

# The League Calendar

#### NOTE PARTICULARLY:-

ALL MEMBERSHIPS EXPIRE September 30th, and are renewed only by specific payment of dues.

The fee is \$1.00 for towns under 1,000 population; \$2.00 for towns between 1,000 and 2,000; and \$3.00 for towns over 2,000.

BUT IF dues are not paid by November 1st they shall be doubled and if not paid by December 1st, they shall be increased by \$5.00. Further, no memberships shall be accepted after January 1st.

# Annual Meeting of the N. D. H. S. League

Study Hall, Bismarck High School, November 4, 1943

Presiding: M. B. Zimmerman, President of the Board of Control.

#### Order of Business:

- 1. Secretary L. A. White announces recent Board action as follows:
- a. High school girls shall be considered eligible for membership in the physical education department of the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund on the same basis as boys.
- b. Protection in the basketball department of the A.A.B. Fund for 1943 shall be as of November 1.
  - c. The state tournament dates are as follows: State A at Bismarck, March 9, 10, 11. State B at Minot, March 16, 17, 18.
  - 2. Report of the Secretary-Treasurer:

Since complete and detailed reports of the secretary-treasurer had been printed in the official Handbook for 1943 and distributed to all member schools it was moved by Mr. White, seconded by Mr. Killie of Fessenden and carried that the reports be accepted as printed.

3. The president announces the nominating committee which had been previously appointed:

Seifkin of Hankinson, Hagen of Dickinson, Tiller of Walhalla.

#### 4. Old Business:

There being none, the president called for the next order of business.

#### 5. New Business:

Superintendent Stevens of Lakota offers the following resolution as a motion:

Whereas, the schools, St. Mary's of Bismarck, St. Leo's of Minot and Sacred Heart of Fargo have consistently shown by their basketball tournament play that they are class A competition: be it therefore moved that these schools shall be designated as class A for the purpose of basketball tournament play subject to the regulation of the Board of Control of the North Dakota High School League. This provision shall become effective beginning with the 1943-44 basketball season.

The motion was seconded by Supt. Gludt of Killdeer.

In an active discussion many participated.

Mr. Strand (coach of St. Mary's) offers as a substitute motion the proposal that the High School League should abandon the separate Class A and Class B tournaments, the motion being seconded by Bridgeford of Fargo. The chair however, rules that this is not a substitute motion in as much as it is in conflict with the idea of the original motion.

After prolonged discussion Father Hogan offered as a substitute motion the proposal that the Board of Control be commissioned to determine by January 1, based on their seasons record to date, which team (or teams?) referring to St. Mary's of Bismarck, St. Leo's of Minot and Sacred Heart of Fargo, should be placed in Class A for tournament play. Motion was seconded by Mr. Colton.

The chair rules that this is a substitute motion for the original motion in as much as it deals directly with the problem of the original motion.

A motion made by Casselman, seconded by several called for voting by ballot. This motion was amended by Mr. Van Wyk who called for the vote by mail and his motion was seconded by Rice but the motion did not carry.

Casselman and his second then withdrew their motion that the vote be taken by ballot only to be followed by a motion by Jensen

seconded by Gludt that the vote should be taken by ballot which motion then prevailed.

The call then came for the vote on the substitute motion (which would leave the matter of the three schools and their entrance into Class A tournament in the hands of the Board of Control). This vote lost by a vote of 51 to 29.

The original motion was then put to the assembly who voted 50 to 25 in favor of the original resolution which places St. Mary's of Bismarck, Sacred Heart of Fargo and St. Leo's of Minot in Class A for basketball participation.

In the meantime the nominating committee presented the names of "coach" Earl Abrahamson of Mohall and "coach" John Roberts of Hettinger to succeed themselves. There being no nominations from the floor itwas moved by Quam, seconded by several and carried that nominations be closed and the secretary cast a unanimous ballot to succeed themselves.

Note: It is a fact that both Mr. Abrahamson and Mr. Roberts are acting as coaches and results indicate that both are very well qualified. This now brings into view a proposal made several years ago that coaches of the state should have some representatives on the Board of Control.

# Meetings of the Board of Control A

Bismarck, November 3, 4, 5

Present: M. B. Zimmerman, Chairman; E. Abrahamson, J. J. Roberts, A. C. VanWyk, L. A. White.

At scattered intervals the Board of Control members got together several times and the following minutes indicate their discussion and form of action.

1. Moved by J. J. Roberts, seconded by L. A. White and carried that the Board authorize the secretary-treasurer to pay the delayed claims of last year as presented this fall by Harvey and Mandan. Claims respectively being numbers 1112 and 1113. These were accepted as bonafide and proper claims against the A.A.B. Fund, the reports of which have been delayed or overlooked by the schools in charge. Some members of the Board of Control felt critically inclined toward school superintendents who, without good cause, neglect to report their injuries within 12 days and complete

their claim blanks within 60 days as required by the A.A.B. Fund regulations. However, it seemed wise to maintain this tradition of the High School League that all A.A.B. Fund claims shall be paid 100%.

- 2. Moved by A. C. VanWyk, seconded by J. J. Roberts and carried that November 1, 1943 be named as the official opening date for the basketball season for this year as far as the A.A.B. Fund is concerned.
- 3. Moved by A. C. VanWyk, seconded by Earl Abrahamson and carried that the benefits of the A.A.B. Fund, so far as physical education is concerned, be open to high school girls the same as to high school boys.

#### 4. Discussion:

Discussion of scheduled benefits of the A.A.B. Fund. Reference was made to two specific problems:

- a. In the event of a multiple injury what shall be the total payment.
- b. In the event of a vertebral injury what payment shall be made.

The secretary reminded members of the Board of Control of his findings as he attended a meeting of representatives of the National Federation in Chicago two years ago at which time the various states reported their own experiences and plans in these problems. It seems that most states in the event of a multiple injury pay the full amount for the largest injury and half the scheduled amount for each other injury. Most of the states also make a distinction between the relatively unimportant fracture of the lateral processes of the vertebra paying five or ten dollars only for such injuries but paying larger amounts-\$40 the North Dakota fee being a normal amount-for a fracture of the main part of the vertebral ring on the grounds that the fracture of the little processes is not likely to be serious at all whereas a fracture of the encircling bone may endanger the spinal cord. The Board of Control after discussing these points took no action since they were uncertain whether previous action had been taken. Such a subsequent study of the minutes of the Board of Control reveal that no definite action had been taken but the problems were explained as reported on page 28 of the 1942 Yearbook. Board members seem to be of the opinion that the above findings however were probably appropriate.

