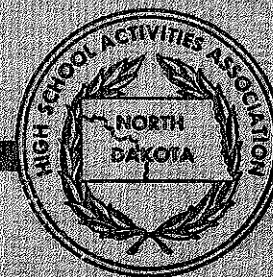

FOREWORD

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is pleased to present the 49th Annual Handbook which contains a historical and statistical account of the year's operation.

Attention is called to events and happenings which were new this past year and to certain trends and developments that have taken place.

1. The reorganization of school districts has apparently leveled off as the total membership remained the same as a year ago with 270 high schools enrolled in the Association. However 20%, or 54 of our member schools have less than 50 students in grades 9-12, and 8 of these have less than 30.

2. The number of Class A schools continues to decline as the larger Class B schools, who had previously elected Class A classification, continue to revert back to Class B. Crosby and Stanley were so reclassified this past year, dropping the total number of Class A schools to 34. Larimore, Mott, and Tioga will follow suit this next year leaving the number of Class A schools at 31 for the 1973-74 season. Bowman and Hettinger have filed for reclassification for 1974-75, leaving only Park River and Fort Yates as the only Class A schools eligible for reclassification who have not filed applications for same.

3. The 1971-72 year was a success financially for the Association. As a result the Board of Directors was able to purchase four electronic wrestling scoreboards this year, besides increasing team expense allowances for track, tennis, and golf for both boys and girls in addition to transferring \$2,000 to the Building Fund Reserve. 1971-72 was also a good year financially for the accident benefit fund, enabling the Board to establish a \$25,000 catastrophic fund for major injuries as well as an \$8,000 transfer to the Building Fund.

4. Gross receipts from basketball tournaments again set a new record exceeding the previous high mark set a year ago by nearly \$1,500. Because of increased operational costs however, the net receipts fell about \$650 short of the record figure set in 1971.

5. Basketball and hockey continue to remain as the only two activities sponsored by the Association which are self-supporting. All other sports and activity programs are subsidized by income realized from these two sources. Track is the most highly subsidized activity, with the girls' and boys' programs costing the Association approximately \$24,000 this past year.

6. This past year, the accident benefit fund program was upgraded so as to provide for a minimum payment of \$25,00 on all pro-rated claims. About 300 more claims were processed than a year ago. These two factors resulted in total payments of approximately \$8,000 more than in 1971-1972.

7. Amendments were passed by the General Assembly eliminating the necessity for the exchange of eligibility sheets for season contests, and changing the age limitations for junior high competition.

8. The first official State Class A Indoor Track and Field Meet was conducted this past year. Due to be added is a similar state meet for Class B schools in 1973-1974.

9. Because of the questioning by the Attorney General of the right of school districts to belong to an Activities Association, your Board of Directors introduced a bill in the State Legislature specifically authorizing same. The bill passed both Houses with only 2 dissenting votes, and was signed by the Governor, thus removing all doubt about the legality of the Association.

10. The ad-hoc music committee completed work on the refinement of the new music manual, and the new program will go into effect in 1973-74.

11. We seem to be experiencing a steady decline in school and student participation in the various speech activities sponsored by the Association. This is a regrettable situation. Because of the great importance of the art of communication in the world today, students should be encouraged to take advantage of the opportunities provided for the training and practice necessary to acquire the power of effective speech through the programs being offered.

12. After conducting a detailed survey as to the wishes of member schools, the Board re-instated girls' basketball as a sponsored activity for 1973-1974. Over 200 schools, which have indicated that they will be participating in the program, have been organized into 27 districts.

13. Because of the rapid growth of girls sports, your Board of Directors voted to add an assistant secretary to handle these activities and to assist with the music and speech programs this coming year.

In general, this has been another successful year. Again, we are mindful of the valued help and assistance given by many school people and others interested in the Association program. The Board of Directors and office personnel express their appreciation for the whole-hearted cooperation of each of you in making this another banner year.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Valley City, North Dakota -- August 3, 4, 1972

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Valley City on August 3 and 4, with all members present except M. F. Peterson.

The reading of the minutes of the June meeting was waived as each Board member had been presented with a copy of these minutes.

The first order of business was a review of annual audit of the Association for the 1971-72 fiscal year as prepared and presented by R. B. Ludvigson, Certified Public Accountant of Valley City. Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Quale, the audit was approved as submitted.

The Board next examined the complete financial report of the Association from July 1, 1972 to August 1, 1972 and approved same following motion by Anderson and second by Easton.

Pat Schwan, sales representative of Daktronic's, demonstrated electronic wrestling scoreboards manufactured by his firm, and quoted the following prices: 1 board - \$1,845.00; 2 boards - \$1,783.50 each; and 4 boards - \$1,625.00 each.

Jim Adelson of KXJB-TV next appeared before the Board presenting a bid of the telecasting of the state hockey tournament in the amount of \$275.00 for the championship game and \$125.00 for each additional game carried for the 1973 tournament, and \$300.00 for championship game plus \$125.00 for each additional game for the 1974 event. It was moved by Quale that the bid for the 1973 tourney be accepted. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

Next reviewed were TV bids received for various basketball tourneys. Upon motion by Broton, the bid of KXMC-TV for \$1,450.00 for the entire State B Tourney, \$500.00 for the semi-final and final games of the NW Class A Regional, and \$500.00 for the semi-final and final games of the SW Class A Regional Tourneys was accepted.

The following proposed budget for the 1972-73 fiscal year as presented by the executive secretary was reviewed and approved upon motion by Anderson and second by Batterberry:

A request from Bowman High School for reclassification as a B school was reviewed. Muckenhirn moved that the request be approved effective with the 1974-75 school year as provided for in the by-laws. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The secretary next reported that the rental fee for the use of the NDSU Fieldhouse for a one-day Class A indoor track meet would be \$300.00. Anderson moved that the figure be accepted and the Association sponsor such a meet this year on a one-year trial basis. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried. Anderson then moved that three team trophies of the minor sport size be provided, plus five place individual awards for each event. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Reports were next presented by the secretary on acceptance of tourney sites by host schools, and by the Assistant Secretary on acceptance of officiating assignments.

Letters from the Fargo Blue-Line Club and other individuals relative to tournament site selections were read. No action was taken in connection therewith.

The Board then recessed until 9 A.M. Friday morning.

After considerable discussion on the subject of girls basketball, Broton moved that the Association implement and sponsor a girls basketball program effective with the 1973-74 school year. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried. Muckenhirn then moved that the girls rule book published by the National Federation be the official rule book to be used in the program, in line with the policy of using Federation rule books in all sports for which same are published. Seconded by Anderson and carried. Other problems, such as time of season, districting, etc., were left to be worked out after further study.

The Board next adopted (on motion by Anderson and second by Quale) a set of guidelines to be followed relative to the recognition of individuals or groups at Association-sponsored activities. These guidelines are as follows: "Requests for recognition of groups or individuals at Association-sponsored tournaments or events are to be cleared with the executive-secretary beforehand and requests shall be generally approved if they meet any of the following criteria":

1. Recognition of prominent public officials.
2. Recognition of State Association or National Federation personnel.
3. Recognition of high school championship teams.
4. Recognition of state "athletes of the year."
5. Recognition of state "coaches of the year."
6. Recognition of newly elected members to Officials Hall of Fame.

Considerable time was spent in reviewing proposals and recommendations of the Finance Committee as to the disposition of approximately \$17,000.00 excess monies in the General Fund, and \$34,500.00 in the ABF. After considering various proposals, the following dispositions were made of the excess amounts in the General Fund upon motion by McLain and second by Easton: Purchase of four (4) electronic wrestling scoreboards - \$6,500.00; Increased allowance of \$5.00 per contestant to schools in state boys and girls track meet for 1973 - \$5,000.00; A contestant allowance to schools of \$10.00 per individual for the 1973 state grass greens golf tourney and \$5.00 per individual for the 1973 state sand greens golf tourney, the state girls golf tourney and the boys and girls state tennis tourneys - \$2,300.00; Trade-in allowance for one new Association automobile - \$1,500.00; Transfer to building fund reserve - \$2,000.00.

After considerable discussion concerning the merits of a catastrophic benefit plan, Easton moved that the excess monies in the ABF benefit fund; \$1,500.00 for trade-in allowance on one Association car, and \$8,000.00 to building fund reserve. The motion was seconded by Quale and carried.

Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by McLain, the following changes were made in the ABF plan for 1972-73:

1. A minimum payment of \$25.00 shall be made on all pro-rated claims.
2. The maximum amount payable under the regular casualty plan was increased from \$1,500.00 to \$2,500.00.

Further, a catastrophic benefit plan beginning at \$2,500.00 and up to \$5,000.00 was adopted, with said catastrophic plan to be considered exclusively as excess coverage and to be payable only for unpaid portions after other coverage for any one accident up to a maximum amount of \$2,500.00. The Association staff was instructed to make a study during the current year as to whether any further benefit increases could be made for the 1973-74 school year without increasing premium rates, and to bring forth recommendations concerning same.

Association Attorney L. T. Sproul next outlined recent court cases dealing with State Associations and discussed possible desirable legislation. After considerable discussion, Easton moved that the executive secretary and Mr. Sproul meet with Mr. Vanderwalle of the Attorney-General's Office, and Mr. Emerson Murray, prior to the September meeting of the Board, to consider possible legislation, and that a report on same be made at the September meeting. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Next brought back for discussion was the question of modifying the regulation dealing with the payment of fees for summer athletic camps, but the matter was tabled upon motion by Broton and second by Batterberry.

A request from the Red River Valley Synod of the LCA for a moratorium on school activities the week of December 25 to January 1 was presented. The secretary was instructed to inform them that such would require an amendment to the by-laws and of the steps necessary to secure such amendments.

Next reviewed was House Bill. 15655 before the National Congress to amend the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The Board went on record as opposing this bill.

Muckenhirn next reported that all amendments before the General Assembly at the National Federation meeting in Miami had been voted down and that Bruce Anderson of North Dakota had been elected to a three-year term as an executive committeeman on the Federation Board. The report was accepted and Batterberry then moved that any and all Board members be authorized to attend the annual summer Federation meetings in the future. Seconded by Broton and carried.

