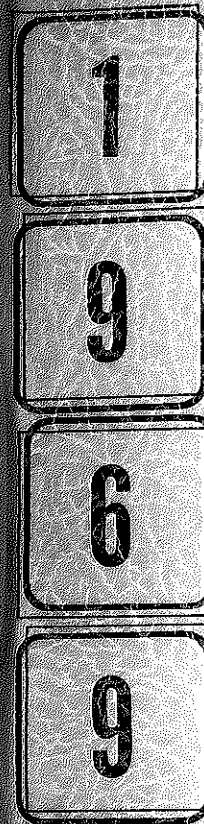


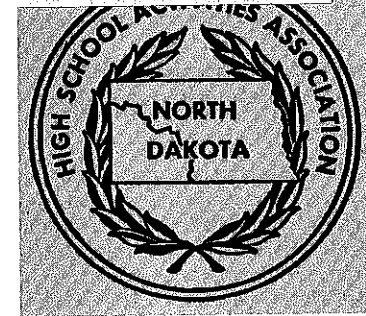
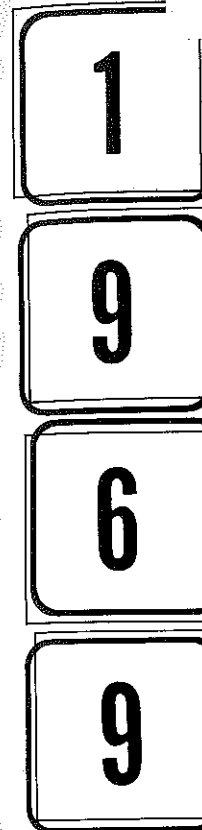

FOREWORD

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is pleased to present the 45th Annual Handbook which contains a historical and statistical account of the year's operation.

Attention is called to certain trends and developments that are apparent over the year. Special attention is called to certain events that have special significance to member schools.

1. The trend toward the reorganization and annexation of school districts is slowly decreasing the number of high schools in operation in the state. Increased financial costs of operation has also resulted in the closing of several parochial high schools. Membership in the Association dropped from 298 to 288 this past year. The loss of 10 member schools represents the greatest decline in membership in any one single year since 1963. Total membership this past year was 87 less than that of 10 years ago — a decrease of 23.2%.

2. An amendment to the Constitution was passed, providing for a representative of the North Dakota Secondary School Principals' Association on the NDHSAA Board of Directors.

3. Several amendments to the by-laws, which became effective on July 1, 1969, were also passed by the membership at the annual meeting. The limitation on the value of awards was increased from \$5.00 to \$10.00. Restrictions on basketball participation by individual students were changed from a game basis to a quarter basis, and the rule requiring invitational basketball tournaments to end on a Saturday was modified to permit ending on a day not followed by a school day. The Board of Directors was also given power to rule on the eligibility status of students in so-called "hardship" cases.

4. Receipts from the state basketball tournaments again broke all previous records; however, because of adverse weather conditions, receipts from the regional tournaments fell off considerably from a year ago, resulting in a slight over-all decrease from the record-breaking year of 1968.

5. Basketball and hockey remain as the only two activities sponsored by the Association which are self-supporting. All other sports and activity programs are subsidized from income realized from these two sources.

6. Interest in interscholastic athletic programs for girls continues to grow, with increased participation in track, tennis and golf. Gymnastics (which was added to the list of girls' sports this past year) was well received and undoubtedly will continue to grow in popularity.

7. Participation in music and speech activities continues to increase but the cost of conducting festivals has also risen to the point where increased entry fees might be necessary in order to finance these events on the district level.

8. A and B divisions were established in wrestling this past year, with separate sites for regional tournaments. State tournaments for each division were run simultaneously at a common site.

9. The number of children covered under the ABF program this past year, and the number of claims paid, showed a slight decrease from the previous year but the total amount paid out in claims and the average cost per claim were greater due to the increasing costs of medical care.

10. A series of four cheerleader clinics was conducted in the fall of 1968. These clinics remain very popular as nearly 1,400 cheerleaders attended the sessions.

11. Several improvements were made in the Association office this past year, including the remodeling of the interior quarters, paving of the parking lot, and the acquisition of a sensimatic accounting machine in the ABF department.

12. The addition of new programs and the increased work connected with the operation of the ABF program necessitated an increase in staff personnel. A second assistant was employed as of July 1, 1969 and it is hoped that with this additional help greater and more efficient services can be rendered for member schools.

In general, this has been another successful year, with more than usual progress. Again, we are mindful of the valued help and assistance given by many school people and others interested in the Association program. The Board of Directors and the office personnel express appreciation for the whole-hearted cooperation of each of you in making this another banner year.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

Valley City, North Dakota — August 15-16 1968

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Valley City, North Dakota, on August 15th and 16th, with all members present except Warner Quale.

The reading of the minutes of the previous session was waived as each Board member had been presented with a copy of these minutes.

Coach Dean Hove of Lignite appeared before the Board in regard to an alleged violation of Association rules in track last spring. Don Kolbo, who had been sent to Lignite to investigate the charges, reviewed the case for the Board members. He reported that the Lignite relay team had been short one man and had used a boy from Columbus in a track meet at Westhope, and that one boy on the Lignite team had participated without having had a current physical examination. Coach Hove admitted that the violations had occurred and explained that the place won by his relay team had not been counted and that the ribbons won had been given to the team finishing next to them, as had been agreed upon prior to the running of the race. He also stated that he did not realize the seriousness of the matter at the time nor the possible consequences which might result from such action. It was moved by Spiss that since there had been no willfull attempt to violate Association rules that the President and Secretary send a letter to Mr. Hove stressing the importance of coaches being familiar with the rules and regulations, and that a copy of same also be sent to the Lignite school administrator and the manager of the track meet at Westhope. Seconded by Cummings and carried.

The next order of business was a presentation of the audit report for the 1967-68 fiscal year by R. B. Ludvigson, Certified Public Accountant of Valley City. Upon motion by Cummings and second by Spiss, the audit was accepted as reported. Mr. Ludvigson also recommended that the reserve for contingency and reserve for future ABF claim funds be increased and that an additional reserve for encumbrances fund be established. It was moved by Peterson and seconded by Cummings that the reserve for contingency fund be increased from \$80,000 to \$100,000, the reserve for future ABF claims from \$44,766.40 to \$75,000. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Peterson and seconded by Spiss that the question be tabled until the next day following adoption of the budget. Motion carried.

Mr. Ludvigson next discussed the value of a long form report as a supplement to the short form certificate audit including comments on internal controls and records or supplementary 'management letters' which would be of help to the directors in outlining the scope of the services of the Association and providing a profile of the activities and responsibilities of each staff member. It was moved by Muckenhirn to table action on such proposal until such time that a greater need is felt for same. Seconded by Larson and carried. Peterson moved that a letter be sent to Mr. Ludvigson commending him for his fine report and his concern for the affairs of the Association. Seconded by Larson and carried.

The Board next examined the complete financial report of the operation of the Association from July 1, 1968, to August 12, 1968. It was moved by Kolbo and seconded by Broton to approve the financial report. Motion carried.

Bids for supplying basketballs for the 1969 district, regional, and state tournament were opened, and it was found that the bid of the G. P. Sporting Goods of Bismarck for \$15.44 per ball F. O. B. Bismarck for the Wilson Jet B1200 official basketball was low. It was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by Broton to accept this bid. Motion carried.

The secretary next reported that the cost of a Watts telephone line for the office would amount to \$170.00 per month for 10 hours talking time to points within the state of North Dakota. As this figure was considerably higher than the amount currently being paid for long distance calls, the Board decided against installing such service.

The Board next took under consideration an estimate of \$450.00 submitted by the Tenefos Construction Co. for stabilizing and blacktopping the Association parking lot. It was moved by Larson and seconded by Peterson to proceed with the project. Motion carried.