#### 5. Discussion:

The question was raised about the possible transfer of membership fees to new athletes when others drop out. The secretary, under the impression that in all likelihood this has been a problem in other states, proposed to write to the National Federation secretary to

see what action other states have taken in this matter. Subsequently, he found, as indicated on page 12 of the 1941 Yearbook, that the Board of Control had already ruled that such transfers are not permissable.

#### 6. Discussion:

Without motion it was agreed that if new federal or state taxes are now applicable to the two basketball tournaments such amounts shall be added to the admission fees.

#### 7. Discussion:

District tournament committees.

It was agreed that the membership of the district tournament committees should be continued as heretofore. In the event one man has withdrawn from the district the other two shall name a successor; and in the event two men have withdrawn the one remaining member shall name a new member and these two shall agree upon a third.

8. Moved by J. J. Roberts, seconded by Earl Abrahamson and carried that the action of the Board of Control as stated on page 10 of the 1943 Yearbook to the effect that "the runner-up of the state B (1942) tournament shall be declared winner of that tournament" shall be corrected. It was subsequently found that action did not represent the intention of the members of the Board of Control as explained subsequently on several occasions nor was it in line with a previously established tradition that in the event of the winner of a district tournament being declared ineligible the district shall then be without representation.

#### 9. Discussion without motion.

It was agreed that the old rectangular backboards should be continued as official for the season and for the tournament for all class B play.

#### B

#### Patterson Hotel Dining Room, Friday Afternoon

Present: M. B. Zimmerman, A. C. VanWyk, J. J. Roberts, L. A. White.

Much of the afternoon was devoted to the meeting with superintendents, principals and representatives of thirteen of the sixteen class A schools as they laid plans for necessary changes in the tournament set-up due to the new membership of St. Leo's, St. Mary's and Sacred Heart. Recommendations were made by the representatives of the schools to the Board of Control as follows:

- 1. The state as a whole shall be divided into an eastern division including Grafton, Grand Forks, Park River, Devils Lake, Fargo, Sacred Heart, Wahpeton and Valley City and a western division including Mandan, Dickinson, Bismarck, St. Mary's, Minot, St. Leo's and Williston.
- II. Play-off plans for entrance into the state A tournament shall be as follows:
  - 1. Northwest-Southwest districts.
- a. The two top teams in each district shall be seeded and shall compete in the same bracket (this means that the two teams in the northwest district shall play in that district tournament and the two teams in the southwest district shall play in that district tournament). The remaining four teams to determine by lot their position in brackets (that means that one or both teams might by lot find themselves placed in the other district tournament).
- b. Play elimination one night; four teams play at Fargo and four teams at Grand Forks. Seeded teams to play in their own district—south at Fargo and north at Grand Forks (this means that one game only will determine in each instance the entrant to the state tournament.)
- c. The income and expense of both tournaments shall be combined. Losses and profits are to be shared equally by all teams. Expenses of competing teams for travel, food and hotel shall follow the schedule of allowances of the state tournament.
- d. Managers of the tournaments shall be designated by the superintendents of the Fargo and the Grand Forks schools.
  - 2. Plans for Southwest district play-off:
- a. A double elimination tournament is to be held in Bismarck either one or two weeks before the state tournament (to be decided by the coaches at once).
  - Pairing for the first round:
     Jamestown and Dickinson
     Mandan and St. Mary's
  - c. Remaining rounds as performers West Conference set-up.
  - d. VanWyk named tournament manager.

- e. Officials to be named by mail with fees as paid by old West Conference.
- f. Profits or losses to be shared by the four teams. State tournament allowances and player limits to govern (this means that expense allowance for travel, lodging and meals for ten players and coach as set by the State A Tournament shall be considered appropriate).
  - 3. Plans for Northwest district play-off:
- a. Minot, Williston and St. Leo's together with one team drawn by lot from Mandan, Bismarck and St. Mary's shall constitute a four team three-day double elimination tournament to be held on the first week in March beginning March 2nd, at Minot.
  - b. Bismarck was found by lot to be the selected school.
  - c. Pairings for the first round:

    Bismarck and St. Leo's

    Minot and Williston
- d. It was agreed that George Heidt should be contacted immediately by phone as one official; the second to be agreed upon later. Fee \$40 and expenses if the tournament is for two days only and \$50 and expenses if the third day is necessary.
- e. Expense allowance for ten men and coach shall be the same as in the A Tournament.
- f. Net proceeds or losses shall be shared equally by the four teams.

The above reports having been made to the Board of Control it was moved by L. A. White, seconded by A. C. VanWyk and carried that the recommended plans be accepted as the basis for the 1944 tournament.

- III. Miscellaneous business.
- 1. Trophies
- a. Moved by J. J. Roberts, seconded by A. C. VanWyk and carried that the best possible arrangements be made with Josten Mfg. Co. to provide such trophies and awards as are possible in the event a duplicate of last year's order for basketball tournaments and track meets are not available.
  - 2. Discussion:
  - a. One member of the district basketball tournament commit-

tee has found it difficult to attend some of the committee meetings and asks if upon occasion he might be represented by his high school principal. In the discussion by the Board of Control members they felt that the appointee should himself act completely or permit a successor to be appointed rather than delegate any of the responsibilities to one not appointed by the Board.

#### 3. Wahpeton has two ineligible players.

Mr. Zimmerman asks the Board of Control to take appropriate action penalizing his school according to their judgment for the use of two men subsequently found to be ineligible. One player took part in two games. He was a new student who entered the school without a transcript of credits and for whom the transcript of credits did not come until after the player had participated in two games. Apparently he had insisted at all times that he was eligible but it was subsequently found that he had not passed in three subjects the previous semester.

