

Constitution Of N. D. H. L. S.

ARTICLE I -- NAME

This organization shall be known as the NORTH DAKOTA HIGH SCHOOL LEAGUE, hereinafter called the LEAGUE.

ARTICLE II — OBJECT

The object of the League shall be to promote, directly or indirectly, all desirable kinds of inter-high school contests, to hold them to the highest standards, and to make them serve the interests of the member schools.

SECTION I. Any accredited High School, Graded or Consolidated School, so classified by the State Department of Public Instruction may become a member of the League by acknowledging allegiance to it's authority and paying the annual dues. The membership year shall be from October First to September Thirtieth following.

SECTION II. The superintendent or his faculty appointee shall be the official representative of the school, hereinafter called the REPRESENTATIVE, such appointment, if any, being made in writing to the secretary.

ARTICLE III — OFFICERS

SECTION I. There shall be a Board of Control, hereinafter called The Board, consisting of five representatives chosen by the League at the annual fall meeting for terms of three years each new member to be seated July 1 following their election, each year, the Board shall choose from its own number a President, and a Vice-President. A Secretary-Treasurer shall also be selected by the Board of Control who will serve at the pleasure of the Board.

SECTION II. The president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer shall each exercise all the functions assigned to him by work or implication of the Constitution, By-Laws and Regulations of the League, or the Rules of the Board.

SECTION III. The Board is the League's executive body, subject only to restraint of the Constitution, By-Laws, and Regulations of the League. The Board shall determine the time and place of its own meetings and shall fill vacancies in its own ranks, to serve until the next regular meeting of the League. Three members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION IV. When the Board is dealing with affairs in which one of its members or his school is specifically involved, the remaining members shall select a proxy to sit in his place.

ARTICLE V — REPRESENTATIVE ASSEMBLY

SECTION I. The time and place of the regular meetings of the Representatives shall be those of the High School Conference and of the North Dakota Education Association, the hours and rooms being designated by the Board.

SECTION II. Special meetings may be called by the Board, and must be called by the Secretary upon the written request of twenty Representatives.

SECTION III. The Representative Assembly shall have electoral and legislative function only.

SECTION IV. Twenty Representatives shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE VI - FINANCE

SECTION I. The Board shall determine what expenditures are necessary.

SECTION II. Each member school shall pay to the Treasurer annual dues according to the following schedule: Class A, \$10.00; Class B, \$7.50; Class C, \$5.00; Class D, \$2.00. Class A shall include all schools that are members of the East-West Conference. Class B shall include fully or minor accredited high schools. Class C shall include graded or consolidated schools. Class D shall include schools not having interscholastic contests, but desiring athletic insurance benefits.

SECTION III. Special assessments may be levied by a twothirds vote of the Representative Assembly.

ARTICLE VII — AMENDMENTS

The By-Laws and Regulations of the League may be amended by a majority vote of those present, at any regular meeting, provided this vote is 25% of all Representatives, and provided notice of the proposed Constitution-amendment with its substance, has been served at a previous session or has been served by letter from the Secretary at the request of another Representative and provided that there shall be a lapse of one month between the time of presentment and final vote thereon.

BY-LAWS GOVERNING RELATIONS OF SCHOOLS ARTICLE I — MEMBERSHIP

SECTION I. Application for membership and acknowledging allegiance to the League must be made by the superintendent of the school on the League's prescribed card-file form.

SECTION II. A school may be suspended or expelled by the Board for violation of League rules; and once expelled, may be reinstated only by action of the Board.

SECTION III. No school shall be admitted to the League during a school year in which it has as a non-member been represented in any interscholastic competition by a student who would have been ineligible under the rules of the League.

ARTICLE II - RESPONSIBILITY

The school's responsibility to the League rests upon the superintendent. Consistent with this obligation, and except as otherwise specified, his powers and duties may be delegated for execution to one or more members of the teaching staff of his high school as follows:

- a. Representative, who may hold office in the League, or speak and vote in its assembly.
 - b. Business managers, coaches, directors, chaperones, etc.

ARTICLE III — OFFICERS

SECTION I. When authorized by the President, the Secretary may submit by mail questions for discussion, but not for vote.

SECTION II. The Secretary shall keep an accurate and systemtaized record of membership, officials of the League, and contestants.

SECTION III. The Secretary shall have general charge of the Board's correspondence, and shall distribute their forms, information and inquiries to members.

SECTION IV. The Treasurer shall receive all funds belonging to the League, which he shall invest or pay out for League bills as directed by the Board and formally approved by the President.

SECTION V. The Treasurer shall keep a systematic and detailed record of all receipts and disbursements, with vouchers for the latter, and shall make a complete financial statement to the League at the Conference session, at which time his accounts shall be audited by a committee of three appointed by the President.

SECTION VI. The Treasurer shall furnish a bond for two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00), to be approved by the Board and paid for from League funds.

ARTICLE IV — RULE VIOLATIONS

SECTION I. All questions in dispute shall be referred to the Board and their decision shall be final.

SECTION II. For any violation of League rules, an offending student may be barred from participating in contests which come under the League jurisdiction; and an offending school may be suspended or expelled.

SECTION III. Any school making a protest against another (which protest must be in writing), shall submit a full statement of facts to the Secretary, who shall submit a copy to the superintendent of the accused school. Such protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of two dollars (\$2.00), which shall later be returned if the protest is sustained by the Board.

SECTION IV. A school aganist which a protest or any charge has been made shall have the privilege of presenting its case to the Board.

ARTICLE V - CONTESTS

SECTION I. Neither contest rules nor eligibility rules may be waived by common consent, and they must be fully observed by League members even the competing with non-members.