Mr. Larson presented the following recommendations of the building committee relative to the remodeling of the office:

1. Lowering of the ceiling to 9 feet using an egg crate plastic grid type ceiling which would allow light and air-conditioning circulation.
2. Partitioning south end of office for a board meeting room.
3. Paneling of walls.
4. Carpeting of floors in Board room and general office area.
5. Converting present lounge area into a storage and work area connecting same to present storage area.

Mr. Maxwell reported that from figures received it was estimated that the cost for same might run approximately \$8,000. It was moved by Broton that the committee proceed with plans for remodeling and that a maximum of \$12,000 be budgeted for the project. Seconded by Cummings and carried.

The next order of business was the adoption of the 1968-69 budget which is as follows:

GRAND TOTAL BUDGETED DISBURSEMENTS

Consideration was next given to the amount of insurance carried on the building and contents. It was moved by Peterson and seconded by Larson that the coverage on the building be increased to \$50,000 and the contents to \$15,000.00.

The Board next took under consideration a report for Larry McLeod, Athletic Director at Moorhead State College, that rental fees for the fieldhouse for the Southeast Class A regional tournament previously scheduled for this site would have to be increased to \$200 per night. The secretary was instructed to check on the availability of the facilities at Valley City State College and North Dakota State University and the rental charges for same and to then confer with representatives of the Southeast Class A schools relative to relocation of the tournament.

The meeting then recessed and was reconvened at 9:00 A.M. on August 16th with all members present except Warner Quale.

The assistant-secretary reported on the progress made to date in securing officials for the 1969 basketball tournaments. Discussion followed on the present method of selection of officials. It was moved by Larson that the regional Officials Association representative meet in Valley City one week before the regular meeting of the Board in June to recommend a list of officials for the regional and state basketball tournaments. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

The Board next reviewed the wrestling and track districts as drawn-up by the office staff and upon motion by Larson and second by Cummings approved same.

The secretary reported that Supt. Gussner had requested that the 1969 Boys State Tennis Meet which had been set for Jamestown be re-located if possible, and that Valley City had put in a bid for same. It was moved by Spiss that the meet be re-set for Valley City. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

A letter from Supt. Solberg of Beulah expressing dissatisfaction with the site selected for the 1969 Boys Sand Greens Golf tournament was read. Discussion followed with the site being left as originally set.

Mr. Kolbo reported that he did not have a copy of the poll taken of schools in Music District No. 8 relative to the question of splitting the district, but would obtain same from the district secretary for the October meeting, since the superintendent of Willow City desired a copy of same.

The question of video-taping of basketball tournament games was next discussed. The assistant-secretary reported that an informal survey relative to regulations pertaining thereto in other states indicated that no problem existed in this area. As no particular problems had arisen in connection therewith, no action was taken concerning same.

Some time was spent discussing plans for the annual meeting relative to possible speakers that might be secured. August Spiss was selected to present the by-law changes to be voted on to the General Assembly. James Broton was delegated to report on the Annual Federation meeting held at Swampscott, Massachusetts. The chairman appointed the following nominating committee and instructed the executive secretary to notify them of such appointment:

Supt. Leon Olson, Williston, Chairman
Supt. J. E. Rindt, New Rockford
Principal Otto Bernhoft, Fargo South

The Board next reviewed the eligibility status of Tim Martin of Hazelton and ruled the boy ineligible for one semester.

The motion for increasing the reserves for the contingency fund and future ABF claims which had been tabled the previous day was brought up for vote and passed. It was moved by Muckenhirn to set aside a reserve fund for encumbrances in the amount of \$25,000. Seconded by Larson and carried.

Discussion followed relative to ABF coverage for students in grades 1-6 who are involved in intra-mural athletic programs after school hours and on Saturdays. It was moved by Spiss to expand the present coverage to cover such activities. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

It was moved by Muckenhirn to purchase a Monroe calculating machine for office use, similar to the demonstrator on trial. Seconded by Larson and carried.

The October meeting of the Board was scheduled for 9:00 A.M. on October 23rd in Grand Forks.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

Grand Forks, North Dakota, October 23, 1968

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Grand Forks at the Holiday Inn Motel on October 23, 1968, at 9:00 A.M. with all members present except M. F. Peterson.

Each Board member was presented with a packet containing the agenda for the meeting and a financial report of all business transacted from July 1 to October 16.

The Board spent some time reviewing the financial report and upon motion the report was accepted.

A special storm-sewer assessment of \$350.22 which had been levied by the City of Valley City, to be paid over a period of 15 years at 5½% interest, was reviewed. It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Cummings that the total assessment be paid off this year. Carried.

The secretary reported that the blacktopping crew which was supposed to blacktop the office parking lot had left Valley City without doing the project. It was moved by Spiss that concrete surfacing be applied if the cost is not too much greater, seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The Board next approved plans outlined by the Building Committee for the remodeling of the office facilities. Proposals and bids for office furniture which had been received were then reviewed. The Building Committee was instructed to seek additional proposals and authorized to proceed with final selection after reviewing all proposals.

Consideration was next given to several eligibility cases. Michael Milde of Beulah was ruled immediately eligible and Mark Norstegaard of Newburg was ruled ineligible for one semester. Final action was delayed on the eligibility status of Keary Riser of Esmond dependent upon ruling from the State Department of Public Instruction relative to whether credits earned at the Western Technical Institute of Denver would be acceptable for high school graduation or not. The secretary was instructed to rule the boy ineligible if such courses were acceptable and eligible if not.

An application for membership in the North Dakota High School Activities Association from the Dickinson Job Corp was next reviewed by the Board. Since the Constitution limits membership to high schools in the state, it was moved by Larson that the application be denied. Seconded by Cummings and carried.

Discussion followed on the number of Cross-country meets and track meets being scheduled by individual schools and whether limitations should be placed on the number of allowable meets per week and per season. The secretary was instructed to survey other states as to policies in effect and to report on same at the January meeting of the Board.

Robert Johnson of the University Division of Continuing Education outlined a proposal for a clinic dealing with the "Medical Aspects of Sports" which they would like to sponsor in cooperation with the ND-HSAA. It was moved by Kolbo and seconded by Quale that the Association co-sponsor such clinic. Motion carried.

Consideration was next given to a request received from several schools for a more complete definition of what constitutes basketball practice so that they would know what actions are permissible and what are not prior to the date set for the opening of basketball practice. After considerable deliberation, the following policy was adopted:

"Any boy who has previously been a member of a sports squad that has engaged in inter-school activities shall be declared ineligible in any one of the several seasonal sports sponsored by the Association which are governed by seasonal regulations, if he takes part in an organized practice or activity outside of the regular season for that sport as defined by the By-laws or Board regulations. If the individual or group performs any of the maneuvers ordinarily associated with the sport, such as shooting baskets, passing a football, putting a shot, etc., such action is to be considered as "practice" if said activity takes place in or on school facilities or non-school facilities used by the school. Any attempt by a school or member of its staff to organize a practice of any students on school or non-school facilities shall also be considered a violation. Individuals who have previously been members of inter-scholastic squads, involved in out-of-season intra-mural programs shall also be covered by the rule."

The Board next reviewed complaints relative to the summer basketball program being conducted in Minot. It was moved by Cummings that Minot school officials be invited to appear at the January meeting of the Board to explain details of the program.

The possibility of violation of the recruiting rule by Minot High School and Minot Ryan of Minot Model students was next considered. It was moved by Broton that the administrators of the two schools involved be asked to appear at the January Board meeting relative to same.

The secretary read a ruling he had sent to the Minneapolis Tribune relative to proposed hockey clinics in the state which were to be sponsored by the Tribune and the North Star Professional Hockey Team. The action of the secretary was upheld by the Board.

