NOTE PARTICULARLY:-

ALL MEMBERSHIPS EXPIRE September 30th, and are renewed only by specific payment of dues.

The fee is \$1.00 for towns under 1,000 population; \$2.00 for towns between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for towns over 2,000.

BUT IF dues are not paid by November 1st they shall be doubled and if not paid by December 1st, they shall be increased to \$5.00. Further, no memberships shall be accepted after January first. AND:—Dues cannot be accepted if your OFFICIAL ELIGIBILITY BLANKS HAVE NOT BEEN FILED WITH THE SECRETARY.

What To Do In

SEPTEMBER:

- (a) Pay the dues at once; secure all League blanks thereby, and athletic books.
- (b) Join the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, to protect your school, and your boys, 75c for football, 50c for six man football.
- (c) Have a physical examination of all boys preparing to participate in athletics.
- (d) Secure written parental permission for all boys who are to participate in athletics.
- (e) Begin at once to check player's eligibility:—Age, semesters of attendance, seasons of attendance, and scholastic records the past semester particularly. Watch 9th semester athletes' ages!
- (f) Get an early start on the SIX MAN FOOTBALL.
- (g) Give special attention to the tobacco and beer rule, right from the start.
- (h) Why not a special "For-the-good-of-athletics" assembly, early in September.
- See News Letters for the Six Man Football Tournament Plans.

OCTOBER:

- (a) Hurry and pay the membership fee. After October 31 the membership fee is doubled.
- (b) What of the Six Man Football Championship?
- (c) A good time now to think about the Accident Benefit Fund, for Basketball at 50c per boy.

NOVEMBER:

- (a) At N. D. E. A. time, the Annual Fall meeting is the big meeting of the League year. This is the time to bring in all sorts of well thought out plans and suggestions. Send coaches to the athletic clinic.
- (b) Start your plans from the first, for the never-varying custom in all contests, and particularly in basketball, of (a) exchanging Eligibility Sheets; and (b) Contracts.
- (c) If your dues are still unpaid, HURRY UP, for after the last day of November dues are increased to five dollars. Too bad, too.

DECEMBER:

- (a) If your membership fee has not been paid before the end of this month, you are out of the League.
- (b) Class B schools better send in their Tournament Fees now for it has to be doubled after the 15th of next month. You might forget it.
- (c) With basketball right on us, why not check again every possible representative of your school on all eligibility points; complete the physical examinations; really secure parental consent; protect the boys with the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund; hold a special assembly to talk about all eligibility rules; with special bearing on the tobacco and beer rule. Watch all ninth semester boys for ages.
- (d) Yes, the League has adopted a Committee Report, urging against interscholastic competitive contests for girls. It is not prohibited however, by our League as has been done in some states.
- (e) See the News Letters for the "Challenge Games" Plans.

JANUARY:

- (a) Too late to join the League now.
- (b) Pay up your Tournament Entry Fees of \$2.00 (Class B Schools) before the 15th, and save the \$2.00 penalty. Send it to your District Tournament Chairman.
- (c) Did you actually complete—the physical examination; parental permission for participation; athletic assembly; membership in A. A. Benefit Fund—and other good resolutions—or are you merely paving some more (with good intentions).

FEBRUARY:

(a) Tournament entry fee is doubled now (\$4.00), but still can be

received by the 15th. Hurry it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.

- (b) Avoid that end-of-the-season embarrassment to your school and team, by making certain before the Tournaments are any nearer, that there is no possible eligibility question about any of your contestants.
- (c) Why not write to your Tournament Committee, giving suggestions for tournaments.

MARCH:

- (a) The Tournament month. News Letters will give specific dates. By tradition the closing Tournament of the season is held about the third week end of March, with other Tournaments coming respectively one, two and three weeks prior to that time. Unless other plans are announced by News Letters, the Class A Tournament will be held during the third week-end in March.
- (b) With the closing of the basketball season you are preparing your data for the Official Eligibility Report, whereon you list the record of absolutely every lad who has represented your school in any inter-scholastic basketball contest, however unimportant, on any team (whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd or other) for any length of time however brief, and regardless whether he was in Grade school or junior high school or senior high school (provided only that the team was not made up of players all of whom were below ninth grade).

APRIL:

- (a) Track time begins. The League is making a strenuous effort to develop track and field work. Get your lads in as many meets as you can. It is a fine spring sport.
- (b) Unless otherwise notified, any Track Meet large enough to have 6 League schools entered, if an open meet, automatically becomes an Official Qualifying Meet for any subsequent State Meet. Qualifying events must have at least 3 contestants; and 1st and 2nd place winners are eligible for the "State" Meets.
- (c) Have you considered the Athletic Accident Fund protection for your track and field boys? It has frequently saved some school embarrassment, and helped lads pay injury bills.

MAY:

(a) Classified High Schools, whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or whatever size in enrollment must be League members to participate in any kind of Inter-scholastic contest, — athletic, music, declamation, etc.—whether held in a County Festival, or a State University or elsewhere. Lines are to be more rigidly drawn

- October 31st. Memberships paid after this date cost \$2.50 additional.
- November 30th. Memberships paid after this date cost \$5.00 additional.

Scattered Items of Interest

Concerning the Special Handbook

The Board of Control takes some pride in the Special Handbook distributed to all League schools, giving in full the Constitution and all By Laws, together with many citations of interpretations of the Rules of Eligibility. The new book, likely to be known as the "black and gold book" because of its colors, will, it is believed, fit a definite need in all high schools. The book divided into six parts, rather completely indexed with cross references, seeks to clarify the workings of the League as an organization, and the applications of the Rules of Eligibility.

Concerning the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund

The A. A. B. Fund seems to merit the continued favor given it. The Board of Control is carefully following the experience of other states, most notably that of Wisconsin which has gone farther than any of the others. In Wisconsin the A. A. B. Fund fees are lower than with us, but their membership fees are enough higher that they make up the difference in most instances. The lowest membership fee is \$7.50 in that state, and range upwards according to the size of the high school, mounting to the figure of \$60.00 for the larger schools. Elsewhere will be found a general accounting of the Fund showing that the fees more than care for basketball, but that the football and six man football fees are insufficient to balance the approved claims. Hockey showed some gain in enrollment this year, but neither track nor physical education enrollments are at all significant.

Six Man Football

Our state is now the leading state in the nation, in the new game of Six Man Football. Supt. L. F. Rice is a member of the National Rules Committee. The game after this added year of experience, seems not only to have maintained its popularity, but has gained in favor both with the public and with the players. To protect the game from falling into disrepute, more and more emphasis is being placed on the necessity of providing appropriate suits and protective pads. Any game in which tackling and blocking plays any significant part is not a "sissy" game, and the players need protection.

The District Track and Field Meets

Following the experiment of last year, the League definitely districted the state again into eight Districts for qualifying entries for the State Meet. District centers were named as follows: No. 1, Wahpeton, Earl Bute, Manager (since the A. C. Track was torn up this spring); No. 2, Jamestown College, E. J. Cassell, Manager; No. 3, Bismarck, W. H. Payne, Manager; No. 4, S. T. C. Dickinson, H. J. Wienbergen, Manager; No. 5, University, C. A. West, Manager; No. 6, Devils Lake, F. H. Gilliland, Manager; No. 7, Minot S. T. C., W. D. Allen, Manager; Williston, J. N. Urness, Manager. Trophies and awards were provided for all events, including the relay, and the two golf and two tennis events, being purchased by the Board of Control. Similarly awards and trophies for the State Meet at Bismarck were purchased by the Board of Control for the first time.

In addition to the first and second place winners who were eligible to enter the State Meet, all other athletes meeting certain minimum standards were also eligible if they participated in meets having at least six schools entered, provided there were three or four other entrants in the given event. The minimum standards were as follows:

The Challenge Games

Last Fall the League itself determined that the challenge game plan of last year should be continued in many of its essential parts. The 8 schools having the largest enrollment were selected automatically as so-called "A" schools; and all others were so-called "B" schools a designation not particularly happy because of previous use in a somewhat different way. Any "B" school was permitted to challenge any of the designated "A" schools, the arrangement of the game or games being made by representatives of the challenging schools, just as last year, their delegates expenses being borne by the N. D. H. S. League. Similarly all games were underwritten by the League. As elsewhere shown, the game between Devils Lake and Dickinson, held at Jamestown failed to make expenses by a considerable amount; and the double-header between Williston and Hannah and between Park River and Jamestown despite the relatively good income failed to balance because of the heavy expenses of some of the teams. The double game at Bismarck-between Valley City and Mandan, and between Minot and Wahpeton balanced out with a margin since three of the teams were relatively "close in." While the "challenge" plan does not meet with complete approval, as yet no better plan has been devised.

