FOREWORD

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is pleased to present the 42nd Annual Handbook which contains a historical and statistical account of the year's operation.

Attention is called to certain trends and developments that are apparent over the year. Special attention is directed to certain events that have special significance to member schools.

- 1. The trend toward the reorganization and annexation of school districts is slowly decreasing the number of high schools in operation in the state. Membership in the Association dropped from 313 to 309 this past year. Five high schools closed this past year and one new school, Fargo, North, was added to the membership list. This trend has slowed down considerably, with only a total decrease in membership of 19 over the past three years compared to a loss of 22 in one year four years ago.
- 2. A special set of by-laws pertaining to junior high and 7th and 8th grade interscholastic athletic competition which will go into effect this coming school year was adopted by the general assembly at the annual meeting last October.
- 3. Interscholastic athletic programs for girls were inaugurated in track, tennis and golf this past year. The track program met with a very enthusiastic response, with approximately one-third of the member schools taking part in spite of extremely adverse weather conditions this spring.
- 4. The first Association-sponsored state high school hockey tournament was held in February. This sport appears to be "catching on" as each year a few more high schools (particularly in the eastern part of the state) are adding hockey to their list of interscholastic sports. Interest appears to be developing also in other outdoor winter sports, with curling and skiing being possible future additions to the winter program.
- 5. A significant step in the development of the Association was the employment of a specialist in the field of athletics as an assistant to the executive secretary. The program of training and registration of officials and the uniform interpretation of playing rules was greatly improved by concentrating this in the hands of one man in the office. It is hoped that sometime in the future a specialist in the fields of music and speech might also be added to the staff.
- 6. This past year baseball and track were added to the list of sports for which rules interpretation clinics are held by the Association for coaches and officials. Present plans call for the addition of hockey to this list next year.

- 7. A new system for the classification of officials was adopted this past year, and a separate directory of officials is being published this summer listing the classification of all registered officials in the various sports.
- 8. For the first time in history, district and regional basketball tournaments had to be postponed and rescheduled because of weather conditions. Because of the severe March blizzard, tourney receipts decreased sharply from a year ago, resulting in a loss of approximately \$12,500.00 to the Association. Such an experience emphasizes the wisdom of your Board of Directors in building up a small financial reserve to take care of emergencies such as this.
- 9. The A. B. F. continues to grow in number of children covered and in the amount paid out for claims. A complete audited report of this year's operation may be found elsewhere in this publication.
- 10. Past history has shown that fees for ABF coverage have had to be revised every two years to keep pace with the rising number of claims and increased medical costs; however, the rate schedule adopted in 1964 will remain in effect next year and possibly the year thereafter.
- 11. Title I has also had an effect on this office. Many schools added Headstart, Basic Skills, Physical Fitness or other similar summer programs to their curriculum this past year. Most of these schools desired ABF protection for these students and so the Board of Directors enlarged the program to offer such protection during the summer months.
- 12. The employment of an assistant secretary has made it possible to personally contact most of you out in the field. We hope that this has been as profitable for you as it has been for us. Although we cannot visit each school every year, we hope to be able to do so at least every other year.

As the books are closed for the year, we are mindful of the excellent cooperation given this office by the many school administrators, coaches and others who have given willingly of their time and talents in order that the Association program could be accomplished. I, personally, have enjoyed working this past year as your executive secretary and would like to express my sincere appreciation to the school administrators, athletic coaches and speech and music directors for your patience and understanding during this my first year in the position. I hope that as time goes on an improvement will be noted in services rendered.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting Valley City - August 20, 1965

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Valley City, North Dakota, on August 20, 1965, with all members present.

The reading of the minutes of the previous session was waived as each Board member has been presented with a copy of these minutes.

The first order of business was the examination of the audit report submitted by R. B. Ludvigson, Certified Public Accountant of Valley City. Upon motion by Maxwell and seconded by Cummings, it was agreed to accept this audit report.

The Board next examined the complete financial report of the Association from July 1, 1965, to August 18, 1965.

Bids for supplying basketballs for the 1966 district, regional and state tournaments were opened and it was found that the bid of Gerrell's of Devils Lake for \$12.93 per ball, F. O. B. Devils Lake, for the Wilson B1200 Jet Officials basketball was low. It was moved by Cummings, seconded by Peterson and carried to accept this bid.

The secretary reported on a communication received from L. R. Marti, Athletic Director at U. N. D. to the effect that it would not be possible to hold the Northeast Class A Regional basketball tournament at the University Fieldhouse on the dates selected should the University be host to the regional collegiate basketball play-offs. It was moved by Peterson and seconded by Johnston that the Northeast Class A regional tournament be held at Grafton. Motion carried. The abovementioned communication also stated that the rental fee for the field-house for the 1966 Class A State basketball tournament would be increased to \$750.00. After some discussion it was moved by Solberg and seconded by Kolbo to accept the \$750.00 figure. Motion carried.

The next order of business was the adoption of the 1965-1966 budget which is as follows:

James Maxwell, in behalf of the hockey committee, next presented the following recommendations governing hockey as an Association sponsored sport:

HOCKEY REGULATIONS

A. Game Rules

Except as modified by the Association, the National Collegiate Athletic Association Rules — High School Section — shall be the official rules for all inter-scholastic contests in which Association members participate.

B. Season

- 1. Practice may begin on the second Monday in November.
- 2. Hockey season will terminate at the end of February.
- No school shall engage in any hockey game, practice, training, instruction, or other hockey activity between the close of one season and the opening of the next season.
- 4. Students who have been members of an A or B squad shall not participate in any hockey games, practice, training, instruction, or other hockey activities organized or supervised by schools, students, individuals, or groups between seasons.

C. Practice Sessions and First Game

Two weeks of organized practice shall precede the first game except that when Thanksgiving falls in the second week of the organized practice, a game may be scheduled and played on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving.