The other player was a senior, a regular member of the Wahpeton High School. However, he had never before been out for football and the school authorities failed to double check on his credits. He too was found to have passed in only two subjects last semester. Upon motion by J. J. Roberts, seconded by L. A. White and carried it was agreed that the usual procedure should be followed including:

- a. The official letter from the League calling for renewed allegiance to the High School League standards and
- b. The forfeit of the games in which the ineligible players had participated and
  - c. Publication of the fault in the News Letter.
- 4. Moved by A. C. VanWyk, seconded by J. J. Roberts and carried that track meets shall be held for the forthcoming season of the same type as last year including the substitution of the pentathlon for the javelin throw.
- 5. Moved by J. J. Roberts, seconded by A. C. VanWyk and carried that the state track meet be held at Valley City if acceptable arrangements can be made.
- 6. Moved by J. J. Roberts, seconded by A. C. VanWyk and carried that the secretary's salary be adjusted upward sufficiently to absorb the withholding tax.

#### $\boldsymbol{C}$

#### State A Tournament, Bismarck, March 9, 10, 11, 1944

Present: Zimmerman, VanWyk, Roberts, White. Absent, Abrahamson.

As usual a series of informal discussions was held as members met at meals, as they sat at the tournament sessions at scattered intervals.

Friday noon a more formal session was held, with business as follows:

1. Balls purchased from Northern School Supply Company. Moved by Roberts seconded by VanWyk that the League purchase balls from Northern School Supply Company, same quality as this year, same price as this year (\$12.95) in same quantities as this year (4 for State A, 4 for State B, 2 for whatever Class A Districts used them, and Districts 1 to 10, and corresponding Regions.) Carried.

#### 2. Track Meet date set:

Moved by VanWyk, seconded by Roberts and carried, that the State Track Meet already set at Valley City be scheduled for May 27, with the several District Meets the preceding week; and the Invitational Meets (if any) the week before that.

#### 3. Spring Football:

There was a review-discussion of Spring Football, with the conclusion that since it was the League as a whole that had legislated against Spring Football the League alone had power to rescind the ruling. It appeared however that the Board members were of the opinion that each school might properly enough under war time conditions, use their own judgment . . . but this was opinion only and has no legal bearing.

- 4. Reference to the Sheyenne Protest against the management of the Fourth District Tournament. No action taken; but it was suggested that further discussion migh be made at the next Board meeting at Minot next week in the event there seems any need.
  - 5. Purchase of championship football awards:

Moved by Roberts, seconded by White that 2 football trophies be purchased for this school year's co-champions of the East-West Conference; and one for last year, since there were co-champions last year, with but a single trophy. Mr. Zimmerman supported the motion only in the event that last year's trophy should be such as to satisfy Mr. Gold of Mandan which school was co-champion last year. Carried.

#### 6. Saturday afternoon consolation game officials:

Agreed that Huss of Bismarck and Bridgeford of Fargo be officials.

7. Purchase 1945 basketball trophies:

Moved by White seconded by Roberts that a budget about equal to that of this year be alloted to basketball trophies and order placed in the hands of Newton and Josten Manufacturing Company to secure best possible trophies available under war conditions. Carried.

- 8. Discussion of Track awards. Already purchased for 1945. Evidence of some dissatisfaction with ribbon individual awards; this purchase was explained on the basis of (a) economy and (b) shortage of significant trophies.. It seems obvious that track interest has dropped very significantly. Some Districts held no meets at all last year. But the Board agreed that the skeleton of the Meets must be maintained and full encouragement given to this important sport.
- Permanent pass cards for retired Board of Control members:

No action was taken, inasmuch as nothing suitable is on the market now; but the board opinion seemed favorable.

10. The Board of Control and E.-W. Conference Committees:

The Board of Control as individuals, and once or twice as an official Board met with the members and officials of the East-West Conference for discussions of matters of mutual interest.

The E.-W. Conference officials finally appointed a special committee to make specific certain ideas that had been in state of flux and the Board of Control subsequently met with the Committee to discuss some of these ideas. It was later agreed that a representative of the E.-W. Conference Committee should be invited by the Board of Control to meet with them at the Class B Tournament time to clarify and accept or reject the E. W. proposals.

### D

#### B Tournament Time, Minot, March 16-18, 1944

Present: All members.

As usual, scattered meetings were held in informal conference manner, with discussions that formed the basis for subsequent action. Mr. VanWyk explains a few points about broadcasting of the A Tournament indicating among other things that he had phoned KILO, Grand Forks, offering them the privilege of broadcasting the A tournament (previously denied by the Memorial Hall Committee); but KILO decided not to broadcast inasmuch as Grand Forks was not a participant.

1. The matter of broadcasting tournaments was the subject of a number of conferences, the result of which was the final adoption of a motion as follows:

#### Concerning Broadcasting:

Moved by Abrahamson, seconded by VanWyk that the following represents the attitude of the Board of Control on the broadcasting of state tournaments:

- 1. The Board of Control believes that effective broadcasting of tournament games not only pleases the 'fans' at home, but is definitely helpful to the tournament itself.
- 2. The Board of Control knows no reason for limiting the privilege of broadcasting to any one station.
- 3. Any station desiring to broadcast the tournament shall broadcast all parts of all games.
- 4. The sponsorship of all broadcasts must be approved by the Board of Control. It is not permissable that liquor or tobacco firms sponsor any broadcasts.
- 5. Any station desiring to broadcast shall notify the Board of Control thru its secretary, not later than October first, indicating its plans for meeting the foregoing stipulations.
- 6. All installations necessary for the broadcasts shall be made only with the consent and approval of the owners of the gymnasium where the tournament is held.

#### Carried.

II. Concerning District and Regional Tournament moneys:

Reference made to page 39 of the 1940 Yearbook brought to light the fact that the Board of Control has ruled that net proceeds from a District Tournament belong to that District and may be divided among the participating teams.

It is understood that as heretofore the expense of a given team to the Regional Tournament Game shall be considered a legitimate part of the District Tournament, in the event the Regional Tournament does not pay out.

#### Motion Concerning Regional Tournaments:

To clarify the matter further, it was moved by Abrahamson, seconded by VanWyk that net proceeds from a Regional Tournament game shall be divided equally between the two participating Districts, the half sum to be sent by the Regional manager to each of the District managers to be added to the net balance, if any, from the District Tournament, and thus divided back among the participating teams.

