### Annual Meeting of the N. D. H. S. League

### FARGO H. S., OCTOBER 22, 1942

Presiding: B. C. Tighe, President of the Board of Control.

Present: Representatives of about 100 schools.

### Order of Business

1. Report of Secretary-Treasurer.

L. A. White, Secretary-Treasurer, referred to the complete report of the Secretary including minutes of the annual meeting of 1941, and all meetings of the Board of Control; and the complete report of the Treasurer including the C. P. A. audit and the many financial statements, all as published in the annual Yearbook, and in lieu of their being read, it was moved by G. W. Hanna, seconded by Supt. Ensrud that the reports as printed be approved and adopted.

Motion carried.

2. The nominating committee appointed a month pricr to the meeting as provided by the Constitution, was announced by Mr. Tighe, and they retired to prepare their report: E. C. Johnson of Kenmare, Harold Wakefield of LaMoure, E. J. Taintor of Park River, J. N. Urness of Williston (replaced by Van Wyk of Bismarck), E. O. Morstad of New England.

### 3. Old Business.

a. Mr. Zimmerman, reporting for the Board of Control who had been by League action a year ago assigned the responsibility for proposing some solution for the parochial school problem, presented the recommendation that due to war time conditions it be considered wise to maintain the status quo with the belief that this would best serve the interests of the League at the present time.

Moved by Havig, seconded by Hanna that the recommendation be accepted. Carried.

b. Second reading of the proposed amendment to the 'transfer rule' which in effect would permit pupils to transfer from one school to another without a like change in the residence of their parents, and be immediately eligible, provided they had the official approval of the school they left, and the approval of the school they enter, and provided also that the circumstances and official approvals as set forth on provided blanks, be approved by the Board of Control. Specific wording is set forth on pages 11 and 12 of the 1942 Yearbook.

After much discussion setting forth possible values and possible

difficulties it was moved by Westlie and seconded by Havig that the amendment be accepted as presented.

Motion lost.

- 4. New Business. There seemed to be none.
- 5. Report of the Nominating Committee.

E. A. Morstad, speaking for Harold Wakefield whom the Committee had named as their own chairman, presented the names of B. C. Tighe of Fargo and M. B. Zimmerman of Wahpeton to succed themselves, stating that Mr. Tighe had previously suggested that his name be not presented in nomination. Mr. Tighe upon hearing the nominations expressed his appreciation for the "friendly gesture" but repeated the withdrawal of his name on the ground that he had completed 25 years of attempted service, and was greeted with a hearty round of applause for an excellent brief address on the importance of genuins service to youth, thru our school activities.

Mr. Morstad's motion that his report be accepted having received no previous second, Mr. Hanna after Mr. Tighe's statements presented the name of A. C. Van Wyk of Bismarck, meanwhile paying a glowing tribute to Mr. Tighe and his significant services to the League.

Motion by Ensrud, seconded by Hanna that nominations be closed was carried.

Motion by Morstad, seconded by Hanna, that the name of A. C. Van Wyk be substituted for that of B. C. Tighe, was carried.

Motion by Hanna, seconded by several, that the report be accepted, the candidates be declared elected by unanimous ballot cast by secretary, was carried. The vote was so cast.

Moved by Supt. Estenson of Cooperstown, seconded by many, that there be inscribed on the minutes of the N. D. H. S. League records, a statement of sincere appreciation for the invaluable services rendered in a span of 25 years by Mr. B. C. Tighe as member of the Board of Control and as president.

A rising vote gave unanimous approval to the motion.

Prior to the closing of the meeting, the secretary called attention to a half dozen observations as follows:

a. An official government bulletin, as yet little known by school men or Draft Boards enables the latter to grant deferment to school men in certain specified assignments, notably superintendencies, principalships, etc., and in certain subject matters, such as science, industrial arts, etc.

- b. The question is raised about the possible part the League may play in directing more activities thru the schools, in sports programs and in physical education departments to help "condition" high school boys for subsequent army service.
- c. Reference was made to the fact that "25% of the schools' type-writers do not need to be turned in to government service" unless their use is only "partial." It appears the typewriter men get \$5.00 each for such machines and their business acumen may encourage an over-enthusiasm.
- d. Reference was made to the marked fallibility of school records as sources of birthdate information, and particularly of high school records, which are secured in the first place from the student only, and then only when he registers the first time. School men were urged to search their grade school records too, for the likelihood of disparities is likely to encourage further definite proof of age.
  - e. Brief comments in re the A. A. B. Fund were made;
- f. and about the annual Eligibility Reports of which many were lacking last spring, and in many of which that were made the proof of birth was the school record only.

# Meetings of the Board of Control A

Fargo, October 21, 22, 23

Present: Tighe, Zimmerman, Roberts, White. Absent: Abrahamson.