SECTION II. Final agreements for contests between two League members shall be incorporated into contracts on forms provided by the League. These contracts shall be executed by the Representatives of the respective schools and exchanged prior to the contest, and shall not be cancelled or altered except by mutual consent of the schools concerned.

SECTION III. No member of the League shall schedule or engage in any contest with a non-member which is eligible for membership in the League, under penalty of suspension for the remainder of the year; nor shall it enter into any contest with an out-of-state school which is not similarly qualified in respect to its own state.

SECTION IV. No member of the League shall engage in any contest with a school whose membership has been suspended, during the period of such suspension.

SECTION V. At least one week prior to any contest between League schools, they must exchange eligibility lists made on the League's forms, in which the superintendent and the principal of the high school certify to the present eligibility of each contestant named and pledge the use of only those who remain eligible at the time of contest.

SECTION VI. In any contest whatsoever, except those among students in the same school no ineligible student shall be used; nor shall such student appear on the field in uniform or otherwise participate as a member of the contesting organization or group. Non-

member using contestants or less than eligible standards may not secure membership within the same year.

SECTION VII. Contesting schools shall each have present an authorized faculty member who shall be responsible to his school for the conduct of his participants and students, thruout the contest and the visiting team's stay away from home.

SECTION VIII. Athletic coaches who are not regularly employed by the board of education are prohibited.

SECTION IX. Students shall not serve as business managers to arrange or handle contests between schools.

SECTION X. High standards of courtesy, fair-dealing and sportsmanship must feature all League contests. The Board may rate schools or students in these respects, recognizing high attainment and penalizing low.

SECTION XI. The League disapproves of expensive awards from school to students for accomplishment in contests.

SECTION XII. The school must keep adequate records of contests and contestants, and all reports required by the Board shall be promptly and accurately supplied.

ARTICLE VI — ELIGIBILITY OF CONTESTANTS

SECTION I. A student shall have been in attendance as many school days as he missed at the opening semester, should his enrollment not have been made the first day of the semester.

SECTION II. He shall not compete for more than four seasons in any one branch of inter-high school contests, provided that competition while in the eighth grade or below, shall not constitute one of the four seasons.

SECTION III. He shall not have participated in a similar contest during the same school year as a member of any other than a high school team.

SECTION IV. He shall not have been at any time a member of a team representing an institution of higher rank than a secondary school.

SECTION V. He shall be doing passing work in at least fifteen hours per week, the passing grade to be computed from the opening of the semester and relate to such subjects only as severally have a credit value of one-half unit per semester.

Note: This means three subjects, each of which is equal a half credit a semester, on the basis of 16 credits for graduation. We may not add physical training and orchestra fractional credits together, for example.

SECTION VI. He shall not be a graduate of a four year high school course, nor a graduate of a senior high school offering three courses comprehending the tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades. Neither shall he compete after having earned credits sufficient to meet the graduating requirements in any course of study prescribed by the school he is to represent unless such credits have been secured in less than eight semesters of school attendance.

SECTION VII. He shall not be over 20 years of age.

SECTION VIII. After attending the first semester of the ninth grade he shall have credit on the school records in the unit-per-year or half-unit-per-semester subjects of at least three half units earned and recorded at the close of the last semester in which he was enrolled as a student, 30 days or more attendance or participation in interscholastic competition within any shorter period being sufficient to constitute enrollment in any semester.

SECTION IX. He shall always have contested under his own name.

SECTION X. He shall have been in attendance in the school he represents for one semester upon transferring from another school, unless his parents have become residents of the school district to which he is transferred or the school from which he is transferred does not offer work of the corresponding year in which he is ranked; and in the instance of a pupil transferred from a public high school to any other high school in the same city or vice versa he shall not be eligible to represent the new high school in the same school year.

SECTION XI. He shall not use tobacco nor intoxicating liquors during the school terms of two semesters.

NOTE: This has not been cancelled but it has been taken from its position between No. 10 and No. 12 in the list of eligibility rules, and placed along with three other rules in the new High School League Recommended Standards of Eligibility, the entire administration of which, including penalties is left completely within the hands of each local school administration.

The Standards are these:

(a.) Every athlete shall be given a thorough physical examination before the opening of the athletic season.

- (b.) Parental consent shall be secured before the participation of any athlete.
- (c.) Proof in advance shall establish the birthdate of every 9th semester student before participation.
- (d.) Every student participating in interscholastic contests shall abstain from the use of tobacco and alcoholic beverages.

SECTION XII. No student shall participate in any interscholastic contest after his eighth semester in high school unless he is under 18 years of age; nor after his seventh semester if his seventh and eighth are not consecutive.

SECTION XIII. High schools with an enrollment of seventy five or less may compete in Class C Tournaments or may elect to compete in Class B.

Minutes of the Annual High School League Meeting

Thursday, October 25, 1945

The annual meeting of the North Dakota State High School League was held in the Junior-Senior Assembly of the high school building in Bismarck on Thursday, October 25, at 4 p. m.

The meeting was well attended with at least one hundred fifty member schools being represented together with other interested parties.

The minutes of the league meeting of a year ago were read by the secretary and there being no corrections or omissions noted they were approved as read.

The secretary was then called upon to give a brief financial report and referred the members to the printed CPA audit report as listed in the 1945 year book. Upon motion of Supt. L. T. Havig of Rugby and seconded by Supt. Harry Westlie of Bowman the CPA audit was accepted in lieu of any further report by any special auditing committee.

The amendment to Article four, Section one of the Constitution was then read for its second reading. Supt. G. Hanna of Valley City moved its adoption. This motion was seconded by Supt. A. O. Totdahl of Beulah and after a brief discussion the amendment was carried without a dissenting vote.

