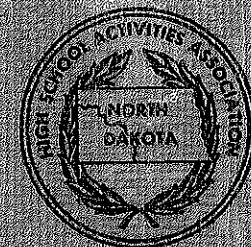

FOREWORD

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is pleased to present the 46th Annual Handbook which contains a historical and statistical account of the year's operation.

Attention is called to certain trends and developments that are apparent over the year. Special attention is called to certain events that have special significance to member schools.

1. The trend toward the re-organization and annexation of school districts is slowly decreasing the number of high schools operating in the state. Increased financial cost of operation has also resulted in the closing of several parochial high schools. Membership in the Association dropped from 288 to 279 this past year and is now 104 less than the peak enrollment of 383 schools during the school years 1955-56, 1956-57 and 1957-58 — a decrease of 27.2% in the past twelve years.

2. This past year regional meetings were conducted for the first time to acquaint the membership with the various activity programs sponsored by the Association, pointing out problem areas and outlining new rules and regulations. Because of the success of these meetings, similar conferences have been scheduled for the fall of 1970.

3. A new amendment to the Constitution gave the Board of Directors power to rule on eligibility of students in so-called "hardship cases" in connection with the transfer rule. Because of this new rule, several students were granted immediate eligibility who otherwise would have had to sit out a waiting period.

4. Favorable weather, combined with increased admission prices and television receipts, resulted in new records being set for receipts derived from regional and state basketball tournaments.

5. Basketball and hockey once again were the only two activities sponsored by the Association which were self-supporting. All other sports and activity programs were subsidized from income realized from these two sources.

6. Interest in interscholastic athletic programs for girls continue to grow, with increased participation in all sports. The girls track program has developed to such a point that separate A and B divisions have been set up for the 1970-71 school year.

7. Participation in music and speech activities also continues to increase. Because of the increasing number of entrants, separate state contests in these activities will be held in the spring of 1971, instead of combining them in one festival as in the past.

8. Interest in the wrestling program continues to grow. Two years ago separate A and B divisions were established, with the state tournaments for each division run simultaneously at a common site. These tournaments will be located at different sites this coming school year.

9. The number of children covered under the ABF program has shown a slight decrease each of the past two years. The number covered in grades 7 to 12 has increased each year but this increase has been more than offset by the declining numbers in the elementary grades. Because of an additional 129 claims paid, and an average increased cost of approximately \$.90 per claim, the total payment for claims exceeded that of 1968-69 by slightly more than \$11,000.00.

10. The addition of new programs and the increased work connected with the ABF program resulted in the addition of an additional assistant to the secretary this past year, who was placed in charge of the ABF program and assisted with the music and speech programs.

11. Your Board of Directors established a ceiling for liquid reserves for both the General and ABF Funds this past year, with the stipulation that should these amounts be exceeded at the close of the fiscal year, credits be granted to member schools the next year on membership dues and ABF premiums. The \$250,000.00 General Fund reserve was exceeded this past year and so payment of membership dues for the 1970-71 school year has been waived for all member schools. In future years expense allowances for participating schools in various activities will probably be increased and profits distributed this way rather than by rebates or cancellation of membership dues.

12. This year the Directory of Administrators and Coaches has been omitted from the Official Handbook as this information is found in the Membership Directory publication which was distributed to member schools earlier in the year.

In general, this has been another successful year. Again, we are mindful of the valued help and assistance given by many school people and others interested in the Association program. The Board of Directors and the office personnel express appreciation for the whole-hearted cooperation of each of you in making this another banner year.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

Valley City, North Dakota - August 14, 15, 1969

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Valley City, North Dakota, on August 14th and 15th with all members present except M. F. Peterson.

The reading of the minutes of the previous session was waived as each Board member had been presented with a copy of these minutes.

The Board examined the complete financial report of the operation of the Association from July 1, 1969, to August 12, 1969. Upon motion by Broton and second by Muckenhirn the report was approved.

The next order of business was a presentation of the audit report for the 1968-69 fiscal year by R. B. Ludvigson, Certified Public Accountant of Valley City. Mr. Ludvigson recommended that unappropriated surplus funds be earmarked and that the Board establish a policy as to the maximum amount of surplus funds that should be maintained. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Larson the audit was accepted as reported.

August Spiss reported on behalf of the ABF committee concerning surpluses which had accumulated in the ABF fund and moved that the in-patient hospital allowance be increased from \$13.00 to \$15.00 per day for the 1969-1970 school year with no increase in premiums, seconded by McLain and carried. The ABF committee was instructed to make further study on the dental schedule as it applies to work that cannot be undertaken or completed within a year of the date of injury.

C. Vandestreek of the Valley City Times Record met with the Board concerning the printing of the Activities Bulletin explaining that they no longer did linotype printing and outlined possible ways of producing an offset Bulletin. The group decided to try the IBM offset type reduced by photography so as to produce copy similar to the old linotype printed Bulletin on an experimental basis.

It was moved by Larson that a second telephone line be installed in the Association office, seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The secretary explained that although the Board had decided last year to pay up the storm sewer special assessment in full, that assessments had already been spread at that time and so it had been impossible to do so. It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Broton that the balance of said assessment plus the special assessment for the city parking lot, totaling \$630.82 for the two, be paid in full. Motion carried.

Discussion followed relative to expenses in connection with the running of track, golf, tennis and cross-country events. It was moved by Muckenhirn that present allowances being made for managers fees and expenses for the various events be doubled. Seconded by Larson and carried.

The Board next reviewed contracts for trophies and awards that were let at the last meeting. It was pointed out by the secretary that some awards had

been overlooked in the original contracts and that some additions and corrections would be necessary. It was moved by Larson to approve the following additions and corrections in connection with the contract with Jostens. Seconded by Engelhardt.

State Basketball — Series J2670-1 — J2670A — 5 places
Prices: \$40.90, \$37.95, \$35.65, \$32.25, \$32.25

State Track — Same as basketball but with track figures — 5 places

State Baseball — Series J2670 — 3 trophies
Prices: \$35.65, \$32.25, \$32.25

Individual Regional Wrestling Awards — Same as district track

Bids for supplying basketballs for the 1970 district, regional and state tournaments were opened and it was found that the bid of Colborn School Supply of Grand Forks for \$15.10 per ball FOB Grand Forks for the McGregor X10L official basketball was low. It was moved by Larson that the secretary check with the National Federation as to whether said ball was on the list of approved balls and if so that the bid submitted by Colborn School Supply be accepted. Seconded by Engelhardt and carried.

The secretary reported that tentative acceptance had been received on all contracts awarded officials for the 1970 basketball tournaments and that all but five contracts had been signed and returned. A report was also made relative to acceptances received to date on tournament sites and management for the various activities for the 1969-1970 school year.

Ell Kay Larson, Chairman of the Class B redistricting committee, reported that District 7 had only 4 remaining members because of school closings and moved that Hannaford and North Central of Rogers be transferred from District 17 to District 7 for the 1969-1970 school year. The motion was seconded by Spiss and carried. He also moved that the following changes be made in the proposed redistricting plan for 1970-1971. Seconded by Quale and carried.

Mercer from District 15 to District 21
Stanton from District 21 to District 31
Max from District 21 to District 24

Officials from the Grand Forks school system appeared before the Board concerning the eligibility status of Morris Henson of Red River High School. After reviewing the testimony presented, the Board ruled the boy eligible for interscholastic activities at Red River.

Discussion followed concerning the large number of entries and problems in connection with the state sand greens golf tournament. It was moved by Larson that the state be divided into two districts for sand greens golf competition with the eastern district to be held at Rugby and the western district at Stanley with the four low individuals, the four low double teams, and the four low teams from each district qualifying for the state event at Beulah, and that the contestants in the singles and doubles contests at the state tourney be limited to those entries qualifying from the district meets. Seconded by Easton and carried. Broton then moved that the office staff select trophies for the district tournaments.

Maxwell next presented the following recommendations of the Radio and TV Committee:

- 1) The minimum fee for televising Class A regional Basketball and state hockey tournaments be set at \$500.00 for the final and semi-final sessions plus \$75.00 per game for each additional game telecast.
- 2) Radio fees for broadcasting of state basketball tournaments be established at \$100.00 for the entire tournament with a minimum of 8 games being broadcast, or \$25.00 per game if less than 8 games are carried, or \$10.00 per game for stations receiving a 'feed' from another station.

It was moved by Broton to accept the report of the Radio & TV Committee. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The next order of business was the adoption of the 1969-1970 budget which is as follows:

The meeting then recessed and was reconvened at 9:00 A.M. on August 15th.

The investment of Association funds was discussed at some length. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the secretary be permitted to invest funds in U.S. Government Securities and that Quale and Larson be named as a finance committee to work with the secretary in making such investments. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Upon motion by Quale and second by Broton, Rex Robinson was included under the Blue Cross-Blue Shield plan previously adopted for the secretary and assistant.

Some time was spent reviewing recommendations of the various divisions of the Speech Advisory Committee. The secretary was instructed to notify this committee to assimilate all recommendations in one package for consideration by the Association Board Committee which had been appointed to study same.

It was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by McLain that the Association purchase and distribute DGWS track and gymnastic rule books for girls to all schools having programs in these sports. Motion carried.

The secretary next read a report from Don Kolbo, official delegate to the National Federation convention, concerning the business transacted at said convention in Las Vegas.

Some time was spent in discussing the program for the annual meeting of the NDHSAA in October. A letter from Adolph Rupp declining the invitation to be the main speaker at the meeting was read. A list of possible alternates was suggested and the secretary was instructed to contact these people.