The Board next reviewed the various proposed amendments to be voted on by the membership at the General Assembly meeting in October. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by McLain, the Board voted to endorse the amendment concerning age of junior high students proposed by Dickinson High School. Broton next moved that the Board of Directors sponsor a constitutional amendment requested by the NDSBA which would remove the restriction on the number of terms which their executive secretary could serve on the NDHSAA Board of Directors. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Easton moved that the Board endorse the amendment sponsored by the SE Principals Association calling for a shortening of the track season, but the motion died for lack of a second.

Discussion followed concerning dissatisfaction expressed by some schools over the need of exchange of eligibility sheets for each individual contest. Muckenhirn moved that the Association sponsor an amendment to the by-laws to remove this requirement and that the office staff develop a plan for certification which would reduce the amount of paper work involved. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Some time was devoted to reviewing other aspects of the annual meeting and consideration of a speaker for the program.

The secretary informed the Board that due to unforeseen conflicts, the fieldhouses at UND and NDSU would not be available for Class A regional basketball tournaments on March 2 and 3. Anderson then moved that each of the four regions be allowed to schedule their tournament on any dates between February 26 and March 3. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

Complaints from some newspapers concerning release time of actions taken at Board meetings were next reviewed and, after some discussion, the matter was tabled.

The secretary informed the Board of the possibility of a special assessment to be levied by the City of Valley City for a parking lot, which would

cost the Association about \$35.00 per year for 18 years. Approval was given for signing the petition for same.

The Board next adopted a policy relative to Association jackets, wherein Board members retiring from the Board are permitted to retain the jacket but remove emblem from same.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned after the Board had set the time and place for a meeting to consider hardship cases if necessary to coincide with the time of the administrators conference in September in Bismarck.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting North Dakota High School Activities Association Valley City, North Dakota — September 14, 1972

A special meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association Board of Directors was held in Valley City at 1:00 P.M. on September 14th, with all members present except James Broton and John Sunderland.

First taken under consideration were three eligibility cases which had been appealed to the Board under the hardship rule and investigated by Board Committees.

Mr. Batterberry reported on an investigation conducted by himself and Mr. Quale in the case of Fred Poitra of White Shield, and recommended that the boy be ruled eligible. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by McLain, the Board so ruled.

Batterberry next reported their findings concerning the case of David Johnston of Hurdsville and moved that, in light of same, and since no letter had been filed by the Sykeston school regarding no undue influence having been made, that the Board not act on this case. The motion was seconded by Easton and carried.

Muckenhirn reviewed the findings of the committee in connection with the application submitted by the Starkweather school concerning Rick Holden, and moved for immediate eligibility. Seconded by Quale and carried.

Harold Pedersen, Athletic Director of the Fargo Public Schools, appeared before the Board to outline the participation of one of their students, Terry O'Leary, in a summer hockey program in the Minneapolis area. The Board agreed with the previous ruling of the executive secretary that there had been no violation of NDHSAA regulations.

Ken Rio, Athletic Director, and James Van Camp, Principal, of Grand Forks Central High School next reported on the participation of one of their students, Scott Omlid, in a two-week hockey camp in Minnesota and a three-week hockey camp in Manitoba this past summer. The Board reviewed the summer camp criteria and decided that, because of the vagueness of the rule concerning such participation by individuals, and because of the lack of a prescribed penalty for excess participation, that no action would be taken against the boy. The item of camp regulations and penalties was placed on the agenda for a thorough review at the October meeting.

Mr. Rio, Manager of the State Cross-Country Meet, asked that the starting time of the Meet be changed to avoid a conflict with the UND-NDSU football

game scheduled at the same time in Grand Forks. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Peterson, the starting time of the Cross-Country Meet was moved up one and one-half hours from that previously set.

The secretary brought up the question as to whether regulations would permit football teams to participate in jamboree-type scrimmages and stated that he had interpreted the rule to mean that three schools could get together and scrimmage each other in football, but that it would count as two scrimmages. The Board agreed that this was a proper interpretation.

Next discussed were questions that had arisen in regard to girls gymnastics as a result of the recent decision to permit schools to conduct a junior high season at any time during the school year. It was moved by Batterberry that junior high participants be permitted to advance to a senior high team at any time but that each individual's total participation be limited to fifteen meets per school year. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

Attorney L. T. Sproul reviewed the highlights of the meeting which he and the executive secretary had had with Assistant Attorney General Gerald Van DeWalle and Emerson Murray as to the advisability of introducing statutory legislation authorizing schools to become members of the NDHSAA. There appeared to be some difference of opinion among the Board members as to the advisability of such action but, upon motion by Anderson and second by Batterberry, Attorney Sproul was directed to draft such a bill for review at the October meeting.

Consideration was next given to a request submitted by Zeeland for permission to use as their wrestling coach the coach from the Strasburg school, even though he would not be teaching in their system. Upon motion by Easton and second by McLain, the request was approved.

The secretary reported that Mr. Bob Shields, who had put on the NDHSAA Cheerleader Clinics for a number of years, had left the National Cheerleaders Association to form a new company under the name of the World Cheerleaders Council, and that he had offered to conduct the 1973 clinics for slightly more than one-half the price that we were currently paying. The secretary was instructed to investigate prices of various concerns and to negotiate a contract with the one deemed to be the most desirable.

Bids submitted by various dealers for 1973 model automobiles were next reviewed. Muckenhirn moved that the bid of McCurley Chevrolet of Valley City for two Chevrolet Caprice sedans be accepted. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

It was then moved by Easton that the Association sell their used cars at \$400.00 below book price to any interested Board members at the time of delivery of the new cars. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

The secretary reported that the Federal Land Bank Bonds purchased in 1969 for \$100,000.00 would mature on September 15th and that there appeared to be no favorable rate on long-term governmental securities at the present time. After some discussion, it was decided to temporarily invest these monies in three-month CD's in a local bank or Savings and Loan Association.

The Board next reviewed a proposed change in the Daktronics Wrestling Scoreboards and, upon motion by Easton and second by Peterson, agreed to purchase the re-designed boards.

Next under consideration was a request from the NW Class A region to employ Henry Milkey to work the NW Basketball Tournament, who would no longer be available to work the SW Tourney because of a change of dates.

Easton moved that said request be approved and contracts be changed accordingly. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting North Dakota High School Activities Association Bismarck, North Dakota - October 25, 1972

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in Bismarck at the Holiday Inn Motel on October 25, 1972, at 9:00 A.M. with all members present.

Each Board member was presented with a packet containing the agenda for the meeting and a financial report of all business transacted from July 1 to October 20, 1972.

The Board spent some time reviewing the financial report of both the General Fund and Accident Benefit Fund and upon motion by Broton and second by Batterberry, the reports were accepted as submitted.

Next reviewed was the eligibility status of Jay Ovitt of Argusville. This lad resides with his parents on a farm in the Casselton school district, but is attending school at Argusville as their home is considerably closer to Argusville. It was the feeling of the Board that there would be no particular hardship for the boy to attend school at Casselton and so upon motion by Peterson and second by Muckenhirn he was ruled ineligible for interscholastic competition at Argusville for 180 school days under the transfer rule.

The following cases which had been appealed under the hardship rule and investigated by two Board members were reviewed and ruled as follows:

Wayne Kleppe of Braddock	eligible
Thomas Robertson of Maddock	eligible
Jeffery Fox of New Town	eligible
Millard Hale of New Town	ineligible

Upon investigation, it was brought out that Veryl Lawler of Minot High School had competed in interscholastic wrestling competition the first semester of the 1971-1972 school year after transferring to Jim Hill Junior High, although he had not successfully passed three subjects the previous semester. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the boy be ruled ineligible for the first semester of the current year, seconded by Easton and carried. Easton then moved that Supt. Johnson of Minot be requested to ascertain from the Jim Hill Junior High Principal why this boy was permitted to participate and to submit a letter of explanation concerning same. Seconded by McLain and carried.

Reports received concerning alleged violations of the drinking rule by athletes from Langdon and Starkweather were reviewed, but as neither school reporting had followed the proper procedure in submitting protests, no action was taken.

Mr. Billy Mills of the BIA appeared before the Board in regards to an Indian Cross Country meet involving Indian students from BIA schools from 13 states to be held at Haskill, Kansas, on November 26th, and explained the

structure of the entire program. Approval for participation by such students as unattached individuals had been received from the other 12 states and Mr. Mills requested like approval from North Dakota. Upon motion by Broton and second by Batterberry the request was approved.

Discussion followed on the proposed legislative bill as drawn by the Association attorneys which would authorize membership by schools in the Association. It was the feeling of the Board that the bill as drawn was too lengthy and involved and that a short amendment to Chapter 15-29-08 of the North Dakota Code would be more desirable. It was moved by Muckenhirn that action on same be deferred until the December meeting. Seconded by Quale and carried.

A communication from the Solen school concerning the delay of the start of a football game played at New Salem was read. Broton gave a full report on the incident and reasons for the failure of the officials to report. Mr. Broton was asked to send copies of the officials contract to the NDHSAA office for examination and possible action. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Letters from the superintendents of the Maddock and Esmond schools concerning the participation of a 10th grade student from Esmond in a junior high contest between the two schools, and the action taken in connection therewith, was read. Motion by Muckenhirn that no further action was necessary and that the schools be commended for their actions in the matter. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The secretary reported on the matter of a boy who had moved from Minnesota to Leeds last fall, and who had failed to start school at Leeds by the 11th day of the semester because of the difference in starting dates of school in the two towns. Because of the extenuating circumstances, a ruling had been made that he would be eligible after he had attended as many days as he had missed since the opening of school. The ruling was upheld by the Board and no further action was deemed necessary.

Quale reported that he had received some unfavorable criticism from some members of the School Board Associations concerning the action taken by the Board at the September meeting relative to the method of disposal of the Association-owned vehicles. After some discussion, Peterson moved that the previous action be rescinded and that the vehicles be advertised for sale on bids to the general public, with bids due on December 1st and accompanied by a certified check in the amount of 5% of the bid, and the Board reserving the right to reject any and all bids. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

Attendance reports on the football clinics and cheerleader clinics were next reviewed.

