some passing consideration was also given to the definition of enrollment, in Rule 8.

11. Tournament Balls Purchased.

Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Robertson that the Board of Control purchase the same number of Dubow Balls as last year from Northern School Supply Company at \$8.80 and the same number at last year from the Colborn School Supply Company at \$8.80. Carried.

12. Net Proceeds of Challenge Games to be Paid Participating Schools:

Board of Control gave further consideration to their action of last year when they directed that one-half of the net proceeds of the challenge games should be divided between or among the participating schools, the other one-half being placed in the League Treasury. After discussion, however, they concluded to maintain that decision and direct the Secretary to complete all payments of last year and year before.

13. Federation Football Rules Adopted for 1936:

Moved by Robertson, seconded by Zimmerman that the Board of Control accept the 1936 Federation Football rules. Carried.

14. Board to be Represented at Federation Rules Meeting:

Moved by Dominick, seconded by Zimmerman that Harry Bridgeford of Fargo represent the High School League at the Chicago Meeting of the National Federation Football Rules Committee, his expense to be borne by the National Federation.

15. Dominick to Represent High School League at St. Louis Meeting:

Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Robertson that Dominick represent the High School League at the meeting of the National Federation at St. Louis in February, expenses to be borne by the High School League. Carried.

16. Net Proceeds of Challenge Games:

It was agreed that the net proceeds from challenge games should be divided this year the same as in the two proceeding, namely: one-half to the League Treasury and one-half to the participating schools.

17. Athletic Accident Benefit Fund Payments:

Board of Control passed favorably upon the following claims presented under the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund with the understanding the payments should be made only when accompanied by professional statement and bill from Dentist or Physician together with statement from a school representative:

18. Acceptance of Valley City Invitation for Class B Tournament:

Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Robertson that the Board of Control accept the Valley City invitation presented by Mr. McCarthy to hold the Class B Tournament at Valley City under the same terms as heretofore except that Valley City guarantees to total receipts of \$800.00. Carried.

19. Purchase of Trophies:

Moved by Dominick seconded by Zimmerman that the individual trophies be purchased from the Balfour Company as follows: 18 1|10 gold filled basketballs fobs at \$2.10 plus engraving; 18 sterling silver basketball fobs at \$.90 plus engraving; 144 bronze basketball fobs at 50c plus engraving for the figures 1936.

District trophies to be purchased from Fargo Jewelry Company,

consisting of 4 plaques sizes and prices as follows: there being a set of four plaques for each of the sixteen Districts, at \$27.90. State trophies being identical with those of last year to be purchased from Josten for \$152.00 for the two Tournaments; and 10 gold belt buckles at \$2.75 and 10 bronze belt buckles at \$1.75 identical with those of last year likewise to be purchased from Josten. Motion carried.

20. State Class A Tournament at Bismarck:

Without motion it was agreed that the invitation of Bismarck be accepted to hold the three-day Tournament there on the same terms as last year except that further consideration should be given to the Bismarck suggestion that they receive a minimum of \$950.00 instead of \$800.00, the added \$150.00 to be applied to the payment of the hall rental for the extra Tournament day. It was agreed that Mr. Robertson would talk this particular point over with the Association of Commerce when he meets with them at the time of the "drawing Committee."

21. University Track and Field Meet:

Moved by Dominick, seconded by Zimmerman that the State Track and Field Meet would be held at the University of North Dakota on May 22nd and 23rd.

22. Other "State Track Meets."

Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by White that the open field meets would be held at Jamestown College and Bismarck and at the University of North Dakota shall be considered State Track and Field meets to the extent that all new records properly made thereat shall be considered State Records; provided however, that the school winning highest honors at the University Meet only shall be considered the State Championship for the year. It is understood that at these Meets only contestants strictly eligible under the rules of the High School League shall be allowed to participate in the Meets. C. L. Robertson was appointed to represent the Board of Control at the Jamestown Meet and L. A. White represents the Board of Control at the Bismarck Meet.

The method of determining preliminary matters was left over for discussion at the next meeting of the Board of Control.

- 23. It was understood that the Board of Control will meet at the time of the Valley City Class B Tournament.
- 24. Recommended by several members of the Board of Control that the Secretary send copies of the News Letter regularly to Sec'y M. E. McCurdy of the N. D. E. A., to the Manager of the

various District Tournaments and extend the mailing list as far as possible. The increasing interest in the News Letter was considered complimentary to the High School League.

