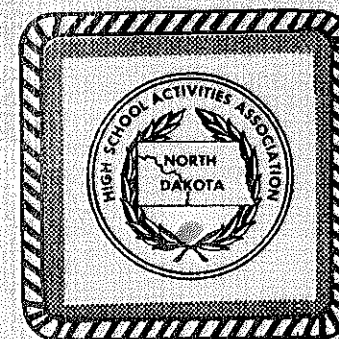

FOREWORD

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is pleased to present the 47th Annual Handbook which contains a historical and statistical account of this year's operations. This year, for the first time, pictures of championship teams are included in the Handbook.

Attention is called to events and happenings which were new this past year and to certain trends and developments that have taken place.

1. Membership in the Association dropped from 279 to 274 this past year and is now 109 less than the peak enrollment of 383 schools in the mid-fifties. The closing of schools because of reorganization and annexation has slowed down somewhat from the rate established in the sixties, but we can still look forward to a further reduction in membership in the years ahead as 51 of our schools have less than 50 students enrolled in grades 9-12.

2. Membership fees were waived this past year for the first time in the history of the organization — this was done in accordance with the policy established by the Board of Directors in setting a maximum reserve that the Association would accumulate. Subsidization of non-or-low-revenue-producing sports was also materially increased in line with said policy.

3. Regional meetings to acquaint the membership with revised rules and regulations were held for the second year during the month of September. These meetings have proven to be quite popular and so will most likely become an annual affair.

4. The membership voted 6-to-1 to retain the present two-class system at the annual meeting in October, and also amended the by-laws to permit two basketball scrimmages between schools prior to the date of the first scheduled game. Amendments to the junior high by-laws pertaining to track and wrestling were also approved, allowing for greater flexibility in this program.

5. Head coaches in major sports were required to attend rules clinics for the first time this past year. Heretofore, only officials were required to do so. We believe that the attendance of both coaches and officials at these clinics will result in a better understanding of the rules and a more harmonious relationship between the two groups.

6. A series of four cheerleader clinics was conducted in the fall of 1970. These clinics remain very popular as nearly 1,700 cheerleaders attended the session, breaking the old attendance record by more than 300.

7. Girls golf was changed from a spring to a fall sport and, as a result, several new schools entered teams in this activity.

8. Probably never have we had two more thrilling final games in the same year in our Class A and B State Basketball Tournaments, with the Class A final being won in the last second of the game and the Class B affair going into overtime.

9. Basketball and hockey remain as the only two activities sponsored by the Association which are self-supporting. All other sports and activity programs are subsidized from income realized from these two sources.

10. Net proceeds from basketball tournaments set a new record again this year, exceeding the former record established in 1970 by slightly more than \$1,300.00.

11. Because of continued development of the wrestling program, the A and B tournaments were held at different sites this past year. This coming year these events will be held on different dates as well to allow fans to attend both Meets.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Valley City, North Dakota - August 20, 21, 1970

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Valley City, North Dakota, on August 20th and 21st with all members present except G. F. Muckenhirn on Thursday morning and August Spiss on August 21st.

The reading of the minutes of the previous session was waived as each Board member had been presented with a copy of these minutes.

The first order of business was a review of the annual audit of the Association for the 1969-1970 fiscal year as prepared by R. B. Ludvigson, Certified Public Accountant of Valley City. As Mr. Ludvigson was out of the city, the report was presented by the executive secretary, F. U. Smith. Mr. Smith explained that ceilings on reserves had been reached in both the General and ABF funds, and that \$21,894.87 was available for refund to member schools. It was moved by Spiss that the audit be accepted as presented, seconded by Broton and carried.

The Board next examined the complete financial report of the operation of the Association from July 1, 1970 to August 15, 1970. Upon motion by Spiss and second by Anderson, the report was approved.

August Spiss reported on behalf of the ABF Committee pointing out that during the fiscal year 1969-1970 approximately \$10,000.00 more had been paid out for claims than in the previous year, and that a corresponding increase this coming year would result in the fund about breaking even. It was the feeling of the committee that member schools should again be surveyed as to their wishes relative to continuing the same type of program for 1971-1972 after explaining possible modifications or other types of coverage available at regional meetings. It was moved by Spiss that such a survey be made by the office staff and that a report thereof be made at the January meeting of the Board. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Association Attorney L. T. Sproul and Associate Dean Lenaburg appeared before the Board and outlined advantages and disadvantages of incorporating by the Association with a recommendation that incorporation not be undertaken for the present, but that maximum liability insurance coverage be carried on Board members and officers. It was moved by Peterson and seconded by Quale to adopt said recommendation. Motion carried.

The executive secretary reported that membership dues for member high schools had been waived for the 1970-1971 school year in line with the policies adopted by the Board in their March meeting concerning maximum liquid assets, and that this would amount to a refund of approximately \$15,000.00 to said schools. He also recommended the following proposals for the 1970-1971 school year:

1. Entry fees for track, cross-country, wrestling, gymnastics, tennis, golf, and baseball be suspended.

12. Separate A and B divisions were also held in girls track this spring. This sport has found great favor among the member schools and is by far the major girls sport in our state.

13. The speech program was completely revamped this past year, returning to a contest rather than a festival-type program. Regional meetings were conducted throughout the state to acquaint speech teachers with the new program.

14. This past year saw a tightening of regulations regarding the participation of students in non-school activities during the school year, and a loosening of some during the summer vacation.

15. The number of children covered under the ABF program has shown a slight decrease each of the past three years. The number of claims paid this past year was nearly identical to that in 1969-70, but the total amount paid was approximately \$10,000.00 less, though equaling the amount paid out two years ago.

16. A questionnaire was submitted to the membership last fall concerning the desirability of continuing the ABF plan, and 86% of those responding voted in favor of doing so. As a result of this poll, schools are being given a choice of two ABF plans for the coming year.

As the books are closed for the year, we are mindful of the excellent cooperation and assistance given this office by the many school administrators, coaches and others who have given willingly of their time and talents that the Association program could be accomplished. The Board of Directors and the office personnel together express their sincere appreciation for your help in making 1970-71 another excellent year.

2. A revised expense allowance of 50¢ per one-way mile and \$100.00 per day for teams participating in the state hockey tournament, using the same formula as used in basketball governing number of days and home team allowances, with the participating teams and the Association continuing to share net profits on a 50-50 basis.
 3. That teams be allowed \$10.00 per participant in addition to mileage for the state wrestling tournament.
 4. That teams be allowed \$5.00 per participant in addition to mileage for the boys and girls state track meets.
 5. That teams be allowed mileage and \$5.00 per participant at the state girls gymnastic meet.
 6. That teams be allowed a \$50.00 meal allowance in addition to mileage at the state baseball tournament.
- and reported that the above changes would involve increased expenses to the Association of approximately \$13,000.00 based on number of participants in these state events during the 1969-1970 school year. It was moved by Anderson and seconded by McLain that these recommendations be adopted. Motion carried.

The secretary next reported that all TV fees for 1969-1970 tournaments had been collected with the exception of the Southwest Class A basketball tournament.

Bids for supplying basketballs for the 1971 district, regional, and state tournaments were opened, and it was found that the bid of Gerrell's of Devils Lake for \$13.60 per ball FOB Devils Lake for the Wilson B-1200 Jet basketball was low. It was moved by Broton and seconded by Quale to accept this bid. Motion carried.

Discussion followed relative to service charges charged by the American National Bank in connection with handling the ABF account. It was moved by Spiss that if local Valley City banks demand a service charge that the account be transferred to the Bank of North Dakota. The motion was seconded by Peterson but failed upon being put to vote. The secretary was then delegated to work out a plan with the local bank so as to eliminate service charges.

Jim Adelson and Rod Romine appeared before the Board and presented the following bids for telecasting 1971 tournaments on behalf of the North Dakota Broadcasting Company:

1. \$2,000.00 for exclusive rights for telecasting the semi-finals and final game of the State Class B basketball tournament at Grand Forks on a state-wide basis. Should the western stations desire to carry additional games, without exclusive rights thereto, a fee of \$150.00 per game would be paid.
 2. \$200.00 for TV rights for the live telecasting of the final game of the state hockey tournament.
- It was moved by Broton that the proposed bid of the NDBC for the State Class B Basketball tournament be accepted. Seconded by Easton and carried. Kourajian moved that the bid for the final game of the State Hockey tournament also be accepted. Seconded by Quale and carried. Spiss then moved that the \$200.00 figure for telecasting the final game of the hockey tournament be allowed this year only because of its being the first live hockey telecast, and that negotiations in future years follow the established policy of a minimum

fee of \$500.00 being set for the semi-final and final games. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

A bid of 20% of gross advertising income was submitted by Channel 8 of Grand Forks for television rights for the championship games of the Northeast Class A basketball tournament on March 5th and 6th. It was moved by Easton that the office negotiate with Channel 8 relative to telecasting of games in said tournament and Thursday games of the State Class B tournament. Seconded by Kourajian and carried.

The Board next considered several eligibility cases, making the following decisions:

1. John Tokvam of Grafton ineligible for one semester.
2. John Lechler of Beach ineligible if he transfers schools without parents moving.
3. Robert McKinnon of Mapleton eligible.
4. Duane Bohnsack of Oak Grove, Fargo, ineligible for one semester.
5. Irving Aslakson of Ray eligible.

The next order of business was the adoption of the 1970-1971 budget which is as follows:

Some time was spent discussing the regional meetings to be held this fall.

The Board then recessed until 9:00 A.M. Friday morning.

The first item taken under consideration Friday morning was the recommendation of the Officials Association for increased fees for officiating preliminary basketball games. Peterson moved that the fee for Class A and B schools to be the same. The motion was seconded by Muckenhirn but failed. Peterson then moved that all rates for officials be the same for Class A and B varsity and preliminary games. This motion was seconded by Muckenhirn but

also failed. Easton moved that the issue be tabled, seconded by Kourajian and carried.

The Board next reviewed the Minnesota Athletic camp rule, the court decision relative thereto, and how it might affect regulations in North Dakota.