D. Games

- Number allowed. Member schools shall not schedule or play more than eighteen (18) games, exclusive of Association sponsored tournament play.
- 2. Holiday Tournaments. Member schools may participate in one four team tournament.

HOCKEY RULES

The NCAA Official Ice Hockey Guide rules govern all inter-school hockey play in North Dakota, except as modified herewith:

Modification of Rule 12, Section 2

A defending player may body check an attacking player only when the defending player has both skates entirely behind the blue line of his defensive zone.

Periods

15 minutes, intermission 10 minutes, overtime period 5 minutes.

Overtime limitation for State Tournament Play:

In case of a tie at the end of regular play follow procedure out-

- 1. Teams remain in the bench area.
- 2. 5 minute rest period; 5 minute sudden death overtime period.
- 3. Continue procedure outlined in 1 and 2, except there will be an 8 minute rest period.
- 4. Change goals for each overtime period.
- 5. Icing rules, whistle blows as soon as puck crosses the goal line.

No team shall be required to play two games on any given day.

16 players which includes 2 goal tenders who must be dressed.

It was moved by Cummings and seconded by Spiss to adopt the above regulations and policies as being effective with the 1966-1967 school term. Motion carried. August Spiss moved that the Association sponsor a state hockey tournament this school year at the University of North Dakota on February 17, 18, 19, 1966. The motion was seconded by Kolbo and carried,

The secretary next reported that the University of North Dakota had agreed to conduct the combination Class A and B district track meet this year under the same terms as the past year, but that they would not be able to do so in future years for less than \$150.00

Mr. Grande presented the following recommendations as outlined by the track advisory committee:

TRACK RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Recommended that in both Class A and Class B district track meets only the first and second place winners qualify for the state track meet - this will include the relay events. There will be no contestants qualifying by minimum standards in the district meets.
- 2. Increase the number of team trophies for the state cross-country meet from 1 to 3. (1st, 2nd and 3rd place feam trophy)
- 3. Commend the meet management for an excellent state track meet last spring.
- 4. The track committee will study and report to the Board their recommendation on the number of long-distance races a competitor should run.

Some feeling was expressed that the recommended standard as suggested for the shot-put was to high. The track committee was instructed to make further study on this and action was tabled on minimum standards pending a supplementary report to be presented at the October meeting of the Board.

It was moved by Spiss, seconded by Larson and carried that the recommendations relative to awarding first, second and third place team trophies at the State Cross Country meet be adopted.

The secretary reported that the date as set for the State Cross Country meet would conflict with the week-end reserved for state-wide church activities because of the state N. D. E. A. convention being scheduled a week later than last year. It was moved by Cummings, seconded by Maxwell and carried that the date for the State Cross Country meet be changed to October 16th if possible.

Mr. Grande next reported on a survey he had made relative to girls athletic programs in other states and plans relative to exploring interest in North Dakota for an interscholastic girls athletic program.

M, F. Peterson moved that the Board submit the name of Earl Abrahamson to the National Federation for consideration for a Citation Awarded by the Executive Committee of that organization. The motion was seconded by Solberg and carried.

Some time was spent discussing plans for the banquet to be held in honor of Earl Abrahamson in Bismarck on September 10th. Mr. Spiss was authorized to make reservations for 350 plates for this banquet.

Mr. Kolbo next presented the following recommended changes in the proposed junior high by-laws as prepared by the junior-high committee.

Article III - Section I Reword to read: "Competition is limited to seventh, eighth and ninth grades except as hereinafter provided. Public and private elementary schools not accredited or organized as junior high schools must be members of the N. D. H. S. A. A. and abide by these junior high school rules in order to participate in the program"

Article III - Section Ii Reword to read: "Elementary schools in school districts not operating a high school, having seventh and eighth grade teams must join the Association in order to play seventh and eighth and/or junior high school teams of member schools by paying the regular membership fee of twenty cents (20c) per pupil in grades seven and eight with a minimum fee of ten dollars (\$10.00)"

Article III - Section IV Add in parenthesis: "This section not applicable to schools whose total enrollment in grades seven and eight does not exceed fifty"

Article V - Section 3a and 3b Add in parenthesis: "This section not applicable to schools whose total enrollment in grades seven and eight does not exceed fifty"

Article V - Section 4b Reword to read: "Each junior high school team is permitted to participate in one invitational tourney in addition to regular season games"

The above recommendations were approved by the Board and the secretary was instructed to send a copy of the revised proposed by-laws to each member school in time to permit a vote on same at the annual meeting in October.

Some time was spent discussing TV policies in connection with state and regional basketball tournaments. It was moved by Solberg that the right to televise these tournaments be let out on bids; without stipulating a minimum fee as in previous years, with the Board reserving the right to reject any and all bids. The motion was seconded by Spiss and carried.

The Board next listened to recommendations of the Officials Committee and upon motion by Larson and second by Kolbo the following officials were to be tendered contracts for the 1965-1966 tournament series:

MINUTES

Board of Directors meeting Minot, North Dakota — October 20, 21, 1965

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Minot at the Holiday Spot Motel on October 20th at 3:00 p.m. with all members present except M. F. Peterson.

Each Board member was presented with a packet containing the agenda for the meeting, a financial report of all business transacted from July 1 to October 15, 1965, and results of a survey which had been conducted relative to a girls athletic program.

The Board spent some time reviewing the financial report and upon motion the report was accepted.

Supt, Fay Connell of Gladstone appeared before the Board requesting approval to use a senior college student from Dickinson State College as basketball coach during the current season. Upon examination of facts involved, the Board felt that the Gladstone school had exhausted all resources in attempting to secure a certified teacher-coach and so upon motion by Solberg and second by Kolbo the request was granted.

Some time was spent reviewing details relative to basketball tournaments. Discussion followed relative to present meal allowance for Class A and B regional tournaments. It was moved by Kolbo and seconded by Cummings and carried that this allowance be increased from the present \$20.00 per day to \$35.00 per day.