A letter of explanation from Harold Pedersen, Athletic Director of the Fargo schools, concerning the intra-mural nature of their 7th and 8th grade hockey program was reviewed. In light of same, upon motion by Easton and second by Anderson, the Board ruled that these students could participate on a non-school team in the state pee-wee hockey tourney without jeopardizing their eligibility for spring sports.

Rev. J. W. Stoerker, Executive-Director of the North Dakota Conference of Churches, appeared before the Board concerning the possibility of a ban on the scheduling of athletic practices and games by schools the week of December 24 to January 1, and the possibility of a uniform state-wide weekly church night during the school year. Discussion followed and it was agreed that the church night problem could better be solved on a local level than on a state-wide level. It was pointed out that the Board had no authority to ban

practice sessions or games during the Christmas week under present by-laws and that any action relative thereto on a state-wide basis would have to be taken by the membership as a whole.

Some discussion followed on girl's basketball. Louis Davis of Page and Roger Bischoff of Tower City appeared before the Board presenting a resolution of the Cass County Schoolmasters as to their wishes concerning the extent of involvement of the NDHSAA in this sport.

Next taken under review were the regulations pertaining to summer camps. Muckenhirn moved that the present regulations concerning summer camps be abolished and that the Association not control or regulate attendance of students at such camps. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

The secretary reported that the City of Valley City would not be providing city steam heat beyond February, 1975, so the Association would have to be thinking about some other method of heating the office building. No action was taken on the matter at this time.

Discussion followed on the National Federation Conference for Athletic Directors at Denver, December 10-13. Chairman Kolbo outlined the advantages of sending a representative or representatives to this meeting. No action was taken.

Appointed to the canvassing committee by the chairman were members Sunderland as chairman, Broton, and McLain.

After some discussion, it was decided to expand the composition of the over-all review Advisory Committee to include the president and executive-secretary of the Coaches Association on said committee, upon motion by Anderson and second by Easton.

A letter from Cliff Fagan, Executive Secretary of the National Federation, concerning the Federation's stand on the Dellmus Bill before Congress, was read. Batterberry moved that the executive-secretary send a letter to our representatives and senators in Congress expressing our opposition to said bill. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The action of the executive-secretary in notifying schools who had failed to file their 1971-1972 master eligibility sheets that they would be suspended from the Association if said forms were not filed by November 1st, was upheld by the Board.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned, after setting the time and date of the next meeting for 9:00 A.M. on December 4th at the Association offices in Valley City.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Valley City, North Dakota — December 4, 1972

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 9:00 A.M. on December 4, 1972, at Valley City with all members present.

The first order of business was the opening of bids for the sale of the two 1972 Ford automobiles owned by the Association. High bidder on the brown car was Enga Larson of Bismarck with a bid of \$3,045 and the bid of

\$2,720 by James Broton of New England was high for the green unit. It was moved by McLain and seconded by Anderson that the bid submitted by the high bidder on each vehicle be accepted. Motion carried.

Next under consideration was the review of several transfer eligibility cases which had been submitted for consideration under the hardship rule. After reviewing same, the following decisions were rendered:

Harvey Foster of Buchanan: eligible with the beginning of the second semester providing he successfully passes the required number of courses this semester.

Earl Stokke of Cathay: eligible

Norman Benson of Halliday: eligible

Jerry Speed of Minot: eligible

Gordon Ward of New Town: eligible on condition that proper certification is received from both schools to the effect that no undue influence was involved.

Adrian Foote, Jr., of Parshall: eligible

Sam Meyers, Jr., of Roseglenn White Shield: eligible second semester providing he successfully passes the required number of subjects the first semester and proper certification is received from St. Marys of New England that no undue influence was involved.

John Pettit of Rock Lake: eligible if facts as outlined are confirmed by investigating committee and proper certification is received from school from which he transferred that no undue influence was involved.

Batterberry next outlined additional facts concerning the Millard Hale case from New Town, and moved that the action taken at the October meeting be rescinded and that the boy be declared eligible upon proper receipt of certification from St. Marys of New England that no undue influence was involved in the transfer. Seconded by Broton and carried.

The following decisions concerning other eligibility cases as follows were next rendered by the Board:

Junior boy from Page who resides in the Clifford-Galesburg district but is attending school at Page: ineligible under transfer rule for 180 school days from date of enrollment.

Peter Mehl of Fargo Shanley: ineligible under transfer rule for 180 school days from date of enrollment.

Tomora Bossa of Langdon: ineligible under the scholastic rule requiring that a student be passing in at least three subjects.

Dennis Bauste of Trenton: ineligible for first semester as he had not enrolled prior to the 11th day of the semester.

A report concerning the suspension of Charles Senn of Hettinger last April by the Hettinger school authorities for the boy's violation of the amateur rule through accepting cash prizes in a bowling tournament was received, along with a request for interpretation for procedure for reinstatement. The secretary was instructed to inform the school authorities concerning said procedure as outlined under Section V of Article VII of the by-laws.

Gerald Halmrast, Bismarck High School Wrestling Coach, appeared before the Board and outlined a junior Olympic wrestling program to be sponsored by the Wrestling Coaches Association in March and requested that post-season eligibility rules for students in connection therewith be waived. The Board informed him that inasmuch as said rule was a by-law they had no power to

waive same, and directed the secretary to caution member schools concerning the violation of said rule.

The executive secretary next presented several cases involving students who had transferred back to their home school after attending various parochial schools which had no interscholastic activities programs. After some discussion, Broton moved that such students be ruled immediately eligible upon transferring back to the high school in their home district. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Letters from Supt. Johnson of Minot and the principal of Jim Hill Junior High concerning the Veryl Lawler case acted on at the October meeting were read. No action was taken.

Attorney L. T. Sproul appeared before the Board and outlined a brief amendment which he had prepared to Chapter 15-29-08 of the N. D. State law which would authorize the payment of dues by school districts to the North Dakota High School Activities Association. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Anderson, the Board approved the amendment as drawn and agreed to submit same to the state legislature.

A request for use of Paul Huber as grade basketball coach at Halliday was approved under the customary conditions, upon motion by Anderson and second by Batterberry.

A similar request for use of Jerry Fladeland as assistant basketball coach at Carpio was also approved under the same conditions, and contingent upon the approval of the Department of Public Instruction since he is not a certified teacher, upon motion by Easton and second by Muckenhirn.

The secretary reported that several requests had been received from schools for an earlier date for the letting of bids for supplying basketballs for the 1973 tournaments. Batterberry moved for calling for bids for same at the January meeting of the Board. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Discussion followed on steps to be taken in connection with the girls' basketball program in 1973-1974. Broton moved that the membership be polled on several pertinent questions concerning same, seconded by Sunderland and carried.

Next taken under consideration was a question raised by the Crary school administration as to whether a basketball district could establish a more severe penalty in connection with the liquor rule for teams to qualify for district tournament play. The consensus of opinion was that while this was a prerogative of each local school, that such action could not be taken by a district committee.

In response to a question raised by the Grafton school, the Board ruled that a high school student would not be violating his amateur standing if he received pay for supervising hockey play of 9-year-old students for the local park board.

Letters from the Hazen school and Editor of the Hazen newspaper concerning a newspaper story of the Hazen-Underwood basketball scrimmage which constituted a violation of the scrimmage rule were read. The secretary was instructed to answer same instructing the editor as to the nature of the rule.

Reports concerning the various sports rules clinics and music clinics were next reviewed.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 11:00 A.M. at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck on January 26, 1973, with all members present.

Each member was presented with a packet containing the agenda, a complete financial report of the years business to January 20, 1973, and a list of checks drawn on the General Fund since October 21, 1972. The Board reviewed the financial reports and upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Broton approved same.

The canvassing committee consisting of members Sunderland, Broton, and McLain reported that they had canvassed the annual election results for membership on the Board of Directors and the proposed constitutional amendment and found them to be as follows:

G. A. Tooley, Bruce Anderson, and Del Easton were declared duly elected members of the Board and the constitutional amendment was declared passed effective July 1, 1973, upon motion by Sunderland and second by Batterberry.

The executive-secretary next reported the attendance of coaches at various rules clinics had been as follows:

261 of 270 basketball schools	
64 of 65 of wrestling schools	
10 of 10 hockey schools	
24 of 28 gymnastic schools	

Letters of explanation had been received from all administrators of schools whose coaches had not been in attendance except for two in basketball and one in gymnastics.

Upon motion by Easton and second by Batterberry, the Board approved an application by Westhope to use Lester Wyman, a certified but non-teaching coach, as 7th and 8th grade coach. A request from Minot Ryan to use Steven Carver, a college senior as girls gymnastics coach, was also approved on motion by Broton and second by McLain.

The secretary next reported on problems that had arisen in connection with rental fees for the NDSU fieldhouse for the Southeast Class A regional basketball tournament, but which had been settled to the satisfaction of all parties concerned. Also explained was the loss of the TV contract for the

telecasting of the Southwest Class A basketball tournament, because of the switch from original dates set.

Discussion followed concerning a violation by Pillsbury High School in using a boy in his 9th semester in two basketball games. The school pleaded ignorance of the rule and that they had discontinued using him after becoming aware of same. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Sunderland, the secretary was instructed to send a letter of reprimand to the school.

President Ray Albrecht of the NDOA briefed the Board concerning the annual meeting of their Association, and recommendations of their group, and invited representatives of the NDHSAA Board to attend their Board meeting on March 10th.

Supt. Tony Schell of Killdeer appeared before the Board requesting that Daniel Cleveland be declared immediately eligible under the hardship transfer rule. After reviewing information at hand concerning the case, it was moved by McLain that the boy be declared eligible contingent upon the findings of the investigating committee and providing necessary letters relative to no undue influence are filed. Seconded by Batterberry and carried. Appointed as an investigating committee were members Broton and Easton.

Chairman Anderson of the finance committee reported that the committee had not completed their work but would be ready to report at the March meeting in Bismarck.