The Chairman next appointed the following to the nominating committee of the Association:

Supt. Leon Olson, Williston, Chairman
Supt. G. I. Sholy, Wahpeton
Supt. J. E. Rindt, New Rockford

Discussion followed on the ruling of the Tax Commissioners office that sales tax is to be collected on admissions to school activities and the effect of same on Association activities.

Next under consideration were the regional meetings of the NDHSAA scheduled to be held this fall. It was felt that these should be held during the month of September as soon after the Administrators Conference as possible and to schedule these as evening meetings with a light lunch being furnished those in attendance. It was moved by Larson that Board members be urged to attend meetings in their area and they in turn be allowed expenses for attendance at such meetings. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The Board next reviewed the regulation adopted at the March, 1967 meeting in which an extra weight allowance was allowed wrestlers who compete on 2 consecutive days. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Easton this regulation was repealed.

The next meeting of the Board was then set for 9:00 A.M., on October 15th in Minot.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Minot, North Dakota — October 15, 1969

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Minot at Gordon's Holiday Spot Motel on October 15, 1969, at 9:00 A.M. with all members present except M. F. Peterson, who was represented by A. R. Nestoss.

Each Board member was presented with a packet containing the agenda for the meeting and a financial report of all business transacted from July 1 to October 11.

The Board spent some time reviewing the financial report of both the General Fund and ABF fund, and upon motion the reports were accepted.

The executive-secretary reported the following investments had been made by the financial committee of reserve funds in the General and ABF accounts:

\$100,000 in 5 year Federal Land Bank Bonds at 8½%, \$100,000 in 3 year Farm Home Administration notes at 8.35%, and \$25,000 in U.S. Treasury Bills at 7½% which mature on June 1, 1970. He also presented a report on the growth of the over-all financial standing of the Association from 1963 to the present time, and suggested that the Board follow the recommendation of the auditor concerning the establishment of a ceiling on accumulation of assets and methods for distribution of any excesses to the membership. After some discussion, it was moved by Larson that the chairman appoint a committee to study the matter and develop a recommended policy concerning same. Second by Spiss and carried. Appointed to said committee were August Spiss, chairman, Del Easton and Harley McLain.

A report was next made on the regional meetings that had been conducted over the state the past month, which were attended by 243 representatives from 94 member schools. The secretary stated that he was somewhat disappointed in the number that attended these meetings but felt that many of those who had attended had benefited from the discussions held at many of the sites. Discussion followed as to whether this program should be continued another year, and following motion by Spiss and second by Easton it was voted to do so.

Consideration was next given to the question as to whether a letterman's club could contribute \$10.00 toward the cost of an award jacket for athletes. The Board approved the interpretation previously made by the executive-secretary of the award rule that partial payment could not be made by the school or other organizations on jackets or sweaters, etc., that are retained by the student.

Discussion followed on the game limitation rule for hockey. It was moved by Broton that the rule be changed so as to be more in conformity with the basketball rule, allowing 20 season games or 18 games plus one 4-team holiday tournament. Seconded by Larson and carried.

Rev. Robert Larson of Zion Lutheran Church and Allen Schauer of Mount Olivet Lutheran Church of Minot appeared before the Board in regard to the problem of individual schools scheduling football games on the week-end reserved for church events as scheduled on the NDHSAA calendar. They were advised that the Association only has control over the sanctioning of multiple school events and the scheduling of Association activities, but no control over the scheduling of athletic events between two schools. However, the Board reaffirmed its former position that schools should attempt to avoid scheduling contests on the week-ends reserved for church events as such would be in contradiction of the purpose of reserving these specific week-ends for church activities.

Discussion followed relative to current admission charges for various Association sponsored events and upon motion by Larson and second by Engelhardt the following schedule was adopted for the 1969-1970 school year:

Duane Carlson, Manager of the State Class B Basketball Tournament, appeared before the Board in regard to the assignment of seats for competing schools and district chairmen. Mr. Carlson outlined the procedure which had been followed in the past and after some discussion a plan was worked out for future tournaments.

Mr. Carlson also reported on some difficulties which had arisen in the past concerning further participation of injured athletes in tournament competition. It was moved by Muckenhirn that once an injured boy is turned over to the tourney doctor that said doctor shall determine if and when a boy might continue participation in the event. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The question as to eligibility of students attending the Strasburg Parochial Elementary School for participation on the Emmons Central High School was next reviewed. It was moved by Nestoss that the previous ruling of the executive-secretary be upheld stating that said students would be ineligible for such participation because of the two schools being under different administrative units, one under the local parish unit and the other under the parishes of the entire county. Seconded by Larson and carried.

A question as to the eligibility status of students from other districts attending special education classes at Strasburg under a county special education set-up was next given consideration. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Muckenhirn that such students be eligible in their home district if they commute or are transported daily from the home school to Strasburg, but eligible at the Strasburg school if they stay in that town rather than going home each day. Seconded by McLain and carried.

It was moved by Larson that because the Northeast Class A and Class B district track meets were moved from Mayville to Grand Forks at the last minute last spring, that a check for \$37.50 be sent to Ken Rio of Grand Forks for handling the meet at Grand Forks. Seconded by Easton and carried.

A petition from Napoleon for transfer from music District No. 6 to District No. 7 was next presented to the Board. Upon motion by Broton and second by Easton, the petition was approved.

Ken Rio and Arnold Bakke of Grand Forks appeared before the Board in regard to an appeal under the hardship rule concerning the ruling previously made by the Board in the case of the eligibility status of Larry Simmers and Dave Evers. A letter from Robert Sauter, former principal at St. James, was read outlining the reasons for disciplinary action taken at the school and subsequent transfer of the two students. Following discussion, it was moved by Larson and seconded by Easton that the previous ruling be sustained. Motion carried.

Mr. Rio also brought up the question of the conflict between the Northeast Regional Wrestling Meet and the State Hockey Tournament. Mr. Rio was instructed to poll the schools involved in the wrestling tourney to see if a different time schedule could be worked out that would be acceptable to the schools and which would eliminate the conflict.

The executive-secretary reported that the Moorhead State Fieldhouse would not be available for the Southeast Class A Tournament, and that the Fargo Civic Auditorium and Valley City State College Fieldhouse were also

booked the dates of the tourney. Consequently, the Southeast regional committee had recommended that the games be played at both the Fargo North and Fargo South gymnasiums, with one game being played simultaneously at each site each night. It was moved by Larson that the executive-secretary make necessary arrangements for the holding of this tournament. Seconded by Broton and carried.

Supt. Bierman of Alexander and Coach Ron Smith of Alamo next appeared before the Board relative to a football game between the two schools played at Alamo in which registered officials were not used. Coach Smith gave a report concerning the incident stating that he had contacted Dennis Healy of Williston last spring about the possibility of his working the game and that he had contacted him again just before Labor Day as he had been unable to secure registered officials. He also stated that he assumed that Mr. Healy was a registered official but knew that his son, who was the other official involved, was not. Upon questioning, he admitted that he had not attempted to secure clearance from the NDHSAA office for the use of said officials when registered officials were not available. Supt. Bierman also gave his impressions of the incident and stated that it was a mistake on their part for not checking to see that registered officials were being used but that they felt that Alamo had taken care of this. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Larson that the Alamo school be placed on probation for one year as of this date for hiring and using unregistered officials, and that a letter of reprimand be sent to the Alexander school for participating in a game in which unregistered officials were used. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Next under consideration was an appeal by Dennis Healy of the penalty prescribed by the assistant-secretary for his having officiated the Alamo-Alexander football game as an unregistered football official. A complete review of the case was made, including the report of the violation, the confirmation of same by the schools involved, and by Mr. Healy, and the suspension of Mr. Healy as a registered basketball official for the 1969-1970 season by the assistant-secretary thereby cancelling his right to officiate high school basketball games and tournaments. Following a lengthy discussion, it was moved by Muckenhirn to uphold the action taken by the assistant-secretary and that Mr. Healy's status for the 1970-71 season be left up to the North Dakota Officials Association. The motion was seconded by McLain and passed by a vote of 7 to 2.

The secretary reported that protests from Dunseith, Hoople, and Max had been received relative to their district assignments in the proposed 1970-71 Class B Basketball District re-alignments. The protests were referred to the Class B redistricting committee for consideration.

A report was made by the secretary of a meeting held in Bismarck, attended by representatives of the NDHSAA, the High School Principals Association and the Bismarck Class A Tournament Committee, concerning problems encountered in the past relative to student conduct at basketball tournaments. In response to a request from the Bismarck Police Department, it was moved by Spiss that a letter be sent to the Police Commissioner advising him that the NDHSAA supports a strict and reasonable enforcement of laws in connection with student behavior at basketball tournaments. Seconded by Nestoss and carried.

It was moved by Spiss that the Association authorize the attendance of Mr. Robinson at the NUEA debate meeting in New York on December 28-30, and that the Association also pay the expenses of a delegate from the Speech Teachers Association at said meeting. Seconded by Engelhardt and carried.

Upon motion by Larson and second by Broton, attendance of the executive-secretary and assistant Dick Schindler at the mid-winter meeting of the National Federation in Chicago, January 7-9, was authorized.

A request by Linton High School for permission to play more than the allowable five mid-week basketball games and for submitting wrestling weight certifications on January 10th instead of December 20th because of their cancellation of their athletic program until January 1st due to a defeated mill levy increase was presented to the Board. It was moved by Larson that since the by-laws provide for additional mid-week basketball games only because of cancellations due to an Act of God that the basketball request be denied and that the request for a later filing of wrestling certifications also be denied, if practice sessions are held in November and December. Seconded by McLain and carried.

A request from Harold Pederson, Assistant Athletic Director at UND, for permission to use the glass basketball bankboards owned by the Association for high school tourneys held at UND, was next presented. It was moved by McLain to grant such permission providing the University assumes responsibility for any breakage or damage which might occur. Seconded by Easton and carried.

