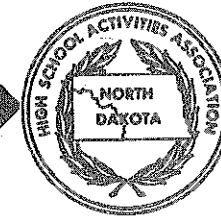

FOREWORD

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is pleased to present the 51st Annual Handbook which contains a historical and statistical account of the year's operation.

Attention is called to events and happenings which were new this past year and to certain trends and developments that have taken place.

1. Membership in the Association totaled 270 high schools this past year, compared to 271 last year and 270 the two previous years to that. Although 20%, or 54 of our member schools have less than 50 students and 11 of these have less than 30, it would appear that we have reached a temporary plateau in the re-organization of our high school districts.

2. With the raising of the enrollment figure for Class A classification, Hettinger, Bowman, and Lisbon reverted back to Class B, dropping the number of Class A schools to 28 for the 1974-75 season. Four of this number are schools whose enrollment is below the compulsory Class A classification figure, but who have elected this class of competition.

3. The 1973-74 year was a success financially for the Association. As a result the Board of Directors were able to purchase a new electronic bookkeeping machine, besides continuing increased team allowances for the various sports activities in addition to transferring \$5,000 to the Building Fund. Nineteen seventy-three - seventy-four was also a good year financially for the Accident Benefit Fund, enabling the Board to increase the Catastrophic Fund for major injuries to \$75,000. In addition, \$23,000 was refunded to member schools on a pro-rata basis based on premiums paid.

4. The number of ABF claims paid in 1974-75 exceeded the 1973-74 figure by slightly more than 200, and the amount on each claim paid averaged approximately \$1.50 more, due to an increase in the benefit schedule. This resulted in a pay-out of more than \$17,000 over the 1973-74 figure. The total paid out for claims plus administrative costs exceeded premiums collected by approximately \$4,000. However, because of interest earned on ABF investments, the program was able to operate in the black.

5. Net receipts from the boys' regional basketball tournaments exceeded those of a year ago by approximately \$9,500. However, because of escalating costs the net profits from the two state tournaments were nearly \$5,000 less, in spite of the fact that gross receipts were up slightly. Overall, boys' basketball produced approximately \$4,500 more revenue than in 1973-74. The state hockey tournament also showed an increase in profits by approximately \$1,200 for the Association and a like amount for the participating schools.

6. Boys' basketball and hockey continue to remain as the only two revenue producing activities for the Association. All other sports and activity programs are subsidized by income from these two sources. Track is the most highly subsidized activity, with the girls' and boys' programs costing the Association nearly \$25,000 this past year.

7. Girls' basketball continued to grow this past year with all but 23 schools fielding interscholastic teams. Schools were divided into Class A and B divisions along the same lines as for boys' basketball and for the first time in history state championships in girls' basketball were held for both classes of schools. The two state tournaments showed a slight financial profit but the

regional tournaments operated at a loss, resulting in a subsidization of approximately \$2,500 for the program. It is expected that as fan interest continues to grow this program will become self-supporting in the future.

8. Boys' and girls' swimming were added as Association-sponsored activities this past year with state tournaments being held for the first time in each division.

9. Although revenues have increased considerably over the past few years, so have operational expenses. Costs of supplies, increased subsidization of non-revenue meets, additional programs, and additional office personnel because of expanded programs have all contributed to these expanding costs. However, your Association is in excellent financial condition as indicated by the Auditor's report, which is printed elsewhere in this Handbook.

10. An addition to the office building was constructed this past year, as well as the remodeling of the existing facilities, to make for more efficient working conditions and to take care of the expanding work force necessary to handle Association affairs.

11. Amendments to the by-laws were passed by the General Assembly modifying the enrollment figure dividing schools into Class A and B classifications, permitting the mixing of sexes on interscholastic sports teams under certain conditions, changing the date for physical examinations for athletes, and increasing the number of schools involved in an activity before sanction approval is necessary for said activity.

12. An Ad-Hoc Committee consisting of approximately 25 individuals from different walks of life has been studying our present by-laws this past year and drafting recommendations for suggested changes to bring regulations more in line with present day conditions. It is anticipated that this committee will complete their work during the forthcoming year and their recommendations will then go before the General Assembly for consideration.

