The League Calendar

NOTE PARTICULARLY:-

ALL MEMBERSHIPS EXPIRE September 30th, and are renewed only by specific payment of dues.

The fee is \$1.00 for towns under 1,000 population; \$2.00 for towns between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for towns over 2,000.

BUT IF dues are not paid by November 1st they shall be doubled and if not paid by December 1st, they shall be increased by \$5.00. Further, no memberships shall be accepted after January first.

AND:—Dues cannot be accepted if your OFFICIAL ELIGIBILITY BLANKS HAVE NOT BEEN FILED WITH THE SECRETARY.

What To Do In

SEPTEMBER:

- (a) Pay the dues at once; secure all League blanks thereby, and athletic books.
- (b) Join the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, to protect your school, and your boys:—\$1.00 for football, 75c for six man football. Explain the Fund to all athletes.
- (c) Have a physical examination of all boys preparing to participate in athletics.
- (e) Begin at once to check player's eligibility:—Age, semesters of attendance, seasons of attendance, and scholastic records the past semester particularly. Watch 9th semester athletes' ages.
- (f) Get an early start on the SIX MAN FOOTBALL.
- (g) Give special attention to the tobacco and beer rule, right from
- (h) Why not a special "For-the-good-of-athletics" assembly, early in September.
- (i) See News Letters for the Football Tournament Plans.

OCTOBER:

- (a) Hurry and pay the membership fee. After October 31 the membership fee is doubled.
- (b) A good time now to think about the Accident Benefit Fund, for Basketball at 50c per boy.
- (c) At N. D. E. A. time, the Annual Fall meeting is the big meeting of the League year. This is the time to bring in all sorts of well thought out plans and suggestions. Send coaches to the athletic clinic.

NOVEMBER:

- (a) Start your plans from the first, for the never-varying custom in all contests, and particularly in basketball, of (a) exchanging Eligibility Sheets; and (b) Contracts.
- (b) If your dues are still unpaid, HURRY UP, for after the last day of November dues are increased by five dollars. Too bad, too.
- (c) Enroll basketball boys in A. A. B. Fund at 50c.

DECEMBER:

- (a) If your membership fee has not been paid before the end of this month, you are out of the League.
- (b) Class B schools better send in their \$2.00 Tournament Fees to District Chairman now for it has to be doubled after the 15th of next month. You might forget it.
- (c) With basketball right on us, why not check again every possible representative of your school on all eligibility points; complete the physical examinations; really secure parental consent; protect the boys with the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund; hold a special assembly to talk about all eligibility rules; with special bearing on the tobacco and beer rule. Watch all ninth semester boys for ages.
- (d) Yes, the League has adopted a Committee Report, urging against interscholastic competitive contests for girls. It is not prohibited however, by our League as has been done in some states.

JANUARY:

- (a) Too late to join the League now.
- (b) Pay up your Tournament Entry Fees of \$2.00 (Class B Schools) before the 15th, and save the \$2.00 penalty. Send it to your District Tournament Chairman.
- (c) Did you actually complete—the physical examination; parental permission for participation; athletic assembly; membership in A. A. Benefit Fund—and other good resolutions—or are you merely paving some more (with good intentions)?

FEBRUARY:

- (a) Tournament entry fee is doubled now (\$4.00), but still can be received by the 15th. Hurry it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.
- (b) Avoid the end-of-the-season embarrassment to your school and team, by making certain before the Tournaments are any nearer, that there is no possible eligibility question about any of your contestants.
- (c) Why not write to your Tournament Committee giving suggestions for tournaments.

MARCH:

- (a) "A" Tournament, March 11-12-13. "B" Tournament, March 18-19-20.
- (b) With the closing of the basketball season you are preparing your data for the Official Eligibility Report, whereon you list the record of absolutely every lad who has represented your school in any inter-scholastic basketball contest, however unimportant, on any team.

APRIL:

- (a) Track time begins. The League is making a strenuous effort to develop track and field work. Get your lads in as many meets as you can. It is a fine spring sport.
- (b) Unless otherwise notified, any Track Meet large enough to have 6 League schools entered, if an open meet, automatically becomes an Official Qualifying Meet for any subsequent State Meet. Qualifying events must have at least 3 contestants; and 1st and 2nd place winners are eligible for the "State" Meets.
- (c) Have you considered the Athletic Accident Fund protection for your track and field boys? It has frequently saved some school embarrassment, and helped lads pay injury bills.

MAY:

(a) Classified High Schools, whether 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or whatever size in enrollment must be League members to participate in any kind of Inter-scholastic contest—athletic, music, declamation, etc.—whether held in a County Festival, or a State University or elsewhere. Lines are to be more rigidly drawn than heretofore. League Eligibility Rules apply.

Summary of Significant Dates

September 30th. All memberships expire at midnight.

November 30th. Memberships paid after this date cost \$5.00 additional.

December 31st. No membership can be received after this date.

Dead line! Tournament Entry Fee of \$2.00 is due. Pay it to your District Tournament Committee Chairman.

January 15th. Tournament Entry Fee doubled to \$4.00 after this date.

February 15th. Tournament Fee not accepted after this date. Dead line!

The Annual Meeting of the N. D. H. S. League

OCTOBER 30, 1941, MINOT, N. D.

Place: The High School Study Hall.

Present: About 100 representatives of about 75 schools. B. C. Tighe, presiding.

- 1. Report of the Secretary Treasurer, made by reference to its publication in the Annual Yearbook, and scattered throughout the membership by mail. Motion made, seconded and carried that the reports be accepted as printed.
- 2. President Tighe names the following nominating committee for Board of Control member to succeed L. A. White for three year term: Supt. Hagen of Dickinson, Supt. Estensen of Cooperstown, Supt. Grimsrud of Lisbon, Supt. Ensrud of Grafton, Supt. Havig of Rugby.

3. Order of old business:

- a. Committee to report application of eligibility rules to National Guardsmen. No member present at the time to make report.
- b. Committee to report on possible change in Class B football tournament plans. No report called for since Committee and Board of Control had previously publicized changes, put into effect this fall.
- c. Supt. Havig of Rugby presents for second reading a previously presented amendment to Article 6 Section 10 as shown on page 10 of the 17th (1941) Yearbook, the point of which would be to make a pupil transferring from one high school to another in the same city ineligible for a year after his transfer.

Since Mr. Zimmerman has an item of new business that seems to bear rather directly upon this proposed amendment he asks and receives permission to present the following resolution:

(a) "Resolved that for purposes of basketball competition in all cities of 10,000 population or over, private or parochial

schools shall be classified as "A" schools and shall determine by season or by tournament play as the schools may decide, a school from their number for further competition among the "A" schools. (b) The school so selected shall have the right to challenge any one of the eight A schools which may be chosen in pretournament contests for the right to enter the State A tournament. (c) However no "A" school shall be challenged for two consecutive years in which such "A" school shall appear in the group of "A" schools selected to appear in the State A Tournament. That is a school challenged shall not again be challenged until it shall have appeared at least once in the State A Tournament. (d) The game to be played between the challenging and the challenged schools shall be held in one of the two cities in which the two schools are located unless with the approval of both schools another place is chosen. Should the two schools be unable to agree on the place for holding the game, then such place shall be determined by lot. (e) This resolution shall in no way affect the right of any member school of the League to arrange games among themselves throughout the season before the tournament games take place.