It was moved by Broton that the secretary write to the regional basketball tourney managers, recommending the use of the fan-shaped bankboards if at all possible. Seconded by Larson and carried.

Next under consideration was an interpretation of the by-laws as to whether a student could be a member of both a 9th grade team and a combination 7, 8 and 9th grade team at the same time, or whether he would be ineligible for the combination team once he were elevated to a 9th grade team. Following discussion, it was moved by Muckenhirn that such dual participation be permitted. Seconded by Larson and carried.

The next meeting of the Board was set for 9:00 A.M. on Sunday, January 25th, at Bismarck.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES

Board of Directors — N. D. H. S. A. A.

November 10, 1969 — Minot, N. Dak.

A special meeting of the Board of Directors was held in the Arnold Room of the Minot Federal Savings and Loan Assn. building at 1:30 P.M.

on November 10, 1969, with all members present except Warner Quale and M. F. Peterson. Mr. Peterson was represented by Deputy Superintendent of Public Instruction, Art Nestoss.

Supt. Kouba of Alamo appeared before the Board in connection with a hearing concerning the eligibility of three transfer students, George Dickinson, Keith Kvande, and Mark Long, who had participated on their football team the past season. A protest as to their eligibility had been filed earlier by the Alexander school, and a preliminary investigation by Board member Easton of Williston indicated the probability that some of the students were ineligible. Mr. Easton presented a report on his investigation and Mr. Kouba also outlined the facts concerning each of the boys in question. All three boys had attended high school at Williston during the 1968-69 school year.

It was established that George Dickinson's mother, who had been a resident of Williston, had remarried during the past summer, and that George had moved with her to their new home in Alamo at that time. Upon motion by Spiss and second by McLean, it was ruled that the boy become immediately eligible at Alamo, because of the transfer of residence of his mother.

Keith Kvande's parents own and operate a farm in a rural school district located between Williston and Alamo. According to the testimony presented, the boy and his mother had stayed in Williston the past year during the school term, but had moved back to the farm at the close of school last spring. No one appeared to know whether the father had also moved to Williston or had remained on the farm during this period. Both parents, however, remained on the farm this fall and the boy enrolled at Alamo as it was considerably closer than Williston. Following the testimony on this case it was moved by Spiss that the boy be ruled eligible if both parents resided in Williston this past year, but ineligible if the father did not move and the legal residence of the family was still on the farm. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Supt. Kouba testified that Mark Long's parents reside in Williston, but that the boy transferred to the Alamo school this fall, residing with a farmer in the Alamo district. The boy had not been placed on said farm either by a court placement or by the welfare agency, but had moved for personal reason. He indicated that the boy had been rather despondent and disturbed, and that his participation in football had given him a great mental lift. He also stated that he had had some misgivings concerning his eligibility status, and probably should have checked into same. At the same time, he indicated that he would do the same thing again, knowing the boy was ineligible. Upon the conclusion of the presentation of testimony concerning said lad, it was moved by Muckenhirn that the boy be declared ineligible, seconded by Engelhardt and carried.

Eli Kay Larson next moved that Alamo forfeit all football games won during the 1969 season and that a letter to this effect be sent by the superintendent to all schools whom they had defeated during the past season, and that the executive secretary send a letter of reprimand to the superintendent and a copy of same to the Alamo school board, with a warning that any further violation during the 1969-70 school year could result in suspension. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried. Easton then moved that Mark Long's period of ineligibility be extended to 18 weeks from the date of the last interscholastic football game in which he participated and that the same penalty apply to Keith Kvande if the check on his parental residence proves him to be ineligible. Seconded by Larson and carried.

A letter from Attorney Dean Winkjer concerning a threatened lawsuit because of cancellation of Dennis Healy's basketball officiating contracts as a result of his suspension by the Association was next read along with a letter of recommendation concerning same from the Association's attorney, L. T. Sproul. James Broton then moved to reconsider the motion adopted at the October meeting which placed said Dennis Healy on suspension, seconded by Larson and carried. Following a lengthy discussion, it was moved by Broton that the action previously taken in suspending Mr. Healy as a basketball official be rescinded subject to the filing by Mr. Healy of a signed release from all claims against the Association. Seconded by Spiss and carried.

Discussion then followed as to the advisability of incorporating in the by-laws of the Association specific rules and regulations pertaining to officials and penalties for violation thereof. Appointed to a committee to draft such amendments were Board members Muckenhirn, Engelhardt, and McLain.

A request from Wahpeton High School for approval of Mrs. Vernon Johnson, who is not a certified teacher or an employee of the Wahpeton School District, to serve as their Student Congress director for the 1969-1970 school year was next presented. It was moved by Muckenhirn to approve such request, subject to the approval of the State Department of Public Instruction and that a regularly certified staff member of the school accompany the group at interscholastic events as the official representative of the school. Seconded by Larson and carried.

Consideration was next given to a similar request from Starkweather High School to use Donald Lee, a non-certified teacher, as basketball coach. It was moved by Broton to grant said request subject to the same conditions outlined above. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The Board next reviewed additions and corrections filed by the Adams High School relative to their 1968-1969 master eligibility sheet, and upon motion by Larson and second by McLain approved same.

A letter from Supt. Schuette of Grace City requesting ruling on eligibility of Kenneth Ackerson under the hardship rule was next presented. It was moved by Easton that the boy be declared eligible, providing the facts as outlined in the letter proved to be true upon further checking. Seconded by Engelhardt and carried.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

It was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by Quale that the proposed plan be adopted. Motion carried.

Discussion followed on the fee to be charged for television rights for optional games not covered in the basic contract for the televising of the State Class B tournament. Upon motion by Spiss and second by Engelhardt, the fee was set at \$250.00 per game.

Ed Kringstad, state chairman of the USWF, appeared before the Board and outlined the wrestling program being sponsored by that organization. Mr. Kringstad answered several questions from Board members in regard to the relationship between the USWF and the National Federation and the state associations.

The secretary outlined problems encountered in securing a site for the Southeast Class A regional basketball tournament and explained the organizational set-up that had been arranged for holding the event at the Fargo North and Fargo South gymnasiums.

The secretary next reported on four violations of the 5 quarter rule in basketball which had been reported to the office and the penalties which had been assessed in connection therewith. Approval of said penalties was made by the Board. Mr. Spiss moved that reports of violations of the 5 quarter rule must be made at least one week prior to the teams district starting date for consideration to be given toward same. Seconded by Larson and carried. The secretary was instructed to mail a memorandum to all schools calling their attention to the 5 quarter rule, pointing out the necessity of reporting violations immediately.

Mr. Schindler presented a report on the recommendations adopted by the North Dakota Officials Association at their annual meeting in November. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Easton the following recommendations were adopted:

1. The recommended maximum mileage allowance be increased from 8½ cents to 9 cents per mile.
2. The executive board of the NDOA prepare a list of recommended rules and regulations pertaining to officials, along with suggested penalties for violations thereof.
3. Gymnastic officials working Association sponsored tournaments be required to register as gymnastic officials with the NDHSAA.

The Board next approved a revised officials contract form which had been prepared by the office staff for use beginning with the 1970-1971 season.

Mr. Spiss, Chairman of the Assets Committee, reported that further study would be necessary by the committee before a report would be ready. Another meeting of the committee was scheduled for 1:00 P.M. on March 20th at Minot.

A request from hockey schools using natural ice for additional practice time after the completion of the state tournament was next presented. The secretary explained the difficulties that these schools encounter in the fall because of warm weather and the shorter season that these schools have because of the lack of ice. It was moved by Larson that schools be allowed two weeks of practice after the state tourney with no games being permitted during such period. Seconded by Broton and carried.

Mr. Schindler reported on the problems in our state in connection with the new weight classes outlined in the Wrestling Rules book, in that schools had difficulty in filling the upper three classes while an abundance of contestants existed in the middle class.

A request from several schools that the widening of the football goal posts to 23'4" be made mandatory for the 1970 season instead of allowing schools until 1971 to make such change as stipulated in the football rules book was next taken under consideration. It was the decision of the Board that the rule book be followed.

A request from Minot that Class A schools be permitted to participate in the Class B baseball tournament was next presented. It was moved by Larson that this request be denied, that the present policy of sponsoring a separate Class A tournament if a minimum of four Class A schools field teams be continued. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Mr. Muckenhirn next gave a report on the Speech Committee work to date. He stated that the proposal submitted by the Speech Advisory Committee would involve a complete change in the speech program from one of a festival type to a contest type and that considerable additional expense would be involved under the outlined program. He also noted that all recommended changes were to apply to the Class A division only with no mention being made of the Class B division, and suggested that his committee should perhaps meet with the speech advisory committee before presenting recommendations to the Board.

A request from Devils Lake High School for permission to enter students of their school who are members of the Devils Lake City Band in solo and ensemble events at the district festival was next presented. It was moved by Easton and seconded by Engelhardt to approve said request. Motion carried.

Upon motion by Broton and second by Muckenhirn, a request from Edgeley for permission to use a non-teaching gymnastic coach was approved.

It was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by Larson that the Association sponsor Cheerleader Clinics again in the fall of 1970. Motion carried.

Discussion followed on whether head coaches should be required to attend the rules clinics conducted by the Association and, if so, what the prescribed penalty would be for non-attendance. Upon motion by Easton and second by Larson the matter was tabled and the assistant Secretary was instructed to conduct a survey as to practices in other states and to report on same at the March meeting of the Board.

President Maxwell appointed Larson, Broton and Muckenhirn to serve on the salary committee, with Larson as chairman.