The secretary reported on his ruling made relative to the Golden Helmet Award being sponsored by the Jantzen Company in the city of Fargo and the actions taken by Fargo North High School and Fargo South High School as a result thereof. The secretary was instructed to check as to whether any students of any of the other Fargo schools had been recipients of this award and if so what action had been taken by the schools.

Dick Karlgaard appeared before the Board and presented an invitation which he had received to attend a national meeting of athletic directors in Washington, D. C., in January, sponsored by the AAPHER and requested financial assistance for attending same. The Board agreed that they would give such aid for attendance at this meeting or for a delegate to attend the annual AAPHER meeting as they had in the past. It was then moved by Cummings that the Association grant an allowance equivalent to round trip air fare cost for Mr. Karlgaard to attend the meeting in January. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

Mr. Karlgaard also outlined the progress made to date on the construction of the new Civic Auditorium in Bismarck and presented a request on behalf of the City of Bismarck that consideration be given for this facility as a site for future wrestling and basketball tournaments.

Consideration was next given to the matter of participation of high school students on non-school teams in post season cross-country meets. Since the By-law prohibiting participation in post season events makes specific reference only to the sports of football, basketball, and wrestling, it was ruled that there would be no violation of Association rules in the case of post season participation in cross-country meets.

The Board next took under consideration the question as to whether the acceptance of cash awards in rodeo events by high school students would be a violation of the Amateur rule. It was the opinion of the Board that rodeos would not be classified as an athletic event and so would not come under the rule as stated. The executive secretary was requested to contact the National Federation as to the ruling of other states in this matter.

The Board next reviewed the number of school closings in the 1968-69 year and the effect of same on Class B basketball district alignments. The Chairman appointed the 'B' members of the Board as a committee to study same and to present recommendations at the January meeting of the Board.

Don Kolbo reported on the meeting of Music District No. 8 which had been held to determine whether the membership was in favor of continuing as is or dividing into two districts. Since the member schools had voted unanimously to remain as one district, no action was taken relative to dividing the district.

It was moved by Muckenhirn that the Association pay the expenses for a delegate of the Speech Teachers Association to attend the NUEA meeting in Chicago on December 29, 30, 1968. Seconded by Spiss and carried.

Upon motion by Quale and second by Kolbo, attendance of the executive secretary at the Midwest meeting of executive secretaries at Topeka, Kansas, on November 15, was authorized, as well as the attendance of the secretary and assistant at the mid-winter meeting of the National Federation at Atlanta, January 8-10, 1969.

Some time was spent reviewing the program and business to bring before the General Assembly meeting on October 24th.

The executive secretary raised the question as to whether it would be advisable in future years to hold regional meetings throughout the state, shortly after the opening of school, to acquaint new administrators and coaches with Association rules and regulations. The idea was endorsed by the Board and the secretary was instructed to plan such meetings for the fall of 1969.

The next meeting of the Board was set for 9:00 A.M. on Sunday, January 26th, at Bismarck.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 9:00 A. M. at the Grand Pacific Hotel in Bismarck on January 26th with all members present. Each member was presented with a packet containing the agenda, a complete financial report of the years business to January 13th, and a list of checks drawn on the general fund since the last meeting. The Board spent some time examining the financial report and, upon motion, the report was duly accepted.

The canvassing committee consisting of members Maxwell, Kolbo, and Cummings, reported that they had canvassed the annual election results and found them to be as follows:

G. F. Muckenhirn, August L. Spiss, H. L. McLain, and A. A. Engelhardt were declared as elected members of the Board effective July 1, 1969.

The Board next reviewed some of the problems in connection with basketball tournaments. After considerable discussion it was moved by Larson and seconded by Broton to ban confetti at Association sponsored basketball tournaments because of the tremendous cleaning job required between sessions and the fire hazard involved, and to prohibit the cutting of nets from the basket following the championship game. Motion carried.

Discussion followed on fees received for telecasting of regional basketball tournaments and it was agreed that minimum charges should be established for the 1970 tournaments. Some time was also spent reviewing admission charges for the state basketball tournament in comparison with practices in neighboring states but no action was taken.

Some time was spent reviewing increased costs in connection with regional and state basketball tournaments and variances in such costs between regions. The chairman appointed members, Muckenhirn, Larson, and Broton as a committee to study the matter and to bring forth recommendations relative thereto at the March meeting of the Board.

Mr. Kolbo next presented a report of the Class B re-districting committee listing proposed changes in district alignments and a recommendation that 2 teams advance from each district to the regional tournament so as to make 8 team regional tournaments. After considerable discussion it was moved by Cummings that consideration of the report be tabled until the March meeting and that the office staff prepare and send maps of the proposed new districts to the individual board members for study prior to said meeting. The motion was seconded by Peterson and carried.

The assistant to the executive secretary next presented a report on the recommendations adopted by the North Dakota Officials Association at their annual meeting in November. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Spiss these recommendations as outlined in the minutes of the annual meeting of the Officials Association were approved.

A report of the building committee was next made by Chairman Maxwell relative to the progress to date on the office remodeling project.

The executive secretary next presented a report on the survey which he had conducted as to limitations in the various states on number of permissible cross country and track meets. Seventeen of the 44 states which responded indicated that they did limit the number of permissible seasonal track and cross country meets. Thirteen limited the number of permissible cross country meets per week, and eleven did likewise in track. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Peterson and seconded by Cummings that the question be referred to the track advisory committee for recommendations.

Mr. Smith reported that information received from the National Federation indicated that about one-half of the states consider the acceptance of cash prizes in rodeo competition as a violation of the amateur rules and one-half do not. After some discussion, the Board voted to continue the present policy of not classifying rodeo competition as a form of athletics.

The question of sanction approval for an invitational girls basketball tournament was next considered. Reference was made to a Board decision in March 1963 stating that girls basketball tournament would not be sanctioned after the 1963 season and a decision in January 1968 stating that sanction approval was necessary for all interscholastic activities involving two or more schools whether such activities were sponsored by the Association or not. Following considerable discussion Larson moved that these regulations be discontinued, and that sanction approval be required only for interscholastic events involving two or more schools in activities which are sponsored by the Association. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The secretary next pointed out that since the travel distance regulation had been removed for out-of-state speech contests, that there no longer was any grounds for denying sanction approval for any such contests and consequently there appeared to be little or no need for requiring applications for sanction approval for speech events. It was then moved by Peterson and seconded by Muckenhirn to remove the sanction approval requirement for activities in this field. Carried.

The next item taken under consideration was the question of girl track clinics. It was decided that these clinics should be conducted by the assistant to the secretary in the future rather than trying to secure women physical education people to conduct these at the different sites.

The question of the advisability of holding an annual Athletic Directors Conference was next considered. It was the opinion of the Board that such would not be necessary since members of this group could attend the regional meetings which are to be held for coaches and new administrators beginning next fall.

A delegation from Minot High School and Minot Ryan appeared before the Board and outlined the summer basketball program as conducted by the Minot Recreation Commission. Discussion followed as to whether any Association regulations might be violated in such a program. The Board agreed to furnish guidelines to the director of the program as to permissible and non-permissible practices concerning high school students involved in inter-scholastic high school athletics. Also under consideration was the question as to whether any violations had occurred relative to the recruitment of former Model High School athletes by these two schools. After hearing testimony relative thereto, the Board was satisfied that irregularities which occurred had been properly corrected prior to the opening of the school term as per instructions from the executive secretary and so no penalties were invoked.

Duane Carlson, Athletic Director of Minot High School, appeared before the Board requesting sanction approval for a football game between Minot High School and the Watertown South Dakota High School on a Friday evening. Since the distance exceeded 600 miles round trip travel and loss of school time was involved, the request was denied; however, the Board agreed that approval would be given if the game could be scheduled on a Saturday night and no loss of school time was involved.