In general, this has been another eventful year in Association affairs and again your Board of Directors and this office are grateful for the assistance and cooperation given by school personnel and private citizens in the administration of the Association program. From the nature of the program, voluntary help is always needed and for your help we are grateful.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Valley City, North Dakota — August 15, 16, 1974

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at Valley City on August 15 and 16 with all members present.

The reading of the minutes of the June meeting was waived as each board member had been presented with a copy of same.

The first order of business was a review of the annual audit of the Association for the 1973-74 fiscal year as prepared and presented by R. B. Ludvigson, Certified Public Accountant of Valley City. Upon motion by Anderson and second by Quale, the report was accepted.

The Board next examined the financial report of the Association from July 1, 1974, to August 10, 1974, and approved same following motion by Peterson and second by Quale.

Carl Carlson of the Grand Forks schools appeared before the Board relative to rate structures in the ABF program with a suggestion that probably an experience factor should be incorporated into premium rates as some schools seemed to be consistently lower than others in percentage of returns. An explanation was made of changes to be made in the 1974-1975 program which might remedy the situation, and proposals under consideration for 1975-76 if inequities then seemed to exist. No further action was taken.

A delegation appeared before the Board in regard to the girls' gymnastic program adopted for the 1974-75 school year, requesting modifications of same to permit Class A schools to enter two contestants in each individual event with an unlimited number in the all-around, and that 2 divisions be retained in Class B, and that qualifying scores be established. A lengthy discussion followed but no action was taken on the proposals, leaving the program as originally set up in June.

The executive-secretary reported on investments made of Association monies in various securities.

The Finance Committee report was presented by Committee chairman Anderson along with the following recommendations:

1. \$25,000 be transferred from surplus ABF funds to the ABF Catastrophic Fund, increasing same from \$50,000 to \$75,000, and increasing maximum benefit payments under said program from \$5,000 to \$7,500.
2. \$5,000 of the surplus ABF fund be transferred to the General Fund to apply on anticipated revenue deficit for the 1974-75 budget.
3. The remaining \$23,000 in surplus ABF funds be refunded to schools on a pro-rated basis based on premiums paid.
4. \$5,000 of the General Fund surplus be transferred to the Building Fund.
5. The \$26,750 remaining surplus in the General Fund be applied on the anticipated revenue deficit for the 1974-75 budget.

Upon motion by Anderson and second by Quale, the report was accepted and adopted.

Anderson reported on behalf of the Building Committee recommending a 1200 square foot addition to the present office building. Following discussion, it was agreed to consult an architect relative to same with a report to be presented at the September meeting concerning the matter.

The secretary reported that Attorney's fees for the Chaffee case and the Parshall case last spring had amounted to \$363.00 and \$160.00 respectively.

Next reviewed was a bill in the amount of \$280.60 from UND for damages to chairs, toilet rooms, and ice in connection with the state hockey tournament last February. It was moved by Peterson, and seconded by McLain, that the bill be disallowed. Motion carried.

Next presented was a communique from the City of Minot to the effect that rental charges for use of the Civic Auditorium would be increased to \$200 per day for regional tournaments, \$300 per day for state events, and \$8.00 per hour for practice time.

The Board discussed financial arrangements to be set up for regional hockey tourneys. Sunderland moved that the regional profits, if any, be divided 50-50 between the State Association and participating teams, and that the Association absorb any losses, and that the 1975 state tourney profits be split 50-50 between the Association and participating teams. Seconded by Tooley and carried. McLain moved that each team be allowed \$100 per day expenses plus 50¢ per one-way mile travel for the regional hockey tournaments with the home teams (teams within 10 miles of site) be given one day expense allowance but no mileage, and that first, second, and third place trophies be awarded at regional meets. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Batterberry moved that a mileage payment be allowed for teams entering state swimming meet with no other expense allowance. Seconded by McLain and carried. Upon motion by Easton and second by Tooley, the same entry fees and manager's fee were established for swimming as for track.

Selection of officials for the girls' basketball tournaments was postponed until the September meeting of the Board.