The Board next reviewed several eligibility cases of transfer students and ruled immediate eligibility for Orville Yellow Hawk of Balfour and Peter Jeston of Neche. Ricky Marzolf of Hatton was ruled ineligible until the end of the second semester of the current term as was DuWayne Mattox of Palermo unless future additional information would establish this as a hardship case.

Selection of delegates to the summer convention was the next item on the agenda. Members Maxwell, Broton, Muckenhirn, Larson and Peterson were named as delegates with McLain and Engelhardt as alternates. Mr. Maxwell was named as the official voting delegate.

A request from the McLean County Schoolmasters for permission to allow the McLean County Band to perform during one night of the State Class B Basketball tourney was next taken under consideration. As the policy adopted

After some discussion, it was decided that individual applications for approval of non-teaching coaches would have to be submitted and each case acted upon separately.

It was moved by Larson that a felt banner containing the Association seal be secured for use when displaying Association materials. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The executive secretary outlined the situation existing in Fargo as to high school and junior high organization and the hockey program in operation in the school system. Because of differences that exist in connection with the organizational program in this sport, it was moved by Easton that 9th graders at the Ben Franklin Junior High be allowed to participate on the Fargo North 'B' squad in hockey. Seconded by Broton and carried.

A letter from the Grafton school authorities acknowledging the participation of one of their students, Greg Sevingy, in an intramural hockey game at UND while a member of the Grafton High School team, was next presented. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Easton, the boy was ruled ineligible for further hockey competition as a member of the Grafton Hockey team for the remainder of the current season.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned after setting the next meeting of the Board for 9:00 A.M., Friday, March 13th, at the Bismarck Civic Center.

SPECIAL MEETING OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

January 26, 1970 — Bismarck, North Dakota

A special meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held in the Hall of Four Seasons of the GP Hotel in Bismarck on January 26, 1970, at 3:30 P.M. for the purpose of considering proposed amendments to the by-laws:

August Spiss presented a proposal by the Board of Directors that sections 1 and 2 of Article X of the by-laws be amended to read as follows and that sections 3 and 4 of the same Article be deleted.

Section 1: The major officials in all inter-school contests shall be on the registered list of officials of the Association, provided, however, that the Executive Secretary or his assistants may, in case of emergency, grant a member school a waiver of this requirement. The Board shall designate who will be defined as major officials.

Section II: The Board shall adopt the procedures for the registration of officials, shall set and establish qualifications and requirements for such registration, shall set and establish rules and procedures for the advancement and classification of officials, and shall set and establish rules, procedures and conditions for disciplining officials, including but not limited to the remedies of revocation of registration, or the suspension or probation of officials.

It was moved by Supt. M. C. Olson that the proposed amendments and deletions to Article X be adopted, seconded by Supt. Joe Rindt of New Rockford and carried.

Supt. D. Allen Halley of Cando moved that subsection (b) of Section III of Article V of the Junior High By-laws be amended to read as follows: "Not more than one game per week permitted, except that two games per week permitted for any three weeks during the sport season. (This section not applicable to schools whose total enrollment in grades seven and eight does not exceed fifty)." The motion was seconded by Supt. Robert Sheppard of Northwood and carried.

Dick Karlgaard of Bismarck moved that Section X of Article III of the Junior High By-laws be amended to read as follows: "A student shall not be eligible to compete on a regular three-year junior high school team on or after the day on which the seventeenth anniversary of his birth occurs, nor on a team consisting of seventh and eighth grades only on or after the day on which the sixteenth anniversary of his birth occurs." The motion was seconded by Supt. C. A. Erlandson of Devils Lake but was defeated by a vote of the assembly.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Board of Directors Meeting

Bismarck, North Dakota — March 13, 1970

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at Bismarck, North Dakota, on March 13, 1970 at 9:00 A.M. with all members present.

Mimeographed copies of the January meeting, which had previously been mailed to the Board, were approved.

The Board next examined the financial report showing a list of all expenditures and receipts of the General Fund and the Accident Benefit Fund up to March 7, 1970. The report was carefully reviewed and accepted.

A delegation from Fargo South appeared before the Board relative to the Board policy permitting only the host school band to play at state basketball

tournaments. Otto Bernhoft, Principal of South High School, asked that the policy be modified to permit bands from all participating schools and that bands from both schools involved in a game be allowed to play at each game. After considerable discussion relative to the pros and cons concerning same, it was moved by Easton that the present policy relative to bands remain in effect for the 1970 state tournaments, and that member schools be polled as to their wishes concerning same before adopting a policy concerning the 1971 tournaments. Seconded by Spiss and carried.

Supt. Ray Frank of Hebron, Supt. Lloyd Rase of Center, and Harold Schwan of New Salem, members of the District 29 basketball committee, next appeared before the Board relative to the number of season games participated in by Glen Ullin, one of their member schools. The committee pointed out that Glen Ullin had played 20 varsity games and in addition two other games, labeled as junior varsity games, in which only 3 members of the varsity squad had been replaced with other individuals. It was their opinion that the 20 game rule had been violated, especially since these games had been counted in the seeding of teams for the district tournament, that the Glen Ullin school should be reprimanded for said violation, and that the Board should formulate a policy as to what constitutes a junior varsity team since that is not clearly defined in the by-laws. After considerable discussion, it was moved by McLain and seconded by Engelhardt that the superintendent and coach of Glen Ullin appear before the Board at their meeting on March 21st at Minot and that any further action, if any, than that already taken by the executive-secretary, be delayed until after said meeting. Mr. Spiss recommended that a committee be appointed to draw-up guide lines defining the composition of teams. It was pointed out that similar action was necessary in connection with other sports, so action was temporarily delayed until after discussion on same.

Supt. Lowe of Mercer next appeared before the Board relative to the assignment of Mercer to District 15 at the January meeting of the Board. He explained that the request which he had submitted at that time had been misinterpreted by the committee, and that it was their desire to remain in District 21 to which they had been previously assigned. It was moved by Larson that Mercer be transferred back to District 21 as originally assigned, seconded by Broton and carried.

L. R. Nyhus, Principal of Devils Lake High School, appeared before the Board relative to the eligibility of one of their students. He testified that Robbie Eisenzimmer, a 9th grade student at Devils Lake High School, had played in a varsity holiday hockey tournament in December and also in a midget holiday tournament, and had continued on as a member of the Devils Lake High School team the remainder of the season and in the State Hockey tournament. There appeared to be some question as to whether the midget team was a school team or a non-school team. It was pointed out that regardless of the ruling on same, the boy would have been in violation of the rules by having either participated in two invitational school tournaments or having participated on a non-school team during the season of the sport. It was moved by Engelhardt that the boy be declared ineligible as of the date of the second holiday tournament in which he participated, and that Devils Lake forfeit all games in which this boy participated after that date including games played and honors won in the State Hockey tournament. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Mr. Nyhus also brought to the attention of the Board the fact that St. Mary's High School of Devils Lake would be closing at the end of the present

school year, but would very likely be re-opening again next fall under the administration of a private corporation. He raised the question of the eligibility of students transferring to other schools from St. Mary's at the end of the current school year. It was moved by Muckenhirn that if the present St. Mary's High School discontinues at the end of the current term and a corporation takes over the operation of the school next year, that students presently attending St. Mary's would be immediately eligible in any North Dakota high school in which they might enroll at the beginning of the school year next fall. Seconded by Broton and carried.

Mr. Edward Lander of Grand Forks, President of the North Dakota School Boards Association, and Dr. Wayne Worner, Supt. of the Grand Forks schools, next appeared before the Board relative to prices for student tickets at regional basketball tournaments. It was their feeling that consideration should be given for establishing a lower admission fee for grade school students at those regional tournaments where seating is not a problem. Dr. Worner also asked the Board to consider hiring regional basketball officials from outside the region. No action was taken on these requests at this time.

Cliff Nygaard, Athletic Officer of the American Legion, next appeared and requested that the NDHSAA and the Legion work out an arrangement whereby both organizations would cooperatively sponsor umpire clinics each spring. It was his feeling that if high school baseball umpires and American Legion umpires would attend the same meetings both programs would be stronger and better umpires would be the end result. No action was taken.

The next item of business was a review of a report submitted by officials Roger Erickson and Elroy Berg of Cavalier, concerning the conduct of Stan Barta, St. Thomas basketball coach, at a game played at Adams. Letters from Supt. Melstad of St. Thomas and Supt. Nathan of Adams relative to the incident were also read. Chairman Maxwell also reported on his investigation of the incident. After considerable discussion, it was moved by Engelhardt that Mr. Barta appear before the Board to testify in his own behalf at the Minot meeting on March 21st. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The secretary next reported on present liability insurance coverage on the Association officers and staff, and the cost for adding personal injury liability coverages. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Spiss, the Board voted to add such coverage.

A letter from the Association's law firm concerning advisability of incorporation and a request for additional time for study on same was read. Upon motion by Spiss and second by Easton, the report was accepted.

The secretary next reported on a telephone call received from Supt. Wilz of Richardton informing the office concerning their violation of the by-law requiring the employment of a certified coach. Mr. Smith was instructed to investigate the matter further and act on the matter dependent upon the facts in connection therewith.

The Board next reviewed two eligibility cases, Bill Lowe of Valley City and James Diemert of LaMoure, under the hardship rule. Bill Lowe was declared immediately eligible under the rule and action on James Diemert was delayed until the meeting in Minot to allow time for filing of additional information on the case.