The secretary next reported that Oak Grove School of Fargo had reported that the enrollment in their school had dropped below 200 for the current school year. The Board ruled that since this was the case their application for Class A status for the 1967-1968 school year would be null and void, and that the school would have to re-apply should they so desire when and if their enrollment reached 200 again.

The next order of business was the opening of bids for televising 1966 basketball tournaments. The following bids were received:

- N. D. Broadcasting Company for the State Class A tournament at Grand Forks — \$2,500,00 for a minimum of five games (two Thursday night, two Friday night and final game Saturday night) plus \$400.00 per game for any afternoon games the station elects to televise.
- Station KXMC-TV of Minot for the Northwest Class A region at Minot, \$810.00.
- Station KXMB-TV of Bismarck for the Southwest Class A Region at Mandan, \$810.00.

It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Cummings that the above bids be accepted and that the secretary submit contracts to the successful bidders. Carried. Mr. Don Kolbo reported that Station KXMC-TV of Minot had made a verbal offer of \$1,100.00 for exclusive television rights for all games, or \$500.00 per session for television rights for the State Class B basketball tournament at Minot. After some discussion, it was moved by Kolbo and seconded by Spiss that the executive secretary be authorized to issue a contract to KXMC-TV on these terms upon receipt of such offer in writing. Motion carried.

Supt. E. S. Killie of Fessenden reported on behalf of the track advisory committee the following recommended changes for the 1966 track season:

- Only first and second place winners in all events including relays in both Class A and Class B district track meets qualify for the State Track Meet. Contestants in district meets can no longer qualify by meeting minimum standards. Qualifying by minimum standards restricted to sanctioned invitational meets.
- 2. An individual may participate in only two distance running events of 440 yards or more, including the mile relay.

Mr. Grande reported on a survey conducted among the schools of the state relative to girls athletics. In lieu of the interest shown in a track program for girls, it was moved by McCrea and seconded by Kolbo that the office set up four district meets on May 13th as qualifying meets for a state track meet. Motion carried. The secretary reported that notification had been received from Minot that they would be unable to run the girls state track meet on May 28th. Upon motion by McCrea and second by Kolbo the date for same was changed to May 20th.

Consideration was next given to petitions from Parshall, Powers Lake and Columbus for transfer from Music District IX to District VIII. Upon motion by Kolbo and second by McCrea these petitions were approved.

The executive secretary next reported the recommendation of the four regional Class A chairmen that a survey be conducted by the Association office of all Class A schools as to their wishes relative to holding a State Class A Music Festival next spring. It was moved by Spiss, seconded by Cummings and carried that such a survey be made.

Wayne Sanstead, debate coach at Minot High School, was named to represent the Association at the N. U. E. A. Committee on Debate and Discussion meeting in New York, December 28-30, 1965. Cummings moved that in the future office personnel be sent as delegate certain years, but that debate coaches should nominate a representative each year for consideration, with final selection of delegate or delegates to be made by the Board of Directors. Seconded by Johnston and carried.

The next order of business was the selection of a delegate to represent the Association at the National Football Rules meeting in Phoenix, January 6-8, 1966. It was moved by Larson that the assistant to the secretary be named as official delegate, and that Floyd Boschee of Rugby also be named to attend since he was the alternate a year ago, and that hereafter only the assistant to the secretary be named. The motion was seconded by Kolbo and carried.

F. U. Smith was authorized to attend the annual meeting of the executive secretaries at Phoenix, January 6-8, 1966.

Discussion followed relative to the advisability of setting dates and sites for next years regional and state events at an earlier time than the customary June meeting. Upon motion by Larson and second by Spiss such action was placed on the calendar for the March meeting of the Board.

Some time was spent reviewing the program for the annual meeting and the revisions to the proposed junior high by-laws to be voted upon by the general assembly.

Discussion followed relative to the opposition of Class B schools in permitting Class A schools to participate in the state baseball tournament play-offs. It was moved by Larson and seconded by Solberg that the baseball tournaments be limited to Class B schools effective with the 1966-67 school term. Carried.

The Board next considered the advisability of splitting the State Cross-country meet into an A and B division. Solberg moved that such be done starting with the 1966-67 season, seconded by McCrea and carried.

It was moved by Solberg and seconded by Kolbo that an AP story be released by the secretary relative to the actions of the Board at the close of the meeting. Discussion followed as to whether the minutes of the Board should be read to the general assembly. It was moved by Larson and seconded by Johnston that this not be done, but rather a summary of actions taken be published in the next issue of the Bulletin. Motion carried.

The next meeting of the Board was set for 2:00 P. M., January 30th at the G. P. Hotel in Bismarck.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting Bismarck — January 30, 1966

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at the Grand Pacific Hotel in Bismarck on January 30 with all members present except Lewis Johnston. Each member was presented with a packet containing the agenda, a complete financial report of the years business to January 27, 1966, a list of checks drawn on the general fund since the last meeting, a National Federation survey of administrative expenses of individual state associations, and a proposed revised constitution and rating system as recommended by the Officials Association. The Board spent some time examining the financial report and, upon motion, the report was duly accepted.

The canvassing committee consisting of members Solberg, Larson and Peterson reported that they had canvassed the annual election results and found them to be as follows:

Minard McCrea, August Spiss, Donald Kolbo, and N. W. Cummings were declared as elected members of the Board effective July 1, 1966.

The executive secretary reported on the results of the Class A music survey which indicated that although the majority of the Class A schools were in favor of a state music festival, less than ½ of the schools would attend if a separate Class A festival were held. John Strohm, president of the North Dakota Music Educators Association, presented the following recommendations of the NDMEA to the Board.

- That a combined State Class A and Class B music festival be held at Jamestown as in past years.
- That Class A participants in the state festival pay an entry fee of \$1.00 for each solo and \$3.00 for each ensemble.
- That all existing rules and regulations in the present NDHSAA Music and Speech Handbook be strictly enforced at both district and state level for both Class A and Class B schools.

It was moved by Spiss and seconded by McCrea to adopt the above recommendations. Motion carried.