25. Motion was made and seconded by action withheld at the suggestion of Secretary, who proposed the propriety of delay in further consideration—motion having to do with the increase in the salary of the Secretary.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETINGS, MARCH, 1936

March 14th at Bismarck

Members present: B. C. Tighe, C. L. Robertson, L. A. White, Supt. Gustafson, Linton; Father (Priest) of Linton and also 7 or 8 school men from 4 or 5 adjacent communities.

Problem:-

1. Two Linton boys are charged with ineligibility on the grounds they are over age.

Mr. White explains the situation as follows: At the time of the State Tournament in 1935 the ages of Joseph Volk, Anton Lauinger were called into question; and at the Valley City Tournament Supt. Gustafson handed the Sec'y signed copies of the baptismal certificates that seemed to establish the birth dates of these boys without question. This fall sometime, question again was raised about the two boys and the secretary in correspondence with Supt. Gustafson received again the two certificates which again were accepted. A third time (in Feb.) question was once more raised about the ages of these boys and in correspondence word came that there must be some mistake about the certificates for other certificates signed and sealed by the same Priests showed one boy to have been born in 1915 and the other in 1914. A careful scrutiny of the first set of baptismal certificates showed what had not been obvious before, namely that both had been tampered with and changed.

At the Bismarck meeting, Supt. Gustafson presents a letter from Mr. Volk, father of Joseph, and an affidavit signed by him to the effect that he himself—the father—had changed the birth date from 1914 to 1916. He also stated that suspicions were resting upon a certain young man who might be guilty in changing the other certificate. The father claimed to have made the change in the Priest's home while the Priest was in another room and while Mr. Gustafson was waiting outside in the car. This explanation, while accepted by the Board raised a question in their minds in as much as the

erasure and change was done with unusual skill and precision and very obviously it was done on a different typewriter and the Linton Priest stated that the other Priest had only one typewriter.

The Board of Control reaching the conclusion that the boys obviously were over age and that the changes had been made, felt that the school authorities had clearly been negligent in themselves tracing these matters down to the same source that seemed to be rather readily available to men from other communities who became interested. For example the family "religious book" was found in the home of one of Volk's relatives which gave his birthdate as 1914 which book was easily discovered by 2 or 3 school men from another community.

The Board of Control passed judgment as follows:

- (a) The boys themselves must be declared ineligible.
- (b) The School must forfeit all games in which either or both of these boys took part after such date as they became ineligible and the school authorities must write to the other schools giving notification of such forfeiture. Further all trophies won by any team in which either or both boys participated must be cancelled.
- (c) The school shall be disqualified in the 1936 District Tournament.
- (d) The school shall be suspended from League membership for the rest of the year.
- (e) Re-instatement of the school and its continuance in the year 1936-1937 and subsequently shall be on the basis of an evidence of continuing good faith.
- (f) Publicity shall be given to the situation in a special school assembly not only through announcement by the Superintendent but through the reading of a letter of official disapproval from the Sec'y representing the High School League.

Note:—The official letter criticized the school authorities for "gross negligence" and called upon the school to rally to the supporting of the High School League and its own past traditions. Question is raised about the payment by the High School League of the expenses of Linton School officials and other school officials but the Board of Control merely stated they would give consideration to all bills presented to them but with the intimation that only authorized bills would be cared for.

Adjournment.

March 19-20-21 at Bismarck

Present: Mr. B. C. Tighe, Mr. C. L. Robertson, Mr. M. B. Zimmerman, Mr. L. A. White. Others present: Supt. Schrumm.

Problem:-

1. In a Mott vs. Bowman game for Regional honors Bowman makes a substitution. Substitute reporting to scorer while ball is dead and out of bounds. Scorer blows whistle but referee and umpire do not hear and permit the game to proceed and the score is made. Bowman protests against the score.

Conclusion:—The Board of Control refers the matter by wire to Oswald Tower of New York City, member of the National Rules Committee who rules that the score counts.

2. Northwood boy drinks beer. Several protests have been presented to the Board of Control against the playing by Northwood of _____ who admitted drinking 2 glasses of beer. The school penalized him by keeping him out of a County Tournament but made explanation on several occasions that the boy was out because of an injured knee. Several schools felt that the penalty was unappropriate and insufficient and the question of camouflage was raised.