Del Easton reported on a recommendation to the Activities Assn. by the Secondary School Principals Assn. that no state activities be scheduled the last week in May, if possible. After some discussion, Spiss moved that the 1971 Girls State Track Meet be re-scheduled for May 29, 1971, and the Boys State Track Meet for May 31 and June 1, 1971. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

The assistant secretary next reported on a survey which he had conducted relative to the required attendance of coaches at rules clinics in other states. It was moved by Spiss that effective with the 1970-1971 school year, the head coaches from each school in the sports of football, basketball, wrestling, hockey, and girls gymnastics be required to attend the rules clinic sponsored by the NDHSAA each year in their sport, with the provision that substitutes could attend the meeting in place of the head coach in emergency situations providing permission for same is secured prior to the time of the clinic. Seconded by Larson and carried. Discussion followed as to penalty for violation of this rule, and it was agreed that the administrator of the school would have to write a letter of explanation for the first offense of non-compliance with the rule and appear before the Board in the case of a second violation.

Discussion followed concerning a non-sanctioned wrestling tournament held at Minot during the past season. It was moved by Peterson, and seconded by Quale that Duane Carlson be asked to appear before the Board at the meeting in Minot on March 21st to explain the case. Motion carried. Spiss then moved that a committee be set-up to study possible penalties and/or a fine system for schools or individuals that do not sanction events as required by the by-laws. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Recommendations of the wrestling coaches which had been made at separate meetings of the Class A and Class B coaches at the state wrestling tourney in Minot were presented to the Board, and in turn were referred to the wrestling advisory committee for study.

Discussion followed as to difficulties encountered by the office staff in determining whether or not schools are scheduling more than 15 wrestling matches under present regulations. Chairman Maxwell appointed Engelhardt, Chairman, Muckenhirn and McLain as a committee to study present regulations pertaining to basketball teams, out-of-season and in-season competition by track competitors, and limits on wrestling competition, and instructed the committee to present recommendations as to desired revisions and clarifications at the June meeting of the Board.

The secretary next reported on the use of the Minnesota modification of the hockey rule relative to 'offsides' by North Dakota schools and officials in the state hockey tournament, contrary to the previous ruling by the Board that the rule should be followed as written in the rule book. It was moved by Peterson that a letter be sent to schools and hockey officials expressing the displeasure of the Board concerning same, along with a warning as to possible penalties in case of future violation. Seconded by Spiss and carried.

The secretary explained problems encountered with post-season hockey competition, since hockey is not included in the list of sports governed by the post-season non-participation rule under Section III, b, Article XIII, of the by-laws. Since the by-laws provide that hockey regulations shall be made by the Board, it was moved by Larson that the same post-season rules that apply to wrestling, football and basketball be adopted for hockey. Seconded by Engel-

hardt and carried.

It was next pointed out that the Board had adopted a new rule limiting participants to two track meets per week effective this year, but had not prescribed the penalty for violation thereof. It was then moved by Spiss that the penalty be loss of points or medals won by the individual in the third meet, and ineligibility of that individual in the next scheduled track meet. Seconded by Larson and carried. Discussion followed as to whether the penalty should be ineligibility in the next scheduled qualifying meet, and Spiss then moved to amend the previous motion to so read. This motion was seconded by Peterson, but was defeated when voted upon.

The secretary next outlined a proposed summer weight-training program that was submitted by Minot High School. Discussion followed but no action was taken.

A request from Cleveland High School for transfer from music District V to District VI so that the music director who is employed at both Gackle and Cleveland could have both groups at the same site was next presented. Upon motion by Larson and second by Easton the request was approved.

The executive-secretary reported that the dates for the fall clinic for cheerleaders have been set and that Mr. Robert Shields of the National Cheerleaders Association would be the clinician.

Next under consideration were the salaries of the executive officers and upon recommendation of the salary committee it was agreed to offer the executive-secretary a \$1,000 increase in annual salary, Mr. Schindler an \$800 increase and Mr. Robinson a \$500 increase.

The Board next proceeded to organize itself for the 1970-71 fiscal year. Ell Kay Larson was elected president and August Spiss was named as vice-president effective July 1.

As there appeared to be no other business, the Board adjourned after setting the next meeting for 9:00 A.M. on March 21 at Minot, and selecting June 11th and 12th as the dates for the June meeting in Valley City, commencing at 1:00 P.M. on June 11th.

MINUTES

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Board of Directors Meeting

Minot, North Dakota -- March 21, 1970

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 9:00 A.M., March 21, 1970, at the Holiday Spot Motel in Minot with all members present except M. F. Peterson.

Supt. E. J. Hollinger and Coach Bachmeier of Glen Ullin appeared before the Board in connection with the complaint filed by the Dist. 29 committee at the March 13th meeting. Supt. Hollinger reported on the number of seasonal basketball games which they had scheduled, admitting that they had played 20 varsity games plus 2 additional games labeled as junior varsity games, in which 3 members of the varsity squad had been replaced by other players. He stated that he felt that there had been no violation of NDHSAA rules as the by-laws did not define varsity and junior varsity teams. It was also brought out that these two games were counted in district standings and had an effect on the seeding of some of the teams in the district. At the conclusion of the presentation of testimony, it was moved by Spiss that a second letter be sent to Glen Ullin backing up the decision previously made by the executive-secretary. Seconded by Engelhardt and carried.

Duane Carlson, Athletic Director of Minot High School, next appeared before the Board relative to their hosting an invitational wrestling meet which had not been sanctioned by the NDHSAA. Mr. Carlson stated that this had occurred because of a misunderstanding between himself and the coach, each one assuming that the other one had filed an application. It was moved by Muckenhirn that a letter of censure be sent to Mr. Carlson and the coach with a notation that responsibility for filing of sanction applications be definitely established by the school. Seconded by Larson and carried.

Mr. Carlson next reported on an AAU track meet held in Regina in February, stating that Minot High School did not attend the meet because of NDHSAA regulations pertaining to participation of individuals, but that other schools had permitted students to participate and had not lived up to the rules pertaining to such participation. He requested that all schools be made aware of the NDHSAA regulations and required to abide by same.

Supt. Melstad and Coach Stan Barta also met with the Board concerning the reported conduct of Mr. Barta at a basketball game played at Adams, and gave their side of the story. Mr. Barta testified that the charges relative to his use of profanity on the floor were true, and stated that this was caused by what he considered to be two mistakes by the officials. Considerable time was spent questioning Mr. Barta and in discussing the effect of such conduct on players and fans. It was moved by Spiss that a letter of reprimand be sent to Mr. Barta, with copies of same to the St. Thomas superintendent and school board, concerning his conduct at said contest, with a warning that continuance of actions of this type would lead to a recommendation by the NDHSAA to the Department of Public Instruction and the Professional Practices Committee that he no longer be permitted to coach activities sponsored by the NDHSAA. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The following recommendations were presented by August Spiss, Chairman of the Assets Policy Committee:

1. The maximum amount of liquid assets in the General Fund to be set at \$250,000. Anything in excess of this amount at the end of the fiscal year, shall be placed in a reserve fund and refunded to member schools in the form of a credit allowed on their next year's membership fee. The amount of said credit shall be established in proportion to the membership fee paid the previous year.
2. The maximum reserves in the ABF fund to be established at \$100,000.

Any excess above this amount at the end of the fiscal year is to be refunded to member schools in the form of a credit on their next year's premium. The amount of said credit per school shall be established in proportion to the premium paid the previous year.

Upon motion by Spiss and second by Muckenhirn, the above recommendations were adopted.

A letter from Ed Kolpack of the Fargo Forum in regard to facilities furnished the press at the State Class A tournament was reviewed. It was the feeling of the Board that this was a matter which should be taken up with the tourney manager and manager of the Civic Center.

Ell Kay Larson next reported on recommendations made by the Class B district chairmen at their meeting on Friday. Action on same was deferred to the June meeting of the Board.

Mr. Muckenhirn reported that the Speech Committee had studied the recommendations proposed by the Speech Advisory Committee changing the Class A program and that it was the feeling of the committee that the programs offered, the philosophy thereof, and the mechanics of operation in Class A and Class B should be similar in nature. It was then moved by Spiss that an administrative representative and a representative of the speech teachers from each of the 10 Class B speech districts and each of the 4 Class A regions meet with the Speech Advisory Committee and the Board Speech Committee prior to the June meeting of the Board to draw-up recommendations pertaining to revisions in the state speech program.

Additional information which had been received on the eligibility case of James Diemert of LaMoure was next reviewed. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the boy be declared immediately eligible under the hardship rule. Seconded by Larson and carried.

Next under consideration was the eligibility status of Greg Tveter of Maddock. Upon motion by Larson and second by Quale, the boy was ruled immediately eligible under the hardship rule.

Discussion followed relative to expenses in connection with the operation of a sand greens golf tournament and upon motion by Larson and second by Broton, managers fees were set at \$25.00, plus \$50.00 for additional expenses, for the regional and state sand tourneys.

Muckenhirn next moved that the following regulations and penalties pertaining to officials be adopted and published in the Officials Directory each year:

Regulations and Penalties for Officials

Pursuant to Article X, Section II, of the NDHSAA Constitution and By-laws, the following rules and regulations pertaining to officials shall be in effect. Violation of any of the following could result in disciplinary action by the executive-secretary of the NDHSAA up to and including immediate suspension of the official.

1. The NDHSAA will have sole jurisdiction over who shall become members of the North Dakota Officials Association by registration through

the NDHSAA.