The secretary reported that the results of the survey conducted relative to girls basketball indicated that 135 schools indicated that they would be participating in girls basketball next year and that a large majority of the respondents favored a fall season of approximately 10 weeks with 12 games and that tournament competition end on a district level. Favored by a smaller majority were: classifying schools in one class and the use of registered officials. Upon motion by Anderson and second by Easton, the following guidelines relative to the 1973-1974 program were approved:

1. Season from opening of school to second week-end in November
2. Tournament play end with district tourney
3. All schools grouped in one class
4. Maximum of 12 seasonal games or 10 games plus an invitational tourney

Broton moved to amend the motion to set-up two classes but the motion died for lack of a second. The secretary was instructed to notify schools of the decisions arrived at and to conduct another survey ascertaining which schools would be participating for sure under the conditions as outlined. Appointed on a committee to draw up district assignments and to work out other details concerning the program were members McLain, chairman, Batterberry, and Broton.

Bids for supplying basketballs for the 1974 tournaments were opened and upon motion by Broton and second by Batterberry, the low bid of \$12.64 per ball submitted by the G. P. Sporting Goods Co. of Bismarck for the Wilson B1200 Jet ball was accepted.

A letter from Fr. LaMeres relative to the transfer of the boys was also read, along with a statement to the effect that he could not file a letter to the effect that there had been no undue influence in connection with the transfers. Statements from the New Town coaches and the athletic director to the effect that they had not contacted the boys or used any influence on them were also presented. Anderson reported on meetings of the executive Board of the National Federation that he had attended since becoming a member of same.

Plans for the meeting of the Class B district chairmen to be held at the time of the State Class B tournament were discussed. McLain was appointed to chair the meeting and to make a report to the Board following the meeting.

Upon motion by Peterson and second by Muckenhirn, the secretary was instructed to contract with the World Cheerleaders Council for the 1973 Cheerleader Clinics.

Bismarck was selected as the site for the Regional V National Federation meeting next fall.

A request by the Ad Hoc music committee for expenses allowance for the holding of one more meeting to finalize plans for recommended revisions of the

state music program was approved upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Anderson.

The Board next ruled that a donkey basketball game would not be classified as a basketball contest and as such would not be counted as one of the allowable basketball games permitted each school.

The Board then recessed and reconvened at 10:30 A.M. on Sunday, January 28th.

Del Easton, Principal of Williston High, reported that their wrestling coach had used a boy in a wrestling tourney, four weeks after he had been suspended for violation of the liquor rule, as the coach thought that the rule was not applicable to possession alone. It was moved by Muckenhirn and seconded by Sunderland that a reprimand be sent to the school, that matches won by the lad be forfeited, and that the boy be required to 'sit-out' the remaining time of his suspension. Motion carried.

A request by the North Dakota Sports Review for permission to sponsor a free-throw contest for 8th graders in connection with the State Class B basketball tournament was presented. Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Broton, the request was denied.

Discussion followed on the advisability of holding training sessions for beginning officials. Mr. Schindler was instructed to meet with the NDOA Board of Directors in March to see if a plan could be worked out that could be financed and administered.

The Board next conducted a hearing relative to alleged conduct of the Stanton coach and some Stanton fans in connection with a basketball game played between Stanton and Flasher. Appearing before the Board were the superintendent and coach at Stanton and the two officials of the contest. The Stanton superintendent outlined steps and procedures which had been taken since then to prevent incidents such as this. Upon motion by McLain and second by Batterberry, the secretary was instructed to send a letter to the Stanton school indicating that the Board deplores such actions by fans and coaches, and encouraging the school to continue the efforts which they have undertaken to control same, along with a note to the officials as to how they might better have handled the situation. Motion carried.

Following this, a hearing was conducted concerning a report from the band instructor at Wilton that B squad basketball players had been permitted to participate in a basketball contest after a drinking violation. Appearing before the Board were the band-man, principal, and superintendent of the Wilton school. The superintendent reported that the guilt of the boys had not been definitely established until after the contest in question and that they had been subsequently suspended. Motion by Batterberry that no Board action be taken as punishment was levied as soon as guilt was determined, other than a letter to school authorities that it appeared that faster action could have been taken in investigating the case. Seconded by Broton and carried.

Next appearing before the Board were the superintendent and coach from North Central High School of Rogers in connection with an incident following the North Central - Buchanan basketball game which had been reported by the official. After reviewing same, it was moved by Peterson and seconded by Broton, that letters be sent to the school expressing our concern relative to such incidents, with a commendation to the superintendent for steps which he had taken to prevent a recurrence, and that a letter be sent to the official reprimanding him for failing to appear to back-up his charges.

Anderson next presented a request from the Class A region that fan-shaped backboards be used at the regional tournament at NDSU. It was moved by Easton that the staff look into the matter to see what could be done in regard to this. Seconded by Peterson and carried. Broton moved that the same be done in those B regional tournaments which were using rectangular boards. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Batterberry reported that President Kolbo had appeared as guest speaker before several Ward County organizations and presented remarks concerning the NDHSAA, and moved he be commended for his efforts. Seconded by Quale and carried.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned after setting March meeting dates as follows: March 9 at 9:00 A.M. at Bismarck, and March 16 at 1:30 P.M. at Minot.

Board of Directors Meeting North Dakota High School Activities Association Bismarck, North Dakota — March 9, 1973

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at the Holiday Inn at Bismarck on March 9, 1973, at 9:00 A.M. with all members present. Each member was presented a packet containing the agenda, a complete financial report of the years business to date, and a list of checks drawn on the General Fund since the last meeting.

The Board reviewed the financial reports of the General Fund and the ABF fund and upon motion by Batterberry and second by Peterson, the reports were approved.

Bob Meyers of Bismarck, free lance photographer, met with the Board concerning taking of action shots at wrestling and basketball tournaments. After reviewing same, it was the feeling of the Board that there was no violation of Board regulations in connection with same.

Supt. Spiss of Mandan appeared before the Board requesting that the starting time the first day of the boys state track meet be moved up because of a conflict with their graduation night that evening. After some discussion, it was the feeling of the Board that an earlier starting time would force some schools to leave for Valley City a day earlier, so no action was taken.

A statement from the Association attorneys in the amount of \$710.40 for services rendered since last August was presented and approved for payment upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Broton.

The Board next reviewed district assignments for 1973-74 which had been made by the office staff for Mott, Tioga, Larimore, and Palermo, along with a request from Palermo for a different assignment. Upon motion by Anderson and second by Broton, the assignment of Tioga to district 27, and the request of Palermo to be re-assigned to district 23 were approved, and the assignment of Mott to district 29 was also approved upon motion by Broton and second by Batterberry. Muckenhirn next moved that Larimore be assigned to district 9 instead of district 8. The motion was seconded by Peterson but failed when put to vote.

A request from Fingal for transfer from district 2 to district 4 in 1973-74 was approved upon motion by Peterson and second by Anderson, and a request by Mayville for immediate transfer from speech district 3 to district 2 was also approved upon motion by McLain and second by Sunderland.

A request from Lloyd Fandrich, former superintendent at Oriska, for permission to purchase for personal use duplicates of the two fourth State Class C trophies which the school had won a number of years ago was presented. Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Peterson, the request was denied.

A petition from Charles Senn of Hettinger for re-instatement of his amateur standing, which had been suspended by Hettinger High School on April 1, 1972, because of acceptance of a cash prize in a bowling tournament was granted upon motion by Anderson and second by Quale, effective April 1, 1973.

Next reviewed was a request by Bismarck High School for permission to take part in a wrestling tourney at Rapid City on January 4, 5, 1974. The request was approved upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Quale.

A request from Grand Forks Red River High School to enter a tape recording of a student's entry in the district speech contest, or for an early appearance before the adjudicator prior to the date of the contest, was next presented. Upon motion by Easton and second by Muckenhirn, the request was denied.

A letter from Les Maupin, manager of radio station KLPM of Minot, requesting deletion of the paragraph of the broadcasting contract pertaining to policy concerning the announcing of the tourney was reviewed. After considerable discussion, it was the opinion of the Board that the paragraph in question should remain a part of the contract.

The secretary next briefed the Board relative to an opinion by the Association attorney that Section X, b, of Article XIII of the By-Laws made no allowance for the Board to rule a student eligible under the hardship transfer rule if one of the school administrators involved refused to file a certificate of 'no undue influence.'

Discussion followed concerning the termination time of a suspension for violation of the liquor rule. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Easton, the rule was interpreted to mean calendar weeks, and that the suspension period would extend from the day of suspension to the morning of the same day six weeks later.

After considerable discussion, it was agreed by the Board that the Association-owned wrestling scoreboards should be stored in Valley City and that insurance coverage on same should be obtained.

The Board next approved, upon motion by Anderson and second by Easton, an extra \$25.00 allowance for officials at the State Class A and B wrestling meets because of extra matches added this year.

On behalf of the girls basketball committee, H. L. McLain presented the following recommendations concerning regulations for the sport for the 1973-74 school year:

1. National Federation Girls Basketball Rule Book as officials rules book.
2. All schools grouped in one class.
3. Season to run from opening of school to November 10.
4. Teams allowed 12 games or 10 games plus an invitational tourney.
5. Tournament play shall end on a district level.
6. Schools presently signed up divided into 27 districts. Others allowed to sign up until May 1 and to be assigned to districts.

7. Registered officials not required for 1973.
 8. Rules clinics to be held first part of September, but attendance of coaches and officials not mandatory.
 9. No regulation as to number of days of practice before first game.
 10. Scrimmages with other schools must count as games.
 11. Individuals limited to 5 quarters of participation per night, 12 nights of participation; 48 quarters per season or 40 quarters plus an invitational tourney. These limitations are in addition to the district tourney.
 12. No restrictions as to days of week games are played, except no games allowed on Sunday.
 13. Junior high students be permitted to participate on both junior and senior high teams as long as they conform to the game and quarter limitations for any one night and season.
 14. No restriction as to number of games per week.
 15. District tournament trophies to be provided in the same manner as for boys.
 16. District to be allowed to order one ball for district tournament through Association office.
 17. Temporary district chairmen to be appointed by executive-secretary for purpose of calling organizational meetings.
- The Board then decided to have these recommendations presented to the Class B district chairmen for their reactions.

Mark Desch of Doug Ruedlinger, Inc., appeared before the Board and outlined a proposal for catastrophic insurance coverage. After some discussion, it was moved by Peterson and seconded by Broton that no action be taken at this time. Motion carried.