Paul Seaborn of the Allard Trophy Company displayed samples of awards which might be used in connection with the new speech program. It was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by Quale that awards be selected by the official staff. Motion carried.

The feasibility of establishing standards for approval of summer athletic camps was next discussed. Quale moved that a committee be appointed to study the matter further, seconded by McLain and carried. Named to the committee were Anderson (chairman), McLain, Smith, and Schindler.

The executive secretary reported on the business meeting of the National Federation held in Seattle on July 11 and outlined amendments which were passed at this meeting.

Chairman Larson next presented additional information in connection with the John Tokvam eligibility case which had been submitted by Mr. Panek, Principal of the Grafton High School. Following considerable discussion, Quale moved to reconsider the case, but the motion died for lack of a second.

Some time was spent reviewing the program and amendments to be considered at the annual meeting of the General Assembly in October. The secretary reported that Mr. Bernie Saggau, Executive Secretary of the Iowa Athletic Association had been engaged as guest speaker, and that James Maxwell would present a report on the Federation meeting in Seattle.

Named to the nominating committee were:

John Hegvik, McClusky, Chairman

Rollard Larson, New Salem

Frank Fischer, Jamestown

Dates for the State Speech event were reviewed, as notification had been received from the Fargo schools that they would not be able to host the events on the dates previously set. It was moved by Easton that the date of the State B Speech be set for May 8, 1971, and the State A Speech for May 15, 1971, seconded by Broton and carried.

The time for the October meeting was set for 9:00 A.M. on Wednesday, October 14th, in Bismarck.

There being no further business, the meeting recessed until September 15th in Bismarck for the consideration of hardship eligibility cases should any be filed.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Bismarck, September 15, 1970

A special meeting of the Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held in Bismarck, North Dakota, to consider various hardship eligibility cases which had been submitted for consideration, with all members present except Broton, Spiss, and Easton.

Supt. Edward Hammer of Drayton appeared before the Board to present the case of Rocky and Gary Tripp. The parents of these two boys, who reside in Keokuk, Iowa, are divorced. The mother was awarded custody of these boys along with two younger children. As she was unable to care for all of the youngsters, she had requested an older son, Pastor Robert Tripp of Drayton, to take Rocky and Gary. A letter from Pastor Tripp concerning the family situation was presented in support thereof. It was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by Quale that the boys be declared eligible at Drayton providing they meet all other eligibility requirements and that all necessary documents be filed with the executive secretary. Motion carried.

Supt. Rollard Larson of New Salem next appeared to present the case of Glen Winderhorst. This lad had enrolled at New Salem the fall term of 1969-1970. That fall he got in trouble with the juvenile authorities and was sent to the Jamestown Hospital for psychiatric treatment. He later was released to the custody of a brother in Wahpeton rather than to his parental home. While at Wahpeton he attended the local high school until the completion of the term, after which he was transferred to his parental home. He then again enrolled at New Salem at the start of the 1970-1971 term. It was moved by Kourajian and seconded by Anderson that the boy be ruled immediately eligible providing he qualifies under the scholastic eligibility rule. Motion carried.

Supt. Claire Bergene of Maddock next reviewed the situation relative to the attendance of Indian students from Fort Totten who were now enrolled at Maddock, but had attended Oberon last year. The Oberon school district furnished transportation for these students during the 1969-1970 school year, but had decided not to do so for the 1970-1971 school term. As a result these students transferred to Maddock this fall and stay in the school dormitory, with the dormitory charges being paid by the federal government under the Johnson-O'Malley Act. It was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by Quale that these students be ruled immediately eligible at Maddock, providing they meet all other eligibility requirements.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Bismarck, North Dakota — October 14, 1970

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Bismarck at the Town House Motel on October 14, 1970, at 9:00 A.M. with all members present.

Each Board member was presented with a packet containing the agenda for the meeting and a financial report of all business transacted from July 1 to October 10, 1970.

The Board spent some time reviewing the financial report of both the General Fund and the ABF fund, and upon motion by Broton and second by Peterson the reports were accepted as submitted.

The executive secretary presented a report on the regional meetings held in September. Two hundred seventy three individuals from 121 schools attended these meetings including 145 coaches, 73 superintendents, 44 principals, 8 athletic directors, and 3 others. After some discussion it was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by Anderson that similar meetings be held again in the fall of 1971.

Arrangements for the Northeast and Southeast Class A regional basketball tournaments were next reviewed. The secretary reported that contracts had been negotiated with the University of North Dakota and North Dakota State University for these two tournaments. Rental fees for both tournaments are to be \$1,000.00, said fee to include all charges except ticket sellers and takers and ushers. The Northeast tournament is to be held on four successive evenings, March 3-6, whereas the Southeast tournament is to be played on March 4-6, commencing the afternoon of the fourth.

Some time was spent reviewing a report concerning the 4 Cheerleader Clinics held in October. Attendance figures were approximately 300 greater than at the last clinics held in 1968, with some centers being over-crowded, and others below capacity. Discussion followed as to possible revision of center sites, but no action was taken.

A notification from Fargo North High School concerning conflicts relative to the dates set for the State Class A and B speech contests was next presented. Upon motion by Spiss and second by Kourajian both events were rescheduled for May 8th at Fargo North.

Consideration was next given to a recommendation by the Class B district chairman that the number of seats set aside for competing teams at the State Class B basketball tournament be increased if the tournament were held at some other site than Minot. It was moved by Kourajian that the number be increased to 60 per team, seconded by Easton and carried.

Next taken under review was an appeal by Parshall High School concerning the eligibility status of Eddie Bracklin. This boy, whose parents reside in Parshall, attended school at New Town during his freshman year, transferring to Mandaree at the beginning of the 1969-1970 school term and

back to his home town in Parshall during the second semester of said school year because of economic conditions. He had been ruled ineligible at Parshall until the beginning of the second semester of the 1970-1971 school year by the executive secretary. The Board ruled that this case would not qualify under the hardship rule and upon motion by Spiss and second by Anderson, the decision of the executive secretary was upheld.

The eligibility status of students who were residents of Lincoln School District and attending Bismarck High School was next taken under consideration. Disputes had arisen as to who was responsible for payment for tuition of these students, and so some students were considering transferring to St. Mary's High School. It was the decision of the Board that any such transfer would result in a period of ineligibility.

Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Anderson, Wayne Skaro, who had been transferred from a foster home at Edmore to a home in the Hoople School District, was ruled immediately eligible at Hoople.

The Board next considered several ABF claims submitted by Garrison for illness suffered by football players, resulting from drinking "gatorade" which had been put in containers lined with zinc. After reviewing the ABF regulations concerning food poisoning, it was moved by Quale and seconded by Peterson that the claims be disallowed. Motion carried.

A letter from Supt. Melstad of St. Thomas concerning the Stan Barta incident of last year was presented to the Board. It was moved by Kourajian that the executive secretary send a letter to Mr. Melstad informing him that after discussion relative thereto, the Board felt that no action was necessary or advisable in connection therewith. Seconded by McLain and carried.

A communique from the North Dakota Medical Association relative to the responsibilities of the tournament doctor at the State Wrestling tournament was next reviewed. Following discussion concerning how much responsibility the doctor should assume, Easton moved that a letter be sent to the Medical Association thanking them for their interest and cooperation and that the Association continue to use the rule as presently written. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The Board then recessed until 2:00 P.M.

Upon reconvening, Bruce Anderson, as chairman of the Summer Camp Committee, proposed that the following recommended criteria for specialized summer camps be adopted:

1. Such camps cannot be sponsored by a member school, held on the campus of a member school, or supported by a member school.
2. Fee must be paid by the boy or his parents.
3. No school uniforms may be used.
4. No longer than two weeks in length for individuals attending.
5. No competition other than customary practice sessions or teams within that particular camp.
6. Football camps shall not be attended after July 30th.

It was moved by Kourajian that the committee report be accepted, seconded by Quale and carried.

Discussion followed relative to the fact that although our regulations concerning non-school participation in sports during the sports season and post-season competition were very clear and precise, this was not true concerning outside pre-season participation. It was then moved by Spiss that no student be allowed to participate in any non-school athletic activity during the school year, if said activity is sponsored by the NDHSAA, with the penalty for violation being loss of eligibility in all school sports from the date of violation to the end of the school year. The motion was seconded by Peterson, but failed when put to vote. Spiss then moved that a committee be appointed to study the pre-season question and that said committee present recommendations pertaining thereto at the next regular meeting. Seconded by Easton and carried. Named to the committee by the chairman were: Broton, Chairman, Spiss and Kourajian.

It was moved by Easton that the Association authorize the attendance of Mr. Robinson at the NUEA meeting in New Orleans on December 28-30, and that the Association also pay the expenses of a delegate from the Speech Teachers Association to attend such meeting. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

Upon motion by Broton and seconded by Spiss, attendance of the executive secretary and assistant Dick Schindler, at the Mid-Winter meeting of the National Federation in Anaheim, December 31 - January 3, was authorized.

Some time was spent discussing the agenda for the annual meeting of the Assembly to be held the next day. Appointed as a re-districting committee should the three-class amendment pass at said meeting, were members Muckenhirn, Anderson, and McLain.

Because of the major revisions in the mechanics of the speech program this year, Easton moved that the Association conduct regional clinics throughout the state relative to same. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

A request from Dickinson High School for approval of a Dickinson College senior who will graduate at the end of the fall term as wrestling coach was next presented. Since Mr. Peterson felt that this individual could secure an emergency certificate, it was moved by Muckenhirn that approval be granted if said individual receives such certification, even though he may not qualify under our rule as a half-time teacher. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

Assistant secretary Schindler reported on an incident which had occurred at the Drake-Anamoose football game in which Dan Johnson and partner failed to show up to work said game. Dan Johnson was under contract and was to supply the co-workers. It was moved by Spiss that a letter be sent to the official and the school explaining the Board's position on such matters. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The executive secretary reported that coaches from all but fourteen member schools had attended the football rules clinics conducted last fall, and that all but one of the fourteen schools had submitted letters of explanation concerning the non-attendance of their coach. The secretary was instructed to send a follow-up letter to said schools.