Supt. F. S. Gilliland then gave an extensive report covering the recommendations of the special league committee on the consoladation of the High School League with the Consolidated League, consisting of Supt. Gludt of Killdeer, Supt. T. S. Grimsrud of Lisbon, and Supt. B. F. Stevens of Lakota. On behalf of the Board of Control and the Committee above named, Mr. Gilliland submitted the following amendments to the Constitution of the State High School League which in essence opens the way for high schools, other than fully accredited or minor accredited high schools, to become members of the league without special board approval from year to year and which also might clear the way for a possible merger of the two leagues when such a move might appear advisable.

The following amendment to the Constitution of the league was then offered for its first reading:

Change article three, Section one, under line one to read as follows:

Any accredited High School, Graded or Consolidated School so classified by the State Department of Public Instruction may become a member of the League by acknowledging allegience to its authority and paying the annual dues. The membership year shall be from October 1 to September 30 following.

Mr. Gilliland then offered for its first reading the following amendment of Article six, Section two.

Each member school shall pay to the Treasurer annual dues according to the following schedule: Class A, \$10; Class B, \$7.50; Class C, \$5.00; Class D, \$2.00. Class A shall include high schools that are members of the East-West Conference. Class B shall include fully or minor accredited high schools. Class C shall include graded or consolidated schools. Class D shall include high schools not having interscholastic contests, but desiring athletic insurance benefits.

To further clarify the status of the present consolidated and graded schools relative to "must" feature of joining the high school league the following amendment was abopted to the by-laws of the league.

This amendment adds a new section called Section thirteen under Article five of the by-laws and reads as follows:

High schools with an enrollment of seventy five or less may compete in Class C Tournaments or contests or may elect to compete in Class B.

There then followed a discussion of the proposed record book to be furnished to member schools as a part of the services of the league and upon motion of Supt. A. L. Hagen of Dickinson and seconded by O. Hewett of Grand Forks, the board of control authorized to proceed with the publication of such a book to be distributed to league members with the annual packet of supplies.

Mr. Gilliland explained to the membership the progress on an officials registration system.

A short discussion of the possibility of league sponsored baseball on par with other league activities was held and the board was, upon motion of Harry Westlie of Bowman and seconded by R. G. Arveson of Leeds, instructed to appoint a committee to give this venture further consideration and study.

President Zimmerman subsequently appointed the following special committee on baseball:

Supt. Lyle Hill of New Salem, Coach Bill Bayne of Carrington, Supt. Harry Westlie of Bowman, and Supt. Clifford Peterson of Taylor.

An informal discussion was then held on possible changes that could be made in the present Class B basketball organization.

At the suggestion of President Zimmerman the members of the

district basketball committees were requested to remain after the meeting and offer their suggestions.

The report of the nominating committee, consisting of William Gussner of Jamestown; E. C. Johnson of Kenmare; and B. F. Stevens of Lakota, was then called for and they submitted the names of M. B. Zimmerman of Wahpeton and A. C. Van Wyk of Bismarck for the three year terms.

Nominations were called for from the floor but no names were submitted.

Vote was called for and the report of the nominating committee was accepted and Messrs. Zimmerman and Van Wyk were unanimously elected for the three year terms.

After a brief discussion of the AAB Fund by the secretary the meeting was declared adjourned.

The following suggestions were brought out at the meeting with the district basketball committees:

First:-

Continue the districts as they are at present but have each district send two teams to a regional play-off from each district, the one winner to represent the two regions involved at the state Class B Tourney.

Second:-

Eliminate the regional competition entirely and send sixteen teams to the state Class B Tourney.

Third:-

Hold two Class B Tourneys—one in the eastern part of the state and one in the western part of the state declaring two champions.

Fourth:-

Same as three above, except the winners of the east and west must meet for a championship game to determine a Class B State winner.

Fifth:-

Continue under the present set-up with sixteen districts and eight regional winners who play off at one State Class B Tourney.

Chairman Zimmerman appointed the following committee to make a study of the above suggestions or any other that appears feasible and report to the board of control at the state Class B tournament in Minot in March, 1946. The following committee members were appointed:

Supt. L. T. Havig, Rugby; Supt. E. C. Johnson, Kenmare;

T. S. Grimsrud, Lisbon; and Supt. E. S. Killie, Fessenden.

The meeting was then adjourned.

MINUTES OF H.S.L. MEETING

PATTERSON HOTEL, BISMARCK, MAY 3, 1946

The High School League met on Friday, May 3, 1946 after the regular conference meeting at 9:30 p.m. The meeting was called to order by Vice-President Roberts in the absence of the President, Mr. M. B. Zimmerman.

The members present were checked and it was found that a quorum was present so that any regular business could be conducted.

Mr. Roberts explained the proposed set-up for the A and the B Basketball Tournaments for 1947. It was noted that the action of the board was in harmony with the recommendations of the East-West Conference for the Class A arrangement and in keeping with the survey that had been made of Class B schools for their preference for the 1947 tournament.

Complete details of the above tournaments will be found in the Board of Control minutes at which action was taken on the tournaments.

Amendment No. 1, which changes Article three, Section one of the constitution of the North Dakota High School League as follows:

Any accredited High School, Graded or Consolidated School so classified by the State Department of Public Instruction may become a member of the League by acknowledging Allegience to it's Authority and paying the annual dues. The membership year shall be from October First to September Thirtieth following.

Was read for its second reading. After a discussion pro and con in which the amendment was explained it was on motion unanimously carried and declared adopted to go into effect for the 1946-47 school term.

Amendment No. 2, which amends Article six, Section two was read for its second reading. Amendment No. 2 reads as follows:

Each member School shall pay to the treasurer annual dues according to the following schedule: Class A, \$10.00; Class B, \$7.50; Class C, \$5.00; Class D, \$2.00. Class A shall include all schools that are members of the East-West Conference, Class B shall include fully or minor accredited high

schools, Class C shall include graded or consolidated schools, and Class D shall include schools not having interscholastic contests, but desiring athletic insurance benefits.