Mr. Kolbo and Mr. Cummings were appointed to serve with Mr. Maxwell on the salary committee to present recommendations as to salaries for office personnel at the March meeting of the Board.

Considerable time was devoted to a discussion of the ABF plan, including present medical charges and the schedule of benefits, prorating of claims, and the possible need for the employment of a claims clerk. Mr. Larson and Mr. Spiss were appointed as a committee to investigate these areas and to present recommendations at the June meeting of the Board.

Named as delegates to the summer meeting of the National Federation were Board members Kolbo, Cummings, Spiss, and Peterson with Kolbo being designated as the official voting delegate. It was moved by Larson that, in future years, one-half of the Board members be sent each year to the summer meetings of the National Federation. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Considerable discussion next centered on the question of eligibility of students who participate in track competition before or after the regular track season. Formulation of definite policies relative thereto were tabled until the March meeting.

The executive officers next presented facts uncovered in an investigation conducted by them of a basketball game held at Sanborn in which the Sanborn coach had been ejected from the gymnasium for protesting officials decisions. Testimony was read which had been given by both officials and the coaches of both teams. It was moved by Cummings that a letter of severe reprimand be sent to the Sanborn coach and also a letter of milder reprimand to the officials who handled the situation. Seconded by Larson and carried.

The date for the March meeting was set for March 14th at Grand Forks and the June meeting for June 12 and 13 at Valley City commencing at 10:00 A.M. on June 12th.

A trophy committee consisting of Kolbo, chairman, Broton, and Muckenhirn was appointed by the president to meet with representatives from the trophy companies at 2:00 P. M. on June 11th. The same group was also named to serve on the Officials Committee the evening of June 11th.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned and the group was taken on a guided tour of the new Bismarck Civic Auditorium by city officials.

Board of Directors Meeting

Grand Forks, North Dakota — March 14, 1969

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at Grand Forks, North Dakota, on March 14, 1969, at 9:00 A. M. with all members present except M. F. Peterson.

Mimeographed copies of the minutes of the January meeting, which had previously been mailed to the Board, were approved.

The Board next examined the financial report showing a list of all expenditures and receipts of the General Fund and the Accident Benefit Fund up to March 10, 1969. The report was carefully examined and accepted.

Jerry Sheldon, Fargo North football coach, appeared before the Board requesting authorization of the use of the helmet during the 3 day conditioning period in football. Following discussion as to the pro and cons concerning same, it was moved by Larson that the use of the helmet be permitted during such period beginning in the fall of 1969, seconded by Cummings and carried.

A report of the progress on the office remodeling project was next reviewed. The secretary also reported that a leak had developed in the roof of the building and that examination of same revealed considerable deterioration of the roofing material. An estimate of the cost of re-roofing was also presented. It was moved by Cummings and seconded by Muckenhirn to replace the old roofing with a new tar and gravel roof. Motion carried.

A communication from the president of the North Dakota Secondary Principals Association naming Del Easton, Principal of the Williston High School, as a representative from their group as a member of the N.D.H.S.A.A. Board of Directors was read.

Taken next under consideration was an ABF claim from Fargo North for treatment of an injury more than a year after the date of injury. It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Cummings that the claim be disallowed. Motion carried.

The secretary next reported that he had received a complaint from Balta that their school had been denied a share of the profits from their district basketball tournament by the district committee. It was moved by Muckenhirn that a representative from the Balta school and the chairman of district 13 be requested to appear in Minot for a meeting with the Board at 9:00 A. M. on March 21st. Seconded by Cummings and carried.

The recommendations of the Wrestling Coaches Association as presented by Mr. Schindler were next reviewed by the Board. It was moved by Cummings to keep the same type of wrestling program at the state tournament as was used this past season with both classes competing at the same site, at the same time, and that regional qualifiers remain the same as in 1969 with the winner and runner-up in each weight class advancing to the state tournament. The motion was seconded by Muckenhirn and carried. Since Roger Erickson of Edgeley had moved into a Class A school, it was moved by Broton that John Sterner of St. Marys of New England be named as the B member of the Wrestling Advisory Committee. Seconded by Quale and carried.

The Board next considered the question as to whether a preliminary contest between high school teams prior to a professional basketball game would be in violation of Association rules. It was the consensus of opinion that there would be no violation of Association rules, and the secretary was authorized to sanction such contests.

Jim Adelson of the North Dakota Broadcasting Company appeared before the Board requesting permission to telecast three additional games of the State Class B tournament over Channels 2, 12, and 13, offering a fee of \$100.00 per game. The Board requested \$150.00 per game, and a compromise figure of \$125.00 per game was eventually agreed upon.

The secretary presented a request by the Speech Committee that the Association assume the expense for a Sweepstakes trophy to be presented to the winning school at the State Student Congress Meet. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the Association provide such a trophy and pay for cost of same. Seconded by Spiss and carried.

A recommendation from the NDMEA that present music awards for district and state contests be continued with the addition of awards for individual contestants in small ensembles receiving number one ratings was next reviewed. It was moved by Spiss that the recommendation be adopted. Seconded by Quale and carried.

The secretary reported that several schools had to travel by round-about routes because of blocked roads to get to the State Wrestling Tournament and requested authorization to allow mileage payments to such schools according to actual miles traveled. Upon motion by Larson and second by Muckenhirn the request was granted.

Mr. Kolbo presented a recommendation of the Class B basketball re-districting committee that the districts alignments for 1969-1970 remain the same as they were in 1968-1969. It was moved by Larson and seconded by Broton to accept the report. Motion carried.

Mr. Muckenhirn presented a comparison of expenses in connection with the 1968 State Class A and Class B basketball tournaments. It was moved by Cummings that the committee make a similar study of the 1969 tournaments and present recommendations in connection therewith at the June meeting of the Board. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

The secretary reported on a request which had been received for the use of three officials in the Southeast Class A regional basketball tourney, and his decision to permit such only in the 3rd and 4th place contest, because he felt that experiments such as this should not be made in elimination tournaments before being tried beforehand. The Board concurred with the decision made by the secretary.

The following guidelines relative to track competition during the school year were adopted by the Board:

1. A student who is a member of the high school team may not be a member of any other team during the season of the sport.
2. An individual student may compete unattached in open meets but cannot compete as a member of any team prior to the opening and after the closing of the high school track season.
3. Distance travel restrictions apply only to a high school team. Participation of an unattached individual in distance meets is a matter to be decided by local school authorities.

The following guidelines relative to student participation in summer athletic programs were adopted:

1. A student may participate as an individual and in a manner that is in no way connected with his school.
2. A student may not wear a school uniform which in any way indicates that he is a student of that school.
3. Schools themselves, as well as coaches, cannot be involved in the students' participation in the activity. This implies that a coach may not work with his high school athletes, and the school may not be involved in any way with finances, transportation, etc.
4. No more than 3 students from any one school who have been on the varsity or B squad the previous school year, and who have not graduated from high school, may participate on the same basketball team in a summer recreational program, nor may the regular high school coach be a coach of a team involving such players from his own school. The same regulations would apply to football and hockey.
5. A student may engage in individual sports such as wrestling, track, and gymnastics, and participate in non-school meets, providing he enters as an individual and is not connected with the school in any way. High school coaches may not instruct students from their own school, if these students were members of the A or B squads the previous school year and have not graduated from high school.
6. School teams are not permitted during the summer in tennis, golf, and baseball; however, students may participate as individuals or as members of non-school teams in these regular summer sports and high school coaches are permitted to coach such teams.

Some time was spent relative to possible speakers that might be secured for the annual Association meeting in October. Mr. Kolbo volunteered to contact Adolph Rupp of Kentucky as to his availability and charges.

