

The League Calendar

NOTE PARTICULARLY:-

ALL MEMBERSHIPS EXPIRE September 30th, and are renewed only by specific payment of dues.

The fee is \$1,00 for towns under 1,000 population; \$2.00 for towns between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for towns over 2,000.

BUT IF dues are not paid by November 1st they shall be doubled and if not paid by December 1st, they shall be increased to \$5.00. Further, no memberships shall be accepted after January first.

AND:—Dues cannot be accepted if your OFFICIAL ELIGIBILITY BLANKS HAVE NOT BEEN FILED WITH THE SECRETARY.

What To Do In

SEPTEMBER:

- (a) Pay the dues at once; secure all League blanks thereby, and athletic books.
- (b) Join the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, to protect your school, and your boys, \$1.00 for football, 75c for six man football
- (c) Have a physical examination of all boys preparing to participate in athletics.
- (d) Secure written parental permission for all boys who are to participate in athletics.
- (e) Begin at once to check player's eligibility:—Age, semesters of attendance, seasons of attendance, and scholastic records the past semester particularly. Watch 9th semester athletes' ages!
- (f) Get an early start on the SIX MAN FOOTBALL.
- (g) Give special attention to the tobacco and beer rule, right from the start.
- (h) Why not a special "For-the-good-of-athletics" assembly, early in September.
- (i) See News Letters for the Football Tournaments Plans.

OCTOBER:

- (a) Hurry and pay the membership fee. After October 31 the membership fee is doubled.
- (b) What of the Six Man Football Championship?
- (c) A good time now to think about the Accident Benefit Fund, for Basketball at 50c per boy.

NOVEMBER:

- (a) At N. D. E. A. time, the Annual Fall meeting is the big meeting of the League year. This is the time to bring in all sorts of well thought out plans and suggestions. Send coaches to the athletic clinic.
- (b) Start your plans from the first, for the never-varying custom in all contests, and particularly in basketball, of (a) exchanging Eligibility Sheets; and (b) Contracts.
- (c) If your dues are still unpaid, HURRY UP, for after the last day of November dues are increased to five dollars. Too bad, too.

DECEMBER:

- (a) If your membership fee has not been paid before the end of this month, you are out of the League.
- (b) Class B schools better send in their Tournament Fees now for it has to be doubled after the 15th of next month. You might forget it.
 - (c) With basketball right on us, why not check again every possible representative of your school on all eligibility points; complete the physical examinations; really secure parental consent; protect the boys with the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund; hold a special assembly to talk about all eligibility rules; with special bearing on the tobacco and beer rule Watch all ninth semester boys for ages.
 - (d) Yes, the League has adopted a Committee Report, urging against interscholastic competitive contests for girls. It is not prohibited however, by our League as has been done in some states.

JANUARY:

- (a) Too late to join the League now.
- (b) Pay up your Tournament Entry Fees of \$2.00 (Class B Schools) before the 15th, and save the \$2.00 penalty. Send it to your District Tournament Chairman.
- (c) Did you actually complete—the physical examination; parental permission for participation; athletic assembly; membership in A. A. Benefit Fund—and other good resolutions—or are you merely paving some more (with good intentions).

FEBRUARY:

- (a) Tournament entry fee is doubled now (\$4.00), but still can be received by the 15th. Hurry it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.
- (b) Avoid the end-of-the-season embarrassment to your school and team, by making certain before the Tournaments are any nearer, that there is no possible eligibility question about any of your contestants.
- (c) Why not write to your Tournament Committee, giving suggestions for tournaments.

MARCH:

- (a) The Tournament month. News Letters will give specific dates.
- (b) With the closing of the basketball season you are preparing your data for the Official Eligibility Report, whereon you list the record of absolutely every lad who has represented your school in any inter-scholastic basketball contest, however unimportant, on any team.

APRIL:

- (a) Track time begins. The League is making a strenuous effort to develop track and field work. Get your lads in as many meets as you can. It is a fine spring sport.
- (b) Unless otherwise notified, any Track Meet large enough to have 6 League schools entered, if an open meet, automatically becomes an Official Qualifying Meet for any subsequent State Meet. Qualifying events must have at least 3 contestants; and 1st and 2nd place winners are eligible for the "State" Meets.
- (c) Have you considered the Athletic Accident Fund protection for your track and field boys? It has frequently saved some school embarrassment, and helped lads pay injury bills.

MAY:

(a) Classified High Schools, whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or whatever size in enrollment must be League members to participate in any kind of Inter-scholastic contest, — athletic, music, declamation, etc.—whether held in a County Festival, or a State University or elsewhere. Lines are to be more rigidly drawn. than heretofore. League Eligibility Rules apply.

Summary of Significant Dates

September 30th. All memberships expire at midnight.

October 31st. Memberships paid after this date cost \$2.50 additional.

November 30th. Memberships paid after this date cost \$5.00 additional.

December 31st. No membership can be received after this date.

Dead line! Tournament Entry Fee of \$2.00 is due. Pay it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.

January 15th. Tournament Entry Fee doubled to \$4.00 after this date.

February 15th. Tournament Fee not accepted after this date. Dead line!

Scattered Items of Interest

Concerning the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund

Each year more states are starting their experiments with this form of protection for high school athletes. South Dakota hopes to start next year, Montana started this past school year. Our state is now one of the 'pioneers.'

For next year each school is asked to get the preliminary report of any accident within 12 days; and the completed report within 60 days. The Board of Control has this year been asked to pass upon accidents that occurred two years ago!

Football and Six Man Football do not pay their own way. Income about \$1,600; outgo about \$2,000.00. Fees are raised for Football from 75c to \$1.00; and for Six Man Football from 50c to 75c.

Rule Books

The new football rule books, contain a supplement for the six man game. These books are presented to all schools by the H. S. League as are also the new basketball rule books and the "play situations."

Challenge Games

Again the challenge games have been tried. There may be no better alternative, but they have proven only relatively satisfactory—especially as far as finances are concerned.

Football Tournaments for State Honors

Plans are well under way for the establishing of State Championships in Six Man Football, and in Eleven Man Football for the "East-West Conference" (a group of a dozen larger towns) and in Eleven Man Football for the other schools.

Basketball Rule Changes

The new Federation Rule Book, on the inside cover points out the significant changes in rules. One has to do with the placing of the basketball backboard four feet in from the end line, altho any distance under four feet but over two feet is still official for gymnasiums that cannot provide the four foot space.

Another change has to do with the re-action of basketballs. Balls are supposed to re-act (re-bound) not less than 49 inches nor more than 54 inches when dropped to solid wood floor from a height of six feet measured to the height of the ball. Some of the new balls are criticized as being "too fast," i. e. rebound too much, and hence are hard to handle on the backboard; and there is said to be a considerable difference in the fumbling also. Certain investigations, and reports from one or more state tournaments make it appear that a tolerance of about 52 inches (rebound) is better than either the slower (49 inches) or the faster (54 inches).

"Modified backboards" are being given much thought and attention and experiments seem to indicate that there are a number of definite advantages. The proposed new backboard instead of being a rectangle, would be a fan-shaped board approximately 54" across and either 27" or 32" from the center of the basket. None are as yet officially adopted however.

Questionnaire on Sports

The secretary made an inquiry into the number of schools and school boys taking part in the several sports in an inter-scholastic way and in an intra-mural way. Of course these inquiry-sheets are a nuisance and come at a busy time, so there was far from a 100%reply from our school men. But in so far as replies were made the inquiry shows data as follows:-1,207 high school boys and 47 grade school boys in 42 high schools play inter-scholastic football; while 234 high school boys and 197 grade school boys in 11 high schools play intra-mural football. In the Six Man game, 35 high schools report that 446 of their high school boys and 11 grade school boys, play the game as an inter-school contest and 16 schools report that 145 high school boys and 113 grade school boys play it as an intramural game. In Basketball 1,627 high school lads play inter-school games in the 108 schools reporting, and 156 grade boys; while in 77 high schools 2,034 high school and 432 grade boys play intra-mural games.

Only 3 schools report on their inter-scholastic hockey saying that 63 high school boys and 7 grade boys play the game; while 2 schools indicate that 48 high school boys and 52 grade boys play it as a school game.