Motion: By Zimmerman, seconded by Jacobson that the foregoing resolution be adopted.

Amendment to proposed resolution, offered by Beleal to the effect that the same resolution apply to Class B eleven man football.

However since the amendment would materially change the details of the resolution, the chair rules that the amendment is out of order and should be presented as a subsequent order of business.

Substitute motion, presented by Van Wyk of Bismarck that the resolution be referred to the Board of Control for further study, seconded by Hanna of Valley City.

During the discussion and before vote was taken Westley offers a motion amending Section 10, Article 6, copy of which is not available as the minutes are being written; the motion being to the effect that if a principal certifies that a boy leaving his school does so without evidence of "outside influences" or for athletic purposes, and the first school is willing, then the lad transferring to the other school may be considered eligible at once, with control left in the hands of the Board of Control to review and nullify the decision when necessary or advisable. Lost for want of a second.

Vote on the Van Wyk substitute motion at first 37 to 38 against; the chair, however, feeling that he had not made clear the meaning of the vote on the motion as stated calls for a re-vote and a careful count shows 38 for and 37 against. The chair ruled the motion carried.

Motion by Beleal, seconded by several, proposed that the four schools involved in the Zimmerman resolution be named "Class A Schools" for both football and basketball. After discussion with the consent of the seconds, Mr. Beleal withdraws the motion.

Upon the suggestion of Mr. Morstad that the League progress to the next order of business, and the chair finding the suggestion apparently meeting with approval, so directs.

Motion: By Wakefield, seconded by Havig, that the Board of Control take appropriate means to eliminate Class B Football Championship for next year.

Amendment by James, seconded by several that the above motion be amended to include the elimination of Six Man Football also.

At the suggestion of Urness, apparently agreeable to all, only schools playing six man football voted upon the amendment which carried; and Class B schools voted to eliminate their football championship.

Motion: Havig again rereads and presents his proposal for the amendment of Article 6 of Section 10. After much discussion again, the vote is taken, and declared against the amendment.

Mr. Westley's amendment is then proposed again. See addenda for complete statement. This concerns transfer pupils being immediately eligible under certain circumstances. THIS CONSTITUTES

THE FIRST READING OF THE AMENDMENT.

State Track Meet. Invitation presented by President Eversull of the State College stimulates a motion by Reitan, seconded by several that the placing of the State Track Meet be referred to the Board of Control. Carried.

Nominating Committee reports:

Supt. Hagen of Dickinson presents the name of L. A. White to succeed himself for a three year term. Moved by Quam of Oakes, seconded and carried, that nominations be closed and the president be authorized to cast unanimous ballot for L. A. White.

Moved by Manning that the regular eleven man football be named as the official ball for the six man football game. No action.

Adjournment.

ADDENDA

Proposed Amendment to Rule 10:

It is hereby proposed that Rule 10 as stated in the Special Handbook of 1938 be amended to read as follows:

"He shall have been in attendance at the school he represents for one semester upon transferring from another school unless:

1. His parents have become residents of the school district to which he has transferred.

- The school from which he is transferred does not offer work of the corresponding year in which he is ranked.
- 3. The school from which he is transferred furnishes a certificate, signed by the principal and of such form as may be prescribed by the High School League, certifying that the change in school systems was not made for athletic reasons; that no improper influence was used to cause the student to leave the first school; and that the first school is willing that the student represent the second school in athletic competition. The Board of Control shall have full power to nullify any transfer certificate which, in its judgment, violates the purpose of this rule or which is issued under conditions not in harmony with the spirit of the High School League.

In the instance of a pupil transferring from a public high school in the same city to any other high school in the same city, or vice versa, he shall not be eligible to represent the new high school in the same year."

Meetings of the Board of Control

University, August 21-22, 1941

Thursday afternoon. Present: Tighe, Zimmerman, Abrahamson, White.

Much of the afternoon was given to discussion of problems, which were then reviewed and supplemented by informal get togethers during the evening and the following day.

- 1. H. V. Porter, Executive Secretary of the National Federation tells in correspondence of proposed legislation, already passed the house, that would collect federal tax from all school entertainments. Since this seems to be taxing one form of national defense (the schools) for the sake of another, it seems somewhat illogical. The League secretary is authorized by the Board of Control to write our two Senators asking them to study the measure carefully and vote against it if the measure is in reality what it seems to be.
- 2. Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Abrahamson, that on the basis of the reports from the post card questionnaire no change be made in the backboard for basketball tournaments in the Class B series for the coming school year. Motion carried. Note:—A good poll was received. Slightly more schools voted for the change than voted against it; but another considerable number indicated an in-

difference. The Board felt that since there obviously was no urgent demand for the change, it would be wiser to withhold action for at least another year, or until the League as a whole has had an opportunity to express itself again.

- 3. It was agreed that Superintendent E. C. Johnson of Kenmare should meet with the Board for a conference relative to the eligibility of Earl Johnson, before the previously proposed "letter" be written him. See notes of the previous May meeting. Mr. Johnson was unable to attend the Grand Forks meeting as he had planned, because of illness in his home.
- 4. Reference to the Grand Forks boy who overplayed in number of seasons in golf tournament. Grand Forks officials discovered the error themselves and reported to the Board of Control and made such amends as possible, sending the trophies to the runnerup. This seems to be a commendable procedure in an unfortunate situation. No further Board action.
- 5. Problem of a Rugby lad: Father and mother separated. Mother and son move to Rolette for a year or two. Mother returns to Rugby, the former home, and the son remains at Rolette. Mother wants the boy to return to Rugby. Board rules the boy may return and be immediately eligible if the mother assumes full support, or partial support.
- 6. Agreed, to secure two full sized gold footballs for the two state football championships as heretofore.
- 7. Concerning expenses for the Coaching School at the University: Previously the Board had agreed to underwrite \$150 for "an outside expert," also expenses for Porter and fee for his helpers (turns out to be \$40); also pay half cost of rules and situations books for members of Coaching School, C. A. West to pay other half; and Coach West is to see Colborn School Supply Company to see if they will purchase remainder of books.
- 8. Agreed there shall be no Athletic Clinics this year, since the League is underwriting the Coaching School so extensively.
- 9. Abrahamson to check upon Hanson and Hoffman as possible Class B officials. White reports that Herting and Walker have been secured as previously agreed upon, for Class A tournament.
- 10. Agreed that District Committees for the Basketball Districts shall be secured as heretofore; i.e., if the three men are still in the district they shall be re-appointed. If one has left the other two shall appoint a successor; if two have left the one shall appoint one successor and these two appoint the third. In all instances the 'appointments' are to be nominations subject to Board action.

- 11. Mr. White explains the financial report to the Board members, referring especially to the C. P. A. audit as printed in the Yearbook; and explaining the change of the 1941 Treasury Bonds to Defense Bonds.
- 12. Much time was spent in discussing plans for the improvement of Class B Football Championship set up. Suggestions were written and placed in the hands of Mr. Elster and later in the hands of Mr. Beleal and these two men as members of the official committee held a conference and prepared to send their recommendations to the Board.
 - 13. As part of these minutes their recommendations follow:

Committee Report, August 22-23, 1941

A. P. Beleal, J. J. Elster, E. C. Johnson.

Functions of the District Committee:

They shall receive an entry fee of \$1.00 from any school desiring consideration, such fee to be paid on or before October 1st; if paid after that date it shall be \$2.00; and shall not be accepted after October 15th. This is for the Committee's business use. Any surplus shall be turned over to the League.