Discussion followed as to the advisability of the employment of a claims manager in connection with the ABF department. The secretary was instructed to call for applicants for such a position, listing duties in connection with the position. The ABF committee along with the secretary was instructed to screen the applications received and to make recommendations to the entire Board concerning applicants.

Policies relative to ABF coverage for summer school programs were next reviewed. It was moved by Muckenhirn to continue the present rate of \$1.00 per student and to expand the coverage to include interscholastic competition in sports such as softball, and supervised swimming instruction but not open, or free swimming activities. Seconded by Larson and carried.

The Board next took under consideration the advisability of continuing publication of the membership directory as there appeared to be considerable duplication with the directory published by Roger Peet. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Spiss, it was decided to continue publication of the Association directory.

Two incidents concerning the Trenton School were received by the Board, one concerning the withdrawal of the basketball team from the floor by the coach before the completion of a game played at McGregor, and the other involving the disregarding of denial of sanction approval for dates requested for an invitational basketball tournament. It was moved by Spiss that Mr. Getz of Trenton be requested to appear before the Board for a hearing at a meeting to be held in Minot at 4:30 P. M. on March 21st. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Some time was spent discussing policies to be followed relative to expense allowances for Board members and former Board members who are requested to present trophies at Association sponsored tournaments. The following policies were established:

- (1) Mileage and meal allowance to be made to those members who have been selected for presentation of awards if they have to travel to the tournament for such purpose.
- (2) payment of all expenses of Board members who have been assigned to attend a tourney for purposes of observation, evaluation, and study.

Discussion followed on problems developing because of the number of radio stations requesting privilege of broadcasting state basketball tournament games. Some feeling was expressed that possibly it might be necessary in the future to eliminate stations carrying only a few games, requiring them to take a feed from other stations. No definite action was taken on the matter at this time.

A review of regional basketball tournament program booklets revealed that in many cases no reference was made to the fact that these tournaments were

sponsored by the NDHSAA. The executive secretary was instructed to inform the tournament committees and managers in the future that this should be done as well as listing current members of the Board of Directors.

A request by Russ Smith of Minot for permission to present the Sportwriters and Sportcasters awards for the outstanding college and high school athlete of the year at the Class B tourney in Minot was denied.

Next under consideration were the salaries of the executive officers and upon motion it was agreed that the annual salary of the executive secretary should be increased \$1,000 and the assistant to the secretary \$800 effective July 1st.

The Board next proceeded to organize itself for the 1969-1970 fiscal year. James Maxwell was re-elected as president and Eli Kay Larson was named as vice-president to succeed Don Kolbo who will be retiring from the Board on July 1st.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting

Minot, North Dakota — March 21, 1969

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 9:00 A. M. at the Holiday Spot Motel in Minot on March 21st with all members present except M. F. Peterson and A. Spiss.

The first order of business was a hearing concerning a complaint by Supt. DeSchneau of Balta that their school had been denied a share of the district basketball tournament profits by the district committee. Supt. Herbel of Rock Lake, Chairman of District 13, testified that their district rules stipulated that each team must play a minimum of 4 season games with district members in order to share in tournament profits and that Balta had not played the required number of games. He also stated that Balta had played only one game in the tournament and it was the feeling of the other schools that Balta did not add anything to the tourney in the way of gate receipts. Supt. DeSchneau explained that because Balta had been shifted from one district to another in recent years that they found it difficult, if not impossible to schedule games, that they had tried but had been unsuccessful in scheduling four games this past year with district members. The Board, although recognizing that individual districts have control over their own affairs, felt that Balta had been discriminated against, and should have been allowed a share of the tournament profits. It was their feeling that the district members had not acted in a sportsmanlike manner, and so recommended to Mr. Herbel that the district re-consider its action and allow Balta their due share.

The Board then recessed until 4:30 P. M. and re-assembled at that time to consider the Trenton case. Leary Getz, principal of the Trenton school, appeared before the Board to present their side of the story in connection with alleged violations of rules. The first case involved the removal of the Trenton basketball team from the floor at McGregor before the end of the game. Mr. Getz stated that he had done this as a protest to the officials who had disqualified one of his players. He felt the officials were not justified in removing the boy and that as a result of this action he only had 4 players left due to earlier disqualification of players because of 5 fouls. The team was removed from the floor with 10 seconds of the game remaining with the score 46 to 42 in favor of McGregor. Supt. Robinson of McGregor also gave his account of the game in question.

The executive secretary next reported the facts concerning the violation of the sanction rule. Mr. Getz had submitted an application for sanction approval for an invitational basketball tournament at Trenton on March 5, 6, 7. Sanction approval had been denied because the tournament was not scheduled to end on a Saturday as provided in the by-laws. A new application was then submitted scheduling the tournament on March 6, 7, 8, and sanction approval was given for same. However, the tournament was set-up on the original dates and a newspaper story concerning this was mailed to the secretary by a member school after the tournament had been in progress one day. A telephone call to the superintendent of the Trenton school verified the newspaper story, and the superintendent was then advised of possible penalties if they continued the tournament on said schedule. A subsequent call from the superintendent was received informing the Association office that the tournament was being re-scheduled for March 5, 7, 8, to comply with the regulations. The Chairman of the Board then questioned Mr. Getz as to why he had proceeded with holding the tournament on the original dates after sanction approval had been denied. His reply indicated that he did not feel that the regulations applied to a 'B' squad tourney and that it was not important. Chairman Maxwell explained to Mr. Getz the importance of abiding by the rules of the Association. The Board then went into executive session and upon motion by Larson and second by Cummings, the Trenton school was placed on probation for the balance of the school year and for the school year 1969-1970.

The decision relative to denial of the request of the Sportswriter and Broadcasters Association for permission to present their annual awards for the college and high school athletes of the year at the State Class B tournament was brought up for review. After some discussion, it was moved by Kolbo and seconded by Cummings that the action taken on March 14th be rescinded and permission be granted for such presentation immediately prior to the opening game on Friday night. Motion carried.

A request from Clifford-Galesburg for transfer from basketball District 6 to District 5 effective September 1, 1969, was next presented. It was moved by Broton that said petition be approved, seconded by Kolbo and carried. N. W. Cummings moved that Balta be transferred from District 13 to District 21 since most of their season games are played against schools in this district. Seconded by Quale and carried.

The Board next reviewed the actions taken and opinions expressed at the district chairmen's meeting held earlier in the day. In line with a recommendation adopted at said meeting, a meeting of the Class B representatives on the Boards of Directors was scheduled for 7:00 P. M. on April 11th at the Association office to work out a major realignment of schools by districts for presentation to the membership.

As there appeared to be no other business, the Board adjourned after selecting June 12th and 13th as the dates for their next meeting, commencing at 10:00 A. M. on June 12th. The trophy committee meeting was set for 2:00 P. M. on July 11th and the officials committee meeting for 7:00 P. M. on the same date.

The next order of business was a report of the trophy committee (Kolbo, Muckenhirn, and Broton) who had examined trophies from the Josten Company, Balfour Company, Allard Trophy Company and the Main Line Trophy Company. It was moved by Kolbo and seconded by Cummings to approve the recommendations of the trophy committee for selection of the following trophies. Motion carried.

Next taken under consideration was a violation of track rules by Langdon High School in permitting a student to take part in five different events in an invitational track meet earlier this spring. The penalty levied by the Association office at the time was loss of eligibility for said student for the remainder of the season, and said decision had been subsequently appealed for Board review. The request for appeal was granted with instructions that any awards or honors won by this student at the district or state meet were to be held in abeyance by the superintendent. After a complete reviewing of the case, it was moved by Cummings that the penalty set by the executive officers be upheld and that any awards won by the student be returned. Seconded by Larson and carried. The executive secretary was instructed to send a letter of reprimand to the Langdon coach for permitting said violation. Copies of same to be sent to the superintendent and the Board of Education.