Athletic Clinics

More Districts held Athletic Clinics this year than last year, and in most places they gained marked favor. Probably the largest single factor in determining the success of the proposed "Clinics," is the personality of the one conducting them. Unfortunately in most instances those needing the Clinics do not attend—for it is the "rusty" and inexperienced referees who are in most need of the type of training given at the Clinics.

Concerning the "Tobacco and Beer Rule"

There need be no misunderstanding about the application of the anti-tobacco and anti-alcoholic-beverage rule. The League has not changed its antagonism to these two evils. The only change is that the administration of the rule is left entirely in the hands of the local schools in each instance. Many school men believed that we were "kidding" ourselves when a pretense was made that boys who had smoked all through the summer would stop short the instant school began for the sake of basketball in the winter, or track in the spring. or even for football in the fall. But with each coach, and principal and superintendent supervising their own boys, handling each case as a misdemeanor on its own merits, it is hoped that more headway will be made against these two evils.

Four Amendments Before the League

It has been proposed that (a) the League should have a full time Secretary at a salary not to exceed \$2,400.00; that (b) any authorized representative of a member school shall be eligible for the Board of Control but that no Board member may succeed himself in consecutive terms; that (c) participation below 9th grade shall not militate against a boy's playing four full seasons while in high school; and (d) no constitution amendment be possible without the intervening of at least one month between the two readings of any proposed amendment.

How Bismarck Uses Its Share of Tournament Profits

Every once in a while, the question has been raised as to the manner of expending its share of each year's net profits, by the Bismarck Association of Commerce. Through Superintendent Saxvik who manages the State A Tournament at Bismarck, the Association of Commerce of that city has authorized the following statement:-(A) For last year: 1, Rental Memorial Hall \$325.00; 2, Courtesy Ball at the high school \$63.58; 3, Tournament programs \$50.49; 4, State Track Meet banquet \$69.76; 5, State Track and Field Meet medals and trophies \$77.98; 6, \$1.00 paid each entrant in State Track and Field Meet to apply on his expenses \$71.00. Total \$657.81. 6, Missouri Area Boy Scout Camp Program \$35.70; 7, Expenses National Boy Scout Jamboree \$43.45. Total for all \$736.96. (B) For this year the unexpended balance beyond the \$736.96 referred to above, is added to the \$850.00 share of the 1938 Tournament, to carry out plans and expenditures about as those of last year, except that to each boy entering the State Track and Field Meet this Spring, will be given about \$2.25 instead of the \$1.00 as last year.

In other words, the Bismarck share has not been appropriated by the Association of Commerce for its own use, nor by the Bismarck high school for its use, but has been used in some form of boy work definitely, nearly every dollar of it being used in some "statewide" application.

Until a dozen or fifteen years ago, the State Basketball Tournaments were significant money-losers. All schools sending entrants expected to pay their expenses in full, hoping to have a few dollars returned after local expenses of the Tournament were met. Then when the Tournaments were taken to the splendid new gymnasium at the Mandan Training School, for the first time in League history, all expenses of all teams, as well as all local expenses were met, and there was a likely balance left over! This was epoch making. Then when Bismarck built its new Memorial Hall, a still larger structure, financial history began to be made, and it seemed appropriate

to make some business deal with the Bismarck hosts. The Association of Commerce guaranteed all tournament expenses; gave the first thousand dollars of net profit to the League, and proposed a fifty-fifty division of any net proceeds thereafter. This seemed good, until the tournament grew so large and profitable that it seemed best several years ago to make a revision downward on the Bismarck share, which was readily acceded to by that city. Under present arrangements all tournament expenses are first paid, the League receives the next thousand dollars, and the proceeds thereafter are divided fifty-fifty provided however that the Bismarck share shall not exceed \$800.00 for a two day tournament or \$850.00 for a three day tournament, the difference being due to the different Memorial Hall rental fee.

Tournament Balls

Acting upon the advice of the Coaches Association whose representatives met at the mid-winter meeting of the Board of Control with them, three balls were made official for any League Tournament:—Either the Goldsmith or Rawlings Laceless, or the Dubow molded ball. For the District games, District Committees were empowered to make their choices; but for the State Tournaments balls of both types were at hand, to permit coaches to agree on their own choices.

Board Holds Conference With Coaches

The Board of Control held three meetings with representatives of the coaches of the state, during the year, it is believed very much to the advantage of all.

At the midwinter meeting H. L. Robertson, Glenn Hanna and George Newgard by invitation of the Board of Control attended the Fargo meeting of the Board and participated in many of the discussions, making definite suggestions on certain assigned matters.

And during the B Tournament at Minot and again during the A Tournament at Bismarck noon-time luncheon conferences were held, rather widely attended, again with good discussions and definite contributions for the good of the League.

It has been considered by many that this form of Conference merits a definite place in the program of the League.

North Dakota has maintained its lead among the state, for the development of Six Man Football.

Any school will get a large quarter's worth, by sending to The Scholastic Coach, 250 E. 43rd St., New York City, for the May issue. Page 22 is devoted to a discussion of the changes in the Six Man

Football rules; and pages 20 and 21 give illustrations and full descriptions of different types of complete equipments for Six Man Football players, ranging in price from \$15.25 to \$26.00. The game has probably passed that critical period when its very existence was threatened by innocent coaches and school men sending their boys out to the playing fields without proper and appropriate protective suits and equipment. Any game wherein tackling and blocking and bodily contact is involved has its possibilities for injuries. And Six Man Football is too good a game to be jeopardized by cheap and inferior protective equipment.

This same issue carries on pages 34, 35, 37 a good description of the changes in the basketball rules, with good "comments" on each change.

Perhaps the most valuable part of the issue however is a discussion of whether or not high school athletes are "burnt out" by their high school participation, the article being a studied reply to the famous Saturday Evening Post article of a few seasons ago. The conclusion is favorable to high school participation.

Incidentally—as per the present time—but at least with implications for the future—a fine article discusses badminton as a co-recreational game. Starting as a plaything, knocking a little ball over a pile of blocks spread across a table, the game has made great strides toward an important and perhaps permanent place among indoor recreative, if not competitive, sports. It is no longer considered child's play, and in some respects demands for itself all the skill and finesse that are usually reserved for tennis.

With the new roll type of high jump, and with the upward creep of the vault, the hazards of field events seem to be somewhat on the increase, at least as far as broken arms are concerned. The A. A. B. Fund is now prepared to help boys thru the Track and Field season, by direction of the Board of Control.

Details concerning the A. A. B. Fund are this year given completely in the Black and Gold Special Handbook, with any changes made thru the season explained in current News Letters.

The several significant points about the A. A. B. Fund are these:

(a) For 75c in football, for 50c in Six Man Football and Basketball and Hockey, and for 25c in physical education classes and Trackand-Field, a boy may be benefited according to the Schedule of Benefits for any injury so listed, that occurs during the appropriate season. Many schools pay the fees for their "varsity players" in whole or in part, and encourage parents to pay for other boys. It seems odd that there is not a more rapid development in the Physical Education department for there is always a chance of a dislocation or broken arm or collar-bone and the schools are certainly saved embarrassment when they can refer to the A. A. B. Fund in such instances.

- (b) There is a special membership blank, facsimile of which is shown in the Black and Gold Special Handbook, but the essential thing is the sending of the fee and the boys name, indicating the sport, and the school, with the principal's signature, stating that he understands and accepts the League's terms of the A. A. B. Fund.
- (c) In the event of an injury, the Secretary is to be notified within 12 days or less, and duplicate blanks are sent to the school, both of which are filled and sent to the Secretary for Board action.
- (d) Payment is made to the Principal or Superintendent and one of the blanks is returned for the school-files; and the Principal or Superintendent then endorses the check over to the dentist or surgeon.

Note:—It is highly desirable that school men, and athletes, and parents and doctors be made acquainted with the Schedule of Benefits for naturally enough there is not attempt to "cover" all kinds of injuries.

Two additions have been directed this year by the Board of Control, following the experience of the Wisconsin organization:
(a) 7th and 8th grade boys may become 'members'; and (b) the coverage will include necessary transportation to and from official interscholastic games, en route, altho probably not an injury occurring when a dozen boys pile on a small car to ride a half dozen blocks from the school to the playing field—a rather distinct hazard, that should be discouraged rather than condoned.

The B Tournament was an outstanding success this year in three respects: (a) The brand of ball and the type of competition; (b) the enthusiasm of the crowds; and (c) the attendance and consequent financial success. The financial statement shown elsewhere shows that the receipts more than paid expenses, for the first time in the history of the B Tournament. The A Tournament was likewise a good success in many respects, tho the absence of Mandan and Minot, and the early defeat of Bismarck contributed to a decrease in attendance, altho on the whole the attendance was excellent.