Approval was given for the use of the following non-teaching individuals as coaches for the 1974-75 school year:

Peter McKenzie — hockey coach at Minot
 Paul Kallenbach — football coach at Maddock
 Tom Bryl — grade basketball coach at Hillsboro
 Tom Gerda — assistant football coach at Devils Lake

Discussion followed on the 1974-75 girls' gymnastic regulations. Anderson moved to reconsider the regulations as adopted at the June meeting and to adopt proposal No. 2 of the Paulson-Simle report. The motion was seconded by Muckenhirn but failed on a roll call vote. Anderson moved that 1st and 2nd place trophies be provided for both the Class A and Class B divisions at the state meet. Seconded by Quale and carried.

Jim Adelson of KXJB-TV appeared before the Board relative to their bid for telecasting various NDHSAA events for the 1974-75 school year. Motion by Muckenhirn, seconded by McLain and carried, that the bid be accepted as submitted.

Upon motion by Anderson and second by Sunderland, the rule as outlined in the 1974-75 girls' basketball rule book pertaining to uniforms was

waived for the current school year.

A communique from the North Dakota Broadcasters outlining their objections to the stipulation that broadcasters are to refrain from criticizing officiating and management of basketball tournament while games are in progress was presented to the Board. Discussion followed but no action was taken.

Reports were next presented by the secretary on the progress of the Ad Hoc Committee to date and by Anderson on the business meeting of the National Federation in July.

The following proposed budget as presented by the executive-secretary and amended by the Board was adopted:

Discussion followed on proposed By-law amendments to be presented to the General Assembly. Upon motion by Easton and second by Tooley, it was agreed to sponsor the following amendments:

1. An addition to Article III in the form of Section X stipulating that interscholastic teams composed of members of both sexes are permissible in the non-contact, non-collision sports sponsored by the Association if a school does not provide for separate teams for each sex.
2. Amending the required date for physical examinations from August 15 to June 15 in Section I of Article XI.
3. Amending the number of schools represented for requirement of sanction approval from more than 2 to more than 3 in Section I of Article VI.

The chairman appointed Tooley, chairman, Muckenhirn and Easton as a committee to set up a job description for the vacancy in the claims department upon the retirement of Mr. Robinson next summer and said committee to report on same at the September meeting.

Plans for the annual meeting in October were discussed and it was decided to hold an "Open Forum" this year rather than having a guest speaker as in former years.

Upon motion by Anderson and second by Quale, the following individuals as recommended by the NDOA Board of Directors were approved for induction into the Officials Hall of Fame - Wm. Galloway, Jr. and Arnie Martin.

The Board studied a newspaper account of a proposed National Basketball Tournament for girls. No action was taken.

A formal protest as submitted by Supt. Bicknese of White Shield of Roseglen charging Coach Dave Wolsky of St. Marys of New England of recruiting of White Shield basketball players was presented next. A hearing concerning same was set for 2:30 P.M. on Sept. 11 at Bismarck.

The Board then adjourned after setting dates for the September and October meetings as follows: September 11 at 1:00 P.M. at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck and October 23 at 9:00 A.M. at the Ramada Inn in Minot.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Bismarck, North Dakota — September 11, 1974

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 1:00 P.M. at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck with all members present.

The first order of business was to conduct the hearing concerning the protest lodged by White Shield High School of Roseglen against New England St. Mary's for alleged recruiting by their basketball coach, Dave Wolsky. Appearing before the Board were Supt. Conrad Bicknese of White Shield, Fr. Casmier Paluck, Supt. of St. Mary's school, Coach Dave Wolsky, Ron Schock, Board Member from St. Mary's, and Patrick Comny, attorney from Bismarck representing St. Mary's.