As usual, meetings were held at scattered intervals with conferences at breakfast and other mealtimes when available and inbetween meetings. About a dozen conferences altogether were held by the various members in groups of two and three and four and all matters of business were gone over thoughtfully.

### 1. The Lakota Case.

Last spring after the B Tournament, the school authorities discovered that one of their players was drafted into war service, and thus there came to light that he was over 20 years of age, and hence had not been eligible for participation in basketball for the Tournaments. Supt. Stevens and the coach visited the League secretary at Minot late in May and presented the predicament, explaining that

they had played the boy in good faith, having had no intimation at any time that his age was such as to make him ineligible.

Supt. Stevens met with the Board and made explanation of the situation verbally, as he had previously done twice in correspondence.

After thoro inquiry the Board of Control was convinced that there was no flagrant fault on the part of the Lakota schools with the exception however, that the inquiry into the proof of the lad's age was insufficient. The school authorities had trusted entirely on high school records, not even studying their own grade school records—which when investigated showed sufficient variation as to raise definite question about the proper birthdate. The Board pointed out that the News Letters of last year more than once had urged all school men to make special study of the birthdates of all their 19 year old players as an error of a year might be fatal, athletically.

The Board ruled as follows:

- a. A letter from the Board of Control pointing out the ineligibility of the player and the lack of complete diligence on the part of the school shall be sent to the Lakota schools to be read at a special school assembly;
- b. In which assembly the school shall pledge its renewed allegiance to the H. S. League and the rules of eligibility;
- c. All games in which the player had participated while of ineligible age, shall be declared forfeit; and
- d. All trophies or individual awards granted to the team or individuals shall be declared forfeit and shall be returned to the Board of Control:
- e. Except that any Lakota player who received first or second all state honors and individual awards therefor shall be permitted to retain those awards and honors; except the individual player who was ineligible.
- f. And the Lakota team while eligible for season's play thruout the basketball season, shall not be eligible for participation in any League tournament.

It was further agreed that the runner-up of the State B Tournament shall be declared winner of that Tournament.

- 2. Agreed that the report to the Annual Meeting in re the parochial school problem in membership, shall be to retain the status quo as best serving the interests of the League at this time of war with attendant difficulties that seem more important.
- 3. Halliday's proposal for a new District did not seem feasible inasmuch as there must remain 8 or 16 Districts, and any re-ar-

rangement of the several towns proposed by Halliday (representing a group of several towns) would probably disarrange the League set-up. However, it was pointed about that exchange of memberships between two or more Districts has always been approved by the Board of Control when the two Districts involved agreed.

- 4. It was agreed that there seemed no wise way of changing the basketball tournament set-up for the year. All trophies are purchased, and while many towns will have difficulty in maintaining a regular season, there seems no reason for withholding the opportunities for those that can avail themselves of them.
- 5. It was agreed that no ruling should be made at this time about the Spring Track Meets; that the matter could more readily be settled as the Board meets at tournament time, and probably with better background for judgment.
- 6. Several times references were made to the Music Contests with the thought that it might be better to have no State Contests with their preliminary District contests. But since the University has such a large part in these contests it was suggested that a conference be held with the U. N. D. authorities. Mr. Howard contacted some of the University authorities and meeting with Mr. White, tentative agreements were made in the absence of other members, as follows:

There shall be no State Contests in Music this year; and consequently no District Contests.

However, many schools will appreciate the annual "music lists" which will then be prepared and made official by the U. N. D.; with the thought that many schools will want to hold their own local festivals; or two adjacent towns may like to join for a semi-local festival; or possibly several towns meet at some convenient place for a little festival, and their preliminary practice on the same assigned music will be of assistance.

Further it was agreed that the U. N. D. might be of some assistance in the instance of some of these de-centralized festivals thru the services of "judges" or supervisors.

It was felt that the U. N. D. might appropriately "keep their hand in" on these matters because of their long services to the schools of the state; but that best judgment dictated that there should be a general de-centralization this year.

While the foregoing proposals are not final, they indicate that the members of the Board of Control and the authorities of the U. N. D. have been thinking along the same lines, all after consultations with representative school men of the state.

The secretary was authorized to pay two claims on the A. A. B. Fund for accidents occuring a year ago even the the reports had not been completed within the assigned 12 and 60 days. In the one instance the broken wrist was thought to be only a sprain until nearly a year had elapsed and an x-ray showed an old break; and in the other instance the dentist had been trying for a number of months to save two front teeth that finally did not respond to the treatment.

There was some discussion of the proposed transfer rule amendment. Board members recognized that it was out of line with the Federation recommended rule on the subject; and out of line with similar rules of most other states; they did know, however, that the South Dakota men were using the rule and approved it and did feel that it might possibly help solve some of their more difficult problems inasmuch as the present rule is very inflexible, and causes adverse rulings at times to boys who are not doing any essential wrong whatever as they transfer to another school.