REPORT OF LEAGUE SECRETARY Membership

In some respects, a good deal of significance attaches to the time at which League schools renew their memberships. Except by error, those schools, longest members of the League and most loyal to its traditions never fail to renew their membership well in advance of the final hour—midnight September 30th. Each year a few schools apparently debate within themselves for several months about joining the N. D. H. S. League, and their delay costs them the penalties provided and published by the Board of Control. Once in a while this is due to a school's vacillating between joining the C. and G. S. League and the North Dakota H. S. League.

Annual Fall Meeting State H. S. League

Junior High School Library, Minot, N. D. Thursday, October 28, 1937

B. C. Tighe, Presiding Officer.

Present:—Representatives of 103 schools and approximately 50 others.

- 1. Reading of the minutes of the Spring meeting. Since the minutes have been published in the Handbook, it was agreed that they need not be read at this time.
 - 2. A report of the Secretary.
 - (a) The Secretary reported membership of the League at this time of 210.
 - (b) Reference was made to the fact that all third class high schools as well as second class and first class must be members of the N. D. H. S. League if they would participate in any interscholastic contests with other classified schools. It was explained also that consolidated schools may secure annual membership in the High School League with the approval of the Board of Control provided they do full four years of high school work, meeting the major classifications of the classified high schools.
 - (c) "I was a member of the High School League—but my school was not"—so wrote a school man recently indicating a misunderstanding of the membership in the High School League. The Constitution provides that it is the Fargo High School and Berthold High School and Ellendale High School that are members of the N. D. H. S. League and not any man at all. There is no individual membership. The superintendent is not the member; nor the principal; nor the coach—it is the High School that is a member of the League. Further, the Constitution provides that the official representative of the High School League is the superintendent unless he delegates that responsibility to some member of his staff.
 - (d) A few statements were made by the Secretary to clarify the meaning of the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund. The League should not call this insurance nor think of it as such for it can not qualify under the State insurance laws which are very stringent. It simply represents the throwing into a hat of 50 cents or 75 cents per athlete and then paying back from this fund to a school for an injured boy

an amount stated in advance in the "Schedule of Benefits." School men and coaches and athletes should acquaint themselves with the Schedule of Benefits printed on pages 10 and 11 of the 13th Handbook. The Board of Control pays every claim justified under this Schedule but has no authority for making payments for injuries not listed thereon. This Schedule of Benefits is not a mere guess but is taken from the experience of Wisconsin where they have gone far in developing this form of athletic protection.

3. Report of Treasurer.

L. A. White as Treasurer offered the following financial statement, referring first to the C. P. A. audit of August 1, 1937, which is printed on pages 80 to 83; following this with a statement of receipts and disbursements to date since August 1st.

It was moved by Superintendent Urness of Williston, seconded and carried that the report be approved.

4. Old Business.

- (a) The second and final reading of the proposed amendment to Eligibility Rule No. 10, changing the words "1 semester" to "2 semesters" in the first line of this rule, was received by a motion duly seconded that the proposed amendment be disapproved, the motion being carried. The amendment was thus discarded and becomes ineffectual.
- (b) The second amendment previously offered in several issues of the High School League letter proposed the elimination of Eligibility Rule No. 11, placing it with three other propositions in a new "High School League Recommended Standards of Eligibility" wherein the administration shall be left entirely to the individual school. The 4 standards are:—(1) Every athlete should be given a thorough physical examination before the opening of the athletic season; (2) Parental consent should be secured before the participation of any athlete; (3) Proof in advance should establish the birthdate of any 9th semester student before participation; (4) Every student participating in interscholastic contests must abstain from the use of tobacco and alcoholic beverages.

Moved by Severson, seconded by Rice that the foregoing recommended standards of eligibility be adopted. Motion unanimously carried.

- 5. Committee Reports.
 - (a) Report of Nominating Committee—Berg of Dickinson; Dahlen of Fairmount; Taylor of Sarles; Willennar of Sanborn; Nelson of Rugby—presented the names of Tighe, Fargo; Ottem, Langdon; Roberts, Elgin, as successors to Tighe, Robertson and Dominick, the latter having resigned last spring. Other nominations from the floor were were Gilliland of Devils Lake; Abrahamson of Mohall; and Paulson of Cooperstown.

Motion duly made and seconded and carried that each school vote for three candidates, and the two receiving the highest votes to have the three-year terms, the other candidate to take the two-year term left vacant by Dominick.

Moved, seconded and carried that nominations cease.

Moved, seconded and carried that each school cast its ballot at the desk in response to roll call.

A committee of tellers subsequently reported 57 ballots for Abrahamson, and 55 each for Tighe and Roberts. It was thereupon agreed that a flip of a coin should determine which of the two should have the short term, and by chance Mr. Tighe was so named.

- (b) Report of Six Man Football Committee. L. F. Rice, now a member of the National Six Man Football Committee, referred to the questionnaire which had been sent throughout the State, the results of which have already been proposed in the High School League News Letter, stating that they had had an influence upon the formation of the rules by the National Committee. He asked for further recommendations and suggestions. Mr. Rice represents the State in a Committee to select the National Honor Six Man Football Players. At the conclusion of his report he moved that the High School League adopt the National Federation Six Man Football Rules as given by Eppler; the motion was duly seconded and carried.
- 6. New Business.
 - (a) Concerning Class A Basketball set-up. Moved by Gould, seconded by Quam that for 1938 the League revert to the 1935 plan. (This plan provided that 8 specific teams should be named as Class A schools—Fargo, Jamestown, Valley City, Bismarck, Mandan, Minot, Devils Lake and Grand Forks, and that any other school of whatever size so desiring might challenge any one of the three nearest of these 8 schools—as the crow flys;* and any such challenging team, if defeated, may not revert to the Class B Tournament. (See footnote.)

Amendment offered by Urness and seconded that the basis for the selection of such 8 teams be the high school enrollment as given in the Inspector's Report for the school year 1937-1938; and that thereafter the 8 teams participating in the 1938 Tournament shall automatically be the 8 Class A teams.

Upon a vote the amendment carried; and upon vote the original motion likewise carried.

Duly moved, seconded and carried that the chair appoint a committee to study a variety of possible plans for handling these Tournaments, making the report at the next meeting of the High School League.

Motion by Hanna, and seconded, that a Committee be appointed to determine specifically what is meant by "enrollment" was subsequently withdrawn.

- IMPORTANT NOTE:—Subsequent discussion made it clear that by "enrollment" was meant not last year's High School Inspector's Report as was stated in the original motion, but the North Central Association Report of 1937, which this year is to be dated December 1st.
- (b) It was recommended by one of the school men that an investigation should be made to discover the possible advantages of having the 32 District set-up with 4 teams participating in the Regional Tournaments, to replace the present 16 District plan with only 2 teams in the Regional Tournaments.
- (c) Motion concerning State Track Meet. Moved by Schrum, seconded by Gould that the 1938 Spring State Track and Field Meet be held at Bismarck, and that hereafter the State Track and Field Meet shall alternate between the University and Bismarck. Motion carried.

Motion made by Lazenby, seconded by many and carried, proposes that in all District and State Track and Field Meets "school men" and not University or College students should be in charge of all events. Motion carried.

Amendment proposed by Payne concerning spring and pre-season football practice. Principal Payne proposed the first reading of the following amendment to the Constitution, Section I, Article I:—"No school shall be entitled to membership in the League which maintains organized football practice between January 1st and September 1st."

An amendment to Article 4, Section I, concerning Board of Control membership. The following constitutes the first reading of an amendment offered by Berg of Devils Lake:-"There shall be a Board of Control, hereinafter called the Board, consisting of five representatives chosen by the League for terms of three years each, new members to be seated January 1, following their election. On or before January 1 each year, the Board shall choose from its own members a president and vice-president, and shall select a full-time secretary-treasurer, not a member of the Board, for a term of one year, starting on July 1 following the meeting at which this amendment shall be ratified, and such selection of the executive secretarytreasurer to be thereafter made annually prior to the date of expiration of the term of the incumbent. The salary of the executive secretary-treasurer shall not exceed \$2400.00 annually.

Further amendment to the Constitution, Article 4, Section I, offered for its first reading by Haroldson of Edmore:—"To amend Article 4, Section I by adding to said section the following statement: Any authorized representative of an eligible school in good standing may be qualified for election to the Board, provided that no member shall be eligible to serve two consecutive terms.

Motion for adjournment prevailed.

Annual Spring Meeting of North Dakota High School League

Woodworth Hall, University of North Dakota Thursday, 4:15, April 14, 1938

B. C. Tighe, Presiding Officer.

Present:—Representatives of about twenty or twenty-five schools, total attendance approximately thirty-five.

- (a) Reference was made to the several Amendments before the League, but no action could be taken inasmuch as the constitutional minimum were not in attendance:
 - 1. Amendment proposed at the November meeting: Providing

for forfeiture of League membership by any school that maintains any organized football practice between January 1 and September 1.

