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The League Calendar

NOTE PARTICULARLY:-

ALL MEMBERSHIPS EXPIRE September 30th, and are renewed only by specific payment of dues.

The fee is \$1.00 for towns under 1,000 population; \$2.00 for towns between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for towns over 2,000.

BUT IF dues are not paid by November 1st they shall be doubled and if not paid by December 1st, they shall be increased to \$5.00. Further, no memberships shall be accepted after January first. AND:—Dues cannot be accepted if your OFFICIAL ELIGIBILITY BLANKS FOR FOOTBALL AND BASKETBALL HAVE NOT BEEN FILED WITH THE SECRETARY.

What To Do In

SEPTEMBER:

- (a) Pay the dues at once; secure all League blanks thereby, and athletic books.
- (b) Join the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, to protect your school, and your boys.
- (c) Have a physicial examination of all boys preparing to participate in athletics.
- (d) Secure written parental permission for all boys who are to participate in athletics.
- (e) Begin at once to check player's eligibility:—Age, semesters of attendance, seasons of attendance, and scholastic records the past semester particularly. Watch 9th semester athletes.
- (f) Get an early start on the SIX MAN FOOTBALL.
- (g) Give special attention to the tobacco and beer rule, right from the start.
- (h) Why not a special "For-the-good-of-athletics" assembly, early in September.
- (i) See News Letters for the Six Man Football Tournament Plans.

OCTOBER:

- (a) Hurry and pay the membership fee. After October 31 the membership fee is doubled.
- (b) What of the Six Man Football Championships?
- (c) A good time now to think about the Accident Benefit Fund, for Easketball at 50c per boy.

N. D. HIGH SCHOOL LEAGUE

NOVEMBER:

- (a) At N. D. E. A. time, the Annual Fall meeting is the big meeting of the League year. This is the time to bring in all sorts of well thought out plans and suggestions. Send coaches to the athletic clinic.
- (b) Start your plans from the first, for the never-varying custom in all contests, and particularly in basketball, of (a) exchanging Eligibility Sheets; and (b) Contracts.
- (c) Be preparing your data for the Official Eligibility Exchange Blank—but do not send it to the Secretary's office, until it is specifically called for.
- (d) If your dues are still unpaid, HURRY UP, for after the last day of November dues are increased to five dollars. Too bad, too.

DECEMBER:

- (a) If your membership fee has not been paid before the end of this month, you are out of the League.
- (b) Class B schools better send in their Tournament Fees now, for it has to be doubled after the 15th of next month. You might forget it.
- (c) With basketball right on us, why not check again every possible representative of your school on all eligibility points; complete the physical examinations; really secure parental consent; protect the boys with the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund; hold a special assembly to talk about all eligibility rules; with special bearing on the tobacco and beer rule. Watch all ninth semester boys.
- (d) Yes, the League has adopted a Committee Report, urging against interscholastic competitive contests for girls. It is not prohibited however, by our League as has been done in some states.
- (e) See the News Letters for the "Challenge Games" Plans.

JANUARY:

- (a) Too late to join the League now.
- (b) Pay up your Tournament Entry Fees of \$2.00 (Class B Schools) before the 15th, and save the \$2.00 penalty. Send it to your District Tournament Chairman.
- (c) Did you actually complete—the physicial examination; parental permission for participation; athletic assembly; membership in A. A. Benefit Fund—and other good resolutions—or are you merely paving some more (with good intentions).

FEBRUARY:

- (a) Entry fee is doubled now (\$4.00), but still can be received by the 15th. Hurry it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.
- (b) Avoid that end-of-the-season embarrassment to your school and team, by making certain before the Tournaments are any nearer, that there is no possible eligibility question about any of your contestants.
- (c) Why not write to your Tournament Committee, giving suggestions for tournaments.

MARCH:

- (a) The Tournament month. News Letters will give specific dates. By tradition the closing Tournament of the season is held about the third week end of March, with other Tournaments coming respectively one, two and three weeks prior to that time. Unless other plans are announced by News Letters, the Class A Tournament will be held during the third week-end in March.
- (b) With the closing of the basketball season, you are preparing your data for the Official Eligibility Report, whereon you list the record of absolutely every lad who has represented your school in any inter-scholastic basketball contest, however unimportant, on any team (whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd or other) for any length of time however brief, and regardless whether he was in Grade school or junior high school or senior high school (provided only that the team was not made up of players all of whom were below ninth grade).

APRIL:

- (a) Track time begins. The League is making a strenuous effort to develop track and field work. Get your lads in as many meets as you can. It is a fine spring sport.
- (b) Unless otherwise notified, any Track Meet large enough to have 6 League schools entered, if an open meet, automatically becomes an Official Qualifying Meet for any subsequent State Meet. Qualifying events must have at least 3 contestants; and 1st and 2nd place winners are eligible for the "State" Meets.
- (c) Have you considered the Athletic Accident Fund protection for your track and field boys? It has frequently saved some school embarrassment, and helped lads pay injury bills.

MAY:

(a) Classified High Schools, whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd, of whatever size in enrollment must be League members to participate in any kind of Inter-scholastic contest, — athletic, music, declamation, etc.—whether held in a County Festival, or a State University or elsewhere. Lines are to be more rigidly drawn than heretofore. League Eligibility Rules apply.

Summary of Significant Dates

September 30th. All memberships expire at midnight.

October 31st. Memberships paid after this date cost \$2.50 additional.

November 30th. Memberships paid after this date cost \$5.00 additional.

December 31st. No membership can be received after this date.

Dead line! Tournament Entry Fee of \$2.00 is due. Pay it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman. Class B Schools' Challenges to Class A must be made on or before this date.

January 15th. Tournament Entry Fee doubled to \$4.00 after this

February 15th. Tournament Fee not accepted after this date. Dead line!

Scattered Items of Importance

Concerning The A. A. Benefit Fund

The Board of Control offers, subject to the action of the North Dakota High School League, a few changes in the Schedule of Benefits, for the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund.

No state has had a wider experience with this form of assistance to athletes, than Wisconsin, and the proposed Schedule is a duplicate of the new Wisconsin Schedule recently adopted for 1936-37.

The North Dakota Fees for the A. A. B. Fund proposed for the new year, are the same as for the past year, given herewith.

