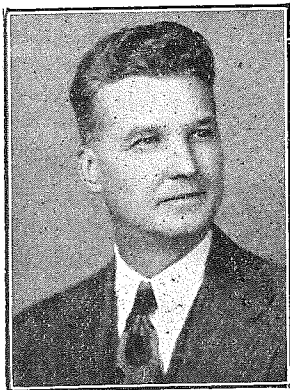

The Handbook of the North Dakota State High School League is one of a distinguished family of State Association publications which form an important link in the chain of communications which enable member schools to think and act as a unit association in matters pertaining to the welfare of activity departments of the school.

This edition is of especial interest since it is an anniversary number and marks the 25th year of publication.

It also marks the beginning of another important era in the League's history, i. e., the period during which the member schools have accomplished a solidarity and an expanded program which warrants establishment of a state office with a full-time staff to direct the activities of the League. North Dakota thus becomes the 32nd state to reach this status.

One of the most impressive things about the remarkable development of the North Dakota State High School League is the great number of important schoolmen who have unselfishly given their time and energy to helping direct these activities. This has been done on the assumption that each man owes part of his effort to the building of the profession of which he is a part. Without such public spirited support, the present North Dakota State High School League would not have been possible. Hence, each reader of this Handbook must do it for himself, — and be a little stronger and slightly more tolerant because of having reminisced about the stalwarts who helped build a statewide organization which has permitted united action in all matters where school welfare is involved.

Constitution of N. D. H. S. L.

ARTICLE I — NAME

This organization shall be known as the NORTH DAKOTA HIGH SCHOOL LEAGUE, hereinafter called the LEAGUE.

ARTICLE II — OBJECT

The object of the League shall be to promote, directly or indirectly, all desirable kinds of inter-high school contests, to hold them to the highest standards, and to make them serve the interests of the member schools.

SECTION I. Any accredited High School, Graded or Consolidated School, so classified by the State Department of Public Instruction may become a member of the League by acknowledging allegiance to its authority and paying the annual dues. The membership year shall be from October First to September Thirtieth following.

SECTION II. The superintendent or his faculty appointee shall be the official representative of the school, hereinafter called the REPRESENTATIVE, such appointment, if any, being made in writing to the secretary.

ARTICLE III — OFFICERS

SECTION I. There shall be a Board of Control, hereinafter called THE BOARD, consisting of five representatives chosen by the League at the annual fall meeting for terms of three years each new member to be seated July 1 following their election, each year, the Board shall choose from its own number a President, and a Vice-President. A Secretary-Treasurer shall also be selected by the Board of Control who will serve at the pleasure of the Board.

SECTION II. The president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer shall each exercise all the functions assigned to him by work or implication of the Constitution, By-Laws and Regulations of the League, or the Rules of the Board.

SECTION III. The Board is the League's executive body, subject only to restraint of the Constitution, By-Laws, and Regulations of the League. The Board shall determine the time and place of its own meetings and shall fill vacancies in its own ranks, to serve until the next regular meeting of the League. Three members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION IV. When the Board is dealing with affairs in which one of its members or his school is specifically involved, the remaining members shall select a proxy to sit in his place.

ARTICLE V — REPRESENTATIVE ASSEMBLY

SECTION I. The time and place of the regular meetings of the Representatives shall be those of the High School Conference and of the North Dakota Education Association, the hours and rooms being designated by the Board.

SECTION II. Special meetings may be called by the Board, and must be called by the Secretary upon the written request of twenty Representatives.

SECTION III. The Representative Assembly shall have electoral and legislative function only.

SECTION IV. Twenty Representatives shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE VI — FINANCE

SECTION 1. The Board shall determine what expenditures are necessary.

SECTION II. Each member school shall pay to the Treasurer annual dues according to the following schedule: Class A, \$10.00; Class B, \$7.50; Class C, \$5.00; Class D, \$2.00. Class A shall include all schools that are members of the East-West Conference. Class B shall include fully or minor accredited high schools. Class C shall include graded or consolidated schools. Class D shall include schools not having interscholastic contests, but desiring athletic insurance benefits.

SECTION III. Special assessments may be levied by a two-thirds vote of the Representative Assembly.

ARTICLE VII — AMENDMENTS

The By-Laws and Regulations of the League may be amended by a majority vote of those present, at any regular meeting, provided this vote is 25% of all Representatives, and provided notice of the proposed Constitution-amendment with its substance, has been served at a previous session or has been served by letter from the Secretary at the request of another Representative and provided that there shall be a lapse of one month between the time of presentation and final vote thereon.

BY-LAWS GOVERNING RELATIONS OF SCHOOLS

ARTICLE I — MEMBERSHIP

SECTION I. Application for membership and acknowledging allegiance to the League must be made by the superintendent of the school on the League's prescribed card-file form.

SECTION II. A school may be suspended or expelled by the Board for violation of League rules; and once expelled, may be reinstated only by action of the Board.

SECTION III. No school shall be admitted to the League during a school year in which it has as a non-member been represented in any interscholastic competition by a student who would have been ineligible under the rules of the League.

ARTICLE II — RESPONSIBILITY

The school's responsibility to the League rests upon the superintendent. Consistent with this obligation, and except as otherwise specified, his powers and duties may be delegated for execution to one or more members of the teaching staff of his high school as follows:

- a. Representative, who may hold office in the League, or speak and vote in its assembly.
- b. Business managers, coaches, directors, chaperones, etc.

ARTICLE III — OFFICERS

SECTION I. When authorized by the President, the Secretary may submit by mail questions for discussion, but not for vote.

SECTION II. The Secretary shall keep an accurate and systematized record of membership, officials of the League, and contestants.

SECTION III. The Secretary shall have general charge of the Board's correspondence, and shall distribute their forms, information and inquires to members.

SECTION IV. The Treasurer shall receive all funds belonging to the League, which he shall invest or pay out for League bills as directed by the Board and formally approved by the President.

SECTION V. The Treasurer shall keep a systematic and detailed record of all receipts and disbursements, with vouchers for the latter, and shall make a complete financial statement to the League at the Conference session, at which time his accounts shall be audited by a committee of three appointed by the President.

SECTION VI. The Treasurer shall furnish a bond for two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00), to be approved by the Board and paid for from League funds.

ARTICLE VI — RULE VIOLATIONS

SECTION 1. All questions in dispute shall be referred to the Board and their decision shall be final.

SECTION II. For any violation of League rules, an offending student may be barred from participating in contests which come under the League jurisdiction; and an offending school may be suspended or expelled.

SECTION III. Any school making a protest against another (which protest must be in writing), shall submit a full statement of facts to the Secretary, who shall submit a copy to the superintendent of the accused school. Such protest shall be accompanied by a deposit of two dollars (\$2.00), which shall later be returned if the protest is sustained by the Board.