Representatives from Grand Forks and Bismarck appeared before the Board extending invitations to host the 1970 Class A basketball tournament. Action on same was deferred until the next day when tournament sites for all activities were to be selected.

Three ABF claims were next taken under review. The claim for Roger Schulz of Fargo North which had previously been denied at the March meeting of the Board was again reviewed at the request of the parent. It was duly moved, seconded, and passed that the action taken previously be upheld. The claim for a knee operation in December of 1968 for Marc Messmer of Grand Forks due to an alleged injury in football in 1967 was denied upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Spiss. A motion by Muckenhirn to allow the claim for a knee operation for Patrick Stockert of Bismarck Junior College (since the boy had been under constant treatment since the date of injury) was approved.

The executive secretary next outlined a plan submitted by the National Federation for the observance of interscholastic football's centennial year this fall. It was moved by Larson and seconded by Muckenhirn that North Dakota endorse the program and authorize participation by member schools in same. Motion carried.

Supt. G. A. Tooley of Lisbon appeared before the Board relative to the disallowance by the referee of a state track record in the Class A high hurdles because of wind. It was moved by Broton and seconded by Peterson that the decision made by the track officials be upheld. Motion carried.

Mr. Leo Froehlich of Jamestown College next presented a report of the State Music and Speech Festival held at Jamestown and extended an invitation to host the event again in 1970.

Some time was spent in reviewing school closings since the March meeting of the Board when Class B basketball district alignments for 1969-70 had been set by the Board. It was evident from same that further adjustments would be necessary before the opening of schools next fall, but action was delayed on same until the August meeting when a more complete picture of the situation would be available. Larson, Broton, Engelhardt, and McLean were appointed as a committee to present recommendations relative to further re-alignments. Letters of protest from Stanton and District 28 relative to the assignment of Stanton under the proposed 1970-71 redistricting proposal were also read, as well as a protest from Northwood as to their assignment. No action was taken at this time.

Eil Kay Larson next presented a report on the meeting of the Class B district chairmen held at Minot in March and the Board took under advisement the recommendations of this group. Larson moved that 40 selected seats be made available for each of the 8 participating teams at the state B tournament plus 64 select seats for the district chairmen and that the cost for two seats be billed to each district by the NDHSAA office when billing for trophies, balls, etc. Seconded by Peterson and carried. Larson also moved that a play-off game be held for 7th and 8th place at the state tournament. The motion was seconded by Broton but failed to pass.

Discussion followed relative to ABF coverage for girls interscholastic basketball. It was moved by Larson that separate coverage for same be made available for those schools desiring such. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Next under consideration was a request by the hockey coaches to set season limits in hockey to correspond with the basketball season. It was moved by Larson that the starting date be changed to correspond with the basketball date with the season ending with the state tournament as previously set. Seconded by Spiss and carried.

Muckenhirn next moved that the Association obtain membership in the Greater North Dakota Association, seconded by Quale and carried.

The Board next considered a request to run girls tennis and golf as fall sports instead of in the spring as at present. It was moved by Muckenhirn that this be done effective with the 1970-71 school year, seconded by Larson and carried.

Discussion followed relative to TV policies concerning regional basketball tournaments and radio broadcast of state tournaments. The chairman appointed Broton to the TV committee replacing Kolbo whose term expires July 1st, and instructed the committee to submit recommendations at the August meeting.

Next under consideration was a request from the Class A schools operating separate junior high schools that regulations be modified to permit a 16 year old junior high boy to compete on senior high school teams if otherwise eligible. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the request be granted, seconded by Larson and carried.

The Board then recessed and reconvened at 9:00 A. M. Friday, June 13th with all members present.

Supt. Tooley of Lisbon again appeared before the Board with a video tape of the State Class A high hurdle race, and pointed out that the anemometer had not been firmly placed four feet off the track, and requested that the Board reconsider its action of the previous day. It was moved by Quale that the matter be brought up again for reconsideration, seconded by Kolbo and carried. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Larson and seconded by Peterson that the action taken on Friday be sustained. The motion carried 6 to 2 on a roll call vote.

Supt. Stepina next appeared before the Board requesting that the Region VII Class B basketball tournament be held at Garrison in 1970. Action was temporarily deferred until the time when the sites for all events were to be set.

A request from Class B Music district VII that district entry fees for music and speech for 1969-70 be increased was next presented to the Board. Since other districts did not appear to be having problems under the present fee structure, it was felt that this district could assess member schools for additional revenue if needed and upon motion by Muckenhirn and seconded by Cummings no change was made in the present fee structure.

Discussion followed concerning expenses for host schools in running Association sponsored track meets, golf tournaments, etc. It was moved by Spiss that a financial summary of the various events be prepared for the August meeting and that action be deferred relative to this problem until the August meeting. Seconded by Larson and carried.

The advisability of holding regional tournaments in the sand greens golf tournament because of the increasing number of participants was next taken under consideration. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the Class B redistricting committee study the problem and develop a plan for two regional meets for consideration at the August meeting. Seconded by Spiss and carried.

Recommendations submitted by the Northwest, Southwest, and Southeast Class A regions were next reviewed.

Olaf Ringerud of Carrington, Chairman of the Music Advisory Committee, and Mr. Lucht of Linton presented the following recommendations for changes relative to the 1969-70 music program:

1. Drop the requirement of memorization for instrumental soloists at the district and state festivals.
2. "Stageband" be included as an instrumental ensemble in district competition with the following 'guidelines' (this does not infer any limitations on number or instrumentation).
 - a. standard instrumentation: four trumpets, four trombones, five saxes (two altos, two tenors, and one baritone), and four rhythms (piano, guitar, string bass and/or tuba, and drums).

- b. that there be no doubling of parts (exception: tuba/string bass)
- c. that stagebands not be permitted to use vocal soloists or vocal groups for district competition.
- d. that they perform literature commonly known as "stageband literature".

It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Broton that the above recommendations be approved. Motion carried.

The Board next reviewed the following recommendations of the girls Gymnastic Advisory Committee and upon motion by Spiss and second by Larson adopted same.

1. Season to start on October 27th.
2. State meet to be held on February 27, 28, starting at 1:00 P. M. on the 27th.
3. Limit each school to 6 entrants in each event and each division plus all-around competitors at the state meet.
4. Drop the special events (tumbling and trampoline) at the state meet.
5. The team championship shall be determined by adding the 3 highest scores from each team in each of the 4 events (compulsory and optional) plus points awarded to each team for places won on a 6-5-4-3-2-1 basis.

Upon motion by Peterson and second by Quale the following recommendations submitted by the Wrestling Advisory Committee were adopted:

1. The state wrestling tournament to be a three day event beginning with the Class B division on Thursday at 1:00 P. M. with semi-final on Thursday night. Class A division to begin on Friday at 1:00 P. M. with semi-finals at 6:00 P. M. to be followed by the Class B matches for 3rd and 4th place and Class B finals. The Class A 3rd and 4th place matches to be held at 6:30 P. M. on Saturday and finals at 8:00 P. M. The same plan to be used in 1970-1971 except that the Class A group would begin on Thursday and finish on Friday with the Class B matches being scheduled on Friday and Saturday.
2. The form used for rating wrestling officials be revised so as to be similar to the football and basketball form.
3. Mat judges not be used during the state wrestling tournament, but permission for use of same in connection with invitational tournaments be allowed for experimentation purposes providing application is made to the NDHSAA office prior to the tourney.