In track and field work, 79 schools report and say that 723 high school boys and 291 grade boys participate in inter-scholastic meets, and in 36 schools, 727 high school boys and 419 take part at home.

Tennis and golf are played in 10 schools according to reports with 53 high school boys and no grade school boys participating with other schools, while 6 schools indicate that 50 high school boys and 6 grade boys play at home.

While these data might be sufficient as a basis for a master's thesis or even a doctorate, they are too incomplete to represent more than a cross section of our high schools. The main conclusions that can be drawn are:— (a) school men do not like to make statistical reports of any kind; (b) school men do not keep accurate data on athletic participation; and (c) literally thousands of North Dakota boys are given almost countless hours of supervised play and competition in a wide program of sports.

Oklahoma Supreme Court Ruling

The right and power of an Athletic Association to declare a lad ineligible to participation in high school contests when he is a bona fide high school student on the grounds he has become ineligible or failed to meet some association standard, is sometimes called into question. It has been questioned in our own state. A recent case was in Oklahoma where parents brought suit to prevent the enforcement of a rule. But the Supreme Court upheld the State Association completely.

Good Sportsmen:-Consider the Hammer

Calcium Chloride to End Dust on Athletic Fields

The June issue of the Athletic Journal tells of the growing use of calcium chloride on tennis courts, on baseball diamonds, on jumping take-offs and on non-turfed football fields. Quotations:— "it completely ends dust'; "it makes the surfact firm at the same time retaining its resilency and natural attractiveness; keep weeds down"; "is clean, odorless, non-staining, does not track"; "can be used on any surface—gravel, cinder, earth, shale, blue stone"; "two pounds per square yard will penetrate from three to five inches and remain an indefinite period"; "can be spread with a shovel just as it comes from the bag"; cost:—2 to 4 cents per square yard"; "famous Forest Hills, Long Island clay tennis courts where many national championships are decided, have been treated with calcium chloride for several years."

Report of the League Secretary

The League membership year is from September 30th to September 30th. It is the school itself that is the member—not the ceach or the principal or the superintendent. The superintendent is, by League Constitution the official representative of the school unless some other faculty member is officially and specifically so named by the superintendent. There is evidence that all coaches in the state are not aware of this fact. The League thru its officers addresses its acitivities directly to the superintendent. While the Board of Control welcomes correspondence from any one interested in contest or athletic problems, it is the superintendent of the school who is the normal representative. It is the rare superintendent who does not give his coach large leeway in all athletic matters as well as in League matters.

While League memberships may be renewed up to and including the last day of December, there is a rather definite line of correlation between the date of the renewal of membership and the school's interest in the League. Long time members and ardent supporters of the League rarely let September go far without caring for their renewal fees.

The problem of delayed membership not infrequently has its source in a local debate as to whether to enter the C. and G. S. League or the N. D. H. S. League, or whether to enter both, or whether to enter neither. The N. D. H. S. League has authorized no effort toward securing membership from the consolidated school, but does authorize the Board of Control to take into annual membership a year at a time, such consolidated high school as may meet the standards of classified high schools. However the C and G. S. League has found itself at times with a number of smaller 3rd class high schools seeking admission in parts of the state where there are more C and G. S. schools than H. S. League schools. The official N. D. H. S. League answer is to the effect that all classified high schools must join their own N. D. H. S. League if they would hold any competitive relations with other classified high schools, but they are at liberty to join the C and G. S. League also if they so desire, provided only that no school may participate in more than one series of District contests.

Report of League Treasurer

Elsewhere will be found the official audit certifying to the accuracy of the N. D. H. S. League financial records, the audit having been made by a certified public accountant.

But it is believed that a running account in general figures, of the several sources of income, and the ways in which the moneys are spent will prove of perhaps even more interest.

Every dollar received is receipted and the receipt sent to the payer, the duplicate being kept for audit in the semi-permanent receipt books. An entry is then made in the ledger with the receipt number, and then is also entered in the appropriate account,—so that a triple check can be made—against the receipt, the ledger and the account.

In like manner every dollar paid out has back of it a signed voucher from the payee, which is numbered with the number of the check which pays the item; and again an entry is made in the ledger and in the appropriate distributed account, thus giving a triple check again.

The treasurer's books are balanced each month against the bank statement. And then in June of each year, prior to the preparation of the manuscript for the annual Yearbook, are audited by the C. P. A.

Concerning Receipts

The receipts for the year just closing have been large—but so are the expenditures.

The books show about \$9,400.00 in receipts. But of this amount \$2,100.00 represented the cashing of an equal amount of Treasury Bonds and re-investment in non-matured U. S. "Baby Bonds"; and \$750.00 represented the actual transfer from the Savings account when the general treasury ran low due to heavy demands from the A. A. B. Fund after the football season.

The A. A. B. Fund really did a "big business" taking in over \$1,-600.00, but since it paid out nearly \$2,100.00, there was a net loss.

The District and Regional tournaments turned back over \$700.00 but this was for payments of balls and trophies. The Challenge Games turned in nearly \$950.00—but the expenses paid from this and other League funds totaled about \$1,225.00, hence there was a considerable loss.

The State B Tournament had a net of a little over \$15.00, but this was turned back to the Junior Chamber of Commerce in keeping with the contract arrangements the money to apply on their expenses—banquet, towel service, hall rental and the like.

The State A Tournament again turns in a nice sum of money—\$2,645.25, of which about \$225.00 is for balls and trophies, and the remainder goes to the support of the League.

Interest on the bonds amounts to about \$100.00, the "Baby Bonds" being such that instead of paying interest they automatically increase in value at maturity time.

The books show other items to be \$289.00 for membership fees; eighty cents for exchange paid by some conscientious school men; \$10.00 for penalties for late payment of membership fees; \$4.53 for over-payments, made in error; and \$30.50 for re-deposits of checks that for one reason or another didn't stay put the first time they were deposited.

In other words, the only real sources of income were the membership fees, the interest and the State A Tournament—the three items amounting to about \$2,600.00; the other items being in the nature of refunds or transfers.

Expenditures

Expenditures at the time this manuscript is being prepared, prior to the audit, will total upwards of \$9,500.00 in contrast to the receipts of about \$9,400.00 which latter amount included the cashing of \$750.00 from savings account into the general account. In other words we have spent considerably more than we have received.

An analysis of the expenditures will show how this goes:-

The challenge games showed a net loss of something beyond \$275.00. The awards and trophies for the track meets came directly from League funds, in the amount of about \$400.00, for there is no return for these, as there is for the basketball trophies. The A. A. B. Fund shows a net loss for the year of about \$450.00. The manager of the State A Tournament is given an honorarium of \$100.00 for his services, and the manager of the State B Tournament is given \$50.00; and the League secretary-treasurer is this year paid \$566.64 for his work.

Board of Control expenses total \$525.50. For Athletic Clinics \$99.35 was spent. For wires and phones \$60.00; for express about \$20.00; for office supplies, postage and the like about \$90.00; for bank charges about \$35.00; for office labor about \$38.00. The printing bill for the year including office blanks, final payment on the special

Handbook and the 1938 Yearbook and partial payment on the 1939 Yearbook; rulebooks for football and basketball ect.—totaIs about \$835.00. Other incidental expenses of about \$125.00 include \$25.00 for the annual audit; \$7.50 for the Federation dues; about \$35.00 charged off on checks before re-depositing; \$25.00 for the treasurer's bond; \$3.30 for safety deposit box and some refunds to Districts that had a balance on hand from previous years.

In the A. A. B. Fund receipts were about as follows: Football memberships about \$1,000.00, with payments on claims \$1,450.00. Basketball memberships \$284.50, with claims of \$165.00. Six Man Football memberships about \$300.00 with claims of about \$425.00. Hockey memberships \$14.50 and claims \$15.00. Physical Education classes paid in \$15.25, with no claims, while \$1.00 was paid for track membership with no claims.

