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The League Calendar

NOTE PARTICULARLY:-

ALL MEMBERSHIPS EXPIRE September 30th, and are renewed only by specific payment of dues.

The fee is \$1.00 for towns under 1,000 population; \$2.00 for towns between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for towns over 2,000.

BUT IF dues are not paid by November 1st they shall be doubled and if not paid by December 1st, they shall be increased by \$5.00. Further, no memberships shall be accepted after January first.

AND:—Dues cannot be accepted if your OFFICIAL ELIGIBILILITY BLANKS HAVE NOT BEEN FILED WITH THE SECRETARY.

What To Do In

SEPTEMBER:

- (a) Pay the dues at once; secure all League blanks thereby, and athletic books.
- (b) Join the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, to protect your school, and your boys:—\$1.00 for football, 75c for six man football. Explain the Fund to all athletes.
- (c) Have a physical examination of all boys preparing to participate in athletics.
- (e) Begin at once to check player's eligibility:—Age, semesters of attendance, seasons of attendance, and scholastic records the past semester particularly. Watch 9th semester athletes' ages.
- (f) Get an early start on the SIX MAN FOOTBALL.
- (g) Give special attention to the tobacco and beer rule, right from the start.
- (h) Why not a special "For-the-good-of-athletics" assembly, early in September.
- (i) See News Letters for the Football Tournament Plans.

OCTOBER:

- (a) Hurry and pay the membership fee. After October 31 the membership fee is doubled.
- (b) What of the Six Man Football Championship?
- (c) A good time now to think about the Accident Benefit Fund, for Basketball at 50c per boy.
- (d) At N. D. E. A. time, the Annual Fall meeting is the big meeting of the League year. This is the time to bring in all sorts of well thought out plans and suggestions. Send coaches to the athletic clinic.

NOVEMBER:

- (a) Start your plans from the first, for the never-varying custom in all contests, and particularly in basketball, of (a) exchanging Elegibility Sheets; and (b) Contracts.
- (b) If your dues are still unpaid, HURRY UP, for after the last day of November dues are increased by five dollars. Too bad, too.
- (c) Enroll basketball boys in A. A. B. Fund at 50c.

DECEMBER:

- (a) If your membership fee has not been paid before the end of this month, you are out of the League.
- (b) Class B schools better send in their \$2.00 Tournament Fees to District Chairman now for it has to be doubled after the 15th of next month. You might forget it.
- (c) With basketball right on us, why not check again every possible representative of your school on all eligibility points; complete the physical examinations; really secure parental consent; protect the boys with the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund; hold a special assembly to talk about all eligibility rules; with special bearing on the tobacco and beer rule. Watch all ninth semester boys for ages.
- (d) Yes, the League has adopted a Committee Report, urging against interscholastic competitive contests for girls. It is not prohibited however, by our League as has been done in some states.

JANUARY:

- (a) Too late to join the League now.
- (b) Pay up your Tournament Entry Fees of \$2.00 (Classs B Schools) before the 15th, and save the \$2.00 penalty. Send it to your District Tournament Chairman.
- (c) Did you actually complete—the physical examination; parental permission for participation; athletic assembly; membership in A. A. Benefit Fund-and other good resolutionsor are you merely paving some more (with good intentions).

FEBRUARY:

(a) Tournament entry fee is doubled now (\$4.00), but still can be received by the 15th. Hurry it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.

- (b) Avoid the end-of-the-season embarrassment to your school and team, by making certain before the Tournaments are any nearer, that there is no possible eligibility question about any of your contestants.
- (c) Why not write to your Tournament Committee, giving suggestions for tournaments.

MARCH:

- (a) "A" Tournament, March 12-13-14. "B" Tournament March 19-20-21.
- (b) With the closing of the basketball season you are preparing your data for the Official Eligibility Report ,whereon you list the record of absolutely every lad who has represented your school in any inter-scholastic basketball contest, however unimportant, on any team.

APRIL:

- (a) Track time begins. The League is making a strenuous effort to develop track and field work. Get your lads in as many meets as you can. It is a fine spring sport.
- (b) Unless otherwise notified, any Track Meet large enough to have 6 League schools entered, if an open meet, automatically becomes an Official Qualifying Meet for any subsequent State Meet. Qualifying events must have at least 3 contestants; and 1st and 2nd place winners are eligible for the "State" Meets.
- (c) Have you considered the Athletic Accident Fund protection for your track and field boys? It has frequently saved some school embarrassment, and helped lads pay injury bills,

MAY:

(a) Classified High Schools, whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or whatever size in enrollment must be League members to participate in any kind of Inter-scholastic contest-athletic, music, declamation, etc.—whether held in a County Festival, or a State University or elsewhere. Lines are to be more rigidly drawn than heretofore. League Eligibility Rules apply.

Summary of Significant Dates

September 30th. All memberships expire at midnight.

November 30th. Memberships paid after this date cost \$5.00 additional.

December 31st. No membership can be received after this date.

Dead line! Tournament Entry Fee of \$2.00 is due. Pay it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.

January 15th. Tournament Entry Fee doubled to \$4.00 after this date.

February 15th. Tournament Fee not accepted after this date. Dead line!

The Annual Meeting of the N. D. H. S. League

Room 207, Grand Forks High School, Thursday, Oct. 24, 1940

- 1. Members present: Between 80 and 100 schools were represented.
- 2. Mr. Tighe gave a brief address emphasizing the value of athletics and physical education calling careful attention to matters of health and sportsmanship.
- 3. Moved by White, seconded by Urness that report of the Secretary-Treasurer found in 1940 Yearbook be accepted, this after the Secretary had given a brief resume as Secretary-Treasurer. Motion carried.
- 4. Appointment of nominating committee: E. C. Johnson of Kenmare; H. O. Saxvik of Bismarck; A. P. Beleal of Enderlin; William Westlie of Marmouth; Supt. Bell of St. Thomas,
- 5a. Mr. Colton reports for the music committee concerning the annual contest to be held at the University giving a statement of appreciation for the work the University is doing.
- 5b. Moved by Urness, seconded by Colton and carried that at this the second reading eligibility rule No. 8 shall be changed to read as follows: After attending the first semester of the ninth grade he shall have credit on the school records in unit per year or half unit per semester subjects of at least three half units earned and recorded at the close of the last semester in which he was enrolled as a student; thirty days or more of attendance or participation in interscholasticc competition within any shorter period being sufficient to constitute enrollment in any semester.
- 5c. Moved by Simmons, seconded by several, and carried that the following proposal at this the second reading be indefinitely post-poned:
 - No two or more schools located in the same city, village or school district may participate in both A and B tournaments.
- 2. The Board of Control is hereby authorized to arrange a separate and distinct and additional tournament for all private high schools members of the League, whenever the lay be discontinued and replaced by a mile medley, including the half mile, the 440, and two 220's.