The Board then recessed until 4:00 P.M., Wednesday, October 15th, following the meeting of the General Assembly.

Upon re-assembling after the General Assembly meeting, representatives of the Fort Yates High School appeared before the Board concerning the eligibility of the son of the principal of one of the Indian Elementary schools in South Dakota on the Standing Rock Reservation, who was staying in their dormitory and attending school in Fort Yates. It was moved by Spiss that the boy be ruled eligible, seconded by Peterson and carried.

It was moved by Anderson that the guest speaker at the General Assembly meeting, Mr. Bernie Saggau, Executive Secretary of the Iowa Association, be paid \$100.00 plus expenses. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Anderson next moved that the Chairman of the Board also be authorized to attend the mid-winter meeting of the National Federation, should he so desire. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

The next meeting of the Board was set for 9:00 A.M. on Saturday, January 30th, at Bismarck.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES - ANNUAL MEETING

North Dakota High School Activities Association

October 15, 1970 - Bismarck, North Dakota

The annual meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held in the Will Moore School gymnasium at Bismarck, North Dakota, on October 15, 1970, at 2:00 P.M. Following an address on "Competitive and Glad Of It" by Bernie Saggau, Executive Secretary of the Iowa Athletic Association, James Maxwell, former president of the NDHSAA, gave a report on the National Federation convention held in Seattle in July, 1970.

The business meeting was called to order by Chairman Larson at 3:00 P.M. Inasmuch as all members had copies of the minutes of the last meeting in the Annual Handbook, Supt. Brintnell of Pembina moved that the reading of the minutes be waived. The motion was seconded by Supt. Stranger of Sykeston and carried.

J. E. Oien, Principal of Mott High School, presented the following amendment to the by-laws and moved its adoption:

ARTICLE II - Classification of Schools

Section I - Class AA Schools:

- (a) This group shall consist of all member high schools with a total enrollment of 400 or over, and/or an enrollment of 200 or more pupils in an all male school in grades 9-12 inclusive as of October 1, 1970, plus any member high school that elects to choose Class AA as provided in paragraph (b), (c), and (d), herewith.

- (b) Any high school with a total enrollment between 300 and 399 in grades 9-12 inclusive, as of October 1, 1970, may elect to join Class AA for interscholastic competition by written notice to the Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association before January 1, 1971.
- (c) After classes are established on January 1, 1971, a member school having a total enrollment of more than 300 and less than 400 in grades 9-12 inclusive, must give two years notice to the Board of Directors to change its classification. Such choice must be made not later than September 1st of any year and shall become effective with the opening of the fall term two years later. Schools that elect to become Class AA schools must remain in that classification for a minimum of three years before they may again apply for reclassification. Provided further, when the total high school enrollment in grades 9-12 drops below 400, and/or the enrollment in an all male school in grades 9-12 drops below 200, that school shall have one year of grace in which to choose its class of competition. Should a Class AA school drop below 300 in enrollment in grades 9-12 and continue below 300 for two consecutive years, this school shall be reclassified as a A or B school. Should a school rise above 399 enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive, and continue above that figure for two consecutive years, this school must be classified as a AA school.
- (d) Should a new high school be established in an existing district or area, whose enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive, exceeds 399, the two year waiting period stated in paragraph (c) above shall be waived and the school shall be immediately classified as an AA school.

Section II — Class A Schools:

- (a) This group shall consist of all member high schools with a total enrollment of 150 to 399, and/or an enrollment of 75 to 199 pupils in an all male school in grades 9-12 inclusive, as of October 1, 1970, plus any member high school that elects to choose Class A as provided in paragraph (b), (c), and (d), herewith.
- (b) Any high school with a total enrollment between 100 and 149 in grades 9-12 inclusive, as of October 1, 1970, may elect to join Class A for interscholastic high school competition by written notice to the Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association before January 1, 1971.
- (c) After classes are established on January 1, 1971, a member school having a total enrollment of more than 100 and less than 149 in grades 9-12 inclusive, must give two years notice to the Board of Directors to change its classification. Such choice must be made not later than September 1st of any year and shall become effective with the opening of the fall term two years later. Schools that elect to become Class A schools must remain in that classification for a minimum of three years before they may again apply for reclassification. Provided further, when the total high school enrollment in grades 9-12 drops below 150 and/or the enrollment

in an all male school in grades 9-12 drops below 75, that school shall have one year of grace in which to choose its class of competition. Should a school rise above 149 in enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive, and continue above that figure for two consecutive years, this school must be classified as an A school.

- (d) Should a new high school be established in an existing district or area, whose enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive, exceeds 149, the two year waiting period stated in paragraph (c) above shall be waived and the school shall be immediately classified as an A or AA school.

Section III — Class B Schools:

All member high schools other than those designated Class AA and A, shall be classified as Class B schools.

Section IV —

Class AA, Class A and Class B schools shall compete in separate classes to determine state basketball championships. The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is authorized to establish classes in other athletic or non-athletic contests and festivals if it appears expedient and desirable.

The motion was seconded by Supt. Thunem of Bowman. After some discussion, a roll call vote was taken and the motion failed by a vote of 37 to 122.

Everett Knudsvig, Principal of Grand Forks Red River High School, next submitted the following amendment, so that paragraph (h) of Section II of Article XII of the by-laws would read as follows, and moved for its adoption:

ARTICLE XII — Sports Seasons

Section II — Basketball

- (h) A basketball jamboree shall be counted as one game. No more than two scrimmages with other schools shall be permitted prior to the date of the first authorized game of the season and these scrimmages may be held only after ten separate daily sessions have been held. Scrimmages held after the first authorized game of the season shall be counted as contests. The allowable inter-school scrimmages shall be held within the environs of one of the participating schools or at some point between the two schools.

The motion was seconded by Supt. Brintnell of Pembina. Supt. Huber of Hazen then moved to amend the amendment by inserting "first regularly scheduled game" instead of "first authorized game" in the second sentence of the original amendment. This motion was seconded by Supt. Johnson of Carrington. Following a short discussion, the amendment to the amendment was passed by a vote of 68 to 29. The amendment as amended was then voted upon and carried by a vote of 66 to 51.

Supt. Muckenhirn of Larimore next presented the following amendment to the junior high by-laws as proposed by the Board of Directors:

That Sections III, IV, and V, of Article VI of the Junior High By-laws be deleted, that Section VI be renumbered as Section III, and that Section IV read as follows:

"All other regulations shall be determined by the Board"

and moved for its adoption, with the emergency clause, so that it could go into effect for the 1970-1971 school year. The motion was seconded by Duane Carlson of Minot and carried unanimously.

Mr. Muckenhirn next presented the following amendment to the Junior High By-laws as proposed by the Board of Directors:

That Section IV of Article VII of the Junior High By-laws be repealed, that Section V be renumbered as Section IV, and that Section V read as follows:

"All other regulations shall be determined by the Board"

and moved for its adoption with the emergency clause, so that it becomes effective immediately. The motion was seconded by Supt. Kourajian of Medina and carried unanimously.

The report of the nominating committee (consisting of Supt. John Hegvik of McClusky, Supt. Rollard Larson of New Salem, and Supt. Frank Fischer of Jamestown) was presented by Hegvik submitting the following names for vacancies on the Board of Directors:

2 — Class B representatives for 3 year terms

James Broton of New England
Norman Batterberry of Max

1 — Director-at-large for 1½ year term

Casper Kourajian of Medina

Nominations were then called for from the floor. Supt. Robert Hunsdor of Newburg nominated Don Kolbo of Mohall for the position as director-at-large. There were no other nominations, so it was moved by Borchert of Crosby and seconded by Maxwell of Grafton that nominations cease. Motion carried.

Supt. Hanson of Harvey raised the question as to why important questions such as classification of schools were not voted on by mail ballot rather than at the Annual meeting. The executive secretary explained that the Constitution provides that amendments to the Constitution shall be voted on by mail ballot, but amendments to the by-laws by a vote of the General Assembly at a regular or special meeting of the body, and since the classification of schools is found in the by-laws of the organization, amendments pertaining thereto would have to be voted on at a meeting of the Assembly.

There being no further business, it was moved by Johnson of Linton and seconded by Muckenhirn of Larimore that the meeting be adjourned. Motion carried.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Bismarck, North Dakota — January 30, 31, 1971

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 10:00 A.M. at the Grand Pacific Hotel in Bismarck on January 30, 1971, with all members present except Larson, Peterson and Easton. Easton was in attendance following the noon lunch recess on Saturday and Larson and Peterson were present for part of the meeting on Sunday. Vice-president Spiss called the meeting to order.

Each member was presented with a packet containing the agenda, a complete financial report of the years business to January 27, 1971, and a list of checks drawn on the General Fund since October 8, 1970. The Board spent some time reviewing the financial report and, upon motion, the report was duly accepted.

The canvassing committee consisting of members Muckenhirn, Anderson, and McLain reported that they had canvassed the annual election results and found them to be as follows:

Member-at-large — Unexpired term to July 1972:

Donald Kolbo 106 votes
Casper Kourajian 102 votes
Scattering 2 votes

Two Class B representatives for 3 year term:

Norman Batterberry . . 171 votes
James Broton 169 votes
Scattering 7 votes

Total ballots cast 216

Donald Kolbo was declared a duly elected member of the Board effective immediately and Norman Batterberry and James Broton duly elected members effective July 1, 1971.

The executive secretary gave a report on the attendance of head coaches at basketball, wrestling, hockey, and girls gymnastic rules clinics conducted by the NDHSAA. Of the 273 basketball schools, 255 attended. Letters were sent to the 18 schools who had not complied with the rule, and all but Kathryn and McVillie had responded with letters of explanation. In wrestling, head coaches from 61 of the 66 schools had attended the clinic, and all but Shanley of Fargo had submitted a letter of explanation of non-compliance. Coaches from 20 of 29 schools who had indicated that they were having girls gymnastics attended the rules clinic. Answers had not been received from Lehr, Cleveland, Tioga, Velva, and Verona concerning their non-compliance with the rule. All hockey coaches were in attendance at their rules clinic.