The committee may decide upon the representative team for the District on the basis of games played alone. But in the event two teams seem outstanding a play-off shall be declared.

Inconsidering the representative team or teams, the committee shall consider only those that have paid their entry fee at the appropriate time; and who have played at least three Class B teams in the same District, or have had equivalent competition. Note: Sometimes a team may play a Class A team instead of a 3rd Class B team and this seems 'equivalent' competition.)

The game shall be played at the home town of one of the teams unless by mutual agreement the teams decide otherwise. The game shall be played on Saturday of the appropriate week, unless the teams by mutual agreement decide otherwise; and in the event of a disagreement in the day of the week, the day latest in the week shall be given preference.

In 1941 the home team shall guarantee expenses as follows: Advertising, ground expenses, three mutually acceptable officials, ball.

And for the visiting team shall allow thus:

(a) For District Play-offs: 40c one way mile or railroad expenses plus \$25 for meals; no lodging.

- (b) For the semi-finals: Game expense as above; 40c one way mile; \$50 for meals; \$15 for lodging.
- (c) For the final: Game expense as above; 40c one way mile; \$60 for meals; \$30 for lodging.

For the District Game, the Committee shall determine the location recommending the home field of one school.

For the semi-finals, the game shall be played in the south end of the state in odd numbered years; and in the north end in even numbered years.

For the final game, the game shall be in the east end of the state in odd numbered years; and in the west end of the state in even numbered years.

In the event either school in any series fails to play, the game shall be automatically forfeited to the other.

In the event the home school fails to meet in full the expenses of the game it shall be ineligible to play H. S. League football the following year.

Addenda Note: For the year 1942 the League itself at the N. D. E. A. time League meeting ruled there shall be no Class B football championship; and no Six Man football championship.

Meetings of the Board of Control, Minot, N. D., October 29, 30, 31, 1941 During the N. D. E. A. Convention

The Board of Control held a series of meetings beginning with a dinner meeting Wednesday evening, October 29, Mr. Roberts, Mr. Abrahamson and Mr. White being present.

Since the other members were absent no action taken, but discussions centered around the following points: With this year's trophies already purchased, what about new contracts; how shall tournament balls be handled; what of final action on Class B officials; possible problems in forthcoming League meeting.

In the evening after the general N. D. E. A. meeting, all members being present, actions as follows were taken:

Motion by Zimmerman, seconded by Roberts that we name "the top quality" Wintark and Lasbilt balls as official tournament balls, letting Districts No. 1 to 8 inclusive purchase their preference from Northern School Supply Company, and Districts No. 9 to 16 select their preference from Colborn School Supply Company, with Class A Tournament balls being purchased from Northern School Supply Company, and Class B Tournament balls being purchased from Saunders Drug Company of Minot; regional balls being purchased along with district balls; price in all instances to be \$12.25, federal tax included, but neither state tax nor delivery charges included;

with the further understanding that for the state tournaments both Lasbilt and Winark balls be available. Carried.

Agreed: That Hanson and Hoffman of Grand Forks Coaching Association be named Class B Tournament officials provided they refrain from refereeing Class B games during the season; pay to be \$75 and expenses, same as Class A officials. Some members of the Board feel a definite amount should be set for expense money, but no action is taken to that effect.

Discussion: Location of State Track and Field Meet. There is evidence of a likely invitation from the State College for the 1942 meet.

Breakfast Meeting, Thursday Morning

Discussion of the probable forthcoming proposal that parochial schools be placed in a separate league. Members finally developed a resolution to be presented to the League that would withdraw the three major parochial schools from the Class B tournament and give their selected team a chance to enter the Class A tournament through challenge.

Agreed: That Lloyd Jarman of Carrington should represent the League at the National Federation Football Rules Committee meeting in Chicago. Motion by Abrahamson, seconded by Zimmerman. Carried.

Note: Board members overlooked their previous agreement to send Gruenenfelder of Mandan to this meeting.

Discussion: Conditions under which "state records" should be accepted. It seems that at least occasionally some 'state records' may heretofore be set under conditions when accurate timing or starting or measuring may have been handicapped. The secretary shows the New Federation Official Blank upon which 'new records' may be recorded with appropriate testimony in their establishment.

Kenmare problem: Supt. E. C. Johnson of Kenmare appears before the Board of Control and to their satisfaction explains the age problem of Earl Johnson (not a relative) about whom question of eligibility had been raised on basis of age. The Board is satisfied: (a) there was no intentional wrong on the part of the Kenmare school officials; (b) there is still doubt as to the boy's real age.

Meetings of the Board of Control, Bismarck, N. D., Class A Tournament Time, March 12, 13, 14, 1942

All members present.

At scattered intervals throughout the tournament, at meal times, through the forenoons, evenings after the games, and afternoons after the tournament games, the Board held many formal and informal meetings.

The following actions were taken either by mutual agreement or by formal motions as stated herewith:

- 1. It was agreed that the State Track and Field Meet should be held at the State College at Fargo, on Friday, May 29th to avoid Saturday, Memorial Day; but it was agreed that the golf and tennis tournament games could be held over for Saturday completion. Such motion was made by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman. Carried.
 - 2. Ten men for state tournaments in basketball.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by White and carried that for the State A and B Tournaments 10 players be allowed; and that each district shall decide for itself whether to allow nine or ten players during the district tournaments.

3. Oval shaped backboard discussed.

A discussion without motion concerned the possible adoption of the new oval shaped backboard for the B tournaments. There is no marked demand for the new backboard, though there is some feeling that it may have gained increased favor during the year after the year's use by a number of schools, and in the A tourney. Short gyms and the added expense remain as two reasons for avoiding the change.

Note: Subsequently a post card questionnaire shows less interest than a similar questionnaire last year.

4. Tournament balls.

Agreement made with Chas. Kimball of Northern School Supply Co. of Fargo, that we purchase balls for Districts No. 1 to 8 inclusive and the corresponding regions, and for the State A tournament, at \$12.95, federal tax included, but no state sales tax nor delivery charges, same quality ball as for 1942, with the understanding that we may be asked to receive and pay for them this spring in order to make certain of their delivery. The secretary is to check with the other firms to secure a like agreement for other balls on the plan of last year; i.e., other district and regional balls from Colborn; and State B from Saunders. Balls to be top quality Lasbilt or Wintark.

- 5. U. N. D. Coaching School. Discussion, with no action. There is no knowledge of definite plans for such a school this coming summer.
- 6. Discussion of the Halvorson (Milnor) claim under the A. A. B. Fund. A multiple vertebrae injury, i.e., of the lateral processes. The secretary shows several letters from secretaries of other states, indicating their plan under like circumstances. It was agreed that no

further action should be taken (\$40 having been paid at the time) until the secretary shall have conferred with the surgeon in charge (Dr. Fortin of Fargo) and shall have word from the National Federation meeting where several state representatives of other A. A. B. Funds are to meet to discuss just such questions.

7. Board re-organized.

Again the Board found it had previously forgotten to organize itself with officers.

Moved by Roberts that Tighe be re-elected president was followed by a motion by Abrahamson that nominations close and the secretary be authorized to cast unanimous ballot for Tighe as president.

A like pair of motions brought about the re-election of Mr. Zimmerman as vice-president.