75 cents per boy for football, covering all regularly scheduled practises and games from the opening day of school to the final scheduled game.

25 cents per boy for six man football, under conditions as above stated.

25 cents per boy for physical education class for all nine school months covering only the classroom work during the regular class room period.

50 cents per boy for basketball covering all regularly scheduled indoor practices and games from Thanksgiving Day to the time of the final Tournament.

50 cents per boy for hockey covering all regularly scheduled practises and games for the hockey season.

To appreciate these figures, one has but to make comparison with the rates of commercial insurance companies, whose schedule

of benefits are almost identical with those we have been using or are proposing, but whose rates are from four to five times as much. While the A. A. B. Fund membership rates in Wisconsin are a little lower than ours in North Dakota, it will be remembered that School memberships in the Wisconsin Association run from \$7.50 for schools enrolling under 100 pupils, and \$15.00 for those enrolling from 100 to 250, on up to \$40.00 and \$50.00! Our membership fees of \$1.00, \$2.00 and \$3.00 look rather low in comparison!

Medical Regulations

- 1. Benefits on green stick fractures will be limited to half the amount listed on the schedule.
- 2. The amount actually allowed will not exceed the itemized statement filed by the physician which must accompany every request for benefit. The listed amount is the maximum in each case.
- A few suggestions are herewith made, concerning the A. A. B. Fund.
- (a) How to enroll athletes in the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund.

Some enrollment blanks have been sent to all schools. If they have been mislaid each school may prepare its own by use of the following form:

(b) How to remit the money for A. A. B. Fund Membership fees.

It is very helpful to the Secretary's office, if instead of sending a quarter or a half dollar every few days in stamps or coins (as has been done) each school would gather its fees together, and send them in at one time, and make their payments always by check. Stamps and loose coins are not at all desirable. Paper money is better; but checks or postal money orders give both the sender and the secretary a double check and act as receipts.

(c) How to make reports on accidents.

It is important that accidents be reported without unnecessary delay. The Board of Control is desirous of making the A. A. B. Fund as helpful as possible and hesitates to place any final limit beyond which benefit payments cannot be made, but as this manuscript is being prepared there are several claims not only for basketball injuries, but even for football which are still incomplete.

Two reports are necessary:—From the school representative, coach, or principal or other eye-witness, describing the time and place and condition of the occurrence of the accident, specifying as to practice or game; and (b) from the attendant doctor or dentist, describing the nature of the injury in some detail, the nature of his treatment in some detail, and his bill in some detail. It is these professional reports that frequently are delayed.

(d) How the benefit money is paid.

When the Board has taken final action upon a claim, and have directed the payment of the specified amount, a check is drawn to the principal or superintendent of the school, who in turn endorses the check, or makes payment direct to the attendant physician or dentist. It is to be noted that a lad does not receive \$10.00 for a broken tooth, but in the event there is a broken tooth, the A. A. B. Fund will pay up to \$10.00 to apply on an actual dental bill. The money does not go to the boy himself at any time.

SIX MAN FOOTBALL

This new game has gained greater momentum in North Dakota than in any other State in the union, due largely to the support given it by the N. D. H. S. League, and the Consolidated League. Last year approaching 80 N. D. H. S. League schools played the new game, and over 100 C. and G. S. League schools played it.

The American Boy, perhaps the leading boys' magazine in America, sent its editor through the nation studying six man football in the states where it is being played, and he is placing the support of the great magazine solidly behind the game, believing it can be given national significance in a very few years.

Very wisely, Mr. Reck, the editor, is emphasizing the importance of proper coaching and proper equipment for six man football, believing that any game wherein tackling and blocking are

done, must surely require proper training and proper protection.

With eleven man football for the larger schools, and six man football for the smaller schools to represent the fall form of athletics; and with basketball and hockey more widely spread throughout the state as winter sport activity; and with track and field events, with tennis and golf given more prominence in all North Dakota Schools, the N. D. H. S. League will be serving the high school athletes of the state with increasing effectiveness, when this proposed enlarged program of athlete activities is actually under way.

THE DISTRICT PLAN FOR TRACK AND FIELD QUALIFYING

While attended with less published vocativeness than the Challenge Games in basketball, there has been at least as widespread a questioning of the effectiveness of the new District Plan for the selection of entrants for the State Meet.

After reviewing a number of alternatives, several years ago the Board of Control approved the plan of admitting to the State Track and Field Meet, the first and second place winners of all Approvad Track and Field Meets, and such meets could secure "Official Approval" by having at least six schools entered, and at least three contestants in a given event. The purpose of this obviously rather loose interpretation of "Approved Meet," was to encourage as large a number of significant Meets all over the state as possible. And such was the result. Many county meets, and many invitational meets have sprung up all over North Dakota, with a total entrance list of many hundreds of athletes, in a state where heretofore track and field events have competed mostly with fishing and gopher hunting! The Board at one time considered the District Plan, but felt the state was not yet ready for such a limiting plan.

The District Plan was adopted for trial this year, upon the recommendation of the Coaches Association, largely through the efforts of the Association president, who had given the proposal considerable thought.

The hampering of other Meets, the problems of weather, the lengthened travel and consequent elimination of many athletes,—these have been presented as the three most serious handicaps of the District Plan. Some objection has been made on the ground that concentration on a few Meets, instead of magnifying the importance of as many as possible may represent something of a deterrent to the rapid development of track-and-field interest.

THE CHALLENGE GAMES

With 12 Class A teams as at present, and the possibility of several more, the problem of selecting eight for the State A Tournament each year becomes more difficult.

Three experiments have been tried:—(a) Eight schools were named by the League, with other schools regardless of size, being privileged to challenge any one of their three nearest among the eight schools.

(b) A change was made last year, such that all schools enrolling 250 or more should attend the State Tournament, but this seemed unsatisfactory to all participants. (c) The third experiment was based upon the fact that the 12 larger schools had to be recognized, and by lot eight schools were named as tournament schools, giving the other schools a chance to challenge any of the eight they might desire, and a special meeting of the four schools made arrangements for their challenges. The plan was expensive as the schools could not agree to play at any given place, nor could they, by pairs, agree to play at the home town of either. The plan did however select at least as well as heretofore, the strong teams of the state. If 16 Class A schools can be nominated, some districting plan might rather readily reduce the number to the eight Tournament schools.