After a brief discussion this amendment was upon motion declared adopted and in full effect at the opening of the 1946-47 school term.

Amendment No. 3, which adds a new section, thirteen, to the by-laws, was read for the second reading.

Amendment No. 3 reads as follows:

High schools with an enrollment of seventy-five or less may compete, in Class C Tournaments or Contests or may elect to Compete in Class B.

Upon motion this amendment was declared adopted and in full effect and force at the opening of the 1946-47 school term.

There being no further business, the meeting was, upon motion, adjourned.

Minutes Of The Board Of Control

A

BISMARCK, N.D.E.A. OCTOBER 23, 24, 25, 1945

The Board of Control was in session much of the time during the NDEA convention. Much business was discussed and the following report indicated that portion of the business that was presented for final action and disposition.

The Board spent considerable time in discussing the constitutional changes necessary to amalgamate the two leagues and finally voted to submit the amendments to the constitution and by-laws which appear in the proceedings of the annual meeting of the North Dakota State High School League.

The question of the eligibility of a Fargo boy who had been ill' and unable to complete his school work last spring was discussed and in-as-much as the school authorities had conformed with the requirements of the board in obtaining statements from the attending physician and had presented a formal request for his eligibility, it was decided to declare the lad eligible.

Mr. Zimmerman reported that the nominating committee consisting of Gussner of Jamestown, Johnson of Kenmare, and Stevens of Lakota, had been appointed some thirty days previous to the meeting and would give their report at the annual meeting.

Some considerable time was spent discussing the present AAB Fund and the board went on record to make the following corrections and changes in the plan effective as soon as notification could be made by The News Letter.

- (a) Fracture of the collar bone shall be included with the benefits allowed at a maximum fee of \$25.00. (This had inadvertantly been omitted in the circular explaining the fund.)
- (b) The allowance for X-Ray to determine fracture should be paid only in those cases where the X-Ray was negative to fracture. (This is in harmony with the old plan which was made on the assumption that if the X-Ray proved positive the bill of the attending physician would include the X-Ray.)
- (c) Girls participating in basketball may also be covered in those schools that play interscholastic basketball for the same fee that is now charged the boys with the understanding that these games are played under girls rules. The coverage dates are to remain the same as for boys.

The increased detail work due to the changes made in the AAB Fund was discussed and it was agreed that the secretary's salary should be increased to \$1,100.00 for the fiscal year. It was pointed out that the new fund set-up requires the use of additional forms and certificates from attending physicians as to physical fitness after accidents, which all means additional work and correspondence and also that there is an increase in the number of registrants after the new schedule has gone into effect and consolidated schools may register for the benefits.

The Coaching School at Valley City in November was considered and as the board had at previous sessions agreed to send representatives from the different sections of the state the following appointments were made:

Harry Bridgeford of Fargo, Earl Hoffman of Grand Forks, Norris Sando of Grafton, Harry Weinbergen of Dickinson, Willard Solberg of Hettinger, E. Nelson of Williston, and Glenn Iverson of Donnybrook.

It was understood that these officials were to attend the clinic at league expense and return to their respective communities and hold clinics on rules and officiating.

Some time was spent considering eligibility rules. Special attention was given to the controversial rule 10 in the by-laws of the League. It was pointed out that under the present interpretation of the rules any lad going to another town or city to attend some other high school than his own high school was considered a transfer student if his parents did not change their residence making it necessary for him to change schools. Furthermore, the same boy upon return to his parental home would have to put in a semester of residence before becoming eligible.

On the other hand it has been a common practice for boys within a given city to transfer to or from a parochial school, to or from a model high school, or to or from a central public high school and become eligible if the transfer was made prior to the opening of school and not after school had opened. While this privilege has been granted, only to those boys whose residence has been within a given city there has been a growing tendency on the part of schools within the cities so affected to grant this privilege to any and all students whether their legal residence was within the city or outside the city. Such an interpretation of the rules has given the boy within a city with two or more high schools a decided advantage over the boy who made his home in a small town with only one high school.

In order to interpret the rule the same for all boys of the state and not grant any boy advantage because of his residential location, it was agreed to interpret the rule strictly according to the way that it is written, namely:

Any boy that transfers schools without this change being made necessary by a change in the parental residence must attend a semester before becoming eligible.

The secretary was instructed to publicize this change in interpretation of rule No. 10 in the News Letter and inform the members that this rule would become operative at the opening of the 19!6-47 school term.

Representatives of the Josten Company and the Balfour Company met with the board and the board authorized the following purchases of trophies at this time with the further understanding that the other necessary trophies would be purchased at a later date.

The Josten Company was awarded a contract for 132 participation medals for the state Class A and B tournaments and two sets of 10 tie clasps to be awarded to the first and second all state basketball teams.

The Balfour Company was awarded the contract for 11 gold and 11sterling silver basketballs to be awarded to the champion and runner up teams at each tournament.

Supt. H. H. Kirk met with the board to extend an invitation on behalf of Fargo for the 1947 Class A basketball tournament.

It was understood that this meeting would take the place of the usual meeting of the board held during the Christmas vacation period.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

Minutes Of The Board Of Control

B

VALLEY CITY, NOVEMBER 23, 24, 1945

The Board of Control met at Valley City at the Coach's Clinic on November 23, 24. All members of the board were present.

Some time was spent in discussing eligibility problems as presented by Assumption Abbey, Turtle Lake and Kindred.