Next under consideration was the rule whereby the Board Chairman votes on motions only in case of tie. It was pointed out that several states had modified their regulations permitting the chairman to vote on policy matters

and others to vote on all motions. It was moved by Broton that in the future, the chairman should vote on all motions. Seconded by Quale and carried.

The secretary next presented a request from the hockey coaches that a 4th place trophy be awarded at the state hockey tournament. It was moved by Broton that inasmuch as no elimination tournaments are held in hockey, that the request be denied. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The secretary next reported that 231 of the 274 member schools had responded to the ABF questionnaire, and that 87% of the respondents favored the continuance of the program by the NDHSAA, 4% favored turning it over to private companies, and 9% would leave insurance coverage up to the parents. Of the 87% favoring continuance, 35% favored the present plan, 22% favored a plan offering increased benefits with higher premium rates, and 30% favored two plans being offered. In lieu of the returns, the secretary recommended that the present plan, along with an alternate plan, be offered next year to member schools. It was moved by Muckenhirn that a committee be appointed to study the feasibility of same and that a report relative thereto be presented at the March meeting. Seconded by Kourajian and carried. Named to the committee were Anderson, Chairman, McLain and Robinson.

Discussion followed on the fee to be allowed Miss Dolores Paulson for conducting gymnastic rules clinics last fall. Upon motion by Broton and second by Anderson, the fee for same was set at \$15.00 per clinic.

Next under consideration was a request from the North Dakota School for the Deaf for permission to attend the Midwest Relays for the deaf at Fairbault, Minnesota. It was moved by Anderson and seconded by Quale that the request be granted. Motion carried.

Upon motion by Kourajian, and second by Quale, the Board authorized payment of plane fare for Duane Carlson of Minot to attend the AAPHER athletic directors meeting in Washington, D.C., as a delegate from North Dakota. Discussion followed relative to the first annual athletic directors conference being sponsored by the National Federation in February and whether future subsidies should be for this meeting rather than the AAPHER meeting, but no action was taken at this time.

James Broton, Chairman of the pre-season participation committee, presented the following recommended rule relative to pre-season participation and moved its adoption effective with the 1971-1972 school year:

"A student shall not participate in non-school competition from the opening of the school term until the beginning of the high school season in that sport except in American Legion and Babe Ruth baseball, with a penalty for violation thereof of loss of eligibility in that sport for the school season."

The motion was seconded by Kourajian and carried on a roll-call vote by a margin of 7 to 2.

Rex Robinson next reported on the regional speech meetings held during the past few weeks to acquaint speech teachers with the new program. Reports were also made by staff members on the NUEA meeting in New Orleans, the National Federation mid-winter meeting for executive secretaries, and the National Alliance Football rules meeting held in Anaheim, California.

Discussion followed concerning the rule pertaining to numbers and trim on basketball uniforms. It was moved by Anderson that the rule as stated in the rules book be applicable to varsity teams only. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Next under consideration was the use of video equipment by teams at tournaments. Muckenhirn moved that use of such equipment by schools be prohibited at any indoor meets or tournaments sponsored by the NDHSAA. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The question of when the announcement of pairings for the state wrestling tournaments should be made was next taken up for consideration. After some discussion, it was moved by Anderson that such announcement not be made until after the completion of the regional tournaments. Seconded by Broton and carried.

Discussion followed on whether an individual could participate on both the A and B squad in a dual wrestling meet between two schools. McLain moved that a boy may represent his school in only one match in a dual wrestling meet. The motion was seconded by Easton and carried.

The meeting then recessed and reconvened at 9:00 A.M. on January 31st, with all members present except Larson and Peterson who reported later in the day.

The Board next reviewed problems encountered in collecting fees due from TV and radio stations. Muckenhirn moved that beginning with the 1971-1972 season, an additional charge of 1½% per month compounded, be made on all such bills not paid upon completion of the event. The motion was seconded by Anderson and carried on a roll-call vote of 5 to 2.

Discussion followed as to the eligibility status of students presently attending the Walsh County Ag. School should this school be taken over by Park River District No. 78 instead of Walsh County. The Board instructed the secretary to invite Supt. Galloway to attend the March meeting to present information concerning the enrollment of the school.

The secretary reported on action which he had taken concerning the removal of the St. John basketball team from the floor with only a small playing time remaining in a game held at Lankin. It was moved by Muckenhirn to support the action of the secretary, seconded by Kourajian and carried.

The Board next reviewed an incident concerning a member of the Luverne basketball team which had been reported by the Luverne school. It was moved by Muckenhirn that on the basis of evidence presented, no violation of Association regulations had occurred. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

The Board next reviewed problems encountered with trophies being supplied by Josten's Inc. for state-sponsored events, and apparent reasons therefore.

A request from the Fargo Public Schools in regard to junior high hockey during the two weeks practice period following the state high school hockey tournament in 1971 was approved upon motion by Anderson and second by Muckenhirn.

A letter from Bill Osmon, manager of the 1971 state boys track meet, concerning problems encountered with the holding of the meet on the dates set was next presented. Considerable time was spent reviewing same and problems which would be encountered if the dates were changed at this time. Muckenhirn then moved that the dates for the state boys be changed to May 28th and 29th and the date for the state girls meet to May 27th. The motion was seconded by Anderson, but was defeated when put to vote. Easton then moved that the dates be left as previously set, seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The executive secretary explained how little informed new administrators and coaches are concerning the State Association, its constitution and by-laws and regulations, and proposed that an attempt be made to have a unit or partial unit of study concerning same taught at our state colleges. It was moved by Easton that the secretary contact the various deans of education and athletic directors at the colleges to see what could be done in this regard. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Each member of the Board was presented with a copy of the National Federation Administrative survey for study preparatory to the March meeting of the Board.

The Board next discussed the annual summer meeting of the National Federation in July in an attempt to find out which board members would attend. Larson, Kourajian, Anderson, Quale, and Peterson might be available, but final selection was left until the March meeting.

An invitation to state executive secretaries to attend the DGWS annual meeting at Estes Park was read. The problems concerning rule books being published by both the DGWS and the National Federation are to be aired at this meeting. It was moved by Muckenhirn that no action be taken on the invitation. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

Discussion followed on expense allowance for Board members at Board meetings. It was moved by Broton that \$10.00 per day be allowed for meals plus actual cost for room. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Supt. Roberts of Newburg appeared before the Board requesting approval of Donald Henry as a "B" squad basketball coach. Mr. Henry, a local farmer in the community, is a college graduate and has a valid teaching certificate, but is not employed as a classroom teacher in the school system. It was moved by Kourajian that the request be approved. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Next under consideration was a request from Makoti for the use of Wayne Franks as wrestling coach. Mr. Franks, a college graduate who had coached previously, is currently attending Minot State College to get a degree in education. Broton moved that the request be approved, providing Mr. Franks obtains an emergency certificate from the Dept. of Public Instruction. Seconded by McLain and carried.

A request from Washburn for the use of Clayton Carr as a 7th and 8th grade basketball coach was next considered. Mr. Carr, a local resident, is not a certified teacher. It was moved by Broton that the request be approved providing Mr. Carr is not paid from school funds, and that a regular employed teacher sit on the bench at all interscholastic contests as the legal representative of the school. Seconded by McLain and carried. Mr. Anderson requested that it be recorded that he voted against the motion.

Also considered was a request from Lefor to use Greg Haugland, a senior student at Dickinson State College as basketball coach, who would not be paid from school district funds for this work. It was moved by Easton to approve the request. Seconded by Broton and carried.

The Board next reviewed recommendations adopted by the North Dakota Officials Association at their annual meeting in November and upon motion by Broton and second by Easton, the following recommendations were adopted:

1. The recommended maximum officiating fees in Class A varsity football, basketball, wrestling, and hockey be raised to \$20.00 per game and to \$17.50 for the same sports in Class B schools.
2. The recommended maximum officiating fees for preliminary basketball games in Class A and Class B be raised to \$7.50 for an 8 minute quarter game and to \$5.00 for a 6 minute quarter game.

The \$7.50 preliminary game figure was amended from the NDOA recommendation of \$10.00 in Class A upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Kourajian.

Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Kourajian, the following junior high track events and regulations were adopted for the 1971 track season:

JUNIOR HIGH TRACK:

- a. maximum of 3 events per boy per event
- b. season limit of 8 meets per boy, with a limit of 2 meets per week, and no two meets on consecutive days
- c. 7th grade distance limit is a race of 440 yards with only one race this length per meet, plus distances of 220 yards or less
- d. 8th grade distance limit is a race of 880 yards plus distances of 220 yards or less
- e. hurdles shall be 30 inches in height
- f. 80 yard hurdles shall be spaced 10 yards apart with 15 yards from start to first hurdle and also 15 yards from last hurdle to finish
- g. 120 yard hurdles shall be spaced 20 yards and also 20 yards from start to first hurdle and from last hurdle to finish
- h. in meets consisting exclusively of 9th grade students, the events and regulations pertaining to high-school meets may be followed.
- i. suggested events:

1. 75 yard dash	9. 880 yard relay
2. 100 yard dash	10. mile relay
3. 220 yard dash	11. shot put (8 lb.)
4. 440 yard run	12. discus (2 lb., 3.25 oz.)

Del Easton informed the Board of an amendment to the by-laws pertaining to the use of tobacco, alcohol, and drugs, under consideration by the Secondary Principals Association for proposal to the General Assembly. The proposed amendment would provide for a uniform state-wide penalty instead of each school handling cases individually.