Feeling that the A. A. B. Fund should be self supporting or nearly so, the Board of Control has authorized the raising of the football and the six man football membership fees from 75c and 50c to \$1.00 and 75c respectively since it is these two parts of the A. A. B. Fund that make the heavy drain. However the previous balance on hand as shown in the 1938 Yearbook just about balance the net loss for the year and so the \$1,000.00 allotted to the A. A. B. Fund by the League is still practically intact—as it should be for the "rainy day" that might follow some disastrous accident. In this connection reference might well be made to a court case probably to arise in Minnesota where the Board of Control of the State A. A. have been directed to pay all claims, whether listed in the Schedule of Benefits or not. This, if supported will automatically end the A. A. B. Fund, and would almost if not quite spell ruin and 'finis' to the A. A. B. Funds now under experiment operation in a number of states. movement needs encouragement, and not harrassing. This is probably one of the finest things the N. D. H. S.| League is doing. Scores of boys have been given adequate care and treatment that perhaps might otherwise have been denied them.

In reality it is the State tournament at Bismarck that sustains the N. D. H. S. League. Before the schools were separated into A and B classes, the District tournaments made a nice profit for the League, but now they regularly run at a loss altho District No. 2 made a net gain of \$13.69 (to be kept in the League treasury, subject to call). District No. 4 with a previous credit of \$15.61 called for \$15.40 of it this year because of a deficit. Similarly Districts No. 11 and 12 called for their previous balances respectively of \$32.15 and \$32.20.

The Challenge games; Red faces; Grey hairs! And yet it is difficult to invent better substitutes. The Minot-Osnabrock game that

had to be played apart from the others to see which should play Valley City took in \$33.50, while the four games played at Bismarck took in over \$909.00, due in large measure to the enthusiastic interest in the Mandan-Bismarck game. Without that, the income would doubtless have decreased materially. The expenses were high:—\$45.74 for the preliminary meeting; then \$144.20 for Williston; \$171.00 for Hannah; Osnabrock \$345.50; Dickinson \$74.50; officials about \$200.00; Devils Lake \$138.85; Valley City \$82.50; Minot \$58.31—in addition to some expenses paid at Bismarck.

The \$100 spent for Athletic Clinics this year is considered a good investment by the men who were close to them. They were available for each of the 16 Districts, but less than half of the Districts called for them. Perhaps in coming years, such Clinics can be held earlier in the year, so that training in football, six man football, basketball and track can all be included. Or perhaps, a spring time clinic might be well.

An analysis of the expenditures of the Board of Control might forestall any possible idea of extravagance on their part. The Board has regularly held a midwinter meeting where they work at top speed on problems of administration of League affairs, interpretations and the like. In the last two years in addition to their own membership they have paid the expenses of three coaches to confer with them; and at times have called in fellow superintendents or one or more men from the University to discuss problems of common interest. In addition to this annual meeting there are regularly two other annual meetings-at the time of the State A tournament and again at the B tournament. There is always considerable work to do, and their presence at the tournaments has at times cleared up some distressing entanglements. At each tournament this year, large luncheon meetings were held attended by the coaches as they conferred with the Board of Control-meetings that have been found quite invaluable. Other expenditures have had to do with some special committees—as for instance a luncheon meeting at Minot when there was an intricate problem of basketball ruling to be settled between two towns. Then this year again Mr. Tighe was sent to a National Federation meeting at Chicago; and Mr. Abrahamson was sent to a National Federation session at the Cleveland N. E. A. For a number of years, some coach has been sent to the national rules committee meeting in Chicago, tho this has been at Federation expense.

The printing bill for the year looks large—but it will be remembered that thousands and thousands of blanks are used thruout the state—eligibility exchange sheets for use during the year, and others for official records at the close of the year, and uniform contracts, and A. A. B. Fund record blanks and cards; then the rule

books and 'play situations'; then the annual Yearbook usually costs from \$275 to \$310; and last year the Special Handbook of Interpretations was published.

Fifty eight dollars for telephones and wires may seem a considerable item—but when it is remembered that South Dakota took a referendum year before last over their state basketball tournament at a cost of five or six hundred dollars, our annual bill does not seem so high.

Office supplies run upwards of \$100 in expense—but this buys a lot of stamps and envelopes and mimeograph papers and like materials. Each News Letter takes about a ream of paper-and about 8 hours of work. The mailing list includes not only each member school but several business firms the coaches of the state institutions and several others. There has been some call for more than one copy of the News Letter as some coaches have felt their superintendents didn't always contact them. The League does not own an addressograph and the hand-labor of the several thousand envelopes is a rather significant item. Possibly some day a used addressograph may be purchased at an appropriate second hand price. The Board has authorized the expenditure of \$100.00 for office help for next year; and has regularly suggested the use of such part of \$50.00 as may be needed. This year about \$38.00 has been spent. The members of the secretary's household have made it possible to get much of the work done more promptly than the secretary alone could have done it.

The secretary's salary of \$500.00, has been changed for the coming year, as of March, at \$700.00, largely in consideration of the fact that the A. A. B. Fund has nearly doubled the work of the secretary's office. This change was made after a nation wide survey of the work of other similar offices and salaries paid. In a number of other states having large memberships-Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, and so on full time secretaries are employed these associations operating on a very large scale, with abundant budgets that include from one to several office assistants. In a few states the office is part of the State Department of Education with a tie-up with the health work. Several smaller states have tried a full time secretary—as for instance South Dakota, which two years ago was paying \$2,200.00 in salary plus \$600 for office assistance; Oregon paying \$2,400 and \$700 for office assistance. But it remains to be seen whether these smaller associations can finance so generous a program and whether the additional work done by full time secretaries can in a commensurate way increase the income of the organization. North Dakota is the only state operating an A. A. B. Fund, printed annual report regular News Letters and other regular services on so small a budget. Montana, the nearest approach has just instituted an A. A. B. Fund, and allot \$500 as an experimental salary for the first year for the secretary and \$360 for office assistance, as they measure the amount of labor involved; but they do not prepare a yearbook, as yet.

No serious attempt has been made in this running account of income and outgo to provide an accurate balance. League members are referred to the official audit for the accurate financial report.

Meetings of Board of Control

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N. D. E. A. Time, Fargo, October 25 to 28

The Board of Control members met incidentally and informally every once in a while during the convention and discussed matters of the League concern.

One dinner meeting was held, with Roberts, Abrahamson and White present, the time being devoted to a discussion of a series of League problems without action being taken. However the meeting paved the way for a formal meeting the following night.

Friday night, 11:30 p. m. to 1:00 a. m. The Parlor, Gardner Hotel there being Tighe, Roberts, Abrahamson and White present.

Motion concerning A. A. B. Fund, there being a problem when a school lad pays his A. A. B. Fund money to the school, which in turn delays forwarding it to the League office, awaiting several other such membership fees—and meanwhile the lad becomes injured.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that the membership of any boy in the A. A. B. Fund be dated from the time his NAME has been forwarded to the League office, with the understanding that the FEE will follow within at least ten days. Carried

Moved by Roberts, seconded by White that the secretary be instructed to prepare and distribute ample sized placards for use in schools and gymnasiums, explaining in full the schedule of Benefits, and the essential points about the A. A. B. Fund. Carried.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that the secretary-treasurer be authorized to pay those claims on the A. A. B. Fund that conform to the Schedule of Benefits and requirements of the Fund. Carried. (Note:—One or two members of the Board looked over the claims to acquaint themselves with them in a general way, and the secretary discussed some of the claims with Board members.

Mid-winter Board Meeting. It was agreed that the Board of Control should meet at Fargo on Thursday and Friday, January 5th and 6th. The secretary was also authorized to confer with the Coaches Association inviting their committee of three to meet with the Board at League expense.

Official Basketball. No official basketball was named, nor was any motion made, but it was agreed that the "channel type" ball would be the desirable ball for the year, apparently there being two main products of this type—the Lasbilt and the Wintark, both patents being used by two or more sporting goods companies.

Reference was made to the inivitations from Bismarck and Minot for the A and B Tournaments respectively, but no action was taken. Note:—The secretary had previously written all other towns that had ever invited either tournament, suggesting that if they were considering the issuance of an invitation it be without delay. No others received to date.

Other matters discussed:—(a) Should the A. A. B. Fund cover transportation accidents? Later it was discovered that while last year in the same discussion no action was taken as shown by the minutes, evidently an agreement had been reached, as the statement is covered in the black and gold Handbook on page 54, and boys of grades 7 and 8 are also to be covered.