#### Carried.

Note: It was agreed that the Tournament manager of the District shall divide the moneys among the several teams, under the direction of the District Committee.

#### III. Hanna Named Track Manager:

Since previously the State Track and Field Meet had been placed at Valley City and the date set as May 27, a motion was made by Roberts, seconded by VanWyk that Supt. G. W. Hanna be named as the manager of the meet. Carried.

#### Other Meet Dates:

It was further agreed that the District Track Meets, to be held in the same locations as heretofore, should be on the week preceding the State Meet; and that invitational Meets shall be held prior to the time of the District Meets.

#### IV. Individual medals for participants in State Meet:

Moved by VanWyk, seconded by Roberts, that the use of ribbons for the State Track meet be abandoned, and that 1st, 2nd and 3rd place individual awards be purchased for each of the 13 events, in keeping with proposals previously set forth by Mr. Newton of the Josten Company. Carried.

It was also agreed that the secretary should call the attention of the Josten Company to the fact that the District Basketball trophies were considered far below their usual standard and question their actual value.

#### V. Discussion: Teachers Retirement Fund:

Without motion it was agreed that the secretary of the Board of Control should write to the Board of Managers of the Teachers' Retirement Fund indicating their judgment that the Retirement might properly pay the maximum allotment to retired teachers rather than continue to build up unneeded reserve too rapidly.

VI. Plans were laid for the usual noon luncheon when coaches and superintendents and a few others are guests of the Board of

Control for the discussion of tournament and League problems. At the luncheon some reference was made to (a) The National Committee's questionnaire on proposed basketball rule changes; (b) Use of old backboard versus the oval backboard; (c) schools' responsibilities for acquainting young lads with the Navy program as presented by a Navy representative; (d) and opportunity was given as always for school men to present any problems pertaining to the tournament or League.

1944 Class B Tournament set at Minot:

An invitation from Mr. Alton Anderson, president of the Minot Junior Chamber of Commerce was presented for the 1944 Tournament, upon which Mr. J. J. Roberts moved that the invitation be accepted, Mr. White seconded the motion, and it was carried unanimously.

VII. Carlson of Minot and Murdoch of Bismarck were named as officials for the afternoon consolation games. Plans were laid for the giving of trophies and awards at the gymnasium at the close of the tournament and at the banquet.

VIII. Pentathlon Plans:

Moved by Roberts, seconded by VanWyk that C. T. Denton of Bismarck and Frank Young of Minot be appointed a committee to clarify any problems connected with the Pentathlon as one of the Track Meet events. Carried.

IX. New Plans for Class A Tournament, from East-West Conference:

Mr. C. T. Denton, secretary of the East-West Conference and memebr of a Special E. W. Conference Committee appeared before the Board of Control as per previous arrangement at the meetings during the Class A Tournament and presented the following recommendations from the East-West Conference Special Committee:

"Motion by H. Rice and seconded by Supt. Gussner that the following recommendations be made to the Board of Control:

1. That the state be divided into four districts:

N.E.: Devils Lake, Grand Forks, Park River, Grafton.

S.E.: Fargo, Sacred Heart, Wahpeton, Valley City.

N.W.: Minot, St. Mary's, Williston, St. Leo's.

S.W.: Bismarck, Dickinson, Mandan, Jamestown.

2. That play for the right to enter the State A Tournament be conducted on the same plan as that used in the East Half this year."

Note: The East Half Plan referred to above clarified by the Board of Control is as follows:

First: All four teams in each District shall be given a designated rank of First, Second, Third or Fourth, in any manner determined by the District.

Second: The two top seeded teams in each District are to play the two lower-placed teams in the other or opposite District in this manner:

Team No. 1 of one District plays Team No. 4 of the other District.

Team No. 2 of one District plays Team No. 3 of the other.

Teams No. 1 and 2 shall play in their own home Districts.

Third: The games shal be played at Fargo, Grand Forks, Minot and Bismarck, respectively, to the S.E., N.E., NW., and S.W. Districts, unless the four teams involved in a given play-off shall mutually agree upon another location.

Fourth: All profits or loss shall be equally shared among the eight teams in the given half of the state, the two tournaments of that half to be considered as a unit. Expense allowance for transportation, meals and lodging shall be the same as for the State A Tournament . . . 40 cents a one way mile, \$3.50 per man per day for 10 players and coach; with \$10.00 allowance for the home town team.

Fifth: The tournament play-offs shall be held on the second Friday preceding the State Tournament, unless a majority of the four teams involved in the given play-off shall by agreement appoint another date.

Sixth: During or before December, the two tournament managers of the given half section of the State, shall submit to all eight schools of the given half-section of the state, a list of not less than 10 possible officials to be rated by each school, the top rated men to be secured for the two District Tournaments of the section, in their order of ranking and availability.

Motion that the aforegoing plan as recommended by the East-West Conference Committee be adopted was made by White, seconded by VanWyk and carried.

- X. Murdoch and Carlson (Bismarck and Minot) appointed to officiate at the Saturday afternoon consolation games.
  - XI. State B again at Minot.

At the Saturday noon luncheon attended by over 30 coaches, principals, superintendents and others as guests of the Board of Control, President Alton Anderson of the Junior Chamber of Commerce presented an invitation for the 1945 Class B Tournament on the same terms as this year:

Moved by Roberts, seconded by White that the invitation be accepted. Carried.

XII. Tournament dates fixed:

Moved by VanWyk, seconded by Roberts that the State A Tournament for 1945 be held on March 15, 16 and 17; and the Class B Tournament be held one week later.

No invitations have yet been received for the Class A Tournament and hence no action taken.

Note: The Board of Control gave approval to KILO, Grand Forks station, to broadcast the final tournament game in the event Mayville became a participant. KLPM invited KILO to use their hookup without charge if they desired. However, KILO broadcast directly from the officials' booth, presumably reaching the Mayville neighborhood much more effectively than KLPM could have done alone.

Adjournment.