- 2. Provides that newly elected Board members take their places January first following their election; and the Board select a full-time paid secretary not of their number, at a salary not to exceed \$2400.00.
- 3. Any authorized representative of any member school may be eligible to membership on the Board of Control, no member to serve two consecutive terms.
- 4. Amendments proposed by News Letter:—(a) Provides that an interval of at least a month is necessary between the proposal and the passing of an amendment. (b) Eligibility rule No. 2 be so changed that participating below the 9th grade does not count as "participation."

This latter amendment was referred to particularly by Mr. Tighe, who had previously written the amendment.

- (b) A rather wide discussion was held concerning the so-called Challenge Games; the possible methods of handling the A and B schools and of so listing them; the possibility of holding schools within their own class, perhaps with a final "play-off" between the two champion teams; a possible re-districting with 32 Districts and 4 Regionals such that 4 teams participated in each—all given evidence of considerable thinking on the part of many, and similarily given evidence that there is no ready-made plan that can overcome all difficulties.
 - (c) There was some discussion of the track plans for the spring.
- (d) A request was relayed by Mr. Zimmerman for an explanation of the method used by the Bismarck Association of Commerce for its share of the annual Tournament net proceeds, report having been made by the Secretary of the fact that the B Tournament had for the first time "paid out" in full, with a net balance approaching \$200.00 and the net proceeds accordingly good. The Secretary read Mr. Saxvik's recent explanation by the Secretary of the Bismarck Chamber of Commerce explaining their use of their Tournament moneys as follows: (a) For last year—(1) Rental Memorial Hall \$325.00; (2) Courtesy Ball \$63.58; (3) Tournament Programs \$50.49; (4) State Track Meet Banquet \$69.76; (5) State Track Meet medals and trophies \$77.98; (6) \$1.00 paid for each entrant in State Track Meet to apply on expenses \$71.00. Total \$657.81. (7) \$35.70 Missouri Area Boy Scout Camp Program; (8) \$43.45 expenses National Boy Scout Jamboree, all totaling \$736.96. (b) For this year, that unexpended balance will be added to this year's receipts (\$850.00) to carry on the same type of plans as listed above, plus the distribution of about \$2.25 per entrant in the State Track Meet instead of the one dollar.

Meetings of the Board of Control

A

Minot, North Dakota October 27-28, 1937

The Board of Control, consisting of Tighe, Fargo; Robertson, Jamestown; Zimmerman, Wahpeton; and White, Minot, held three meetings at which the following matters were discussed and action taken:

(a) Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, Claims No. — to — payment of which were endorsed by the Board in so far as they are completed and conform to the Schedule of Benefits, the Secretary-Treasurer being authorized to make payments in keeping with the Schedule of Benefits.

The Board considered the financial status of the A. A. B. Fund in its several parts and a little discussion was given concerning the appropriateness of the present fee system but no change was made or proposed.

- (b) The Board gave some consideration to the two amendments that had been proposed, discussing the advantages and disadvantages of each.
- (c) Upon consideration of the financial report of the C. P. A. audit and the current report, the Secretary-Treasurer was authorized to invest \$1500.00 in Federal Government Gold Certificates or Treasury Bonds.
- (d) A conference was held concerning the State A and B Tournaments, reference being made to Bismarck's invitation for the 1938 Tournament. No action was taken.

It was proposed and apparently agreed upon that the State A the State B Tournament, the Regional Tournaments and the District Tournament should be held on the 25th and 26th of March, with Tournaments respectively being held in appropriate weeks preceding, thus placing the District Tournaments on the 4th and 5th of March.

- (e) It was agreed that the plan of District Clinics as followed last year should be continued among those Districts so desiring with the allowance again of \$25.00 per District. Encouragement is to be given to the attendance at these Clinics of as many referees and officials, as well as coaches and school men, as possible.
- (f) A brief discussion about Tournament Basketballs led to no action.
- (g) It was proposed by a letter from the Federation office and from Mr. Bohnhoff that the League representative attending the

"Rules Committee meetings" is to be appointed for a series of not less than three years on the grounds that his value to the Rules Committee increases materially by such continued attendance. The Board, however, seemed to feel that while this might be a significant advantage to the Rules Committee, on the other hand the North Dakota League would profit more by changing representatives each year, proposing to permit more coaches and school men to gain this important contact.

- (h) Consideration of District Tournament Committees; to be the same as last year in so far as possible.
- (i) Secretary asks for suggestions about improvement of News Letters.
- (j) Reference to inadvertent playing by Minot of Hartl in a game with a Canadian independent team; subsequently it was found by the principal that the boy had not completed a third 9th grade credit in Junior High School. Board considers this an "inadvertent" rather than a flagrant violation, and requires the school to write the other school in explanation of the circumstances, offering the forfeiture of the game.

There were no formal meetings, hence no formal adjournment.

Gardner Hotel, Fargo, N. Dak., Dec. 27-28, 1937

Present: B. C. Tighe, M. B. Zimmerman, J. J. Roberts, Earl Abrahamson, L. A. White.

1. Organization:

MOTION by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts, that B. C. Tighe and L. A. White be re-elected President and Secretary-Treasurer respectively. Carried.

MOTION by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson, that Zimmerman be elected Vice-president. Carried.

2. Coach West appears before the Board and discusses:—Willingness of the University to help with any form of set-up for spring track—handling a District or a Regional Track Meet if such should be held, or the usual State Meet, or a State Meet in which records are established but not State Championship. He also referred to a possible Coaching School in the summer, inquiring about sponsorship from the H. S. League through the Board of Control. No specific actions or proposals of any kind were made.

He asks for a list of the coaches of the state.

3. G. W. Hanna appears before the Board and discusses the present Class A set-up, expressing the hope that a broader interpretation could be made, particularly on the challenge plans, and asking that a very definite and official statement of enrollments be given.

No action taken at the time.

4. Mayor Frederickson and Mr. . . Connolly, representing the Association of Commerce of Valley City, appear, inviting the Class B Tournament again to Valley City, proposing: (a) A guarantee of at least \$500.00 of gross receipts; (b) gymnasium with appropriate dressing and shower room service; (c) banquet as heretofore; and (d) broadcast. They referred to the probability that the new large armory would be available.

No action taken at the time.

- 5. Plans for State A Tournament.
- (a) The 8 largest in enrollment by N. C. A. report on December 1, high schools shall automatically be named as eligible for entrance into the State A Tournament. (This by League action.)
- (b) All others are to be considered eligible to enter the State B Tournament unless they shall elect to challenge some one of the 8 listed schools, the winner to enter the A Tournament.
- (c) Challenges shall be made by January 21st, through the Secretary of the League; with the privilege of withdrawal by January 31st. The general plan of handling challenges and making schedules shall be basically the same as last year.

MOTION involving these three essential points was made by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts. Carried.

Note:—At League expense representatives of the 4 schools left out of the 12 last year when eight were drawn by lot, met at Bismarck, where, with representatives of the Board of Control, each by lot drew a number to indicate whether he made the first challenge or second, etc. School drawing Lot No. 1 challenged his choice of the eight schools. School No. 2 had the privilege of challenging the same or another school. And so on. Each school in turn having had its first chance to challenge, each was then privileged to make a change or hold to its first challenge. Obviously if a team had challenged a seemingly weak team, but a strong challenger came in to challenge that same team, the first school might prefer to shift to another challenge. It was planned to go "around" a sufficient number of times until each of the 4 challengers should be satisfied; but by agreement decision was made not to make more than three rounds. This is the plan the Board has in mind for arrangement of "challenges,"

permitting, however, all schools, however, many, that want to challenge to be represented at this conference.

It was proposed that wherever one of the two towns to meet in a challenge game should have a neutral floor, by agreement in advance the game should be played there in order to help finance the game; or in the event the schools were unwilling so to do, they might play elsewhere, bearing their own expenses. No action was taken.

It was proposed that in the event two or more schools challenge the same school, a tournament should be declared; possibly not requiring any school to play more than once on a given day. No action taken.

The three point motion, however, was carried. And the representatives of the coaches expressed their approval of the plan.

6. Coaches represented.

By Board appointment, C. L. Robertson, Glenn Hanna and George Newgard of Minot, Bismarck and Hillsboro respectively, were present and held numerous conferences with the Board of Control.

Some time was spent in discussing officials, a total of 15 men being considered. The coaches subsequently struck off a few of these and from the remainder the Board made their selections.

7. Official Balls selected.

Conference with the coaches led to the conclusion that two types of balls be selected:—Laceless, and molded.