Conclusion:—The Board of Control upon contact with the District Tournament Committee concluded by a 4 to 1 vote that the penalty under the circumstances might be considered ample and the boy was declared eligible.

Note:—It was subsequently learned that upon a number of occasions school authorities of Northwood referred to the boys injured leg (which had not been injured) and had intended for the sake of the mother to keep the real reason under cover. The Board in reconsidering the question at the Valley City Meeting concluded that while the penalty was not very severe they still felt that the situation would not merit going over the heads of the District Tournament Committee, who being charged with special investigation and holding a special hearing recommended that the boy be considered eligible.

- 3. Complimentary Tickets. It is agreed that this memorandum should be made:—For this Tournament, Board authorises the issuing of 4 reserved tickets and up to 5 general admission tickets so far as may be used by school representatives for each of the 12 schools participating in the Tournament.
- 4. It is agreed that in the Class B Tournament each team consist of 8 players.

- 5. A discussion showed that all Board members were of one mind on the point that for the 1937 Class A Tournament it will be wise to admit only 8 teams and plans should be developed whereby this would best be done.
- 6. The discussion was re-opened concerning the St. Leo (Minot) lad who because of quarantine was unable to complete the first semester's work. No action was taken but the Board who on a divided vote had previously ruled the boy eligible—though too tardy for this participation—by the general tenor of the discussion was favorable toward developing some plans whereby any injustices can be avoided.
- 7. Preliminary discussion of relation between the Consilidated League and the High School League; and concerning 6 Man Football with the feeling that a full effort should be made to develop a lively interest and State wide participation.
- 8. It was agreed that Cassle and McLeod should be named as officials for the Consolation series and Jarrett and Gaetz for the final Consolation game.
- 9. Concerning the Sombrero game. In the discussion the Board of Control seemed to be rather favorably inclined toward the North Dakota-South Dakota game, provided it could be established that the situation is entirely clear in South Dakota. The fact that the game is proposed for the first week in November was accepted agreeably. The Board seemed to feel that it was somewhat anonalous too for an out-side-of-the-State-influence to select the "outstanding North Dakota team," yet the members were loath themselves to participate in its selection.
 - 10. The Board approved the Aberdeen Track and Field Meet.
- 11. Reviving plans for Track and Field Meet again the following conclusions were reached:—The University on May 22nd and 23rd shall be declared a State Meet wherein school Championships are decided. State Meets also may be held at Bismarck, probably during the last week in May and at Jamestown, probably during the first week of June which so far as establishment of official records is concerned may be considered State Meets.

Official Qualifying Meets may be held anywhere in the State at any time under the following provisions:—That it shall be open Meets. That winner of first and second places in any event having at least 3 entrees in such meet shall be eligible to enter any one or all of the above named State Meets. It was further felt that any winner of the first 4 places of the University Meet should be automatically eligible for the other State Meets. Further, it was felt

12. The Board of Control asks Supt. Reitan and his District Tournament Committee to investigate the Northwood question of the boy who drank beer and was suspended from the County Tournament and to make report with a recommendation as to the eligibility of the boy. They subsequently report and recommend his eligibility.

March 27th and 28th, Valley City.

Present: Mr. B. C. Tighe, Mr. C. L. Robertson, Mr. M. B. Zimmerman, Mr. L. A. White.

Many informal discussions were held going back and forth over numerous problems regarding the variation for future plans. Considerable thought was given to all tentative plans for the selection of the 8 teams that should participate in the Class A Tournament.

Considerable thought was given to the aggressive campaign for the firm establishment of the North Dakota High School League, organizing that properly, without competitive intent. The Consolidated and Graded School League has in the last 2 years been encroaching on the territory of the North Dakota High School League by its readiness to accept into membership "any High School of the State regardless of classification that has an enrollment under 100."

A good deal of attention was given to proposed plan for making a State wide Tournament in 6 Man Football with a possible culmination for the State championship.

It was agreed that under the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund the fees for X-ray should be raised from \$2.00 to \$4.00 and encouragement should be given toward its use.

There was some consideration of the possible extension of the List of Benefits. It was thought that perhaps a "secondary list" might be added for which payments could be made only in the event that the funds on hand were ample to care for the original list in the Schedule of Benefits.