The secretary pointed out the decrease in the League funds as shown in the Yearbook, explaining that this was caused by (a) decreased tournament income; (b) a little more expenditures; and (c) payment in advance for next year's basketballs and trophies and awards.

It was ruled that the State A Tournament be placed at Bismarck in keeping with the Bismarck invitation, and that the secretary review the business arrangements involved.

A little discussion centered around any possible action of the League in helping schools "condition" their boys physically for forthcoming army service, with special reference for 18 and 19 year olds.

Passing reference to St. Mary's complaint against a broken contract with Garrison. Information was insufficient for any formal consideration.

### B

### Bismarck, N. D.

March 11, 12, 13, 1943—A Tournament Time

Present: All Board members.

As usual, the Board members met at meal times and at scattered intervals between tournament games.

1. March 11. Moved by Zimmerman, seconded by Abrahamson, that the State Tournament next year be held March 16, 17 and 18;

the Class B Tournament on March 23, 24 and 25; and the District Tournaments March 10 and 11. Carried.

### 2. Track Meet set for 1943.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson, that the 1943 Track Meet be held on Saturday, May 29th, with the preliminaries in golf and tennis on the preceding day. Carried.

Note: Subsequently the East-West Conference men in session discussing the dates proposed a week earlier, as a recommendation to the Board of Control on the ground that many schools would be out on the 29th.

### Friday, March 12.

### 3. Track Meet set at U. N. D.

Moved by Zimmerman seconded by Roberts that the State Track Meet this year be held at the U. N. D. on the 29th as stated above. Carried.

Note: Subsequently the East-West Conference men recommended to the Board of Control that the Meet be held at Bismarck or Jamestown as being nearer the center of the state and the "turn" of the central part of the state.

### 4. Track Meet awards.

Agreed that similar awards be purchased for schools for the State Track Meet; none for the District Meets; and ribbons for individual awards. To be considered as Board meets at Minot, Class B time.

### 5. Nordly and Oudahl for next year.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Zimmerman, that we secure Nordly and Oudahl for both tournaments next year. Carried.

Note: When subsequently approached, they seemed uncertain.

### 6. Increased allowance for tournament players.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts, that each tournament player and coach be allowed \$3.50 per day for attendance at tournaments, applying to both A and B Tournaments this year. Carried.

### 7. \$10.00 for home team of tournament.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Zimmerman that \$10.00 be allowed teams of the home town where the turnament is played, including this year, as: Bismarck and St. Leo's, Minot. Carried.

### 8. Rule books as usual.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson, that the secretary

order basketball, football rule books and play situations and six man rule books as heretofore, for next year. Carried.

### 9. Balls to be purchased, 1944 tournaments.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts, that balls be purchased (top grade laceless, as Lasbilt are no longer available), @ \$12.95; for Districts No. 1 to 10 from Northern and State; and Districts No. 11 to 16 for Colborn. Carried. (Goldsmith X9L.)

### Friday dinner.

Agreed discuss with Class B coaches at luncheon, as to Track Meet dates, since E-W coaches and men suggest May 22.

Discussion. Secretary analyzes League's business arrangements with Bismarck in other years.

Discussion. KFYR broadcasting. KILO of Grand Forks had asked for privilege of broadcasting A Tournament. Board of Control had granted but KILO found it impossible to interest other Mutual stations. Board met with Mr. Fitzimmons of KFYR and he explained the broadcast situation from his viewpoint: They must cancel N.B.C. broadcasting and advertising to cover the full tournament, at a considerable loss; such that in reality KFYR makes no profit on the tournament broadcast. KFYR wants to broadcast the tournament however, feeling the prestige is significant and feeling that they have done a good job in other years.

### Saturday.

Board of Control sent flowers to H. O. Saxvik, former manager of the State A Tournaments.

Luncheon attended by officials, coaches, school men and others (42) at which (a) Lieutenant Commander MacDonald of the navy explained the opportunities for high school boys and young men in the navy; (b) Dr. Nordly explained the Physical Fitness program; (c) Mr. Tighe made appropriate remarks; (d) former Congressman P. D. Norton, father of one of the all state players spoke. Reference was made to the death of George Newgard a former N. D. coach, and the group stood in honor of his memory.

Note: An East West Conference committee was authorized to prepare some proposal for "physical fitness" exercises that might be introduced into the spring track and field meet this year.

### C

### Minot, B Tournament Time

March 25, 26, 27, 1943

Present: Zimmerman, Abrahamson, Roberts, White. Absent: Tighe. Van Wyk present for organization meeting.

As usual the Board members met informally during the tournament time and at meal time discussing their problems, then concentrated their actions later.

### 1. Re-Organization.

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by Roberts, that M. B. Zimmerman be named president of the Board of Control. Carried.

Moved by Roberts, seconded by Abrahamson, that L. A. White be re-elected secretary-treasurer. Carried.