In like manner White was named secretary-treasurer. All motions carried.

8. White to attend A. A. B. Fund meeting in Chicago, in April.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Zimmerman that the secretary represent the Board of Control at a Chicago meeting of officials of the several A. A. B. Funds of other states on April 11 and 12. Carried.

9. Request of Grand Forks to broadcast final tournament game.

It was agreed that the Board of Control okay the request of the Grand Forks radio station to broadcast the final basketball game in which Grand Forks is involved, i.e., the championship game; the approval, however, not to include the authorization for extension of wires into the building; all mechanical and physical changes involved are to be made only upon the authorization of the Chamber of Commerce or other appropriate body governing the building.

10. Tournament players daily expense allowance increased.

Motion by Zimmerman, seconded by White and carried, provides for the increase to \$3.00 per player for coach and 10 players when they attend the State A and B tournaments. Motion to go into effect this present year.

11. Naismith Memorial Fund.

Motion by Zimmerman, seconded by Roberts and carried that \$100 be pledged by the N. D. H. S. League for the Naismith Memorial Fund to be paid only when the Memorial is definitely underway in construction. Note: At the present time because of war conditions, funds are being invested in Defense Bonds and plans for the actual construction of the building are being deferred.

12. The A. A. B. Fund.

Certain weaknesses of the A. A. B. Fund were noted and discussed by the Board as follows: School men, boys and parents are uncertain about the A. A. B. Fund Plan, sometimes considering it as "insurance" and covering all types of injuries. Moneys and names are carelessly sent in for registration. Schools do not keep very accurate records of their own members. There are some schools that do not avail themselves of the plan. There is some uncertainty even in the minds of the Board of Control about the application and meaning of certain parts of the schedule of benefits: For instance, payment on multiple injuries; payment for injuries occurring when boys are going to and from the practice or game field; requirement of x-ray pictures for filing, etc., etc.

Suggestions: (a) Let placards again be printed and sent to all schools for their bulletin boards. (b) Let mimeographed sheets be distributed to all schools in such quantities that high school boys may each have one, preferably to take home to discuss with their parents.

13. State Calendar.

It was suggested by Mr. Abrahamson that it might be a good idea to do as is done in Iowa, print a celandar of important dates, checking schools on the time for their payment of dues; their tournament fees, listing contest and tournament dates and so on. The same type of thing has been done for years in the front pages of the annual Yearbook, but perhaps it has become an 'old story,' and a fresh way of doing the same thing would be helpful.

14, 1943 tournament trophies and awards.

The Board of Control spent considerable time with representatives of the Balfour, Herbst Jones and Josten Companies, discussing tournament awards and trophies for the forthcoming year.

Motion by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts that trophies and awards in quantities identical with those of other years be purchased from Josten Manufacturing Company for \$746 complete, not inclusive of necessary tax, insurance or delivery charges, but including all engravings. Carried. The placques are to be changed; and for the state tournaments four sizes of mounted basketballs shall be used; while for the district tournaments, four sizes of wooden bases with figure mountaings shall be used; all individual awards to be identical with those of other years.

15. One football award.

It is assumed that the East-West Conference football champion-

ship is to be continued even though the League in the fall voted to discontinue the Class B and the Six Man football championships.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson, that we purchase from Balfour one only football trophy same as the 1942 trophy, for "about \$21.00." Carried.

16. Moved by White, seconded by Roberts that we hold up any purchase of track and field trophies and wards for the present. Carried.

While it was emphasized in the discussions that later purchases of awards may be problematic, it was also realized by Board members that the status of track and field meets for 1943 would also be problematic.

Adjournment.

Addenda

The Saturday luncheon of Board of Control with tournament officials, school officials and coaches was held in the dining room of the G. P. Hotel with about 45 men present.

While there were a few discussions and suggestions, the major activity centered around the appointment of a committee that should make some recommendation concerning physical examinations for competitive athletics.

A. C. Van Wyk was appointed chairman; and with him were C. T. Denton of Dickinson, H. Bridgeford of Fargo, H. B. Ensrud of Grafton and M. B. Zimmerman of Wahpeton.

Their resolution, developed after the meeting had adjourned, was handed to the secretary of the Board of Control and reads as follows:

"The committee proposes that the following resolution be adopted and that it become effective immediately:

"That each boy participating in inter-scholastic athletics present a certificate from a licensed medical practitioner showing that he has satisfactorily passed a medical examination and that he can safely participate in athletics. The medical examination should include at least an examination of lungs, heart (including blood pressure), hernia, and a urine analysis.

The committee also heartily recommends that this medical examination be extended to include the entire enrollment in all of the schools as soon as possible."

D

Meetings of the Board of Control, B Tournament Time, Minot, N. D.,

March 19 to 21

Members present: Tighe, Zimmerman, Abrahamson, White. Absent: Roberts.

As usual, meetings were held at intervals in the forenoons, after the afternoon games, at luncheons, after evening games, and even during the progress of the games, some discussions were held.

1. The Ryder player.

A Ryder boy entered school the first day but thereafter was absent for nearly three weeks. When he returned he played football at the end of the week. This is contrary to Rule No. 1. Supt. Banga acknowledges his error, but explains that there had been so much absence and irregularity in attendance that there was little class work done, and in reality there was little work the boy could make up to represent the first three weeks.

The Board supported the secretary in his first ruling that the boy was eligible for basketball the second semester, the fact that he had played football while ineligible not being considered as reason for ruling him out of basketball. The boy had attended less than 30 days hence despite his athletic participation the secretary and Board ruled him eligible for the second semester in basketball. However, in reviewing the case now, the Board and secretary find themselves in error for the rule as presented by Morstad for first reading to the League in 1939 at the Annual Meeting not only changed the words "10 days" to "30 days," but added the clause "or participation in interscholastic competition,' and this was the amendment that was adopted at the 1940 League meeting.

2. Discussion: One region in basketball, through its two committees had made complete plans for the regional game. But the two teams largely through the initiative of one, objected to the location—after the two District Championships had been decided. The major problem involved concerns the policy of waiting until the two district champions are known and then setting the time and place for the regional playoff, in keeping with their preferences if possible; or laying plans well in advance, and as in this instance on the basis of alternating between the two districts from year to year. Obviously there are problems to be encountered in either instance. The Board had previously assumed it might be well to let the two teams involved always have opportunity to help in the decision; yet it becomes apparent that there are advantages in an earlier planning. Previously

the Board, with the knowledge of the Regional Committee had changed the place of the regional game to confirm to the request of the two teams. No action was taken toward establishing basic policies.

3. Should there be a "singles event" in golf?

Mr. Tighe was authorized to analyze the situation and determine some policy for this year, the meet being held at Fargo, State College.