It is agreed that a boy whose birthday is on Friday (or any other given day) is not eligible to participate in athletics on that day.

It is agreed that Bute and Cassel shall be named as officials for the consolation game.

N. D. HIGH SCHOOL LEAGUE

Mr. Cassel explains that receipts for the Regional Game were so small that he paid out several dollars from the Jamestown College Athletic Treasury. The Board agreed to their reimbursement.

The Board authorized the payment of 800.00 to Mr. F. C. Spalding as the first payment to make up the deficit in the B Tournament.

High School League Meeting

SPRING 1936

WOODWORTH HALL, UNIVERSITY

1. Bridgeford of Fargo reports on the meeting of the Rules Committee in Chicago, where he represented the High School League by appointment of the Board of Control.

The tenor of his report was to the effect that it is an honor for our State Organization to be a member of the National Federation, which he feels is a very significant Association.

His report dealt largely with the proposed changes in Football Rules and he discussed various changes and the reasons thereof.

- 2. Secretary-Treasurer gave a brief report on:-
- League membership, referring briefly to the possible problem involved if the Consolidated and Graded School League seeks further membership among Classified High Schools.
- b. The Athletic Accident Benefit Fund and
- A financial report, dealing particularly with the report of the two State Basketball Tournaments.
- 3. In the discussions that followed some inquiry was made about the financial arrangements made by the Board of Control with the Bismarck Association of Commerce. The question was raised as to whether or not the placing of the Tournament in some other City might bring larger receipts and a margin proportionate share be returned to the League. President Tighe, Superintendent Saxvik, Secretary White and others explained the business arrangements with the Bismarck Association of Commerce:—Because of the added day of Tournament \$150.00 more rental fee was necessary, raising the Bismarck share from \$800.00 to \$950.00. This money

provides the whole rental and the Banquet and any excess is used not in connection with the Association of Commerce but with athletics in the local High School in connection with the athletic field, the track meet, and similar expenditures.

- 4. The question was raised as to the feasibility of holding Class A and Class B Tournaments at the same time at the same place with the idea that the Class A Tournament always overshadows the B Tournament not only in attendance but in interest.
- 5. Report by E. A. Quam, Committee Chairman, concerning girls' participation in athletics.

The following recommendation was presented and adopted: Recommendation:

That the High School League approves of girls' interscholastic basketball, basketball tournaments and similar sports where opposing players come in personal contact, and further, that the High School League recommends to all member schools that such interscholastic sports be discontinued. There follows Mr. Quam's survey of the attitudes of schools on girls' athletic participation:—

Conference Time Meeting

BOARD OF CONTROL

University

Members present: Prin. B. C. Tighe, Supt. C. L. Robertson, Supt. Leo H. Dominick, Supt. L. A. White, Supt. M. B. Zimmerman.

1. Sombrero Game.

The Board of Control approves the proposed Sombrero Game at Aberdeen, S. Dak., to be played on or about Armistice Day provided that certain discrepancies in the reports of the attitudes of the Board of Control of the South Dakota Athletic Association be clarified.

Some disapproval was expressed over South Dakota authorities taking action equivalent to the naming of the "football champion of North Dakota" in as much as the High School League has frowned upon such championship. The proposal was made but withdrawn that the Boar dof Control of the North Dakota High School League

should name "The outstanding team in football" which would be eligible to represent North Dakota in the so-called Sombrero Game.

- 2. Reports from members of the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund were presented and approved for payment.
- 3. It is proposed tentatively that for the forth coming year a fee of 50c each in football, basketball, and hockey be charged for membership in the A. A. B. Fund and 25c for track. It was also proposed that a secondary Schedule of Benefits be developed to include injuries that are not "breaks" with the understanding that the secondary list should not be paid until the primary list had been cared for in full.

While no definite action was taken on either of the above proposals since the reports for the two years' experiment in basketball and one year experiment in football indicate that the fees thus far have more than paid for all injuries it might be advisable either to reduce the fees or extend the Schedule of Benefits or both.

CONCERNING SIX MAN FOOTBALL

While the Board of Control has not sufficiently completed all plans for the proposed State Championship in Six Man Football to permit of an official statement at the time this manuscript goes to press, careful consideration is being given and appropriate announcements will be made through the News Letter.