SECTION IV. A school against which a protest or any charge has been made shall have the privilege of presenting its case to the Board.

ARTICLE V — CONTESTS

SECTION I. Neither contest rules nor eligibility rules may be waived by common consent, and they must be fully observed by League members even tho competing with non-members.

SECTION II. Final agreements for contests between two League members shall be incorporated into contracts on forms provided by the League. These contracts shall be executed by the Representatives of the respective schools and exchanged prior to the contest, and shall not be cancelled or altered except by mutual consent of the schools concerned.

SECTION III. No member of the League shall schedule or engage in any contest with a non-member which is eligible for membership in the League, under penalty of suspension for the remainder of the year; nor shall it enter into any contest with an out-of-state school which is not similarly qualified in respect to its own state.

SECTION IV. No member of the League shall engage in any contest with a school whose membership has been suspended, during the period of such suspension.

SECTION V. At least one week prior to any contest between League schools, they must exchange eligibility list made on the League's forms, in which the superintendent and the principal of the high school certify to the present eligibility of each contestant named and pledge the use of only those who remain eligible at the time of contest.

SECTION VI. In any contest whatsoever, except those among students in the same school no ineligible student shall be used; nor shall such student appear on the field in uniform or otherwise par-

ticipate as a member of the contesting organization or group. Non-member using contestants or less than eligible standards may not secure membership within the same year.

SECTION VII. Contesting schools shall each have present an authorized faculty member who shall be responsible to his school for the conduct of his participants and students, thruout the contest and the visiting team's stay away from home.

SECTION VIII. Athletic coaches who are not regularly employed by the board of education are prohibited.

SECTION IX. Students shall not serve as business managers to arrange or handle contests between schools.

SECTION X. High standards of courtesy, fair - dealing and sportsmanship must feature all League contests. The Board may rate schools or students in these respects, recognizing high attainment and penalizing low.

SECTION XI. The League disapproves of expensive awards from school to students for accomplishment in contests.

SECTION XII. The school must keep adequate records of contests and contestants, and all reports required by the Board shall be promptly and accurately supplied.

ARTICLE VI — ELIGIBILITY OF CONTESTANTS

SECTION I. A student shall have been in attendance as many school days as he missed at the opening semester, should his enrollment not have been made the first day of the semester.

SECTION II. He shall not compete for more than four seasons in any one branch of inter-high school contests, provided that competition while in the eighth grade or below, shall not constitute one of the four seasons.

SECTION III. He shall not have participated in a similar contest during the same school year as a member of any other than a high school team.

SECTION IV. He shall not have been at any time a member of a team representing an institution of higher rank than a secondary school.

SECTION V. He shall be doing passing work in at least fifteen hours per week, the passing grade to be computed from the opening of the semester and relate to such subjects only as severally have a credit value of one-half unit per semester.

Note: This means three subjects, each of which is equal to a half credit a semester, on the basis of 16 credits for graduation. We may not add physical training and orchestra fractional credits together, for example.

SECTION VI. He shall not be a graduate of a four year high school course, not a graduate of a senior high school offering three courses comprehending the tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades. Neither shall he compete after having earned credits sufficient to meet the graduating requirements in any course of study prescribed by the school he is to represent unless such credits have been secured in less than eight semesters of school attendance.

SECTION VII. He shall not be over 20 years of age.

SECTION VIII. After attending the first semester of the ninth grade he shall have credit on the school records in the unit-per-year or half-unit-per-semester subjects of at least three half units earned and recorded at the close of the last semester in which he was enrolled as a student, 30 days or more attendance or participation in interscholastic competition within any shorter period being sufficient to constitute enrollment in any semester.

SECTION IX. He shall always have contested under his own name.

SECTION X. He shall have been in attendance in the school he represents for one semester upon transferring from another school, unless his parents have become residents of the school district to which he is transferred or the school from which he is transferred does not offer work of the corresponding year in which he is ranked; and in the instance of a pupil transferred from a public high school to any other high school in the same city or vice versa he shall not be eligible to represent the new high school in the same school year.

SECTION XI. He shall not use tobacco no intoxicating liquors during the school terms of two semesters.

NOTE: This has not been cancelled but it has been taken from its position between No. 10 and No. 12 in the list of eligibility rules, and placed along with three other rules in the new High School League Recommended Standards of Eligibility, the entire administration of which, including penalties is left complete within the hands of each local school administration.

The Standards are these:

(a.) Every athlete shall be given a thorough physical examination before the opening of the athletic season.

(b.) Parental consent shall be secured before the participation of any athlete.

(c.) Proof in advance shall establish the birthdate of every 9th semester student before participation.

(d.) Every student participating in interscholastic contests shall abstain from the use of tobacco and alcoholic beverages.

SECTION XII. No student shall participate in any interscholastic contest after his eighth semester in high school unless he is under 18 years of age; nor after his seventh semester if his seventh and eighth are not consecutive.

SECTION XIII. High schools with an enrollment of seventy five or less may compete in Class C. Tournaments or may elect to compete in Class B.

Minutes of the Annual High School League Meeting

Grand Forks — October 21, 1948

The High School League met in the auditorium of the Grand Forks Central High School on Thursday, October 21, 1948, with about 100 member-schools present.

Upon motion of Supt. Schroeder of Grand Forks and seconded by Harry Westlie of Bowman, it was agreed to waive the reading of the minutes as they were printed in the 1948 handbook and available to all members. The CPA audit report of Mr. Luehe of Minot was accepted and a brief summary was passed out to the members. Some time was spent explaining the expanding financial picture of the league. By comparison it was noted that receipts and disbursements are nearly as large as those of the NDEA. The secretary also reported that there were nearly 200 schools taking advantage of the AABF and that nearly 28,000 boys and girls were protected at the close of business October 15th of the current year.

The next order of business was the voting on the two proposed amendments. Amendment number one would amend Article 111, Section 1, so that the present board would consist of 14 members. After a brief discussion the question was called and the amendment was unanimously defeated.

Amendment number 2 would amend Article VI, Section X, of the By-Laws so that the penalty for transferring schools would become two semesters instead of the present one semester. After some discussion for and con, Supt. James called for the question. Upon a rising vote, it was found that the amendment lost by a substantial majority. President Zimmerman called upon Supt. Havig to explain the new proposed music and speech setup. Mr. Havig explained the new proposal for some thirty minutes and answered several questions on the proposed plan.

The report of the nominating committee, consisting of Supt. E. A. Quam, Oakes, Chairman, Frank Gurley, Tower City and Glenn Iverson, Underwood was called for and they unanimously submitted the names of A. C. Van Wyk and M. B. Zimmerman to succeed themselves. President Zimmerman called upon Vice-President Roberts to take the chair. Nominations were called for from the floor. None were offered and a motion was made and seconded that the nominations cease. Mr. Tighe of Fargo then moved that an unanimous ballot be cast for Messrs. Zimmerman and Van Wyk. Motion was seconded and carried.