5d. Moved by Gilliland and seconded and carried that the 440 resame shall seem desirable and expedient.

Discussion of the Javelin Throw pointed out there is significant danger, but since no action was taken, the Javelin Throw continues.

5e. A committee was appointed to study B Football Tournaments recognizing that there are certain problems involving in the present set up. The chair was asked to reappoint the former committee to review their rulings and make new or additional recommendations at the spring conference. The committee consists of Beleal of Enderlin, Elster of Hillsboro, and Johnson of Kenmare.

6. New Business.

- a. Moved by Urness, seconded by Gilliland that the Chair appoint a special committee to investigate the proper application of the eligibility rules upon high school athletes belonging to the National Guard whose school attendance may be thus broken. The Chair appointed Gilliland of Devils Lake, Siefkin of Hankinson, and Urness of Williston.
- b. Supt. Havig of Rugby proposed the following changed amendment for Article 6, Section 10 at this the first reading as follows:

To read, "He shall have been in attendance in the school he represents for one semester upon transferring from another school unless his parents have become residents of the school district to which he is transferred or the school from which he is transferred does not offer work of the corresponding year in which he is ranked; and in the instance of a pupil in the same city or vice versa, he shall not be eligible to represent the new high school for one year from the date of transfer."

6c. Basketball Clinic.

Moved by James of Egeland, seconded by Sando of Dickinson and carried at the recommendation of the Board of Control that basketball clinics be accepted. The proposals are as follows: 1. At High School League expense Gates of Jamestown, Gruenfelder of Mandan, Sigerseth of Minot Model, and Negard of Hillsboro are to attend the Minnesota basketball clinic. Upon their return each is to hold one basketball clinic in each of the four basketball districts in his corner of the state and for each clinic a payment of \$10 plus necessary expenses shall be made.

In this connection it was proposed by Supt. Gilliland that the Secretary be authorized to secure some good basketball films that could be used by these clinic leaders.

6d. State track meet will be placed at U. of North Dakota. It was seconded and carried that the high school track and field meet for 1941 be placed at the University of North Dakota.

In connection with this motion, reference was made to the invitation from the Agricultural College.

6e. Motion by Van Wyck, seconded by Urness and carried that the location of the basketball tournaments be left to the Board of Control.

Note: The Board of Control had previously named Bismarck and Minot as the places for the A and B tournaments respectively.

6f. The Nominating Committee presented the names of Abrahamson and Roberts to succeed themselves.

Report of the nominating committee:

From the floor Ottem, Rogers, and Christopherson were nominated. Moved by Van Wyck, seconded and carried that nominations be closed. Moved by Urness, seconded and carried that the two men receiving the highest votes, should be declared elected. Tellers were appointed and the vote showed the election of Abrahamson and Roberts. Meeting was adjourned.

SPRING MEETING OF THE N. D. H. S. LEAGUE

Since there was no high school conference, due to storm and impassable roads, there was no annual Spring Meeting of the N. D. H. S. League.

Meetings of Board of Control

N. D. E. A. Time: Grand Forks, Oct. 23 to 26

1. Consideration of protest from Crosby.

The District Committee-Stewart of Stanley, Anderson of Garrison, and Elliott of Bottineau decided October 18 Bottineau and Model High should play off for district honors. By the time the Board considered Crosby's protest they had won two more games and thus had a record of defeating Model High, Mohall, and Kenmare with scores of 18, 19, 20 to nothing. The Board of Control authorized the Secretary to contact the chairman of the committee asking that they reconsider the records of the schools and include these last two games played by Crosby on the grounds that there is nothing in the tournament plans to prevent the consideration of these late games. Secretary was authorized to inform the committee president that Crosby was to be considered only in the event that they had paid the \$2 tournament fee. Mr. Stewart as chairman conferred with his two board members, and reported back that the committee had decided to award the district honors to Crosby without a play off stating that Crosby had paid their tournament fee, but Bottineau had not.

2. Parshall protests.

Supt. Seher of Parshall stated that the District committee had not given his team any consideration for district honors in six-man football and wanted to challenge Drake for district honors. The Board upheld the action of the committee on the grounds that the committee had not been previously notified by Parshall about their desire for consideration. The committee had not received from Parshall, a list of games played and apparently had no means of knowing of Parshall's interests or athletic record when the committee met at the appointed time for the six-man set up which definite time was previously announced in an August News Letter so all schools have reason to know when the committee would act.

3. Football trophies.

Moved by John Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson that the Board of Control purchase three trophies identical with those of last year from the Balfour company through its agent, Mr. Sherman. Carried.

4. Location of State Basketball Tournaments.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that the A Tournament be placed at Bismarck and B Tournament at Minot. Motion carried.

5. Football tournament problems.

The Board discussed certain problems connected with the B class football tournaments and the six-man football tournaments and decided to ask the League to appoint a committee for their consideration.

6. No transfer of AAB Fund memberships.

The Board discussed the question of whether or not football memberships might be transferred from one person to another. Sometimes a boy drops out of the squad or leaves school or for some other reason would like to have a refund of his money or the school would like to have the membership transferred to another pupil.

Without a motion the Board of Control decided that such transfers could not be granted.

7. A. A. B. Fund membership in a basketball to begin November 1. Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts and carried that protection for the basketball season might begin as early as November 1, under the A. A. B. plan.

8. Shall basketball clinics be held?

The Board of Control reviewed its action of last spring and recommended that the plans they adopted tentatively should be presented to the High School League for its action. The plans proposed the sending of four men representing the four corners of the state to the Minnesota basketball clinic paying their expenses; each of these men should then hold four basketball clinics in the four districts nearest them for which they should be paid \$10 plus their needed expenses.

The Board proposed Ernie Gates of Jamestown, Mr. Gruenfelder of Mandan, P. O. Sigerseth of Minot Model High, and George Newgard of Hillsboro.

9. Ashley protest.

The protest of Ashley presented by Supt, Heitzman was to the effect that their school had not been considered. The committee meeting at Grand Forks ruled that Ashley's record within the district was not significant and their two victories over Linton were not sufficient to merit serious consideration as contenders and felt that the games they had played in South Dakota could not be well considered. The Board of Control upheld the decision of the district committee.

- 10. Moved by Abrahamson, and seconded by Roberts that an added amount be paid to Supt. Rice of Velva to meet his full expenses at the Chicago six-man football rules committee meeting last spring. The Board had previously paid him only \$25 at his request, but found that he had paid part of his own expenses. Motion carried.
- 11. Mr. Tighe, speaking for the State Agricultural College, invites the State Track Meet to be held in Fargo. Adjournment.