Six Man Football is 'catching on' rapidly, and the response this Spring indicates that our smaller schools have been waiting for just some such fall-time sport. One county is already being organized in May, and several schools sent their 1936-37 dues months in advance in order to secure their Rule Books.

CONCERNING THE ATHLETIC ACCIDENT BENEFIT FUND

A report of the A. A. B. Fund is printed elsewhere.

The time is at hand when League members will do well to give the A. A. B. Fund much thought to discover whether it is "hitting the spot," or missing it entirely, or whether certain adjustments might be advisable.

Wisconsin with ample financial backing was enabled to build up a very successful record. The school men in Illinois, after several years of experiment during which time little interest was found in it, decided by a large majority to discontinue.

Certainly if the fees could be reduced very materially, and the

list of benefits increased very materially, the program would prove much more attractive. But this cannot be done directly. The Schedule of Benefits, built from the Wisconsin Plan, is considerably more generous than that of Wisconsin or any other state. And the fees are only a relatively small percent of fees charged by insurance companies. Fees cannot be compared with those of Wisconsin since their Membership Fees are so very much higher, varying from \$7.50 to over \$50.00.

The Board of Control does have in mind however the extension of the Schedule of Benefits, by a form of "secondary list" upon which proportionate payments might be made in the event all demands upon the regular Schedule of Benefits have been met. And likewise the Board is considering a lowering of the A. A. B. Fund fees.

The News Letters will carry more definite information.

CONCERNING CHANGES IN FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL RULES

The April issue of the Oklahoma H. S. A. A. bulletin is authority for the following summarized statements:—

Football

Some of the changes for the 1936 football rules as reported by ${\rm D.}~{\rm X.}~{\rm Bible}$ are summarized below.

- 1. Rule 7, Section 7. The slow whistle has been abolished and the 1934 interpretation of a dead ball will be used.
- 2. A ball kicked from scrimmage which does not cross the line of scrimmage can be recovered and advanced by either team.
- 3. When ineligible players of the passing team cross the line of scrimmage and get in advance of the spot where the pass is caught or incompleted, it is interference.
- 4. When a forward pass is made by a player from less than 5 yards behind his scrimmage line the ball is dead if incompleted or if caught by a player of the passing team.
- 5. Infliction of penalty for running into the kicker will be left largely to the judgment of the official as to the intent of the players.
- Officials not required to notify teams to be ready for play at the beginning of the second half. Penalty changed to 15 yards. The option of putting ball in play by scrimmage deleted.

- 7. Question 54 on enforcements of penalties changed to read: Team A punts, it having been clearly determined by the referee, the ball is out of bounds and then a foul occurs. Decision: The ball belongs to Team B, penalty inflicted from spot of foul.
- 8. Recommended that numerals be 6 inches in height on the front and 8 inches in height on the back of the jerseys.
- Recommended the coaches assume the responsibility of keeping up with substitutions.

Basketball

The Basketball Rules committee has been reorganized and is now composed of eight representatives of the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association in addition to the chairman and editor; the National Federation of High School Athletic Association has four representatives; the Canadian Amateur Basketball Association has one and the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union has one representative. The A. A. U. and Y. M. C. A. groups did not choose to join in the reorganization plans. Some of the major rule changes and recommendations are as follows:

- 1. A concentric circle with a six-foot radius to the inside of the two inch line will be made at the center.
- 2. In case of violation of the restraining circle rule by opponent of a jumper who taps the ball in the basket, the violation is to be disregarded and the goal allowed.
- 3. A change in the substitution regulations eliminating the clause "nor shall he communicate with any players except with an official until play has been resumed," and the addition of a clause to provide that the game shall proceed immediately after the player has reported to the official.
- 4. The number of allowable time outs increased from three to four.
- There will be alternations for clarifying the face guarding and held ball regulations.
- 6. There was much discussion of proposed changes such as all jump balls being at one of the three large circles; eliminating jump after successful field goal; removing restrictions from player without the ball in the half of the free throw circle farthest from the basket; widening the lanes to possibly 12 feet and projecting the backboards two feet farther into the court. Further experimentation and research recommended before changes are made.

The June issue of THE ATLETHIC JOURNAL has a three page discussion of the new football rule changes explaining in detail what the proposed changes are designed to accomplish as well as an interpretation of the rule meanings.