2. To be eligible to register as an official with the NDHSAA, the applicant must be at least 17 years of age and not a student in high school.
3. Each individual official who officiates a game or match for a member school of the NDHSAA must be currently registered and currently eligible in the sport in which he is officiating. The sports which require registered officials are: football, basketball, wrestling, hockey, girls gymnastics, and baseball.
4. Officials in the sports of football, basketball, wrestling, and girls gymnastics must each year attend a NDHSAA rules clinic and take the required test in each of the above sports in which he is registered. This requirement may be waived by the executive-secretary in case of an emergency.
5. No official may violate or cancel any contract with a member school unless by mutual agreement between the official and the school.
6. Officials registered with the NDHSAA shall not officiate at any bowl, all-star or charity type out-of-season contest held during the school term or the summer vacation period involving persons who were members of a high school team the previous year.
7. Registered officials may not officiate with an unregistered individual unless emergency approval has been given by the executive-secretary.
8. An applicant's registration fees must have been received by the NDHSAA and a membership card issued before the applicant is a registered official.
9. The registration period begins July 1st of each year and terminates on June 31st of the following year.
10. Officials must renew their registration prior to August 1st of each year or pay the penalty charge for late registration.
11. Deadline dates will be in force for all sports and are listed in the Officials Directory. Applicants will not be allowed to register after the deadline unless a shortage of officials in a particular sport exists in which case the executive-secretary can take emergency measures.
12. Officials must wear the prescribed uniform as outlined in the Officials Directory. The prescribed patches and emblems must be worn properly on the uniform.
13. Officials may not appear at the game site under the influence of alcoholic beverage, including beer, or under the influence of drugs or with the odor of alcoholic beverages, including beer, on their breath.
14. Officials may not pursue a course of action which is detrimental to the welfare of the NDHSAA or the members thereof.
15. Registration of an applicant may be denied for any reason for which disciplinary action would be authorized against him if he were a registered official.

16. Officials may not charge more for their services than the maximum recommended officiating fees schedule as adopted by the Board of Directors of the NDHSAA.
17. Any appeal of punishment administered by the executive-secretary of the NDHSAA may be appealed to the Executive Board of the North Dakota Officials Association through the secretary of the North Dakota Officials Association.

Officials Uniforms

Uniforms: The following uniforms will be worn by North Dakota officials working games or matches for member schools of the NDHSAA. It should be understood that when two different types of shirts, etc., could be worn, that all members of the crew should be dressed the same.

Football: Black and white vertically striped long or short sleeved shirt. White knickers with short overlap below the knee. Solid black stockings, white sox outside black stockings. Black shoes, black strings, black baseball cap with white piping, black leather belt at least one inch wide. Black and white vertically striped jacket, if jacket is worn. Shirts worn by crew to be similar.

Basketball: Black and white vertically striped shirt with short sleeves. Black trousers, primarily black shoes and black laces, black belt. Jackets, if worn, should be uniform also.

Wrestling: Black and white vertically striped short sleeved shirt. Black trousers, black gym shoes and black belt.

Hockey: Black and white vertically striped long sleeved shirt. Black trousers and black skates, black laces and black belt.

Baseball: Dark blue or black suit, umpires cap, baseball shoes or black oxfords with golf type cleats or ripple soles. When coat is worn it should be with a white shirt and black tie or dark blue shirt without tie. A dark blue shirt is recommended when a coat is not worn. A black belt should be worn.

Gymnastics: Men: White shirt, open at collar, dark trousers and black belt. Women: White blouse, dark skirt.

The North Dakota Officials Association patch (for current year) shall be worn on left shoulder of shirt about 1½ inches down from the left shoulder seam. The National Federation patch (for Master, Certified, and Approved Officials) shall be worn on the left front pocket of their officials shirt.

The motion was seconded by Spiss and carried.

Discussion followed on the proposal submitted by Mr. Cliff Nygaard at the meeting on March 13 relative to joint clinics for American Legion and NDHSAA baseball umpires. It was moved by McLain that the executive officers work out an arrangement with Mr. Nygaard for joint clinics in 1971, with each group retaining their identity. Seconded by Broton and carried.

Chairman Maxwell appointed Engelhardt (chairman), McLain and Spiss on the officials committee, and instructed the secretary of the NDOA to have the North Dakota Officials Board meet at Valley City approximately one week prior to the June Board meeting to draw-up recommendations for 1971 tourney officials for presentation to the Board committee.

Consideration was next given to a request that ABF coverage be expanded to cover migrant summer school programs. Larson moved that such coverage be provided for schools requesting same. Seconded by Broton and carried.

The secretary informed the Board that the TV contract for telecasting of the State Class A basketball tournament had one year left to run, whereas the contract for the State Class B tournament had expired, and that the North Dakota Broadcasting Company would like to appear at the June meeting to negotiate a new contract for both tournaments. It was moved by Spiss to advertise for bids for the 1971 State Class B Basketball tourney only and that an advertisement for bids for both tournaments again be made in 1971. Seconded by McLain and carried. Larson and Smith were appointed to the TV committee by Chairman Maxwell.

A petition from Forbes High School for transfer from District 17 to District 3 in the new basketball alignment was read. It was moved by Larson that the request be denied since it was not presented during the time allotted for such petition. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Richard Schindler was named as Assistant Secretary and Rex Robinson as Assistant to the Secretary effective July 1. Salary offers for the executive officers for 1970-1971 were brought up again for reconsideration and amended, providing for increases of \$1,500 for the executive secretary, \$1,200 for the assistant secretary and \$800 for the assistant to the secretary.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Valley City - June 11, 12, 1970 -

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in the Association office building at 1:00 P.M. on June 11th with all members present except M. F. Peterson. Each member of the Board was furnished with a complete financial report of the business to date, a financial report of the receipts and disbursements of the accident benefit fund to date, and an agenda for the meeting. Upon motion by Spiss and second by Muckenhirn, the financial reports were accepted as submitted. Spiss then moved that the executive-secretary contact the bank requesting dispensation of the service charge being levied. Seconded by Engelhardt and carried.

The secretary next reported that a poll of member schools indicated that Class A schools were in favor of the present policy of having only the host school band or a band from the host city perform at state basketball tournaments by a margin of 28 to 4, and Class B schools also favored the policy by a vote of 138 to 63. In light of the results of the poll, Muckenhirn moved that the present policy be continued, seconded by Engelhardt and carried.

The secretary next reported that a mail poll of the Board had indicated that the majority of the members felt that the summer gymnastics program proposed by the Fargo Public Schools would not be in violation of Association regulations, and he had therefore notified the Fargo schools of same.

Delegations from Bismarck, Minot, Grand Forks, Fargo, Mohall and Garrison next appeared before the Board extending invitations for hosting various Association sponsored activities. Action on same was deferred until the next day, in order that all written invitations received might also be reviewed and given consideration.

The secretary reported that investigation had proven that the coach at Richardson was a properly certified teacher, so no action had been necessary relative to same.

The Board next considered the request submitted by Mr. Lander and Dr. Worner of Grand Forks at the March meeting for establishment of a lower ticket admission price for grade school youngsters at regional basketball tournaments. Larson moved that the present ticket admission division be retained, seconded by McLain and carried.

The Board next took under consideration the question of an additional mileage allowance to participating teams in the boys state tennis tournament which had to return to Valley City again for completion of the tournament because of interruption due to rain on the scheduled date. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the mileage allowance be doubled for those teams who had to make two trips, seconded by Spiss and carried. Discussion followed as to the disposition of balls purchased for the tourney and it was decided to give these to the host school.

Next under consideration was the track violation by Shanley High School and the penalty administered by the executive officers based upon action that had been taken by the Board on similar cases previously. No further action was deemed necessary.

The Board next reviewed a report on a junior high track violation by Napoleon. Inasmuch as the points won by the boy in violation had been taken away and since he had been withheld from the next meet, no further action was deemed necessary.

It was moved by Spiss, seconded by Broton and carried, that the wording of item No. 17 of the Regulations and Penalties for Officials as adopted in the March meeting be amended to read as follows:

"Penalties administered by the executive secretary of the NDHSAA may be appealed to the Board of Directors of said organization."

A request from the coaches of the North Central Hockey Conference for modification of the offsides rule to permit an attacking team to straddle the

blue line was next presented. As it appears that this change has already been approved for 1970-71 by the National Rules Committee, it was moved by Engelhardt that the matter be tabled, seconded by McLain and carried.

A request from music district IV for the addition of a chamber group to the district music festival was next taken under consideration. The matter had previously been presented to the Music Advisory Committee, and it was their recommendation that action be deferred until the Music Educators organization had considered same, so action on same was deferred pending receipt of this group's recommendation.

The following recommendations of the Music Advisory Committee were adopted:

- 1) That the policy of not requiring memorization of instrumental solos be continued.
- 2) That the Board seek another site for the state festival where better facilities might be available.

The report of the Speech Advisory Committee was next reviewed. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Quale the following recommendations were approved:

- 1) That the Class A event be run by the NDHSAA instead of the system used the past few years.
- 2) Contestants participate in two rounds of competition with those receiving highest ranking participating in a third round.
- 3) The top 4 contestants in each category be ranked 1, 2, 3, and 4 at the district level and the top 3 at the state level. All other contestants ranked as 5 on district level and 4 on state level. In the Class A division the top 4 ranking students at the district level qualify for the state contest. In Class B districts, 1 contestant for each 8 entries or fraction thereof, shall qualify for state competition.
- 4) The one-act plays ranked as number 1 and 2 from each Class A division shall advance to the state contest, and one play for each 8 entries or fractions thereof in Class B district competition.
- 5) Medals are to be furnished by the NDHSAA to the top 4 contestants in the individual events in district competition and to the best actor and actress in the one-act play competition. Small trophies are to be awarded schools for first and second place in the one-act play competition.
- 6) The top 3 winners in all events at the state level shall be awarded trophies similar to those awarded individuals winners in track and wrestling.
- 7) The 3 schools scoring the most points at the state contest to be awarded 1st, 2nd, 3rd place trophies.
- 8) Separate state contests to be held for Class A and Class B, with contests to be held at Fargo North on two consecutive days.
- 9) Two new divisions, extemporaneous interpretation, and after-dinner speaking, to be added to the list of events.