MOTION by Abrahamson seconded by Zimmerman that Colborn School Supply Company be asked to supply balls for Districts 11 to 16 and Regions F, G, H, and State B as last year; and Northern School Supply Company for Districts 1 to 10, with Regions A, B, C, D, E, and State A as last year, under the following conditions:

- (a) The company selling the balls to contact the District Chairmen of his several Districts, letting them have their choice of either the Dubow molded ball at \$10.55, or Rawlings or Goldsmith at \$10.70; this to be the same as last year except in such Districts as may desire to get along with fewer balls.
- (b) But for the State Tournaments six balls of each of the three kinds shall be at hand, available for use by the pairs of competing teams according to their preference, the League to pay for the six balls that are used.

Carried.

8. Tournament Dates set.

MOTION by Zimmerman, seconded by Roberts that the State A Tournament be held on March 24, 25, 26; State B Tournament March 17, 18, 19; Regionals either March 11 or 12; and District Tournaments February 25 and 26, or March 4 and 5, according to judgment of District Committees. Carried.

- 9. MOTION by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman that both State Tournaments be three-day tournaments. Carried.
- 10. MOTION by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that District Tournament Committees determine whether 8 or 9 players be allowed in the District Tournaments. Carried.
- 11. MOTION by Abrahamson, seconded by Zimmerman that nine players be allowed in Class B Regional as well as in both State Tournaments. Carried.
- 12. Discussion of the deficits of the two coaching schools—the one at Valley City under Rognstad and McLeaod showing a loss of about \$97.00 and the one at Minot showing a loss of about \$242.00. Action was tabled without motion, awaiting the development of a policy toward coaching schools.
- 13. Overlooking the action of the Board of Control at Minot, it was moved by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman, that approval be given to the establishment of Basketball Clinics in each District under the District Committees, at an expense not exceeding \$25.00 each. Carried.
- 14. MOTION by Zimmerman, seconded by Roberts that Ernie Gates of Jamestown be named to represent North Dakota at the National Federation Football Rules Committee meeting in Chicago, January 7 and 8. Carried.
 - 15. Consideration of State Tournament locations.
- (a) There being only one invitation for the State A Tournament, it was moved by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman that the invitation of Bismarck be accepted, under terms stated (same as last year), subject to any changes incident to the third day now in the tournament. Carried.
- (b) Consideration was given to the aforementioned invitation of Valley City for the B Tournament; a similar one from Dickinson guaranteeing \$850.00 gross receipts; and similar ones from Mandan and Minot without guarantee of receipts.

Motion by Abrahamson, seconded by Zimmerman that the Class B Tournament be held at Minot. Carried, Roberts voting No, favoring Dickinson.

- 16. MOTION by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman that H. L. Robertson of Minot be named as Tournament Manager for the B Tournament. Carried.
 - 17. Tournament officials selected.

Considering the list of officials as selected by the coaches, they having stricken six from the 15 discussed, the Board upon motion of Zimmerman, seconded by Roberts named Wyttenbach and Holzer for the State A Tournament; and upon motion by Roberts seconded

by Abrahamson named Crouse and Oudahl, both of St. Cloud, for the State B Tournament. Both motions carried.

It was agreed that Holgate of Aberdeen and Hunt of Miles City be considered as alternates for the A and B respectively.

18. Trophies selected.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that the following order be given Mr. Wimmer of the Fargo Jewelry Company:—18 No. 86 gold 1/10 filled and 18 s.s. basketball charms at \$2.45 per set; and 108 bronze balls at 50 cents each; all suitably engraved, this year including bronze balls, at 2 cents per letter. Carried.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson that the following order be given Josten Manufacturing Company of Owatonna, Minnesota:—10 gold buckles at \$2.75; 10 bronze buckles at \$1.75; 16 sets of District Trophies as of last year (adding 3rd and 4th places) at \$26.50. Carried.

- 19. Zimmerman to National Federation Meeting in Atlantic City.

 Moved by White, seconded by that Zimmerman be sent at League expense to the Atlantic City meeting of the National Federation held in connection with the mid-winter N. E. A. Carried.
- 20. In the temporary absence of the secretary it was moved and carried that the secretary be allotted \$100.00 for secretarial work in connection with preparation of a new Special Handbook setting forth the Constitution and By Laws and a series of interpretations of the Rules of Eligibility. Carried.
- 21. Hanna proposed the propriety of requiring physical examination of all athletes. No action taken. All Board members approve physical examinations but feel it can not well be required since many towns do not have medical service and the expense is probably prohibitive in many instances; further it was mentioned that in the new "Recommended Regulatory List of Requirements" this already has the backing of the League.
- 22. Discussion of drawing for places at the Tournaments. No action taken. Proposed this might be done for the A schools at the time of the Challenge Conference.
 - 23. Track and Field Plans; Dates.

Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by White, and carried that the following plan be adopted for the spring track and field meets:

- (a) The following were named as District Centers:—Fargo, Jamestown, Bismarck, Dickinson, Williston, Minot, Devils Lake, Grand Forks; and first and second place winners from these District Meets shall be eligible to entrance into the State Meet, dates to be May 21 for District, May 28 for State.
 - (b) Athletes who meet or exceed certain minimum time, distance

or height standards in events having at least four entries in Meets having at least six schools, shall likewise be eligible to entrance into the State Meet.

NOTE:—Last year's minimum standards are to be adapted downward somewhat by conference between B. C. Tighe and C. A. West.

24. Discussion.

Glenn Hanna proposed the possibility that the new track would not be ready in time for the State Meet although every effort will be made to have it ready.

- 25. The Board gave consideration to the report of the Secretary on A. A. B. Fund Claims, looking over briefly the list of claims for which records are complete and giving approval to the payment according to the Schedule of Benefit plans. Four records are available for each claim: (a) The official claim signed by the school representative testifying as to the time, place and nature of the accident; and signed by the attendant doctor or dentist testifying as to the naure of the injury, his treatment and his bill; (b) The check stub; (c) The record in the Treasurer's A. A. B. Fund record and cash record; (d) The signed voucher-receipt.
- 26. It was agreed that Sacred Heart Academy of Fargo could not be accepted into membership until such time as it might be officially listed on the State Classified H. S. list.
- 27. It was agreed that N. D. A. C. Model H. S. should pay the \$3.00 membership fee, there apparently having been a little question as to whether the fact that the school was small might make some difference in the amount of the fee. It was agreed that all parochial and Model and other high schools located in any given town should pay the same fee as the public high school in the town, as fees by Constitution are based upon the size of the town and not of the school.
- 28. Bowesmont delayed in paying membership; must pay the \$5.00 penalty in addition to the \$1.00 fee.
- 29. Geneseo, a first class graded school; not considered eligible to membership until it has established through the state department that its standing is equivalent to classified high school.
- 30. Fingal in November (29th) sent membership of \$1.00. Upon notification of the dollar penalty sent a second dollar, but not until December. Board agrees okay.
- 31. Fargo boy injured last year in football; could not get dental work done until this fall upon advice of dentist. Board okays his claim, even though the report was a hold over.
- 32. Additional claim of Mott boy correspondence through Superintendent Stubbins, okayed by Board up to amount of Schedule;

claim due to subsequent professional care after first claim had been paid.

- 33. By agreement 7th and 8th grade pupils are not considered eligible to A. A. B. Fund protection unless they play on the regular High School teams.
- 34. By agreement girls are not eligible to protection of the A. A. B. Fund on the grounds that there is no knowledge as yet of the hazards of girls' athletics, and further the League has previously ruled to "take no cognizance of girls' competitive athletics."
- 35. Principal Colton asks for dating back to previous day of membership in the A. A. B. Fund on basis of good intentions. A boy broke his nose in basketball game, and fees were paid the next morning. Request is denied on grounds that no Insurance company would try to operate on such a plan.

Minot, N. D., March 17-18-19, 1938

Present:—All members.

Time and place: At scattered intervals in the school office and at several luncheons and dinners.

Action: Knowing the Board would be meeting next week at the Bismarck Tournament, more time was spent in discussing problems than in seeking final action on them.

- (a) Reference was made to the Park River-Jamestown basketball challenge game wherein the Board of Control was asked to rule upon the play, each team having made alternately several baskets toward the closing of the game, the officials ruling that the final Park River basket did not count because time was up prior to the throw. The board had previously unanimously ruled, after considerable investigation and personal conferences among several members by the secretary, and by wire and phone, that there was no controversy among the officials, whose judgment must be sustained.
- (b) Reference was made to Williston's dissatisfaction with the Board for flipping a coin as a mode of decision between playing the Williston-Hannah game at Minot or at Devils Lake. The two schools had been unable to agree; the secretary made several suggestions even after being asked to have the Board determine the matter. Secretary suggested Kenmare, fairly accessible for each. Williston apparently could see nothing but Minot; while Hannah proposed Devils Lake, Mohall, or flip between Minot and Devils Lake. While Devils Lake is inaccessible to Williston, i.e., 10 hours away by slow train, Minot seemed nearly as inaccessible to Hannah, i.e., 90 miles drive and several hours by train. There being no alternative, the Board flipped the coin.