The Abbey question involved two boys who had transferred to the Abbey from schools out of the state in order to obtain the divinity course as offered at that institution. It appeared that the desire for a special course was the reason for these transfers and the board was agreed that they would have to spend a semester in residence before being declared eligible.

The Kindred case was similar in that a lad had transferred to Kindred when he could have remained in Leonard where he was enrolled last year. Again it was agreed that a semester of attendance would be required before the lad would be eligible for interschool competition.

The Turtle Lake case involved a returning serviceman who was enrolling in the Turtle Lake High School. This case was also decided in the negative on the grounds that the lad was ineligible at the time he left for service and could not gain eligibility by virtue of his military service.

The question of the eligibility of returning ex-service men was discussed and the following modifications in the rules were authorized in order that service men would not be penalized because of the time they were compelled to spend in service.

If a returning ex-service man had not passed his twentieth birthday he may return to the school in which he was enrolled prior to his induction into service and become immediately eligible for interscholastic competition, providing he was eligible at the time he left for service and provided further he is not repeating any part of any season of sport in which he engaged prior to his induction into service. It was further agreed that the granting of these concessions does not in any way waive any rules of eligibility to which the returning ex-service man must conform to the same rules and regulations as any other high school participant whose course has not been interrupted.

It was agreed by the board that the expenses of the men appointed to attend the coaching school on behalf of the board would be allowed their actual expenses at the clinics to be later conducted in the local communities.

Clinics were set at the following places: Mott, Bowman, Dickinson, Beulah, Bismarck, Williston, Kenmare, Minot, Devils Lake, Grafton, Larimore, La Moure and Wahpeton.

Coach Johnny Mack of Mandan was named as the official representative of North Dakota to the Football Rules Committee at Chicago at the National Federation Meeting in Chicago in January 1946. Coach Roy Reslock was named as an alternate.

It was agreed that Mr. Gilliland and the secretary were to represent the board at the Federation meeting in Chicago.

The State Track Meet was set at Valley City on May 25, 1946, with Supt. G. W. Hanna as manager.

John J. Roberts was selected to represent the board at the American Association of School Administrators in Chicago in February.

Attention was then directed toward plans for the two state tournaments of basketball.

It was agreed that the radio broadcast should be conducted in the same manner as last year.

Mr. A. C. Van Wyk was appointed as manager of the Class A tourney and Supt. Paul Miller as manager of the Class B tournament. On the same conditions as were in effect last year.

Fees for the referees at each tournament were set at 75 plus expenses.

The following referees were appointed for the tournaments:

Class A.: Earl Hoffman, Grand Forks; George Heidt,

Mandan; and George McCain, Fargo.

Class B.: Ervin Huss, Bismarck; Elmer Nelson, Willis-

ton; and Harry Bridgeford, Fargo.

The board spent considerable time examining trophy samples and agreed to award the trophies for basketball to Jostens and the trophies for the district and state track meet to the Balfour Company.

Mr. H. V. Porter, Secretary of the National Federation met with the board for about an hour and gave the board an interesting picture of the workings of the National Federation.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

Meeting Of The Board Of Control C

BISMARCK, MARCH 7, 8, 9, 1946

The Board of Control met at frequent intervals during the course of the State Class A Basketball Tournament at Bismarck with all members present.

Many items of business were discussed informally and final action deferred until the following week at Minot at the Class B Tournament.

Several controversial claims against the AAB Fund were discussed. The Reeder case was allowed for hospitalization only as the injury itself was not under the schedule of benefits as adopted by the board. The McClusky case involving an injury to a lad while on a basketball trip was allowed and ordered paid.

It was moved and seconded that the coaches luncheon be again sponsored by the Board of Control. This was subsequently done and about fifty coaches and superintendents were present.

The Baseball agreement as sponsored by the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations and Organized baseball was adopted by the Board. This agreement places penalties on any representative of organized baseball who induces a high school baseball player to sign a contract with organized baseball until he shall graduate from high school or if he drops out of school until his class shall have been graduated. It further penalizes a member school of the League that uses its influence to encourage a boy to sign such a contract.

The matter of expense allowance for teams participating in the state tournaments was discussed at some length and it was agreed to increase the allowence per diem for meals and lodging to \$4.00.

The High School League Committee to study the baseball question met with the board together with Mr. C. Lille of Grand Forks, Chairman of the American Legion Baseball Committee and Abe Abrahamson, State Commander of the American Legion.

It appeared that it was impossible for all schools to enter into baseball competition during the short spring season. However the board went on record as endorsing the sport for those regions of the state that found it possible to play baseball and further placing their sanction on the Legion program which would permit high school boys to carry on the baseball activity during the summer months. The practice of encouraging school boards to hire coaches to remain on the job during the summer months and assist communities in carrying on a summer baseball program was also endorsed.

Track district centers were selected by the board at the same 8 centers as last year with the same managers. Coach Harry Wienbergen was named as manager of the Dickinson district and Red Jarrett manager of the Grand Forks Meet.

Superintendent G. Hanna of Valley City met with the Board relative to a clarification of the rules for admission to the state track meet.