- (b) C. C. boys stop in the spring to enter camp, but continue their same school work in the summer, in C. C. C. camp, but working more slowly cannot complete by June. If they do complete their work before school opens in the fall, will this affect their elegibility? No decision made.
- (c) A boy from —— is injured in the first few minutes of play in his first year of participation 5 years ago; may he be considered eligible now in this his 5th year, since he really did participate so little that first year? Answer:—It was agreed that any part of any game however brief and however unimportant must be considered as "participation," hence the boy unfortunately cannot be eligible.
- (d) Reference made to the Dickinson S. T. C. trophies for the Track Meet of last spring. Mr. Wienbergen had purchased a set of trophies from Josten well in advance of the Board's action neither knowing of the action of the other. Hence there is an unused set of trophies on hand, and Mr. Weinberger has not been paid for his set. It was agreed that if the trophies could be used next spring, the League would pay for them.
- (a) A Washburn lad is injured after he had paid his A. A. B. Fund fee to the school, but the school has held it up waiting for several other such fees, to avoid sending in "driblets." The superintendent has vouched for the payment of the Clinic and hospital bills, and asks if the A. A. B. Fund can participate in any way. It is suggested that the school try in every way to get the bills cared for by the Social Welfare set up as the lad's father is on W. P. A.; then the matter can again be presented to the Board for consideration.
- (f) What of grade girls as members of the A. A. B. Fund? No action has ever been taken to grant them membership since the League officially "takes no cognizance of girls in athletics," neither approving or disapproving officially of such participation.

(g) A man moves to Canada, retaining his citizenship and vote in this country. His son goes to a Canadian school for a year at a distance of some 12 miles. He decided to come back to the U.S. and attend his former school. Is he eligible even if his parents have not moved back? Answer:—It was agreed that this is different from moving from one state to another, and since the Canadian high school does not fit into the situation well, the lad is eligible to return to his former high school and be immediately eligible.

Adjournment.

Friday, Saturday, January 5-6, 1939

Gardner Hotel, Fargo

Present: B. C. Tighe, M. B. Zimmerman, J. J. Roberts, Earl Abrahamson, L. A. White.

Also: Three representatives of the Coaches' Association by Board of Control invitation. The coaches were: Ed Bonhoff of Grand Forks, George Newgard of Hillsboro, and Denton of Dickinson.

The secretary had prepared an Aggenda Sheet, previously presented to the members of the Board in preparation of the meeting.

1. Organization of the Board of Control.

Prior to this order of business L. A. White, proposed the propriety of considering other Board members for the secretaryship if such should be the desire of the Board, at the same time pointing out the somewhat intricate work involved in the office, and the rather heavy demand on his time, with the suggestion that the Board study by questionnaire the remuneration given in other states.

MOTION by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson that the present officers be re-elected for the forthcoming year: Tighe, president; Zimmerman, vice-president, and White secretary. Carried.

- 2. In discussing the set-up for the Class B Tournaments reference to the minutes showed that the dates and general plans for the District and Regional Tournaments had already been planned; and the Tournament Committees named.
 - (a) Minot named for Class B Tournament.

Moved by Roberts seconded by Abrahamson that the invitation of the Minot Junior Association of Commerce be accepted and that the Class B Tournament be held at Minot in keeping with the terms of the invitation, namely that if after the usual tournament expenses are met, there remains a net balance, a certain amount shall be applied upon local expenses as follows: \$50.00 for hall rental; up to \$85.00 for the banquet or dancing party; \$15.00 for towel service, and \$25.00 for incidental expenses; all other net balance to go to the N. D. H. S. League. Carried.

George Mellum was named manager.

(b) Class A Tournament at Bismarck.

MOTION by Abrahamson, seconded by Zimmerman, that the Class A Tournament be held in Bismarck, in keeping with the terms of the invitation, which duplicated that of the preceding year. Carried.

H. O. Saxvik named as manager.

(c) Officials selected.

A list of a dozen and a half officials was submitted to the coaches for their rating, to which list they were encouraged to make additions. Subsequently by long distance phone the Board made arrangements with Dick Holzer of Moorhead, Ben Taylor of Brainerd; and L. S. Herting and "Andy" Anderson both of Rapid City, South Dakota, specific appointment being determined by their free dates, the first two being scheduled for the Class A tournament if dates of the four men permitted. Remuneration \$75.00 and appropriate expenses, the tournament being three day tourneys.

The men were named upon motion by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson, and carried.

3. State Track and Field Meet.

Previous minutes showed that the State Track and Field Meet is to be held at the University; and the Board of Control named May 27th as the appropriate day.

(b) District Meets.

MOTION by Zimmerman, seconded by Abrahamson that the same plan as last year be followed for the District Track and Field Meets. Carried. The plan provided for the eight District Centers, with golf and tennis added to the relays and the usual 13 events with managers named as before.

The District Meets are scheduled for May 20th; and the Invitational Meets for May 13th.

Winners of the qualifying Meets are eligible to enter the State Meet on the same basis as last year; i. e., by winning honors in their events, or by equaling or exceeding certain specified standards.

4. The "new" high school discus was discussed, but after reference of the problem to the coaches, no action was taken for this spring.

5. The Challenge Games.

A good deal of attention was given to the problems involved in the so called challenge games, and two types of action were taken: (a) It was decided to maintain the same general plan as last year for this season; and then present (b) to the League a somewhat different plan for consideration for the next year.

The teams participating in last year's A Tournament are automatically eligible to enter the Tourney this year, unless defeated by some school in a challenge game.

Any of the other former "A" schools may challenge any of these eight teams, as may also any "B" school, challenges to be made on or before January 21 with withdrawal privileges up to January 31.

Representatives of the challenging schools shall meet at Bismarck February 11 to arrange for the games, with a likelihood or possibility of all such games being held at Bismarck at an appropriate subsequent date.

The League will underwrite the challenge games.

In the event two or more schools challenge the same school, a small tournament is declared among them.

Teams that lose in the challenge games are not eligible to enter the B Tournaments; nor are the former Class A (larger) schools whether they challenge or not.

The Board repeats its ruling that St. Leo's of Minot and the Bismarck high school are not to play any games on the tournament floors for a month prior to the tournament times, i. e., the same provisions as heretofore.

6. Discussion of the proposed "International Meets," i. e., between North Dakota schools and the Canadian schools, the discussion based upon the several meets thus far held at Estevan. It is within possibility that a future development might include a similar meet at Winnipeg; with return meets in this country some time.

MOTION by Zimmerman, seconded by Abrahamson that a committee be appointed to investigate the possibilities of such meets, and report to the Board of Control in March. Carried.

- L. A. White and Earl Abrahamson were duly appointed.
- 7. Placement of bankboards for basketball.

Reference was made to the proposed 2 foot change in the bankboards, but no action was taken by the Board of Control, though they referred the matter to the three coaches, as an appropriate subject for their Association to investigate. The present impression seemed unfavorable to the proposed change.

8. St. Mary's and the 5th District.

Following the proposal by the Tournament Committee of the 5th District that St. Mary's High School be placed in the 9th District since there are but four teams involved there as against the present nine in the 5th District, the secretary was authorized to write the chairman of the 9th District as to the feasibility of moving St. Mary's either this year or next, preferably this year.

9. The C. C. C. boys, problem.

Not infrequently high school boys seem forced to leave school and enter C. C. C. camp. If their school work can be continued there, will it be posssible for them to be considered eligible the following semester, is a question sometimes brought up.

The Board of Control again considers the problem, and again concludes there is no way these boys can be given opportunity to "make up" their incomplete work, any more than if the same boys had remained at home to work on the farm or had done other work. It was not considered that the C. C. C. camps are sufficiently "educational" to do work equivalent to high school work, even though the high school could in a few cases give some supervision.

The Board of Control meeting shortly after 4:00 when the trains arrived from the west, continued in session until dinner with the three coaches; and worked again until midnight.

Saturday

The Saturday morning session started informally at 8:30 breakfast with all members present, and continued without interruption even for luncheon until about 3:00 when the Board adjourned.