## Scattered Items of Interest

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND PHYSICAL FITNESS

"EDUCATION FOR VICTORY," issue of May 3 tells of a second series of regional institutes recently held under the direction of the U. S. Department of Education. The following quotations are significant:

#### Purpose of Institutes

The purpose of the institutes and meetings were defined as follows:

To aid school administrators in meeting administrative problems in relation to wartime programs in health and physical education, such as ways of meeting the teacher shortage, scheduling, program planning, provision of facilities, training student leaders, and conducting testing programs.

2. To stimulate increased efforts in providing school health services, and health instruction.

To stimulate increased efforts in providing improved physical fitness programs for boys and girls.

- 4. To encourage evaluation of improvement in physical fitness.
- 5. To acquaint lay community leaders with the school health and physical education programs, and solicit their support of such programs.
- 6. To create better understanding of Army and Navy physical training and recreation programs, and preinduction physical fitness needs of boys and girls.
- 7. To increase the morale and stimulate to greater efforts teachers of physical and health education.
  - 8. To emphasize competitive methods using more students.

#### Status and Trends

The following impressions were gained as to present status and trends in school and college physical fitness programs:

Schools have increased the time allotment to physical education. More students are being given physical education, particularly juniors and seniors in high schools. School people are discouraged over the prospect of losing their few remaining men physical education teachers, but are using a variety of procedures to try to meet the situation.

Physical education programs include more vigorous activities especially those developing the arms, shoulder-girdle, trunk, and abdominal muscles. Greater emphasis is being placed on developing strength, speed, agility, and endurance. Fewer recreation activities are being taught.

Much more testing of physical education is being done, using such tests as chins, dips, push-ups, sit-ups, squat-jumps, jump and reach, squat thrusts, swimming, broad-jump, obstacle courses, and running. The tests most commonly used are chinning, push-ups, sit-ups, and running. There is apparently an increased emphasis on exercise as such and less emphasis on teaching skills. Whereas at the beginning of the war reduced attention was paid to progression, there is now coming in a renewed interest in progression and in bringing boys to peak condition gradually.

Interscholastic athletic programs have been curtailed as to distances covered, but are being continued. Programs for girls have

been stepped up in vigor but have been changed less than have boys' programs.

Greater effort is being made to discover and correct health defects. More health instruction is being given. There is a tendency to favor a semester period of health instruction on the junior high school level and another course on the senior high school level. Relatively (to the importance of the problem) there has been insufficient shift in high school curricula to allow adequate time for health instruction.

There appears a decreased emphasis on obstacle courses, possibly due to a feeling that they are too strenuous, and possibly to lack of imagination as to how to use them. Military marching is not being used extensively and where used is often poorly taught. Calisthenics or conditioning exercises are being widely used. There is a marked return to use of apparatus exercises.

Sanitation of dressing and bathing facilities and cleanliness of uniforms is noticeably below standard.

#### Present Problems

Some of the most pressing problems confronting school people interested in improving health and physical education for boys and girls relate to:

The teacher shortage.

Health examination of students, and discovery of remediable health defects.

Shifts in school curricula to allow more time for organized health instruction.

Classification of students in physical education so as to allow more progression in instruction and exercise.

Grade level achievement standards relating to the varied objectives of physical and health education.

More vigorous activities for girls.

Excusing athletes from basic instruction in physical education.

Substitution of R. O. T. C. for physical education.

Extensive use of boxing, often poorly taught.

More consideration to improved health and physical education programs in elementary schools.

Consideration of the advisability of a possible trend toward the assuming of health instruction in schools and the training of teach-

ers of health education by public health agencies rather than by constituted educational agencies.

# STATUS OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND HEALTH EDUCATION IN NORTH DAKOTA

C. A. West of the University of North Dakota, by means of a questionnaire spread throut the state thru the agency of the office of the secretary of the N. D. H. S. League analyzed the status of physical education and health education in the state.

His first finding was to the effect that "the mid size gym... 60 feet by 34 feet by 18 feet... of the smaller schools is a little too small for best basketball; but on the whole the gym situation is not a serious one, for most gyms were entirely adequate for physical education needs, i.e. 50 square feet per pupil.

But the equipment, he found on the whole is insufficient, almost entirely lacking in many instances. . . Few horses and parallel bars; not sufficient mats; not many chinning bars, nor climbing ropes: not ample facilities for volley ball.

His findings indicate that shower facilities are generally inadequate. . . an average of two boys and one for girls in the smaller schools and three for boys and two for girls in the larger schools.

Locker facilities for physical education work are not sufficient.

Nearly three-fourths of the smaller schools and one-fourth of the larger schools do not provide foot-protection solutions against athletes foot and other infections.

Few make any provisions for towels in the showers, and not many for soap.

A third of the smaller schools do not require "dress" for gym work, and even 17 percent of the larger schools; and 52 percent and 45 percent respectively do not require showers after gym work.

His conclusion is that the gym and dressing room instead of being the model health center of the school is all too often "one of the smelliest and dirtiest places in the system."

Encouragement is found in the fact that over 90 percent of the schools have play areas near the schools . . . varying in size from three-eighths of an acre to five acres in the smaller schools, and from one-tenth of an acre to a block in larger schools. He advocates, two or three outdoor basketball courts, several horse shoe courts, a soft ball field, and a field with turf for football, touchball and volleyball.

Mr. West finds too many gyms closed at night because of the slight cost of heat and lights and janitor service, and is critical of this fact.

Insufficiently prepared teachers, the questionnaire shows are fairly common, though 21 percent in the smaller schools and 53 percent in the larger schools have either a major or a minor in physical education preparation.

The program has been increased markedly thruout the state.... "practically all our high schools require boys to take physical education five days a weeks in grades nine to twelve; though the program for girls is only about half that. Less than an hour period, does not seem advisable.

Physical exams are required among 29 percent of the smaller schools and 55 percent of the larger schools. Mr. West recommends a uniform card for statewide use.

There is, Mr. West reports, a marked dearth of work in "health education," and quotes authorities to indicate the national need for such work . . . six million people incapacitated for work by illness or accidents on a typical winter day; 22,000,000 illnesses disabling for a week or more, in a single year; the average person disabled 10 days each year; the wasting of millions of dollars on needless ills and ailments, and on useless or harmful medicines or nostrums.

It is interesting to note that the University of Illinois will now accept two units of credit in physical education out of the 15 required for college entrance.