- 4. The Board considered the question of a possible Coaching School at the University, this summer. Two points of view were obvious: Is there a special need because of the possibility of young men being forced into coaching with less than usual training and experience; but is there likelihood of less than normal attendance because of the possibility that coaches and other men will be at work as much through the summer as possible. It is remembered that the attendance last year, while fairly good, was rather disappointing, and the work situation was considered even then, an element, at least to some extent.
- 5. The Board completed the purchase of balls for next year as follows: For Districts No. 1 to 8 inclusive, and regions involved, from Northern School Supply Co., together with State A Tournament balls; Districts 9 to 16 inclusive, with regionals, from Colborn; and from Saunders of Minot, for the Class B State Tournament; all at \$12.95 including federal tax, but not including state tax nor delivery charges; all balls to be top grade Wintark or Lasbilt, molded model.
- 6. The invitation of Minot to entertain the Class B State Basketball Tournament was accepted for 1943, terms as heretofore: (a) All tournament expenses to be paid; (b) not to exceed \$75 for the banquet; (c) 50/50 division of net proceeds thereafter.
- 7. Consideration was given to some questions about broadcasts of the A and B State Tournaments. No official conclusions were reached. Correspondence with other states indicate that there is no one way of handling such broadcasts. Some states permit as many companies to broadcast as may be desired; some limit the broadcasting to one. Some charge the broadcast stations a fee; some feel it is a privilege to have the broadcasts in that it helps advertise; some feel the broadcasts interfere with attendance, and contemplate charging more.
- 8. The annual luncheon of the Board of Control with the coaches and school officials, and tournament officials was held at the La Plaza cafe. It was suggested that a questionnaire should be sent to all B schools again to discover their interest in the oval backboard. Other questions discussed: Compulsory use of knee pads; compulsory phy-

s cal examinations as a requirement for interscholastic competition. No action.

- 9. Without conclusion the Board of Control discussed the problems brought up at the Annual Meeting of the League concerning the participation of parochial schools in the various tournaments. The Board members are to undertake the development of several alternatives from which it is to be hoped that the League membership may find an appropriate answer.
- 10. The Board of Control reminded itself that a year ago it had named Coach Gruenenfelder of Mandan to represent the League at the annual football rules committee meeting at Chicago—and then forgot the appointment. The re-appointment of Gruenenfelder was reconfirmed, for next year.

Adjournment.

Scattered Items Of Interest

Putting the "Phys" in Physical Education

This title and much of the paragraphs have been borrowed from the Oklahoma H. S. A. A. bulletin, the title representing an article by E. A. Thomas of the Nebraska Association.

"For years there has been going on in this country a struggle between those who believe in a rugged program of athletics and physical education and those who prefer a gentle program of recreation in which the boys can feature their fancy sport shirts and slacks of latest style and go in for nothing that requires body contact or strenuous physical endurance. No doubt the demands upon our young men in the present wartime emergency will be greater than ever before in our country's history and this is the 'big inning' for the proponents of 'ruggedness.' We have all been preaching that it is necessary to carry on our inter-scholastic athletic programs for the benefit of the boys who will soon be the men upon whom we shall have to depend for the security of our nation, but a mere 'carry-on' pronouncement will not do the trick. If our schools are to do their share they must see to it that means are devised whereby our boys will be encouraged to go in for vigorous sports and games.

"Walter B. Spencer, executive secretary of the Connecticut association, has produced the best editorial on the subject yet printed in any of our high school journals in which he lambasts the schools for taking the attitude that we are to 'let the Army, the Navy, the Air Service do the job.' He jibes us for keeping our youth occupied merely with pleasurable tasks and games. 'As for our gymnasiums, now stripped of all semblance of body building exercises,' says Mr.

Spencer, 'the program there must consist of table tennis, badminton, social dancing, and drop-the-handkerchief type of games. We must be content with brave expressions such as 'broadening the physical education program' or 'making more dynamic the program of intramural sports and games.' And most of us are forced to stop right there because there is little or nothing dynamic in any program of physical education or intra-mural sports as now practiced. There is no specific end in view; no spark to kindle red blood interest.'

"Harking back to the days when there were no 'pink tea' scenes in the physical education drama, Mr. Spencer winds up his splendid article by saying: 'In this emergency I believe that we who know the value of body building for competitive sports should work for the restoration of a physical education program which has not lost its 'phys'; for an athletic program geared to the times; for a program for both boys and girls which will give them an actual foretaste of what is in store for them,

"'In this way our nation's armed forces will benefit immeasurably and this unholy war will be ended, victoriously, that much sooner. Isn't this common sense and a practical program for your youth today?'

"We believe Brother Spencer has something there."

Not "Business as Usual," But "More Business Than Usual"

H. V. Porter, Secretary of the National Federation of State Athletic Associations, of which our N. D. H. S. League is a long time member, is being widely quoted as he undertakes to challenge all schools in the interests of a more widely distributed program of athletic and sports participation.

Some of his examples taken from actual facts, make it evident that no school should too glibly conclude that nothing different can be done.

Two major changes seem on their way: (a) A different program for the physical education class periods; and (b) a different program for sports and athletics for all pupils. Busy work and "fooling around" must be replaced in the physical education periods by procedures that have definite objectives that tie in with health measures. Without diminishing the emphasis on the "physical," more emphasis must be laid on the "education." There must be PHYSICAL EDUCATION. Why not required library reading. Why not class discussions. Why not individual and small group discussions. Why not "building up" if not "setting up" exercises. And perhaps the "winning team" will be replaced by the "winning school." It may well be that the time is at hand when concentration on the 5 or 7 or 10 basketball boys will be replaced by attention to the hundred and 5 or 7 or 10 other pupils.

There is no serious thought that competitive athletics will be thrown out the window. "This ought ye to do, and not leave the other undone" was the advice of the Master Teacher years ago when he was showing a keen sense of relative values.

"A grass roots philosopher opines that any old nag can roll over with appropriate accompaniment in the morning, but it takes a thoroughbred to do it at night after a hard day's work." The statement is applicable to the current condition of school athletic departments. Any athletic administrator can produce a good program when there is plenty of money, adequate facilities and an experienced teaching staff. The real test comes when there is a demand for an expansion of activity at a time when income is decreased, and the staff is depleted through call to the service in the armed forces or in war industries. The present need in school athletics is more than "business as usual." It is for "more business than usual." The problem cannot be solved by ordinary measures. It takes extraordinary effort. Adversity breeds courage and strength. It gives the leader a chance to prove his ability to lead—to prove his strength and courage. The times demand a physical program that will reach every student in high school. It must be produced with or without proper tools, or adequate teaching staff, or rubber for playing equipment or school bus tires. A way must be found;-with the assistance of priorities departments if possible,—without it, if necessary.

"Here are a few developments that are straws in the wind. A group of California schools cannot transport their teams for any great distance because of priority limitations. Less determined men would be discouraged and cancel athletic schedules; but not this group. For the next school year, they have drawn up an interscholastic schedule for groups of 2 and 3 closely grouped schools. Each school will provide three interscholastic teams (instead of one).

"A group of schools in Illinois has operated a mass basketball tournament whereby each school enters an A team, a B team and a Freshman team. Each team competes in its own class but the school tournament winner is determined by a point system based on the accomplishment of all the teams from a given school.

"A school in a metropolitan area recently staged a physical training demonstration in which 2,000 students participated. Another has made it compulsory for every able bodied student to participate in some form of track activity. An Iowa high school uses one corner of the athletic field for obstacle racing which includes fence climbing and trench jumping.

"State Athletic Associations which have become lax in requiring a physical examination for all athletes are becoming active. Those which have been requiring only a physician's statement that an athlete may compete are interesting themselves in supplying a definite and comprehensive card form that must be used in the examination. This in turn is leading to a thorough examination of all students—a development that is long overdue.

"In the Ozarks a group of overall clad high school boys in a marginal school district are practicing the discus throw with a stove lid from a junk pile that Uncle Sam had not yet called in. They put the shot with a 13 pound cogwheel from an old corn sheller. Yankee ingenuity is not dead, and determination thrives on adverse conditions.