Supt. James Slocum of Minot appeared before the Board relative to the ruling made by the Board at the October meeting that the state high school baseball tourney would be open only to Class B schools effective in the spring of 1967. He indicated that Minot would like to continue in the tournament play-offs if possible and if not whether some alternative tournament plan could be devised. President Maxwell appointed Donald Kolbo, Minard McCrea and N. W. Cummings as a committee to study the situation and to make a report relative thereto at the March meeting of the Board.

Supt. Mack of Halliday appeared before the Board relative to the eligibility status of Alvin Hall who had transferred from Mandaree to Halliday. It was the opinion of the Board that the letters of guardianship presented naming Almont Kisse as guardian did not satisfy the requirement of the rules relative to legal adoption or court orders which would grant immediate eligibility. The Board ruled that unless such court orders were presented the boy would be ineligible to represent Halliday in interscholastic activities until the first semester next fall.

The secretary reported that a contract had been entered into with station KXMC-TV for television rights for the State Class B basketball tournament as authorized at the October meeting. Such contract was in the amount of \$1,100.00 for exclusive television rights for the entire tournament or \$500.00 per session if the entire tournament were not televised.

The question of what constitutes a legal basketball scrimmage between schools was discussed. A committee consisting of August Spiss, Chairman, Willard Solberg and Ell Kay Larson was appointed by the chairman to study the question and report at the March meeting. It was moved by Cummings and seconded by Solberg that this committee also study other possible changes in the by-laws of the Association such as the revision of enrollment figures for Class A classification.

The Board next reviewed the applications of Finley for transfer from music district No. 3 to district No. 2 and Colfax from district No. 1 to district No. 2. After some discussion it was moved by Cummings and seconded by Peterson that both applications be denied. Motion carried.

Some time was spent by the Board reviewing basketball tournament regulations. Confirmation was made of the secretarys ruling that play-

off games were to be held in the Southwest Class A region between teams 7 and 10 and teams 8 and 9 by Monday prior to the regional tournament, with such play-off games to be held on the home court of the 7th and 8th place teams.

The following assignments were made for the presentation of trophies at the state and regional basketball tournament.

A report was made by Chairman Maxwell on the State Hockey Tournament. It was decided to allow the Northeast Hockey Conference to run the tournament on the same basis as last year, and that the Association would only sponsor the tournament and would not share in any profits or underwrite any loss. The secretary was instructed to procure suitable trophies bearing the Association seal. Beginning with the 1966-67 season, the Association is to set up a definite expense allowance schedule and will conduct the tournament similarly to those conducted in other Association sponsored sports.

Mr. E. S. Killie, President of the North Dakota School Administrators appeared before the Board relative to the NDHSAA co-sponsoring with the NDASA a physical fitness clinic or clinics this spring. He explained that there was a possibility that the NDAAU would also be a co-sponsor. It was moved by Solberg and seconded by Kolbo that the Association agree to co-sponsor these clinics. Carried.

Mr. Grande reported on the recommendations of the Officials Association as to proposed revisions in their constitution and method of classification of officials. The Chairman appointed a committee consisting of Solberg, Chairman, Spiss and Kolbo to study the recommendations and report at the March meeting.

Mr. Grande next reported on the following recommendations of the Committee of the division of girls sports of the NDHPER relative to the girls track program.

- Pick the first two places from each district meet and anyone meeting the minimum standards in the district only, for the state track meet.

- Consideration of adopting the 880 yard run and javelin for 1967 meet.
- 5. Track teams be run by women wherever possible and follow DGWS standards.
- 6. An instructional clinic by a woman track authority be sponsored by the NDHSAA.
- 7. That the DGWS rule book be the Official Track rule book for girls competition.
- 8. Not include gymnastics in girls program until future, because of lack of qualified coaches and equipment.
- 9. That the Divisions for Girls and Women's Sports of the North Dakota Health Physical Education & Recreation Association be the advisory Board on girls athletics.

Moved by Kolbo and seconded by Cummings to accept the girls track recommendations. Passed.

The policy of conducting Cheerleader Clinics every other year was discussed. Since none were conducted last fall, it was moved by Solberg and seconded by Kolbo that these clinics be scheduled for the fall of 1966.

The secretary reported that since the time applications had been secured from school district for membership in the Association, many, new districts had been formed because of reorganization and in most cases no new applications had been filed by these reorganized districts. It was moved by McCrea that all schools be asked to re-apply for membership to bring the membership list up to date. The motion was seconded by Peterson and carried.

The secretary reported that French Lick, Indiana, had been selected as the site for the 1966 meeting of the National Federation and Honolulu, Hawaii, as the 1967 site. Action as to attendance and selection of delegates was deferred to the next meeting of the Board.

Interpretations on some meanings of wrestling rules and situations were discussed. It was moved by Larson and seconded by Cummings that the wrestling coaches be asked for their recommendations on these interpretations at their next meeting.

August Spiss brought up the subject of wrestling weight control. It was decided that the control of weight is a local problem. No action was taken.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting

Holiday Spot Motel - Minot - March 18, 19, 1966

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at Minot, North Dakota, on March 18, 19, 1966, with all members present. Mimeographed copies of the minutes of the January meeting which had been previously mailed to the Board were approved.

The Board next examined the financial report showing a list of all expenditures and income of the General Fund and the Accident Benefit Fund up to March 15, 1966. This financial report was carefully examined and accepted.

Discussion followed relative to additional expense allowances to be awarded teams marooned at the Class A regional tournament sites because of blizzard condition. It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Cummings that each team be paid \$100.00 per day for each extra day over and above the regular days, that they had to remain at the tournament site because of the storm. Motion carried. It was moved by Larson, seconded by Johnston and carried, that such extra expense allowance be charged against each respective tournament involved.

Kolbo moved that officials who were also marooned at the tournament site because of the storm be allowed one extra mileage payment in lieu of one day's per diem for the marooned days. Seconded by Larson and carried.