(c) State Track Meet.

Marmarth had inquired if the State Track Meet at Bismarck, planned for the 27th and 28th of May, should not be re-dated, since that is Commencement time in many schools. Board concludes little can be done, but believes many schools can place their commencement exercises a day or two ahead if necessary.

(d) Is Spring Football okay this Spring?

Since the first reading has been given to anti-spring football, the question was raised as to whether or not it is legal or sporting for a school this spring to continue spring football. The Board not only rules that it is quite all right, but there seemed to be no serious objection to spring football, anyway, among the members.

(e) Exchange Eligibility Sheets.

Considerable time was spent discussing eligibility rules, inasmuch as the Board is presenting a new Interpretations Book.

The Constitution provides that all schools must exchange these Eligibility Sheets prior to each game. And it was thought that the carelessness of some schools in this regard—either by not using them at all, or by carelessness in preparing them, is at the base of some difficulties which schools find every once in a while.

(f) Athletic Accident Benefit Fund.

The Board spent some time discussing possible ways of improving the A. A. B. Fund service. It seemed generally understood that following the general advancements made by the Wisconsin A. A. B. Fund may be good policy, as that organization has developed its plans and policies farther than any other. Reference was made to the fact that Wisconsin or some other state now permits the A. A. B. Fund to cover accidents made en route to games, when boys are on necessary athletic trips. Possibility of adding "concussions" to the Schedule of Benefits was considered, but no action was taken on any point as yet.

(g) Participation by 3rd class High Schools in C and G. S. League affairs was discussed, with the conclusion that the problem is so small, relatively, that it probably is handled best by each school working out its own solution. No other state undertakes to maintain two Leagues; 3rd class schools are eligible to memberships in both Leagues in N. D., by their own constitutions, and at times some schools find difficulties in entering county meets, some of which are dominated by the C and G. S. schools.

- (h) Should the B series carry through the consolation series to final 7th and 8th places? Since the manager had already planned it, there seemed no good reason for changing, though apparently some members thought the game was not of particular moment. The manager explained his reason for it was that it gave each team a chance to play three times, and felt that a number of schools appreciated the value of "tournament play," particularly those whose teams are young, and not very strong, but are counting on a strong season for next year.
 - (i) Finances from District and Regional Tournaments.

The Board reviewed the changes:—Formerly all net profits were given to the N. D. H. S. League and became part of the general funds, and in the days prior to the division into A and B classes there were some very significant profits. Then it was proposed that profits from either District involved in the Regional game should be used to defray losses of either team participating, and also help defray losses of the other District, if any, in the District Meet. And meanwhile it was determined that net proceeds should be credited to the District having such, up to \$300.00, the moneys to be kept and recorded with the League Funds, and any amounts beyond that sum should be League money. The next step was the complete autonomy of each District. If a given District makes a net profit, its money will be used to help defray the loss, if any, of its representative team in the Regional game, but not the expense of the other team, nor need any be used to defray the loss of the other District in its Tournament.

An uncertain question remains:—Suppose a Regional Tournament makes a net profit (an almost unheard condition), what shall be done? The Board concludes:—(a) The proceeds should be credited equally to each District involved, which in turn may (b) apply any necessary part upon any District deficit and (c) place the balance with the League Secretary for District credit.

- (j) Reference made to the Beulah-Killdeer Regional game held at Bismarck with a very poor attendance—\$28.40.
- (k) Discussion of payments of referee and umpire for the challenge games held last week at Bismarck.
 - (1) All State Teams.

The Board specified that in the A Tournament the All State Teams should be named by the four desk officials (timers and scorekeepers) and reviewed by the referee and umpire, who, in instance of a tie, are empowered to make final decisions; Supt. Abrahamson being appointed to care for all details.

- (m) Bills for "challenge games" reviewed. Two teams travelling 30 and 125 miles respectively place bills of \$73.00 and \$83.00 for their expenses. The Board asks for inquiry.
 - (n) Travel allowance determined for tournaments.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson that tournament managers (with special reference to A and B State Tournaments) be authorized to make travel allowance on the basis for each team of 40 cents per one way mile (i.e. a team travelling 100 miles to a tournament will receive \$40.00). Carried.

District and Regional Tournaments usually do not pay out well enough to permit this sum.

It was discussed also that in the event railroad rates are less than the proposed allowance, settlement shall be made on the basis of railroad rates.

(o) Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Roberts that Bismarck High School be permitted to play three important games during the season on the Memorial floor, without practices, and that neither Bismarck nor St. Leo's of Minot be permitted to play games or practise on the Memorial Hall floor or Minot gym floor, respectively, for a full month prior to the Tournament, if the State Tournaments should be placed in these two same halls again. Carried.

Mr. Saxvik explained that their three major games could not be held in their own hall because of attendance; and St. Leo's gym can not accommodate any crowds, so it has always played games on the public school floor, according to Father Hogan, who further explained that this year his team had scrimmaged once only on the floor, and had played its last six games away from town—a matter of six or seven weeks.

(p) Dates for 1939 Tournaments set.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman that the dates for the 1939 Tournaments in basketball be as follows:

State A Tournament, March 23, 24, 25; State B Tournament March 16, 17, 18, Regional games in preceding week, District games either March 3 and 4, or February 24 and 25.

Carried.

(q) Considerable time was devoted to the "dummy" prepared by the Secretary dealing with interpretations of eligibility rules, a new Special Handbook being in the process of preparation.

Bismarck, N. D., March 25, 26, 27, 1938

1. It was decided that the Official District Track and Field Meets should be held at the Eight Centers, with managers as follows:

Wahpeton, Earl Bute, manager (since the A. C. field is unusable.) Jamestown, E. J. Cassell, manager.

Dickinson, H. J. Weinbergen, manager.

Williston, J. H. Urness, manager.

Minot, W. D. Allen, manager.

Devils Lake, F. H. Gilliland, manager.

Grand Forks, C. A. West, manager.

The date had previously been set:-May 21.

Previously the Board had agreed that first and second winners of these meets qualify for the State Meet. Also, in any event having at least four entries in any meet having at least six schools entered, the athlete making a certain minimum standard of time, distance or height may also qualify, B. C. Tighe and C. A. West to re-adjust the standards of last year which had been found a little too severe.

2. District Basketball Committee appointed.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson, that all District Committee members be re-appointed now that they may plan their work for next year; and in the event any member may have withdrawn from the District by next year, the remaining two members are empowered to appoint the third member; and in the event two members withdraw, the remaining member shall appoint a second, and these two shall appoint the third, appointments to be ratified by the Board of Control. Carried.

3. District Track and Field Trophies purchased.

The Board, under motion by Zimmerman, promptly seconded and carried, directed the purchase of the following trophies for each of the eight District Meets:

- (a) Championship trophy: (b) Relay trophy; (c) First, second and third place individual fob-awards for each of the 13 events, the quotation price by Josten's being \$334.24, and for singles winner, doubles winners; and medalist and doubles players in golf.
 - 4. Brief discussion of finances of Districts No. 11 and 12.

The two teams entering the Regional Game each visit the University gym three times for practice and bring their bands with them, thus increasing their transportation and other expenses. The Board concludes the net profits of the Regional Game, after normal allowance of expenses for each team, should revert to the two Districts

to make up any deficit of the District Tournament teams; and in the event there were no such deficit, the amounts should then be sent to the League treasury for credit to the two Districts. The net profit does not belong to the two participating teams.

- 5. Secretary Wolseth of South Dakota confers with the Board of Control, explaining their Tournament set-up and discusses other problems. Shown a map of our state he can find no way of using their plan in our state. He expresses interest in the A. A. B. Fund which they hope to start; and in the new proposed Special Interpretation Handbook the League is to publish. His office handles matters of athletics only. He is a full time secretary, salary \$2100.00 this first year, plus \$900.00 (700.00) for traveling or office expenses. He conducts some Athletic Clinics through the state.
- 6. John Mach discusses the International Track Meets with the Board of Control. For three years a team of a dozen athletes has met at Minot, been transported to Estevan by the Truax-Traer Coal Company, and are entertained at the Canadian city in private homes, and returned by the Truax-Traer Company to Minot after the Field Day. Mr. Mach envisioned the day when a similar meet might be held at Winnipeg for boys from the eastern half of the state, and at Regina for Montana boys. It was even thought that perhaps an outstanding Meet might be developed at the Peace Garden, as plans are made for future years. The Board looks with favor on the general project, though there apparently is no action to be taken as yet.
 - 7. Tennis and Golf added to Track and Field Meets.