- 10. As the coaches met with the Board their judgment was asked on these several problems: Rating of the dozen and a half officials for the Tournaments; the new discus; the 2' change in bankboards; the official basketball; the proposed challenge game plans; the problem of whether or not a limited number (perhaps 20) of games should be recommended for an annual basketball schedule. After some general discussion of these problems, the coaches were asked for any problems for consideration:
- a. Mr. Boenhoff said he had been asked to raise the question of having 10 men at the state tournaments; but a discussion of the various phases of the problem made it clear that there seemed little real need for the added expense. And it was recognized as a handicap rather than a help for smaller schools. Few schools use over 7 or 8 men anyway, except in easy games.
- b. Mr. Denton asks about feasibility of shortening the basketball season by having the tournaments earlier. The conclusion seemed to be that so far as students are concerned, a sufficiency of "activities"

must be provided, and a shortening of the basketball season should require a good substitute, which for many schools might not be readily forthcoming. It was reported that Minnesota and South Dakota have seasons about identical with our own.

c. Mr. Newgard raised the question about a Hillsboro lad injured a year ago in football, the injury developing more and more as time passed on; and asked that consideration be given the case even though it was seriously delayed. The Board agrees that if the injury conforms to the Schedule of Benefits, it can be approved despite its tardiness.

It was also suggested that the secretary impress upon the school men the necessity of making their injury reports within the specified time (10 days-see 1935 Handbook).

- d. Reference was made to Football Clinics, but no action was taken, and little discussion was given since time was passing rapidly, and it was felt that one of the two subsequent meetings of the Board of Control would provide more time.
- e. To the coaches was presented the proposed "set-up" for challenge games for next year. It is suggested that this proposed plan be presented to the League at some appropriate time that it may be considered for adoption or change at the Fall meeting of the League. The new plan is essentially: 1. Certain of the larger towns (i. e., according to town population rather than according to school population) shall be designated as A schools; and certain others shall be designated as B schools. All A's must remain such and all B's must remain such. Then the scattered few whose population places them somewhere midway between the A's and B's may by their own choice determine to be either A or B, but having done so, must so remain for a period of three years. There would then be no changing from A to B, or challenging by B schools. 2. Tournaments would continue then as at present. 3. With a possible provision for an official "play off" between the winners of the two State Tourneys unless such game by mutual agreement of the two winners were not desired.
 - f. Mile record to be recorded.
- Mr. Denton calls attention to the fact that a new mile record made by Wm. Filer attendant at the Dickinson school, had never been officially accepted and published; and asked that this be done. And it is so authorized when officially the League is so notified by the manager of the Bismarck track meet, (of two years ago.)
- g. The question is raised about having 4 teams participate at the Regional Tourney on the grounds that sometimes a lesser team wins a District and may enter the state over some better teams. In reply, reference is made to the new committee which is studying a possible 32 team District set up with 4 teams automatically appearing at the Regional games.

- 11. Monango re-instated. The Monango superintendent under the impression that no school could join both Leagues, had joined the C. and G. S. League since more schools in his neighborhood are of that caliber. Moved by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman that in this instance the school be re-instated without the usual December penalty. Carried.
 - 12. Abrahamson to attend Federation Meeting at Cleveland.

MOTION by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman, that Abrahamson represent the N. D. H. S. League at the meeting of the Federation of State H. S. A. A.'s at Cleveland, with expenses paid. Carried.

13. The Football Championships.

Agreed that definite action and further discussion await the March Board meetings, though it seemed to be felt that there should be three official final games; that the East-West Conference should have League sanction thru Board action; that the B (other) schools should be encouraged to have championship set up (see note of November League meeting and the committee appointed) and that there should be a set up for Six Man Football, for which also there is a Committee of investigation. It was stated that the N. D. H. S. League Six Man tournaments should be kept entirely apart from that of the C and G. S. League—this in response to a question previously raised.

14. Anent League memberships.

MOTION by Abrahamson, seconded by Zimmerman that for the inter-school contests of all kinds, (a) the eligibility rules of the N. D. H. S. League be used; and (b) only students be considered eligible that are from schools which if classified are members of the N. D. H. S. League, or if Consolidated and graded schools are members of the C and G. S. League. Carried.

- 15. Passing rference to the two North Dakota boys who apparently were inveigled to Nevada for athletic participation in their first semester. Conclusion: Wait until the March Board meetings.
- 16. It was agreed that all Board members should attend both A and B basketball tournaments.
 - 17. Trophies purchased.
- (a) 10 gold and 10 bronze buckles for "All State 1st and 2nd" teams purchased from Jostens at \$4.50 per set; and from Fargo Jewelry Company should be purchased 18 gold 1/10 and 18 s. s. silver basketball charms at \$2.45 plus engraving; and also 108 gold filled charms at 50c complete-so moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Roberts and carried.
- 18. Consideration of trophies and awards for the eight District track and field meets and the state meet; but action deferred until the March Board meetings.

19. MOTION by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that the official ball for District and Regional Tournaments be determined by the District Committees, their choice to be between the Dubow Wintark and any one of the five Lasbilts, Districts No. 1 to 10 inclusive to secure balls from Northern School Supply Company as heretofore and Districts No. 11 to 16, from Colborn School Supply Company as heretofore, one ball being sufficient for each District; that the balls for th Regional be determined as above, and purchased for Regions A. B. C. D and E from Northern and Regions F, G, H, from Colborn; that the State A balls (3 only) be purchased from Northern, with the understanding that either Lasbilt or Wintark shall be available at Tournament time; and that the State B balls (3 only) be purchased from Saunders Drug of Minot (presumably a Spalding, though possibly a Goldsmith), Carried.

20. The Washburn Claim.

The superintendent presents an affidavit showing that on such and such a date the given lad had paid his A. A. B. Fund fee; but before it had been forwarded to the League secretary, the boy was injured. The injury turned out to be a triple leg-bone fracture and highly expensive, the superintendent himself offering the surgeons and hospitals to be responsible.

MOTION by Zimmerman and seconded by Abrahamson that under the circumstances the Board participate in payment of the claim according to the Schedule of Benefits. Carried.

Summary of Important Dates: Challenges due January 21; withdraw by January 31; school representatives meet at Bismarck February 11th.

State A Tournament March 23, 24, 25; State B March 16-17-18.

Regional Tournament March 10 or 11; District March 3 or 4; or 1st week end in February.

State Track and Field Meet, May 27; District May 20; Invitational Meets on May 13.

Meeting adjourned.

Minot, N. D., Class B Tournament Time March 16, 17, 18

Thursday, Friday, Saturday, March 16, 17, 18, 1939, a series of meetings was held: Several in Mr. White's office, with all members present, and several more or less informally at luncheons and with some further discussions "on the side," during tournament games, and in "standing around."

Formal Meeting Friday, 10:30. All members present.

- 1. Discussion of the proposal that is "being talked about," i. e., what shall be done about spring football, what does the new rule actually mean. Board felt we should make no interpretation as yet but await further discussion and see what interest there may be. Subsequent reference was made to this at the Luncheon held for coaches by the Board of Control when several possible ideas were advanced.
- 2. Mr. Tighe advances the idea that some of the new "protective" football equipment may protect the wearer but may be harmful to his opponent and proposes that we look carefully into the matter. Mr. Abrahamson and Mr. Roberts being instructed so to do and report at the Bismarck meeting.
- 3. Reference to the Washburn A. A. B. Fund claim. The secretary was authorized to ask Mr. Thorson to meet with the Board either at Bismarck or at Minot to clear up one or two obscure points.
- 4. MOTION TO INCREASE FOOTBALL A. A. B. F. fees and SIX MAN FEES. MOTION by Zimmerman, seconded by Roberts that the eleven man football fee for membership in the A. A. B. Fund be increased from 75c to \$1.00 and the six man fee be raised from 50c to 75c. Carried. This motion followed the secretary's report showing that Eleven Man Football receipts had amounted to about \$450 and claims had amounted to about \$1,250; and Six Man fees had been about half the amount of the claims. Statistics of other states have shown that Six Man football hazards are approximately as great so far as the A. A. B. Fund claims are concerned, as the older game.
- 5. Reference was made to the Coteau-Bowbells game in which the referee blew whistle for a foul a few seconds before time was up but the time keeper did not hear it. Hence two viewpoints: If time was up at the blowing of the whistle then after throwing for the free throw, the ball would be in play and a basket if made, could count (i. e., a field goal if the foul were missed); but if time continued until the timekeeper called the game over as he did with his gun, then if the foul were missed there could be no play thereafter. A committee authorized by the Board of Control upheld the latter ruling. Subsequently word came from Bowbells that Oswald Tower had reversed the ruling. The Board asks the secretary to write Mr. Tower for confirmation as his ruling seems contrary to several implied rules.