"Each community and each state has local problems. None are beyond solution. The times demand a physical fitness renaissance. It ought to come under direction of the established school administration machinery. If this is not geared to fit current needs, the rebirth is still inevitable—but not under non-political supervision."

Athletic Accident Benefit Funds

Perhaps the most significant development among State Athletic Associations or Leagues, has been in the spreading of the Athletic Accident Benefit Funds.

Though the experiment covers only a relatively few years, nearly half of the states of the Union are operating some form of Athletic Accident Benefit Fund Plans.

This spring, the Board of Control directed the secretary to attend a two day conference at Chicago, where representatives of a good number of states gathered for consultation over common problems.

- 1. Publicity. One problem common to all is to keep clearly in the minds of parents, boys and even of school men the true nature of the A. A. B. F. Plan. Since the only thing in existence like it at all is "insurance," there is likely to grow up the idea that the A. A. B. Fund Plan is actually an insurance plan, and should cover a wide area of claims in semi-limitless amounts. Our Board of Control has authorized the secretary to prepare more printed material to send to all schools for use among boys and their parents.
- 2. Physical Examination. All states believe in the propriety and necessity of thorough physical examinations before boys should be permitted to participate in athletics. One of the best ways of compelling this examination is to enroll in the A. A. B. Fund Plan, only those who have been so examined. And obviously enough there is the added advantage in protecting the Fund from making payments on

claims of boys whose physical equipment is such that they should not have been exposed to the hazards of heavy athletics.

Few states are more negligent in this matter than is North Dakota. Scores of boys take part in intense competitive athletics without any preliminary physical examination whatever; and others have only a hasty and cursory examination. We excuse our negligence on the basis of the fact that many towns have no doctors; but it is doubtful if there are really many, if any, localities where such physical examinations could not be secured in some way, if it were really necessary. Michigan last year refused participation to 600 boys because their physical examinations showed them unprepared. Bad hearts; hernia; rickets; bad pulmonary conditions—these may show up under effective physical examinations, and yet not be otherwise too apparent.

The Conference developed the conclusion that the examination should be at least threefold: (a) Cardio-vascular system; (b) nervous system; (c) bone structure. A specialist of the Continental Casualty Company felt definitely that any lad who could not show a normal expansion of three inches had no right to be exposed to the rigors of competitive athletics.

- 3. Injury Reports. The Conference members agreed that the administration of the Fund should hold rigorously to the requirement of a preliminary report within 12 days (or other assigned period) and a completed claim report within 60 days. Perhaps the Board of Control has been too lenient in our state, for there has been an attempt to pay every claim whenever possible, and not infrequently school coaches and principals and superintendents leave these matters to one another with delinquent results.
- 4. Enrollment in the A. A. B. Fund. Most states are much more formal in their enrollment requirements than are we in North Dakota. Some states require the whole school to be enrolled! Some will not enroll less than a certain number at one time. But all seem to find it good practice to require (a) a formal application for membership for each boy or all boys; and (b) some form of master sheet kept in the principal's office.

Heretofore there has probably been altogether too much informality in the enrollments, in our state. Money is sometimes sent without any enrollment names at all. Names are sent at times without any fees. Actually backs of envelopes, half sheets of paper, parts of scratch pads—almost anything has seemed sufficient to be called an enrollment. To send out enrollment blanks indiscriminately for all possible boys in the all possible schools means a tremendous waste of printed material. The secretary always does send such blanks on request. He further has called attention to the authorized form as shown in the 1938 Handbook of Interpretations.

It is not too much to ask that schools give the following informa-

tion at all times as they make application for their boys: (a) The name of the school; (b) the date; (c) the sport; (d) the names of the boys and their parents; (e) the amount of money enclosed; (f) and a statement that they understand the A. A. B. Fund Plan, and abide by it.

5. The Schedule of Benefits. It is only a combination of "guess work" and experience that have determined what should be listed in the Schedule of Benefits yet the majority of A. A. B. Fund Plans have almost identical Schedules both as to items and as to amounts.

Fundamentally the coverage is for fractures and dislocations, with special allowances for x-rays for exploratory purposes.

One or two points should be given thoughtful consideration by our own League: (a) In the event of a multiple injury what payment should be made. That is, if four bones in the foot are broken should there be a payment of four times the amount provided for the fracture of a single bone. Most states put some limit on such multiple fractures, just as North Dakota does when it pays \$10.00 for one broken tooth, and not to exceed \$25.00 for a total dental injury. Some states pay the full amount for the first fracture and 50% of that amount for all additional fractures put together. In such instance the four bone accident would make a justifiable claim for \$15.00. The theory is that surgical aid does not differ in proportion to the number of bones fractured. (b) A distinction should be made between the serious fracture of the vertebraa, and the relatively unimportant fracture of the lateral processes. Some states pay about \$40 for the former and either \$5 or \$10 for the latter; and a half some for all other fractures after the first.

Annual Report Of The Secretary

The major report of the H. S. League Secretary is found elsewhere in this Yearbook, in the records of the meetings of the League itself and in the reporting of the meetings of the Board of Control.

Throughout the year scores of letters are written in correspondence with League members and with the Board of Control with whom contact is made frequently but at irregular intervals through the year by letter, by wire and by phone.

Approaching 5,000 sheets of news letters have been sent throughout the state during the year.

Contact has been maintained with the managers of the various tournaments in football and basketball and track, and with their committees.

Many letters have been written to school men replying to their inquiries about eligibility problems. Much correspondence has been maintained with schools about the A. A. B. Fund.

The many letters that pour in to the League office are a source of very real satisfaction for there is a widespread interest and confidence in the real worth of the North Dakota High School League.

Treasurer's Report

The formal report of the treasurer of the N. D. H. S. League is found in other pages of this Yearbook in the Annual Audit of the Certified Public Accountant whose statements testify as to the accuracy of the records and the general financial condition of the League.

But it is assumed that many League members would like to know in more detail where the League money comes from and in what quantities and where the money goes, and in what amounts.

The following statements are presented prior to the completion of the audit and before the close of the month hence they may not 'jibe' with entire accuracy with the C. P. A. report. They do, however, give an "over-all" picture of the finances of the year.

1. The Tournaments (Basketball):

For many years the State A Tournament was the major source of income for the League, even being called upon to help finance the B Tournament.

The net income this year is \$1,317.75, next to the smallest since the Tournaments have been held at Bismarck, and among the five smallest incomes since 1926.

The B Tournament gave the League a net income of \$345.14, which while considerably smaller than that of the A Tournament, does represent the highest net income from any of the B Tournaments.

Perhaps the \$100 honorarium paid to Mr. Saxvik, and the \$50 honarium paid to Mr. Mellem as tournament managers should be charged directly against these Tournaments, reducing the net proceeds by those amounts. They're listed, however, in the "Miscellaneous" accounts.

The District and Regional Tournaments no longer make any net profits; or if they do, the moneys are kept within the Districts to cover possible losses in subsequent years. Before the schools were separated into B and A classes, most tournaments made a fine financial showing, the net proceeds bolstering up the League income appreciably. But with the withdrawal of the larger schools, the District Tournaments in most instances do well to meet actual tournament expenses.