- 10) Entry fees to be raised on the district level to \$2.00 for individual entries and \$5.00 for one-act plays.
- 11) Regional meetings to be held to acquaint schools with the new speech program.

Recommendations of the Class B basketball district chairmen were next reviewed by the Board. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Larson, pairings of teams in regional and state basketball tournaments were set up on a rotational basis instead of by lot as in the past.

The Board next reviewed salaries being paid office personnel and voted an increase of \$35.00 per month to Mrs. Lucile Vandestreek, bookkeeper, and Mrs. Ethel Thvedt, secretary, effective July 1, 1970.

The Board then recessed and reconvened at 9:00 A.M. Friday, June 12th, with all members present again except M. F. Peterson.

The first order of business on Friday was a review of the recommendations of the Wrestling Advisory Committee. It was moved by Larson that the State Class B and Class A tourney be held at one site next year, and that a poll of participating schools be made as to their desires for the school year 1971-72. The motion was seconded by Muckenhirn, but failed when put to vote. Muckenhirn then moved that the State A and B tourneys be held at different sites but on the same dates in 1971, and that the tournaments be held one week apart in 1972, and that 3 boys qualify for the state tourney from each region in each weight class, with pairings set so that the No. 1 wrestlers from the various regions would not meet each other in first round matches, but rather 1st would be paired against 2nd and 3rd, and 2nd against 3rd, so that each of the 12 boys in the various weight classes would have equal opportunity to have a match the first round and be able to score advancements points. The motion was seconded by Spiss and carried. The following additional recommendations of the Wrestling Advisory Committee were also adopted by the Board:

- 1) Weight classes for the 1970-1971 season be established as follows: 98, 105, 112, 119, 126, 132, 138, 145, 155, 167, 180, heavyweight. When North Dakota schools wrestle against a school from another state following the national weight classes, the 180 pound wrestler may wrestle at 185 pounds and still remain certified at 180.
- 2) Schools be permitted to schedule 15 meets exclusive of NDHSAA sponsored meets, of which 6 may be multi-meets consisting of 3 or more schools.
- 3) To recommend that all coaches exchange weight certification sheets prior to each match and that a copy of the certification sheet be sent to managers of each invitational tourney to be attended.
- 4) To recommend that a visual scoring device be provided and used at all duals and invitational tournaments.

It was moved by Muckenhirn that no high school wrestler be allowed to practice at college facilities against college wrestlers and that high school wrestlers be allowed to work out at college facilities only when the entire team has a regular practice scheduled at the college and then the practice must be with the high school team only. The motion was seconded by Larson but was defeated when put to vote.

The Board next reviewed the recommendations of the Girls Gymnastic Committee and adopted the following recommendations:

- 1) Five entrants per school be allowed in each event, if at least one is entered in the all-around. Only 4 entrants permitted if none are entered in all-around.
- 2) All-around events to be counted towards determining team championship.
- 3) Individual awards also be given for 4th and 5th place at state tourney.
- 4) State meet be held at Jamestown or Fargo.
- 5) Gymnastic clinics be held at Jamestown, Minot, Fargo, Grand Forks, and Bismarck or Mandan, with Dolores Paulson as conductor.

The opening date for girls gymnastic practice was set for October 12, 1970.

Next under consideration were the recommendations of the Girls Track Advisory Committee. Upon motion by Broton and second by Quale the following recommendations were adopted:

- 1) Separate A and B divisions be run in 1971, with qualifying districts to be established following the same boundary lines as the boys districts.
- 2) Minimum standards for qualifying be modified as follows:
 - a. 440 yard dash — 67.0 sec.
 - b. 880 yard run — 2 min., 40 sec.
 - c. high jump — 4 ft., 9 in.
 - d. 440 yard relay — Class A — 54 sec.
Class B — 55 sec.
 - e. 880 yard relay — Class A — 1 min., 58 sec.
Class B — 1 min., 59 sec.
 - f. 880 yard medley relay — Class A — 2 min., 3 sec.
Class B — 2 min., 4 sec.
- 3) State meet manager supply 2 shots and 2 softballs for all competitors to use at state meet.

Some time was spent discussing regulations pertaining to individual events and limitations in various athletic sports in the junior high by-laws. It was moved by Muckenhirn that an amendment be submitted to the General Assembly at the October meeting removing these regulations from the by-laws, thereby granting the Board authority to establish regulations pertaining to same and that the emergency clause be attached thereto so that these regulations might become effective for the 1970-71 season if the amendment passes. Seconded by Quale and carried.

Recommendations of the Boys Track Advisory Committee were reviewed and upon motion by Broton and second by Easton the following were adopted:

- 1) A doctor to be present at the state meet.
- 2) Only 6 teams be permitted to qualify for the finals of the 880 yard relay at the state meet.
- 3) Two mile run to be added to list of events on a one year trial basis,

with this event to be contested following the mile relay at the district meets and at 1:00 P.M. on the second day of the state meet. Minimum qualifying time for this event to be 10 min., 30 sec.

- 4) Minimum standards for Class B relay events to be modified as follows:
 - a. 440 yard relay — 47.0 sec.
 - b. 880 yard relay — 1 min., 37 sec.
 - c. Mile relay — 3 min., 39 sec.
- 5) If less than 5 contestants cannot make the starting height of the pole vault and high jump at district meets, they be allowed to compete for medals following the completion of the events with no points to be awarded.

It was moved by Spiss that the penalty for violation of one of the track regulations will be ineligibility of the boy for the next scheduled meet and if the violation occurs at the district meet the contestant cannot qualify for the state meet, but could participate if he had previously qualified by minimum standards, and points and medals won by said contestant in a meet in which the violation occurred would have to be forfeited. Seconded by Broton and carried.

Recommendations relative to the cross country meet were next reviewed and upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Easton the date for the state meet was changed from October 31st to October 24th, the number of entries permitted was increased to 8 per school, and individual awards at the state meet increased from 7 to 10 in each class.

Discussion followed on the sand greens golf program. It was decided to continue holding 2 regional meets and that only the 6 qualifying singles entries at each regional meet would be eligible for the singles championship at the state meet.

The Board next reviewed recommendations of the Officials Assn. and the Officials Committee relative to tournament assignments for next year. Upon motion by Engelhardt and second by McLain, the following officials were to be tendered contracts for the 1971 basketball tournaments:

Discussion followed relative to officials fees for preliminary basketball games. It was moved by Broton and seconded by Easton that this matter be tabled until the August meeting. Motion carried.

Recommendations of the Outside Competition Committee were next reviewed and upon motion by Easton and second by Broton the following items were adopted:

- 1) In basketball, each individual player is limited to participating 20 nights or 18 nights plus one invitational tournament with the seasonal limits of 80 quarters and no more than 5 quarters per night to remain in effect.
- 2) Track and gymnastic competitors may not compete on any other than a school team nor as unattached individuals in non-school meets during the school season for that sport. Participation on non-school teams or as unattached individuals in non-school meets during the season of the sport results in loss of eligibility in that sport for the remainder of the sport season.
- 3) Post-season participation in gymnastics and hockey as well as football, basketball and wrestling, results in loss of eligibility in other sports for the remainder of the season.
- 4) The use of school facilities for summer recreation programs operated by the city or park board is permissible.
- 5) Summer weight lifting training programs are permissible.

Easton moved that school teams be prohibited during the summer months but that students be permitted to participate as individuals or as members of non-school teams in all sports except football, and that high school coaches be permitted to coach such teams. Seconded by Broton and carried.

The executive secretary recommended that a study of the entire ABF program be made during the coming school year. Action on same was deferred to the August meeting.

A communique was presented from the executive secretary of the school administrators organization relative to conflict in meeting time of the Board of Directors of that organization and the NDHSAA Board of Directors at the time of the annual meeting of the NDASA and the NDEA meeting, since several members serve on both boards. It was moved by Spiss that the time of the January Board meeting be changed to the Saturday prior to the NDASA convention and that the meeting time at the NDEA convention be left as before. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

After reviewing all invitations that had been extended, the following

sites were selected for NDHSAA sponsored events for the 1970-1971 school year:

Some time was spent discussing plans for attendance at the National Federation meeting in July. Since delegates Larson and Peterson, who had earlier been selected as delegates, would not be able to attend, Easton was added as a third alternate in case either of the two original alternates could not go.

The Board next reviewed the report submitted by Mr. Ubbelholde, manager of the state debate tournament. Mr. Ubbelholde had incurred a personal debt of \$160.50 for food services, because of schools failing to show up for meals which they had previously ordered. It was moved by Muckenhirn that Mr. Ubbelholde be reimbursed for this amount and that hereafter arrangement for meals be left to each individual school. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Two ABF claims were next taken under review. The Board reconfirmed their previous action of no further allowance on the claim for Debra Motschenbacher of Fargo, because of the time elapsed between the date of original injury and treatment which exceeded the one year allowable period. The claim for Jeff Burich of Belfield was disallowed for the same reason.

The Board accepted the resignation of A. A. Engelhardt who was no longer qualified to serve as a member of the Board of Directors because of having accepted other employment and appointed Supt. Casper Kourajian of Medina to serve in his place until the next general election.

Letters from Crosby and Stanley requesting reclassification as B schools were presented. The Board approved both requests effective as of September 1972 per provisions outlined in the by-laws.

As there appeared to be no other business, the Board adjourned after setting August 20 and 21 as the dates for their final summer meeting.

MINUTES

ANNUAL MEETING — N.D.H.S.A.A.