- 2. Board of Control and school men meet at luncheon. Saturday. Mr. Roberts presiding, asked for expressions on several problems:
- a. What of the new backboard. Some difference of opinion but the general impression seemed to be favorable toward retaining the old board under the present war time conditions. The secretary reported on last summers questionnaire that showed a little less desire for the new board than had the questionnaire of the summer before.
- b. Most of the men preferred having 10 men in tournaments but it was felt that for the District Tournaments, the committee men would do well to take a poll of their members.
- c. As to the state track meet, all seemed in favor of having it this year and most seemed to plan for a track team; they expressed themselves in favor of the May 22nd date, same as the Class A school men.
- d. They approved the idea of dropping the javelin throw and substituting the proposed Physical Fitness Pentathlon; and agreed with the Class A men that a limit of three events plus either relay would be well, with no regular track men participating in the Penthalon if they participate in other track events.
- e. Reference was made to the new drive on sanitary conditions in school with special attention to faulty drinking fountains and toilets that may back syphon bowl contents into the water-source. While the physical fitness program is excellent, it is not fitting to let these preventive features go by.

### 3. Concerning Track Meets. Board action.

The Board of Control definitely goes on record in the following conclusions which they had previously discussed a number of times:

- a. Eliminate the javelin throw, motion by Roberts, seconded by White. Carried.
- b. Replace the javelin throw with a penthalon as later described for boys not otherwise participating in the track meet except in golf and tennis; moved by White, seconded by Roberts. Carried.
- c. Hold two relays, 440 and 880, as per motion by Roberts, seconded by White, following recommendations of East-West Conference men. Carried.
- d. The track meet to be held at Bismarck, with A. C. Van Wyk as manager, moved by Roberts, seconded by White. Carried.
- e. The date to be May 22, with preliminaries in golf and tennis on the 21st, in keeping with coaches' recommendations. Motion by Roberts, seconded by White. Carried.

Note: Mr. Van Wyk states that each contestant will receive \$1.25 as expense money.

f. The Board reminds itself that contestants enter the State meet in either of two ways: By winning either 1st or 2nd place at one of the 8 District Meets; or by equalling certain time or distance in other meets which have at least six schools participating and at least three entrants in the given event. See 1940 Yearbook, p. 41.

### 4. Concerning 1944 Basketball Tournaments.

a. Moved by White, seconded by Roberts, that the Class A Tournament be held at Bismarck. Carried. And moved by Roberts, seconded and carried that the Class B Tournament be held at Minot.

After a discussion of dates, centering around the second week end in March and the third week end in March, the secretary was instructed to get in touch with Mr. Oudahl of the General Mills Company, Minneapolis, and with Dr. Carl Nordly and see just what dates may be possible for Mr. Ossie Oudahl for both Tournaments and see if Dr. Nordly will be available for the A tournament at that given time. Note: Mr. Oudahl has expressed his willingness to work the A tournament and also the B if he is not assigned the Minnesota State Tournament; and Dr. Nordly has expressed his willingness to handle the A tournament, but is not available for the B.

### 5. Concerning Track plans.

After conference several times with a representative of Josten Manufacturing Company, it was agreed to purchase track awards as

follows for this year: (a) For the Districts, ribbons only for 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places for each of the 13 events and two relays @ about \$9.00. (b) For the State: 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th place trophies for the schools and also for the two relays; 4 place ribbons for the 13 events and relays and golf and tennis; and fob award (shoe) for high point winner. Total about \$150.00. Motion made and carried.

### 6. Concerning Basketball trophies.

Moved by White, seconded by Roberts that from Josten, awards and trophies for the 1944 basketball tournaments be purchased as follows: Districts: One only trophy; and because of scarcity these 16 cannot all be identical; they are to cost about \$10.00 each. For other place winners, the leather basketballs used in the games are to substitute for trophies for 2nd and 3rd places. For the State Tournaments 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th place trophies for 8 and B tournaments, @ \$57 a set, but these will be somewhat different. For the individual awards, 21 gold filled and 21 silver basketball fobs @ \$5.00 a pair, total \$110. Plus also 132 participants fobs @ 75c each. Note: No plans for first all state and second all state belt buckles as none are available, nor could any substitute as yet be proposed.

Adjournment.

### Scattered Items of Interest

### 1. The Athletic Accident Benefit Fund

While much regular publicity is given each year to the A. A. B. Fund it may be appropriate once more to review this important part of the N. D. H. S. League service for the new principals and superintendents who are not fully aware of the Fund plan.

Essentially it is not an "insurance" but is only a fund or "pot" created by the fees paid in by or for athletes and then paid out in accordance with a definite and published schedule of benefits.

The cost is 25c a year for protection during the physical education periods of the school; 25c for the track season; 50c a year for the hockey and basketball seasons; 75c for the six man football and \$1.00

for the eleven man football season. Methods of payment differ. Some schools pay for large squads. Some schools pay for the "varsity squad," and let the second teams and subs pay for themselves. Some schools go half and half.