Discussion next followed on adjustment of the TV fee for the Southwest Class A regional tournament, since this tournament was not carried to conclusion. Upon motion by Spiss and second by Peterson it was agreed to reduce the contract fee by 25%.

The Board next reviewed the appeal by Oak Grove High School as to the ruling by the Executive-Secretary regarding the eligibility status of a student who planned on enrolling there next fall and whose parents are missionaries in New Guinea. It was moved by Cummings and seconded by McCrea that the decision that the boy would be ineligible for 18 weeks was upheld. Motion carried.

Mr. Spiss reported in behalf of the committee on revision of by-laws relative to recommendations pertaining to basketball scrimmages. Chairman Maxwell requested that the committee draw up a proposed by-law covering same to submit to the Board for approval at the June meeting. The committee also recommended that the present compulsory figure of 250 for Class A classification be changed to 300 and that the elective group be amended to include those schools between 200 and 299. It was moved by Spiss and seconded by McCrea that the Board approve this recommendation and that an amendment to the bylaws to this effect be submitted to a vote of the Assembly at the next annual meeting. Motion carried.

Willard Solberg, chairman of the committee appointed at the last meeting to study the recommendations presented by the Officials Association, moved the adoption of the following recommendations:

- 1. All officials must be registered with the NDHSAA by August 1st, and that a booklet be published at this time and furnished all schools listing all officials in good standing for the current year. Those officials whose names appear in the publication will be eligible for the entire year. However, those who do not attend a rules clinic or take the required written tests, or in some other way fail to live up to the requirements of the NDOA during the current year, are not to be allowed to register and officiate the following year.
- 2. Following the August first deadline for registering for all sports, any official renewing his registration will be charged the late registration fee. All new officials or transfers from out-of-state will not be assessed the late registration fee.
- 3. All officials are to be required to take the rules examination each year in the sports for which they are registered, providing such test is part of the requirement for officiating such sport.
- 4. A registered official who works a game for a North Dakota High School with an undegistered official will not be permitted to register or officiate the following year. The unregistered official will also not be permitted to register or officiate the next year.
- 5. Beginning with the 1966-67 hockey season, all hockey officials must register with the NDHSAA.
- 6. Any official asking for more or less than the Association recommended fees will not be allowed to register to officiate the following season. Schools are asked to pay officials according to the recommended rates and not deviate from such schedule.

- 7. Officials who ignored the 1965-66 recommendations of the Officials Association should not be considered when selecting officials for the regional and state tournaments for the 1966-67 season.
 - 8. Signed officials contract forms are to be used by all schools.
- The Secretary of the NDHSAA or his assistant, is vested with the authority to make arrangements necessary to deal with problems brought on by extenuating circumstances.
- 10. A new classification system for officials and a revised officials constitution as presented by the Officials Association be adopted and effective July 1, 1966.

The motion was seconded by Spiss and adopted.

The Secretary reported on a communication received from Mr. Killie to the effect that word had been received from the President's Council on Physical Fitness of the impossibility of conducting a physical fitness clinic in North Dakota this spring.

The Board next considered recommendations submitted by the hockey coaches relative to next years hockey program. The following rules and regulations were added to those adopted at the August meeting:

- 1. Number of players permitted was increased from 16 as adopted in August to 17, consisting of 3 full lines and 2 goalies.
- 2. Expense allowance set at \$50.00 per day plus 50c per one-way mile for tournament teams.
- Full consolation round to be played with first, second and third place and consolation trophies to be awarded at the state tournament.
- Recommended officiating schedule: \$15.00 per game plus \$5.00 for preliminary games for regular season play; \$25.00 per game for state tournament.
- 5. Hockey rule clinic to be scheduled at Grand Forks on the Saturday preceding the opening of the practice season.

It was also recommended by the hockey coaches that the 1967 tournament be scheduled at the new Grand Forks Arena on the same corresponding date as this year. No action was taken on this recommendation pending further investigation by the Board.

Walt Sherman, temporary state chairman of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, explained their program to the Board and requested permission for publication of a guest article on same in the Bulletin. Action on same was tabled pending further study.

Recommendations of the wrestling coaches were next presented by Mr. Grande. The following actions were taken:

- Opening date for 1966-67 wrestling season practice set for October 24, 1966. Final state tournament scheduled for February 24, 25, 1967.
- Changed North Dakota rule to conform with National Rules relative to weight classes. This will permit a 180 pound wrestler to compete as a heavy weight.

It was moved by McCrea and seconded by Cummings that we adhere to the national rules as closely as possible. Motion carried.

Don Kolbo next presented the following recommendations of the committee appointed to study the baseball situation:

- 1. That only Class B schools be permitted to participate in the State Tournament in 1967.
- A separate state tournament be sponsored for Class A schools in 1967 providing a minimum of 4 entries are received by March 1, 1967.

Following motion by Kolbo and second by Cummings the above recommendations were adopted.

Mr. Grande reported on the dates and sites for baseball and track clinics scheduled this spring.

The executive-secretary reported that Mr. Tyler or Mr. Shields of the National Cheerleaders Association would be available for the conducting of cheerleaders clinics the week of October 3-6, 1966. Since the Board had previously approved this project, no action was necessary.

It was moved by Cummings and seconded by Kolbo that the calendar project be continued next year. Motion carried.

The Board next took under consideration a request from the Kathryn High School that permission be granted to use Miss Marge Jacobson, a senior music major at Valley City State College, as music instructor and to enter district competition under such arrangement. It was moved by Spiss and seconded by McCrea that approval for same be granted providing a regular qulaified faculty member be in charge of the group. Motion carried.

Mr. Grande reported on recommendations made by the state debate coaches. The executive-secretary was instructed to contact Samuel French Productions as to the possibility of reduced royalty rates on certain productions for one-act play festivals so that the smaller schools might be thereby enabled to select better plays for the one-act play festival.