Some time was spent reviewing the 1973-74 calendar as adopted at the January meeting. It was agreed that the Class B regional basketball tournaments should be held on March 4, 5, 6, if a 3 day tournament is run, and on March 5, 6, if they are a two day event. Discussion followed concerning the scheduling of the state hockey, state Class A wrestling, and state girls gymnastics meet on the same week-end, but no changes were made.

A report was made by the assistant-secretary on proposals that the wrestling coaches would be submitting to the wrestling advisory committee.

The Board was next made aware of additional teams who would be participating in the hockey program next year and the need for a revised state tournament format. Action on same was tabled pending recommendations from the hockey advisory committee.

A request from the state gymnastic meet judges for additional pay for an extra four hours was presented. It was moved by Batterberry and seconded by Anderson that the extra pay be allowed and that the gymnastic set-up for next year be revised. Motion carried.

Considerable time was spent discussing the method of selection of officials for basketball tournaments next year.

The agenda for the district chairmen's meeting at Minot was next reviewed.

A request from Supt. Carpenter of Washburn for permission to use Mrs. Hugh Welsh, a non-faculty member, as girls track coach was approved under the usual restrictions upon motion by Broton and second by Batterberry.

A request from Ken Wyman, sportscaster from KDDR of Oakes, for a press pass to tournament games although they were not broadcasting same was denied upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by McLain.

Discussion followed on the types of insurance carried on Association-sponsored tournaments. Upon motion by Broton and second by Anderson, the secretary was instructed to investigate the possibility of adding burglary and vandalism coverage and the cost of same.

Questions relative to the powers of district committees in regards to regulation of district tournaments were next considered. It was the opinion of the Board that these committees had the power to decide whether varsity or "B" squads would fulfill the obligations of district competition. It also was their opinion that references made in the by-laws to district committees also applied to regional "A" committees, since the region was the basic organization in this class.

The Chairman next appointed Anderson and McLain as a committee to investigate the hardship transfer case of Debra Opp of Harvey and instructed them to report on same at the meeting next week in Minot.

A news story account of the Fargo South High School bands participation in a parade at the Kentucky Derby next May was reviewed. The secretary was instructed to inform Principal Raymond of Association regulations pertaining to such participation.

The Board then recessed until 9:00 A.M. Saturday morning, at which time they went into executive session. Bruce Anderson presented the recommendations of the finance committee relative to salary increases for the executive officers for the 1973-74 fiscal year. After some discussion, Batterberry moved as an alternative proposal that the present salaries of the executive-secretary and assistant-secretary be increased \$700 for the next fiscal year, seconded by Peterson and carried. McLain moved that the salary for the claims manager be increased \$500 for the 1973-74 fiscal year, seconded by Anderson and carried.

Discussion followed on the possibility of need for an additional office staff member to handle girls sports with the addition of basketball to the list of sponsored activities for girls. The executive-secretary was instructed to draw-up a job specification proposal for presentation at the next meeting.

The Board then adjourned after scheduling the next meeting for 1:30 P.M. on Friday, March 16th, at Minot.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting
North Dakota High School Activities Association
Minot, North Dakota — March 16, 1973

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 1:30 P.M. on March 16, 1973, at the Ramada Inn in Minot with all members present except G. F. Muckenhirn.

The first order of business was the assignment of Larimore to Class B district No. 8 for the 1973-74 school year upon motion by Broton and second by Anderson.

Discussion followed concerning admission prices for contests and rising expense costs for teams entered. Upon motion by Broton and second by McLain, the finance committee was instructed to study the entire financial structure of admission prices, team allowances, officials expense allowances,

etc., and to present recommendations relative to same at the June meeting. The following recommendations of the TV committee were approved upon motion by Anderson and second by Quale:

1. A minimum of \$500 for the televising of the championship game of the state hockey tournament, or \$1,200 for the semi-finals and final game.
2. A minimum of one-half the amount received for the State Class A basketball tournament be received for television rights for the State Class B tournament.

Mr. McLain reported that the Class B district chairmen had recommended that the proposed regulations concerning girls basketball as outlined in the minutes of the March 9th meeting of the Board of Directors be adopted and that the Association office poll the B schools as to their wishes concerning advancing first and second place district winners to the regional tournament, making an 8-team regional tourney. Upon motion by Broton and second by McLain, the above recommendations were adopted.

Father Williams of Minot Ryan appeared before the Board concerning forfeiture of wrestling matches in meets, and requested that 10th grade students in Minot be considered free agents to enroll in either the parochial or public schools in Minot in the fall of 1973 because of the new organizational plan to become effective in the public schools. The Board took no action on the forfeiture of wrestling matches as rules governing same are contained in the official rules book, and ruled that they had no power to set aside the by-law providing for a period of ineligibility when a student transfers to schools without a corresponding change in parental residence after once enrolling in the ninth grade.

The secretary presented financial reports of tournaments held to date.

Next reviewed were the job specifications drawn-up by the secretary for an assistant-secretary to handle girls sports. It was moved by Batterberry that they be accepted and the question as to whether to call for applicants for same be placed on the June agenda. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

Upon motion by Anderson and second by Batterberry, Jim Broton was named as voting delegate at the business meeting of the National Federation in July.

The question as to whether regional NDHSAA meetings should be held this fall or not was next discussed. Easton moved, not to hold such meetings, seconded by Peterson and carried.

The assistant-secretary next presented a report on the NDOA Board of Directors meeting.

The secretary reported that burglary insurance could be obtained for Association-sponsored tournaments at the cost of about \$8.00 per tournament, but that vandalism coverage would not be practical because of the \$250 deductible feature in such policies. Upon motion by Broton and second by Anderson, the secretary was instructed to obtain burglary insurance plus insurance coverages presently carried on said tournaments for the 1973-74 school year.

Harold Pedersen of Fargo presented the following requests on behalf of the high school athletic directors:

1. That the NDHSAA take over the sponsorship of both boys and girls swimming.
2. That ABF coverage for grades 1-6 be expanded to include intramurals in all sports after school hours and on Saturdays.
3. Relaxation of game restrictions for junior high school hockey.

No action was taken on these proposals at this time.

The Board next ruled that district committee regulations could supersede wishes of two schools involved as to contesting teams in district season play in order to qualify for district tournament.

McLain and Anderson reported results of their investigation concerning the transfer of Debra Opp from Hazen to Harvey and recommended that she be declared immediately eligible under the hardship transfer rule. Upon motion by McLain and second by Anderson, the recommendation was adopted.

The date for the annual meeting of the General Assembly was set for October 25th at Bismarck.

The Board next proceeded to organize itself for the 1973-74 fiscal year. Don Kolbo was elected president and Bruce Anderson was named as vice-president effective July 1st.

As there appeared to be no other business, the Board adjourned after selecting June 14 and 15 as the dates for the June meeting in Valley City, commencing at 9:00 A.M. on June 14th, with committee meetings at 1:00 P.M. on June 13th.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Valley City, North Dakota, June 14, 15, 1973

The Board of Directors of the NDHSAA met in the Association office building at 9:00 A.M. on June 14, 1973, with all members present except M. F. Peterson. Each member of the Board was furnished a complete financial report of business to date, a financial report of the Accident Benefit to date, and an agenda for the meeting. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Batterberry, the General Fund financial report was accepted as submitted. The Board next reviewed the financial report of various activities. The report was accepted as submitted. The Accident Benefit Fund report was reviewed and upon motion by Broton and second by Sunderland it was accepted as submitted.

A request from the American Legion for the NDHSAA to approve an oratorical contest was read. A motion by Sunderland to approve the request and seconded by McLain was carried.

A request from the Kiwanis Youth Career Awards Program for approval by the NDHSAA was considered. Muckenhirn made the motion to table the request until the National Federation acts on the program, second by Easton and carried.

McLain presented a report of the Girls Basketball District Alignment Committee. Petitions were read requesting transfer of districts as follows:
Center from District 15 to District 23
Stanton from District 23 to District 24
Gwinner from District 2 to District 1

The requests of Center and Gwinner were approved but the request from Stanton was denied. The Board also discussed the question of schools that did not want to play in the district or district tourney, but rather wanted to play an independent schedule. It was agreed that schools do not have to play in the

district or the district tourney but that all schools must abide by all the regulations covering the girls basketball program.

The Board next discussed post-season wrestling and a tournament held in Fort Collins, Colorado, in which wrestlers from Minot and Bismarck participated. The Board wondered about the involvement of the high school coaches with these athletes and agreed to question the two athletic directors later in the meeting.

Mr. Smith gave a report on a national survey concerning state regulations on pre-season, in-season, and post-season competition. Discussion followed concerning North Dakota policy on these items and whether the whole subject should be reviewed to see if our regulations are still valid and up-to-date. Much discussion followed as to whether the entire NDHSAA Constitution and By-laws should be re-written and the complete document brought up-to-date. Motion by Broton to have a Constitutional Convention organized to draw up a new NDHSAA Constitution and a committee be appointed to recommend machinery for same and report on details at the August meeting, second by Anderson, carried.

The Board studied a U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals Decision in Minnesota which allowed girls to take part on boys teams in some sports. The schools involved did not have a girls program in the sports in question. Discussion followed on the implications of this decision. The Board agreed that they would deny participation by girls on boys teams in NDHSAA sponsored activities.

A letter from Sports Seminars Incorporated was read to the Board. This Minnesota-based group is involved in conducting 2-day sports seminars for boys in basketball and football. The leaders of the seminars are professional football players and high school or college basketball coaches. Local community groups sponsor the seminar and boys may attend by paying a \$11.00 fee to cover both days. A motion was made by Muckenhirn and seconded by Easton, that the NDHSAA give its approval by letter to the program. Carried.

Mr. Smith next outlined the attendance of coaches at the track and baseball clinics conducted by the NDHSAA. A motion by Batterberry to drop baseball clinics, seconded by McLain, was carried. Easton made a motion to reconsider, seconded by Quale, and carried. Anderson then moved that baseball clinics be mandatory for coaches and officials, seconded by Sunderland. Roll call vote: yes - 3, no - 6. Motion by Anderson to discontinue having baseball clinics sponsored by the NDHSAA, seconded by Muckenhirn. Roll call vote: yes - 9, no - 0.