President Kolbo opened the hearing with the following introductory statement:

"The Board of Directors of the NDHSAA is charged with the responsibility of holding a hearing of a certified protest (Reference: page 16, Section IV c.f.g. of the NDHSAA Constitution and By-laws Manual) by one member school of the Association against another member school of the Association for alleged violation of a governing by-law (s) of the Association that all member schools, by their assuming voluntary membership in the NDHSAA, have agreed to abide by for the best interests and welfare of the schools and students in the elementary and secondary schools of North Dakota. The alleged violation reported to the NDHSAA is Article V, Section II, e. (Reference: page 25 of the NDHSAA Constitution and By-laws Manual) which specifically reads:

- e) "for unduly influencing a student to attend school or by offering or giving any remuneration either directly or indirectly to influence him to attend or his family to reside in a given District in order to establish the student's eligibility on the team or activities of the school."

The White Shield High School has presented to the Board of Directors NDHSAA, a certified protest in full compliance with Article IV, Section III (Reference: page 24 of the NDHSAA Constitution and By-laws Manual) of the alleged violation of Article V, Section II, e. (Reference: page 25 of the NDHSAA Constitution and By-laws Manual). The protest was presented, in written letter form, to the Board of Directors of the NDHSAA, dated August 14, 1974, accompanied by an earnest protest fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) officially signed by Mr. Conrad W. Bicknese, Supt. of Schools of the White Shield High School which specifically reads as follows:

"Please consider this letter a protest against the St. Mary's High School of New England, County No. 21, North Dakota. This protest is submitted against the activities of St. Mary's Basketball Coach Dave Wolsky for the act of attempting to recruit White Shield students to St. Mary's of New England for the purpose of playing basketball. \$10.00 in cash is enclosed.

Mr. Wolsky spent most of Monday, August 12th, in the White Shield community. For the most part, his contacts and conversation

were with male high school students who attended their last year of school, 1973-74, at White Shield. The boys talked to and were athletes, either wrestlers or basketball players. The boys that Mr. Wolsky talked to were: Tom Yellow Bird, Felix Dickens, Robert Grady, Raymond Grady, and David Krueger.

In schools the size of White Shield, the loss of a few key athletes can seriously injure our own athletic program. A good athletic program is an integral part of a school program, and thus recruitment of a few key athletes can seriously damage the entire school program.

The amendment a few years ago to the Constitution and By-laws requiring a full two semesters of attendance and passing work as a condition for athletic eligibility originated from District No. 24. This amendment was most specifically directed against the recruitment activities of the St. Mary's School at that time.

We are prepared to substantiate the allegations made herein."

Chairman Kolbo then called upon Supt. Bicknese for comment. Mr. Bicknese stated that his protest was not a personal protest against Mr. Wolsky but rather a protest as administrator of the White Shield School of actions of a coach of the St. Mary's school. He also stated that in reference to the boys mentioned in his letter, one was attending White Shield School, three had enrolled at St. Mary's and one was not in school. He had not obtained statements from any of the boys or their parents but that he felt the very presence of Mr. Wolsky in White Shield had an undue influence on the boys involved to want to go to St. Mary's and play for him.

Mr. Comny next testified for St. Mary's stating that he had trouble determining as to what constituted undue influence and what was due influence in its relation to the case involved. He mentioned that three of the boys had been students at St. Mary's previously and that one of the boys had dropped out of school at White Shield and was not attending any school. He presented a letter from Yellow Bird dated August 8 and addressed to Father Paluck inquiring about attending school at St. Mary's, along with a statement from the boy dated September 9, identifying the other boy mentioned in his letter as Felix Dickens.

Father Paluck then explained procedures employed by the school in recruiting students in general and stated that individual contacts are made only upon receiving inquiries from students. Follow-ups to these inquiries are made by himself personally, or by staff members, or school board members, so he didn't feel that they were "off base" by having Mr. Wolsky visit the boys at White Shield.

Mr. Schock next reported on his contacts with the Grady boys in Winnipeg on August 7, when they asked to be re-admitted to St. Mary's.

Mr. Wolsky stated that he had been requested by Father Paluck to go to White Shield to "follow up" the inquiries which had been received, and testified as to his conversations with these boys.

When questioned about financial charges to students, Father Paluck reported that board, room, and tuition amounts to \$64.00 per month and that with book fees, etc., the cost per year per student is roughly \$660. He also stated that part-time jobs were available to students to help pay bills and that

deferred payment arrangements could be made with the result that there are some outstanding bills.