The following rules were adopted by the board for admission to the state meet:

- 1. Winning of a first or a second place at any of the 8 official district track meets would qualify a contestant for the state meet.
- 2. Meeting of a minimum standards at any invitational meet in which at least six schools were entered and which had a minimum of three entrants in any given event, provided the following conditions are met:
 - a. Authorization from the Board is obtained before the meet to list this meet as a qualifying meet.
- b. The meet is held within the boundaries of the state. If out of state schools are present they may be counted as one of the six schools necessary to make this a qualifying meet although their members may not compete in the state meet.
- c. No invitational meet may be held on a day which would conflict with a district track meet.
- d. In events that require timing for qualification, no contestant can qualify unless the time is taken under the conditions of the state track meet. This implies that three watches must be used on each place that qualifies. Thus a contestant winning second place could not qualify for the state meet unless he were actually timed under the above conditions.
- e. An official entry blank for the state meet would be provided the meet manager and it would be his duty to officially certify the record made to the contesting school and the superintendent of the school in turn to submit these blanks to the state manager if he wished his entrant to go to the state.
- 3. Relay teams must qualify at a meet before they are eligible to go to the state.
- 4. Only one relay team of each type may enter the state meet from any school,
- 5. Contestants are limited to three events exclusive of relays at any district or state meet,

- 6. Pentathlon entrants may not participate in any other district or state event.
- 7. Points made by a pentathlon entrant shall not be counted toward total points at district meets but will be counted toward total points in the state event.
- 8. Pentathlon entrants are limited to two from any school. These two may enter the state meet directly without qualifying in a district meet.
- 9. Tennis and golf entries shall be limited to two singles and one double team from any one school and said entrants may be admitted to the state meet without qualifying at a district meet.
- 10. If enough entries make it necessary, tennis preliminaries will be held on Friday before the state meet.

Upon motion by J. Roberts and seconded by Gilliland it was agreed to purchase a small admit pass which would admit all former board of control members to all state athletic contests.

The status of rule 1, which had been waived for the past three years was discussed at some length and it was moved by Van Wyk and seconded by Roberts that this rule be fully reinstated for next fall. The motion prevailed.

The secretary was directed to order balls for next year as soon as tourney plans were completed.

Coach Hubbard of Grand Forks requested the board to give an interpretation on the question of post-season games. The plan being to schedule a home game with Winnipeg after the tournament was over. It was agreed that at present North Dakota has no rule against the playing of such games provided they are not scheduled with the idea that a championship is involved. Grand Forks was authorized to play the series this year with further advice that perhaps next year a definite rule relative to post season games would be recommended to the League.

Invitations from Fargo and Bismarck were received for the 1947 Class A tournaments.

The Board organized for the 1947 year with the following officers selected:

M. B. Zimmerman, President; John J. Roberts, Vice-President; and Earl Abrahamson, Secretary-Treasurer.

Upon motion by Gilliland and seconded by Van Wyk, it was agreed to increase the clerk allowance for the secretary to \$450.00 per annum.

The secretary was ordered to present the trophies at the Class A tourney.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned to meet next week at Minot and complete other business pending at that time.

Minutes Of The Board Of Control Meeting D

MINOT, NORTH DAKOTA, MARCH 14, 15, 16, 1946

The Board of Control met in Minot on March 14, 15, 16, at the Class B Tournament with all members present.

The secretary was instructed to arrange for the annual coaches dinner at the La Plaza cafe.

It was agreed to defer the selection of trophies for the 1947 tournaments until next fall when companies would be in a better position to submit suitable awards.

It was agreed that President M. B. Zimmerman should present the trophies after the Saturday night games.

The question of awards by civic associations to championship teams was presented by Principal Hewitt of Grand Forks. A study of the high school League rules at the present time indicates that the League disaproves the granting of awards by schools of a monetary value of more than one dollar. There doesn't appear to be any rule in the State Constitution that would prevent a Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, Rotary or Kiwanis or any similar organization of presenting awards of higher value than one dollar. It was the opinion of the Board that in the future some rule should become a part of the League by-laws so that no high school player could accept expensive awards from any source whatsoever. At the present there is no rule against it.

The Basketball committee, consisting of Havig, Killie, Johnson and Grimsrud met with the board regarding the basketball set-up for Class B schools and made the following report:

The majority opinion preferred a plan of dividing the state into a west and east half with an eight team tournament in each half. The winners and runner-up of each half to meet in a four team tournament to determine a state winner. Under this arrangement, the winner of the east

would play the second place team of the west and the winner of the west would meet the second place east team. The minority report offered as an alternate to this plan, a sixteen team state tournament to be held on four days with a state winner to be selected from the 16 teams.

The committee report was accepted and the secretary instructed to survey the Class B school as to their preference on the two plans submitted, together with a third proposition of leaving the set-up as it exists at the present time, namely; the present 16 districts with 8 regional games and an 8 team state tournament.

It was agreed that this survey should be submitted to the members as soon as possible and a final decision of the board would be made at the conference meeting in Bismarck on May 2 and 3.

It was also agreed that the final date for submitting the Class B tournament fee was to be moved up from February 15 to February 1.

Upon motion by Van Wyk and seconded by Gilliland, the following plan was adopted for the Class A tournament for 1947:

1. State to be divided into four districts with following membership:

Northwest {	Minot St. Leo's Williston St. Mary's	Northeast	Devils Lake Park River Grafton Grand Forks
Southwest	Jamestown Bismarck Mandan Dickinson	Southeast {	Wahpeton Fargo Sacred Heart Valley City

During season play the teams will be rated 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th in each district similar to the plan used for 1946. Ties will be broken by drawing lots.

2. Two conference single elimination tournaments are to be held on March 6, 7, 8, 1947. One in Bismarck for the west districts and one in Fargo for the east districts. In these tournaments the first round will consist of the following:

Tournaments will be played to a conclusion.

- 3. The following week, March 14, 15, 1947, the winner and the runner-up of each half will play in Bismarck in a four team tournament. The first round will be as follows:
 - (1) Winner of East Runner-up of West
 - (2) Winner of West Runner-up of East

The following evening the winners will play for state championship and the losers for 3rd and 4th places.

The Devils Lake Chamber of Commerce submitted an invitation for the 1947 Class B tournament.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned to meet at the State High School Conference at Bismarck on May 2, 3, 1946.