By motion of Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson, tennis and golf were added to the District Meets and to the State Meet. Carried. This does not make provision for those events, however, in any other than the 8 District Meets.

NOTE:—Each school is limited to three players in tennis and three in golf.

8. Track-and-Field Procedure.

Moved by Abrahamson and seconded by Roberts that all Qualifying Meets follow the order of events as provided in the collegiate rules of the N. I. A. A. Carried.

9. Standard discus to be used.

Reference was made to the new light-weight discus sponsored by the Federation, but since it is supposed that many schools may have the older weight discus on hand, it is better this year to continue its use.

10. For all Qualifying Track and Field Meets.

All schools, including Consolidated that are members of their own League shall make use of the proper entry blank, and also affirm the eligibility of their athletes on the Official Eligibility Exchange Blanks of the N. D. H. S. League.

11. Interpretation:—Shall correspondence work count toward eligibility? The Board interprets thus: Correspondence work may not count as one of the three subjects under Rule No. 5 for the current semester. However it may count under Rule No. 8 as one of the three completed in the preceding semester, when it has been completed within that given preceding semester. This specifically rules out work completed during the summer; i.e. there shall be neither earning advanced credit nor making up deficiencies through correspondence work during the summer vacation time. If work should be finished in April, it may be credited as having been completed by the end of the Spring semester, and with two other subjects would qualify a player for the fall. But if the work hangs over in correspondence work, as in any other work, until after school is out for the summer, it may not be credited. School work by correspondence completed in November or December for example may be credited to that given semester in which it is completed-provided it was not started or continued in the summer. The summer is not to be capitalized in any way for correspondence work, any more than it can be capitalized for any other kind of school work.

12. Interpretation on Rule No. 8:

A boy makes 90 in the first semester in a year subject and 65 (under passing) in the second semester, but the teacher grants a unit credit for the year on the basis of the year's work. What is the attitude of the League, since the boy did not "pass" at the end of the semester?

Answer:—It was agreed that the problem is one belonging to the school and not to the League. Since the school's records show the boy granted a year's credit in the subject, this must mean a credit for each of the two semesters and the League is not interested in the teacher's method of computation. If the credit is earned and recorded by the school for the semester, that suffices.

13. Amendment proposed:

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman that Article VII of the Constitution be amended in such manner to provide that the Constitution may not be amended by any proposal that has not been before the League for at least a month, the Secretary of the League to present this amendment through a News Letter. Carried.

NOTE:—At the present time the Constitution provides for its own amendment by giving notice "at a previous session or previous sitting of the same session"; presumably the withdrawal of the words "or at a previous sitting of the same session" would accomplish the desire of the Board to prevent any hasty action being taken at a single meeting-time of the League.

14. Who enters what District Track Meet?

A given school will enter whichever of the 8 Official District Meets that is nearest. No school is permitted to divide its teams and send some to one District Meet and others to another District Meet. A school may enter one District Meet only.

For tennis and golf a school may enter three contestants, i.e., the singles player need not play on the doubles team.

15. The Secretary was directed to write to the chairman of District No. — expressing of placing any tournament at Hettinger, where it is understood the outrageous rental fee of \$150.00 or more is charged. Practically every other District of the state finds it possible to place a tournament in a town that will provide the hall free; although in a few instances a few dollars will be made. But this situation at Hettinger is considered open to serious criticism and objection.

16. Board entertains Coaches Association at luncheon.

About 25 coaches, former coaches, Board of Control members and a few others met at the Grand Pacific luncheon room for a joint meeting.

President-elect Glenn Hanna of the Coaches Association presented the following items for the consideration of the Board of Control:

- (a) The Coaches Association appreciated having three of their number present at the mid-winter meeting of the Board of Control, and would be pleased to participate in a similar conference next year; in which event they would like to have George Newgard and Harley Robertson attend the conference again and Edward Bonhof act as a third member.
- (b) They proposed that the tournament ball should be (a) a molded ball and (b) should be a "channel ball." They expressed criticism of the Dubow ball again, including this year's new ball,

and called attention to the fact that none were used in either State Tournament and only two in the District Tournaments.

NOTE:—The Board members Tighe and Zimmerman explained in detail why the National Federation and the N. D. H. S. League as a Federation member had taken so friendly an interest in the Dubow ball.

(c) It was proposed that a somewhat more generous allowance might be given each team participating in the Tournament. One or two schools staying at the Prince Hotel found they could not get a 75-cent rate there, hence their 75-cent allowance left them short, and they felt they should have full expense allowance; also there was some feeling that \$1.50 per diem was a little short for food.

NOTE:—The Board subsequently raised the daily allowance of \$1.50 and 75 cents to \$2.50, including this year.

- (d) It was suggested that a special tournament ticket price for coaches who are members of the Coaches Association might stimulate interest in joining the Coaches Association.
- (e) It was proposed that the Class A and B Tournaments be reversed next year, with the Class A Tournament coming first, inasmuch as some B coaches felt their season was too short, and some A coaches felt their season was too long.
- (f) A football conference plan was described wherein eight schools in the eastern half of the state would play among themselves largely, and five within the western half play among themselves, at least to the extent of three games, within their respective halves, and a final play-off between the two strongest teams of the two halves would determine the State Champion of the Conference.
- 17. Bridgeford of Fargo suggests the advisability of having a mile relay, dropping the mile run from the 13 events.

Gates of Jamestown suggests the problem of hotel rates.

Robertson of Minot proposes that the expense allowance might be cared for by giving each team a distinct and equal amount, regardless of expenses, i.e., an additional \$25.00 because of incidental expenses that always arise.

Hanna of Bismarck proposes the advisability of having a Board of Control member attend each challenge game.

Mach of Williston explains the International Track and Field Meet at Estevan and its possibilities of development. Tighe of Fargo refers to hockey as an excellent sport, worthy of development.

- 18. It was concluded that the State Meet could be handled on a single day, Saturday, May 28; and similarly for the District Meets.
- 19. The Secretary is instructed to prepare an enrollment blank for the entrants in the District and State Meets.
 - 20. The Board of Control considers the Coaches' six points:
 - (a) The joint conference at midwinter seems advisable.
- (b) The question of whether Dubow may next year be making a channel-molded ball is raised. No action is taken.
- (c) Tournament per men expense allowance is raised from \$2.25 to \$2.50.
- (d) Questioning whether the principals' association or other organizations might in like manner seek a special tournament ticket price, the Board withheld any action, but expressed a desire to help the coaches build up their membership.
- (e) Concerning reversing the two State Tournaments, the Board members reminded themselves that:—(a) Originally the A tournament was held first, but was changed at the request of B schools that felt theirs was an anti-climax; (b) it was originally held a week earlier, but changed to the present date after the year in which so many district tournaments or regional games were thrown into the next week because of blizzards and snow blockades, and (c) the proposal would seem to put the Regional games at the time of the A Tournament. Hence, it seemed wise to take no action, at least as yet.
- (f) Reference was made to the football conference, which seems mostly a matter for the schools involved, rather than the League.
- 21. The Secretary was directed to write the Associations of Commerce of Bismarck and Minot in appreciation of their hospitality to the State Tournaments.
 - 22. State Trophies for Track purchased.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Zimmerman that trophies and medals for the State Meet at Bismarck be purchased as follows: Championship award; relay team award; and individual awards for each of the 13 events, and for singles and doubles in tennis, and medalist and doubles in golf; from Josten for \$135.60, plus \$8.00 for the special die; plus four cents per letter for engraving on the two major awards.

As shown elsewhere in the summary of the payments for A. A. B. Fund claims, football claims amounting to \$913.00 have been allowed so that the receipts from the 1198 members at 75 cents each have come within about \$20.00 of balancing these claims.

Summary, about 48 schools, and 429 boys, in membership. Claims amount to \$232.50 less a \$2.00 refund for a splint returned, hence this section of the A. A. B. Fund, despite its hazards came within about \$20.00 of paying out.

- (d) In the Physical Education Classes section, there again has been little interest. Minot being the single school in the district to send in 3 memberships at 25 cents each. There were no claims, hence this section shows a balance of 75 cents for the year. Many schools however, in a series of years do encounter embarrassments when unforseen and unavoidable accidents occur on the physical education floor, and it helps to be able to explain to parents that the responsibility can be met easily for 25 cents per pupil for the entire year. It would seem that this section merits a larger interest.
- (e) The Hockey Section has received memberships as follows:-Wahpeton, 14; Jamestown, 2; Fargo, 5; Valley City, 5; Jamestown, 1; Fargo, 2; Jamestown, 1—a total of 30 at 50 cents, with a single claim, No. 237 for "subpattellar bursitis" paid in the amount of \$3.00 to cover the X-ray, thus leaving a balance of some \$12.00.