After a lengthy discussion, Easton moved to continue the hearing until the October Board meeting and that a decision be made at that time. Seconded by Quale and carried. Anderson then moved that the chairman appoint a committee to investigate the charges. The motion was seconded by Muckenhirn but was defeated on a roll call vote 6-4.

Next under consideration was an appeal by the Carpio school of a ruling of the executive-secretary that Michael Brayson would be ineligible for one semester under Section 8 of Article XIII of the By-laws. After examination of the boy's transcript by the Board, Easton moved that the secretary's decision be upheld. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

The Board next reviewed and rendered the following decisions relative to hardship cases presented:

David Dorman of Watford City - eligible
Doug Martin of Gackle - ineligible
Larry Bentz of Bismarck St. Mary's - ineligible
Virgil Blackwell of Lisbon - eligible

Bids submitted by various dealers for 1975 model automobiles were next reviewed. Muckenhirn moved that the low bid of \$4,792.22 submitted by Geisler Implement for Pontiac Catalinas be accepted. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Anderson reported that the Building Committee had met with the architect and that he had recommended that proposals be received from possible contractors on a cost-plus basis for the office building addition rather than advertising for bids, because of the small size of the project. After reviewing plans as submitted, Peterson moved to adopt the plan basically as submitted by the committee. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The secretary next reported on a conflict with Board policy concerning minimum fees for TV rights and the bid proposal of KXJB which had been accepted at the August meeting and his contacts with the station concerning same, with the result that KXJB had offered to amend the hockey contract so as to provide for a payment of \$500 for the championship game, plus an option of \$350 per game for the semi-final contest with payments for the basketball tournaments to remain as per previous bid. Sunderland moved that the policy stipulating that bids for the State Class B basketball tournament shall be at least one-half the amount for the A tournament be rescinded, and that the basketball bid and the amended hockey bid of KXJB-TV be accepted. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The secretary reported that ABF refund checks totaling \$23,008.00 had been mailed to participating schools, pro-rated on the basis of premiums paid, with the smallest payment being \$6.00 to the Gardner Elementary School and the largest, \$1,312 to the Bismarck Public Schools.

Mr. Smith reported that he had talked to Mr. Marti of UND concerning the \$280.60 bill submitted for building damages in connection with the 1974 state hockey tournament and that Mr. Marti had stated that the Building and Grounds Department insisted on payment from the athletic department for same. No action was taken.

The chairman appointed Anderson, Tooley, and Muckenhirn as a committee to select officials for the 1974 girls' regional and state basketball tournaments.

Tooley reported that the committee assigned to determine a job description for Robinson's replacement had not completed their work as there were several ways to go. He asked that the committee be given ideas from the Board and staff members and that it be finalized at a later date.

The secretary read a communique from the National Federation which had been sent to all state Governors opposing a proposed national high school basketball tournament as part of the Bi-centennial celebration. Muckenhirn moved that a letter be sent to Governor Link recommending rejection of the proposal. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Requests from Newburg and Carpio for permission to use basketball uniforms which did not conform to the new rules were next presented. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Quale, the requests were approved.

The Board agreed to charge the same fees for radio broadcasts of the girls' basketball tournaments as are charged for similar boys' tournaments.

A petition from Montpelier for transfer from District 18 to District 3 in the 1975-76 basketball alignment was next presented. As letters had not been received from the two districts involved approving such a change, no action was taken at this time. Muckenhirn moved that the deadline for submitting petitions for change of district assignments be set for November 1, 1974, seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The Board then recessed, convening again at 9:00 A.M. on Friday morning at the request of Supt. Myhre of Carpio for reconsideration of the decision concerning the eligibility status of Michael Brayson, a student at Carpio. After a lengthy discussion, Muckenhirn moved that the meeting be adjourned. The motion was seconded by Sunderland but failed. Further discussion followed. Anderson then moved that the meeting be adjourned, seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Minot, North Dakota - October 23, 1974

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 9:00 A.M. at the Ramada Inn in Minot with all members present.

Each Board member was presented with a packet containing the agenda for the meeting and a financial report of all business transacted from July 1 to October 16, 1974. Upon motion by Quale and second by Tooley, the reports were accepted as submitted.