The executive-secretary reported that Mr. Lawrence Hanson had notified the office that he no longer would be able to continue as manager of the State Class A tournament because of his new position. It was moved by M. F. Peterson and seconded by Larson that the secretary issue a life-time State Association pass to Mr. Hanson in recognition of his many years of faithful service, along with a letter of appreciation. Motion carried.

The Board was advised that the trophy contracts expire this year and the following committee was appointed by the President to screen trophies at the June meeting of the Board: N. W. Cummings, Chairman, Minard McCrea; August Spiss. This committee was designated to meet at 7:00 p. m. on June 16th with companies displaying trophies and submit their recommendations to the entire Board.

The Board next selected June 17th as the date of their next meeting, such meeting to begin at 9:00 a.m. with all committee meetings scheduled for the previous day.

Delegates to the Summer Federation Meeting at French Lick were next named and members Peterson, Johnston and Solberg were authorized to attend this meeting along with the Executive Secretary. Solberg was designated as the official voting delegate at the meeting.

The Board next proceeded to organize itself for the 1966-67 fiscal year. James Maxwell and Don Kolbo were renamed as president and vice-president respectively.

The Board then recessed until 9:00 a.m. the next morning to consider the resignation effective as of July 1st submitted by Assistant Secretary Sid Grande. After some discussion it was moved by Spiss to accept this resignation and that the executive-secretary and the Board officers be authorized to terminate employment prior to such time if necessary upon two weeks notice. The motion was seended by Larson and carried. It was requested that Mr. Grande announce his resignation immediately so that a call for applicants could be made right away. The secretary was instructed to list qualifications for the position similar to those set up a year ago and to set the closing date for applications at April 15th. A screening committee consisting of the president, vice-president and executive secretary was named to screen applications, narrowing the field to five candidates to be recommended to the Board as a whole.

The Board agreed to raise the salary of the executive-secretary \$500,00 per year effective July 1st. Action on other office personnel was deferred until June meeting.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Peterson that the same admission be charged for the girls state track meet as for the boys meet. Motion carried.

Discussion followed relative to a request that a Class B track coach be named to the track advisory committee. It was moved by McCrea that this committee consist of a Class A track coach, a Class B track and a superintendent. Seconded by Cummings and carried. Wiley Wilson, Coach at Minot Model, was appointed to the committee to replace Ernle Gates of Jamestown who had retired from the coaching field.

The Board next took under consideration a request from the Southwest Class A Region that the Class A basketball play-off games be considered a part of the tournament and be played at the tournament site. It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Solberg that each Class A Region be permitted to decide the play-off set-up in their own region. Motion carried

The committee on by-laws revisions presented recommendations for the amendment of certain by-laws as follows:

Article II, Section I — Class A Schools:

- a. This group shall consist of all member high schools with a total enrollment of 300 or over, and/or an enrollment of 150 or more pupils in an all male school in grades 9-12, inclusive as of October 1, 1967, plus any member high school that elects to choose Class A as provided in paragraph (b), (c), and (d) herewith.
- b. Any high school with a total enrollment between 199 and 299 in grades 9-12, inclusive on October 1, 1967, may elect to join Class A for interscholastic competition by written notice to the Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association before January 1, 1968.
- c. After classes are established on January 1, 1968, a member school having a total enrollment of more than 199 and less than 300 in grades 9-12 inclusive must give two years notice to the Board of Directors to change its classification. Such choice must be made not later than September 1st of any year and shall become effective with the opening of the fall term two years later. Schools that elect to become Class a schools must remain in that classification for a minimum of three years before they may again apply for reclassification. Provided further, when the total high school enrollment in grades 9-12 drops below 300, and/or the enrollment in an all male school in grades 9-12 drops below 150, that school shall have one year of grace in which to choose its class of competition.

Should an A school drop below 200 in enrollment in grades 9-12 and continue below 200 for two consecutive years, this school must be reclassified as a B school. Should a school rise above 299 in enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive and continue above that figure for two consecutive years, this school must be classified as an A school.

d. Should a new high school be established in an existing district or area, whose enrollment in grades 9-12, inclusive, exceeds 299, the two year waiting period stated in paragraph (c) above shall be waived and the school shall be immediately classified as an A school.

Article XII, Section 1

g. Scrimmages held after the permissible starting date shall be counted contests.

Article XII, Section 2

h. A basketball jamboree and/or scrimmage with another school shall be counted as one game.

It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Peterson that the committee report be adopted and that the above amendments be presented for a vote of the General Assembly at the annual meeting in October. Motion carried. The Chairman instructed the committee to study Article XIII, Section 1, for proposed amending to bring such by-law up to date in harmony with the recommendations of the State Department of Public Instruction and to report on same at the August meeting of the Board.

Discussion followed relative to modifying the interpretation of major officials as defined in Article X, Section 1, of the by-laws to bring same into conformity with the new system for classification of officials. It was mived by McCrea and seconded by Solberg that hockey officials and the head linesman in football be added to the list of major officials required to register, as well as both basketball referees and the base umpires in baseball. Motion carried.

The secretary next reported on recommendations presented by the speech and music advisory committees. It was moved by Peterson and seconded by Spiss that the recommendation be adopted requesting the Association office to hold clinics for district speech and music committees and district contest managers so as to obtain more uniform practices throughout the state. Motion carried. The secretary was also instructed to contact the state music contest manager relative to tuning of pianos prior to the state meet.

Discussion followed relative to TV and radio policies in connection with the broadcasting and televising of state contests. Don Kolbo and F. U. Smith were named as a committee to present recommendations as to changes in present policies at the August meeting of the Board.

Consideration was next given to the question as to whether mileage allowances should be granted to both schools when contestants from two schools travel together to state events for which provision is made for a mileage allowance. It was the decision of the Board that both schools should be entitled to such allowance providing a faculty representative from each school accompanied the group.

The secretary reported that several schools had sent contestants to some state tournaments, particularly the golf tournaments, without an accompanying faculty representative. As such practice is in violation of the Association by-laws, the secretary was instructed to call this matter to the attention of the member schools and to instruct managers to the effect that contestants in such cases should not be permitted to take part in the contest.