2. The Membership:

The League membership holds steady year after year. This year 225 schools continued their memberships. Of these 164 paid \$1 dues; 36 paid \$2 dues; and 25 paid \$3. This sum of \$309 does not even pay for the supplies that are sent out to the schools in the first mail during the fall. It is the Tournaments that have kept the N. D. H. S.

League financially alive during the last decade, when its program has been expanding.

3. The A. A. B. Fund:

The Athletic Accident Benefit Fund has had another excellent year, and somewhat to our surprise has made a little money in each of its several departments. It will be remembered that the League voted a half dozen years ago to hold \$1,000 in readiness to underwrite the A. A. B. Fund not knowing whether that sum would melt away the first year of the experiment or whether it would ever be called upon. To date that money is still intact.

This the more interesting when it is realized that while the North Dakota Schedule of Benefits is almost identical with that of Wisconsin and other states, a number of states subsidize their A. A. B. Funds regularly with a great deal of money. I believe Wisconsin is reported to have put upwards of \$40,000 into their A. A. B. Fund, and Iowa is reported to place around \$15,000 each year, by paying a significant part of each athlete's fees.

a. The football section of the A. A. B. Fund has registered 1,319 boys from about 75 different schools. Claims have been paid to date in the amount of about \$1,000, leaving a net balance for the year of nearly \$320. One or two out of the ordinary cases have arisen. One boy riding home from practice, possibly not properly inside the car, was injured in a car accident, seriously mangling one foot with dislocations, and compound fractures of a number of bones. His hospitalization and treatment bills far exceeded the surgical bills, totaling well over \$325. The Schedule was interpreted in such way as to pay \$40. Another problematic case was that of a boy who injured the lateral processes of four vertebrae, with a total expense of over \$100. The April conference in Chicago, attended by representatives of several states operating A. A. B. Funds, including North Dakota, brought to light the fact that several states have schedules that make a distinction between injury to the round vertebral bone itself, and injury to the lateral processes, the latter not being serious. In some instances while \$40 may be paid for the more serious vertebral injury only \$5 or \$7.50 may be paid for the lateral process injury. And when there is a multiple fracture full payment is made by several states for the first injury and only half that amount for all other injuries together.

B. The Six Man Football Section also made a net balance of about \$350 this year. About \$5 schools participated this year, with 779 boys registered @ 75c for the season. Claims, as this report is being written have amounted to \$235. Normally all claims must be completed within 60 days of the accident, but the Board has authorized leniency in all cases. Two claims have just been completed this

week, in this section. The Chicago conference on A. A. B. Fund organizations made it rather clear, however, that it is well to hold strictly to the requirement of the preliminary reports being completed within 10 or 12 days; and fully completed within the 60 day limit. Perhaps the Board of control would do well to be a little more strict in this regard. A recent case involves a skull fracture just discovered, presumably done during a football game last fall.

- c. In the basketball section 1,041 boys were registered @ fifty cents each, from about 90 schools. Since the claims have amounted to a little less than \$220, there is again a net balance for the year of about \$300. It is the usual experience that the 50 cent rate for basketball shows a net balance and helps carry the more hazardous games of football and six man football. Dental and nasal injuries are the most common in this sport. Large bone injuries are rare.
- d. Ten schools this year enrolled 232 boys in physical education classes for only 25c for the entire year. A comparison of injury records indicates that the physical education class hazards are about identical with those of basketball. This is probably one of the best "bargains" of the entire Athletic Accident Benefit Fund set-up. While the annual enrollment is increasing, it seems a bit strange that more school men do not encourage their pupils to secure this protection. In reality it is a significant protection to the school men, for parents have little come back in the event of an injury, when they have had the opportunity for only a quarter to cover a list of over 30 injuries. Legal cases are on record wherein the physical education instructor has been held responsible for surgical bills whenever there was any evidence of even slight neglect, for schools as such, nor Boards of Education as such cannot be sued. Total claims amounted to \$47 which came nearer offsetting the receipts of \$58 than in any other department. Usually, however, claims are not in such large proportion. One lad alone broke both wrists in an unfortunate gym accident. His \$30 payment meant a good return on his 25c investment, and it is reported that the parents felt no criticism of the school-as perhaps they might have done if they had had the full bill to care for.
- d. Two schools enrolled 15 boys @ 50c in hockey, for a total of \$7.50. Apparently most of the boys played this rather dangerous game without mishap, though one boy had a broken nose with a \$5 surgical bill.
- e. Two schools enrolled 35 boys in track work for the season @ 25c each and fortunately no one was injured. However, the protection against thirty some fractures and dislocations for the season, in addition to the same protection while going to and from practices and meets is easily worth worth the quarter.

So the A. A. B. Fund season closes with another fine record of

success and satisfaction. Many letters express approval and appreciation. It is rare that there is the slightest criticism, and these are always directly traceable to some misunderstanding in advance. It seems difficult for parents particularly, for boys to some extent, and even for the school men themselves once in a while to understand that the A. A. B. Fund is not an insurance company covering a limitless list of injuries in limitless amounts. In reality it is only a co-operative venture in which boys throw in their coins to form a pot with the understanding that the money will be divided back again in terms of the unfortunate who suffer certain specified in advance dislocations or fractures, in which instances, certain specified in advance payments will be made from the Fund to apply on the surgical or dental bill. The whole plan is simple. There is no need for any misunderstanding.

4. The League Office:

Expenses for the League office were about \$775, \$700 being for salary; \$24.02 for office supplies; \$3.60 for rental of safety deposit vault box and \$50.60 for office labor. The Board has granted an annual appropriation of \$100 for office assistance, though the secretary has as yet never used this amount. So far as we know, the North Dakota League office operates on the lowest budget among all State Associations that have Athletic Accident Benefit Funds that obviously add much to the office obligations.

5. Board of Control:

Board of Control members receive no salary, with the exception of the secretary, but they do receive reimbursement for their actual expenses when they attend Board meetings.

About \$290 represents the expense of the Board members at their meetings, covering transportation, meals and lodging.

Other expenses ordered by the Board of Control were as follows: \$146.57 for Mr. Abrahamson's attendance at the National Federation meeting in San Francisco in connection with the N. E. A. meeting; \$20.06 for Mr. Jarman's (coach of Carrington) attendance at the annual Football Rules Committee meeting in Chicago, his other expenses being borne by the National Federation: \$14.24 for Mr Zimmerman's expenses as he directed the drawing for the Class A Tournament, at Bismarck. While a League representative has for a number of years been sent by the Board of Control to conduct the Class A drawings held in the office of the Governor of the State with several state officials and reporters and others present there has remained for a number of years a lingering suspicion that there might be some irregularity in the drawings. \$59.14 was spent by Mr. White in attendance at a Chicago conference with representatives of other states that conduct Athletic Accident Benefit Funds. \$15.91 was refunded to Mr. Hanson of Grand Forks to clarify some misunderstandings he had had about certain activities of the League, and had publicized over his radio station. Mr. Hanson had some misgivings about the use of money received by Bismarck from the State A Tournaments, about the drawings, about the broadcasts and other matters of concern to the League; and the conference over these matters seemed to be mutually advantageous. The two luncheons by the Board of Control with the coaches and tournament officials at the State A and State B Tournaments represented an expenditure of about \$50. These expenditures all total slightly over \$600.

6. Communications:

Naturally enough the League's bill for postage is large—the mailing of the packages in the fall; the many news letters and the rather large correspondence during the year. The total was about \$185. At times the long distance phone and Western Union reap a little harvest when tournament or other problems require immediate answers. The bill for long distance phone calls and telegrams for the year was \$61.83.