Wakefield of LaMoure moved that a committee be appointed to work with the Board of Control to see if some changes could not be made in the class B tourney sites for the coming March. The motion was seconded and carried. Subsequently President Zimmerman appointed Supt. Gludt of Killdeer, Chairman Wakefield of LaMoure and Totdahl of Crosby and asked them to report at the next Board of Control meeting in December.

The chair called for any other new business and there being none, Supt. Lazenby of Hankinson moved for adjournment. The motion was seconded and carried.

Devils Lake — July 23, 24, 1948

The Board of Control of the High School League met at Devils Lake on July 23, 24, 1948 with all members present.

The question of Athletic Benefit Protection for the 1948-49 school term was studied and it was agreed to discontinue the individual plan entirely and substitute in its place the new group plan. The table of benefits was also studied and benefits were raised in hospitalization, x-ray allowance and a few other places. It was agreed to insert a clause in the new booklet stating that no benefits would be paid in tournaments which were not conducted under league sanction and approval.

1. Arrangements were made to print up new information booklets and forms in order to put the new plan into operation.

2. The question of the location of football rule clinics to be conducted in early September was discussed and the following sites were suggested: Bismarck, Minot, Devils Lake, Valley City, and Grand Forks. The secretary was instructed to contact Mr. Hoffman and work out a schedule which would be satisfactory to him and the league.

3. The secretary was instructed to invest some of the league surplus in government bonds. It was the opinion of the board that \$10,000 in type F bonds could be purchased at this time.

4. Upon motion by VanWyk and second by Gilliland it was agreed to set the allowance for mileage at six cent per mile for travel.

5. Some attention was given to the Class B and C basketball setup for 1948-49. The following regulations were adopted upon motion of Roberts and second by Johnson:

(a.) Schools with an enrollment of 75 or over, not members of East-West conference, are automatically Class B and must remain Class B for competitive purposes.

(b.) Schools under 75 are automatically class C schools for competitive purposes and remain in that class unless they notify their district committees and the Secretary's office by October first that they wish to compete in Class B.

(c.) Enrollment figures for classification purposes shall be taken from the 1947-48 high school directory.

6. Officials for the State sponsored tournaments were selected as follows:

West State Class A—Bismarck, March 3, 4, 5, 1949; Clarence Oamek, Osakis; Roy Domek, Moorhead; Reuben Hammond, Minot.

East Class A State—Fargo, March 3, 4, and 5 1949. Art Hovde, Minot; Bernard Busse, Minot; Ernie Anderson, Moorhead.

State Class A finals—Fargo, March 11 and 12 1949. Reuben Hammond, Minot; Earl Hoffman, Grand Forks.

West Class B State—Dickinson, March 10, 11 and 12, 1949. Bernard Busse, Minot; Bernard White, Grand Forks; Vernon Nelson, Hanks.

East Class B State—Devils Lake, March 10, 11 and 12, 1949. Norris Sando, Grafton Glenn Gumlia, Grand Forks; Leonard Egstrom, Grand Forks.

State Class B finals—Minot, March 24, 25 and 26, 1949. Reuben Hammond, Minot; Earl Hoffman, Grand Forks; Art Hovde, Minot.

State Class C March 17, 18 and 19, 1949. L. G. Peterson, Michigan; Elmer Smeby, Oberon; George Schaumberg, Bismarck.

Fees were set at \$100 per official plus expenses for each and all tournaments.

7. Complying with the mandate of the H. S. League, the Board spent considerable time discussing the proposed music and speech contests to be carried on under league direction and supervision. It was agreed to accept the main outline of the proposed plan as submitted by Supt. Havig of Williston. Details of this plan will be published in forthcoming news-letters. The main features of this plan will:

(a.) Set up two state centers instead of one at the University. The centers will be at Bismarck and Grand Forks. Schools will compete in one or the other of these centers in the final contests.

(b.) Eight district centers will be continued as a preliminary to the state contests.

(c.) Instead of definitely assigned selections more choice will be given by permitting the selection of any piece approved by the Music Educators National Conference and listed in their manual.

(d.) The same division of schools as now exist for basketball shall be followed.

(e.) District centers and managers were selected as follows:

Minutes of the Board of Control

Grand Forks, October 20, 22, 1948

The Board of Control of the High School League met at various times when it was possible to get together during the NDEA meeting in Grand Forks.

Several controversial claims against the AABF were discussed and disposed of.

Two vacancies had developed in the position of referees at the East and West Class A Divisional Tournaments due to the inability of Hammond and Busse to accept these dates. Larry Schneider of Fargo was named to the vacancy at Bismarck on March 3-4-5 1949 and Glenn Gumlia of Grand Forks was named to a similar vacancy at Fargo on the same dates. In the event that Mr. Gumlia had other arrangements made and could not accept the secretary was instructed to contact Herb Parker of Minot State Teachers College.

The question of trophies was discussed and it was agreed that a committee consisting of Elmer Johnson, M. B. Zimmerman, John Roberts and secretary E. Abrahamson should go ahead and make the purchases. Due to the difficulty of getting together with all parties concerned it was later agreed to defer the purchase of trophies until the December meeting of the board when all members could be present for all sessions.

The question of radio broadcasts for the 1949 tournaments was considered and after a lengthy discussion it was agreed to permit broadcasts on the same basis as in 1948; namely as follow: Any radio station may broadcast games without charge but must agree to carry

all games and all parts of all games. Any station agreeing to broadcast all games may feed one or more games to other stations for rebroadcast.

M. W. Cummings, Coach at Oakes was named to represent North Dakota at the Annual Football Rules Committee meeting in Chicago, December 29-30th.

E. C. Johnson and E. Abrahamson were named as delegates of the Board of Control to the Annual Federation Meeting in Chicago, December 28-30th.

It was again agreed to send seven coaches to the Annual Clinic at Valley City, Nov, 26-27th with the understanding that these men return to their respective areas of the state and conduct rules clinics.

The following men were selected: From the Southwest—Harry Wienbergen, Dickinson and Willard Solberg, Hettinger. From the Northwest—Ed Roy of Williston and Milo Lodoen of Bottineau. From the Northeast—Wallace Osman, Langdon and Roy Reslock, Devils Lake. From the Southeast—Harry Bridgeford, Fargo.

Messrs. Gilliland and Van Wyk reported as a committee on uniform charges for tournaments and field a written recommendation which was to be distributed to all tournament managers.

It was agreed to pay the expenses of the two coaches, in the amount of \$50.00 for their expenses in appearing on the program of the summer coaching school at the University.

Earl Abrahamson was named to the position of full time secretary for the coming year effective June first at the salary of \$5,000 per annum.

It was agreed to meet again at Dickinson about the first week in December to take care of all unfinished business and whatever new developments that might come up on the tournament question and the new music-speech venture. The secretary was instructed to make the necessary arrangements for this meeting.