The Fund thus created does not make a net profit for the League but it does just about break even from year to year, and in the event of an especially difficult year, the Schedule of Benefits could still be met in full for at its inception, the League authorized the drawing upon the Treasury to the ertent of \$1,000. But such a draft has never been required.

The amounts paid, depend upon the nature of the injury. Like similar schedules of other states, the nearly three dozen specified types of injuries are primarily those of fractures and dislocations.

There is a growing interest in this protection for the physical education classes. While most schools have doubled or tripled their programs the 25c fee is still authorized by the Board of Control—probably the best twenty-five cent investment one can make for the Schedule applies in exactly the same amounts. Of course the hazards in the physical education classes are not so grea, tyet it is a great comfort and 'calmer-downer' when a boy is hurt to be able to assure the father that most of the expenses of the broken arm or dislocated shoulder will be cared for by the A. A. B. Fund.

### 2. Annual Payment of League Dues

Dues are due when school starts and are delinquent at midnight September 30th.

Some of the smaller schools await the development of their basketball teams before joining the League, and thus run the risk of losing out in their memberships despite frequeent reminders in the News Letters.

A number of schools join the Consolidated School League and assume that this meets their obligation toward the N. D. H. S. League, there being some confusion in their minds. It is to be noted that the Consolidated and Graded School League is not in any way connected with the N. D. H. S. League but was planned and developed later to care for consolidated schools and grade schools doing part time high school work, that were not at the time eligible for membership in the parent organization.

### 3. War-Time Health Education Principles

Everywhere the physical fitness program has been stepped up with highly satisfactory results.

The following principles have been set forth in the Detroit schools as basic in physical education programs, and might well be accepted as worthy standards in our own schools:

- 1. Every means possible should be employed in the correction of remediable physical defects.
- Nutrition will assume greater and greater importance and should be emphasized in health instruction, general science, and home economics.

- 3. Most of us are qualified to teach first aid. Thi sis vitally important now.
- 4. As nursing service becomes scarcer it is more and more necessary that instruction be given in home care of the sick.
- 5. As we approach the possibility of large groups concentrating in limited spaces every precaution possible needs to be taken to insure healthful and sanitary school conditions.
- 6. Every boy and girl in our intermediate and high schools having pools should be taught to swim.
- 7. High school boys in particular should be given more combative sports.
- 8. We should concentrate more on those activities that will increase strength, agility, and physical stamina.
- Activities having potential morale building qualities should receive increased emphasis.
- 10. As many boys and girls as is possible under plant facilities should participate in intramural or interschool competitive athletics (High School).
- 11. In all of our physical education activities we should stress leadership and followership.
- Greater precautions should be taken to avoid accidents. Every accident is a potential loss physically, mentally, and economically.

### 4. Gymnasium Equipment: How to Obtain It

Equipment for gymnasium work of the type described in the official manual the League sent to each school last year, entitled Physical Fitness Through Physical Education for the Victory Corps, may be purchased by following certain specified plans.

The ten types of equipment given official authorization are: Swimming pool equipment such as ladders, platforms, diving board platforms and fulcrums. Climbing poles. Climbing ropes. Parallel bars. Horizontal bars. Stall bars. Flying and traveling rings. Horizontal ladders. Basketball goals. Volleyball standards. These it is to be noted involve some use of steel and iron. However orders are slow in being filled and schools do well to plan in advance, for their needs.

The authorities of the War Production Board ask all schools placing orders with manufacturers for such equipment, to send a copy of their orders to D. W. Lando, War Production Board, Jefferson Junior High School Building, Washington, D. C.

### 5. Are We Physically Fit

Recent reliable statistics give us reasn for bleieving that school efforts toward good health and good physique are productive of some good. And yet there is reason to know that there remains much to be done.

Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the American Medical Association Journal says: "The results of the examinations made by the Selective Service Boards and the Induction Boards are a challenge to the medical profession . . . and to all those concerned with the physical improvement of our people."

Statistics indicate that 40% of our draftees are rejected as unfit for military service, and the majority of those accepted are physically soft and without ample skill for self protection. It is estimated that 50% of our armed forces when inducted could not swim well enough to save their lives, and "lack the strength, agility and endurance to jump ditches, scale walls, throw missiles, and stand up under forced marches."

Col. Theodore P. Bank, Chief, Athletic and Recreational Branch of the U. S. Army defines physical fitness thus: "In the Army, we figure on physical fitness as freedom from disease; enough strength to do easily the heaviest task a soldier has to face; enough muscular endurance to be able to persist without undue fatigue thru the most strenuous day; enough cardio-respiratory (heart and lungs) endurance to perform easily any long continued exertion that the soldier is called upon to do; enough speed, agility and flexibility to be able to handle himself effectively in tactical operations."