THE ATHLETIC CLINICS

The N. D. H. S. League at its meeting in November, 1936 authorized the expenditure of such part of \$25.00 for each of the 16 Districts, as might be needed to conduct athletic clinics, with the hope of stimulating an interest in more uniform interpretations of the rules, and more nearly uniform officiating. In many respects, the Clinics were eminently successful, altho several Districts held none.

The League also authorized a Special Clinic at the time of N. D. E. A. meeting at which time a rather full session, it is expected, may be devoted to athletic and coaching interests.

AN IMPORTANT NEW INTERPRETATION

One of the most important interpretations of recent years followed an investigation by Superintendent Robertson, as the Board sought to liberalize its rule concerning "make up work." As stated in full in the Minutes of the Board of Control, the new interpretation provides a definite method by which a lad whose absence from school is due to certain specified causes, may "make up" his work in certain specified ways, and thus regain his eligibility.

TWO AMENDMENTS PROPOSED

At the November Meeting of the League, the League will take final action on an amendment that would require students transferring from one school to another without an equivalent move on the part of their parents, to be present in the new school for two semesters before being eligible in the new school.

The other proposal is the withdrawal of the tobacco and alcoholic beverage rule from the list of Eligibility Rules, and placing it on the list of Recommendations, along with such other recommendations as parental approval for athletic participation, and physician's physical examinations for all athletes. It is thought by some that the change would give a stronger control over the tobacco and alcoholic beverage problems, and bring about a clearer and more frank facing of the problems as they exist.

RESIGNATION OF L. H. DOMINICK

His removal from the state has brought about the resignation of Supt. L. H. Dominick of Wahpeton, who for several years has been a valued member of the Board of Control.

IMPORTANT BOOKLETS FURNISHED MEMBERS

The Handbook; the Exchange Blanks; the Contracts; the Six Man Football Book; the mimeographed Interpretations in Football; the Football Rule Book; the Football Play Situations; the Basketball Rule Book; the Basketball Play Situations; and important and invaluable "examinations questions"—a supply of materials that exceed in cost, the membership fees for most schools is provided by the League to its members. A thoughtful consideration of this material, and its careful use; and a reading of the monthly and occasional News Letters, will give every school a good acquaintance with matters of importance in athletics.

THE ATHLETIC ACCIDENT BENEFIT FUND

Since Wisconsin, a few years ago, started the idea of providing some form of protection against athletic injury bills, a number of states have taken up the experiment.

With the N. D. H. S. League, we continue in the experimental stage, but the background of our own experience, and the reports from other states combine to indicate the general trends.

As elsewhere shown, the Schedule of Benefits for the new year 1937-8 is being extended, by the adoption of the Wisconsin Schedule.

An analysis of the auditor's report will give a more accurate statement of the condition of the Fund in its several parts, but at this writing, prior to the audit, in general the following statement may be made:—

In addition to the above accounting, reference may be made to the \$1000.00 allotted by the N. D. H. S. League to initiate the A. A. B. Fund, no part of which however has ever been called upon. It appears that the rigors of football and possibly of six man football, if the latter game develops to real state wide proportions, may make disproportionate demands upon the A. A. B. Fund, as compared with the other forms of protection. Eventually doubtless some form of appropriate balance may be developed, but at present the relatively small loss in the football fund is not a disturbing one.

REPORT OF LEAGUE SECRETARY

MEMBERSHIP

Nearly two dozen schools paid their membership fees in August to make certain they were in good standing for the fall. On the other hand, several schools assumed the superintendent or principal or coach or some one else was caring for the matter or it was overlooked, and November and December came along, with the annoying penalties to add to the fee:—or even January, when no renewals could be made for the year.

To show how various schools care for their League membership renewals, they are listed herewith by months according to their renewal dates:—

Annual Fall Meeting State H. S. League

Grand Forks High School—Thursday, November 5, 1936 Members Present: Approximately 100 schools represented.

- 1. Secretary briefly reports on membership indicating practically nearly every Classified High School is a member in good standing and in addition a few Consolidated Schools have also been accepted into membership.
- 2. The Secretary-Treasurer instead of making a detailed financial report passed three copies of an official audit by F. E. Luehe, C. P. A., of Minot so that every member present had an opportunity to see the audit. Moved by Superintendent Rogers of Carrington and seconded by Superintendent Gilliland of Devils Lake that this audit made as of October 31, 1936, be accepted.
 - 3. Standing Committee report—none.
 - 4. Special Report Committee report-none.
- 5. C. L. Robertson, representing the Board of Control, raises the question as to whether or not the High School League has the

right to authorize the inclusion of other sport than basketball and football to benefit from the \$1000.00 allowed the A. A. B. Fund by the League a year ago to "help the insurance experiment in football and basketball." Moved by Payne of Bismarck and seconded by several that other sports listed this year, namely six man football, track, and hockey should be included along with football and basketball to participate in such part of the \$1000.00 as may be needed.

- 6. Nominating Committee:—Paulson, Abrahamson, Ingervoldson, Payne, and Wakefield were appointed by the Chairman as a nominating Committee (the Secretary is not certain that one or more substitutes were not subsequently named by the Chair one or more of these men not present).
- 7. The question was raised as to whether some time other than the second day of Convention might be better for the Annual League Meeting in order to devote more time to it. There being no discussion or suggestion no action was taken.
- 8. Discussion of Six Man Football: Several men who had this year experimented with Six Man Football discussed it in some detail but all apparently with the same attitude, namely that it was a real game that had probably come to stay and was to make a large contribution to the smaller schools, most of which have heretofore been limited to basketball. It was emphasized however, that the game is a rugged game and there is real need for proper training and proper equipment of players.
- 9. Moved by Mr. Rice of Velva seconded by several that a Committee of five including some coaches should be named whose responsibility it is to clarify the Six Man Football rules. Motion carried.
- 10. It was suggested that it may be helpful to have a Committee to handle Six Man Football games and championship series but that for the present the conclusion was that specific action might well be left with the Board of Control. The spirit of the meeting indicated a satisfaction with this year's proposals for the championship series idea being to continue the same for next year letting the final outcome be determined by whether finances, interest, and other considerations are favorable.
- 11. Report of nominating committee:—Superintendent Paulson reports for the Committee the names of Zimmerman of Grafton and Dominick of Wahpeton as members for the three year term to succeed themselves, and there being no other nominations from the floor the motion to accept this report was passed and these men were duly elected.
- 12. Moved by Paulson and seconded by Wakefield that the Board of Control name a nominating Committee thirty or more

days in advance. Motion carried. In the discussion it appeared that there was a desire on the part of some to have the Board of Control members chosen with some regard to geographical distribution, size of schools, and other considerations.