Their being no further business the meeting adjourned.

Minutes of the Board of Control

Dickinson, December 2, 3, 1948

The Board of Control of the High School League met in Dickinson

December 2 and 3, 1948 with all members present. A number of eligibility cases were discussed as the first item of business. The details of the cases and their final disposition follows—THE WALCOTT CASE.

Two lads enrolled at Kindred High School and attended classes for several days thinking that their tuition would be paid at that school. Later they found that that was not the case and they left Kindred High School and enrolled at Walcott where they had attended school the previous year. The question asked—was when would these lads be eligible to participate in athletics at Walcott. The board was of the opinion that they would not be eligible at Walcott for a period of one semester of eighteen weeks. The fact that they had enrolled at Kindred and had attended one or more classes and then subsequently enrolled at Walcott made them transfer students and as such they must attend the full semester before becoming eligible.

THE RAY CASE:

A lad, whose parents were separated and had been separated for a period of about ten years, had made his home with his mother. For certain good reasons the lad no longer found it possible to live with his mother and was sent to Ray to live with the father. The question was—when would he be considered eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics at Ray. This case was one of broken homes and such cases always present certain problems making their solution rather difficult. It was agreed that, if it could be established that the lad could no longer live with the mother and it was necessary for him to come to Ray and live with the father and further if it could be established that the father was the sole and only support of this lad and further if the juvenile authorities would certify that he was obliged to make this change, then he should be declared immediately eligible.

THE DAZEY CASE:

A Dazey lad is carrying two subjects in residence in the Dazey High School and the balance by correspondence study. The question raised—can this lad be eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics. The answer is definitely No. He must carry a minimum of three subjects having a value of one half unit per semester in his local high school. Correspondence subjects have never been counted under rule 5 for the reason that a lad taking correspondence can progress at his own rate. He may lay off for a week or two or he may make a definite spurt as he sees fit. There is no way of check-

ing his standing at any particular time. Hence the local school has no way of knowing whether he is currently eligible or not. On the other hand the league does recognize correspondence work under rule 8 in that it permits the credit in correspondence work to be counted as one of the three passing subjects. However to count under rule eight, this credit must be earned and recorded by the end of the semester involved. Thus a lad could not finish a correspondence course in February and have it counted back in the previous semester. If the semester ended on January 23rd then this correspondence course would have to be passed and recorded by January 23rd.

THE DELAMERE CASE:

During the interval when the superintendent of schools was confined in a hospital an ineligible player was used by the temporary coach. Upon his return to work, the error was discovered and the player was immediately removed from the squad and the infraction voluntarily reported to the Board of Control. Letters of apology were written to the school involved in the game played with the ineligible player in uniform. The question before the board was to determine a suitable penalty for the infraction. It was the opinion of the board that the superintendent should be complemented for voluntarily reporting the infraction and further that the secretary should write the superintendent and ask him to officially forfeit the game even tho the game was lost and secondly that he reaffirm his schools support of the leagues rules in a special assembly called for that purpose. It was the opinion of the board that under the circumstances further penalty was not necessary or desirable.

Supt Van Wyk presented an invitation on behalf of the Bismarck Chamber of Commerce inviting the board to hold the Class C tournament in that city. It was agreed to accept this invitation and upon motion the 1949 Class C tournament was set for Bismarck on March 17-18-19.

Upon motion by VanWyk and second by Johnson it was agreed to allow the sum of \$4.50 per day for 12 men for board and lodging for teams taking part in the StateTournaments. No change was made in the allowance for transportation, which then remains at 45c per one way mile. It was further agreed to allow each competing team a net amount of ten percent in each of the state A divisional tournaments. Such an amount to be divided amongst the eight teams participating in each separate tournament.

It was agreed to send Marshall Murdock of Bismarck to the National Basketball Rules Committee meeting if such procedure was permissible under Federation rules.

Some considerable time was spent discussing plans for 1950 tournaments. It was agreed to meet with the chairmen of all/C committees at Bismarck during the C tournament and the following

week at Minot with the Chairmen of all B committees to hear of any changes or suggestions that these committees might have to improve the present set-up.

The State Track Meet was set for Valley City on Saturday, May 28th with Supt. M. S. Ward in charge.

The Board spent considerable time examining trophies on display by the Balfour and Jostens Company. Purchases of trophies were authorized as follows:

Balfour Company thru their representative Walter Sherman:

Individual Awards for first, second, third, and fourth place State Track in 13 events.

Trophies for four places for state track meet.

Trophies for first and second places for the eight district track meets.

Medals for three places for the individual awards at the eight district track meets.

Medals for the state Golf and Tennis-Medalist and Individual.

33-10K balls for winning team members.

33—Sterling Balls for runnerup team members.

State Relay trophies.

Jostens Company:

Belt buckles for all Tournament team.

374 Bronze participation awards. (For state tourney teams except first and second place winners).

State Basketball trophies first, second, thir and fourth places.

Trophies for first and second places East and West Divisionals A and B.

Trophies for the 8 class B and C districts as called for by the district committees.

Coach Hannegan of the Dickinson High School met with the the Board to explain the wishes of the different official associations. It was explained that the officials wished to have the league set up a registration and examination plan for officials. It was agreed to undertake this venture next summer by setting up a registration plan whereby officials could register for a fee of \$2.00. This fee would include rule books news-letters, and also the right to take the federation sponsored examination on rules.

A committee consisting of Supt. Wakefield of LaMoure, Totdahl of Crosby and Gludt of Killdeer met with the board relative to the possibility of changing the plans for district Playoffs for qualifying for the state Class B tournament. The proposal of the committee was to hold four regional tournaments with two from each region being selected to go to the state final B Tournament. A check with the superintendent of Minot revealed that a tournament could be held at Minot, Dickinson was available as was Devils Lake. A telephone conversation with the Secretary of the Valley City Chamber of Commerce, Bill Stutsman, indicated that the Valley City Spring show was on at that time and the armory would not be available. A call to Jamestown indicated that the time possibly could be cleared but that no particular interest existed for a tournament there at a time when the tournament was conducted at Fargo. After due consideration the board was of the opinion that it was not advisable to try to make any changes in the present setup of two divisional tournaments at Dickinson and Devils Lake.

Some time was spent discussing the number of entries in the C tournaments. It was noted that there were very few entrants in some districts and a large number in others. Upon motion of Johnson if any particular district had only one team contending for the right to enter the state C tournament then this team should be set into another district adjoining and the second place team of the largest district be permitted to enter the state C tournament. The motion was seconded and carried.

Supt. Havig of Williston met with the Board relative to plans for the district and state music and speech contest. There appeared to be many questions yet unsolved in this new venture and it was agreed to call in the State Music Committee, the chairmen of the eight district committees and the managers of the east and west State contest to meet at Bismarck on Tuesday, December 28th, 10 A. M. in the high school building for a general conference to make final plans for both the district and state contests and iron out any difficulties which may exist at the present time.