The following items were agreed upon by the Board:

- 1. Beginning next fall the sport of baseball should be included under the Athletic Accident Benefit Plan with a fee of 50 cents per student being set as the amount necessary to qualify for benefits.
- 2. Several AABF claims were discussed and the secretary was instructed to make disposition of these claims as per schedule.
- 3. It was agreed to order a sufficient quantity of Payne's Record Books to furnish one copy to each member school for next year.
- 4. The track forms to be used at the state track meet were checked and approved.
- 5. The following set-up was agreed upon for the state Class B basketball tournaments for 1947:
- A. The state is to be divided into two divisions—an east and a west.

B. An east tournament will be conducted at Devils Lake and the west tournament at Dickinson on March 14, 15, 16, 1947. Each of these tourneys are to be the regular 8-team affair.

C. The following districts will comprise the west: 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 15, 16. The following districts will make up the east: 1, 2, 3, 4, 11, 12, 13, 14.

All regional games are eliminated and each tournament will be played to a conclusion.

D. The following week, March 21, 22, 23, the winners of each of the two tournaments, the runner-up of each of the two tournaments and the consolation winner of each of the two tournaments shall meet in Minot to determine the state champion. Teams two and three shall meet on Thursday night and team number one shall draw a bye and play its first game on Friday night, meeting the winner of teams number two and teams number three.

West Tournament at Dickinson, H. J. Weinbergen, March 14, 15, 16.

6. It was agreed that Supt. Zimmerman should represent the Board of Control at the state track meet in Valley City.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting at Bismarck, March 8, 1946

As announced by letter, the East-West Conference meeting was called to order by the President, G. W. Hanna of Valley City. All sixteen member schools reported official representatives present.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved without correction. The Treasurer's report was read and approved.

Election of a new president was the first order of new business. The nominating committee (Van Wyk, Shelby, Heen) presented the name of Supt. Wm. S. Gussner, Jamestown, for the Presidency of the East-West Conference. Second by W. L. Neff, Mandan. Carried.

Mr. A. C. Van Wyk and others expressed their gratitude and thanks to our retiring President, Mr. G. W. Hanna, for his fine and able services to the East-West Conference and the North Dakota athletics in general.

Football problems were discussed. Moved by Gales of Jamestown that tie games in football, be counted a half win and a half loss in the divisional standings. Seconded by H. Bridgeford. Motion carried.

Motion by Supt. A. C. Van Wyk that the incoming President appoint a committee to draw-up, as now devised, a definite football plan that could be incorporated into the constitution. Seconded by Supt. Ensrud of Grafton. Carried.

The Basketball set-up came in for a lengthy discussion. Motion by Supt. W. L. Neff, Mandan, that the following recommendation be made to the Board of Control of the High School League.

- 1. That the Western and Eastern Divisions, as now grouped, each hold an eight team tournament.
- 2. That the two top teams from each division meet in a four team state tournament.
- 3. That the final play-off of the four team state tournament be conducted in such a manner, that all four teams have an equal chance to win the state title. Seconded by Supt. Gussner of Jamestown. Vote on the motion delayed.

An Amendment to the above motion by F. H. Gilliland of Devils Lake that the top teams of Divisional tournaments play for first and second places in four team state tournament, and that second place winners play for third and fourth. Seconded. Vote on the motion delayed.

Mr. P. A. Miller, Minot, introduced an amendment to Mr. Gilliland's amendment that the eight team Divisional tournaments be run to their final conclusion. Seconded. Carried.

Amendment by Mr. Gilliland failed to carry when put to a vote. Mr. Neff's original motion or recommendation to the Board of Control carried.

Mr. Gilliland asked that the members of the East-West Conference lend support to the proposed merger of the North Dakota Consolidated League with the North Dakota High School League.

Conference District Meetings held and the following Chairmen duly elected for the ensuing school year.

North-East District Supt. Ensrud, Grafton. North-West District, Supt. Fortsch, Williston. South-East District, S. O. Pearce, Valley City. South-West District, Johnny Mack, Mandan.

Invitation extended by Mr. Van Wyk, on the part of the Coard of Control and the Bismarck Chamber of Commerce to attend dinners on Friday and Saturday respectfully.

Motion to adjourn. Carried.

North Dakota State High School Track and Field Meet

ANNUAL INTERSCHOLASTIC TRACK AND FIELD MEET
Under Auspices of the North Dakota High School League
Hanna Field, Valley City, N. D.

May 24, 25, 1946

Accompanying this report please find a statistical record of the State Track and Field Meet together with that of tennis and golf. Approximately 175 pupils were entered, from 37 different schools, a slight falling off as compared with last year.

As in the past two years, the weather was perfect. That was nice for the spectators, bringing out a large crowd who enjoyed the meet in comfort, and it was distinctly fine for the competitors.

In golf Paul O'Leary of St. Mary's in Bismarck was tops for the third successive year, and Bridston and Fladland again took first in the team match. In tennis Keller of Jamestown took first in the singles, and Eddie of Jamestown took second. Then these two teamed to defeat Baarstad and Morgan of Valley City.

Gilman of Beach was high point man in the track and field events, taking a first and two seconds. Simonson of Grand Forks was the only winner of two firsts, these being in the hurdles. Other strong men were Thompson of Grand Forks, with a first and a second, and Peterson of Williston and Johnson of Bismarck, each of whom took a first and a third.

The only record of the meet that was broken was the quartermile relay. Grand Forks won this in 45 seconds flat, clipping 1.6 seconds off from the state record. The 880 relay as well as the 440 was run in lanes.

The records in the following events surpassed last year's marks but were under the state records: 100 yard dash, pole vault, shot put, discus throw, and half mile relay. All others failed to come up to last year's record.