13. Without motion it was agreed by decision that membership in the A. A. B. Fund for hockey this year be 50s for players instead of 25c as has been proposed; and similarly that the membership fee for Six Man Football be 50c instead of 25c.

Meeting of N. D. H. S. League

Spring Conference—4:30, April 16, 1987 Woodworth Hall at University

Members present: About 25.

- Secretary's report herewith given was presented and adopted as was also the Treasurer's report after mimeographed copies were distributed.
- 2. President noted that no official action could be taken inasmuch as there was no quorum present.
- 3. Mr. Tighe made remarks upon what he feels has been a low growth of sportsmanship and good athletic spirits throughout the states, apparently feeling that in some instances there is a lack of appropriate leadership.
- 4. It was proposed by the men present and agreed to by Cosch West, U. N. D., that next year the State Track and Field Meet be held on or about the 21st of May. In the discussion it became evident that most of the men present preferred to have the track and field meet at a time separate from the music and other contests.
- 5. Considerable time was spent in discussing the Districting Plan of qualifying athletes in track and field events, several serious difficulties being pointed out. It was obvious that the men present were not over-enthusiastic over the Districting plan. We finally felt the experiment should be given a good trial this year.
- 6. Motion by Supt. Reltan of Larimore, properly seconded and carried, that the Club endorse the six District set-up for this year with special subsequent changes as the Board may direct.
- 7. The Secretary inquires for any constructive criticisms or suggestions that the men may have concerning the State "A" basket-

ball tournament problems for next year. None was forth-coming, but Supt. Rodgers of Carrington asked us whether it might be better to hold both state tournaments in the same place either exactly at the same time or separated by a day or so, so that the finals of the "B" tournament might be part of the finals of the "A" tournament. This plan had been discussed before in other years.

8. New Amendment proposed. Supt. Reitan of Larimore, proposes that Eligibility Rule No. 10 be amended, but change the words "one semester" to the words "two semesters" in the first line of the rule.

NOTE:—This constitutes the first reading of this proposed amendment. The second reading will occur at the time of the annual fall N. D. H. S. League meeting at which time it may be accepted or rejected.

9. Some discussion concerned whether or not for such contests as music, declamation and the like the Rules of Eligibility are giving the same conscientious consideration that they receive in athletics. There seemed to be a rather general belief that the rules are not so carefully observed nor so completely checked. Complimentary reference was made to efforts of Mr. John Page of the University to give appropriate publicity to these rules as he contacted the schools of the State concerning the music and other contests.

Meetings of the Board of Control

Grand Forks-November 5, 1936

Members present: B. C. Tighe, C. L. Robertson, L. L. Dominick, and L. A. White.

1. Since the fourth week end of March is Holy Week and since the third week end is the traditional time for the Class A Tournament it was agreed that the Class A Tournament in basketball should be held in the third week-end in March, this latter in keeping with the preference of Class B Schools as expressed last year.

There was some discussion of a proposal to reduce the number of Class A teams in the Tournament to eight. One plan involved dividing the State into four quarters with three Class A teams in each; by lot two teams would be chosen in each district to attend the State Tournament, the third team then having the privilege

of challenging either of the other two. This division might place Park River, Grand Forks, and Fargo together; Wahpeton, Jamestown, and Valley City together; Bismarck, Mandan, and Dickinson together; and Devils Lake, Williston, and Minot together. No action was taken. Several days after the adjournment of this meeting the Board of Control received a proposal "from the North Dakota coaches Association, Bismarck" that with a series of preliminary games the Class A schools and the winners of the Regional games in the Class B schools should compete for entrance into the class A Tournament.

- 2. Concerning district basketball committees: Without a motion it was agreed that in each of the 16 districts, other things being equal, the committee chairman should be re-appointed; that by flip of a coin one of the other two members should be appointed; and that these two men should determine the third member.
- 3. Moved by Dominick and seconded by Robertson that the Secretary write to all states that make exceptions to their rule requiring three subjects to be completed by record by the end of a given semester. Motion carried.
- 4. The Secretary was authorized to inform the school at Rhame that they should make whatever arrangements for any more Six Man Football games that they may desire. (The League meeting subsequently concluded that for this year, an official state championship seemed to be out of the question).
- 5. Shall the League again use the Dubow Ball in the Tournament? No action was taken by the group but the spirit of the group seemed to indicate that it would be well to continue the plan of other years purchasing necessary Dubow Balls for the Tournaments but not naming any Ball the "official ball." No action was taken.
- 6. It was agreed that the Board of Control should meet on Tuesday and Wednesday following Christmas Day.
- 7. Moved by Dominick and seconded by Robertson that for the coming season the membership fee for hockey in the A. A. B. Fund be made 50c instead of 25c. Motion carried.
- 8. Professor Spalding of the State Teachers College meets with the Board of Control to discuss the responsibility if any resting upon the Valley City Association of Commerce inasmuch as the Class B Tournament receipts amounted to less than the proposed \$200.00. It was felt on the one hand that the Association of Commerce should take their own proposal seriously, and yet it was recognized that the change in the date made by the Board of Control on account of impassable roads and inpossible weather was a factor in keeping the receipts low. (Note:—subsequently

word was received from Mr. Spalding that the Valley City Association of Commerce would send a check for \$150.00 to apply upon the deficit, feeling that this would be a fair arrangement).

ANNUAL MID-WINTER MEETING OF THE BOARD OF CONTROL

Gardner Hotel, Fargo, N. Dak., Dec. 28-29, 1936

Present: All members of the Board of Control.