The Board also agreed to have all registration for both the speech and the music contests sent to the secretary's office. All fees so received were to be checked and 50% of these fees were to be returned to the districts and be used as the district committees see fit. Any unused portion of the fees returned to the districts would remain with districts for use in future years. The board further agreed to underwrite the expenses of the state contests for judges.

Mr. Gilliland was instructed by the board to investigate the possibility of awarding certificates or some other suitable award for participating in the state contests. Mr. Gilliland was further instructed to release complete information to the press upon the operation of the Athletic Benefit Fund.

The Board of Control were invited to a special luncheon on Friday sponsored by the Business men of Dickinson.

The meeting adjourned Friday evening with the understanding that the board would meet at Bismarck with the District C chairman and again at Minot with the class B Chairman who would be asked to bring in their recommendations for any changes in the present B and C set-up. These meetings would be called during the tournaments held in the respective cities.

Minutes of the Board of Control

BISMARCK—March 17-19, 1949

The Board of Control met in Bismarck during the State Class C Tournament with all members of the board present and also representatives of the eight class C districts.

A considerable number of items of business were discussed informally but action was deferred on most items until the following week at Minot. Two mornings were spent in conference with the special C committees discussing problems of this class of school.

The "C" committee drew up the following recommendations for consideration of the Board of Control.

1. The one eight team state tournament in basketball was endorsed by the group with a minority report voting in favor of an East-West Tourney as used in class B competition during the current year.
2. The Committee recommends that districts stage sub-district elimination tournaments within the districts thus eliminating travel and creating greater fan interest.
3. In order to stabilize the Class C tournaments thru both the district and state level, it is recommended that schools having an enrollment of 65 and under as of October first of the current year compete in class C tournaments. Schools with an enrollment of 66 to 75 as of October first should be given the option of competing in either the Class C or the Class B tournaments. Further should a school, which formerly had an enrollment under 75, reach an enrollment figure of 76 or more, then such a school should be permitted to remain in class C for the current year.

4. The committee recommended that the League Secretary send out at intervals suitable publicity materials concerning the work and operation of the League which could be used in the school papers and also the local press.
5. The Committee unanimously endorse the League 100% in enforcing the regulation that all League members may not play eligible non-members.
6. The committee recommends that the Athletic Benefit Fund be broadened and additional benefits be added and that fees be increased to care for these greater benefits.
7. The committee recommends that schools must inform the district committee by November first if they propose to enter the district class C tournaments.
8. The committee recommended that the Board of Control be increased to seven members with a further provision that one member must be elected from the class C schools.
9. It was also recommended that the Board of Control sponsor girls basketball for those smaller schools that wish to engage in that sport.
10. The committee commended Supt. A. C. VanWyk, Manager of the Class C state tournament for the splendid manner in which the tourney was conducted, also the Bismarck High School Band and the school for the entertainment between halves of the games.

It was agreed that M. B. Zimmerman, President of the Board of Control, should present the awards and trophies after the final game.

Upon motion of Roberts and seconded by VanWyk, it was agreed to award the contract for basketballs for the 1950 tournaments to Northern School Supply Company of Fargo and the Colborn School Supply Company of Grand Forks on the same basis as the current contract.

The Board of Control and visiting coaches and superintendents were guests of the Bismarck Chamber of Commerce at a dinner.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned with an understanding that matters discussed informally would be disposed of at the Minot class B tournament the following week.

Meeting of the Board of Control

Minot—March 24-26, 1949

The Board of Control of the High School League met in Minot in the basement of the Chamber of Commerce Building and in the parlors of the Leland Hotel. Every available minute until the conclusion of the tournament was spent in meetings as a heavy agenda had to be disposed of during the two days allotted to the meeting. The Eight Class B Districts were represented by the committee chairmen or some other committee member designated to represent the district. Friday and Saturday mornings were spent with these committee members and Supt. Wakefield of LaMoure who represented a special B committee for the study of a revision of the East-West arrangement qualification for the state B Final Tourney.

The Class B committee made the following recommendations:

1. The plan of four regional tournaments which was presented by the special B committee is recommended for adoption by the Board of Control for the 1950 basketball tournaments.
2. Each region is to decide for itself whether there shall be an eight or a four team regional tournament. The Secretary of the League is to poll the schools of the region as to their desires. The Board of Control is to decide the sites of the tournaments, giving consideration to the wishes of the schools as to locations.
3. We recommend that the state final tournament be moved ahead one week.
4. We recommend the plan advanced by the C schools with this amendment that all schools under 65 must petition the board by October first if they wish to play in Class B Tournaments.
5. We recommend that the state final class B tournament be placed in Bismarck in 1950.

The recommendations of the Class B committee were accepted and placed on file to be later reviewed by the Board for final action.

1. Upon action by Johnson and seconded by Roberts, it was agreed to purchase two prints each of new Football and Basketball films—"King Football and King Basketball." These films were to be deposited in the League Film library and be made available to member schools for a small service charge. Several letters were read from Dickinson urging that

the west playoffs be again awarded to that city. Invitations were also received from Minot to hold the State Class B tourney in that city. A committee from Bismarck appeared before the Board of Control and extended invitations for the State Class A, The State Class B and the State Class C Tournaments.

2. Upon motion by Roberts and second by VanWyk it was agreed to adopt the plan of four regional tournaments for qualifying for the State Class B tournament in 1950. It was further understood that the adoption of the four regional plan did not mean any change in the present district organization. Region would consist of the following:

South East—District one and two.

Southwest—Districts seven, south half of district 6, south half of district 5.

Northwest—District 8, west half of district 4, north half of district 6.

Northeast—District 3, east half of district 4, north half of district 5.

Where the district is divided, the district itself shall determine which teams will be assigned in the respective halves of the district.

3. It was agreed that the Board of Control would underwrite the four regional tournaments and take any profits that may result and absorb any losses that might occur.
4. Upon motion by Gilliland and second by VanWyk it was agreed to grant the Class A schools one half of any profits made at the East and West Divisional tournaments. In the event of a loss the competing schools must absorb that loss. This sharing of profits is to be limited to the East and West Divisional tournaments and not the State A Finals.
5. Upon motion of VanWyk and second by Roberts the State A final tournament was changed to an eight team tournament with the first, second, third and consolation winner of the east and west divisions to advance to the finals.
6. Upon motion of Gilliland and second by Johnson the A tournaments for 1950 were set as follows:
 - East A—State Divisional at Fargo on March 2-3-4, 1950
 - West A—State Divisional at Bismarck on March 2-3-4, 1950
 - State A—Finals at Bismarck, March 9-10-11, 1950.
 Consideration was given to the request of the Class A coaches

that a week interval be granted between the divisional and the final tournaments but it appeared to the Board that this was impossible for the coming year.