This ATLETIC JOURNAL published at 6858 Glenwood Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, for \$1.50 is designed to bring to coaches the most recent developments in all lines of sports. Many schools are finding it a very appropriate investment, for their coaches and players.

"INSIST UPON THE TAG."

These words, quoted from the Illinois H. S. Athletic urge every school man in purchasing athletic equipment to "look for the National Federation approved tag and label before agreeing to purchase any football equipment."

On the back of the official tag is the statement: "The design and construction of this article provides adequate protection for high school players. It incorporates the safety features specified by the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations and is built in accordance with the standards approved by them.

The National Federation Committee has had recently completed arrangements with most of the larger sporting goods manufacturers to comply with certain standards which the Committee have reason to feel are significant for the protection of high school athletes. They have dealt particularly with football pants, shoulder pads and helmets. The material and type of construction are tested in the United States Testing Laboratory under the supervision of the National Federation Committee. The manufacturers have co-operated well, even setting aside a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00 per year from their experimental fund to take care of the expenses of administration and for the making of proper tests.

Since this is a co-operative venture for the welfare and protection of high school boys, neither the National Federation nor the manufacturers receiving any financial benefits from the experiment, it is hoped that school men everywhere will purchase these specially constructed and specially tagged articles.

THE PROBLEM OF ATHLETIC INJURIES

The February issue of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association bulletin analyses several recent studies of the manner and place in which football injuries occur, as it explains the marked trend in Federation states toward the "new rules" sponsored by the Federation, designed to adapt the game a little more definitely to boys of high school age.

Prof. Floyd Eastman of New York University has made a rather widespread study of football injuries, and records for a series of years in the offices of the Illinois Athletic Association and thru the Athletic Accident Benefit Plan as conducted in Wisconsin all combine toward definite conclusions.

- (a) The development of certain specific standards for athletic equipment designed to give the maximum of protection. An example:—Headgear protecting nose and teeth.
- (b) No interscholastic contests until after an adequate period of practice.
- (c) The presence at each game of a medical attendant, who must sanction the return to the game of any injured player.
- (d) The extension of "clinics" and interpretation meetings for a more thorough study of rules, and particularly for a cleared understanding of the best ways of conducting athletic contests.

Dr. Eastman completed a 5 year study of football accidents in co-operation with New York University, the press associations and the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters.

While it is true that of the fatalities 44% were accounted for among high school lads, the proportion was only about half that among college or other players. The fatalities represented 2.4 per hundred thousand among high school boys and 4.5 per hundred thousand among college players.

Of the fatalities, 69% were the result of injuries to the head or spinal vertebrae while 24% were the result of injuries to the abdomen. Tackling accounted for 42% of the deaths, blocking for 13%, being tackled for 12% and being kicked for 8%.

The majority of those killed or injured were halfbacks, tackles and ends, in the order named.

The most serious accidents occurred among the youngest players—those aged 14—while the most frequent injuries were to those of 17 years of age.

The majority of injuries were to the lower extremities—pelvic girdle, thigh, knee, leg, ankle and foot. High school boys were found to have frequent muscle and tendon injuries.

The causes were found to be in this order:—34% due to faulty leadership, 6% with faulty equipment and facilities, and the remainder due to the nature of the game itself. Causes associated

with leadership were these:—awkwardness, unnecessary roughness, carelessness and presence of old injuries.

Prof. Eastman made these recommendations:-

- 1. Provide better playing surfaces both for practices and for games.
- 2. Insist upon pre-season medical examination before the first practice session; complete with medical history.
- 3. A minimum of three weeks of practice before the first contest, with emphasis on body conditioning rather than upon execution of plays.
 - 4. Adequate money for adequate equipment.
 - 5. A doctor at all games.

%

- 6. Eliminate "live bait" in tackling practice.
- 7. Teach fair play and good sportsmanship. Increase protection of shoulder, knee and ankles of halfback and ends. Develop knee and ankle protective bandages to help reduce initial injuries and prevent recurring ones.
- 8. Develop better trained officials, authorizing then to remove injured players from game either on own authority or upon consultation with coaches.

The Wisconsin data show the dangers to younger boys.

Doubtless this means that those few big overgrown lads of 14 and 15 are altogether too immature to put up against the older boys. Notice that the 7% of the boys (the younger ones) receive almost one fourth of all the injuries.

The Federation movement toward some rule changes, and toward standardizing equipment is definitely in the safety and health interest of the high school boys.