Review of Linton-Ashley tournament game, wherein in overtime by agreement schools play to full three minutes instead of sudden death; but after Linton makes score, subs and others rush on floor

interfering with Ashley who have ball. Officials (referee and umpire) and manager (Supt. of Linton) and Tournament Committee Chairman of District, all seem agreed that there was no significant interference, referee and umpire sending signed diagram.

Review Oberon-Cooperstown tournament game. Dispute arose over score book discrepancies and consequent overtime play after both teams had gone to showers. Oberon boy stated to tournament manager that he had been credited with one basket too many hence the overtime period was to straighten out the error. Apparently the manager was merely correcting an earlier over-looked error of the type that can arise.

6. Discussion of A. A. B. F. claim from St. James. Schuck hurt in 1937 shows recent signs of more serious injury than supposed and has taken many treatments or adjustments. There is however no proof or evidence or statement that shows the original injury occurred in any known football game. Claim rejected.

Saturday morning 10:00—members present:

- 1. Elroy Taylor of Minot, injured in 1937 game, but blank never filled out until this fall completed by Coach Jarret on a trip to town here. However the blank does not show a broken nose, but "contusion." Hence not within the Schedule of Benefits and is disallowed.
- 2. What shall be done with St. Mary's. There is a feeling it might properly be removed from No. 5 to No. 9, adjusting the numbers in the two Districts somewhat better. Mr. Roberts assigned the task of making inquiry and recommendation.
- 3. Reference made to District No. 11 with net loss of \$100 on the District tournament but with a balance in League treasury of \$35.50. Board authorizes return to District No. 11 as in keeping with previous direction of League.
- 6. TRACK AND FIELD PLANS. MOTION by Zimmerman, seconded by Abrahamson that the NEW DISCUS BE MADE OFFICIAL FOR ALL MEETS BEGINNING WITH NEXT YEAR. CARRIED.
- 7. Question raised about the expenses of members of the Committee on Eleven Man Football Tournament. Proposed we make some payment toward the expenses of their meeting here in Minot even though they met of their own volition and without authorization so far as expense is concerned. Mr. Beleal merely asked for gas.
- 8. Discussion of possible plans for the "set up" for A and B basketball tournaments for next year. No action taken. Suggested we try to crystallize some plans for next week. Reference made to Abrahamson's previous suggestions.

- 9. The Dubow ball—some difference of opinion as yet the ball is practically unknown.
- 10. Why not secure officials for next year's tournaments now—was frequently asked, but no action taken.
- 11. Explanation by secretary of investment of the Gold Bond $4\frac{1}{2}$ money (bonds expired) in "baby bonds" through postal department, \$2,100.00
- 12. Is there some way that we can develop a rating sheet or record for officials? No conclusion.
- 13. How can our League "hit the spot" better with smaller schools was a topic given some thought. Perhaps the Six Man football tournament will help.
- 14. Mr. Abrahamson's report on the Cleveland Federation of State H. S. Athletics Associations. Each Board member had previcusly received a complete mimeographed report.
- 15. Discussion of the Yearbooks—in what way can they be improved, made more readable, include more, or otherwise be changed.
- 16. Some reference made to data showing work and remuneration of Association secretaries of other associations.
- 17. Throughout the A meetings there seemed again as last year a general satisfaction with the B tournament, although this year crowds seemed somewhat less, due doubtless to the fact that roads even within 50 mile radius were practically impassable until the final tournament day.
- 18. The secretary was authorized to inquire into the proposed \$50.00 fee of the two officials who handled the 4 challenge games at Bismarck.
- 19. Some informal discussion of the un-wisdom of Minot and Osnabrock playing their expensive game at Bismarck, where receipts were only \$33.50 and expenses were 6 or 8 times that amount. The Bismarck play however had been in keeping with the January suggestion of the Board of Control and with the agreement of the teams at Bismarck as they arranged the challenges, before they even knew how the challenges would come out. This is one of the obvious weaknesses of the "challenge" system. The other four games more than paid their own expenses, receipts amounting to something over \$1,200.00.

Bismarck, March 23, 24, 24, 1939

All Board members were present.

Note: The Board had many informal meetings—at nearly all meals and as they sat together at the tournament games and walked together to and from, regularly discussions turned to problems of the Tournament, and of the League. But a series of formal meetings was also held.

Friday A. M., breakfast, continued throughout the morning.

- 1. Mr. Roberts reports on conference with St. Mary's officials in their removing to another District; they seem willing. No action taken, pending report of the Committee that is to consider a possible 32 districting of the state.
- 2. "Dangerous equipment." Mr. Abrahamson and Mr. Zimmerman unable to make report as yet. At the Minot meeting there was some feeling that some of the new equipment while protecting the wearer well might be dangerous to his opponent.
- 3. Shall official Eligibility Sheets be used at the music and other contests? Mr. Page of the U. N. D. has recommended their use. Conference with the C and G. S. representative (Mr. Peterson) makes it clear that there would be no feeling on their part. The Board authorizes the secretary to send blanks to all, asking for them.

4. "No spring football."

The new rule prohibiting "organized Spring Football between January 1st and August 25th, was discussed at the B Tournament time officially, and here-and-there by many men; and at the coachesand-Board luncheon; and similarly at Bismarck, where in addition the State Coaches' Association analyzed it thoroly and then concluded officially they had no recommendation to make to the Board. Hence the Board finally concluded, in conference with three members of the Coaches' Association that the only logical interpretation of the rule would be a literal interpretation, with the understanding that any football practice in track suits, or any other form would be a mere camouflage and contrary to the rule. It was thought that there is no way to make a lenient interpretation that would be equally helpful to all schools; and that a strict interpretation would bring about a careful study of a change if the League desires a change for another year.

5. Dr. Gates meets with the Board and Coaches (see Saturday luncheon) and reads a well prepared analysis of the problems, pros

and cons of girls inter-scholastic athletic competition. There is becoming a state wide interest in the problem, sponsored by the State Department of Health, and the Department of Physical Education of the N. D. E. A., both of which are represented on Dr. Gates Committee. No official action taken. It is probable that both C a-G. S. League and N. D. H. S. League will find it appropriate to take some common action.

- 6. Discussion of possible officials for next year's tournaments. See subsequent minutes.
- 7. Reference to letters of secretary written to two officials whose bills seem high.
- 8. Discussion of purchase of football and basketball rules and play situations as published by National Federation. The secretary is authorized to purchase as needed to supply all schools participating.

MOVED by Zimmerman, seconded by Abrahamson that they be purchased, the motion apparently covering 6-man rule books as well. Altho they are not so published.

- 9. COMMITTEE APPOINTED: President Tighe appoints the following Committee to discuss the problems, pros and cons, of a 32 District set-up: E. A. Quam, Oakes; E. O. Morstad, New England; O. E. Tiller, Walhalla. The Board is not aware that there is any wide spread demand for any significant changes in the B set-up. One corner of the state at least, at the present time sends two schools from each District to a Regional game, where a "little tournament" is held.
- 10. Reference was made to the experience in Kentucky where they tried to use only local state officials—with attendant difficulties.
- 11. It was planned to provide gold and silver basketball charms for coaches of the two winning tournament teams; and provide passes for former Board of Control members.
- 12. Some reference was made to the new Dubow ball, remembering its development thru the National Federation; with the idea that along with other states we should continue to encourage a try-out of the ball. No action was taken. See later minutes.
- 15. Discussion of possible new set-up for Class A and B. The Board, it has been suggested by other members, should develop some plans which can be considered by the League, in order to avoid hasty ill-considered plans from "bobbing up." It was suggested that Mr. Tighe and Mr. Abrahamson consider themselves leaders of the Board, other members also to help, to crystallize some plans.
 - 16. What standards of height, speed or distance for the non-official

track meets this year? Answer: Same as last year. See 1938 Yearbook.

MOTION by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that the expenses of the Board of Control incident to the work of the 11 Man Football Championship Committee be allowed. Carried.