7. It was moved by Johnson and seconded by VanWyk that the plan of four regions for Class B be tried in 1950 and that dates and sites be named as follows:

Northwest Region at Minot, March 9-10-11

Northeast Region at Devils Lake, March 9-10-11

Southwest Region at Dickinson, March 9-10-11

Southeast Region at Valley City, March 9-10-11

In the southeast region there was a possible conflict with the Winter Fair at Valley City. Two options were left open for this district. If time could not be cleared at Valley City, either hold the tourney at Fargo or change the date to one week later.

8. It was agreed to hold the State B final tournament on March 23-24-25, 1950, and the state C final on March 16, 17, 18, 1950. Location of these tournaments were discussed but no action taken at this time. Consideration was also given again to the recommendations of the B committee to move the final class B tournament up one week. It was the opinion of the Board that no conflicts were desired between the B and C state tournaments.
9. Mr. Gilliland was instructed to proceed with revision plans for the Athletic Benefit Fund, which would increase the schedule of payments and enlarge the amount of benefits.
10. Elmer Johnson was delegated by the Board to award the trophies after the final game on Saturday evening.
11. Coach Jarrett appeared before the Board to discuss the possibilities of a summer coaching school. No action was taken at this time by the Board.
12. The Secretary was instructed to poll the class C schools and obtain their opinions on the plan advanced to stabilize class C tournament competition. It was the understanding that this poll be made this spring and a report of it made at the next meeting of the Board of Control.
13. The Board of Control reorganized itself for the coming fiscal year by re-electing M. B. Zimmerman, President and John Roberts, Vice President.
14. The secretary was instructed to draw up an amendment to the by-laws of the League which would control all star contests and post season games.

The Board of Control were entertained by the Chamber of Commerce at Minot at a dinner and also were guests with visiting coaches and superintendents at a dutch lunch.

There being no further business, the Board of Control adjourned the meeting to meet upon call at Valley City track meet.

Recommended by Principal Leifur and seconded by Pete Petrie that "A" schools be allowed to dress and compete 12 men in tournaments. Also that expenses be paid for 12 players. Motion carried.

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A PLAN FOR THE ORGANIZATION OF INTERSCHOOL EVENTS IN MUSIC AND SPEECH IN NORTH DAKOTA

1948-1949

I—ADMINISTRATION

A. Events—Events shall be held in music and speech on an interschool basis and will be under the general management of the Board of Control of the High School League.

B. Board of Control—The Board of Control of the High School League shall be the final authority in administering this plan. It shall arrange for annual divisional and state contests, supervise finances, provide such funds as it may seem necessary to administer the plan and perform such other duties as are hereinafter mentioned.

C. Official Representative—At all meetings where a vote is required, the administrative head of the school shall represent the school unless he designated another member of the staff to represent him.

II—COMPETITION - Festivals in Music

A. For the purpose of division into classes, the enrollment in grades nine to twelve inclusive shall be considered. Schools that are members of the East-West Conference shall be classified as class A. Schools enrolling 75 or more pupils be designated class B, and those enrolling 75 or more pupils shall be designated Class B and those enrolling less than 75 shall be designated class C. A class C school may compete in class B.

B. Events which shall be included in the contests shall be the following:

Class A—To be determined by the members of the East-West Conference.

C. It is recommended that all selections performed be chosen from the appropriate cumulative or selective lists to be found in the **School Music Competition Festivals Manual**. Current copies of the Manual may be secured from the **League Secretary at Belfield, N. Dak.** All events advancing to finals must use the same number as used in the district event.

D. Bands shall use one warm-up march and one selected number. The total time to be used by each band shall not exceed 20 minutes, which includes set-up time.

E. Choruses shall not use more than ten minutes each and shall be limited to two selections.

F. The playing or singing time for a soloist or ensemble shall not exceed six minutes including tuning and is limited to one selection.

G. Elementary pupils may participate in contests as soloists or members of a group.

H. Each school may enter only one entry in each event.

I. All selections must be memorized in instrumental solo events and all vocal events.

J. Ratings shall be given as follows:

Highly Superior or I

Superior or II

Excellent or III

Good or IV

Fair or V

Inferior or VI

No plus and minus ratings shall be used. The same rating may be given to any number of contestants. Only those receiving the highest rating in an event may enter final contests. To enter such contests a rating of excellent or better must be received.

K. All entry blanks will be furnished the individual school by the secretary of the league. The forms of the blanks, scoring sheets, and such other forms as are required for the conduct of the contests shall be determined by the Board of Control.

L. In all events, a copy of the selection rendered must be provided the judges.

M. It is not required that all solos be accompanied.

CLASS A

A. Schools shall be divided into an East Division and a West Division as in the East-West conference.

B. Sometime during the month of September, representatives of the schools in each division shall meet separately to determine the type of divisional events to be held during the following spring, site of event, date, manager, etc. This meeting shall be arranged for by the Board of Control through its secretary. One member of the Board shall be designated by it to take charge of the meeting. An advisory committee of three members shall be set up for each division to administer the plan under the supervision of the Board of Control.

C. The manager of the events shall select judges with the advice of the divisional manager.

D. Participants shall not repeat selections used in either of the two preceeding years if they won the highest ratings with them.

E. Entries and fees shall be sent to the secretary of the Board of Control and he shall forward the proper share to the managers of the divisional events.

F. Divisions may choose to follow the festival plan. In the event the festivval plan is selected, the plans for the festival shall be made at the September meeting of the representatives of schools comprising the divisions.

CLASSES B AND C

A. There shall be a district committee of three for each district of the state. For the first time the members of this committee shall be chosen by the Board of Control. One shall serve for one year, one for two years and one for three years. Vacancies shall be filled by elections conducted at an annual fall meeting of the representatives of these schools of the districts. The district committee shall appoint a manager for each contest of festival and delegate to him all necessary power to conduct such events. The results of such elections shall be reported to the secretary of the Board of Control. Each district shall determine whether the festival or the contest plan shall be used.

B. Each district shall assume the responsibility of financing its activities. Admissions may be charged at all events. It is suggested that the admissions shall not exceed 50c per person per event or \$1.00 for a season ticket. It is suggested that pass tickets be provided all participants, directors, etc.

One half the entry fees and all the receipts from admissions remain under the control of the district committees and are to be used for the payment of expenses of district events. Balances remaining are to be disposed of in such manner as directed by the district committee. Such funds may be used for developing future events, for sending contestants to the state events, for distribution among participating schools, or for any other purpose deemed proper by the district committee.

C. The following are suggested as expenses which may be deducted from district receipts:

Judges—Maximum of \$25.00 per day and six cents per mile and travel expenses.

Advertising—\$10.00 maximum.

Tickets—\$10.00 maximum.