The point winners were spread over 23 schools, and the tops were all won by small totals. When the track events were completed, Bismarck and Grand Forks were tied in points. At that moment the report of the pentathlon came in, giving Bismarck three points and Grand Forks none, making something of a dramatic finish. It should also be said here that Jamestown not only won first in the pentathlon, but also third, giving her a total of 7 points, something of a tribute to Coach Osmon, a young man who is majoring in physical education.

Grand Forks took first on both relay races, breaking the 440 in fast time, and coming close in the 880. Fargo, a perennial power

in track, won 4th in both relays, but took not one single counter otherwise.

As usual in the Valley City State Meets, the Chamber of Commerce paid for rooms for all who of necessity stayed in Valley City over night. The Kiwanis Club gave a nice dinner again wherein all meet participants could sit down together, and at which time Supt. Van Wyk presented the trophies. A new feature was a Saturday noon luncheon at the Country Club, by the Valley City Sportsman's Club. These things are done in spite of the fact that there is no gate receipts, and it goes a long way toward reducing the expenses of participants.

The new form supplied by the League Board were very effective and very helpful to the Meet manager. The qualifying certificates should show where the meet is held at which the pupil qualifies. Forms should be made so they will not have to be changed from year to year. Also, it is proper to have all entries come from the superintendent fortified by the qualifying certificates of the meet managers, rather than from meet managers. It is my opinion that the Board of Control now has a chance to work into these meets their own desires, whereas as institutional meets it grew from institutional control to a combination of institution and League. It is my advice that the Board carefully revise its rules as to what and how many events a participant may enter. The golf competition should be standardized as to number of holes to be played, etc., and I think it should be given two days and the tennis one day if there are enough courts to take care of it where the meet is held. This meet deserves your study, and it should be given consideration several months before the meet is to be held.

The main achievements of the year are:

- 1. The extension of the A. A. B. F. to include girls basketball and the addition of the baseball which will become operative with the beginning of the 1946-47 school year.
- 2. The new set up for basketball in 1946-47 which will provide for both east and west tournaments and a state final tourney for both class A and class B. The reasons for this experiment are to give more people an opportunity to witness the games and to permit more participants to enjoy the thrill of a state tournament. Only time will tell if this plan is superior to the old plan.
- 3. The printing and distribution of standard forms for use in special and district track meets. It is hoped that these forms will standardize the procedure in scoring both track and field events and simplfy the procedure in qualifying for the state track meet.
- 4. Some attention has also been given to clarifying the rules for admission to the state track meet.
- 5. A start has also been made to include baseball as one of the major sports in North Dakota High Schools and to encourage this activity during the summer months when schools are not in session.
- 6. The Board of Control has given some attention to a study of eligibility rules. Rule one, suspended during the war emergency will be fully renistated at the opening of the 1946-47 school term. Rule ten, relative to transfer students will be interpreted uniformly for all high school students in all schools regardless of location.

Further attention should be directed toward rules concerning "post-season" games and granting of awards to athletes by groups other than the school.

7. One other achievement of the year must be mentioned, namely that of amending the High School League Constitution in such a manner as to permit the merger of the High School League with the consolidated and Graded School League where that move appears advisable. Our League Constitution now makes such a merger possible.

8. The change in the schedule of League membership dues effective with the opening of the 1946-47 school term is also an achievement not to be overlooked. Each member school will more nearly pay for the services it obtains from the League and the League will not be as dependent upon the financial success of the State basketball tournaments. In the past nearly all the operating funds were derived from the receipts of the basketball tournaments.

Financially the League has had a successful year. The two state tournaments have returned a net of over \$7,400. This is the largest amount in the history of the League. It can be explained by the general economic condition of the state, the increasing and growing interest in basketball and by the fact that neither Minot nor Bismarck received any share in the profits but turned all proceeds into the League Treasury. The League funds are all securely guarded. The treasurer furnishes a \$10,000 bond and all investments are in U. S. Government Securities. The A. A. B. F. continues to pay its way. However, the payments of benefits for eleven man football claims have exceeded the income from this source. As a possible explanation to the heavy claims for eleven man football your secretary offers the following: Many schools resumed football last fall and were obliged to use old wornout equipment as the supply of new equipment was very limited. Due to late fall work many boys entered school late and were not properly conditioned before the playing season opened. Some schools carried on athletics without the direction of trained coaches, the superintendent, English teacher, and in some instances the janitor being drafted for this assignment.

Total receipts from the A. A. B. F. amount to \$3,157.75. Payments for claims amount to \$2,702.75. From all appearances allowances under the North Dakota Schedule of Benefits are as liberal as they can be made. Up to the present time no charge has been made against the fund for any administration cost, for printing of forms used by the Fund, for postage used in clearing claims, for exchange on checks, etc.

A comparison of the current financial report with others in years past indicated that expenses of the League grow from year to year. Many services are given today that were not included years ago. A glance at the printed report indicates that \$192.10 is expended for rule books and other Federation publications that are distributed to member schools upon receipt of dues. Printing costs for various forms amount to \$392.00. The mimiographed newsletter costs \$143.90.

Member schools are invited to examine the financial report which is given in sufficient detail to give a clear picture of both sources of income and expenditure. Finally member schools are invited to examine the payments made by the A. A. B. F. This year's report gives two additional tables that should be of interest to the membership.

The first table gives a summary of the types of claims paid for each of the special sports and physical education. From this table it is evident that football claims are in the majority with payments for explanatory X-rays in all sports being the most frequent payment. A study of this table is suggested to superintendents and coaches.

Table two gives the payment of benefits classified by schools. A suggested use of this information might be to sell this form of protection to high school students under your supervision.

Your secretary and Board of Control submit the above report for your approval. It has been a pleasure to serve you although at times the work has been heavy with other school duties. Your cooperation and support have made it possible to complete another League year.