- 18. MOVED by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson that championship trophies be provided for the East-West Conference, and for the 11-Man and 6-Man also, if such be established. Carried.
- 19. The secretary is asked to have the 11-Man and 6-Man Committees complete and hand in their reports as soon as possible. (Note: The 11-Man Committee report was handed in at the tournament time; and Mr. Rice verbally reported that the other is about completed.)
- 20. Further reference to Eligibity Sheets and music and other contests; it being decided that a few changes in wording would be appropriate to make the blanks clarified for these contests.
- 21. Agreed Abrahamson to make presentation of the awards at the high school party.
- 22. In the absence of the secretary, the following memorandum was authorized: The secretary's salary beginning with March shall be \$700 instead of \$500 as heretofore and \$100 allowance for office help instead of \$50 as heretofore. This was based upon data shown from all other states. The North Dakota secretary's salary and office allowance seemed notably lower than that of any other doing equivalent work; though few states have an A. A. B. Fund unless they have a full time secretary.

Friday Night

After the tournament games, the Board met again and considered the purchase of track trophies and awards, adjourning about 2:15 a.m.

MOVED by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson that by a two year contract the following items be purchased from Josten's at the following prices:

State Field and Track Meet: 1 J133, 1st place, \$20.50; 1 J134, 2nd place, \$14.00; 1 D110, Relay, \$6.75; 13 sets in gold filled, sterling silver bronze art and bronze at \$4.90 per set for the 13 events (representing 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places); 4 1-15 10K gold filled (for each of the relay runners); and 6 sets in gold filled and sterling silver for singles and doubles in tennis; and for medalist and doubles in golf.

Eighth District Track and Field Meets: 104 (8x13) sets; 3 R83S in duro, sterling and bronze (what about other place?) at \$2.07 a set; 48 duro for 1st place in tennis and golf at 87c. Note: Why the 104 and 48 instead of 8x13 and 8x3?); 8 J3MS for 1st place district track, bronze @ \$4.90; 8JIMS for relay in bronze @ \$3.75; 1 only gold running shoe @ \$4.15. All to be suitably engraved without expense. Total State:—about \$135.00; 8 districts total about \$326.00. Total \$461.25.

Saturday Conference with Mr. Peterson, C and G. S. League.

- 1. There is no reason why N. D. H. S. League members should join C and G. S. League, to participate in county tournaments, Mr. Peterson agrees; nothing in their constitution.
- 2. For the music contests and the like, few C and G. S. schools enter; hence the use of the N. D. H. S. Eligibility Blanks and rules is okay. The C and G. S. League rules are somewhat more strict Mr. Peterson feels (refers to the fact that a boy must have gained at least 3 credits in the TWO preceding semesters) as example.
- 3. What of fickle schools, want to change back and forth. Suggestion made, should be made to retain membership in the tournament of one League or the other for at least two successive years. No action.

Coaches as Guests of Board of Control Noon, Saturday

About 30 (31) men present.

Mr. Tighe as president welcomes the coaches; speaks of the Dubow ball; of the discus; of track dates and plans; of possible East-West 11-Man and 6-Man championships; girls athletics; of possible "interpretation" for "no-organized football practice rule" and asks for suggestions.

Dr. Gates speaking for the State Health Department, and the Department of Physical Education of the N. D. E. A. discusses the feasibility of restricting girls' participation in inter-school athletic competition, with special reference to basketball. Mr. Tighe expresses appreciation of Board of Control to Coaches' Association for their help in a number of ways. He refers to the January meeting when they conferred with the Board about Tournament officials, and other items.

BOARD MEETING, with Three Representatives of the Coaches' Association, at dinner.

1. Coaches recommend Hertig and Anderson with Oudahl and

Crouse as first choices for next year's tournaments; with recommendation of Higgins and Fahey; Hunt; Nordley and Holgate. Note: The Board authorizes the secretary to make immediate contact with the first four named for next year's tournaments.

- 2. The Coaches' Association made the following recommendations:
- a. State men be secured for tournament officials.
- b. Four men be secured for each tournament.
- c. Recommend in opposition to the Tribune selection of all state players announced prior to the closing of the tourney.
 - d. Approve the new Federation approved discus.
- e. Propose that the Class B tournament be held next year at the same time as this year; but the Class A tournament be held a week prior to the Class B.
- f. If the Board is to invite a committee to meet with them at midwinter, the following are selected: Newgard, Bohnhoff and Gruenenfelter of Hillsboro, Grand Forks and Mandan, respectively.
 - g. They recommended against the Dubow ball.
- h. They had no recommendation to make on an appropriate interpretation for the "no spring football" rule.
- 3. The Board of Control in discussing these recommendations agreed upon officials as stated above; presented the difficulties involved in using state men; pointed out that while now it costs about \$500 for tournament officials, doubling the officials would double the cost; felt that the early announcement of the fictitious Tribune all state is an error; approved the new discuss this year, reversing an earlier decision; felt there are some difficulties in the proposed time-change for the tournaments; and questioned the need for the coaches meeting with the Board at mid-winter now that we have selected the officials and have the new recommendations; the Board had previously felt that the spring joint-meeting would be better. The Board rehearsed the history of the rise of the Dubow ball, and asked the coaches to see that the new ball is given a fair trial before judgment is passed on it; they proposed that "no spring football" should be interpreted as "no spring football", and the coaches seemed to feel there was no better solution.

Supt. Guy Thorson met with the Board to explain a discrepancy in some dates involved in an A. A. B. Fund claim, the explanation being satisfactory to the Board which directed the secretary to pay the bill in the amount of \$48.75.

Trophies bought for B. B. Tournament for 3 years.

MOVED by Zimmerman, seconded by Abrahamson, that a 3 year contract be entered into with Josten's for a complete list of trophies for the A and B tournaments, the same as heretofore except that each winning coach and runner-up coach shall be awarded gold and silver basketballs respectively the same as their teams at prices as herebelow listed. Carried.

The Board finally agrees that inasmuch as it is so difficult to interpret the "no spring football" in such a way as to be equable and satisfactory, the only way to save the Board and League from embarrassment due to lax interpretations, a strict interpretation is necessary; and the Board shall call upon all schools to turn with lively interest toward Spring track.

The Annual Meeting of the N. D. H. S. League

H. S. Study Hall, Fargo, N. D. Thursday, October 27, 1938

Present:—About 100, representing about 55 or 60 schools.

B. C. Tighe, presiding.

1. The secretary proposed to read the Minutes of the last League meeting if desired, but pointed out that they had been printed in detail and distributed to all schools that are members in the 1938 Year-book.

Moved by Payne, seconded by Thompson, that we dispense with the reading of the minutes on the above grounds. Carried.

- 2. The secretary-treasurer in like manner referred to the printing and distribution of the complete treasurer's report and C. P. A. audit, and it was moved by Severtson and seconded by several that the reading of the reports be dispensed with on the above grounds, and that the reports be accepted as published. Carried.
- 3. The five amendments before the League were presented on the mimeographed Agenda sheet.

Amendment No. 1, proposing to add Section IV to Article 1 of the BY LAWS GOVERNING RELATIONS OF SCHOOLS, as shown on page six of the black and gold Handbook of Interpretations, reading as follows:—"No school shall be entitled to membership in the League which maintains organized football practice between January first and September first."

After much discussion indicating a variety of viewpoints, with several proposed motions and amendments, and some confusion, roll call was called for on an amendment which changed the September first date to August 25, the maker and second of the amendment being lost in the 'shuffle', the amendment carrying by a vote of 27 to 24. The original motion by Payne seconded by Reitan supported the amendment as stated above then carried by a vote of 39 to 22. Thus football (either Six Man or Eleven Man) is prohibited between January 1st and August 25th.

Amendment No. 2. It was proposed to amend Article IV of the Constitution by changing Section I as follows:—First 5 lines to read as at present as given on page 5 of the black and gold special Hand-

book, except that January 1st shall be substituted for July 1st, and changing the word secretary and thereon as follows:—..." president and vice-president, and shall elect a full time secretary, not a member of the Board for a term of one year, starting on July 1st following the meeting at which this amendment shall be ratified, and such selection of the executive secretary-treasurer to be thereafter made annually prior to the date of expiration of the term of the incumbent. The salary of the secretary-treasurer shall not exceed \$2,400.00 annually."