Rental—None.

Mailing, mimeographing, telephone — actual cost.

Piano tuning—\$4.00 maximum.

D. The local manager shall select the judges, but he shall secure the advice of the district committee.

E. Winners of the highest rating shall not repeat selections used by him in either of the two previous years.

F. The district events shall be held by April 23. The final events shall be held at Grand Forks and Bismarck on May 13.

G. Entries and fees to the district events shall be sent to the secretary of the High School League at least two weeks before the district contest.

H. Entries for the final contests at Grand Forks and Bismarck shall be sent to the manager of those events by May 1. No additional entry fees shall be required for participation in the final events.

J. Districts 1-2-3-4 shall constitute the Eastern Division and the state final contest will be held in Grand Forks in 1949.

District 5-6-7-8 shall constitute the Western Division and the state final contest will be held at Bismarck in 1949.

While it is expected that schools will compete in the group or groups assigned, it will be permissible for border line schools to transfer from one group to another where it can be shown that another site is more convenient for the competing school.

K. Any school may transfer from one district to another by appeal to the Board of Control.

L. If the schools participating in the festival plan to decide, they may send individuals or small groups or large groups to the final state contests on the recommendation of the critic judge, provided that the selection is found in the national list, requirements as to entry are met, and such participation is recommended by the critic judge.

M. An advisory state committee of three members shall be established for class B and C schools whose duty it shall be to name sites for state and divisional contests, select managers, determine expense allowances and to perform such other duties as are essential to the conduct of the state and divisional contests. For 1949, due to the need of quick action of the Board of Control has set up the sites of Grand Forks and Bismarck for the state contests with John Howard and A. C. VanWyk as managers.

N. Lists giving the approved musical selections will be distributed from the office of the secretary of the Board of Control.

Note: Arrangements have been made with the National Music Educators Conference to supply the following material:

A. Selective Music Lists for Band, Orchestra, Chorus, Instrumental Ensembles for 1946-47 may be obtained for 50c per copy. This will be used until the new list is published.

B. Selective lists of instrumental and vocal solos may be obtained for 50c per copy.

C. A new complete list of ensemble music—available at \$1.00 per copy.

All the above are available at the League Secretary's office for the prices named.

SPEECH

A. Speech events to be included in this plan are debate, one act play, oration, humorous reading, serious reading, extempore speech.

B. Schools shall be divided into classes A and combined B and C groups in speech. No separate contest for debate will be held for Class B and C schools. They may however, compete by entering contests sponsored by class A schools. Class B and C speech contests shall omit debate this year.

C. The debate event for schools located in the western part of the state will be held at Mandan on March 25 with Superintendent

W. L. Neff as manager. Class A, B, or C schools located in the western half of the state may enter this event and such entries should be made by **March 11** to the secretary of the High School League.

D. Entries must be made and fees paid to the secretary of the High School League two-weeks prior to the district events. District events must be held by **April 23**, and may be held separate from or in connection with music events (except for debate).

E. The final events for the state shall be held at Grand Forks and Bismarck on **May 13** in connection with the music events. Entries to the final events must be made to the managers of the divisional events by May 1.

F. No fees shall be paid for entry in the state contests.

DEBATE

A. The question for debate each year will be the question chosen by the appropriate committee of the National University Extension Association.

B. Competing schools shall be represented by two teams, one affirmative and one negative, each consisting of two speakers. No speaker shall be permitted to speak on both sides of the question in any given contest. A school shall be required to use the same four debaters in all rounds of a given contest.

C. Constructive speeches shall be limited to ten minutes and rebuttal speeches to five minutes. Each speaker shall give one constructive and one rebuttal speech. Time cards shall be used to inform the speakers of the amount of time remaining.

D. A debator may receive no help from anyone during the time he is speaking. New arguments may not be introduced in rebuttal speeches. Schools are asked not to scout unpublished personal letters, data resulting from the receipt of such letters shall not be admissible as evidence in arguments presented by any team.

E. In any debate contest having only two, three, or four schools entered, the debate contests shall continue until all affirmative teams have debated against all opposing negative teams and vice versa. In any debate contest having five or more teams, all schools shall debate both sides of the question three times.

Drawing for these debates shall be made by lot under the supervision of the managers immediately prior to the first debate, in the presence of representatives of the schools represented. Drawings shall be made as follows: The representative of each school will draw a number from a series containing as many numbers as there are schools debating. The affirmative and negative teams of each school are to be guided by the number drawn in debating the

following schedule for the first three rounds of the tournament. (The schedule below is based on six schools).

F. The judge (s) of each debate, in addition to rendering a judgement on the winning or losing teams involved, shall grade each affirmative team and each negative team A, B, C, D, or E, with the highest rating assigned to the letter A.

Each decision rendered by any judge shall be sealed in an envelope and turned over to the contest manager to be opened at the end of the first three rounds of debating.

Judges are definitely instructed not to reveal any decisions in debate until after the results of the first three rounds have been announced.

G. Winner of Debate.

1. If, at the end of three rounds, any school has clearly won more decisions than any other school in the debate contest, i. e., the highest percentage of wins, then that school shall be considered the winner of the event. The school having the second best percentage of wins shall be awarded second place, etc.

2. If, at the end of three rounds, two or more schools are tied for the first place the ties shall be broken and the winner decided by means of plans a, b, or outlined below.

(a) If, at or before the completion of three rounds, all possible combinations of debate have been exhausted and if two or more of the schools are tied for first place, the tie shall be broken by use of the point system explained in 3 below.

(b) In all contests in which five or more schools are entered, if only two schools are tied for first place after three rounds of debating, two schools shall debate a fourth round under one of the following plans:

(1) If neither the affirmative or negative teams have debated against each other in the first three rounds, the schools shall decide by lot which teams shall debate each other, but only one team from each school shall debate.

(2) If the results of the drawing in the first three rounds have already brought together two of the teams from the

tied schools, then the other two teams shall debate each other in the fourth round.

(3) If both teams of each school have already debated against each other in the first three rounds, the pairing for the fourth round shall be determined by lot, but only one team from each school shall debate.

(c) In all contests in which five or more schools are entered, if three or more schools are tied for first place, then the tied schools shall be paired in order of the numbers originally drawn and shall debate a fourth round. In this fourth round both teams from each of the tied schools shall debate.

(d) If a fourth round is necessary to determine a winner, percentages shall again be computed after this round to determine whether or not the tie shall be broken as in a. by the point system explained below:

3. Point system for breaking ties: The letters representing the grades assigned by the judges in all of the rounds debated shall be translated into the following numerical equivalents for purposes of determining the final ranking:

- Teams graded A shall receive 1 point
- Teams graded B shall receive 2 points
- Teams graded C shall receive 3 points
- Teams graded D shall receive 4 points
- Teams graded E shall receive 5 points.