Bismarck, A Tournament Time, March 13, 14, 15, 1941

Present: Tighe, Zimmerman, Roberts, Abrahamson, White.

Note: The Board of Control members met Thursday evening and thereafter regularly three times a day at meals where they discussed League matters preparatory to subsequent formal action; and Friday and Saturday forenoons they met, and afternoon luncheons prior to the afternoon games, and frequently met either after dinner or after the evening games.

Actions were taken as follows:

Motion by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that the date of the State Track and Field Meet at the University be Saturday, May 31, with the preceding day used as needed for tennis and golf preliminaries. Carried.

Agreed: That the Committee appointed to select the All State Tournament first and second teams be notified of their appointment and work by Zimmerman. Their names are purposely withheld from these minutes inasmuch as it seems inadvisable that publicity be given to the committee personnel. This in keeping with action of other years.

Agreed: That Bridgeford and Cassell be named as officials for the Consolation final game. Tighe to notify the former and White the latter; the usual fee to be paid.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson that the Board of Control allot the sum of \$150 for the securing of (?) famous coaching instructor for the University Coaching School to be develoed and directed by C. A. West at the University for the coming summer, provided that subsequent expenditures by the Board of Control for Clinics shall not be greater than \$250 in addition thus keeping within the usual \$400 total expenditure for Clinics. Carried.

Note: In this connection it was proposed that possibly H. V. Porter, executive secretary of the National Federation of State H. S. A. A.'s might be available for a Clinic in our state and from it smaller clinics could be scattered thru the state.

Agreed: That arrangements shall be made to permit the Wahpeton band to participate in the entertainment features of the Saturday evening tournament but not participate as a "pep band." There is a well founded tradition that there is to be only one official band for the tournament.

Motion made and carried that "it is not within the traditions nor for the best interests of the N. D. H. S. League that any trophies and awards be given at the State Tournament from any source other than the H. S. League itself."

Agreed: That the secretary, thru the News Letter give publicity to the University Coaching School to be held possibly the week prior to August 25 (time for opening football practice); with courses for eleven man football; for six man football; for basketball; and with emphasis on officiating as well as on coaching. It was also proposed that if the Conference Week for superintendent and principals could be placed at the same time, the courses may be made of special significance and interest to them also.

Agreed: That the News Letter give publicity to the forthcoming Central District Meeting of the Physical Education Association at Fargo, a meeting involving some 9 states.

On Friday the Board and Coaches met with the representatives of the Association of Commerce as guests, at luncheon.

On Saturday noon, the Board and Coaches met at luncheon as guests of the N. D. H. S. League.

At this meeting the Coaches Association presented the following three points:

- 1. It is recommended that a special reserved section be set aside for all coaches at both A and B Tournaments at a special price of one dollar and fifty cents for each tournament.
- 2. The coaches "adopted" the new backboards and recommended that the Board of Control require their use in all "A" schools.
- 3. It is recommended that the secretary send out notice to all coaches as to the time and place of any subsequent Clinic meetings.

At this meeting the East-West Conference made the following proposals:

- 1. That the fan shaped backboard be adopted.
- 2. That 10 players be allowed to constitute a tournament team.
- That the Board of Control adopt the Van Wyke system of ceding by Districts, as shown herewith.

PROPOSED PLAN OF CEDING FOR NORTH DAKOTA CLASS A BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT "THE VAN WYKE PLAN"

- The four teams needed for ceding wil be obtained in the following manner:
 - (a) District winners in District A, District B, and District C will be ceded.
 - (b) The fourth team will be selected by lot from the second place winner in District B and the second place winner in District C.
- 2. A draw will be conducted to determine which of the above teams will have places 1, 3, 5, and 7.
- 3. The other four teams will draw to determine who will have places 2, 4, 6, and 8.

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The above proposal was unanimously approved by those attending the East-West Conference Meeting.

- 4. Discussion on sending the same man to the Chicago rules meeting was tabled by the E. W. conference.
- 5. That the Board of Control allow contesting schools in the tournament to participate in the net proceeds (profits) of the tournament. Such apportionment of the net proceeds to be divided equally among the participating schools and that said proportion be left as to the amount to your board. (Signed, Ernie Gates).

Agreed: That N. D. H. S. League eligibility rules should be used not only at the H. S. contests at the University but in those held at the State College at Fargo as well, there being a little uncertainty as to the amount of attention given to the League rules in some of the inter-school events.

Discussion: Should there be a restriction on the giving of trophies and awards at District and Regional tournaments in basketball, from non-league sources? No action.

Discussion: What has become of the \$150 film in football, purchased by the League for use at the University coaching school a year or two ago? What can be done to get more value out of it? One man knew of a school asking for its use, and had no reply to his inquiry.

Discussion: What shall be done about the new backboards; the Board recognizes the merits of the new board, the trend in that direction but also sees the problems for some schools. No action.

Report: The secretary reports on (a) the meeting of the State H. S. A. A. secretaries at Atlantic City and an all day meeting of the National Federation also at Atlantic City. At the former meeting the League secretary spoke on the unsanitary practices in basketball and gym work in general, leading to some discussion. The same topic was discussed rather thoroly at the Bismarck meeting with the coaches, by a representative of the state health department.

Discussion: Compulsory physical examination before granting membership in the A. A. B. Fund; and before participation in athletics. Many states require such examinations for both purposes. No such requirement has been made yet in our state largely because of the expense involved, and the difficulty in many smaller towns of getting to a doctor. The League however urgently directs that such examinations should be made.

Discussion: The forthcoming Physical Education Convention at Fargo, April 2, 3, 4, 5. And how the League can help.

Discussion: How can the League get superintendents and principals and coaches to pay more attention to checking-in-advance the ages of their athletes?

Adjournment.

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Minot B Tournament Time, March 20, 21, 22, 1941

Present: Zimmerman, Roberts, Abrahamson. Tighe unable to attend. White ill.

Board members present held informal discussions without taking official action in most instances.

They examined proposed means of re-seating the parquet floor in order to increase capacity. The secretary had previously caused to be built two sets of experimental bleachers to hold three rows and to hold four rows instead of the present set-up which holds but two rows.

Board members met at the LaPlaza with coaches and informally discussed whatever problems any present felt inclined to present. The coaches seemed favorably inclined toward the fan shaped backboard.

It was agreed that the dates for tournaments next year correspond with those of 1941; and that the tournaments again be held at Bismarck and Minot.

It was agreed that Walker and Hertig be invited again to handle the A Tournament, subject to the vote of Mr. Tighe as absent member; and it was suggested that Hanson and Hoffman be named to handle the B Tournament.

Grand Forks, N. D., May 31, 1941

Morning session: Present, Zimmerman, Abrahamson, White.