He recommends that everywhere, if possible, facilities for physical education and recreation be improved: (a) with better showers and dressing room facilities with lockers or at least with baskets; (b) improved and increased gymnasium equipment and apparatus; (c) improved and enlarged play areas adjacent to the schools for out of school hours.

He recommends that all physical education teachers have at least a minor preparation in that subject, and that ALL such teachers have at least one basic course in Health Education.

He recommends that the physical education period should be of standard sixty minutes in length, with three days a week devoted to the physical training and two days a week to health education, with physical examinations.

He feels cleanliness should be emphasized . . . in the rooms, in the equipment; in the play suits; in the showers; with soap and towels provided.

He believes that the physical education class should be conducted as a class . . . that credit should be given for it, and that actual grades indicating quality of work, should be given.

He advocates the development of the physical examinations by doctors and dentists with appropriate follow up thru co-operation with parents.

And he concludes that the health education program should be placed as a definite responsibility in specific hands in each school.

#### PHYSICAL FITNESS AND WAR MEMORIALS

The National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations, of which North Dakota is a long time member in reporting on the activities of the Committee on Physical Fitness presents a suggestion from that Committee that certainly merits fullest cooperation.

The following is an exact quotation:

"One of the activities of the Fitness Committee is that concerning the stimulation of interest in erecting utilitarian war memorials during the postwar era. Various schools and other organizations are being contacted to enlist their interest in having war memorials take the form of recreational facilities, school physical fitness extensions and public athletic fields. There is certain to be a great deal of interest in this type of memorial when the war ends and if energy is directed into useful channels, something of permanent value may come from it. The schools are in a position to exercise direction and supervision if they are alert and if activity is started early enough to forestall movements into less desirable channels. It is not too early for individual school administrators and state high school associations to develop plans which will make maximum use of these energies."

It seems highly probable that based upon their experiences with Memorial Halls, many communities can advisedly sponsor the proposals for athletic fields and community play grounds of appropriate size and properly equipped as an additional and different type of memorial.

#### NATIONAL BASKETBALL COMMITTEE

In late March, 1944, the National Basketball Committee met to discuss basketball problems and proposed answers as based upon 10,000 questionnaires previously sent thruout America to interested students of the game. North Dakota men participated in the use of the questionnaires. That they represent a wide spread viewpoint of high school people is shown by the fact that of the 10,000 question-

naires, 6,500 were sent to high schools, 1,000 to organized high school officials, 750 to colleges, 600 to Y.M.C.A.'s, 450 to Chartered Boards of Officials, 350 to the National Coaches Association and 350 to Canada. It is interesting to note that 75 of the leading newspapers of the country were also given the questionnaire, and a few sporting editors did reply.

In the tabulation below, are listed the eight major problems according to the replies of the questionnaires. Their order of importance is indicated by the number under the heading "weight"; Thus more people felt that the most serious problem for consideration is the number of fouls that causes disqualification although there is no marked agreement as to what might best be done. On

the previous page are listed a variety of suggestions. It is interesting to note that some states have tried 5 personal fouls before disqualification and at least one, Minnesota has concluded that the standard four is quite enough. The question of "goal tending" which in common parlance has seemed so important, according to this study ranks next to the last... and this will be a surprise to many of us. During the State Tournaments, Dr. Nordly and Ossie Oudahl the officials felt that it rated No. 2 in importance but agreed that the personal foul disqualification rule was No. 1.

Whether to "freeze" the rules as they are, and quit tampering with them, or try to make "improvements" . . . is a question that will find most fans lining up definitely on one side or the other. Proponents of "freezing" point out that the grand old game of baseball has become what it is, in part at least, because the rules have been stabilized in recent decades and it is too big to be tampered with. Others point out that the present game is weakened by certain problems that can be solved only by experimentation. It is to be noted that over two-thirds of the voters favor some changes.

# Report of the Secretary of the North Dakota High School League

Perhaps the most important part of the secretary's work, does not lend itself well to a final report. Scores and scores of letters are received by the secretary and an even greater number leave his office; and in some respects these represent the most important part of the year's work for they are the equivalent of personal contacts. The so-called "League" has no identity other than in the personalities of the men whose schools are members. But in its influence on the high school life of the state there is reason to believe that the League does have a personality.

A second part of the secretary's report, having to do with the meetings of the Board of Control and the annual meeting of the League as an organization is found elsewhere in this Yearbook. The office of the secretary is the clearing house for the members of the Board of Control and thru this office much correspondence is had with Board members.

The News Letters have continued thruout the year. A total of approximately 5,000 mimeographed sheets of material presumably of some interest to League members having been sent out to a mailing list of about three hundred fifty, including League members, newspaper men, college coaches, business firms, extra League members, and so on.

The Secretary has maintained appropriate contact with the Committees and Managers of all tournaments and meets giving some assistance, receiving some assistance, providing trophies and awards as directed by the Board of Control; arranging for and receiving their reports, and so on.

Despite the publication in 1938 and the distribution then and once again later, of a Special Yearbook of Interpretations of Eligibility Rules, the secretary's office maintains a goodly correspondence with school men thruout the year concerning questions of eligibility. This is as it should be, and simply betokens the fact that conscientious school men want to make certain that they are upholding the plans and principles of the League. It has been a privilege of many years to continue this correspondence and to note the high standards of sportsmanship maintained so regularly by the schoolmen of the state.

The foregoing list of 234 schools represents all but six of the "Fully Accredited High Schools"; it includes 42 of the Minor "Accredited High Schools"; and it includes eight Consolidated Schools.

Since the change in classification of high schools, the League has not clarified its point of view on required membership. The Constitution in Article III, Section 1, provides that "Any classified

school in North Dakota or any school of equivalent rank specifically admitted from year to year by the Board may become a member of the League by acknowledging allegiance to its authority and paying the annual dues."

This wording was clear in the days when all high schools were definitely classified as "First Class," "Second Class," or "Third Class." But now that schools are known as "Fully Accredited" and "Minor Accredited" the position of the League is not so clear. For the tradition has grown up, supported by definite Board Control ruling as well as by Article V, Section III of the Constitution, that "No member of the League shall schedule or engage in any contest with a non-member which is eligible for membership in the League, under penalty of suspension for the remainder of the year, etc."