The sums of those numerical equivalents of the graded shall then be found and the school having the smallest sum of such numbers shall be assigned first place. The school having the next smallest sum shall be assigned second place, etc.

4. If a team wins a round of debate because of the disqualification of an opponent or because of a forfeit, the numerical grade points to be awarded to the school represented by the winning team shall be the average points earned by that school in the other rounds in which it is debated.

5. The system of debating a fourth round shall be resorted to only in the case there is a tie for first place. If there is a tie for any place other than first place, the tie shall be broken by the point system as explained before.

H. Instructions — A copy of the following instructions shall be given to each judge.

Instructions to Judges

1. A decision is not to be based on:

- a. The merits of the question. The judge should not be influenced by prejudices in favor of or against the proposition.
- b. Partiality. The judge should not be influenced by the repu-

tation of or partiality for or against either of the competing teams, their school, or coach.

c. Preconceived notions on arguments. The judge should not allow his idea of what the best affirmative or negative arguments or case may be to influence his decision.

d. Personal preferences on debating style. A judge should not penalize a team if its style, either in case construction or delivery differs from that which he personally prefers.

2. A decision should be based on:

a. Skill in analysis. This includes not only the analysis of the proposition, but also analysis of the debate as it progresses.

b. Use of evidence. This includes the use of sufficient evidence and proper reference to source.

c. Validity of argument. This includes reasoning and conclusions drawn from the evidence presented.

d. Adequacy of rebuttal. This includes both the defense of the case presented and the attack of the opponent's case.

e. Clarity of organization. This includes clear outlining of constructive arguments and easily followed handling of refutations.

f. Effectiveness of delivery. This includes all matters pertaining to oral presentation with special emphasis upon extempore abilities.

3. A team should be penalized for:

a. An unfair interpretation. If the interpretation is disputed by the negative. It shall rest with the judge whether or not the affirmative is supporting a tenable position.

b. Discourtesy toward opponents. Discourtesy should be penalized according to the seriousness of the offense.

c. Falsification of evidence. If a team falsifies evidence in support of a point, they shall lose the point, and if the falsification is obviously deliberate the judge shall impose an additional penalty according to the seriousness of the falsification.

d. Misconstruing an opponents argument. A speaker who misconstrues an argument unintentionally should not be penalized more than the time wasted. If it is intentional, the team shall in addition forfeit the argument.

c. Introducing new arguments into rebuttal. The judge shall disregard new arguments introduced in rebuttal; this does not exclude the introduction of new evidence in support of points already advanced or answering of arguments introduced by opponents.

f. Speaking overtime. When a speaker's time is up, the judge shall disregard anything beyond a closing statement.

I. Fees for debate shall be \$3.00.

One-Act Plays

A. Time limit—30 minutes.

B. Contest shall be held in either the light and humorous play or the serious and dramatic type. Those shall be alternated each year with the light and humorous play to be presented in 1949.

C. The characters shall not be less than three.

D. If there is a royalty this must be paid by the school presenting the play.

E. Only standard properties are to be furnished. Unusual properties must be provided by the school presenting the play. All plays are to be presented before a cyclorama or a standard set.

F. Judging standards:

1. Acting included such elements as diction, characterization, memory, contrast, ensemble, tempo, motivation, and connection.

2. Staging includes such items as stage business, makeup and costume.

3. The play includes such points as the suitability for high school people and suitability to the particular cast.

H. Ratings shall be:

Superior - 1

Excellent - 2

Very Good - 3

Good - 4

Fair - 5.

I. The same rating may be given to more than one play.

J. The play receiving the highest rating of Excellent or better shall be entered in the final contest.

K. The entry fee for this contest shall be \$2.50.

Interpretative Readings

A. Serious, humorous, oration, and verse.

1. Time limit:

Serious, humorous, and oration - 10 minutes.

Verse - 5 minutes.

2. Selections shall be chosen by the schools entered, unless the state committee announced a group of selections from which choices must be made. These shall have literary merit.

3. All selections shall be memorized.

4. Judging standards:

Adaptation of selection to speaker.

Appreciation of thought.

Appreciation of emotional content.

Simplicity and direction of presentation.

Voice, enunciation, pronunciation, articulation.

Bodily expression and general appearance.

Projection to audience.

5. Ratings shall be:

- Superior - 1.
- Excellent - 2.
- Very Good - 3.
- Good - 4.
- Fair - 5.

If more than one judge is used, the average rating shall be determined by use of numerical ratings.

6. More than one contestant may receive the same rating.

7. Selections earning the highest rating of Excellent or better shall be entered in the final contest.

8. Entry fees shall be 50c per reading.

Extempore Speaking

A. Time limit - 8 minutes (maximum).

B. Topics for the Extempore Speaking event shall be drawn from current topics of state, national, and international importance. No set list of magazine topics will be used. However, the following magazines are recommended as good background material to facilitate a contestant's preparation for this event: **Reader's Digest, Time, Newsweek, New Republic, Scholastic, American Observer, United States News, Life, Atlantic, Harper's.** Study of these publications should be limited to issues published between September 1 of the school year and the contest.

C. One hour before the time for his appearance in the contest, each contestant shall draw three topics from a list which has been prepared in advance. Having selected the topic on which he desires to speak, the contestant shall return the other two topics. These drawings shall be made at eight-minute intervals with speakers appearing in the same order for their speeches one hour later. Regardless of the amount of time consumed by previous speakers, each contestant shall be given one full hour of time for preparation.

D. After a contestant has selected his topic he shall not receive any advice or information from anyone. However, notes, references, or magazines may be used. The hour of preparation shall be spent in meditation on the subject, organizing and preparing of brief outline or notes which, if used, shall be presented to the judge at the completion of his speech. These notes may be used during the speech without disqualifying the speaker.

E. Before beginning to speak, each contestant shall be required to state verbatim the topic upon which he is to speak. In the state final contest a contestant may not use the same topic as in the preliminary round.

F. A timekeeper shall be time cards indicate time elapsed at minute intervals.

G. Judging standards:

1. Strict adherence to the precise statement of the topic he has drawn, and severely discounted for shifting to some other phase of the topic on which he might prefer to speak.
2. Well-chosen information relative to subject.
3. Organization of the material into some logical plan.
4. Effective delivery, including mechanics of speech, poise, quality and use of voice, bodily expressiveness, directness, and ability to enlist and hold interest of audience.

H. Ratings shall be:

- Superior - 1.
- Excellent - 2.
- Very Good - 3.
- Good - 4.
- Fair - 5.

I. More than one contestant may receive the same rating.

J. Speakers receiving the highest ratings of Excellent or better shall be entered in the final contest.

K. The state advisory committee shall select a list of twenty topics from which the selection shall be made by the participants. The same list of topics shall be used for district and final events. The list of topics will appear in the **February newsletter of the Secretary of the High School League.**

L. Entry fees shall be 50c per person.