7. Printing:

As this report is being made, the expenditure of \$565.35 for printing is incomplete; for rule books used this year were paid for in last year's budget; and rule books for next year have not yet been paid for.

The 500 copies of the Yearbook cost \$365.72; to reduce the number of books would reduce the cost only slightly and this quantity provides two copies for each school, with a few left over for League files.

\$129.29 was spent for the needed blanks, including post cards for the questionnaires. \$70.34 was paid for some rule books used at the U. N. D. Coaching School, for which, however, there was a small return.

Rule books for track this spring, and for next year's football and basketball are as yet unpaid, all having been received as this report is made, but without the financial statement at hand as yet. When purchased directly from the Federation by others than State organizations ordering them before printing, their prices are listed as follows: Football rule books 25c and Play Situations 50c; Six Man Rule Books 35c; Basketball Rule Books 25c and Play Situations 50c; Track and Field Rule Books 30c. These may be obtained by individual League members from the National Federation of State H. S. A. A., 7 South Dearborn St., Chicago.

The Board of Control has authorized the free distribution of these books as needed to its members. Six man football books and eleven man rule books and track rule books are sent to schools in keeping with their annual eligibility reports. If schools have neglected to make their annual reports, the League secretary has of course, no way of knowing what sports they participate in. Basketball books are sent to all schools. The League pays 14c, 18c and 20c for the books.

7. Trophies and Balls:

It has been the policy of the Board of Control to purchase all trophies for all contests. Repayment for these is made from the District and State Tournaments in basketball, but none is made in other sports, i. e., football and track, as these have no incomes.

This year \$79.03 was spent by the League for the football cham. pionship trophies, and \$749.82 for the basketball trophies and awards.

The track and field trophies and awards for the eight district meets and the state meet last year amounted to \$531.27 and presumably the account is identical this year. The bill has not yet been paid since the Josten office has added to it some of the bills for next year's basketball tournaments without clarifying identification. In this connection it is appropriate to point out that the Board of Control has already purchased trophies for next year's basketball tournaments but for the one year only. It appears likely that all trophies will be delivered but the company cannot give full assurance, due to the shortage of bronze and other needed metals. Hence there remain outstanding the bills for this year's track meet trophies and next year's basketball trophies, approximating \$1,280.

Basketballs are purchased by the League at contract price and charged back to the District, Regional and State Tournaments. \$430.36 was paid for basketballs this year at the contract price of \$12.25, plus postage and insurance. In addition to this, the four balls used in the Class B Tournament were paid for directly; as were also several balls by some of the district managers. Contracts are already out for next year's balls @ \$12.95 and the balls are being delivered, possibly to be paid for out of this year's budget. There is some doubt as yet, as to the amount of basketballs to be available for next year, but it is believed that the Board has acted wisely in arranging for the tournament balls a year ahead of time.

8. Miscellaneous Items:

The League has received \$72.09 from scattered sources: \$1.55 from thoughtful schools that paid exchange on their checks; \$13.00 from schools' penalties for late dues; \$13.22 from the sale of rule books; \$37.31 interest on bonds (most of the League bonds are of the accruing-in-value type); and \$6.89 interest on the savings account.

Miscellaneous expenses have been as follows: \$100 to Mr. Saxvik as State A Tournament manager and \$50 to Mr. Mellem as State B Tournament manager; \$25 for the annual C. P. A. audit; \$8.75 for refunds on errors in payments to the League; \$34 transferred from the checking account in the exchange of matured bonds for new bonds; \$44.47 for bank charges; \$190 for the U. N. D. Coaching School; \$7.50 for National Federation dues; \$2.85 for express; \$25 for

Treasurer's bond; \$4.10 for the repair, repacking and carriage on some track trophies this year sent to the League office instead of direct to the several districts.

As the secretary-treasurer balanced his books on the last day of May there was a balance in the checking account of \$2,604.11 to which \$9.38 has since been added as interest on bonds.

June checks already written as this report is being made, but prior to the audit have amounted to \$926.93, but already reported in the preceding statements: \$150 for honorariums for the state basketball tournaments; \$700 for salary; \$67 for claims No. 926, 860, 1009 and 840; \$10.03 office expense.

There are a number of heavy bills outstanding, most of which do not normally have to be paid until the next year, but because of war conditions must be accepted and paid for now while they can be secured. (a) This spring's track trophies and awards \$535; (b) next fall's Yearbooks, about \$375; (c) next fall's football trophy. about \$35; next year's basketballs, about \$450 (it may be payment can be withheld until delivery is actually made); next year's basketball trophies, about \$750 (most of these are already delivered); next year's rule books, about \$160.

These heavy demands at this time of the year will exhaust the checking account and make some draft on the League savings account of \$1,385.88.

The financial 'retreat' at this time is due, as stated above, to the payment of bills that ordinarily should come out of next year's receipts; and also is due to the rather serious decline in the Class A tournament receipts; for the \$1,317.75 is only a little more than half the net receipts of a year ago. If the State A tournament continues to fall off in net receipts, the League will be forced to practice certain economies that have not heretofore been considered necessary.

Obviously the League is not a money making institution. With the approach of new years likely to be 'harder' financially, League incomes are likely to be decreased materially for a few seasons.

It will be noted that the A. A. B. Fund as a whole is more than paying its way. It never has demanded the \$1,000 made available for it by League action.

You will note from the C. P. A audit report that all League moneys are well safeguarded. The major portion are in Defense Bonds, Savings Bonds and U. S. Treasury Bonds with the balance in checking account and savings account likewise fully protected by the federal government.

Bismarck and the Class "A" Tournament

Members of the N. D. H. S. League are very appreciative of the outstanding success made each year, of the State A Tournament at Bismarck under the able management of Supt. H. O. Saxvik.

The financial strength of the League itself, is due in very large part to the financial success of these Class A Tournaments.

In a way, it is nobody's business what use the Bismarck authorities make of their share of the Class A Tournament money. Yet so many inquiries are made every once in a while, and because there have been some exaggerated ideas about Bismarck and its part in the Class A Tournament, it appears that Superintendent Saxvik,

87

before his unfortunate illness, was preparing a statement for publication.

As the Yearbook goes to press, Acting Superintendent Van Wyk sends to the League office a statement that follows saying: "Found this on Mr. Saxvik's desk. I believe he intended to elaborate on this and send it to you." Hence we assume it is entirely appropriate and fair to all concerned to make use of the statement.

It will be noted in this statement as in like statements published in previous Yearbooks, that in the early years of the Tournament at Bismarck a larger division was made in favor of Bismarck. Then a ceiling was placed for one year, but increased the following year when all 13 teams made a long tournament. Since 1938 the ceiling was placed at \$850, a \$50 increase over the previous ceiling when the tournament was changed into a three day tournament.

It appears that the City of Bismarck, and the Chamber of Commerce, do not profit directly in any way from the tournament finances. The largest item is the hall rental; the second largest item covers some reconditioning of the hall which has directly benefited the tournament; and the third largest item shows moneys put directly back into high school athletic activities for boys of the district and state.

It would seem that Mr. Saxvik is to be commended on the way these moneys, coming from an athletic source for high school activities, have been turned back into like activities, not alone for the boys of his own city but on a wider distributive basis.