The secretary next reported on the proposed amendment to be voted on at the annual meeting of the National Federation in June, which would remove the necessity of Federation sanction for interstate contests involving more than two schools if the individual states asso-

ciations involved approved such event. Willard Solberg, the official voting delegate, was instructed by the Board to vote against this amendment. Delegates to the Federation meeting were also instructed to contact possible speakers for the annual meeting of the state association in October.

The Board next took under consideration the adoption of a sick leave policy relative to employees. It was moved by Peterson and seconded by Spiss that a policy providing for 10 days sick leave per year, accumulative to 30 days be adopted and effective as of July 1, 1966. Motion carried.

The Board next considered a request by District 13 for the re-assignment of Balta to some other basketball district. The chairman appointed Larson and Kolbo as a committee to investigate the feasibility of same and requested that this committee submit a recommendation thereto at the August meeting.

Discussion followed on problems in several districts relative to seeding procedure in basketball tournament play. The secretary was instructed to contact district committees relative to using an equitable plan for seeding purposes.

Some time was spent studying the Class B music district alignment. It was the feeling of the Board that District VIII at Minot had become too large and that a new district should be created centering around Mohall. It was moved by Peterson and seconded by Cummings that this be done and that the secretary draw up boundary lines for the two districts. Motion carried.

A proposal which had been submitted by the North Dakota Coaches Association to the Class A schools outlining a plan for football champion-play-offs was read. The matter was tabled until the August meeting when results of the poll of the administrators might be available.

Mr. Kolbo informed the group that Mr. Sid Bjorlie had accepted a new assignment at Minot State College and so would no longer be available as manager of the State Class B Basketball tournament. The secretary was instructed to write a letter of appreciation to Mr. Bjorlie for his many years of service and to present him with a life-time pass for Association sponsored activities.

The Board next authorized the purchase of a new office desk and chair for the assistant secretary.

Discussion followed relative to salaries for the office staff next year. It was the opinion of the Board that the maximum figure had been reached for the bookkeepers position under present conditions. A \$25.00 per month increase in salary was voted for Mrs. Ethel Thvedt, office secretary, effective July 1st. The executive secretary was authorized to employ additional part-time secretarial help as needed. It was moved by Spiss that Earl Abrahamson be retained on a consultant basis at an annual salary of \$1,500.00 per year paid in 12 equal installments of \$125.00 per month and to work at such times as needed as determined by the executive secretary. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

After reviewing the practices common in other states, the Board established the travel allowance for Association business at 10c per mile effective July 1st.

As there appeared to be no other new business, the Board selected August 11th at 1:00 p.m. and August 12th as the dates for their final summer meeting, with committee meetings scheduled for the morning of August 11th.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Reclassification of officials was discussed and a new plan based on 100 points for basketball and wrestling officials and 85 points for football was discussed. It was moved by Herb Parker and seconded by Orville Iwen to present this recommended classification to the officials annual meeting on Saturday. Passed.

An earlier sign-up date for all officials was next discussed. It was moved by Bill Galloway, Jr., and seconded by Herb Parker, that all officials be required to sign up by August 1st, 1966; all renewals not registering by that date would be charged late registration fee, but all new men and transfer from other states could register without the late registration fee; also that a published booklet be sent to all schools and officials with the names of these men in it. The motion was passed.

It was moved by Orville Iwen and seconded by Bill Galloway that officials not attending a clinic and/or not taking the rule exam should not be allowed to sign up the following year rather than being declared ineligible for the remaining part of the current season. Passed.

Motion moved by Herb Parker and seconded by Orville Iwen that all officials recommended to work state sponsored tourneys be at least an approved official. Passed,

Other business was discussed but not acted upon pending the officials annual meeting on Saturday.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

The other two officials would then be assigned the afternoon consolation game and the first evening third-fourth place game and the total fees would be the same for all four officials.
- b. Track starters be paid regular officials wages and they be required to register as officials, take the test and attend a clinic.

November 13, 1965 - Valley City State College Fieldhouse

President Ed Agre called the meeting of the North Dakota Officials Association to order with 27 members present. Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. The treasurer's report was distibuted and it was moved by Jim McCord and seconded by Robert Frost that this report be accepted. Passed.

The question of an earlier sign-up for all officials was discussed. It was moved by Jim McCord and seconded by Bill Frost that all officials must be registered with the NDHSAA by August 1st; that a booklet be published containing names of officials registered with the Association and this booklet be sent to all schools and officials registered. The motion was passed.

A motion was made by Paul Gravel, and seconded by Jim McCord, that any unregistered official working a game for a North Dakota High School, as well as the man who worked with him, be suspended for the remainder of the current year plus not being allowed to sign up with the NDOA the following year. This motion was passed.

It was moved by Orville Iwen that all hockey officials must be registered with the DHSAA starting the 1966-67 season. Seconded by Ray Albrecht and carried.

Robert Frost moved the adoption of the new classification system for officials and asked that the NDHSAA do what is possible to force the schools to rate the officials at the end of the season. Seconded by Bill Frost and carried. The new classification method is outlined on page 50.

Motion was made by Paul Gravel and seconded by Ray Albrecht that after August 1st all renewals with the NDHSAA will pay the late registration fee, but all new men and transfers will not have to pay the late fee. Carried.

Jack Brown made the motion, seconded by Bill Bachmeier, that all officials be required to take the rule examination each year, and the secretary be instructed to make any arrangements necessary with an official in case circumstances beyond his control kept him from taking the exam.

The motion was made by Paul Gravel and seconded by Bill Bachmeier to adopt the revised Constitution and By-Laws as outlined on the following page. Carried

Owen Wallace moved that the recommendation be sent to the North Dakota High School Activities Association that their Constitution be changed to read that all officials hired for a football game must be registered with the NDOA. Seconded by Galloway and passed.