The following cases which had been appealed under the hardship rule were reviewed and ruled as follows:

Monty Buckholder of Deering - eligible
Steve Solby of Upham - ineligible

An appeal for waiving of the rule pertaining to enrollment by the 11th day of the semester submitted by the Fingal School concerning Steve Johnson was next presented. Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Peterson, the appeal was denied.

A request from Warwick for special consideration for Gary Longlie in connection with the 9th semester rule was next reviewed. Upon motion by Anderson and second by Tooley, action was delayed pending further investigation.

The case concerning the protest submitted by White Shield of Roseglen against St. Mary's of New England which had been continued from the September hearing was next considered. A letter from Supt. Bicknese of White Shield stating that he had no further testimony to present was read. Father Paluck and Coach Wolsky of St. Mary's summarized their position in the matter. After some discussion, Tooley moved that the protest be denied because of lack of sufficient evidence. The motion was seconded by Peterson and carried on a 9 to 1 vote of the members.

The following requests for non-certified individuals as coaches or assistant coaches were approved subject to approval from the Department of Public Instruction:

1. Mike Nelson and Alan Glynn as 7th and 8th grade basketball coaches at Fullerton.
2. Del Lusso as 7th and 8th grade basketball coach at Hillsboro.
3. Thomas Metgroth as 9th grade hockey coach and Joseph Pavicic as assistant gymnastic coach at Fargo South.

Also approved were the following certified but non-teaching coaches:

1. Colette Folstad as girls' basketball coach at Fargo South.
2. Keith Jiskra as 9th grade basketball coach at Grafton.

In addition the following non-teaching, non-certified individuals were approved under the usual restrictions requiring the presence of a regular faculty member on the bench at all times:

1. Bruce Martin as assistant girls' basketball coach at Maxbass.
2. Practice teacher at Larimore as 7th grade basketball coach.

A letter from Supt. Borah of Aneta concerning their use of an ineligible player and steps taken by them concerning same was presented. Muckenhirn moved that the action taken be approved and no further penalty be applied. Second by McLain and carried.

A communique from Supt. Buchholz of Hazelton concerning recruiting by parochial schools in general was read. No action was taken concerning same.

A letter from Forbes concerning a girls' basketball game played at Hague, relative to the officiating, uniforms of players, and setting aside of rules, was reviewed along with the reply sent by the executive secretary. No further action was deemed necessary.

A letter from Devils Lake concerning a proposed hockey camp the week prior to the opening of the season, along with the executive secretary's reply outlining rules and regulations pertaining to same, was next presented. The decisions of the secretary were confirmed by the Board.

The next order of business was the opening of bids for the sale of the two 1974 Pontiac automobiles owned by the Association. High bidder on the coral-bronze car was Dale Sorenson of Valley City with a bid of \$3,930.00 and the bid of C. L. Larson of Forman of \$3,279.00 was high for the green unit. It was moved by Muckenhirn that the bid of Dale Sorenson for the coral-bronze unit be accepted. Seconded by Peterson and carried. Quale then moved that all bids for the green unit be rejected and that a price of \$3,600.00 be set on same with an opportunity to be given to bidders for first chance for purchase if they so desired. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Due to the fact that New Rockford had converted their golf course to a grass greens course this past summer, the Board next considered a change in site for the regional sand greens tourney originally scheduled there for next spring. Tooley moved that the tourney be relocated at Rugby, if they would accept it. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Discussion followed on a request submitted by several schools that schools be allowed to set their own season for girls' junior high basketball rather than following the high school season. Batterberry moved that the request be denied. Second by McLain and carried.

Next discussed was the regulation stipulating that "No more than two games per week are permitted for girls' basketball teams, except when participating in an invitational tourney." In response to inquiries, the staff members had ruled that only one other game would be allowed in the week when a team participated in such a tourney. Peterson moved that this interpretation be incorporated as part of the regulation. Seconded by Tooley and carried.

Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Quale, swimming and girls' basketball were included in the list of sports governed by the post-season competition rule.