A hearing was next conducted by the Board concerning a report filed by officials James Johnson and Don Kostecky on the conduct of the Hague coach, players, and fans at a basketball game played at Forbes in December. Testifying at the hearing were the two officials, the coach and superintendent at Hague, and the superintendent of the Forbes school. In addition to the testimony relative to conduct of various individuals, it was reported that damages to the dressing room had been made by the visiting Hague team. Following the testimony, the Hague coach was censured by the Board for his actions, and the executive secretary was instructed to send a letter of censure to the Hague school and a copy thereof to the President of the Hague school board.

A request from the NDMEA for approval of the holding of an all-state chorus and band festival to be sponsored by the NDMEA during the Thanksgiving holidays in lieu of the all-state band and chorus festival being put on by colleges was next presented. It was moved by Muckenhirn that action be tabled until the March meeting and that a representative of the NDMEA be requested to appear at said meeting to explain the proposal in more detail. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The secretary next reported that Parshall had used a boy on the 8th grade basketball team who was over 15 years of age. The violation had been discovered by the school themselves and they had promptly advised the Association thereof and had forfeited all games in which the youngster had been used. It was moved by Anderson that the boy be ruled ineligible for any interscholastic basketball during the second semester on either a junior high or senior high school team. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The secretary next reported on a speech contest held at UND for which no sanction approval had been requested, and which had been attended by several member schools, and the subsequent warning which had been sent to all such participants. A need for additional regulatory procedures which would prevent such occurrences was discussed and the secretary was instructed to present recommendations relative to same at the next meeting.

An invitation for the executive staff members to attend a Region V meeting of the National Federation at Minneapolis on April 2 and 3 was read. It was moved by Easton that the executive staff members be authorized to attend said meeting. Seconded by Kourajian and carried.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

SPECIAL MEETING

Board of Directors

Bismarck, North Dakota — March 1, 1971

A special meeting of the Board of Directors of the NDHSAA was held in the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction at the State Capitol in Bismarck on March 1, 1971, at 1:30 P.M. with all Board members present except Anderson, McLain, and Broton. The meeting was called to ascertain whether any Association regulations had been violated by Beulah High School in connection with an incident previously reported to the Association office by Supt. Solberg.

Mr. Solberg appeared before the Board and outlined particulars in connection with a "B" squad basketball game played between Beulah and Bismarck High School Junior Varsity team on February 27, 1971. According to his testimony, and records presented to verify same, Beulah had contracted the maximum number of varsity and "B" squad games for the season. The varsity schedule was completed on Friday, February 26, and the "B" squad schedule was completed on Saturday, February 27. Their head coach had been hospitalized for some time and the assistant coach allowed "A" squad boys who had not completed their allowable number of quarters or nights of participation to play in the "B" game against Bismarck. The question in point was whether the team fielded in the Saturday contest would be considered a varsity team or a "B" team because of the use of 7 members of the "A" squad, including 3 regular starters, and whether therefore the 20 game team limit rule had been violated.

The Board spent considerable time discussing the incident and practices employed by other schools in similar situations. Kolbo moved that since the Association has no clear-cut definition of what constitutes a "B" team and a varsity team and since no limitations had been exceeded by any individual players, that no violation of present Association regulations had been made by the Beulah High School and that the incident be dismissed. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Mr. Solberg was commended by the Board for reporting the incident to the Board and for the accurate records kept in connection with their basketball program and the athletes taking part therein.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Bismarck Civic Center — March 12, 1971

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at the Bismarck Civic Center on March 12, 1971, at 9:30 A.M. with all members present. Each member was presented a packet containing the agenda, a complete financial report of the years business to date, and a list of checks drawn on the General Fund since the last meeting.

The Board reviewed the financial reports of the General Fund and the Accident Benefit Fund and upon motion by Peterson and second by Spiss the reports were approved.

The executive secretary reported to the Board a violation of the one invitational basketball tournament rule by four Karlsruhe basketball players, which had been reported to the office by the Karlsruhe superintendent, and that the following penalties had been assessed by the secretary: games won by Karlsruhe in the second tournament were to be forfeited and the boys involved were to be kept out of the next two regularly scheduled season games. The penalties levied were approved by the Board.

Next reviewed by the Board were reports from the tournament manager and one official concerning an incident involving the principal of the Wahpeton High School wherein he allegedly physically and verbally abused said official at the Southeast Class A wrestling tournament following a match which one of the Wahpeton contestants lost. The secretary informed the Board that a letter had been sent to the Wahpeton principal requesting that he appear at either the Bismarck or Grand Forks meeting of the Board. A letter in reply in which Mr. Carr apologized for his actions and stating that he could not appear at the Bismarck meeting was also read. The secretary was instructed to again write Mr. Carr requesting his attendance at the Grand Forks meeting the next weekend.

Next under consideration was a report concerning the switching of numbers on one of her contestants by the Minot High School gymnastic coach

at the girls state gymnastic meet in Jamestown. Correspondence with the Minot athletic director and the Minot coach concerning the incident were also reviewed. Spiss moved that a letter of reprimand be sent to the Minot coach. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

Duane Carlson, Athletic Director at Minot, appeared before the Board and reported on the National AAPER Athletic Director Conference in Washington which he had attended. Harold Pedersen, Athletic Director of the Fargo Schools, also reported on the National Federation Athletic Directors Conference in St. Louis which he attended. The Board spent some time thereafter discussing whether to continue giving monetary support to individuals attending various national meetings. Because of the increasing number of such meetings and the increasing number of interested groups, it was moved by Peterson that henceforth the NDHSAA not finance any representatives to meetings unless the representative is a proxy of the Board. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The executive secretary and assistant secretary next presented short reports on the two state wrestling tourneys and their meetings with the coaches. Specific recommendations by these groups were referred to the wrestling advisory committee.

The Board next reviewed dates previously set for the 1972 Class B regional and state wrestling tournaments. Broton moved that these dates be changed setting the date of the State B wrestling meet one week prior to the State A meet and the Class B regional meets one week prior to the State B meet. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Next under consideration was whether the two week practice period allowed hockey teams after the state tournament should be considered in-season or post-season, if students should participate on non-school teams during said period. It was moved by Easton that this period be considered as part of the season. Seconded by Quale and carried.

The secretary next pointed out that we do not have a hockey advisory committee and that several recommendations for changes in rules had been made by the hockey officials. These in turn had been referred to the hockey coaches for consideration. Since this group is so small in number, McLain moved that a representative of the group present their recommendations directly to the Board. Seconded by Broton and carried.

The Board next discussed the possibility of clarifying the 20 game team rule for high school basketball and the 12 game team rule for junior high. Appointed as a committee to study the problem and to report at the June meeting were Broton, chairman, McLain and Anderson.

The attention of the Board was called to problems in connection with the rules pertaining to junior high schools in Class A systems which maintain separate junior high schools. It was moved by Spiss that the "20 game committee" study this problem also. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

The Board then recessed and reconvened at 1:30 P.M. with all members present except M. F. Peterson, who was represented by Mr. Bangs of the State Department.

Discussion followed on anticipated problems and revision of rules which would be necessary if some schools begin operating on a 12 month schedule, or were to organize on a 6-2-2-2 plan. Action on same was deferred until the necessity of same arose.

Next under consideration was the expense allowance for entrants of home teams in the state wrestling, track and gymnastic meets. It was moved by Spiss that a summary of expenditures for same be presented at the June meeting and that action be deferred until that time. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Discussion followed on steps which might be taken to eliminate the probability of schools entering non-sanctioned meets. Broton moved that the host school send confirmation of sanction approval to all participating schools. Seconded by McLain. The motion was defeated when put to vote. Spiss then moved that the executive secretary check with the Attorney General as to the legality of establishing a "fine" system. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Mr. Robinson reported on a mix-up in tabulation of points and judges errors at the State Debate tourney, and that these errors had resulted in the incorrect awarding of some awards in the novice division. He was instructed to check this out further with the meet manager and the judges involved and to make necessary corrections so that the awards go to the proper recipients.

The Board next reviewed reports received by the Association office concerning the conduct of some of the Belcourt students at out-of-town basketball games. Muckenhirn moved that the principal and coach of the Belcourt school be asked to appear before the Board at the meeting in Grand Forks next week. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

The secretary next reported that an informal request had been made by a member school that curling be added as an Association-sponsored sport. Spiss moved that action on same be taken if and when a written request outlining the proposed operation of such a program is submitted. Seconded by Broton and carried.

The Board was next made aware of the number of Class A schools contemplating reverting back to Class B status. As a waiting period is involved before such change is made, no action was taken at this time on reorganizational structures which might become necessary.

A request by the Class A regions that 4 officials be employed for Class A regional basketball tournaments was approved by the Board.

Upon motion by Broton and second by Easton, the number of umpires to be hired for the State Baseball tournament was increased from two to three.

Chairman Larson appointed Broton as chairman of the "Officials Selection Committee" along with McLain and Kolbo as other members of the committee.

Discussion followed relative to certain Board regulations concerning state tournaments. Attention was called to the fact that no solicitations are permitted at such events, but that there were no such regulations relative to exhibits, and so permission for the display of a Chevrolet car in the Civic Center lobby had been given to the Chevrolet company. It was moved by Muckenhirn that

exhibits not be allowed at state-sponsored meets or tourneys. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

The Board then recessed until 9:00 A.M., March 20 at Grand Forks.

Board of Directors Meeting

Grand Forks, North Dakota — March 20, 1971

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 9:00 A.M., on March 20, 1971, at the UND Student Union Center at Grand Forks with all members present except D. Easton.

The first order of business was the election of officers for the 1971-1972 school year, with August Spiss being named president and Don Kolbo vice-president.

Bruce Anderson reported on behalf of the ABF committee concerning an alternative plan under study to be offered to member schools for the next fiscal year. The committee was instructed to continue further study relative to same and present recommendations relative thereto at the June meeting of the Board.

A request for sanction approval of an annual All-State Band, Choir and Orchestra festival to be sponsored by the NDMEA was next presented by August Spiss. Broton moved that said approval be granted. Seconded by Muckenhirn. M. F. Peterson moved that the motion be amended with a recommendation that the managers fee for conducting this event be set at \$200 instead of \$300 as proposed to bring said fee in line with fees allowed for management of other state activities. The motion was seconded by Quale and carried. The original motion as amended was then approved by the Board.