The report of the Boys Track Advisory Committee was next reviewed. Upon motion by Cummings and second by Peterson the following recommendations were approved:

1. Revise the first days schedule at the State Meet to be as follows:

2. In the 100 yard dash, run semifinals if more than 16 boys are qualified for the state meet. If 16 or less qualifiers, run 2 heats and take 4 from each heat. In the 220, high hurdles, low hurdles, 440, 440 relay and 880 relay, if 2 heats are run, pick 4 from each heat, but if 3 heats are run, pick 2 from each heat by place and then qualify the 2 fastest times in addition to the six already picked.
3. Video tape replay equipment available at state meet if possible to help pickers when needed.
4. Have 5th place team trophy for each class at state meet. Give awards for individuals on 1st two place relay teams at district. Give awards for individuals on all place winning relay teams at state meet.
5. Have section dealing with dangers involved in javelin event put in Bulletin next spring.
6. If the 2 mile run is contested in any invitational track meet, individual running in this event may not enter any other running event in that particular meet.
7. In Bulletin dealing with track next spring, have section dealing with sportsmanship of athletes and responsibility of people running events to enforce the rule on disqualification of an athlete who acts in an unsportsmanlike manner.
8. Make a duplicate 5th place individual award available when two boys tie for 5th and 6th.
9. The distance limitation for individuals be allowed each day of the 2-day state track meet.
10. A limitation of 2 meets per week for each individual track participant.

CROSS COUNTRY RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. A limitation of 2 meets per week for each individual cross-country participant with at least 48 hours between meets.

2. The opening of organized cross-country practice to be the same as the opening date for football each year.

Upon motion by Peterson and second by Cummings the following recommendations of the Girls Track Advisory Committee were approved.

1. Revise minimum standards as follows:

- Run the 220 on a full turn using 1/2 of a 440 track.

- Limit a girl to running either the 880 or the 440 but not both during a meet.
- Have shot puts weighed for district and state meets.
- Start the high jump at 4 feet for the district and state meets.
- Have a section in the Bulletin next spring asking meet managers to make sure girls are throwing the shot legally.
- Provide individual awards for both 1st and 2nd place relay teams at district meets.
- Provide individual awards for all 5 placing relay teams at the state meet.

Next under consideration was the report of the Speech Advisory Committee. It was moved by Cummings that a complete study be made of these recommendations with a view to revising the program for the 1970-71 school year. Seconded by Kolbo and carried. Named to a committee to study these recommendations were Muckenhirn as chairman along with Broton and Easton as members.

Some time was spent reviewing certain interpretation contradiction in the present edition of the Constitution and By-laws. The executive secretary was instructed to revise conflicting interpretations so as to correspond to the by-laws as written. Policies relative to high school golfers participating in amateur tournaments were also reviewed and revised so as to permit students to accept merchandise prizes in same during the summer months, but prohibiting the acceptance of cash prizes or participation in a golf calcutta. The acceptance of prizes in tournaments held during the school year would be permissible only if such prizes conformed to the awards rule.

The Board next reviewed recommendations of the Officials Association and the Officials Committee relative to tournament assignments for next year. Upon motion by Peterson and second by Quale, the following officials were to be tendered contracts for the 1970 basketball tournaments:

The following recommendations of the Officials Association were also adopted:

1. Three football clinics this fall to be conducted on basketball courts with particular emphasis placed on position of officials during various play situations. These three clinics to be held at Bismarck, Minot and Jamestown.
2. Association should carry a notice in fall Bulletin that schools should make every attempt to keep cheerleaders off the floor during basketball games. An area should be provided off the floor for the cheerleaders.

3. Per diem allowance for basketball tournament officials be increased from \$12.50 to \$15.00 per day
4. An on-the-floor type demonstration basketball clinic to be held this next fall at the Valley City Rules Clinic.
5. Beginning with the 1970-71 season the Class A Regional Committee should be responsible for selecting their own basketball officials for the regional tournament.

Some time was spent discussing catastrophic insurance coverage. The ABF Committee consisting of Spiss, Larson, and Smith were instructed to report on same at the August meeting after obtaining information on programs in other states at the National Federation meeting in July.

The conduct of students attending the state basketball tournaments was discussed at considerable length. It was agreed that the executive secretary should meet with representatives of the Principals Association and host cities to work out a plan to cope with existing problems.

The executive secretary explained a proposed amendment to be voted upon at the National Federation meeting in July which would change the number of representatives on the Executive Board from each region from 1 to 2, and if said amendment passed North Dakota would be entitled to a representative from Northwest section 6. It was moved by Muckenhirn that Eli Kay Larson's name be placed in nomination should the amendment pass, seconded by Cummings. Upon motion by Spiss a unanimous ballot was cast for Mr. Larson.

It was moved by Kolbo that Rex Robinson be added to the list of delegates from North Dakota to attend the National Federation meeting in Las Vegas. Seconded by Larson and carried. Muckenhirn moved that the Association pay the cost of the registration fee and banquet ticket of wives of delegates attending the convention. Seconded by Larson and carried.

The Board voted a \$25.00 raise in salary per month to Mrs. Lucile Vandestreek, bookkeeper, and Mrs. Ethel Thvedt, secretary, effective July 1, 1969.

As there appeared to be no other business, the Board adjourned after selecting August 14 and 15 as the dates for their final summer meeting commencing at 10:00 A. M. on the 14th.

MINUTES

Annual Meeting

October 24, 1968 — Grand Forks, North Dakota

The Annual meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held in the Burtness Theater at the University of North Dakota at Grand Forks on October 24, 1968, at 3:00 P. M. James Broton presented a report on the National Federation meeting held in Swampscott, Massachusetts, last July. Following this was an address by Paul Giel, Sports Director of WCCO Radio in Minneapolis—St. Paul, on "Don't Be Afraid To Lose".

The group then recessed for a few minutes and re-assembled for the general business meeting at 4:00 P. M.

It was moved by Hanson of Harvey and seconded by Barthel of Zeeland that inasmuch as all members had copies of the minutes of the last meeting in the Annual Handbook, the reading of these minutes be waived. Motion passed.

August Spiss, Chairman of the By-Laws Committee, next presented the following proposed amendments to the By-laws:

Article VIII — Awards

Section II

Awards such as unattached letter, trophy, metal football, metal basketball, metal track shoe, or similar article of symbolic value only may be given, provided that the cost of the award shall not exceed ten dollars (\$10.00). (Sponsored by Board of Directors)

It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Buchholtz of Jamestown that the amendment be adopted. Motion carried.

Article XII — Sports Season

Section II — Basketball

- c. Total games played by any team shall not exceed twenty season games, or eighteen season games and one invitational tournament. An individual may not participate in more than eighty quarters of competition, or seventy-two quarters plus one invitational tournament during the season, nor more than five quarters in any one evening. Games played in the district, regional, or state basketball tournaments shall not count in the maximum number of games or quarters permitted.
(Proposed by North Dakota Coaches Assn. and endorsed by Board of Directors)

Upon motion by Spiss and second by Panek of Grafton, the above amendment was adopted.

Article XII — Sports Seasons

Section II — Basketball

- f. All tournaments, other than Association sponsored tournaments, must end on a night not followed by a school day.
(Sponsored by Stutsman County Schoolmasters)

It was moved by Larson of Streeter and seconded by Bernhoft of Fargo that the amendment be adopted. Motion carried.

Article XIII — Rules of Eligibility

Section X

- a. He shall have been in attendance in the school he represents for one complete semester of eighteen weeks upon transferring from another school if the transfer is made at the opening of the first semester, and in attendance for one full year of two consecutive semesters if the transfer is made during the second semester, unless his parents have become residents of the district to which he transferred or the school from which he transferred does not offer work of the corresponding year in which he is ranked.

NOTE: Opening of the first semester means within the first thirty days of the semester. If the transfer is made prior to the thirty-first day of the semester, he becomes eligible at the end of eighteen full weeks; if the transfer is made during the first semester but after the thirtieth day of the semester, he becomes eligible at the end of the second semester.

If transfer is made during the second semester, he becomes eligible to compete at the end of the first semester during the next school year.