October 16, 1969 — Minot, North Dakota

The annual meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held in the Augustana Lutheran Church at Minot, North Dakota on October 16, 1969 at 3:00 P.M. Following an address on "Sportscasting Is A Business?" by Jim Adelson, Sports Director of KXJB-TV of Fargo, the business meeting was called to order by Chairman Maxwell at 4:00 P.M.

It was moved by Bart Thompson of Valley City and seconded by N. W. Cummings of Oakes that inasmuch as all members had copies of the last meeting in the Annual Handbook, the reading of these minutes be waived. Motion carried.

Don Kolbo of Mohall presented a report on the National Federation meeting held in Las Vegas last July.

The report of the nominating committee (consisting of Supt. Leon Olson of Williston, Supt. G. I. Sholy of Wahpeton and Supt. J. Rindt of New Rockford) was presented by Olson submitting the following names for the two vacancies on the Board of Directors:

Nominations were then called for from the floor. There were no other nominations, so it was moved by Thompson of Valley City and seconded by Solberg of Beulah that nominations cease and that the report of the nominating committee be adopted. Motion carried.

Dave Vollak of Dickinson presented arguments in favor of amending the junior high by-law pertaining to the age limit of 8th graders on junior high teams. After some discussion, it was moved by Larson of Munich and seconded by Muckenhirn of Larimore that the by-law be amended to read as follows:

"A ninth grade student shall not be eligible to compete in the junior high division on or after the day on which the seventeenth anniversary of his birth occurs; a seventh and eighth grader on or after the day of his sixteenth birthday."

After further discussion, and a ruling that the question could not be voted on as it had not been previously presented to the membership at least 30 days prior to the meeting, the motion was withdrawn with the understanding that the

Dickinson school authorities would draw up a proposed amendment and that a special meeting be held at the time of the School Administrators Conference in January for consideration of same after proper notice had been made to the membership.

The executive-secretary reported on a meeting which had been held with Attorney Michaels of the Sales Tax Department, and enumerated items running through a school's activity fund account which would be and those which would not be subject to sales tax, if said monies were not deposited in the school district general fund.

Mr. Tieghe of Minot spoke briefly on the problem concerning the scheduling of football games on the week-end of the NDEA Convention.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Ray Albrecht stated he felt that the actual selection should be made when the Officials Board is in session in June. The Board again discussed the problem of finding a suitable location for displaying the bronzed photos of the Hall of Fame members. It was suggested that Ray Albrecht and Jerry Balzer attempt to secure permission to put them in the new Bismarck Civic Auditorium.

Motion by Jerry Balzer that all officials officiating in Association-sponsored activities must register as an official through the NDHSAA. Seconded by Jack Brown and carried.

Motion by Bill Galloway that the Officials Executive Board be given complete control of the selection of officials for the state sponsored basketball tournaments and also control of the establishment and enforcement of regulations pertaining to membership in the NDOA. Seconded by Jack Brown and carried.

Motion by Ray Albrecht to change recommended maximum officiating fees from \$17.50 to \$20.00 per official in Class A football, basketball, wrestling, and hockey, and to raise recommended mileage fee to 10¢ per mile. Seconded by Jack Brown, deferred until annual meeting.

Board of Directors Meeting

Bismarck — March 12, 1970 — 11:00 A.M.

Bill Galloway called the meeting to order with all members of the Board present except Gerald Balzer.

The group spent considerable time trying to determine what regulations and penalties should be adopted by the Officials Association. Upon motion by Albrecht and second by Parker, the following regulations and uniform were adopted:

REGULATIONS AND PENALTIES FOR OFFICIALS

Pursuant to Article X, Section II, of the North Dakota High School Activities Assn. Constitution and By-laws, the following rules and regulations pertaining to officials shall be in effect. Violation of any of the following could result in disciplinary action by the executive secretary of the NDHSAA up to and including immediate suspension of the official.

1. The NDHSAA will have sole jurisdiction over who shall become members of the North Dakota Officials Association by registration through the NDHSAA.
2. To be eligible to register as an official with the NDHSAA, the applicant must be at least 17 years of age or older and not a student in high school.
3. Each individual official who officiates a game or match for a member school of the NDHSAA must be currently registered and currently eligible in the sport in which he is officiating. The sports which require registered officials are: football, basketball, wrestling, hockey, girls gymnastics, and baseball.
4. Officials in the sports of football, basketball, wrestling and girls gymnastics must each year attend a NDHSAA rules clinic and take the required test in each of the above sports in which he is registered. Emergency approval may be given by the executive secretary for failure to comply with above.

5. No official may violate or cancel any contract with a member school unless by mutual agreement between the official and the school.
6. Officials registered with the NDHSAA shall not officiate at any bowl, all-star, or charity type out-of-season contest held during the school term or the summer vacation period involving persons who were members of a high school team the previous year.
7. Registered officials may not officiate with an unregistered individual unless emergency approval has been given by the executive secretary.
8. An applicant's registration fees must have been received by the NDHSAA and a membership card issued before the applicant is a registered official.
9. The registration period begins July 1st of each year and terminates on June 30th the following year.
10. Officials must renew their registration prior to August 1st of each year or pay the penalty charge for late registration.
11. Deadline dates will be in force for all sports and are listed in the Officials Directory. Applicants will not be allowed to register after the deadline unless a shortage of officials in a particular sport exists in which case the executive secretary can take emergency measures.
12. Officials must wear the prescribed uniform as outlined in the Officials Directory. The prescribed patches and emblems must be worn properly on the uniform.
13. Officials may not appear at the game site under the influence of alcoholic beverage, including beer, or under the influence of drugs or with the odor of alcoholic beverages, including beer, on their breath.
14. Officials may not pursue a course of action which is detrimental to the welfare of the NDHSAA or the members thereof.
15. Registration of an applicant may be denied for any reason for which disciplinary action would be authorized against him if he were a registered official.
16. Officials may not charge more for their services than the maximum recommended officiating fees schedule as adopted by the Board of Directors of the NDHSAA.
17. Any appeal of punishment administered by the executive secretary of the NDHSAA may be appealed to the executive board of the N. D. Officials Assn. through the secretary of the N. D. Officials Assn.

OFFICIALS UNIFORMS

The following uniforms will be worn by North Dakota officials working games or matches for member schools of the NDHSAA. It should be understood that when two different types of shirts, etc., could be worn that all members of the crew should be dressed the same.

Football: Black and white vertically striped long or short sleeve shirt. White knickers with short overlap below the knee. Solid black stockings, white socks outside black stockings. Black shoes, black strings, black baseball cap with white piping, black leather belt at least one inch wide. Black and white vertically striped jacket if jacket is worn. Shirts worn by crew to be similar.

Basketball: Black and white vertically striped shirt with short sleeves. Black trousers, primarily black shoes and black laces, black belt. Jackets, if worn, should be uniform also.

Wrestling: Black and white vertically striped short sleeve shirt. Black trousers, black gym shoes and black belt.

Hockey: Black and white vertically striped long sleeve shirt. Black trousers and black skates, black laces, black belt.

Baseball: Dark blue or black suit, umpires cap, baseball shoes or black oxfords with golf type cleats or ripple soles. When coat is worn it should be with a white shirt and black tie or dark blue shirt without tie. A dark blue shirt is recommended when a coat is not worn. A black belt should be worn.

Gymnastics: Men: White shirt, open at collar, dark trousers, and black belt.
Women: White blouse, dark skirt.

The North Dakota Officials Association patch (for current year) shall be worn on left shoulder of shirt about 1½ inches down from the left shoulder seam.

The National Federation patch (for Master, Certified, and Approved officials) shall be worn on the left front pocket of their officials shirt.

Motion by Brown that if the Class A Regions want 4 officials they should be allowed to use 4 in their 1972 tournaments. Second by Parker and carried.

Motion by Albrecht that all Class A Regional officials not have any conflicting contracts on the dates of the regional tournament. Second by Brown and carried.

The Board of Directors gave a vote of thanks to Ray Albrecht and Gerald Balzer for the work they had done in regard to getting the "Hall of Fame" plaques hung in the new Bismarck Civic Center.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Motion by Brown to use 4 officials at the Class B Regions during the 1970-71 season. Seconded by Balzer and carried.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned so that the Board members could work on their recommendations for the various state-sponsored basketball tournament officials for the 1970-71 season.

Motion by Russ Burfening to recommend to Class A schools that they attempt to use four officials in football. Second by George Hill and carried.

Herb Parker discussed the possibility of the Executive Board of the NDOA being given the power to set standards and regulations and penalties for violations of these regulations by NDOA members.

Motion by Jack Brown that the Board of Directors of the NDOA be given the power to formulate rules and regulations and prescribe penalties for violations of such regulations. Second by Paul Gravel and carried.

Motion by Ray Albrecht that all gymnastic officials working Association-sponsored gymnastic tournaments and meets must register as a gymnastic official with the NDHSAA. Second by Bill Galloway and carried.

Roger Gebhart brought up the question of not being in agreement with the present method of obtaining rating from schools. He stated that since he works in Minnesota for many games he does not get sufficient ratings turned in, he also felt the rating should be sent in each week. Dick Schindler stated that Minnesota schools would be furnished rating sheets upon request.

Nominations were in order for a representative from the Southeast district. Jack Brown was nominated to succeed himself, and was duly elected by members present from the Southeast district.

Nominations were in order for a representative from the Southwest district. Ray Albrecht was nominated to succeed himself and was duly elected by members of the Southwest district.

Moved by Paul Gravel and seconded by Orville Iwen to adjourn.

Following the meeting the Board of Directors met to reorganize. Bill Galloway and Jack Brown were named President and Vice-president respectively for the coming year.