Supt. Jerome and Principal Gannerelli of the Turtle Mountain Community School of Belcourt next appeared before the Board to answer reports filed with the Association office concerning conduct of some of their students on road trips. These gentlemen felt that "this was a two-way street" and that corrective measures were necessary on both sides. After considerable discussion, it was moved by M. F. Peterson that the High School Activities Association Board of Directors recognize the problems and issues between Belcourt and other schools in its basketball schedule, that the Board appreciates and understands Belcourts concern and in turn the Board expresses its concern, and therefore the Board suggests local responsibility and trusts that the Belcourt community and other communities concerned or involved do their utmost to resolve the difficulties and that the Board stands ready to assist in any way and at any time it can. The motion was seconded by Quale. At this time reports were received concerning incidents at the Holiday Inn involving the Belcourt team. Spiss then moved that these reports be checked out and that Mr. Peterson's motion be temporarily tabled. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Mr. Quale, manager of the Holiday Inn, later appeared before the Board and reported that two lamps had been damaged in one of the Belcourt team rooms, and that some of the ceiling tile in one of the rooms had to be replaced with a total damage value to lamps and ceiling of about \$40 to \$45. He also reported that one of the team members had attempted to purchase liquor in the lounge and that 2 cases of beer were found in one of the Belcourt rooms. He later filed a written report concerning the room damage only. As the Belcourt administrators had already left the city, it was moved by Spiss that they be requested to appear again at the June meeting of the Board and that action be deferred until said time. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The executive secretary presented a financial report on all tournaments held to date on which managers reports had been filed.

A request that coaches in a particular sport be permitted to select members on advisory committees instead of said committees being appointed by the Board was next presented. It was moved by Anderson that said request be granted effective with the 1971-1972 school year and that these committees present recommendations for the 1972-1973 season. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Rex Robinson reported on his investigation of apparent errors made on some judging ballots and tabulation of points which resulted in incorrect awarding of trophies and awards in the novice division of the debate tournament, and that these awards would be returned to the state office for proper distribution.

Next under consideration was a request for an increase in the number of participation awards to be given to participants in state tournaments, so that awards might be given to assistant coaches and student managers as well as the squad members and head coach. Anderson moved that the number be increased by two in each sport. The motion was seconded by Kolbo, but was defeated when put to a vote.

The secretary next-briefed the Board on a report filed by Supt. Bengson of Anamoose concerning action which he had taken relative to their third place finish in the district basketball tourney. Unbeknown to the school authorities, some members of their team had been picked up by law enforcement officers in a neighboring town on the Saturday preceding the tournament, and were fined for an open container liquor violation. Upon being informed of same after the tournament, Mr. Bengson had notified the district committee and the NDHSAA office of their forfeiture of games won in the tournament and had returned the third place trophy which they had been awarded. The secretary was instructed to write a letter of commendation to Supt. Bengson for the action which he had taken.

Discussion followed as to whether Association regulations apply to non-sponsored sports such as girls basketball. It was the decision of the Board that such regulations apply to only those sports which are sponsored by the Association.

As Gary Carr, Principal of the Wahpeton High School, failed to appear for his scheduled meeting with the Board, Spiss moved that the secretary write to the Wahpeton superintendent of schools concerning same with a request that

Mr. Carr be asked to appear at the June meeting and that copies of this letter be sent to Mr. Carr and the president of the school board. Seconded by Broton and carried.

The following were named as eligible delegates to attend the National Federation meeting in Denver, July 13-17: Kolbo, Anderson, Kourajian, Larson, Quale and Peterson, with Kolbo designated as voting delegate and Anderson as alternate.

Next under consideration were salaries for the executive staff members for the next fiscal year. Broton moved that the salary policy adopted by the Board on March 10, 1967, be rescinded and that the following salaries be offered said employees next year: executive secretary — \$18,500; assistant secretary — \$15,500; and assistant to the secretary — \$10,500. Seconded by Quale and carried.

The dates for the next meeting of the Board were set for June 10 and 11 commencing at 9:00 A.M. on the 10th.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Valley City — June 10, 11, 1971

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in the Association office building at 9:00 A.M. on June 10, 1971, with all members present. Each member of the Board was furnished with a complete financial report of the business to date, a financial report of the Accident Benefit Fund to date, and an agenda for the meeting. Upon motion by Broton and second by Spiss the financial reports were accepted as submitted.

The secretary reported on letters received from Bismarck firms in reply to the letter of appreciation sent by the NDHSAA office concerning their support of the State Class A basketball tourney.

An opinion from the Attorney General's office, in response to the Association question of whether the Association could legally levy fines on the membership for violation of rules, was next read. The opinion implied that it would be difficult to levy fines especially against coaches or other individuals rather than the school districts, since the membership consisted of school districts.

A communique from the North Dakota Tax Commissioner concerning liability for sales tax collections for 1971-1972 under the new sales tax law was next presented. It was pointed out that although certain questions which were raised were answered therein, not all points were covered. No action was taken pending further information relative to same.

Bids for supplying basketballs for the 1972 tournaments were opened. Two bids were received, one from Gerrells of Devils Lake for \$13.60 per ball for the Wilson B1200 Jet ball, and one from Colborn School Supply for \$13.50 per ball for either the Rawling RLO or RSO ball. It was moved by Anderson that the low bid of \$13.50 per ball for the Rawling's RLO ball as submitted by Colborn be accepted, seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The following requests for re-classification to Class B status were next reviewed:

1. Watford City effective with the 1971-1972 school term
2. Mott effective with the 1973-1974 school term
3. Tioga effective with the 1972-1973 school term

As the requests from Watford City and Mott were in order and in compliance with the by-laws, it was moved by McLain and seconded by Anderson that these requests be approved. Motion carried. Since, according to the by-laws, Tioga's request for change could not become effective until the 1973-1974 school term, it was moved by Spiss that Tioga be so advised and instructed to re-submit their request for change effective as of this date, if they so desired. Seconded by Quale and carried.

A request received in May from Clarence Christianson, baseball coach at Minot High School, for an Association-sponsored State Class A baseball tourney to be held at the close of the school year was reviewed, along with the answer written by the executive secretary after consulting with the Class A members of the Board. In said reply, the request was denied and the stipulation made that future requests should be made a year in advance, and that a minimum of 4 Class A schools be required to play a regular season schedule before such a tournament be scheduled. The action of the secretary was approved and adopted as a policy for future requests concerning same.

A football contract problem of Minot Ryan was reviewed by the Board. The school had signed contracts with Bottineau and Red River of Grand Forks for a football game on the same date in 1971, with the Bottineau contract being the first one negotiated. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the contract with Bottineau be honored and that the Red River contract be declared void, unless both Bottineau and Ryan mutually agree to cancel their contract. The motion was seconded by Anderson and carried.

Next under consideration was a request from Grand Forks Red River for permission to play a football game on September 2nd, one day prior to the official opening date. The request was denied upon motion by Spiss and second by Broton.

Discussion followed as to composition of basketball teams in summer recreational programs involving students from several communities. It was moved by Broton that the old rule restricting the makeup of any such teams to no more than 3 members who had been on the same varsity or B squad the previous season remain in effect. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

The secretary reported on his denial of a request received from Enderlin High School for permission for their Wrestling Club to pay partial registration fee of individuals attending a summer wrestling camp. As the school had abided by the decision of the secretary, no action was deemed necessary.

The Board next took under review the question as to whether it was permissible for a boy to attend a summer camp and be employed as a counselor or in another capacity in lieu of payment of registration fees. It was the opinion of the Board that there would be no conflict with the summer camp regulations if the boy actually had a legitimate job at the camp.

Next reviewed was an incident which had occurred between Jud and Marion school which had caused some ill feelings. Correspondence in regard to the matter was read in which it was reported that the schools had settled the dispute themselves to the satisfaction of both parties. No action was deemed necessary.

The secretary next reported on progress to date relative to getting an instructional course or unit of study incorporated in an existing course concerning the NDHSAA in our state colleges for prospective administrators or coaches. Discussion followed as to the proper manner to implement same. It was then moved by Spiss and seconded by McLain that the executive secretary and a Board representative meet with the Commissioner of Higher Education relative to this. Motion carried.

The Board next discussed methods of bringing the story of the Association to more people. It was pointed out that several states have a motion picture film concerning the activities of the Association which is made available to schools and other groups upon request. It was moved by Quale that the executive secretary check into the cost, etc., of having a film made and report on same at the August meeting of the Board. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

The secretary reported that the Association had made its final \$100 payment on its institutional membership in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame and the name of the Association would be inscribed on their Founders Wall in memory of an individual designated by the Association. It was moved by Kolbo that Earl Abrahamson's name be submitted for same. Seconded by McLain and carried.

A request from the Park River Elementary School for permission to use 9th grade boys from the Walsh County Ag. School on their junior high football team was read. The Board voted to sustain the ruling made a number of years ago that since the two schools were two different entities, students from one school would not be eligible to participate on teams of the other.

Mr. Broton presented a report of the "20 game" and junior high committee. It was moved by McLain that the committee's recommendation that junior high students be eligible for the high school team regardless of type of school organization be approved. Seconded by Easton and carried. Muckenhirn moved that members of junior high basketball teams be limited to 12 nights of participation and a total of 48 quarters plus one tourney. Seconded by Spiss and carried. The committee's recommendation that the "20 game" rule in basketball be left as is for another year was adopted.

A request from St. Ann's Elementary School that they and St. Mary's Elementary, both of Bismarck, be allowed to field one football team composed of students from both schools because of their small size was next presented. It was moved by McLain that since this was contrary to the by-laws of the organization, the request be denied. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

A report was next given showing the amount of money paid out to home teams at this year's state wrestling, gymnastics, and track meets. It was moved by Easton to leave payments next year the same as before. Seconded by Quale and carried.

A letter from the I-94 Conference requesting Board approval for play-off games between conference champions in football was read. No action was taken since it is now legal to play football games up to November 15th, and so such games are possible without Board approval.