A request from Supt. Swartz of Edinburg for permission to get started in girls' basketball program by being allowed to play some games during the boys' season was denied upon motion by Batterberry and second by Easton.

Peterson moved that the office staff appoint individuals for trophy presentation assignments at the girls' regional and state basketball tournaments. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Tooley presented the following recommendations of the job specification committee:

1. A claims clerk be hired upon the retirement of Mr. Robinson and that said individual begin work in May, if possible.
2. Mrs. Anderson be employed as the assistant secretary working with the non-athletic activities.
3. An additional staff member be employed as girls' sports director.
4. A re-assessment be made of duties assigned to all staff members.

Quale moved that the report be accepted and the executive secretary present recommendations relative to the re-assessment of duties at the January meeting. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Muckenhirn moved that Mrs. Anderson attend the NUEA meeting in St. Louis in December. Seconded by Tooley and carried.

Bruce Anderson, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported on the progress on the building addition to date.

The executive secretary next reported the attendance of head coaches at the various rules clinics had been as follows:

- 160 of 161 football schools
- 222 of 246 girls' basketball schools
- 26 of 26 girls' gymnastic schools.

Letters of explanation had been received from administrators of all schools whose coaches had not been in attendance except for two in girls' basketball.

The secretary next reported on the attendance at the various cheerleader clinics that were held this fall.

Appointed to the canvassing committee for the Board election in January were members Easton, Muckenhirn, and McLain.

A letter from a Dickinson patron to the Dickinson School concerning permission for post-season competition for a cross country runner was presented. After some discussion, it was moved by Tooley, seconded by Easton, and carried that the request be denied.

A request from Jamestown College for permission to set up an information booth at the girls' state Class A tourney was denied.

A request from Dunseith for permission to use their present boys' basketball uniforms which did not comply with regulations specified in the rule book was presented. Tooley moved that if the violation was in connection with a relatively recent rule that the request be granted. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

A communique from Montpelier withdrawing their earlier request for transfer of basketball districts in 1975-76 was next presented.

The Board designated McLain and Schindler as delegates to attend the National Athletic Directors Conference in December.

An appeal from Bismarck for consideration of an ABF claim which had previously been turned down by Mr. Robinson in that it was a year old, was denied upon motion by Tooley and second by McLain.

Anderson moved that wrestling tourneys for 1974-75 involving five matches per boy in one day which had been sanctioned prior to the rule change be allowed, but that all such future requests be turned down. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Supt. Benzie appeared before the Board relative to the question of the post-season cross country competition, and was advised that the Board had already taken action on the case denying the request.

Muckenhirn moved that a December meeting of the Board be called if the executive secretary feels that sufficient agenda items warrant a meeting at that time. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

The Board then adjourned, after setting the date for the January meeting at Bismarck for January 25th at 2:00 P.M., with the canvassing committee meeting at 1:00 P.M.

The Board of Directors of the NDHSAA met in the Administration Office of the Valley City Public Schools on December 5, 1974, at 9:00 A.M. with all members present.

The following eligibility cases were reviewed and ruled as follows:

- Gary Longlie of Warwick - eligible second semester
- Terry Baurle of Churchs Ferry - eligible
- Brad Ertlet of Fingal - ineligible first semester
- Chester Zolondek of Minto - eligible
- Allen Stokke of Cathay - eligible
- Robert Kutz of Sykeston - eligible
- Mitchell McCloud of Lisbon - eligible if investigating committee confirms facts as outlined and schools involved submit letters of no undue influence.

The Board next conducted a hearing concerning an incident involving a spectator and Jon Plowman, one of the officials at a girls' basketball game between Robinson and Pettibone at Pettibone on October 21st. Attending the hearing were Mr. Plowman and Supt. Zimmerman of Medina and Supt. Madcke and Coach Haugen of Robinson. After hearing testimony presented by Madcke, Haugen, and Plowman, Anderson moved that Mr. Plowman be suspended from officiating for the 1975-76 season. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Supt. Zimmerman and Coach Jon Plowman of Medina next appeared before the Board because of Mr. Plowman's failure to attend the boys' basketball rules clinic two consecutive years. Muckenhirn moved that a letter be sent to the Medina school board reprimanding Mr. Plowman for said offense. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The following action was taken on requests for approval for use of non-certified or non-teaching coaches:

Michael Lemnus of Enderlin, Rick Irey of Upham, Gilbert Borgen of Souris, John Johnson of Lisbon, and Br. Richard Paquette of Ojibwa approved contingent upon receiving approval of Department of Public Instruction if paid from district funds.