A report was given on the Class B, District VIII, Speech Contest held at Minot State College. A complaint was filed with the chairman of the Advisory Committee because the music department of Minot State College handled the speech contest instead of the theatre arts department. A letter from students at MSC in theatre arts protesting the music departments management was also read. The letter was signed by ten students. A letter from the manager of the contest and Mr. Smith's reply were also read. It appeared to the Board that the entire matter was an internal struggle at MSC between the two departments and no further action was required.

Mr. Smith gave a report on state-wide speech contest participation by member schools. The report indicated that the speech program was declining in many areas of the state and that small numbers of participants were found in many of the categories of the program. The Board cited several reasons for the decline.

Mr. Smith reported that the compressor on the office air-conditioner had failed and that some type of decision had to be made as to whether the unit should be repaired or a new unit installed. Mr. Smith also pointed out that in two years a new heating system would have to be installed and that perhaps at that time a central air-conditioning system should be included. Motion by Muckenhirn, seconded by Easton, to replace the compressor unit on the present conditioner was carried.

A letter from Supt. Hansen of Ellendale was read in which he protested individuals smoking on stage in the state one-act play contest. It was pointed out that this was a direct violation of the Association rule on smoking. The moral conduct of characters portrayed in one of the plays was also questioned by Supt. Hansen. The Board discussed the problem but took no action at this time as Mr. Hansen was scheduled to appear before the Board the next day.

Mr. Smith reported that there had been drinking by students at the state music festival and that boys from three or four schools were involved. No further action was taken as the school administrators had all handled the problem themselves after becoming aware of the incident.

The Board next discussed whether or not the Association's alcohol penalty should be interpreted so that penalties not finished when school lets out would be carried over to the fall semester for completion. A motion was made by Easton, seconded by McLain, to carry the unfinished penalty over to the next school year. Roll call vote: yes - 4, no - 5.

Appearing before the Board extending invitations to host several Association-sponsored activities for the 1973-1974 school year, were delegations from Minot, Bismarck, Grand Forks, Fargo, Jamestown, Valley City, Wahpeton and New Town. The Board did not consider sites following the presentations but went on to other business.

Duane Carlson and Dick Karlgaard were asked to appear before the Board and were questioned about their schools involvement in the post-season wrestling tourney in Fort Collins, Colorado. Both directors stated that their schools were not involved and that the wrestlers traveled to the tourney with Bismarck Junior College. They did not know if the boys used school uniforms or if the coaches actively coached the boys at the tourney. Since the directors could not answer all questions, it was agreed to have the two coaches involved appear before the Board in August.

A question from the Fargo schools in regard to boys playing on a school junior high hockey team and also on a non-school team at the same time was raised. Mr. Smith read from a letter he had sent in reply to Harold Pedersen. Motion made by Quale, seconded by Broton, to support the written opinion. Carried.

Mr. Smith reported that the date for the State Student Congress would have to be changed because it had been set previously on the Good Friday weekend. Easton moved to have the office staff set a new date, seconded by Broton and carried.

Mr. Smith reported on the survey that had been taken relative to Class B regional basketball tourneys. The results of the poll showed an overwhelming desire of the Class B schools to advance two teams from each district to the regional tourneys. Motion by Muckenhirn to postpone the 8-team regionals for one year, second by Quale. Muckenhirn then moved to amend the motion to postpone to the October meeting of the General Assembly, seconded by Quale, and carried. Vote on motion as amended, roll call vote: yes - 3, no - 6. A motion was then made by Broton to change to 8-team regionals for 1973-1974,

seconded by Batterberry. Roll call: yes - 8, no - 0, pass - 1. Meeting adjourned.

The meeting reconvened at 8:00 A.M. on June 15, 1973, with all members present except M. F. Peterson.

A letter was read from a Fargo PTA concerning complaints about incidents happening at Grand Forks at the state hockey tournament. The letter specifically asked that the hockey tourney not go back to Grand Forks next year. Mr. Smith read his reply to the letter. No further action was taken.

McLain reviewed the minutes of the District Chairmens meeting and brought out several items for discussion. The chairmen wanted a greater ticket allotment for participating teams at the state tournament. The chairmen also wanted a state-wide effort by the NDHSAA to get Juvenile Commissioners to release to the schools the names of violators of the non-smoking and drinking rules. The chairmen also requested that district tourney managers pass out regional passes, etc., at the conclusion of the district tourneys. This would mean that regional managers would have to send a packet to each district manager in his region. The Board discussed all items and upon motion by Broton and second by Easton the report was accepted.

The Board next reviewed the recommendations of the various advisory committees. Smith presented the recommendations of the basketball, hockey, and girls gymnastics committees and Schindler those for football, wrestling, boys track and girls track.

A motion was made by Easton, seconded by McLain to approve the following football committee recommendations. Carried.

1. In September Bulletin, put notice that schools can submit open dates for football for the following year. These to be tabulated and put on master sheet and mimeographed sheet sent to all football coaches in December. Open dates must be sent to NDHSAA office by end of November. This procedure to be announced at football rules clinic.
2. Recommend that conditioning days are for all football teams, not just the varsity.
3. Adopt rule 3-1-1, which permits, by state high school association adoption, games involving 9th grade students to be played in 10-minute quarters. Games involving only students below the 9th grade shall be played in 8-minute quarters.

The Board agreed to bring to the attention of the membership at the annual meeting, the following recommendation:

Football play-off system started in North Dakota for 1974-1975. Would like to see 4 class play-off. Want support of over-all committee and also Board of Directors.

Batterberry made the motion to approve the following wrestling committee recommendations, seconded by Sunderland and carried.

1. Change 180 pound class to 185 to conform with National Federation rules.
2. At 6:45 P.M. on first day of state tourney have first round of wrestle-backs on 4 mats followed by the championship semi-finals on 2 mats at 8:15 P.M.
3. In Class B regionals, if at the end of the tourney a 2nd place and 3rd place wrestler have not met in a bracket, a match be wrestled between these 2 boys with the winner receiving 2nd place and qualifying for the state tourney. The team points would be awarded following this wrestle-off match with points being scored in regular method.

4. Doctors Weight Permit forms to be due on last Saturday in November. Late-comers permits to be due prior to first interscholastic match or within three weeks after the boy starts practice.
5. Tourney sites to be able to accommodate 4 mats for state meets.
6. Five team trophies at state meet.

The Board agreed upon motion by Anderson, second by Easton, to sponsor an amendment to the By-laws concerning junior high wrestling:

Junior High: Junior high wrestlers be allowed 6 duals and 3 tourneys with the provision that for every tourney not scheduled 2 more duals could be scheduled.

One match per week except that 2 matches per week be allowed for any 3 weeks during the season.

McLain moved to approve the basketball committee recommendations, seconded by Easton and carried. Recommendations are as follows:

1. Motel reservation for participating teams in Class A state tourney should be made by tournament manager, including rooms for referees.
2. Keep girls basketball in the fall. If it is expanded in the future to include regional and state tournament play, delay opening of boys practice one week.

3. Method of selection of tournament officials:

A. Class B:

1. B regions select own officials. The 4 district chairmen in each region being a committee for same. Four officials for each regional tourney.
2. These 32 officials would be ineligible to work the state Class A meet which is held the same week.
3. The winners of the 1st round in regional play would vote on these 32 officials for the state Class B tourney, the top 6 to be assigned to same — with top 4 working the championship round and the bottom 2 the consolation games.

B. Class A:

1. All Class A schools vote on Saturday before the regionals for 6 officials for the state tourney.
2. Ballots of 8 teams advancing to state tourney to be tabulated. Top 6 assigned to state tourney - with top 4 being assigned to championship rounds and bottom 2 to consolation games. Could not select any of 32 working Class B regions.

4. Place a reminder in the Bulletin about schools notifying opponents of who officials are before the game as stipulated in the contracts.

5. Continue holding of pre-tournament meeting of coaches and officials.

Upon motion by Anderson, and second by Batterberry, the following girls gymnastic advisory committee recommendations were approved:

1. The gymnastic season for 1973-1974 be shortened one week at the beginning of the season and one week at the end of the season.
2. To compete during the season in novice all-around, a girl must be in at least two individual novice events. In intermediate and advanced, a contestant must be in at least one individual event in that division to be in all-around in the division.
3. Qualifying scores for state meet be raised to 4.5 for novice, 5.0 for intermediate, and 6.0 for advanced.
4. Novice and intermediate state champions in each event must move up to the next division for the following state meet.

5. In the novice and intermediate divisions, a spotter may stand between the bars without a deduction in points; however, this is not permitted in the advanced division.
6. The top 5 scores in each event shall be counted for team scores.
7. Trophy awards at the state meet be changed so that a 1st and 2nd place trophy be given for Class A schools and a 1st place trophy for the top Class B school. Individual awards to remain on a combined basis.
8. Recommended fee schedule for judges:

Season:	Duals:	\$12.00 if one set of judges used
		\$ 6.00 if two sets of judges used
	Triangular:	\$9.00 if two sets of judges used
	Multiple:	variable with size of meet and number of sets of judges, but proportionate to fees for duals and triangulars

State Meet:	Acting judges	\$40.00
	Superior judges	\$50.00
	Referee	\$60.00

Upon motion by Sunderland, second by McLain, the following boys track advisory committee recommendations were approved:

1. In Class B districts, start pole vault at 9'6".
2. Authorize Class B Indoor State Meet. Hold this meet right along with the Class A meet but allow only one entrant per school in individual events. State schedule of events to be worked out. Start pole vault and high jump earlier on schedule.
3. 8th grade distance limit to read: Distance events are the mile and 880. A boy may run only one of the two and if he does other running events, must be of 220 yards or less.
4. State track meet to be on a Friday and Saturday. Recommend last Friday in May be set for a 2 year period.
5. In the morning part of the district track meet schedule, put the mile run between the 100 and low hurdle preliminary heats.
6. On a one-year trial basis, add the 2-mile relay to the district and state meet schedule of events.
 - a. at the district, the 2 mile relay to be run between the 100 and high hurdles on present schedule
 - b. at the state meet, the 2 mile relay to be run at 6:30 P.M. on the 1st day
 - c. the minimum standard for qualifying for the 2 mile relay shall be 8:40 for Class A and 8:48 for Class B
7. At the state meet, put the mile relay final at 1:00 P.M. on the 2nd days events and move all other events down accordingly.
8. Recommend a band participate in the opening parade and also that schools be introduced as they pass the stands.
9. In shot, discus, javelin, pole vault, long jump, and high jump, have flights arranged so that competition is started with the low qualifier and ends with the top qualifier.
10. Have referee, or some one designated, meet with the inspectors and exchange judges prior to the meet to explain their duties and how to make the calls, etc.
11. In the 880, mile, 2 mile, mile relay, and 2 mile relay, assign lanes by qualifying times with the best time being assigned lane one, etc.
12. No more minimum standard qualifying for the outdoor meet at indoor meets or when outdoor events are run indoor because of weather.