A request from the Southeast Class A region for a state indoor track championship meet was next presented. It was moved by Spiss and seconded by Muckenhirn that the matter be tabled. Motion carried.

A request from Ray High School that the Activities Association put on a basketball rules clinic in connection with their invitational coaches clinic next fall was read. Quale moved that the decision relative to same be left to the executive secretary. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Bruce Anderson presented the report of the ABF committee recommending that schools be offered an alternate plan next year whereby payments on claims would be increased 50% with an increase of 35% in premium cost. A study by the office staff of 2,000 claims revealed that such an increase in premium would take care of the increased payments under said plan. Anderson moved that the recommendation be adopted. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The Board then recessed for lunch and reconvened at 1:00 P.M. with all members present. Delegations from Minot, Bismarck, Grand Forks, Fargo, and Valley City appeared before the Board extending invitations for hosting various Association-sponsored activities in the 1971-1972 school year. Action on site selections was deferred until the next day so that all written invitations might also be reviewed and given consideration.

A request from Bismarck to change the date of the boys district track meet from Friday to Saturday was discussed. It was then moved by Peterson that all boys district track meets be held on Saturday, and seconded by McLain, but the motion failed when put to vote. Spiss then moved that the managers of the boys district meets be permitted to schedule same for either Friday or Saturday, with a preference for Saturday, but that no schools be allowed to switch districts. The motion was seconded by Peterson and carried.

The Board next reviewed the minutes of the Class B district chairmen's meeting and discussed various items which had been brought up at that meeting. It was moved by Broton that ABF coverage for 5th and 6th grade interscholastic basketball be provided with no increase in premiums. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

Recommendations were read from various Class A and B districts concerning items they wished brought to the attention of the Board. Discussion followed, and it was agreed that the item concerning a lengthening of the period of ineligibility from one semester to one year be placed on the August agenda.

The secretary reported that requests from 18 schools primarily from the southeast section of the state, had been received requesting that the State

Music Festival be moved from Minot to a more central location. No action was taken.

The following recommendations of the hockey coaches were adopted upon motion by Anderson and second by Quale:

1. Failure of player to wear mouthpiece shall result in a 7½ minute misconduct penalty.
2. Excessive curvature of stick draws a disqualification penalty.
3. Any player who leaves the bench area to participate in a fight will automatically be disqualified for that game plus the next scheduled game in regular season or tournament play. This rule is applicable also to a player or players engaging in a fight with another player while leaving the ice area.
4. Back skate of offensive player must be in contact with the ice when straddling the blue line in attacking zone.
5. In overtime play in state tournament competition a 12 minute rest period will follow the first overtime period instead of 8 as at present, to allow sufficient time for cleaning and flooding the ice.
6. Rating cards for officials and coaches be used similar to those in basketball and other sports.

Recommendations of the Wrestling Advisory Committee were next reviewed and the following were adopted upon motion by Spiss and second by Quale:

1. Clarify weigh-in time for A and B squads.
2. A boy may go up one weight class over his actual weight two times after the date of weight certification.
3. Mat judges be used in one A and one B region next year.
4. A tournament having eight or more schools should have two scales available for weighing-in.
5. The Association supply forms to be used by coaches at weigh-in as per sample submitted.
6. Overtime judges be selected by state tournament managers but all judges should not be from the city hosting the tourney.

Recommendations of the Boys Track Advisory Committee were then reviewed and the following were approved upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Spiss:

1. Minimum standard in the 2 mile run be changed from 10:30 to 10:20.
2. Class A and B schools be allowed 4 entrants per event at regional meet instead of three.
3. Distance Limits:
 - 1 day meet: Distance events are 2 mile, mile and 880. Any boy may run 2 of the 3 but could not be entered in any other running event. If he runs only one of the 3 he may enter other events of less than 880.
 - 2 day meet: Distance events are 2 mile, mile, 880, 440, and leg of mile relay. Any boy may run 3 of the 5 distance events plus one of a lesser distance.
4. At district meets the scheduled time for the 2 mile and the mile be reversed so that the mile is run in the morning and the 2 mile in the afternoon.

5. At least 2 more judges be used on the turns at the state meet.
6. Team members are to be attired in similar uniforms at district and state meets.
7. At district and state meets in races around the curve or around the track when preliminaries are held, final qualifiers be given their choice of lanes according to preliminary times.
8. The NDHSAA check into the possibility of securing different type numbers for contestants at the state meet.
9. In the 100 yard dash when quarterfinals are run they should be run in 4 heats with 3 from each advancing into the semifinals. The qualifiers from heats 1 and 2 to make up the one semifinal heat and the qualifiers from heats 3 and 4 to make up the 2nd semifinal heat. Four qualifiers from each semifinal heat to advance to the finals.
10. No less than 3 individuals or relay teams are to be placed in a given heat at the state meet.
11. At the state meet, the pickers stand should be at least 20 feet from the inside lane.
12. In a combined junior high meet (7, 8, 9) the 9th grade boy must abide by the limits set for the 8th grade boy.
13. Items to be put on next years questionnaire:
 - a. Should scoring in the relays be changed to 10-7-5-3-1?
 - b. Should qualifying meets be allowed with 3 instead of 6 teams competing?

The following recommendations of the Girls Track Advisory Committee were next presented and were adopted upon motion by Anderson and second by McLain:

1. Minimum standards to be revised as follows:
 - a. 440 yd. Dash to 66.0 from 67.0
 - b. 70 yd. Hurdles to 10.8 from 11.0
 - c. Discus to 95 feet from 90 feet
 - d. 880 yd. Relay — Class A to 1:56 from 1:58
Class B to 1:58 from 1:59
 - e. 880 yd. Medley Relay — Class A to 2:02 from 2:03
 - f. Mile Run — new event at 6:00
2. Add mile run as one of the events to be contested.
3. Allow girls to enter four events with a maximum of 3 running or three field events.
4. Distance races to be the mile, 880, and 440. Any girl may run two of the three plus one of lesser distance.
5. The 880 to be contested at 10:00 A.M. at district and state meets with the 440 to be run at 1:00 P.M. and the mile in the time slot now occupied by the 440.
6. Allow Class A and B schools to enter 4 contestants per event at the district meets.
7. Numbers to be used for contestants at the state meet.

The Board then recessed for the day and reconvened at 9:00 A.M. June 11th, with all members present.

Mr. Broton, Chairman of the Officials Committee, presented recommendations for officials for the 1972 basketball tourneys. Upon motion by Peterson and second by Quale, the following officials were to be tendered contracts:

The Board next reviewed the minutes of the North Dakota Officials Board of Directors meeting and approved the following items applicable to the NDHSAA:

1. In the interests of better communication, it was recommended that a NDOA representative make the presentations to the NDHSAA Board following the annual meeting of the NDOA.
2. When possible, beginning officials be used in junior varsity games, freshman games, etc., in order to gain experience prior to varsity work.
3. In 1972 regional and state tourneys, officials in basketball be paid \$30.00 per game and their expenses for meals and lodging be raised to \$20.00 per day. At regions, the meal allowance be \$5.00 per day if officials commute each day.
4. The NDHSAA send an instructional sheet to all tourney officials in in wrestling and basketball listing the uniform and demanding that they be properly attired.
5. The four state basketball officials meet the morning of the beginning of the tourney with the tourney manager and a representative of the NDHSAA staff to assign officials for the championship bracket games and that this group also meet with the eight coaches of the teams involved.
6. Officials mechanics to be covered for about 20 minutes at next years clinics.

It was agreed that Mr. Schindler should represent the NDHSAA at the meeting specified in item 5 above.

After reviewing all invitations that had been extended, the following sites were selected for NDHSAA sponsored events for the 1971-1972 school year:

Supt. Dan Jerome and high school principal, Darrell Gannarelli, of Belcourt appeared before the Board in connection with incidents involving the Belcourt basketball team or members of the team at the state basketball tournament. A statement from the manager of the Holiday Inn Motel concerning incidents happening at the motel was read. Various other reports concerning conduct of the Belcourt team and students were also reviewed and discussed with the Belcourt school officials. Following a discussion concerning these matters, Muckenhirn moved that the Belcourt school be placed on probation for one year in keeping with previous policy in the handling of similar incidents and that the executive secretary send a letter to the Belcourt school advising them of such action. Seconded by Spiss and carried.

Mr. Gary Carr of Wahpeton also appeared before the Board in regard to the incident involving himself and an official at the Southeast Class A regional wrestling tourney in Valley City earlier in the year. The case was reviewed at this time and responsibilities of principals outlined. A letter of apology had already been submitted by Mr. Carr to the Board for his actions, and he was instructed to also send a written apology to the official involved with a copy of same to be filed with the executive secretary.

Discussion followed as to expense allowance to be made to teams and officials who had to make two trips to Hatton because of the postponement of the State Baseball Tourney because of rain. It was moved by Easton that they be given double mileage allowance and a 50% increase in meal allowance. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

As the golf coaches had requested a 2 day 36 hole grass greens golf tournament in 1972, Spiss moved that the office staff work out details for same. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The following recommendations of the Girls Gymnastic Committee were next presented:

1. The state be divided into two districts (East and West) and district championship be held to determine entries for the state meet, and that 8 gymnasts per event including the top 3 all-around gymnasts qualify for the state meet from each district.