- 1. Motion:-Moved by Dominick, seconded by Robertson, and carried, that James Volk of Linton be declared eligible. Explanation:-Several years ago the family had lived in Linton. The parents separated. Two years ago the Mother and boy moved to Aberdeen, South Dakota; the following year they moved to Lamberton, Minnesota, where they lived with the lad's grandparents. During this past summer they moved back to Linton with household goods and belongings intending to make their home there, but before school started the Mother was called back to take care of her parents apparently temporarily. The boy made his home then with an uncle who took out legal guardianship papers to prevent the Father from taking him. The Mother before school started presented the explanation to the Linton school authorities asking that school tuition should not be charged on the ground that Linton was her home by intention and stating that she would return as soon as possible.
- 2. Consideration of Proposed Case of Transfer from Courtney to Jamestown:—Action:—The Secretary was directed to write to Rex Bohn to discover the legitimacy of the proposed transfer and its actual necessity before a ruling can be made. The case:—Some years ago the family lived at Jamestown then moved to Courtney where the Father now has a restaurant. For financial reasons the Mother returns to Jamestown where she has work. She prefers to have the boy come to Jamestown to stay with her so that he might graduate from a larger high school as have some other members of the family. The boy has raised the question about his eligibility in basketball in the event he makes the transfer.
 - 3. Action Concerning State A Tournament.

Motion by Zimmerman, second by Dominick, and carried, that the following plan be adopted for the 1937 State A Basketball Tournament:—(a) eight teams only shall attend the Class A Tournament (b) The Twelve Class A teams shall be placed in four groups as follows: group one—Williston, Minot, and Devils Lake; group two

—Dickinson, Mandan, and Bismarck; group three—Wahpeton, Valley City, and Jamestown; group four—Fargo, Grand Forks, and Park River; thus placing the "new" Class A school in each group and thus arranging the teams on the whole according to accessibility (c) By lot two of these three teams in each group be chosen as the two A Tournament teams.

- 4. Members of the four teams not so drawn by lot shall meet on January 30th at Minot or other designated place there to arrange their challenges by mutual agreement there being no limitations upon their challenges. In the event any of the eight class A schools shall be challenged by more than one school (whether Class A or Class B) a tournament shall be declared. Class B schools may challenge any one of the three nearest of the eight class A schools distance to be determined by the compass; challenge to be in the hand of the Secretary on or before January 22nd; and challengers have the privilege of returning to its own class B tournaments. Class B schools shall be notified by the Secretary of the challenges made on January 30th by the four class A schools. The net proceeds of the challenge games shall be divided as heretofore, 50% to the High School League and 50% to be divided equally among the participating schools. The challenge games shall be held on or about Friday, March 5th unless otherwise arranged by mutual agreement of the participants.
- 5. Motion concerning A. A. B. Fund Payments:—Moved by White, seconded by Robertson, and carried, that payments of claims on the Six Man Football Fund of the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund be acted upon as follows: number 1, 4, 11, 12 to be allowed as per the Schedule of Benefits if on or before the first of February the required statement from dentist or doctor is received by the Secretary; numbers 2, 9, 13, 14, 17, 18, 19, 20 be disallowed inasmuch as they represent injuries not listed in the Schedule of Benefits; numbers 3, 5, 6, 7, 10, 21, 22 be allowed any amount listed on the Master Sheet; allowance on number 8 to be determined by bill from Dr. DeMoulley; claims numbers 15 and 16 are to be disallowed inasmuch as neither student was a member of the A. A. B. Fund.

By the same motion it was moved and carried that the following action be taken on the claims on the Eleven Man Football Fund of the A. A. B. Fund:—numbers 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 30, 31, 36, 37, 38, 39, 41, 42, 43, 46, 49, 54, 57, 60, 62, 65, 66, 68, 69, 70, 79 and 80 be allowed as per the Master Sheet.

The following shall be allowed subject to statement and bill of dentist or doctor by the secretary on or before February 1st:—numbers 29, 33, 34, 35, 44, 45, 47, 58, 59, 61, 75, and 82.

While the following are not listed in the Schedule of Benefits \$4.00 shall be allowed for each X-ray:—numbers 32, 40, 48, 63, 71, and 75B. In as much as the following are not listed in the Schedule of Benefits no allowances can be made on numbers 49B, 50, 51, 52, 53, 55, 56, 64, 67, 72, 73, 76, 77, 78, and 81.

The following shall not be allowed inasmuch as the boy was not a member of the A. A. B. Fund at the time of the injury:—number 74.

- 6. Motion Concerning Ball:—Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick, and carried, that the Dubow Ball shall be used as the official tournament ball by all Class A and Class B tournaments and that they purchase them at \$3.50 each as follows: two balls each for districts one to ten; one ball each for regions A, B, C, D, and E; and six balls for the state A tournament at Bismarck from the Northern School Supply Company of Fargo; and two balls each from districts eleven to sixteen; one ball each for regions F, G, H; and six balls for the Class B Tournament at Valley City from the Coleborn Supply Company at Grand Forks.
- 7. Motion State A Tournament at Bismarck:—Moved by Dominick, seconded by Zimmerman, and carried, that the invitation of Bismarck to hold the 1937 State A Tournament be accepted with the understanding that it be under the terms of the 1935 Tournament. It was decided that this should be a two day tournament of eight teams composed of nine players.
- 8. Mr. Bonhoff sent to Federation Rules Committee:—Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick, and carried, that Edward Bonhoff, coach of Grand Forks High School, represent the High School League at the Football Rules Committee Meeting on January 8th and 9th in Chicago, the expense to be born by the National Federation.
- 9. Officials for State Tournaments:—It was agreed that Richard Holtzer of Moorehead and E. L. Bersagal of Aberdeen be invited to handle the Class A Tournament; and Cy Holgate of Aberdeen with L. C. Crose of St. Cloud at the Class B Tournament at Valley City with F. E. Wyttenbach of Aberdeen as alternate. The fee is \$75.00 with expenses.
- 10. Fairmount dues as of September 1st:—It was agreed that the statement of Superintendent Dahlen of Fairmount that he wrote a check for \$1.00 membership fee dues and sent it to the Secretary shall be the basis for the acceptance for a new check of \$1.00 without penalty even though the Secretary's records do not show the receipt

of the previous check. Fairmount's membership to be dated as of September 1st.