### 6. How "Fit" Is "Physically Fit"?

The Amateur Athletic Union of the United States has prepared a bulletin for distribution that sets forth in definite figures standards of attainment as a measure of fitness.

This organization of more than fifty years existence thru a special Physical Fitness Committee representing the 41 Associations of the A. A. U. has prepared these tests most carefully and has dedicated them to the 4'safeguarding of our country by stimulating the interest and effort of American men and women toward physical fitness by providing progressive tests of speed, strength, agility and endurance as standards against which they may match their abilities and their progress."

There are standards for youth under 18; for those from 18 to 24; from 25 to 35; for those over 35; and "open to any age." The first series of tests are called "Primary Tests." A second group are "In-

termediate Tests" and the final group are the "Advanced Tests." There are similar tests and standards for women.

In addition to the track and field tests; there are walking tests; long distance tests; swimming tests; weight lifting tests; wrestling tests; gymnastic tests; and "all-around tests."

There are definite plans for scoring; and certificates are available for those who qualify, as well as certificates for organizations that co-operate with the A. A. U.

As this manuscript is being prepared it seems fairly likely that further information will be broadcast thru the League directly to each school but in the event such is not done, your attention is called to the official address of the Physical Fitness Committee of the A. A. U. Association at 39 S. La Salle St., Chicago, Illinois.

### 7. The North Dakota Pentathlon

Our state started something that may well become traditional, not only here but in other states, when for the first time a 'Penthalon' based on Physical Fitness activities was listed as one of the 13 standard field and track events at the State Track Meet.

The elimination of the javelin throw, opened the way for an experiment. A special committee of men close to the physical fitness program developed a five activity unit to replace the javelin throw and like the javelin throw to count as one of the standard 13 track and field events.

A rather unique point system of scoring was developed, and despite a few unforeseen minor problems, the new penthalon took its place in the eight District Field Meets and in the State Field Meet in very satisfactory shape.

Unaware of the North Dakota experiment, a group of schools in Southern California undertook to develop a district physical fitness penthalon contest. They used the 15 foot rope climb, the Burpee test, the sit-up, the standing hop step and jump and the 300 yard run. A description of the California plan can be secured for 15c by writing to the State Department of Education, at Sacramento, California.

It seems feasible to develop, in many schools, some intramural activities based upon the physical fitness program; and it also seems possible to develop some indoor "track meets" among neighboring schools as a fine "filler-in" after the basketball season, if not thruout the year.

### 8. 1935 Track Record Officially Recorded

On June 8, 1935, William John Feiler of Dickinson, made a new track record in the mile run, his time being 4:33.2.

Unfortunately the new record was not established at the time but the National Federation of State H. S. A. A. has provided a special blank for deferred recordings, and the blank having been duly filled and attested has now been accepted and filed at the League office.

The claim for the record was presented by C. T. Denton and G. R. Shelby of the Dickinson high school; was qualified by A. C. Van Wyk as referee, and was attested by A. C. Van Wyk as Track Manager; by L. C. McMahon as time keeper; by C. H. Kimball as starter and by J. C. Gould as Clerk of the Course.

This matter is included in the Yearbook for two reasons: To give publicity to the record itself; and to make public the fact that there is an approved and official way of establishing deferred records.

# Report of the Secretary of the North Dakota High School League

The office of Secretary of the N. D. H. S. League is combined with that of Treasurer.

The twofold office combines the financial interests of the League; the operation of the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund; the recording of the minutes of the League in its two official annual meetings (assuming the spring meeting is held at H. S. Conference time); the recording of the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Control; the maintenance of the roll of membership; and the official contact with member schools through the News Letters and personal correspondence.

As noted in the Index, the financial report and the Minutes of the League Meetings and of the Board of Control are printed elsewhere.

### Treasurer's Report

Elsewhere in this Yearbook is found the official report of the Certified Public Accountant testifying as to the accuracy of the records of income and expenditures and the assets of the N. D. H. S. League.

However it is believed that a running story of the business transactions of the year, may prove a little more readable and understandable to many League members.

In setting forth the financial story, "round numbers" will sometimes be used for the emphasis is laid on the general idea of the League business. The C. P. A. audit will report with detailed accuracy.

### The Income

In the first place, the League receives its income primarily from three major sources: The membership fees, the fees for the several forms of the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund, and the net proceeds from the two State Basketball Tournaments.

(a) The membership fees vary little from year to year. They amount to \$1.00 for each school in towns whose population is under 1,000; \$2.00 for towns whose populations run between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for other towns. And Parochial and Model schools pay according to the population of the towns in which they are located.

These dues are delinquent at midnight, September 30th but many schools pay well in advance—some of them during the summer, and once in a while some enthusiast pays during the spring (but there is no advantage in paying until the old school year is past). Once in a while some school overlooks the payment of the membership fee, in spite of the several News Letters that harp on the matter until the secretary feels almost apologetic for reminding schools. Presumably each of several school men—the superintendent or principal or coach—thinks someone else is tending to the matter. Or once in a while some school is uncertain whether to join the N. D. H. S. League or the C. and G. S. League; and once in a while a school frankly waits to see if the team is going to be good enough to try for a place in the tournament.