13. For indoor, outdoor (boys and girls) state meets, video tape be set up at the finish line in front of stands and be used to help determine finishing results of races ending there.
 14. The Monday prior to the state meet to be final day for coaches to check qualifiers and those not in at that time will not be allowed in later. If evidence is presented, they may be allowed in through that date.
 15. Have AP press release on Friday of districts listing all state qualifiers up to that point.
- Upon motion by Broton, second by Muckenhirn, the following girls track advisory committee recommendations were approved:

1. Change following minimum qualifying standards:

a. 100 yard dash	from 12.0	to 11.9
b. 880 yard run	from 2:38	to 2:35
c. long jump	from 15'6"	to 15'9"
d. 440 yard relay	from 55 & 54	to 54.5 & 53.5
e. mile relay	from 4:39 & 4:35	to 4:36 & 4:32
2. In the shot, discus, long jump, high jump, and softball throw have flights arranged so that competition is started with the low qualifier and ends with the top qualifier.
3. In the 880, mile, and mile relay, assign lanes by qualifying times with the best time being assigned lane one, etc.
4. The Monday prior to the state meet to be final day for coaches to check qualifiers and those not in at that time will not be allowed in later. If evidence is presented, they may be allowed in through that date.
5. One day distance limit: distance events are mile and 880. If a girl runs both, her third running event would have to be of 220 or less. If a girl runs only one of the two, she may run two other events of a lesser distance.
6. Recommend that girls state meet be run on an all-weather track.
7. Have advisory committee act as Jury of Appeals at state meet. Have seating in infield area or other spot where duties could be carried out.
8. Have an extra track clinic in North because of complaint of travel for those in New Rockford district.
9. Combine boys and girls sections of the track clinics into one meeting.
10. Girls Junior High: may compete in 3 events. Distance events are 880 and 440. If a girl runs the 880, she must drop to 220 or less for other events. Girl may run two 440's but third event would have to be 220 or less.
11. Recommend following state meet schedule:

Second Day: Only change is to put mile run final at 3:00 in place of the 880. All other events the same as this year's schedule.

Motion by Batterberry, second by Sunderland, and carried to approve the following recommendations of the hockey advisory committee:

1. Officials: Wendy Feist, John Knauf, Ron Geatz, Dennis Hogan. Alternate — Bill Olson.
2. Two clinics to be held — one at Grand Forks, one at Devils Lake.
3. Modify rule on requirement concerning tooth protectors to exclude goalies.
4. At state tourney, top team in bracket be designated as home team and wear dark jerseys. Exception allowable if a team has only one set of jerseys.
5. Recommend following rule book as to number of players allowed at tourney — 17 plus 2 goalies.
6. Four period rule to be waived for goalies in case of an injury to a goalie in doubleheader.
7. All 11 teams send team pictures and rosters to tournament managers.

A motion made by Muckenhirn, second by Easton, that Durum conference number 1 and 2 teams be seeded 5 and 6 at the state tourney, and that play-offs determine 7th and 8th place seeding, was carried.

Supt. Hansen of Ellendale appeared before the Board to personally explain his position on the smoking during the state one-act play contest and also the moral conduct of the characters portrayed in one play. He also felt that the adjudication on plays was not correct as the adjudicators did not even know the play in some cases. The Board again discussed the problems and wondered whether the recommended list of plays should be made compulsory. No further action was taken pending review of the advisory committee recommendations.

Batterberry made the motion to table the tennis recommendations until the August meeting, seconded by Sunderland and carried.

A motion by Easton, second by Sunderland, to approve the following items for the boys golf program, was carried:

1. Two regional grass greens tourneys with one in east and one in west. These are to be qualifying meets of 18 holes in one day.
2. Six teams and six individuals to qualify from each region to the state tourney.
3. In both sand and grass that all state participants be eligible for medalist.
4. Abolish doubles, pitch & putt, and driving contest, in both sand and grass.

Motion by Muckenhirn, second by Easton, and carried, to postpone for one year, the Association's sponsorship of boys and girls swimming.

Motion by Broton, second by Anderson, to approve the following recommendations of the music advisory committee, carried:

Broton moved, seconded by Anderson, the adoption of a new music manual as submitted by the advisory committee, after rejecting some of the proposals. Major changes in the program are as follows:

1. Revise entry fees for district contests to \$1.50 for solos, \$3.00 for ensembles, \$15.00 for large groups. State Association to retain 50% of fees for solos and ensembles, but none of the fees for large groups.
2. A star rating be given top performers at district level, limiting such ratings to no more than one for every five students. All other contestants receive no ratings, only critiques. Same type rating system to be used at state — only the limitation rule would not be in effect.
3. Star ratings at district to receive certificates. Star ratings at state to receive medals for solos. Individuals in group events receiving star ratings at state to receive certificates.

A motion by Muckenhirn, second by Broton, to approve the following recommendations of the speech advisory committee was carried.

1. Sweepstakes trophies be provided at district level. If necessary, charge cost to district.
2. Four Class A regions be retained as is.
3. Eliminate regulation prohibiting entering a cutting from a 3 act play that has been previously shown to the public.
4. Smoking be forbidden on one-act plays.
5. Class A and B state meets not be combined, but if they are manager's fee for a combined meet to be \$150.00.

Mr. Smith next read recommendations for various districts as to their preference for regional basketball sites. He also read a recommendation sponsored by a group of 28 schools that Minot be the site of the State Class B basketball tourney. Written invitations for various association-sponsored events were read.

Motion by Easton, second by Quale, and carried, to approve the recommendations of the North Dakota Officials Association as follows:

N.D. Officials Assn. — Board of Directors Meeting — May 30, 1973

The first order of business was discussion of the new classification system and rating system. It was determined by examining the constitution that the Board could adopt a new plan without

ratification by the membership at the annual meeting. It was agreed to review the new plan at the annual meeting to get the sentiment of the membership. The new plan, if adopted, would go into effect in 1974-1975. Ray Albrecht and Ron Cameron were designated to work on refining the plan that has been worked on.

The Board next considered the recommendations of the gymnastics advisory committee and upon motion by Brown and second by Cameron supported the officials fee schedule as proposed by that group. The schedule is as follows:

Motion by Brown and second by Cameron that gymnastic officials be required to wear a solid navy blue skirt and white blouse, carried.

The Board agreed that the mechanics demonstration at the football clinics stress the kicking situations and penalties involved with fair catch, etc. They also agreed that the basketball demonstrations would cover signalling and whistle blowing.

The Board next reviewed the nominations for the Officials Hall of Fame and selected the following men to be inducted into the "Hall" in November: Dave Wolf of Fargo; Rueben Hammond of Minot; W. A. Odne of St. Thomas.

The Board next questioned whether to expand present accident benefit fund coverage to include grades 1-6 activities beyond 4:30 P.M. each day. A mimeographed sheet of facts was circulated. A motion by Easton to extend the coverage, was seconded by Sunderland and carried.

The Finance Committee report was given by Anderson. He then moved to accept the report, second by Quale, and carried. The recommendations are as follows:

1. That state basketball season reserved tickets be increased \$1.00 and student unreserved season tickets 50¢. Single session admission tickets for adults be increased 50¢ for all but the consolation series. Single session tickets for students be increased 25¢ for first round and semi-final games and 50¢ for the finals, with no change in consolation game prices.
2. State wrestling ticket prices be set as follows:

4. No change be made in admission prices for other Association-sponsored events, but in event Class B regions become an 8 team affair, same price structure as used in Class A regional be employed.
5. Maximum daily team allowances at state basketball tournaments be increased from \$225 to \$275 per day.
6. Expense allowance for officials at state tournaments be increased from \$15 to \$25 per day.

The Board then reviewed the financial picture of the NDHSAA and the investment of Association funds. It was pointed out that the returns on Government securities looked better at present than it had for quite some time.

Muckenhirn made the motion to add a female employee to the office staff to fill the job description approved at the last meeting, second by Quale and carried.

Discussion followed on the question as to whether to continue present office hours during the school year, or whether the hours on Monday through Friday should be increased, closing on Saturdays. It was agreed that the change could be made on a trial basis, if so desired by the secretary.

The Board next reviewed salaries being paid office personnel and voted an increase of \$25.00 per month to Mrs. Vandestreek, bookkeeper and Mrs. Posein, secretary, effective July 1, 1973.

Mr. Schindler asked the Board for time at the March, 1974, meeting to discuss his salary. Motion by Broton, second by Anderson and carried, to have question of staff salaries on the agenda for the March 1974 meeting.

The program for the National Federation meeting in Minneapolis in July was reviewed. No further action was taken.

Motion by McLain that Robinson attend the National Federation meeting in Minneapolis as one of the sessions pertains to school insurance, second by Batterberry and carried.

The Board denied a request from Harold Pedersen for additional expense allowance for running the state grass greens golf tourney.

A report was given on two unsanctioned track meets held in Fargo and one in Bismarck. Mr. Smith read from letters he had sent to both athletic directors. No further action was taken.

The Board was made aware of the fact that a high school is opening in Fort Totten this fall. No action.

A request was read from Cardinal Muench Seminary for approval of use of a non-qualified coach. The same request had been approved a year ago for the same person. Motion by Easton to approve the request, but to point out that the request is unusual in that it is the 2nd year for the same request and that approval cannot continue, second by Anderson and carried.