- 11. Penalty For Late Dues Reduced:—It was agreed that for this year the \$10.00 penalty for December membership fees shall be reduced to \$5.00 and the \$5.00 fee for November be reduced to \$2.50.
- 12. New Penalty Fees For Tardy Fees:—Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Robertson, and carried, that hereafter the penalty for tardy in November should be the doubling of the fee; and shall be \$5.00 in December; with no admission into membership in January just as heretofore.
- 13. New Interpretation Grants Make-Up Work Privilege Under Rule Number 8:-Moved by White, seconded by Dominick, and carried, that the following interpretation be the basis for use in connection with Rule Number 8:-- "The work must be completed by the last day of the semester for which the credit is given, except that in case of actual disabling illness or of quarantine as a result of illness, or of death in the immediate family, the school may be permitted to hold the semester record open for the student until he has had an opportunity to make up his work, provided that a certified statement giving the facts of the case must be filed by the principal of the high school and the attending physician or the city or village health officer, with the Secretary of the Board of Control not later than fifteen days after the illness or quarantine. One opportunity only shall be given for make-up work or special examination to cover any such case. This provision shall not apply to failures which were not due to illness or quarantine and shall not apply to failures due to illness or quarantine which were not reported to the secretary as above provided. In any cases in which the student was not up to passing grade in three subjects at the time when he left school, the failure shall be regarded as not due to illness or quarantine.

In the case of students carrying courses in agriculture involving projects in growing crops or raising stock the high school is permitted to hold the second semester records open until such projects can be completed, provided that notice of the necessity of such extension of time is filed with the Secretary of the Board of Control within fifteen days after the end of the semester.

It is further provided that during the period when the school records are held open for a student for any of the above mentioned reasons such student is not eligible for interscholastic competition.

A student who loses the last few weeks of the semester (11-6

weeks) and then enters school at the end of a succeeding semester for a time equivalent to that lost, may complete the required three or more units of work, provided his attendance during the second semester shall comprise not less than 20 school days. In such case, both semesters shall be counted in computing enrollment under the 8 semester rule."

COMMENT:—Superintendent Robertson made an intensive study of the items of some 18 states so to interpret their rules equivalent to our number 8 as to dealing a little more leniently with unfortunate pupils handicapped by injury, illness, quarantine, or death in the family.

14. Consideration of Conflicts Between District Tournaments and County or Consolidated Tournaments:—It was agreed that even in Districts where consolidated schools may out number classified high schools or where county tournaments seem to rival the High School League's District Tournament the High School League's District Tournament must be considered of first importance.

Specific reference was made to the situation in Barnes County where there are 12 Consolidated League schools and 5 High School League Schools and where there also is a large county basketball tournament. A similar situation is found in McLean County where all schools of the district but one are within the county for basketball in a county tournament.

The major point in the mind of the Board of Control members was that the High School League District Tournament cannot rightly be expected to give way or accommodate itself to or merge itself into county tournaments or consolidated school tournaments.

- 15. Adjustment Made on Valley City's 1936 Tournament Guarantee:—Moved by Robertson, seconded by Zimmerman, and carried, that inasmuchas the 1936 Class B Tournament at Valley City was changed from the assigned date to a later one due to serious road and weather conditions thus being a factor in causing a lessened attendance at the tournament the \$800.00 gross receipt guarantee of Valley City's Civic and Commerce Association be reduced to \$675.00 and that the receipt of the difference between this amount and the actual receipt be announced as fulfilling the entire obligation of the Valley City Civic and Commerce Association.
- 16. State B Tournament Placed at Valley City:—Moved by Robertson, seconded by Zimmerman, and carried, that the invitation of Valley City's Civic and Commerce Association to entertain the 1937 Class B Tournament be accepted under the proposals as follows:—(a) to make up such deficit in the gross receipts as might

be determined by the Board of Control (see motion above) (b) guarantee \$700.00 gross receipts (c) provide a banquet to officials, coaches, and players without charge (d) provide radio broadcast over KOVC.

- 17. Trophies Purchased From Josten:—Moved by Zimmerman seconded by Robertson, and carried, that the Board of Control enter into a three year contract with the Josten Manufacturing Company for the first, second, and third place trophies for both Class A and Class B Tournaments at \$28.00, \$17.25, \$16.25, and \$14.50; and also into a three year contract for first and second place district trophies at prices submitted (to be corrected inasmuchas the price of \$26.50 was for the complete set of four awards for each district); and one year contract for five gold and filled bronze belt buckles for each tournament for all state first and all state second teams as in other years at \$2.75 and \$1.75 each.
- 18. Trophies Furchased From Wimmer Jewelry:—Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Robertson, and carried, that for each of the 16 Districts the third place trophy 11 by 6½ at \$6.25 and fourth place trophy 10 by 6½ for \$5.25; and 9 sets of number 86 heavy balls 1/10 G F & S at \$2.75 be purchased for the State A Tournament at Bismarck and 8 similar sets be purchased for the Class B Tournament at Valley City; and 54 bronze balls for participation for the Bismarck tournament and 48 of the same for the Valley City Tournament be purchased for the ensuing year from the Wimmer Jewelry Manufacturing Company of Fargo. All plaques and balls except the bronze balls to be suitably engraved as heretofore.
- 19. Robertson to Represent High School League at New Orleans Federation Meeting:—Moved by Dominick, seconded by Zimmerman, and caried, that Vice President C. L. Robertson represent the State High School League at the annual meeting of the Federation of State H. S. A. A. The meeting will be at New Orleans and the expenses paid by the League.
- 20. University May Fete and The League:—President Tighe conferred by long distance telephone with John H. Page of the University of North Dakota concerning the time and nature of the May Fete. No action was taken but the secretary of the League was instructed to write Mr. Page concerning any problems connected with the Fete.
- 21. Eight Teams Drawn by Lot for State A Tournament:— On three separate slips of paper the names of Park River, Grand Forks, and Fargo were placed—one name on each slip and placed

in a group; similarly Wahpeton, Valley City, and Jamestown; Devils Lake, Minot, and Williston; Dickinson, Mandan, and Bismarck.

In the presence of the Board of Control Mr. Charles Kimball of the Northern School Supply Company shook up the three slips from one group, not knowing which group, and placed them in a hat from which Superintendent George Myers of Page drew first one slip and then a second.

From the first group Park River and Grand Forks were drawn thus automatically entering the State A Tournament unless being beaten subsequently by some challenging team.

In like manner Wahpeton and Valley City; Devils Lake and Minot; Dickinson and Bismarck were the teams selected.