To what extent this ruling may apply to the Minor Accredited schools, or to what extent it may be relaxed, for some of the schools were formely known as Third Class High Schools, has never been definitely determined.

Another phase of the undetermined status of these schools is found in the fact that the Consolidated and Graded School League originally planned for only such schools as the name indicates has in more recent years invited into membership, schools of any type provided only that their high school enrollment is within a certain maximum. North Dakota is the only state in the Union that has two Leagues; and thus has come about an anomalous situation in which two organizations are somewhat competitive for the same memberships. This is not a serious condition at all. As a matter of fact there are some advantages both to the schools themselves and to some extent to the N. D. H. S. League; for sometimes the classified high schools are in a neighborhood where there are a number of Consolidated Schools who are their normal athletic contacts.

The secretary's office reports a year of gratifying co-operation from all member schools. There has been a commendable promptness in all matters of reports, and everywhere full evidence of a genuine desire to uphold the standards and traditions of the North Dakota High School League.

The year has been notably free from petty bickerings among schools and a fine spirit of good sportsmanship has prevailed everywhere.

The efforts of the League to extend its influence into the physical fitness activities have been well received and there have been many acknowledgements of the benefits of League membership.

The Athletic Accident Benefit Fund is growing in popularity and hence in service; and it is being understood better right along. There remain once in a while a few who unfortunately assume that the small fee for a given sport may be sufficient to cover any and all kinds of injuries.... They just do not acquaint themselves with the explanations that annually are made in the Yearbooks and News Letters. But most school men and boys and their parents now realize that payments can be made only in terms of the published Schedule of Benefits, covering about three dozen specified items.

The financial report of the A. A. B. Fund will be shown elsewhere.

#### THE NORTH DAKOTA PENTATHLON

The North Dakota Pentathlon, to the best of our knowledge is the probable forerunner of similar developments throughout the country.

Other states have developed five-item events from their physical fitness programs, but it does not appear that they have as yet standardized it as part of the Field and Track Program.

The inspiration for the Pentathlon came from several interested men at about the same time, though its real impetus came from the fact that the javelin throw was being eliminated and it seemed appropriate to make some replacement. The Board of Control had discussed the javelin throw for several years.

Coaches and other members of the East-West Conference became much interested in the Pentathlon and too many made contributions to make it feasible to give credit to any individuals.

The National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations has asked for a detailed report of our State Pentathlon, and it is assumed that some publicity may be given to the plan through that source.

But whether the Pentathlon be given wider acceptance or not, it seems to be meeting the needs of the hour and gives evidence of surviving indefinitely. At the various Meets where it has been tried out last year and this year, interest has been keen.

There are two significant characteristics of this Pentathlon which set it apart from the traditional Track and Field events:

- (a) It is a direct outgrowth of the physical fitness program.
- (b) And as such should give marked impetus to the daily gymnasium activities. Most track and field events are isolated specialties with no significant tie-up with the physical fitness program except in the generalized way that all athletics have. Not so the Pentathlon.

There follows the most recent outline of the events and the method of scoring.

#### a. The hundred yard dash:

A separate event from the 100 yard dash of the regular Meet. This shall be run on a regular track in the same manner as the "track hundred," except that the last ten yards of the track shall be measured off in "yards." One or more men will time the first runner in and each following contestant's time will be computed by the yard marker he was in when number one was clocked; i.e. a runner in space three yards from the finish would have a running time of 3 seconds (3-10 of a second) more than the first finisher.

#### b. Rope Climb:

A 20-foot rope of regulation thickness (1½ to 2 inches) shall be climbed by any method. The participant shall start from a seated position, hands grasping the rope and on the starting signal arise and commence climbing. When he can TOUCH a designated place at the top of the rope his time shall stop. If the participant climbs to the top of the rope and fails to touch the object he may climb again provided the second try is made immediately, and thus qualify. The time in seconds and tenths of seconds elapsing between the starting signal and reaching (touching) the object shall be the time recorded.

#### c. Jump and Reach. (Sergeant Jump.)

Contestant stands facing the wall; toes against the same, feet flat on floor. With a short piece of chalk in his marking hand and with forearm and hand against the wall, contestant reaches as high as he can and makes a short horizontal chalk mark. Turning thru a 90 degree angle with his marking arm toward the wall, the contestant now jumps as high into the air as possible above the first mark. The vertical distance to the nearest half inch between these two marks constitutes the record. The best of three trials is reported. No crow hopping is permitted.

#### d. Sit Ups:

Lying with back on the floor, fingers of both hands interlaced behind the neck, feet held by another class member the trunk is raised forward and moved downward, rotating so that the right elbow touches the left knee. Return body to starting position. Next raise trunk as before, except that left elbow touches right knee. Continue raising trunk alternately touching left knee with right elbow and right knee with left elbow. Each completed exercise is one count. This performance shall be carried on for a period of five minutes

and the number of complete exercises done during the five minutes shall be the contestant's record. He may rest between sit ups if he wishes.

#### e. Push Ups:

From standing position, place hands on floor and extend legs backward, feet together, back and arms straight, with weight supported on hands and toes only. This is the starting position. Lower the body by flexing the arms until the chest nearly touches the floor.

(A bell ringing device will (may) be used which will register each time the participant comes within two inches of the floor.)

Then raise the body to the starting position. This counts as one push-up. THE HEAD, TRUNK, AND LEGS SHOULD REMAIN IN A STRAIGHT LINE THROUGHOUT THE MOVEMENT. BOTH SHOULDERS SHOULD BE RAISED AT THE SAMETIME AND NO SWAY APPEAR IN THE BACK. The dips shall be done without rest between and shall not count if any part of the body other than hands and toes, touches the floor.

#### f. Scoring Table for Pentathlon:

See page 78, 1943 Yearbook. But note the following changes:

- (a) For the rope climb, add one (1) full second for each number of points listed from 465 to 1,000 inclusive; and raise the 425 and 445 to 10.3 sec. and 10.5 respectively. Thus a speed of 6.4 seconds grants 1,000 points; 6.7 seconds scores as 960 points, etc.
- b. Sit ups A 5 minute test. Athlete may rest when he desires (but his time goes on.) Change figures thus: 190 to win 1,000 points; 180 for 960 points; 170 for 925 points; 165 for 890; 160 for 855; 155 for 820; 150 for 785; 145 for 755; 140 for 725; 135 for 690; 130 for 660; 125 for 630; 120 for 605; 115 for 580; 110 for 555; 105 for 530; 100 for 505; 95 for 485; 90 for 465; 80 for 445; 70 for 425.