Moved by Gould, seconded by Rice that action on the amendment be indefinitely postponed, the motion being unanimously carried.

Amendment No. 3. It was proposed to amend Article IV Section I of the Constitution by adding the following:—Any authorized representative of an eligible school in good standing may be qualified for election to the Board, provided that no member shall be eligible to serve two consecutive terms.

Moved by E. A. Quam, seconded by E. C. Johnson that action on the amendment be indefinitely postponed. Carried unanimously.

Amendment No. 4. It was proposed to amend Article VII of the Constitution by the addition of the following:— . . . "provided that there shall be a lapse of at least one month between the time of the presentation of the proposed amendment and the final vote thereon."

Moved by L. F. Rice, seconded by many, that the amendment be adopted as read; carried.

Moved by (secretary missed the mover among several), seconded by Robertson and several, that the amendment be adopted as read. Carried unanimously.

4. Football Championship Committees.

Moved by Severtson, seconded by Lazenby that two committees be appointed to study the feasibility of developing plans for a State Championship in Six Man Football, and for a State Championship in Eleven Man Football (for towns not including among the 13 in the new East-West Conference.) Carried.

Committee Appointments:—Six Man Football— L. F. Rice, Velva; M. R. Lazenby, Michigan; Lyle Hill, New Leipzig.

Eleven Man Football:—A. P. Beleal, Hebron, E. C. Johnson, Kenmare, J. J. Ekster, Hillsboro.

(To report at Conference meeting, and install plans for next Fall.)

Moved and seconded by (names were lost in the discussion) that
a Committee be appointed to study the feasibility of dividing the

state into 32 Districts, with 4 teams involved in the Regional games, and report back at next League meeting time. Carried.

5. Re-Districting State for Basketball proposed.

Committee:-E. A. Quam; E. O. Morstad; O. E. Tiller.

6. Preparatory to a motion concerning the basketball tournaments, Gould raised the question about the status of the former "A" teams that last year did not enter the A Tournament, as to whether they are eligible for entrance into the B Tournament. No official action was taken, or judgment given, but it seemed the opinion that such teams were eligible to enter B Tournament, or challenge one of the 8 teams in last year's A Tournament, just as other B teams may. He proposed the advisability of preparing a list of A schools and B schools so definite that each remains within its own classification. Others suggested the latter arrangement with the addition of a play-off between the winners of the A and the B State Tournaments. No action taken; no motion made.

Moved by Gould, seconded by A. C. Johnson that the League empower the Board of Control to arrange the set-up for this year's basketball tournaments. Carried.

Note:—Action of the League last year provided that the 8 teams participating in the A Tournament in 1938 should automatically be considered the teams for the A Tournament in 1938, subject to challenge and defeat by some other team or teams. Apparently the motion placed the set-up now in the hands of the Board of Control to accept, modify or develop, and such seemed to be the tenor of the discussion.

7. Report of nominating committee and election.

The nominating committee:—Ingvalson, Gould, Johnson, Schroeder and Fossum, present the name of L. A. White to succeed himself, and there being no other candidate, he is duly elected upon motion by Quam, seconded by Rice.

- B. C. Tighe discusses the set up of the A. and B. Tournaments,

and also gives a brief report of the financial and general condition of the A. A. B. Fund.

L. F. Rice, chairman of the special committee on the proposed Six Man State Championship gave a report on the committee's work, report herewith attached.

The report was adopted by the assembly.

The Eleven Man Football Championship Committee plan was discussed, it having been presented to the Board of Control previously at their Minot meeting. Rogers of Carrington and Reitan of Larimore suggested that Board action on the plan be announced early in order that schools be able to make their schedules without delay.

There was discussion of the Class \boldsymbol{A} and Class \boldsymbol{B} Tournament set-up.

Principal L. G. Thompson of Grand Forks, asked why this year schools are suddenly required to use the Eligibility Exchange Sheets for the Music and other contests. Mr. Tighe explains:—The Board in their January meeting at Fargo had invited Mr. Page of the U. N. D. to meet to discuss a more strict application of the League's rules. Tho unable to attend, Mr. Page has given every evidence of interest in the rules; and has co-operated fully. Several schools have urged the use of the blanks, and the U. N. D. was agreeable if the schools so desired. Correspondence and long distance conferences with the League secretary resulted in the readiness to press the use of the blanks.

Mr. Gould of Mandan questions the propriety of the 25c fee for enrollment in all the contests, pointing out how much this totals for many schools, indicating that not infrequently schools know they will have no representatives at the U. N. D. contests, where presumably the fees are collected and used.

Motion by Gould, seconded and carried, that a committee be appointed to confer with Mr. Page and other University officials over problems connected with these contests:—

Mr. Colton, Thompson and Gould appointed on the committee. Adjournment.

Plan for Six-Man Football Championship Series

I. The Board of Control shall have full supervision of the management of all details of the series, in the same manner as is now carried out in the basketball championship series.

II. Districts: The state shall be divided into eight districts. Division to be made according to the distribution of teams in the state and to the present football conference. Each district shall be in charge of a committee of three superintendents or coaches, to be appointed by the State Board of Control.

III. Registration and selection of schools. All schools wishing to enter their teams in the championship series shall be members of the North Dakota State High School League and must register for six man football by paying a fee of one dollar before October 1, or two dollars between October 1 and 14. These registration fees shall be used to pay the expenses of the district committees, and the fees shall be paid to the chairman of the district committees. All teams registering must report to the Tournament Committee the results of all games played previous to, and including October 14, as soon as possible:

District selection: After the 14th the Tournament Committees shall meet and shall select a team to represent the district. Such selection to be made not later than October 21. The Tournament Committee, in making their selection, is to consider the records of the teams and in case there is more than one outstanding team in the district they may arrange for the necessary play-offs which must be completed not later than October 21.

Region games: The districts will be paired in regions with the regional game to be played not later than October 23.

Semi-finals: The four winning teams of the regions will be paired for semi-final games to be held not later than October 31.

Final game: The final game is to be played not later than November 4.

Note: Dates may be changed by the action of the Board of Control.

Trophies: The first year, the cost of trophies is to be paid by the High School League; all other necessary expenses to be paid from the receipts of the games.

Location of Tournament Games: The location of all tournament games shall be determined by the teams involved. In case of disagreement the place shall be determined by the Sec. of the High School League.

Districting to be located later by a map.

PLANS FOR STATE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

N. D. HIGH SCHOOL LEAGUE

Members of High School League Board of Control.

Dear Sirs:

As chairman of the committee which you appointed for the purpose of outlining a plan for determining the Class B eleven man football championship of North Dakota, I wish to report the work of this committee.

It was the sense of the committee that the only feasible plan called for the division of the state into four geographical units. This has been done and a map showing this division and the location of the eleven-man Class B teams within these divisions is included within this report.

The committee compromised between placing equal numbers of teams in each district and dividing the state into four equal geographical divisions. They also kept in mind the existing conferences and tried to avoid splitting them. Two schools which were difficult to place were Watford City and St. Marys of Bismarck but the committee did what they considered most fair in placing those schools.

We thought it advisable that a committee of three be appointed by the League Board of Control in each district to determine the team representing that district. We also recommend that a newspaper sports editor in each area be attached to each committee in an advisory capacity. In order to facilitate the work of these committees, it is advisable that all class B eleven- man teams make their October 27 date tentative. In order that an elimination game between two outstanding teams of a given district could be played on that date. After the district champions have been determined, the state board of control should arrange for a Western Championship game and an Eastern Championship game during the first week end of November, and that the state title game be played November 11.

It is also recommended that in order for a team to be considered for the district championship it must have played three other Class B eleven-man teams in their own district. It is recommended that any school now included in the class A set-up in football be kept in that class and not allowed in the B division.

It has been impossible to say exactly which team will play eleven-man ball next fall because the school administrators themselves in some cases do not know what their school will do. The schools marked on the map are based primarily on last season's play and what they have indicated they plan to play next fall.

The committee is quite aware of the imperfections in this plan and realize that picking district championship winners on the basis of one season's play, with only the October 27 date for district play offs is going to cause difficulty. However, all in all, it seems to be the only available solution.

As chairman of this committee I wish to thank the Board of Control for my appointment and I wish to express the appreciation of the members of the committee for the cooperation given us by the members of the board.