Jack Brown moved that officials asking more, or less, than recommended fees not be allowed to register the following year. Seconded by Gravel and passed. It was also recommended to the NDHSAA that all schools pay up to recommended rates and that officials must not ask for more or less than the recommended rates.

Moved by Jack Brown and seconded by Bill Frost and passed, that track starters be required to register with the NDHSAA starting the 1966-1967 season.

Nominations were in order for a representative in the Southeast to take the position vacated by Sid Grande when he accepted a position

with the NDHSAA. Jack Brown of Jamestown was nominated. In the Southwest Eddle Agre of Bismarck was nominated to succeed himself. Being no nominations from the floor it was moved that a unanimous ballot be cast for these two men. The motion was passed.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

NORTH DAKOTA OFFICIALS ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - Name

The name of the organization shall be the North Dakota Officials Association.

ARTICLE II - Objects

The object of this association shall be to further the best interest of athletics.

- 1. By aiding the officials, coaches and players in acquiring a thorough knowledge of the playing rules of the various sports.
- 2. By promoting uniformity in the mechanics of officiating.
- By encouraging observance of the spirit and letter of playing rules and ethical codes in all occasions,
- 4. To obtain due recognition to the art of officiating by the public and school officials.
- 5. To secure recognition for the training and experience of the officials of the state.

ARTICLE III - Membership

- **Section I** Any man of good character desiring to qualify as an official may present his application to the secretary with the necessary fee.
- Section II Any official failing to meet the requirements provided in the by-laws will cease to be a member.
- Section III The membership year shall be from August 1 to July 31.

ARTICLE IV - Management

Section 1 — Executive Committee

 The operation and management of the Association shall be vested in the Executive Committee which shall be composed of five men.

N. D. HIGH SCHOOL ACTIVITIES ASSOCIATION

- The Executive Committee shall be responsible for the execution
 of the mandates of the membership and for the general direction of the policies and activities of the Association and shall
 represent the organization in the activities undertaken in the
 cooperation with other athletic organizations.
- 3. In the event a member of the Board of Directors can not be present at any meeting of the Board, he is authorized to appoint a proxy from his district to serve in his place.

Section 2 - Mode of Election

- The election of the Executive Committee shall be at the annual business meeting to be held at the Valley City Coaches Clinic in November.
- The state shall be divided into four districts and one executive committee member shall be elected from each district and one at large.
- 3. Nominations for Executive Committee members shall be made by the districts and voted upon by the membership at large. The majority of the votes cast by those present shall prevail.
- 4. Districts shall be determined by counties as follows:
 - District 1: Southeast Kidder, Stutsman, Foster, Griggs, Steele, Traill, Cass, Barnes, Richland, Ransom, Sargent, Dickey, LaMoure, Logan, McIntosh.
 - District 2: Northeast Grand Forks, Pembina, Walsh, Cavalier, Ramsey, Towner, Rolette, Pierce, Benson, Nelson, Eddy, Wells.
 - District 3: Southwest Emmons, Burleigh, Morton, Oliver, Mercer, McLean, Dunn, Billings, Golden Valley, Stark, Slope, Bowman, Hettinger, Adams, Grant, Sioux,
 - District 4: Northwest Divide, Burke, Williams, Renville, Mountrail, Ward, McHenry, Bottineau, McKenzie, Sheridan.

Section 3 - Term

 The term of each member of the Executive Committee shall be for two years and they shall take office at the next meeting following their election. Districts one and three shall select their members in the odd years and districts two and four and director-at-large in the even years.

Section 4 -

 The Executive Committee shall immediately after election meet and select one of their number to serve as president and one to serve as vice-president.

- In case of vacancy created by removal from the district, nonmembership or resignation, the remaining members of the Executive Committee shall fill the unexpired term of such member by appointment.
- 3. Three members of the Executive Committee shall be considered a quorum and the majority vote of those present shall prevail.

Section 5 -

The secretary of the North Dakota High School Activities Association, or his assistant, shall serve as secretary of the Association.

ARTICLE V - Amendments

- Section I Amendments to the constitution and by-laws of this organization as adopted may be made:
 - By a majority vote of those present at any regularly called meeting of the Association.
 - By a majority vote of those voting in the event of the mailing of the ballots to the members of the Association.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Minot, North Dakota - October 21, 1965

The annual meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held in the City Auditorium in Minot on October 21, 1965, with a large delegation present for an address by Halsey Hall, famed radio and TV commentator of WCCO, Minneapolis, on the subject "Philosophy, Humor and Oddities in Athletics".

Following this address the meeting recessed for a few minutes and reassembled for the general business meeting at 3:15 P. M.

It was moved by Thompson of Elgin and seconded by Hanson of Grand Forks that inasmuch as all members had copies of the minutes of the last meeting in the Annual Handbook, the reading of these minutes be waived. The motion carried.

The report of the nominating committee consisting of Superintendents Vernon Eberly, John Sunderland, Henry Sausker and James Broton was presented by Chairman Eberly, submitting the following names for the respective vacancies: for Class A, August Spiss; Class B, Donald Kolbo; director-at-large, Nate Cummings; to succeed themselves and Minard McCrea to complete the unexpired portion of Joel Davy's term as a Class A director, and moved the acceptance of the report. Nominations were then called from the floor. As no nominations were offered, Elmer Johnson of Kenmare second the motion to accept the report of the nominating committee. Carried.

President Maxwell called on Donald Kolbo, Chairman of the Junior High By-laws committee, to present the proposed by-laws as revised pertaining to this group. Bart Thompson of Elgin moved to amend Section 10, Article III, to read as follows:

"A ninth grade student shall not be eligible to compete in the junior high division on or after the day on which the sixteenth anniversary of his birth date occurs; a seventh or eighth grader on or after the day of his fifteenth birthday". The motion was seconded by Gene Halvorson of Wishek and carried.

The chair then called for a roll call vote on the original motion as

amended and a tabulation of same found 86 schools voting in favor of the motion and 16 opposed. The motion was declared passed.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