CONCERNING MEMBERSHIP IN OUR OWN LEAGUE

The promotion of appropriate interscholastic relations among schools demands that all Classified High Schools should be loyal to their own League and regularly maintain their memberships, and regularly support all rules and requirements of the League.

The N. D. H. S. League was organized in 1908 primarily for classified high schools, although provision was made that "any

school of equivalent rank" might be admitted for a year at a time by the Board.

Since graded schools and many consolidated schools were not eligible to membership in the N. D. H. S. League, they later formed an organization of their own. At one time—vide 1931 Handbook—consideration was given to the proposal to consolidate the two Leagues, made by officials of the C. and G. S. League and a series of conferences was held. But it was decided that certain problems of the smaller schools prevented their being assimilated into the older organization. Since no other State, so far as information is at hand, undertakes to conduct two such organizations, such a coalition might have its advantages.

But there has been something of an overlapping of "territory" between the two organizations inasmuch as the C. and G. S. League has opened its membership to third class schools, and within the last year or two to schools under 100 in enrollment, regardless of classification. This has brought about a misunderstanding, and during the past year several schools joined the C. and G. S. League, insisting later that they had assumed they were joining their own classified school league.

To clarify the situation, the Board of Control has authorized the following statements:—

- (a) To hold inter-scholastic competitive relations of any sort at any time with other classified schools, a classified high school, whether first, second or third class, regardless of size MUST BE A MEMBER OF ITS OWN LEAGUE—The North Dakota High School League. No other classified high school will be permitted to compete with a non-member classified high school, nor enter any Meet, Festival or Tournament in which such non-member classified school participates.
- (b) If for reasons of its own any classified high school desires to join any other League, it still must become a member of its own N. D. H. S. League if it would participate with classified high schools in any inter-scholastic competitive events, and must always be governed by the Eligibility Rules and requirements of the N. D. H. S. League.
- (c) While "other schools (than classified high schools) of equivalent rank" may be accepted into membership by the Board of Control, as provided by the constitution, no effort is made to take them away from any other League, and their membership is from year to year by granted permission.

The auditing committee of the State High School League as appointed by President C. B. Tighe hereby submits the following report:

We hereby certify that we have examined the books of the treasurer of the State High School League as furnished us by Secretary L. A. White. After a careful examination we find the books in all respects regular and correct as of date November 8, 1935.

In checking over the books we would like to submit the two following recommendations with the understanding that these recommendations are in no way a reflection upon the honesty or the integrity of either Secretary White or any other member of the Board of Control.

It is our belief that as a matter of good business and for the protection of the secretary as well as of the League members, that the books should be given a CPA audit annually, provided that this CPA audit can be obtained at a reasonable cost. We suggest that there are such qualified accountants in the City of Minot who would

be glad to do this work at a cost not to exceed ten dollars, or that the travelling auditors from the state banking department would also be available on the same basis as they now are to school districts within the state.

Second, we recommend that the treasurer's bond be increased to an amount which shall at all times equal the maximum amount of money that the treasurer of the State High School League shall have in his possession at any one time. It is our belief that these two recommendations should receive serious consideration by the Board of Control.

It may be noted that the experiment thus far in North Dakota does not duplicate that of Wisconsin where over \$16,000 was taken from the Association Treasury to maintain their A. A. B. Fund. While the Board of Control proposes to proceed carefully, it does have a plan in mind whereby the rates may be reduced slightly, the plan extended into track, and hockey and gymnasium work, and whereby a secondary list of injuries may be added to be cared for from any balance after the original Schedule of Benefits has been met in full. No other State has ever attempted to go as far as the Board of Control is proposing to go with this experiment. But certainly there is no desire that there should be built up any credit balance, and some good ways must be found to get these extra dollars each year back to help care for injured boys.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Board of Control has directed the Secretary to secure the early enrollment of every Classified High School into League membership, for tardy enrollments frequently lead to misunderstanding. While most of our schools are prompt, and doubtless all intend to be prompt, some schools that do not play football, find it difficult to remember their dues until the opening of the basketball season. With the development of Six Man Football, there will be good reason for every school to revive the membership with the opening of school, the very first day. All memberships expire at midnight, September thirtieth. As a matter of fact two school men, so interested in Six Man Football, paid their 1936-37 dues in May of this year!