- 1. Discussion: When should the medley relay race best be run in Track Meets. Conclusion: Let the question be submitted to the Coaches Association for their study and recommendation.
- 2. When should the Summer Conference be held? Agreed that in our judgment the best interests both of the Conference and of the Coaching School would be served if the Conference be held at the Coaching School time, i. e. in the week of August 17th instead of the proposed date of August 3rd. The University authorities are to be approached on the matter.
- 3. Shall Consolidated Schools be considered eligible to enter Track and Field Meets? Apparently there has never been a clear cut position taken on this. Several track records are held by boys from Non-H. S. League boys. On the one hand is it proper to reprive these athletes from this privilege; on the other hand what assurance is there that athletes from non-member schools are maintaining all or any rules of eligibility as do other boys? No action taken at this time.
- 4. The Inter-National Track and Field Meet at Regina, for the first week in July, has been cancelled. Again the Board questions the place and meaning of this meet for the N. D. H. S. League, which has upon occasion, once or twice, paid \$100 or a part thereof in its support. No action taken,
- 5. The football film owned by the League at a cost of \$150.00 kept at the U. N. D. does not seem to be used at all. Is there some way? No action taken.
 - 6. Should athletes be limited to ${\bf 3}$ events only, in all track and field

meets? This problem is turned over to the Coaches Association for their study and recommendation.

- 7. It is reported by some sporting goods salesmen some question is being raised by the fact that some Districts have this year paid \$10.35 for ball, and others have paid \$11.00. The secretary explains that a year ago one firm gave the \$10.35 price on a lesser ball, but this year gave the first grade ball. The League is paying \$11.00 to all firms for balls used in tournaments, but since word went out earlier in the year that certain districts would pay only \$10.35, the price was left that way—the League is making up the difference of 65c. It was agreed to publish this explanation in a News Letter.
- 8. For next year, it was further agreed that under specified numbers to identify them exactly, the Board would secure quotations on Wintark and Lasbilt balls from several companies, then let tournament managers get whatever ball seems most desired by their participating schools.
- 9. It was agreed that Mr. Gruenfelder of Mandan should represent the N. D. H. S. League at the midwinter Rules Committee meeting in Chicago.
- 10. Three athletes from Dickinson are invited to enter the A.A. U. meet in Minneapolis at the University. Is it proper for them to attend? No action taken, at this time.

Evening Meeting

Present: Tighe, Zimmerman, Abrahamson, White.

- 11. Dickinson case above, reviewed. Agreed Secretary would secure approval or dissaproval from National Federation office. Subsequently disapproved.
- 12. Board met with East-West Conference members and discussed problems of interest to both the Conference and the League as a whole. There is evidence of a wholesome loyalty to the interests of the League and a desire to co-operate with the League thru its Board of Control in all matters. This is a matter of some moment, for in an adjacent state, the larger schools at one time practically withdrew from their League to set up an independent organization of their own.
- 13. A discussion of the proposed adoption of the new backboard brought the following conclusion, by a motion by Abrahamson and seconded by Zimmerman: That the State A Tournament will use the new backboard; and the B schools shall be polled by the secretary to determine the preference of the majority, with the understanding that a proposal to use the new backboard for B schools should be supported by a very substantial majority indicating that preference.

- 14. Discussion again, about the eligibility of athletes from Non-League schools in the various track and field meets. No action taken; held for a subsequent meeting.
- 15. Where shall the next State Track and Field Meet, be held? Reference made to Jamestown's new stadium, as well as to Bismarck's probable interest. No action was taken. It was felt that perhaps the League itself should determine the location, as it has been doing in the past several years.
- 16. Discussion of Tournaments and officials. Reference was made to the Board's earlier action in placing the tournaments at Bismarck and Minot. It was agreed that Hertig and Walker be again invited to handle the A Tournament; with no action taken on proposed men for the B Tournament.
- 17. Clinics. It was agreed that we would not expect to hold Clinics this year, like last year, inasmuch as at the Coaching School a significant major Clinic will be held, under the leadership of H. V. Porter. It was agreed that an effort should be made to gain an attendance of officials at the Friday meeting of the Coaching School.
- 18. The secretary was authorized to confer with Dean Breitwiszer by phone (tried several times) or by mail, urging the placing of the Conference during the week of August 17th, to coincide with the Coaching School.
- 19. The secretary was authorized to write a letter of criticism and admonition to Supt. Johnson of Kenmare on the grounds of laxity in using thruout a basketball season and even in the state tournament of 1940 a lad whose birthday was so questionable as to bring grave doubts as to his eligibility. According to school records during the last half dozen years of school attendance indicate the boy's age such as to make him eligible; but earlier school records differ; and records of the census and of the school filed with the county superintendent make the birthtdate very uncertain at least. The secretary asks that Supt. Johnson be given opportunity to secure a "deferred birth certificate," if possible; granted.

Scattered Items Of Interest

A. Summary of Rules Governing Interscholastic Contests.

The Director of Physical Education and the Director of Research of the Portland, Oregon, Public Schools has just distributed their results of their study of all the rules of all the states, governing interscholastic contests. Their findings are interesting and significant, and may well be a guide to our own League.

- 1. There is some tendency to lower the eligible age to 19. At the present time 7 states permit a lad to play up to his 21st birthday; 31 states, including North Dakota, put the limit as 20; while 9 give 19 as the age limit. Virginia uses 20½ as the limit. It is the southern states that retain the 21 year limit; and it is the eastern and far western that trend toward the 19 year limit.
- The problem of amateur standing is settled in most states.
 Only North Dakota, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Vermont have failed to demand proven amateur standing.
- 3. Eighteen states have limited the value of awards that can be given to athletics to one dollar. North Dakota is included in this list by tradition though our Constitution does not make the specific limitation. Twenty eight states have no ruling. One has a \$2.00 limit; one a \$3.00 limit.
- 4. A most question has been whether interscholastic competition shall be allowed for girls. The Womens Division of the National Amateur Association raises a strong voice against it. In 31 states it is allowed; in 5 it is definitely prohibited; in 4, including North Dakota, no pronouncement has been made.
- 5. The requirement of a medical examination before the athletic participation can begin is made in 28 states, but is not required in North Dakota and 10 other states.
- 6. Georgia permits not more than one football game a week or not more than 2 basketball games a week. Kansas limits football to 10 games for the season, and 18 basketball games make a season limit. Missouri uses 10 and 16 for limits in football and basketball, while New York uses 7 and 6 respectively as the limits. The problem of unduly heavy schedules however has been given much more consideration than this brief report would indicate. There seems to be a growing feeling particularly in basketball that there is a tendency to overdo the good game. The North Dakota season is very long and a single game a week from the middle of November thru most of March, together with a second game some weeks, and the several tournaments make a very imposing schedule for some schools.