# The Treasurer's Report

The annual C. P. A. audit is of course the most accurate and concise report a secretary can make.

The first point is the testimony that the accounts are accurate and the financial status of the League in good shape.

The investments are all in government bonds, with the exception of (a) the remnant of \$500 that was in the Mandan Farmers State Bank, the remaining \$374.05 of which probably will have to be charged off some day. This came from the days when the State A Tournament was held in Mandan, and it seemed appropriate to maintain some account in that city; and (b) a large checking account which is in the Minot Union National Bank, fully protected by the Federal Government, which amount presumably the Board of Control will direct in large part to be invested in further government securities. The partial loss from the Mandan bank is the only moneys in its history that the N. D. H. S. League has ever lost. In this connection it may be appropriate to state that the League Secretary-Treasurer is bonded in excess of the checking account.

Other points of interest, amount of income and outgo and their sources, are well explained in the audit report with a few exceptions as indicated herewith:

In order to get the auditor's work done when he was available, this year the books were closed as of May 31st instead of in June as has been more the custom.

Hence to the figures of expenditure as listed in the audit, there are the following:

Checks No. 1849 and No. 1851, \$5.00 each for A. A. B. Fund claims for basketball injuries, and No. 1852 for A. A. B. Fund, Phys. Ed claim, for \$5.00.

Check No. 1850 A. A. B. Fund, B. B. claim, possibly for \$25.00 for colles fracture, the the claim is as yet incomplete at this writing.

No. 1853 for \$1.36 is an added trophy expense, covering postage; and No. 1862, in an amount around \$500 covers track trophies and some of the basketball trophies. Apparently negligent clerical work at the Josten plant has confused the records, and 'ye sec' refuses to clear the bill until the vouchers are more lucid. This is not intended, however, as a criticism of the company as a whole for in a series of many years, they have been entirely honorable, prompt and accurate.

No. 1854, for \$39.00 is for football rule books for next fall; and later in the summer an added bill will be entered to cover next year's basketball rule books.

No. 1855, is for telegrams, in the amount of \$6.97.

No. 1856 to Colborn covers nine basketballs for next spring's tournaments in Districts No. 13 to No. 16. The Board of Control finds it advisable to get balls right away. The amount was \$120.24; balls cost \$12.95, plus postage.

Nos. 1857, 1858 and 1859 might possibly be called office expense items for respectively they cover \$68.50 for office assistance, \$25.00 for the 1944 audit (the item in the audit was for 1943) and refund for mimeo supplies 'borrowed' from the Minot schools, \$20.20.

No. 1860 for \$3.60 covers the annual cost of the safety deposit box, No. 108, in the Union National Bank in Minot, where the League government securities are placed for safe keeping.

Check No. 1863 (approximately \$380), (Yearbook not yet completed at this time), is to cover the expense of the 1944 Yearbook, but more properly belongs to next year's accounts, as this present audit shows the check for \$346.80 for the 1943 Yearbook; i. e., both Yearbooks should not be charged against this present year as far as actual expenditures are concerned.

These items, while part of the 1948-44 year's expense, will be balanced in the Secretary-Treasurer's books as of the year, and then be audited next year.

While the League is not 'wealthy' it is in a healthy financial condition due only to two things: (a) The eminent success of the State A tournaments; and (b) the gradual building up of a surplus in the Athletic Accident Benefit Fund. The Board of Control will do well to consider thoughtfully the offerings of the Schedule of Benefits to see whether a few more items may be added to the list, or/and to see whether certain of the more common injuries might receive a little more money. An example might be the dental injury to a front tooth, for which \$10.00 is commonly paid. While this suffices for the loss of other teeth, the replacement or treatment of front teeth is usually very much more expensive. It is proper to add, however, that on the whole the Schedule of Benefits of the North Dakota High School League, built as it was on the experience of other early A. A. B. Funds in other states, continues pretty much in line with the schedules of other states.

Under the management of G. W. Hanna, the 1944 State Track and Field Meet at Valley City was a significant success.

37 schools participated and about 170 athletes were in the various contests. A banquet for the athletes, coaches and officials numbering about 200 concluded the annual meet that more and more is gaining in interest and attention. Of the 37 schools participating, 18 got into the scoring column.

Fargo won first place with 34½ points; with Jamestown and Ashley tieing for second and third places with 15 each. Minot came next with 12½ points.

Minot won the Pentathlon for the second year, raising the former score of 4225 to 4525 against a field of strong opposition. This work ties in so closely with the physical fitness programs of the high school gymnasium classes that it has a significance not found in the traditional events. Duane Zimmer won this year; Vernon Vix, last year.

Clarence Reich of Ashley was top scorer, with three firsts—his 15 points tieing with the 15 points of the Jamestown squad for next to first rank for the school.

Mayville followed with 10 points; Dickinson 7½; McVille 5 1/6; Hillsboro, Killdeer and Hebron with 5 each; Valley City, Page and Harvey, 3 each; St. Leo's (Minot), 2; Mandan, 1; and Michigan 1/6.

In tennis doubles, Grand Forks' Gunness and Linfoot defeated Jamestown's Erickson and Cadieux; while in the single Erickson of Jamestown defeated a school mate, James Keller.

Grand Forks won the golf doubles with Bridson and Fladland by defeating Dornfeld and Werre of Minot. O'Leary of Bismarck won the singles, defeating Dornfeld of Minot and Christofferson of Valley City, who tied. Wally Lodine of Jamestown was fourth.

The approach and putting contest was won by Porter of Jamestown with Fladland of Grand Forks, second; and in the driving contest O'Leary of Bismarck was first with Bridston of Grand Forks, second.

In the Pentathlon, won by Zimmer of Minot with 4525 points, Ben Sorenson of Fargo was second, and Bloom, a class mate, third with 4,475½ and 4,402½ points, respectively, all three surpassing last year's record.