Receipts from membership this year amounted to \$317.00.

In addition to this tardy and delinquent schools paid from \$1.00 to \$4.00 penalty fees, totaling \$47.00. Ye Sec always feels a bit se'f-conscious about these penalties, for the League does not need the money, and frequently the school man himself has to dig up the penalty fee from his own pocket or from some uncertain source. But there seems no other way to keep schoolmen from forgetting their financial obligation to the League!

### (b.) Membership fees in the A. A. B. Fund.

In the fall, schools playing football scurry around rapidly to gain the protection of the A. A. B. Fund for their players. Eight hundred sixty-one boys were A. A. B. Fund members @ \$1.00 each. Some schools see that every lad who goes out in a school suit, whether a varsity player or a mere new scrub, is an A. A. B. Fund member. It seems like a legitimate expense, to give this protection, just as it is a legitimate expense to protect a boy with a good strong helmet or other equipment.

The six man game was not played so widely this year ,and naturally enough, the payment of the 75c fees reflect this fact. Receipts were \$241.50—representing an enrollment of 322 boys, whose coaches and superintendents and parents could breathe a little easier because of the possible aid from the Fund in the case of need.

Interest in Physical Education membership in the A. A. B. Fund is increasing. And why shouldn't it? For the same 25c fee as heretofore boys are given the same protection thruout the entire school year, and most schools have doubled or tripled the number of periods now spent in physical education classes, and in like degree have increased the possible hazards. Two hundred thirty-two boys were members this year accounting for the receipts of \$58.00. School superintendents are more and more recognizing that this is the finest protection, not only against the harards of the gym, but against misunderstandings and serious criticisms on the part of parents.

Seven hundred thirty-four boys were members of the A. A. B. Fund in the basketball section, the total fees amounting to \$367.00. While the hazards of this game are not as serious as those of football, dental injuries and dislocations and fractures are all too frequent, and it is a great feeling of satisfaction when one can report to parents that the dental or surgical bill will be cared for in large part, if not entirely, by the A. A. B. Fund of the N. D. H. S. League.

Five dollars was paid for membership in the hockey section of the A. A. B. Fund. Not many schools play inter-scholastic hockey.

This means a total of \$1,532.50 came into the League treasury for the A. A. B. Fund.

### (c) The Tournaments.

The A Tournament at Bismarck did very well under the handicaps of the year, the net proceeds being \$1,481.21; this after meeting all tournament expenses which were high, since per capita allowances for players was materially increased.

And the B Tournament at Minot again made a new record as it has been doing each year, the total net for the League being \$273.08.

The \$8.77 and \$37.39 received respectively from Region G and District 3 belong to them and are held only temporarily by the League, subject to call as per previous League action.

### (d) Other income sources.

Perhaps refund payment for balls, \$359.71, and for trophies, \$747.88, might better have been reported under Tournaments, for these figures represent repayment from the District, Regional or State Tournaments for balls and trophies used in the Tournaments and

charged to them. The League makes no profit on these transactions. In fact there usually is a minor loss, for it seems impossible to trace completely and accurately the final destiny of all balls, and secure the full payment. This is particularly true of the Regional games, where no one knows either the location or the management until the last moment after the District Tournaments are over and the Regional game has to be played the next week-end.

\$18.75 was received for intereest on Treasury bonds; and several school men were thoughtful enough to add nickels and dimes in the amount of \$1.35 to their checks to cover bank charges. Most men forget this item.

### (e) Summary.

It thus appears that the League income was just a few dollars beyond the \$4.800.00 mark.

### Expenditures

The largest single item of expenditure by the League is for trophies and awards. Most of these are of course for the basketball tournament season and covers purchases for the 16 Districts and the State A and State B sessions; but a goodly array of awards are provided for the eight track District Meets and the State Meet; and then there is the award for the Football championship. The bills this year total \$1,676.18. To this should be added the \$251.01 yet to pay at this writing on individual awards for next year's State A and B Tournaments. It will be remembered that instead of expensive track awards for the District Meets this year ribbons were provided both for the sake of economy and because the traditoinal awards are rare. The statement should be made that the net cost to the League is materially decreased inasmuch as the Districts refund to the League for their trophies and awards as do also the State A and B Tournaments. There is no refund, however, for football or track awards and trophies.

The printing bill of the year amounted to \$800.00, which covered the cost of the Yearbooks, about \$375.00; Federation Manuals and Rule Books, \$171.90 for the year—\$76.63 for next year; C. A. West, U. N. D., \$23.50 for Phys. Ed. Manuals; and about \$140.00 for printing of blanks for League use:

\$530.00 paid for basketballs for the District, Regional and State Tournaments was returned to the League except for incidental discrepancies referred to above. The Board of Control gets a special price on the balls, saving around \$3.00 a ball.