- 7. Twenty one states require game officials to be registered.
- 8. Eleven states still permit boys to play on high school teams and other teams besides at the same time; but North Dakota and 31 others do not, a few states as yet having given the matter no thought apparently.
- 9. Ten states require a statement of parental consent before a boy can participate in athletics. In our state we strongly recommend it, you will recall, but apparently few schools do much about it. The plan might prove an excellent safeguard to some school man some day.
- 10. New York State alone permits post graduates to participate in interscholastic games, but since it has a 19 year age limit, the permission does not mean a great deal.
 - 11. Twenty eight states do not permit post season games.
- 12. The question of required attendance for the previous semester is poorly answered in the questionnaire, for in other states as with us the requirement differs with circumstances. For instance, it is not required for the first semester in the 9th grade; nor in the case of a transferred pupil when his parents move to a new school town.
- 13. Maryland is the only state that does not have a scholastic requirement. Presumably most states have the two as do we: the passing of at least 3 subjects the past previous semester of attendance and the carrying of at least 3 during the present semester.
- 14. Practically all states limit participation to the normal 8 semesters.
- 15. 9 states prohibit spring football. Presumably this refers to spring football practice as well as play, tho the point is not clear.
- 16. 28 states report they hold state championships. Since South Dakota reports "No," and we know they have their basketball championship tournaments, the meaning of the question becomes uncertain.
- 17. The transfer rule is an interesting one. If parents move, the athlete is immediately eligible in practically all states; while in 2 states he is eligible only after 2 weeks, and in one state is eligible only after a year of attendance. But if his parents do not move then he is immediately eligible only in New Hampshire; while in 9 states he is not eligible for a full year; in 12 states he is eligible after a "term" (semester?) of attendance; in 4 or 5 other states he must attend from 12 to 30 weeks.
- 18. Practically all states limit participation to 4 seasons, but there are variations not shown in the study. For instance in our own state as you remember, we do not count participation below the 9th grade;

and we do not permit participation if the 7th and 8th semesters are not consecutive.

It will be seen that on the whole our state eligibility rules are right in line with those of other states, as may be expected since the general recommendations of the National Federation are rather closely followed everywhere.

Consequently the N. D. H. S. League should always look carefully into proposed eligibility rules that vary far from those recommended by the National Federation or in use by other states.

B. The National Federation of State H. S. Association.

The National Federation has now come of age! Starting in 1920 as the "Midwest Federation" its charter members were Illinois, Iowa, Michigan and Wisconsin, it now has connections with 37 states repreenting the interests of 20,000 high schools. This teamwork has enabled the high schools in a united way to formulate policies and develop plans for improving athletic conditions. It is possibly the organization that represents the "largest organized body of athletics in the world," according to Major John L. Griffith.

Its first interests had to do with unifying eligibility rules among schools and among states. Then the sanctioning of inter-state meets came into the picture with their attendant problems.

No other organization of any kind has ever studied sports and athletics from the standpoint of the welfare of the high school athlete so thoroly as has the Federation.

Very definite contributions have been made by the Federation as follows: A reduction in the size of the football and basketball making both more adaptable to the size of school boys' hands; the revolutionary development of the 'molded ball' in basketball and a similar attempt for football; the change to the 39" hurdle; the new small size discus; the shorter low hurdle race; the analysis of athletic injuries and attempts toward better protective athletic gear; changes in rules particularly in football and basketball in the interests of high school boys; uniform interpretation of rules and uniform methods of game administration thru training of officials, athletic managers and coaches; raising of standards of coaching and playing ethics and of general sportsmanship—these represent some of the accomplishments of this unique organization.

Many of us do not realize that the National Federation each year puts out more than 100,000 books on football and basketball, and even these are supplemented by many bulletins of further information—last year over 45,000 printed basketball bulletins went to the various high schools.

While the Federation has no direct connection with the 23 states and their Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, its very existence has made it the normal clearing house for information and assistance.

Among the men of the nation listed in the March issue of the Athletic Journal as having been prominent in the growth of the Federation is B. C. Tighe, long time president of our own State League.

C. Strength and Civilization.

Under this topic Major John L. Griffith has recently pointed out the contribution that sports and athletics may make toward national welfare and national defense.

In these modern days when high school boys have few "chores" to do at home during the school year, and when "jobs" are hard to get at any time, it is in sports and athletics alone that tens of thousands of boys can find outlet for their physical energies, and opportunities for physical training. Organized sports mean more than the mere filling of the empty spaces in boys' lives. Who can give adequate measure to the values in physical health and in social and moral welfare to be found in well organized sports and athletic competitions. Hard training, hard play, hard competition while perhaps best presented in "the good old days" when the forefathers and pioneers had a great deal of physical labor to do, find their modern counterpart in sports. Some one has said: "All history is the story of people's going uphill in wooden shoes, and coming down on the other side in silk stockings." There are very real values in hard training, in hard play, in hard competition. And it is our belief that sports and athletics can and do accomplish much to keep this generation from becoming 'soft,' easy, non-competitive. Athletes must wear "wooden shoes." They must learn to fight; to give and take; to take punishment; to win and lose; to sacrifice.

We contend that organized sports and athletics stand between tens of thousands of worthy youth and degenerating softness, and as such merit the fullest support not only of game fans, but of patriots as well.

The Des Moines Register believes that college and high school athletics have definite outcomes. Favorable outcomes. Of the 83,000 Iowans classified at the time, 1,353 were college students. One out of four failed to merit a A-1 classification because of physical defects, while only one out of ten of the collegians failed to make this rating.

Schools do much. But there is so much to be done. Let's check our own communities. Is it our own school organization maintained at the expense of many thousands of dollars, or is it the W. P. A. or N. Y. A.; is it our trained physical education leaders, or is it some jobless young people on government assignment—that are heading up our recreational programs! All honor to the N. Y. A. or W. P. A. people who are doing the best they can, often enough a pretty good job, but where are the schools, where are the trained physical educationists! Is the leadership where it belongs? Is the leadership being accepted or is it being shunted? Are we tending to let competitive games push aside community recreational activities?

3. The Fan Shaped Backboard.

At the present writing the Board of Control has directed the use of the fanshaped backboard for the Class A Tournament, following the judgment of many of the Class A school superintendents and coaches.

But for the B Tournament, there has been no clear cut demand, hence the Board of Control sent out a post card questionnaire with the assumption that unless there were a well defined demand from a strong majority of schools no change would be ordered for the forth-coming year. The votes thus far show 23% are "indifferent;" 33% favor the new backboards; and 44% oppose the backboard change. If the same proportion continues, presumably no change will be made for 1942.