2. That the season be shortened two weeks and the state meet be a one-day affair on February 11 or 12.
3. That there be a qualifying score before a girl has to move up a division in any event even though she has taken first in an event:
 - a. If a girl scores a first with a score of 3.5 or above in novice division, she must move up. However, any girl may move from novice to intermediate.
 - b. If a girl scores a first with a score of 5.0 or above in the intermediate division, she must advance to the junior division, and this is the only way in which she may so advance.
 - c. A competitor need not move from the novice to the intermediate division in the all-around event unless she has averaged 3.5 or above in each event.
 - d. A competitor cannot move from the intermediate division to the junior division in the all-around event unless she has averaged 5.0 or above in each event, and if she has such an average, she must move up.
4. That it be mandatory to follow the gymnastic guide as established by the NDHSAA to the letter.
5. That the same compulsories must be used when inter-state teams compete in an invitational meet in North Dakota.
6. That more sets of judges be used even if that means a lesser number of judges in each set. However, not less than three is recommended.
7. It be required that mats cover the entire floor-exercise area.
8. A gymnast's score be reduced if her coach or spotter is overly enthusiastic about her performance while she is in the competitive area.
9. Bonus points be eliminated in compiling team scores except in the all-around event.
10. A gymnastic workshop be held for coaches prior to the gymnastic season and compulsories be completely discussed with loop films being made available if possible.

After some discussion, it was moved by Muckenhirn that items 1 and 2 be tabled for further study and that consideration be given to these two items for the 1972-1973 school year should the study indicate desirability for same, and that items 3 through 10 be adopted as recommended. The motion was seconded by Easton and carried.

Next under consideration were the following recommendations of the Music Advisory Committee:

1. That the classification of vocal solos into high voice, medium voice, and low voice, be eliminated, and each school be allowed 6 entries in boys solos and 6 in girls solos, instead of 2 in each of the classifications as before.
2. That schools be permitted to enter 3 solos in B^b clarinet, 3 in cornet, and 3 in trombone, providing total instrumental entries do not exceed present maximum limitations.
3. Multiple percussion be added to solo list.
4. That a major program revision study be made during the next school year as was done in speech the past year.
5. That the State Music Festival be again held at Minot State College in 1972.

6. That district entry fees be eliminated if possible, and that entries then be submitted directly to the district manager without going through the state office.

It was moved by McLain and seconded by Spiss that items 1 to 5 be approved and that action on item 6 be deferred until the August meeting when a more complete financial picture will be available. Motion carried.

Taken under consideration next were the following recommendations submitted by the Speech Advisory Committee:

1. No individual may enter more than one event involving a preparation period, such as Broadcasting, Extemporaneous Speaking, and Extemporaneous Interpretation. However, a person entering one of these divisions may enter one other division which does not involve a preparation period.
2. The number of qualifiers from districts for the State A contest be modified as follows:
 - a. 2-5 entries in district competition — qualify 2
 - b. 6-7 entries in district competition — qualify 3
 - c. 8 or more entries in district competition — qualify 4
3. Only 1 round to be used in Broadcasting, using 3 judges.
4. Trophies, managers fees and incidental expenses for the State Student Congress meet to be paid for by the State Association.
5. Rename the divisions in debate as follows: A division changed to Cross X, B division as Traditional, and novice to remain the same.
6. That the state meets be again held at Fargo North.

It was moved by Easton and seconded by Anderson that all but item 5 of the above proposals be adopted. Motion carried.

Next considered were the following recommendations of the tennis coaches:

1. The date of the state tennis meet be set on the first day of the boys state track meet, if not possible to schedule independently thereof.
2. Schools must enter a complete team in the state meet.
3. Schedule a coaches meeting for 8:30 A.M. the day of the state meet.
4. All teams be dropped that are not present and ready to play at 9:00 A.M.
5. Each school be charged a \$10.00 entry fee which is to be returned when they show up for the tournament.

It was moved by Easton and seconded by Peterson that all items except item 5 be approved. Motion carried. Anderson then moved that because of problems encountered due to the elimination of entry fees at various athletic events, that the possibility of re-instating such fees or deposits be considered at the August meeting. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

The Board next reviewed salaries being paid office personnel and voted an increase of \$25.00 per month to Mrs. Lucile Vandestreek, bookkeeper, and Mrs. Ethel Thvedt, secretary, effective July 1, 1971.

Some time was spent discussing the upcoming National Federation meeting in Denver. Delegates Larson and Peterson notified the group that they would be unable to attend, so the secretary was instructed to contact

incoming board member, Norman Batterberry about being a delegate along with members Anderson, Kolbo and Quale.

The use of school equipment at summer camps was next reviewed. Under consideration was the question as to whether school pads, etc., would be considered as part of the uniform and thus illegal for use by students at such camps. It was agreed that equipment and pads were not a part of the uniform and so are not forbidden under the summer camp rules. The decision as to whether schools would let youngsters use such equipment for summer camps was left to the local school authorities, although the use of school uniforms is forbidden.

Discussion followed on the question whether a track meet between champions in the various divisions, to be held after the state track meet would be legal. The Board ruled that this would not be legal as the track season ends with the state track meet.

A comparison summary of gross and net receipts from Class A and B basketball tournaments in North and South Dakota was next reviewed. The Chairman appointed a finance committee composed of Kolbo, Chairman, Muckenhirn, and Broton to study price structures for the 1971-1972 events and instructed the committee to present a report at the August meeting. Also appointed was a committee composed of Anderson, Chairman, Quale, and McLain to study the retirement plans in effect for office staff members and to report on same at the August meeting.

Muckenhirn moved that the August meeting be held on August 19th and 20th starting at 1:00 P.M. on the 19th. Seconded by McLain and carried.

There being no further business the Board adjourned, after giving retiring President Larson a standing ovation.

The maximum for an apprentice official be set at \$15.00. If the NDHSAA does not adopt the recommended fees, that the NDOA asks to abolish recommended fees and allow each local officials association to set their own fee schedule. Seconded by Brown and carried.

Motion by Brown that one member of the Officials Board accompany Dick Schindler to the rule interpretation meetings conducted by the National Federation. Seconded by Albrecht and carried.

Motion by Brown to have one member of the Officials Board met with the NDHSAA Board to finalize basketball tournament officials selection. Seconded by Albrecht and carried.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

Motion by Albrecht that in 1972 regional and state tourney officials in basketball be paid \$30.00 per game and their expenses for meals and lodging be raised to \$20.00 per day. Seconded by Gebhart and carried.

The proper officiating uniforms for wrestling and basketball officials were discussed. The group felt that uniformity must be demanded at the regional and state level. The group recommended that the NDHSAA send an

instructional sheet to all tourney officials in wrestling and basketball listing the uniform and demanding that they be properly attired.

Motion by Albrecht that the four state basketball officials meet the morning of the beginning of the tourney with the tourney manager and a representative of the NDHSAA staff to assign officials for the championship bracket games and that this group also meet with the eight coaches of the teams involved. Seconded by Ives and carried.

The group then recommended that next year Mr. Schindler attempt to use about twenty minutes in rules clinics to cover officials mechanics.

The maximum recommended officiating fees were next discussed. The group felt that it was unfortunate that the maximum recommended fees too often become the minimum fee even for the beginning official.

The group again recommended that no out-of-state officials be used at state-sponsored tourneys.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Motion by Brown to have one member of the officials board meet with the NDHSAA when final selection of basketball tournament officials is made. Seconded by Kessler and carried.

Motion by Helm to raise the recommended preliminary basketball fees to \$10.00 for Class A, and in Class B to \$7.50 for 8 minute quarters and \$5.00 for 6 minute quarters. Seconded by Orvik and carried.

Russ Burfening commented on the small number of members attending the annual meeting and he felt something should be done. Lasater stated that he felt each official should belong to a local association, and that perhaps the local could then send representatives to the annual meeting. 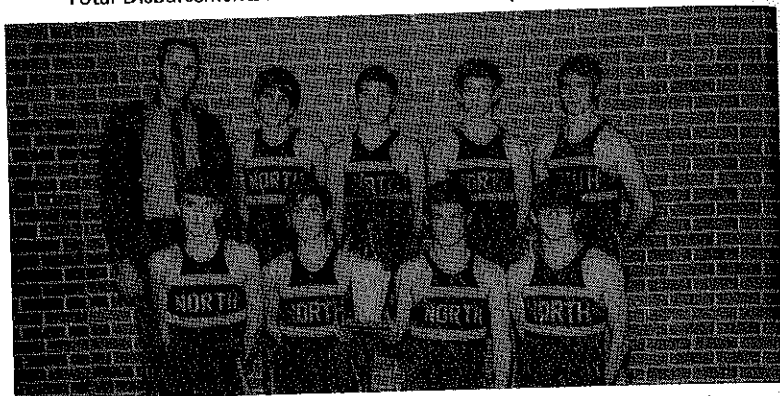

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, June 30, 1971

NOTE 1: The association has invested its reserves for maximum yield and safety. The following summary indicates how the funds were invested on the closing dates --

The yield was 6.8643% on the average investment this year.

NOTE 2: On June 30, 1971, the association had \$44,854. invested in real estate and improvements, \$16,541. in office fixtures and equipment, and \$2,494. in films and publications. Depreciation has been provided using the straight line method with appropriate lives varying from 28 to 4 years.

NOTE 3: Unclaimed checks issued, outstanding in excess of one year, have been restored to the bank accounts and will be carried as a liability until the statute of limitations permits them to be cancelled and restored to the related fund balance.

NOTE 4: Encumbrances represent a provision for unpaid bills, estimates of the cost of goods and services on order but which have not been billed to the association, insurance claims in process, and a reasonable estimate of expected claims where only the notice of injury has been received.

NOTE 5: The association intends to return to the members the excess portion of the balances in each fund which are not needed in the future. This may be done by reducing future assessments for dues or premiums, or by increasing the benefits and services rendered -- at the discretion of the board. During the current year, the dues were waived and allowances increased for activities which were not self-sustaining.

NOTE 6: A change in the practice of crediting all investment earnings to the general fund was made this year. Current earnings were allocated to each fund based on the operating revenues accumulated from July 1, 1962 to July 1, 1970. This resulted in about 60% being allocated to the General Fund and 40% to the Accident Benefit Fund.

The fund balances on July 1, 1970 and 1969 were reallocated to reflect more clearly the accumulations of each fund.

These changes were determined by the Executive Secretary and the auditor and are subject to the approval of the directors at their next meeting scheduled for August 19, 1971.

(Additional detailed financial data is available but has been deleted so this report is reasonably concise, suitable for general distribution, and is consistent with present reporting standards.)