- b. A student who, because of unavoidable circumstances such as broken home conditions, death of parents or guardian, abandonment, or other exceptional or emergency reasons, finds it necessary to change schools in order to have a home, may be declared eligible by the Board of Directors, provided the administrator of each school involved files a statement with the NDHSAA that the change was necessary and there was no undue influence. Rulings on such cases will be considered by the Board only when in regular session.
(Sponsored by Board of Directors)

It was moved by Olson of Buffalo that the last sentence of the amendment be amended to read "Rulings on such cases will be considered by the Board only when in regular or special session". Seconded by Barthel of Zeeland and passed. It was then moved by Spiss and seconded by Rio of Grand Forks that the amendment as amended be adopted. Motion carried.

The report of the Nominating Committee consisting of Supt. Leon Olson of Williston, Supt. Bernum Hanson of Harvey, and Principal Otto Bernhoft of Fargo was presented by Bernhoft submitting the following names for the vacancies on the Board of Directors:

Nominations were then called for from the floor. There were no other nominations so it was moved by Hanson of Harvey and seconded by Stammen of Turtle Lake that nominations cease and that the report of the nominating committee be adopted. Motion carried.

Mr. Spiss next presented the following amendment to the Constitution proposed by the North Dakota Secondary School Principals Assn:

Article V — Officers and Duties

Section I

There shall be a Board of Directors, hereinafter called the Board, consisting of ten members, elected as hereinafter provided, for terms of three years except as hereinafter provided. Each new member shall be seated July 1st following his election and may not hold the same office for more than two consecutive terms, except that he may be appointed or elected to fill a vacancy after one year's absence from office. Three members of the Board shall be chosen from Class A schools, three from Class B schools, and one member shall be elected from any member high school regardless of classification. The Superintendent of Public Instruction or a member of his duly constituted staff, designated by him, shall serve as an ex-Officio member of said Board. One school board member from a member high school, or the executive director of the North Dakota School Boards Association, shall be selected by the executive committee of the North Dakota School Boards Association and his term of office shall be the same as that of other elective Board members. Should this member cease to be a school board member from a member high school, or the executive director of the North Dakota School Boards Association, the position shall be declared vacant and a successor selected by the Board of Directors of the School Boards Association to fill the unexpired term. The North Dakota Secondary School Principals Association shall designate one of their members to serve as an ex-Officio member of said Board. The North Dakota Secondary School Principals Association shall determine how this member is to be selected; however, this member shall be a principal in a member high school and a member of the North Dakota Secondary Principals Association. His term of office shall be the same as that of other elective Board members. Should this member cease to be a principal of a member high school, the position shall be declared vacant and a successor selected by the North Dakota Secondary School Principals Association to fill the unexpired term.

It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Bernhoft that the proposed amendment be adopted. No vote was taken at this time, since this was an amendment to the Constitution rather than the By-laws and requires a vote of the member schools by mail ballot. The secretary informed the group that this ballot would be mailed to all schools at the same time as the election ballots in December.

Supt. Halley of Cando requested permission to survey those in attendance at the meeting relative to their feelings about modifying the junior high school rule relative to game limitations in basketball so as to permit two games a week three times during the season. The majority indicated that they would favor such change, so Mr. Halley indicated that he would offer an amendment affecting such change for vote at a later meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting

November 15, 1968.— MINUTES — NDHSAA Office

The Board of Directors meeting of the North Dakota Official Association was held in the NDHSAA office building Friday morning, November 15, 1968, with all members present except Jack Brown.

The minutes of the June meeting in Valley City were read and approved.

The Board discussed the possibility of taking out insurance coverage on all officials and charging the fee to each individual as he registers. A lengthy discussion on the insurance question followed. It was agreed to bring the question to the entire membership at the annual meeting to be held at the Valley City Fieldhouse this same day.

The Board next discussed the "Officials Hall of Fame". The Board tried to determine the criteria to be used in making selections of members.

Ray Albrecht next proposed a number of rule changes relative to football that he felt should be brought to the membership for support and if the entire group felt the change was desirable the proposed rule change would be forwarded to the National Federation. The proposals were as follows:

1. Move both teams to the same side of the field with each team occupying an area from the 10 to the 40 yard line.
2. That the clock not start until the snap if a delay of game penalty were called during the last 2 minutes of the ball game.
3. Combining all illegal acts which occur just prior to and during the snap into one signal which would be illegal procedure signal.

Ray Albrecht next proposed that the membership vote on a recommendation that schools attempt to get better chain and box crews in football and that schools try to mark their fields every 5 yards.

The Board next spent considerable time in reviewing the present policy in regard to giving the officials tests. The closed-book vs. the open-book type test was studied in an attempt to determine which type encouraged the most study by the officials. The Board agreed that the present system of allowing the Part I to be taken with an open-book and that Part II be taken as a closed-book test be retained.

Motion by Albrecht, second by Iwen to adjourn, carried.

Herb Parker called the meeting to order with all members of the Board present.

The group spent some time in reviewing the many things that should be covered in the annual rules clinics conducted by the NDHSAA.

Motion by Brown to have 3 of the football clinics next fall conducted on a basketball court and to try and simulate as many game conditions as possible, especially in the area of position of officials, etc., and the 3 clinics of this type to be held in Jamestown, Bismarck and Minot. Seconded by Balzer and carried.

The Board felt that the local association should help make personnel available to conduct the clinic, with Schindler coordinating the plans with Brown, Balzer, and Parker.

Mr. Parker brought up the problems in basketball tournament officials selection and asked for comments from the Board of Directors.

Discussion followed as to merits of splitting up officiating pairs for tournaments. A lengthy discussion followed with the consensus of opinion being that pairs need not be kept together for tournament purposes.

A discussion was held concerning the use of 3 officials for basketball tournaments. The group felt that the move should come from the schools and that this should not be undertaken by the NDHSAA until schools have used them regularly during the season. The group also felt that it is not necessary to employ 8 officials at the state tournaments at this time.

Jack Brown brought up the problem of cheerleaders being on the floor during the game in many schools around the state. Motion by Brown that the Association recommend to schools via the Bulletin that they make an attempt to have a place off the court for their cheerleaders during the game. Seconded by Galloway and carried.

Motion by Albrecht that at all Association sponsored tournaments in basketball the assignment of games for the officials be done by the NDHSAA office staff. Seconded by Parker and carried.

Motion by Galloway that per diem allowance be increased from \$12.50 per day to \$15.00 per day and that championship round officials at the 2 state tournaments receive \$30.00 per game instead of \$25.00. Seconded by Balzer and carried.

Motion by Balzer that the Officials Association go on record as extending thanks to NDHSAA for furnishing the state tournament official with 2 passes to the tournament. Seconded by Brown and carried.

Motion by Brown that the maximum recommended mileage fee for officials be changed from 8½ cents per mile to 10 cents per mile. Seconded by Albrecht and carried.

Motion by Albrecht that Class A schools be allowed to pay a maximum of \$20.00 per game for FB, BB, WR, and HO. Seconded by Brown and carried.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

Motion by King to send a proposed rule change in football to the National Federation that the clock would not start until the snap if a delay of game penalty were called during the last two minutes of the game, seconded by Hill and carried.

Motion by Cameron to send a proposed rule change in football to the National Federation that all illegal acts which occur just prior to and during the snap be combined into one signal of illegal procedure, seconded by Schlotfeldt. Did not carry.

Motion by Greenslit, seconded by Strand, to recommend to schools that they attempt to get better qualified chain and box crews in football and that schools also attempt to mark the football fields every 5 yards, carried.

Neil Arntzen brought up the possibility of recommending a minimum fee for officiating as well as just having a maximum recommendation. Much discussion followed and it was felt that a definite problem existed in this area but no action was taken.