The National Federation officials are definite in their conviction that it is but a matter of time when the new backboard will be used everywhere. The new board is not only official, but by recent action of the Federation authorities is definitely recommended for installation in all new gyms, and in all others where the change can readily be made.

There has been some misunderstanding about the new steel backboard. The steel is incidental. A wooden backboard of the proper size and shape is entirely legal and official. In fact some schools are cutting down their old boards to the appropriate dimensions and finding them very satisfactory. In one school, the boys rather prefer the wood backboard (cut down from an old pair) to the steel boards—tho everyone remarks that there is little significant difference.

4. H. S. League Rules of Eligibility and Standards.

Presumably all school men in North Dakota and all school athletes are conversant with the "Rules of Eligibility."

But are we equally familiar with the "League Standards?"

Under Section XI on the back of the Eligibility Sheets the standards are printed and are as follows:

- (A) Every athlete shall be given a thorough physical examination before the opening of the athletic season.
- (B) Parental consent shall be secured before the participation of any athlete.
- (C) Proof in advance shall establish the age of every 9th semester student before participation.
- (D). Every student participating in interscholastic contests shall abstain from the use of tobacco and alcoholic beverages.

The obvious purpose of the first two standards is to protect both the boy and the school authorities. There may be a few communities where the physical check-up in advance represents some difficulties because of the lack of a resident physician. But there are always ways and means of doing right things. In most schools there is no good excuse at all for not maintaining these standards—and apparently ever increasing number of schools are doing this.

The third standard is for the protection of the player, the school and the League. A number of instances have been known where if the application of the same vigor and enthusiasm to establish a lad's birthdate after the season was over, had been applied prior to the opening of the season, a great deal of annoyance would have been avoided. It is not the responsibility of League officials or opposing schools to prove that a given lad is over age; the responsibility is upon the local school always to prove that the lad is of the right age.

There seems to be reason to feel that some sag has followed the removal of the anti-tobacco and anti-alcoholic beverage prohibition from the Rules of Eligibility and placing it among the Standards. The obvious intention was to throw the responsibility more definitely upon the local school with the thought and hope that local pride and honor would care for these serious problems better than under the former plan when each school was tempted to check the other, and no two schools felt full confidence in the other's application of the rule. But there should be no letup on this Standard. Tobacco and alcohol are not good for boys. Every coach knows this. Every superintendent and principal know this. Every fan knows it. Laxity on the part of the schools brings criticism on the schools, even from fans. There are all too few influences left to safeguard boys from tobacco and alcohol. Here is a chance for the schools. Here is a responsibility not to be lightly disregarded. Let's tighten up our belts.

5. Athletic Injuries.

Two years ago a study of injuries in athletics among 51,500 boys was made; and the past year a similar study covered 64,000 boys. That football particularly, is a hazardous game cannot be denied.

Students of the game conclude there is little more change that can be made for safety's sake, without changing its intrinsic character. The kick-off for instance, fertile as it is in bringing accidents, cannot be as lightly thrown aside as can the center jump in basketball. Fracture accidents at the rate of 33 per 1,000 cannot be passed over lightly. A like percentage in the science classes or industrial arts courses would bring serious criticism upon the curriculum-makers.

We want football. We want our virile youth prepared to stand up as men under vigorous physical competition. Not muscles alone, but attitudes and principles are formed in the days of youth, and experienced men of all generations have always known the beneficial part athletes may play in the training of youth. But at the same time, there is the definite obligation to make the game as safe as human intelligence can make it.

Here are some significant procedures: (1) Let every boy be given a thoro physical examination before he enters competitive play, or practice for it. (2) See that playing conditions on the field are the best possible—good turf, no frozen ground, no snow, nor sticks, stones or broken glass; (3) Secure the best possible protective equipment—the newer type of softer fibrous guards and the more resilient sponge rubber. (4) A complete adherence at all times to the safety factors already in the rules—use of headgear, warming up periods, etc.

But fracture accidents are of course not the only ones. A New York State study showed that while there were 38 fracture cases per thousand boys, there were 97½ other injuries per thousand, making an injury ratio of 136 per thousand. And other studies indicate that the Six Man Football game is no less hazardous than its older brother, the eleven man game.

The point of this study is not antagonistic to the great game of football; but rather to urge upon all lovers of the sport, the necessity of providing every possible safeguard.

Report of the League Treasurer

In order to keep the printer in copy it is necessary to make a preliminary report of the year's finances without waiting for the official audit by the certified public accountant. Hence this present report will be made in round numbers.

The year has been a good one in finances, as our League years regularly are now. The annual income is fairly well stabilized, coming

from main sources:-Membership dues and the two State Tournaments.

With the hope that a question and answer type of report may prove more readable and answer some questions that may be in League members' minds, the report is presented in the following form:

1. Is it good business and necessary to continue to pile up a large reserve each year?

It might possibly be good business, but at least it is not being done. The annual expenditures are now purposely kept by the Board of Control very close to the income. The year's receipts were about \$6,625.00 and the year's expenditures about \$6,750.00.

2. Do not the annual membership fees, and the tournament fees just about finance the League, leaving the net profits from the State Tournaments for a profit?

Probably no one could really think this. No other state runs on such small membership fees, we believe. The 225 members for 1940-41, paid \$305.00 in membership fees, for it is to be remembered that most of the schools pay only the dollar membership fee, while 32 paid the \$2.00 fee, and 25 paid the \$3.00 fee. To this may be added \$13.00 for penalties for late fees as provided by League rulings.

As for the tournament fees for the District Tournaments, they are for the use of the Tournament Committes who make an accounting to the Tournament manager and turn over to him any unused balance. The League treasury gets none.

3. Do not the District and Regional Tournaments and the games for determining entrants into the A Tournament for the East-West Conference turn in a good balance to the League Treasury?

The answer is that years ago, when the large schools took part in the several District and Regional Tournaments, there were considerable profits from these Tournaments. But now with the divided A and B classifications, most District Tournaments have all they can do to pay out, as is shown each year in the Yearbook reports. Districts are now authorized to keep their own profits tho most of them have none. This year \$60.90 has been turned in to the League treasury as net balances from District or Regional Tournaments, and the amounts are held in credit for those Districts or Regions.

The profits if any from the East-West Conference teams in their playoffs to locate the eight entrants into the State A Tournament are divided among the participants according to Conference plans.

4. Just how large are the profits from the A Tournament and the B Tournament?

The A Tournament has financed the State H. S. League for a good many years. In the last few years the B Tournament is self supporting and even turns in a small but helpful profit to the League. The financial story of the Tournaments is printed year by year in the Yearbooks. This year the A Tournament gave the League a net profit of \$2,558.40, and the B Tournament a net profit of \$336.20; this in each instance after repaying \$173.44 to the League to cover cost of trophies and awards. These are the moneys that keep the League going. Without this income, the League must fold up. On Page 70 of the 1940 Yearbook is shown a summary of the A Tournament incomes since 1926. Each year the details have been published.