A letter from Supt. Stepina of Garrison concerning an eligibility case was read. Action was deferred until the August meeting pending investigation by the committee.

Mr. Schindler pointed out to the Board that riding time had been abolished for high school wrestling and that modifications would have to be made on the scoreboards owned by the Association. Mr. Schindler was advised to go ahead and have the necessary modifications made.

A motion by Broton, second by Easton, to increase mileage allowance to 12¢ per mile for Association business beginning July 1, 1973, was carried.

Mr. Anderson made a request that the Board study the type of seats that were given to former Board members when they attend state basketball

tournaments. The Board agreed to investigate the matter with a view to getting better seats for these people in the future.

A formal resolution of appreciation for out-going Board Member Muckenhirn was introduced by Kolbo, seconded by Anderson, and carried. The entire Board and staff then gave a standing vote of appreciation to Muckenhirn for his service on the Board.

The August meeting dates were set for the 16th and 17th beginning at 1:00 P.M. on the 16th at the Ramada Inn in Jamestown. Committee meetings to take place the morning of the 16th.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

MINUTES ANNUAL MEETING

North Dakota High School Activities Association
October 26, 1972 - Bismarck, North Dakota

The annual meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held in the Hall of Four Seasons at the GP Hotel in Bismarck on October 26, 1972, at 2:30 P.M. Following an address on "Let's Be Strong" by John Roberts, Executive Secretary of the Wisconsin Interscholastic Association, the business meeting was called to order by President Don Kolbo at 3:00 P.M.

Inasmuch as all members had copies of the minutes of the last meeting in the annual handbook, Supt. James Maxwell of Grafton moved that the reading of the minutes be waived. The motion was seconded by Supt. Sheppard of Northwood and carried.

Supt. G. F. Muckenhirn of Larimore presented the following amendment to Section X of Article XIII of the By-laws and moved its adoption:

"He shall have been in attendance in the school he represents for two complete semesters of 180 classroom days upon transferring from another school to be eligible for interscholastic varsity team competition unless his parents have become residents of the district to which he is transferred, or the school does not offer work of the corresponding year in which he is ranked."

The motion was seconded by Supt. Broton of New England, but after some discussion it was defeated by a vote of 37 in favor to 116 against.

Supt. Muckenhirn next moved for the repeal of Section IV of Article III of the By-laws which reads as follows:

"At least one week prior to any contest between Association schools, the schools must exchange eligibility lists made on the Association forms, on which the superintendent and/or principal of each school shall certify to the present eligibility of each contestant listed and pledge the use of only those who remain eligible at the time of the contest."

The motion was seconded by Supt. Karsky of Streeter and carried with only one negative vote.

Supt. Buchholz of Courtenay proposed the following amendments to Sections II (a) and II (d) of Article XII of the By-laws so that they would read as follows and moved for their adoption:

Section II (a) The full basketball season shall not exceed a total of twenty-one consecutive weeks.

Section II (d) State basketball tournaments shall be held for each of the separate classes of schools, the last of which shall end on the Saturday nearest to March 19th. A final play-off between the champions of each class shall be held the following week, beginning with the 1972-1973 season. The basketball season shall terminate at the close of the final play-off.

The motion was seconded by Supt. Hoffert of Wimbledon. After some discussion Glock of Fargo North moved that the motion be amended to provide for a season of 19 weeks, that the regular A and B tournaments be played the same week-end ending on the Saturday closest to March 5th, and that the play-off game be played the following Monday. The motion was seconded by Raymond of Fargo South but was defeated when put to vote. The original motion was then voted on and defeated by a vote of 104 to 49.

Supt. Muckenhirn next presented the following amendment to Section III (a) of Article XII of the By-laws as proposed by the Southeast Principals Association:

"The track season, other than cross-country, shall begin on the last Monday in the month of February."

Thompson of Valley City moved for its adoption and the motion was seconded by Keller of West Fargo. Following some discussion, the motion was defeated when put to vote.

Supt. Muckenhirn next presented the following amendment to Section XIII of Article III of the Junior High By-laws and moved for its adoption:

"A student who transfers from one junior high school to another is eligible for junior high competition regardless of when the transfer is made."

The motion was seconded by Grose of Inkster Midway, but was defeated when put to vote.

Dullum of Dickinson moved that Section X of Article III of the Junior High By-laws be amended to read as follows:

"A ninth grade student shall be eligible to compete in the junior division for the complete school term if his sixteenth birthday occurs on or after September 1; a seventh or eighth grader if his fifteenth birthday occurs on or after September 1."

The motion was seconded by Karlgaard of Bismarck and passed by a vote of 85 to 72.

A constitutional amendment removing the restriction on the number of terms which the executive-director of the North Dakota School Boards Association may serve on the NDHSAA Board of Directors was read and explained. This amendment is to be voted on by mail ballot in January.

Discussion followed concerning girls basketball and the chairman explained what had been done to date in this matter and what steps would be taken to ascertain the wishes of the membership concerning same.

The report of the nominating committee (consisting of Supt. Sherven of Wahpeton, Supt. Johnson of Carrington, and Principal Freborg of Stanley) was presented by Supt. Johnson submitting the following names for vacancies on the Board of Directors:

Two — Class A representatives for three year terms:
Supt. Bruce Anderson of Valley City
Supt. Marlowe Johnson of Minot

One — Principals representative for three year term:
Del Easton of Williston

Supt. Solberg of Beulah nominated Supt. G. A. Tooley of Lisbon as a Class A representative for a three year term. Johnson of Carrington moved that the nominations cease, seconded by Stock of Mandan and carried.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting
North Dakota Officials Association
November 10, 1972

The misconduct reports were discussed and it was the feeling of the Board that this report was highly beneficial. It was reported that about twelve of these reports were received during the football season and that each school was immediately contacted by Dick Schindler. Mr. Schindler reported that in most cases the schools had voiced approval of the report and were glad that the incident had been brought to their attention. It appeared that all schools had taken steps to see that it did not happen again. The Board was made aware that if the reports were to do any good they would have to be sent to the NDHSAA immediately upon completion of the game.

Motion by Burfening that the NDOA again stress very strongly that all Class A football schools use 4 officials in 1973, seconded by Albrecht and carried.

The Board then approved the present design of the North Dakota Officials patch for use in 1973-1974.

The 'Hall of Fame' induction process was discussed. The Board felt that this project was extremely worthy and had resulted in much good publicity for officiating in North Dakota.

Ray Albrecht was instructed by the president to continue to work on a new rating, testing, and classification system for officials with a view of adopting a more uncomplicated system at a future date.

The Board set their next meeting date at the State Class A basketball tourney at Bismarck on March 10, 1973, at 3:00 P.M. in the Civic Center.

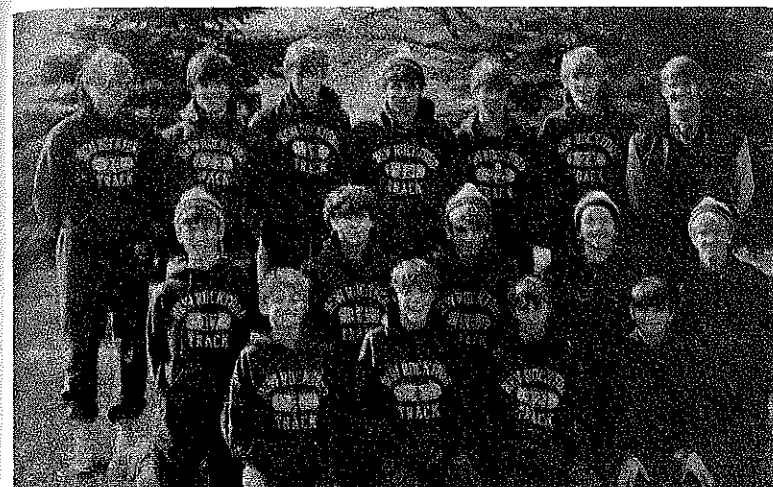

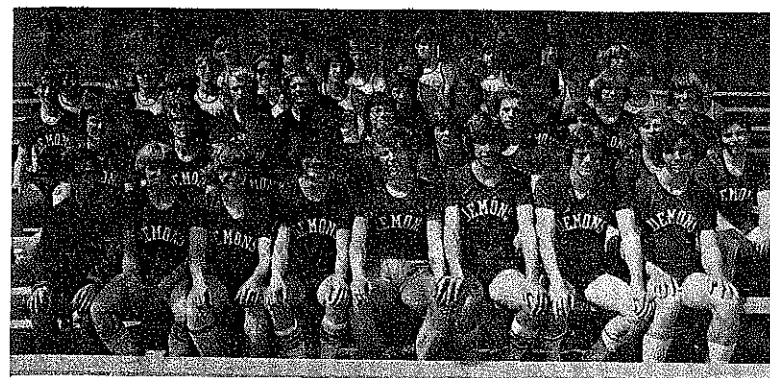

NOTE 1: The association has invested its reserves for maximum yield and safety. The following summary indicates how the funds were invested on the closing dates --

NOTE 2: On June 30, 1973, the association had \$44,879. invested in real estate and improvements, \$24,818. in office fixtures and equipment, \$3,588. in films and publications, and \$8,420. in two staff cars. Depreciation has been provided using the straight line method with appropriate lives varying from 28 to 4 years.

NOTE 3: Unclaimed checks issued, outstanding in excess of one year, were restored to the bank accounts to be carried as a liability as long as necessary.

NOTE 4: Encumbrances represent a provision for unpaid bills, estimates of the cost of goods and services on order or authorized, insurance claims in process, and a reasonable estimate of expected claims where only the notice of injury has been received.

NOTE 5: The association intends to return to the members the excess portion of the balances in each fund which are not needed in the future. This may be done by reducing future assessments for dues or premiums; or, by increasing the benefits, contestants expense allowances, and services rendered -- at the discretion of the board. (See note 6 below for the effect of action taken on review of closing balances.)

NOTE 6: Within sixty days, the board reviews the audit report for the preceding year to determine how to allocate any excess funds. On August 3, 1972, the board made the following allocations from the June 30, 1972 balances--