Office supplies amounted to \$57.30 and office labor to about \$61.00, the latter being a part of the usual \$100 allowance granted by the Board for office help.

"Communications," an account covering telegrams, long distance phones, stamped envelopes for correspondence and News Letters, stamps for packages, and some of the express, amounted to about \$200.00.

About \$300.00 was charged against the Board of Control to cover their expenses at three meetings-at the time of the Annual League meeting, and at the time of the A Tournament and at the time of the B tournament. These latter two particularly are not vacation times for Board members for they actually meet three and four or more times a day, holding important discussions as they eat and frequently transacting business at the time; then they usually meet during the afternoon after tournament games and in the evenings as well. This amount also included the two rather large luncheons given coaches and school men at the A and B Tournaments as League matters were discussed. These luncheons usually cost from 50c to  $65\mathrm{c}$ per plate and are attended by from 30 to 50 men and it is believed, have done much to clarify League problems. Included also are two trips by Board members-Mr. Tighe to direct the drawing for the A tournament at Bismarck, and Mr. Abrahamson to direct the drawing at Minot for the B tournament.

No Board member receives any payment whatever for his services; checks drawn are always re-imbursements for actual expenditures. The single exception is the secretary-treasurer who receives \$700..00 for his assumed services. This amount might be charged against the League Office perhaps, rather than against the Board of Control.

The A. A. B. Fund returned about \$740.00 to the schools for injuries during the athletic seasons. Of this amount about \$350 was for football players; \$145 for six man players; \$200 for basketball players and \$44.00 for members of physical education classes. Financially then this was a fine year for the A. A. B. Fund; but better still it means that relatively few boys were injured.

Under the heading of Miscellaneous, the League paid out about \$75.00, the larger amounts being as follows: \$25.00 for the annual C. P. A. audit; \$9.15 by special direction of the Board of Control to pay for damage at the A. C. dormitory during the 1942 Track Meet; \$7.50 annual dues to the National Federation at the rate of 25c per M high school enrollment in the state; \$3.50 refunds to schools for overpayments; about \$7.00 express not otherwise charged; \$25.00 for Secretary-Treasurer's \$10,000 bond and nearly \$40.00 for bank charges which ran as high as \$14.00 in a single month, October, when many checks were received.

Since the auditor for reasons of his own used headings somewhat different than those above recorded, a financial summary of the year might well be taken from the C. P. A. Audit as follows:

- (a) Total receipts for the A. A. B. Fund \$1,532.50, and total payments from the A. A. B. Fund \$743.07—a net gain of \$789.43. In other words the A. A. B. Fund had a good year financially altho "business" was naturally enough down both in income and in accident payments around 40%. Throughout the state there was a large falling off in athletic participation particularly in football and the six man game.
- (b) In the general business of the League, the income totaled \$3,308.55, and the expenditures amounting to \$4,829.12 made a deficiency of \$1,520.57.

However, aside from bookkeeping, the A. A. B. Fund and the general fund are all kept together, with the result that the financial change for the year means a net loss of \$731.14. This is due in largest measure not to increased expenses of the League, but to the falling off of the annual income from the State A Tournament. A comparison of the net incomes for the last two years makes it evident that the net balance is about \$500 less than the lowest previous incomes during the past ten years, and about \$2,100 less than the highest such income, and between \$1,100 and \$1,200 lower than the past 10 year average.

As stated elsewhere this situation involves no criticism upon the State A tournament, either as to location or management. Several factors are significant. Perhaps the gas-and-tire situation alone may suffice to account for much of the change, for obviously even enthusiastic fans are not going to travel the "magnificent distances" of the prairies quite so readily as in other years. Two other factors also have some significance: The number of players has been increased 40%, raising their expenses by that amount; and the per diem allowance has been increased in the last two years by well over 50%.

In summary, however, it will be noted that the League has a wholesome investment of \$5,400.00 purchase value, or \$7,000.00 maturity, in government securities of the finest type. These are all Sav.ngs Bonds except \$600.00 worth of Treasury 3½'s Bonds which bring the annual \$18.75 interest. The Savings Bonds, like War Bonds are accumulative. No War Bonds were purchased as the League, according to local bank authorities, is not eligible to purchase them.

In addition to the above securities, the League has at the time of audit a checking account of \$2,788.57. It will be noted in comparing the audits of the two years that the previous Savings Account of \$1,385.88 was thrown into the General account by authority of the

Board of Control, and hence while the outgo exceeded the income, the checking account of this June exceeds that of a year ago.

Further, the basketball tournament trophies for next year are now paid for and are in League possession, and a number of the printed pamphlets annually purchased from the National Federation are also in League possession.

The secretary-treasurer invites inquiry about League financial matters at all times from all League members.