5. How about the trophies and balls; doesn't the League make a considerable profit on them?

Each District in basketball is billed for whatever trophies they use in an amount sufficient to refund to the League, the approximate cost. There is possibly an undercharge rather than an overcharge for the secretary has no way of knowing accurately what the varying carriage charges are. The State Tournaments pay the full cost; but no more,

In football, it is all a matter of expense to the League just as in track.

The same situation holds in balls, except that for the State Tournaments the managers bought balls direct, as was also done in scattered instances in Districts where an extra ball or two might have been needed. There was this year a little mix-up over the price of balls. Some Districts paid \$10.35, some \$10.70 as per word sent them for such was our understanding. But in straightening the matter out, the League paid the larger amount for all balls since word had gone to some Districts that balls would be only \$10.35. In this year, as in other years, sometimes the managers have paid for the transportation on balls and sometimes not—as will be seen by glancing thru the Yearbooks' accounts of the District tournaments for a series of years. But when a District has sent in a given amount whether \$10.35 or any other amount, the League Treasurer has no way of collecting more, for by that time the District moneys have all been paid out.

There was a time when the League secretary was authorized to purchase a certain number of balls and sell them, at cost, to schools. This was many years ago when the Dubow ball was first being presented thru the National Federation, when it was sold for a price about two-thirds of other official balls. That Dubow ball is no longer manufactured.

This year, the League has received \$566.80 from the Districts for balls and trophies; \$87.30 from the Regions; \$379.00 from the two

State Tournaments for equal sets of trophies, the A Tournament paying \$32.20 for balls, and the B Tournament buying balls direct from the Minot wholesaler. This totals \$1,033.10 to offset an expenditure of \$1,686.46 by the League for balls and trophies for the basketball tournaments, and for trophies and awards for Football and Track championships. The balls cost \$365.76; Football trophies cost \$71.47 including a replacement; the basketball trophies for 16 Districts and two state tournaments cost \$734.07; and the Track trophies and awards for the eight District and state meets cost \$514.26. The excess cost amounting to some \$550.00 comes of course from the profits of the A and B State basketball tournaments.

6. What about the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund; is that a pretty heavy drag on the League finances, or does it make a nice profit each year?

Last year's Yearbook told the rather complete story of the A. A. B. Fund to date at that time in the annual C. P. A. audit and on Pages 17, 18, and 19.

This year conditions are much the same. For the football season about 1,150 boys paid their dollars, and accident-payments amounted to about \$1,020.00. For the Six Man game @ 75c about \$695.00 were paid in and about \$590.00 paid out. For basketball, @ 50c each about \$380.00 was received and about \$122.00 paid out. In other words this has been a good season for the Fund and the A. A. B. Fund has made a gain over last year. For physical education classes, track and hockey all together, some \$14.00 were received and \$5.00 paid out. It seems a bit odd that more advantage is not taken of the 25c fee for protection thruout the entire year in physical education classes. To be sure the hazards are not great, yet what school has not found itself embarrassed some time or other, by an injury in gym class, with the parent feeling the school or the instructor or some one should be held responsible since the class is officially required. It has been fairly well established in law that a school board as such can not be sued, and that individual instructors may be held responsible when any form of negligence can be established.

It is appropriate to add that the A.A. B. Fund movement is growing rapidly, having met with great success everywhere, until today some 20 or more states are conducting some form of A.A.B. Fund.

7. Are there other minor sources of income?

Yes. The League received \$13.00 from schools that neglected to pay their annual dues. Announcement is made in each Yearbook and thru the News Letters. But—each year some schools forget, or that George had taken care of it. Or something.

Then the League owns some interest bearing bonds as per the C. P. A. Audit; and has received \$56.12 in interest on those bonds. In addition to these U. S. Treasury Bonds, the League owns some U. S. Savings Bonds which pay interest only thru accrued value, a \$75.00 bond (cost) maturing at \$100.00 in 10 years thus netting a little over 3% interest. In addition the League has, as per the audit report a nice balance in savings protected by the Federal Government, and these savings bring a 1% annual interest which is returned to the savings account.

Then some good school men send an extra nickel or dime with their checks to pay the bank exchange—.An even dollar has been received this year in this way.

8. Are the office expenses pretty high?

Probably the answer to this is a matter of opinion. The League secretary is paid \$700.00 in salary. The three adjacent states have full time secretaries. South Dakota has an organization very much like our own in size, in activities, in number of members and in budget. The salary and office expenses there of course are considerably higher. Presumably the service rendered by the office is proportionately increased.

Then the Board of Control allows the secretary up to \$100 a year for office help. He never spends that much. This year he will have spent a little less than \$70.00.

About \$30.00 were spent for scattered office supplies and \$160.00 for stamps, envelopes and package postage.

About \$775.00 were spent for various types of printing; including \$130.43 last summer for rule books, and \$148.75 for this fall's rule books; \$375.00 for the Yearbooks (500 copies); \$28.20 for National Federation materials for use with the Basketball Clinics; and the remainder for printing of blanks, envelopes and the like.

Every school receives each fall for its membership fee whether it be \$1.00, \$2.00 or \$3.00 a supply of printed matter that has cost the League a good deal more than the membership fee. The bill for printing is more than double the receipts for dues.

In the secretary's books about \$155.00 of expense is listed under the heading of miscellaneous. In this are included \$3.33 for the safety deposit box rental; \$25.00 for the bond of the secretary-treasurer; \$70.00 for long distance phones; \$20.00 for telegrams; \$25.00 for the annual audit; \$7.50 annual dues; and a little more for express and minor items.

9. What about the expenses and salaries of the members of the Board of Control?

Only the secretary receives any compensation whatever. The Board members usually forget to put in a bill even for their correspondence which at times of the year gets pretty heavy. Board members do receive their expenses when they attend Board meetings except for the meeting held in connection with the State Education Association that they would attend anyway.