2. Consideration of Minot Ineligibility Cases:—Superintendent George Myers of Page replaced Superintendent L. A. White on the Board of Control during consideration of this case in keeping with the Constitutional provision.

The data had been presented by correspondence and to some extent verbally before but was reviewed by Mr. White and Mr. Colton substantially as follows: Eligibility Sheets of 1936-37 show Franklin Morrell to have reached his 18th birthday on October 27th, 1936. At that time, however, his father presented the school with an affidavit signed by the attending physician setting forth November 7th as the correct birth date. The school, finding this difference from its school records, makes inquiries at the doctor's office and at the office of the city auditor where to their surprise they find not October 27th but October 7th to be the correct date. This means that the boy has played two games after his birthdate. Further investigation makes it appear that the school record card in the principal's office had been changed, possibly during the summer, by the insertion of the figure 2 before the 7 which would account for the difference between the Eligibility Sheet of this year and that of last year inasmuchas the principal to avoid carrying any possible error of the preceeding year had instructed his secretary not to copy from last year's Eligibility Sheet but to take each boy's birthdate from the original office card.

The problem of Michael Doyle differed inasmuchas the most thorough investigation failed to bring to light other than conflicting birthdates although the preponderance of evidence seems to establish his correct birthdate to be 1916. The principal's secretary, making use of the official record card of the office, represented on this year's Eligibility Sheet the date of 1919 whereas the sheet of a year ago showed 1916. Although there is no record in the school office of any sort to show this to have been his birthdate.

The school officials traced every possible source of information and presented their data immediately to the Board of Control.

Mr. White assuming that it might be for the best interests of the League to emphasize the obligation upon every League member to use utmost care in the preparation of its Eligibility Sheets tendered his resignation from the Board of Control and from the Secretaryship. In his absence the following minutes were prepared.

George Myers of Page sitting on Board in place of L. A. White. Minot Ineligibility Cases—Michael Doyle and Franklin Morrell—Circumstances explained by Superintendent L. A. White and Principal Colton.

In spite of the fact that the Board had affidavits from parents in both cases showing the boys to be under 18 the bulk of the other evidence presented by the school convinced the Board that Michael Doyle was ineligible throughout the football season and that Franklin Morrell was ineligible after October 7, 1936.

Dominick moved, seconded by Myers, and carried, that the boys be declared ineligible for the periods above mentioned and that the following penalties be imposed:

- 1. Minot High School shall forfeit all football games in which either boy played while ineligible. School authorities shall notify all opponents of such forfeiture.
- 2. Special assembly of the Minot High School shall be called at which the principal shall read a letter prepared by the Board.
 - 3. The case shall be reported fully in the League News Letter.
- 4. The school shall be directed not to grant letters or any other athletic honors or award to Michael Doyle or Franklin Morrell during the school year of 1936-37.

Superintendent White offered his resignation as Secretary of the Board. During his absence from the meeting the matter was discussed. It was felt by members that his honest endeavors to support and promote the policies of the League within his own school cannot be questioned. Upon motion by George Myers, seconded by Zimmerman, it was unanimously decided that the resignation should not be accepted.

23. Reorganization of Board of Control for 1936-37:—Moved by Dominick, seconded by Zimmerman, as of November 5th, that B. C. Tighe, C. L. Robertson, and L. A. White be re-elected to their own respective offices as heretofor. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING March 12-13, 1937

Members present: Robertson, Tighe, Zimmerman, White; Dominick absent.

Several informal meetings were held during the time of this Tournament—a rather wide variety of topics discussed.

- 1. A question was raised as to whether or not eventually the State College at Fargo with its large gymnasium might not prove a satisfactory place for the State "A" Tournament in the event it were to be moved.
- 2. Reference was made to the fact that the Civic and Commerce Association of Valley City had just paid by check, a sum of \$125 to fulfill its obligation on its guarantee of tournament receipts a year ago in keeping with a compromised agreement with the Board of Control.
- 3. Various types of plans for track and field meets throughout the State were discussed.
- 4. There was a discussion about tournament balls. Apparently there were more inferior Dubow balls. Reference was made to the fact that in the main tournament several different makes of balls are available for the teams and boys during the tournament.
- 5. C. L. Robertson presents a written report on his attendance at the New Orleans meeting of the National Federation of High School Athletic Associations.
- 6. Consideration was given to a proposed Districting of the State to provide Qualifying Meets for the State Track and Field meeting, a specific plan being presented by Coach Rognstad of Valley City. This plan was nearly identical with Districting plans previously considered by the Board in other years.
- 7. The Board met with representatives of the Valley City Kiwanis Club to discuss their invitational meet. Reference was made to the fact that the State Meet of the University should be on May 15, and preliminary meets to be with the satisfaction proceeding; that the A. C. Meet would be on the 8th and the Bismarck Meet (if any) would probably be in the last week of May or the first week of June.
- 8. A brief discussion concerned the problems involved in the two-day State "A" basketball tournament verses the three-day basketball tournament.
- 9. Some discussion of Bismarck's plan to hold again a State Meet wherein state records would be accepted but no school champions determined—just last year—but it seemed uncertain whether Bismarck planned such a meet.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Bismarck, State "A" Tournament - March 19-20, 1937

Members present: All of Board of Control.