(f) The Track and Field section made a start this year, with a single enrollment from a single school—Sharon sending 25 cents. It is not clear that the League had intended this sport to be in the list, but the fee was accepted in good part as it was paid in good part, and for the forthcoming year, the Board of Control has directed the inclusion of this growing sport as a section of the A. A. B. Fund.

In conclusion, it may be seen that the A. A. B. Fund has had in its membership in one form or another, approaching half of the League schools, with a total athletic membership of over two thousand. Financially it has met every possible claim, the Board of Control seeking to make payment in every case where the records were complete and within the range of the Schedule of Benefits, even though contrary to the proposal of the Fund, the reports may in a number of instances been very delayed. The first thousand dollars directed by the League to help start the Fund has never been called upon, and so far as book keeping is concerned still repose with the general fund, since the A. A. B. Fund as is shown by the audit has a neat balance of its own.

The boys of the state have been relatively fortunate. Only a few of the more serious types of injuries would "break down" the Fund financially; but it is a source of great satisfaction to all League members to know that there is a fund, created without any serious expense to any one, from which payments may be made to dentists and doctors and surgeons, so that athletes may have their broken arms and teeth, and sprained and dislocated knees and ankles given appropriate care.

As shown in the Black and Gold Handbook, the A. A. B. Fund plan is being somewhat extended for the new year, based upon the wide experience of the Wisconsin Association.

(2) Expenses of the Board of Control.

The Board of Control holds a series of meetings throughout the year. The first one is in the fall in connection with the N. D. E. A. and the last one in the spring in connection with the H. S. Conference but Board members are not allowed expense-money for those meetings, except perhaps in the rare event of some special lunch-time meeting as was the case the past fall, when \$4.92 was spent for this purpose. The major meeting of the year is in mid-winter usually at Fargo. This year's meeting included in its membership three representative coaches, and the two-day meeting cost \$101.50 for fare, rooms and meals for the five board members and the coaches. The challenge games-conferences held in Fargo to help arrange for the

method of scheduling, the challenge games, attended by some Board of Control members, and by representatives of the challenging schools, cost the League about \$80.00. Two luncheon conferences with special committees to consider the problem of ceding in District No. 8 and the Park River protest cost \$1.68 and \$1.84 respectively. The Board of Control sent M. B. Zimmerman to the meeting of the National Federation at Atlantic City in February, at a cost of \$134.10. Expenses for the five Board members at the Minot State Tournament amounted to \$105.62 including about \$7.00 expenses for Mr. Saxvik who was called into conference. The Board's expenses at the Bismarck Tournament were \$103.14, these figures as in the preceding item including a special luncheon with the Coaches Association, the Bismarck meeting being a large one. It is a matter of book-keeping only, but possibly the items for Challenge Games Conferences might with more appropriateness be charged against the Tournaments.

- (3) An item of \$1,500.00 is listed in the Treasurer's books as a new "Investment," having been placed with the U. S. Postal Department in Government Postal Bonds.
- (4) The bookkeeping record of "Membership" shows the membership list as reported under the Secretary's report, with the addition of 50 cents to cover exchange on checks, plus \$8.00 penalties for tardy membership payments, the latter listed under "Miscellaneous."
- (5) Other items recorded in the The Treasurer's books under Miscellaneous are these:—"Overpay," covering errors in moneys sent to the League treasurer amounting to about \$8.50, which moneys were returned as shown by the checks covering expenditures. The audit of last year cost \$25.00; Rule books and certain examination sheets totaled \$159.89.

Each month bank charges, usually based upon cashing of checks sent to the League treasurer amount to varying amounts, that for the year have totaled about \$25.00.

It has been found cheaper to send out the "big packages" by express, and advantageous too, since for each package, a receipt is given thus lowering the loss frequently encountered when such packages have been sent by mail. The express items for the year total about \$25.00.

Telegrams and telephones cost much:—i.e. between \$50.00 and \$60.00; but this is cheaper than the South Dakota plan for last year they took a referendum vote of all League members by telegraph, on

some problem connected with their State Tournament—costing well over \$500.00.

- (6) \$231.38 was spent for Athletic Clinics held in Districts No. 3, 6, 14, 7, 15, 16, 9, 2, 10, 4 and 8 having been authorized by the League two years ago and continued during the current year. It was proposed that up to \$25.00 per District, for each of the 16 Districts such Clinics might be held. Many of them are said to have been excellent.
- (7) The annual bill for printing is large. The annual handbook of last year cost \$308.65. The blanks used for the year cost about \$130.00. Envelopes of various kinds and stamps have cost \$139.38.
- (8) Office supplies—stencils, cleaning mimeograph, small incidentals amounted to \$11.04.

At times of special work, the Board has authorized the secretary to secure additional stenographic help, usually "up to \$50.00." About \$25.00 was spent this year. For the preparation of nearly 300 News Letters, usually containing from two to four pages, writing the copy, making the stencils, running the mimeograph, addressing the envelopes, filling the envelopes with the folded letters—a total of many hours work for each News Letter, for this the "White family" is requisitioned by the League secretary; for which no payments are made.

- (9) Other incidentals include the National Federation dues of \$7.50; the Treasurer's Bond, \$25.00; and this year the 1,000 copies of the Special Black and Gold Handbook, prepared at a cost of \$423.45 for printing and \$100.00 for editing, by order of the Board of Control. While the Secretary spent many hours gathering and preparing the materials all Board members "read the dummy" each having an individual copy, and several conferences were held concerning the book and its contents.
- (10) The tournaments are always somewhat involved in their financial reports, but complete details are given elsewhere for each one. The Tournament Committees received the \$2.00 entry fees from the participating schools, and use these moneys for their expenses. If they run short, it is too bad. If there is a balance, they turn it over to the manager of the District Tournament who makes an accounting of it. Each District has this year turned in to the Treasurer \$50.40 to pay for the set of four trophies and the two balls; however, several Districts used only two trophies and some used only one

ball, hence their payments were correspondingly less. District No. 14 made a net profit, hence is credited in the League's books with \$15.40 which may be drawn upon by that District in the event they should run behind in their District Tournament in some subsequent year. Similarly District No. 12 has a credit balance of \$32.20; District No. 11 a balance of \$35.75; District No. 13 a credit balance of \$45.56 and District No. 2, a credit balance of \$13.86.

As elsewhere shown the State B Tournament netted the League \$171.15 and the State A Tournament, \$2307.51, in each instance after all expenses, including balls and trophies had been paid. An honorarium of \$50.00 is given the manager of the B Tournament each year and \$100.00 to the manager of the A Tournament.

For the Challenge games, reports are as follows:—The Devils Lake double header took in \$189.00 after certain local expenses were paid, and Park River was paid \$66.50 for expenses. Jamestown, \$72.50; Williston, \$150.44 and Hannah, \$44.34, while the officials were paid \$60.00 The double header at Bismarck turned in a net balance of \$221.93 after all expenses were paid. The game at Jamestown between Dickinson and Devils Lake turned to the League \$3.05 after local expenses were paid, and the League paid \$123.00 for Dickinson's expenses and \$70.50 for Devils Lake's expenses.

Basketball trophies and awards this year cost \$135.87 from Fargo Jewelry Co.; plus an engraving item of \$3.84 left over from the B Tournament of last year; and \$693.20 to Jostens In addition to these awards, for the first time, The Board of Control purchased significant awards for the eight Track and Field District Meets; and for the State Meet at Bismarck, itemized statements not yet being at hand at this writing.

For tournament balls, the League paid Colborn School Supply Company \$241.91 and Northern School Supply Company, \$364.05.

The preceding report is given as an "overview' of the year's finances, the detailed complete report of the C P A Audit follows:

All vouchers, checks and bills have been carefully checked and verified and I wish to add, that the records are in a very fine condition.

For claims No. 204 and 227, I have been unable to find any vouchers, but have found some correspondence.

The minutes show that at the fall election, Earl Abrahamson and J. J. Roberts have been elected to the places of C. L. Robertson and L. L. Dominick while B. C. Tighe was reelected.

135 claims have been presented and 26 have been dis-allowed.

It is evident from the records that the "Basketball Fund" has hardly been touched while both the "6 men" and "11 men" Football Funds are overdrawn. It almost looks as it might be necessary to tax members of the Football classes at a higher rate.

Cavalier came next with 6 points gaining 3 each in the pole vault and the $100\ \mathrm{yard}$ dash.

Linton made $5\frac{1}{2}$ points, scoring 3 in the 120 yard hurdles, one each in the 220 yard hurdles and discus throw, and $\frac{1}{2}$ point in the high jump.

Williston totaled 5 points, with 3 in the 880 yard run and 2 in the mile run.

Kenmare made 4 points, $2\frac{1}{2}$ in the high jump and $1\frac{1}{2}$ in the broad jump.