This year's book show nearly \$2,200.00 charged against the Board of Control, but this is readily misleading. Perhaps the salary of the secretary should be charged against his office rather than against the Board of Control, even tho he is a member of the Board. Then probably the \$100 paid to the Manager of the State A Tournament and the \$50 paid the Manager of the State B Tournament should be charged against those tournaments rather than against the Board of Control. Again, the expense of the Clinics last year might well have been charged against some other account, but were charged against the Board of Control since the Board authorized them. The cost was about \$100.00 to send the four men to the Minneapolis meeting and around \$300.00 for the various District Clinic meetings held by these men in our state. Another charge made against the Board of Control is for the Board-and-Coaches luncheons held at the time of the two state Tournaments, about 25 men attending the B luncheon and about 40 attending the A luncheon. An added payment of about \$20.00 was made to L. F. Rice who a year ago had attended a Six Man Rules Committee meeting, and found less of his expenses had been cared for from other sources than he had anticipated. In recent years the Board has been sending one member to the annual National Federation meeting held in connection with the the mid-winter N .E. A. This year the secretary, financed by his Board of Education for that meeting, was sent to a northwestern meeting of the Naional Federation at Spokane, at an expense of \$75.00. One other word of explanation, this year's total of about \$2,200.00 includes an overlapping of \$500.00 of last year's salary paid after last year's audit that really belonged to last year's accounting. A \$5.00 film rental for a sectional N. D. E. A. meeting; a \$20.00 added expense account for Grand Forks players that had been held over by the storm; a \$5.00 W. P. A. labor item for a seating experiment at the B tournament; about \$25.00 for representative at national football rules meeting-represent scattered other expenses charged against the Board of Control. The remainder of the amount is in reality the only proper charge against the Board, and covers their expenses as they attended a total of five official Board meetings.

10. At one time the League authorized the laying aside of \$1,000 for the support of the A. A. B. Fund. Has this amount been used up?

The League did make such an authorization, but each year the A. A. B. Fund has just about held its own. Page 24 of last year's

Yearbook shows by the C. P. A. audit that the A. A. B. Fund to date had spent \$6.15 in all its departments (basketball, football, etc.), for the several years of its existence, more than it had taken in. The A. A. B. Fund is kept separate from other League moneys only in the book-keeping. This year it appears that all departments of the A. A. B. Fund will have made a little net gain, so this loss of \$6.15 will be wiped out. In other words the original \$1,000 is still intact.

11. Just how well are the League's funds invested and how well are they protected?

The Board of Control has felt that safety for the League's funds is more important than large returns. All League funds are protected by the Federal Government. "As long as the government still stands in Washington," we are entirely safe. Last year's audit shows our moneys are in four investments:—U. S. Treasury bonds drawing $3\frac{1}{4}\%$ and $3\frac{1}{6}\%$; in U. S. Savings maturing in 10 years drawing $3\frac{1}{6}\%$ interest; in Savings Account on the Union National Bank of Minot, a member of the First Bank Stock Corporation and protected up to \$5,000.00 by the Federal Government; and in checking account in the same bank, and protected in like manner.

The Board of Control and League may well be proud of its record of investments. In all its years, the League's only loss was in connection with the Mandan Farmers State Bank, where the League presumably still has an equity of \$421.88, after several 10% dividend payments in a series of years since the closing of the bank. There is said to be a fair chance of some further payments, tho none have been received this year.

12. Would it be possible for League members to consult the treasurer's books?

The secretary-treasurer invites an inspection of the books by any one at any time. Despite the acknowledged fact that he is an inferior penman, being a school-teacher, the books are entirely accurate as attested by the monthly balancing with the bank statements and by the annual audit by the certified public accounant. Until the past several years, committees from the League membership used to "audit" the books at the annual meeting, and patient as they might be their audit was more in the nature of a "scanning" and general approval than a thoro audit. The C. P. A. audit involves the checking of every check, of every receipt, of every voucher, of every bank entry, of every book-record, of every deposit, of every bank statement. Mr. F. E. Luehe, C. P. A. of Minot, receives \$25.00 for the annual audit; the making of audits is his profession.

Note by Secretary-Treasurer:—

Since C. P. A. audits are not much more lucid to many of us than bank reports I venture to point out the following several highlights:

- (a) The investments of the N. D. H. S. League are identical with those of last year, all in Federal securities, either Treasury bonds or Savings bonds. The Treasury bonds of 1941 mature in August and will be replaced by Defense Bonds. The U. S. Savings Bonds, the kind you buy at the postoffice are listed at their cost value and the year 1937 or 1939 refers to the year in which they were purchased, hence their present value is increased by about 3% beyond that. They mature in 10 years from date of purchase and pay interest only by accrued value. All investments are protected by the Federal Government,
- (b) The A. A. B. Fund shows a net gain to date of \$535.35 as compared with a net loss of \$6.15 as shown on Page 24 of last year's

Yearbook. Basketball receipts were increased by over \$150.00; and the claims were some \$15.00 less. Football receipts were increased by \$60.00 and claims were over \$200.00 less. In the Six Man game while claims were increased, receipts were enough greater to make the net loss over a hundred dollars less than a year ago. The other items show little change. This is really a remarkable showing and the significant thing is not the balance on hand, but the actual payment of over \$1,732.00 to care for the bills of injured athletes. Keeping within the restrictions of the A. A. B. Fund Plan as adopted by the League itself, the Board of Control has paid every claim presented to it, within the meaning of the plan.

(c) The status of the checking account is shown by the item under Union National Bank June 30, 1941, \$2,249.83 from which is to be subtracted the amount of the outstanding checks, \$706.34. The balance on hand, \$1,543.49, shows the League has a little more than held its own with last year when the balance was \$1,768.04 but with \$500.00 at that time still to pay on the secretary's salary. In summary, the financial condition of the League is bettered slightly, in the amount of \$275.45. Summer time expenses in connection with the Coaching School will represent a new investment but will replace the amount previously spent for Clinics. The Board of Control spends money freely for the betterment of the League as is shown in the Treasurer's running report but there is reason to believe that the League is making excellent headway under this spending program.



THE NEW FAN-SHAPED BACKBOARD

Just as other states have done, we are herewith presenting a cut secured from the National Federation Office, showing how an old rectangular backboard can be changed into the new fanshaped board assuming that all schools will be interested in it at least academically and perhaps some schools will desire to experiment with the change at least for cross court practice boards.

In Minot, a pair of rectangular backboards was changed with W. P. A. labor by following a design from the cardboard cutouts that were sent as face protection for a new pair of steel fanshaped backboards. The men designed their own form of braces and supports and apparently encountered no difficulties whatever and some of the

players seem to prefer the wooden made-over backboards to the new steel boards. At least they are decidedly more than a makeshift.

At this writing, the last of June, 38 schools indicate a preference for the new board, 17 oppose it, 17 are indifferent, 1 carefully returned a card with no mark, 1 could not consult the coach, but well over a hundred have made no reply, and this is taken to mean that they are not eager to make the change at this time, in keeping with the letter accompanying the cards as they were sent out.

The National Federation feels that there is no question about the growing use of the new backboard. It is already in required use in a number of states. The Federation directs its use in new gyms and in renovated gyms. The forthcoming experience among the A schools will doubtless prove of value in our state.

The Schutt Manufacturing Company of Litchfield, Illinois, is said to have plans and designs helpful to a manual training department for making or making over wood fanshaped backboards.