- 1. Motion concerning basketballs moved by Dominick, seconded by Robertson:—that when the Coaches Association officially submit any recommendation concerning tournament balls (prior to the time of the meeting of the Board of Control) which as yet has never been done, the Board be prepared to give no serious consideration to such recommendation. Carried.
- 2. The Secretary was authorized to write Professor C. C. Schmidt asking that the High School League meeting at the time of the High School Conference be scheduled not later than 4:30.
 - 3. Discussion of State-wide track and field meets.
- 4. Discussion of challenge games and consideration of bills by the eight teams, moved by Dominick and seconded by Zimmerman that all bills be paid as rendered except that Williston be allowed the usual round trip railroad fare from Williston to Minot and the usual round trip bus rate from Minot to Bismarck. Carried.
- 5. The Secretary was authorized to pay the two officials, Hann and Payne \$10 each for their work in the Dickinson-Williston challenge games; and was also to pay \$11.15 for the ball used in the Grand Forks-Mandan challenge game.
- 6. The Secretary was authorized to send Mr. Saxvik a check for \$100 and Mr. Spalding a check for \$50 in payment for their services respectively in the Class "A" State Tournament and the Class "B" State Tournament.
- 7. Moved by Robertson, seconded by Dominick that beginning as of January 1937, the Secretary's salary shall be at the rate of \$600 per annum. Motion caried.
- 8. Luncheon meeting with Supt. Saxvik at which time favorable comment was passed by the Board upon the excellent management not only of the Tournament but of conditions throughout the city. The Secretary was authorized to write a letter of commendation to Chief of Police Ebeling. Attention was called by the Board of Control to Mr. Saxvik as Superintendent of Bismarck Schools and as manager of the Tournament, to the fact that certain publicity by radio and by newspaper given by one of the members of the Bismarck city school staff did not seem in harmony with the spirit of cooperation and understanding, or good taste.
- 9. Moved by Dominick, seconded by Robertson that for the season of 1937, the Board adopt the plan of Districting the State as proposed by Coach Joe Rognstad and approved by the Coaches

Association, whereby the State is divided into six districts as follows: District No. 1 consists of all League schools in the counties of: Richland, Sargent, Ransom, Cass and Barnes; District No. 2: Grand Forks, Nelson, Walsh, Pembina, Cavalier, Trail, Steele and Griggs; District No. 3: Dickey, LaMoure, McIntosh, Logan, Stutsman. Foster, Kidder, Emmons and Burleigh; District No. 4: Ramsey, Benson, Towner, Rolette, Pierce, Bottineau, McHenry, Sheridan, Wells and Eddy; District No. 5: Sioux, Grant, Morton, Adams, Hettinger, Stark, Slope, Bowman, Billings, Golden Valley, Oliver, Mercer. Dunn and McKenzie: District No. 6: Renville, Burke, Divide, Williams, Mountrail, Ward and McLean, with qualifying meets at the following places: Valley City (later changed to State College at Fargo), University, Jamestown, Devils Lake, Minot and Dickinson. Winners of First and Second places shall be eligible to enter the State tournament. Any athlete achieving the following minimum standards shall also be eligible in addition to the first and second place winners. This District plan was adopted on an experimental basis for one year only, for it is anticipated that certain difficulties will arise some of which might be surmountable.

- 10. Some discussion was given to the question of whether or not new records made at any Meet other than the University should be accepted as official and the question was held open until the time of the conference meeting. At the present time, Bismarck is considering the "plowing up" of its athletic field, and its Spring Athletic program seems uncertain.
- 11. It is agreed that the University meet shall be the official State meet both for the establishing of new records and for the determining of school championships.
- 12. It was agreed that an effort is to be made to have the University place the track meet not earlier than the 21st of May.
- 13. Consideration of the use of ineligible players. Some school man wrote to Supt. Dominick stating that in error he had used some athlete throughout the basketball season only to find near the end of the season that the boy's credit in music had not been sufficiently complete to gain him eligibility, and thus he had not previously passed in three subjects. The letter had been written to the Secretary, but in some way had disappeared, and the data were presented by memory without knowledge of the boy's name or certainty as to the school. The Board agreed, however, that if the case is as it seems to be, the same four penalties should be applied that were applied in the Minot case.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

University Conference, Grand Forks, April 16, 1937

- 1. No formal Board of Control meetings were held, but Mr. Tighe, Mr. Zimmerman and Mr. White discussed the Board of Control problems in incidental meetings rather frequently. Mr. Robertson and Mr. Dominick were not present.
- 2. Mr. Zimmerman and Mr. White gave special attention to the following points:—1. Can the Board of Control give some financial backing to the proposed Coaching School to be held at Minot State Teachers College at which time Bierman and MacMillan are to be present. The problems seem to be more complicated when it was learned that Coach West at the University is planning a school and Joe Rognstad at Valley City is planning a summer Coaching School. No action was taken nor an agreement reached. Mr. Zimmerman was to confer with Mr. Dominick that evening at Wahpeton and telegram a decision (no telegram was received; apparently Mr. Dominick was out of town).
- 3. Mr. Zimmerman and Mr. White conferred with Coach West to consider his proposed list of Minimum Standards for the Coaching of athletics in addition to the first and second place winners in the District Meets. Coach West approves the list as given by Mr. Tighe considering it a better list than his own.
- 4. Some discussion was centered around what to do about towns that were certain to have a cost having transferred from one district to another district because of distances. There seemed to be no answer in advance for it was felt that confusion follows with many transferences made, and yet it seems too bad to force any town to travel an extra 100 miles unnecessarily.
- 5. It was agreed that since the State College at Fargo is again conducting its traditional track meet on the 8th day of May, it would be wiser to use this as the official qualifying District Meet instead of the one proposed at Valley City, especially so since Mr. Spalding of the Valley City State Teachers College was finding it very difficult to direct such a Meet.

By order of your secretary, Mr. L. A. White, I have carefully checked the receipts and disbursements of your Body, reconciled same with the bank, have examined all receipted bills and claims as presented and herewith submit a complete report of same, together with a record of your Assets as of November 1, 1936.

Allow me to suggest a few changes in the routine of "keeping your books."

- 1. Use one receipt book only, making out receipts for all monies received, regardless of the source of Income. Have the receipts numbered consecutively by machine.
- 2. Make a summary of receipts by sources at the end of each month in your "Cash Book."
- 3. Procure a ledger, in which to keep separately a list of "schools" paying into the "Benefit Fund," dividing them into the three different classes "Football regular," "Football 6 men" and "Basketball."
- 4. Procure a book for a correct record and a detailed account of all injuries reported, allowed and paid for.
- 5. The minutes of the "Meetings of the Board of Control" of course are required to list expenditures specifically and separately at each meetings.

The subsidiary books, mentioned in 3 and 4, can I believe conveniently be combined in one, preferably a "LOOSE LEAF" ledger.

These records should I believe be fully and completely brought up to date, beginning with the first entry in the Benefit Fund, so that they will serve as a permanent record for the future. It is apparent that this Fund will grow from year to year, and as this is in the nature of a "Public Trust Fund" so to speak, it seems adequate and wise to build now for the future.

A proper "Filing System" of course goes with the complete records spoken of. And the work of doing this installation will be only a small matter now, as there are only two years to consider.