Larry Slaubaugh and Douglas Guss of Wolford approved.
Doug Schmidt of Glen Ullin approved.

The executive secretary next read a report concerning an incident at a Fort Yates - Dickinson girls' basketball game at Dickinson. No action was taken. Also presented was a report concerning failure by Dunseith to fulfill a football

contract with Walhalla and actions taken by both schools concerning same. No further action was deemed necessary.

Bob Stewart of the North Dakota School for the Deaf appeared before the Board presenting an invitation sent to their school for their track coach, Mr. Dwight Rafferty, to serve as a coach at the Pan-American games for the deaf next September in Venezuela and for Drexel Lawson, a student at the school, to participate in same. After considerable discussion concerning this and other invitations received by some other high school students for somewhat similar experiences, Muckenhirn moved that existing Board policies relative to pre-season and post-season competition by students as members of other than school teams or as unattached individuals in those sports not covered in the by-laws be rescinded. Seconded by McLain and carried.

A request from Sheyenne for reconsideration of their request for transfer from district 16 to district 13 for the 1975-76 season was next reviewed. Muckenhirn moved that the request be granted providing both districts involved give approval for same. Seconded by Quale and carried.

A petition from Dakota Arthur for transfer from District 4 to District 5 was next presented. Motion by Easton that the petition be denied due to failure of the school to submit same by the deadline date for submission of petitions. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

Discussion followed on charges for local cable TV delayed telecasts in a single community of events for which admission is charged. Easton moved that a fee of \$25.00 be set for each showing in each town. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

Some time was spent reviewing a directive sent to the Esmond school by HEW concerning girls' sports. M. F. Peterson moved that the NDHSAA Board of Directors not become involved with local school problems in connection with HEW policies or directives but confine themselves to only those policies which affect all schools in general. Seconded by Tooley and carried.

Letters from Lisbon and Bowman informing the Board of their decision to revert back to Class B classification effective January 1 were read along with statements from Cavalier and Fort Yates electing to remain in Class A. Lisbon was then assigned to Class B District 2 and Bowman to District 32 for the balance of this year and for the 1975-76 school year.

A letter from G. A. Tooley submitting his resignation as a Class A representative on the Board of Directors effective January 1, 1975, because of their school reverting back to Class B at that time was next read. Peterson moved that the resignation be reluctantly accepted with regrets as Mr. Tooley has served as an outstanding and contributing Board member. Seconded by Batterberry and carried. Anderson then moved that Supt. Frank Fischer of Jamestown be appointed to fill the position until the next general election. Sunderland moved that the nominations cease. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

The Board next reviewed the financial report of the girls' regional and state basketball tournaments.

Following considerable discussion concerning the girls' basketball program for 1975-76, the following dates were established for regional and state tournament play:

Class A Regions — November 6, 7, 8, 1975

Class B Regions — November 10, 11, 12, 1975

Class A State — November 13, 14, 15, 1975

Class B State — November 20, 21, 22, 1975

Sunderland moved that the number of permissible season games be increased from 12 to 14 and that the number of quarters of participation for individuals be adjusted accordingly. Seconded by Muckenhirn and carried.

A request from Lankin for permission to use their boys' basketball uniforms, which did not conform to the rules, until their new ones which are on order are received, was presented. Upon motion by Anderson and second by Quale, the request was approved.

The secretary next reported the attendance of coaches at various rules clinics had been as follows:

258 of 270 basketball schools

64 of 65 wrestling schools

12 of 13 hockey schools

The minutes of the November meeting of the NDOA Board of Directors and the minutes of the annual Officials' Association meeting were read. The following recommendations of this group, as amended, were adopted:

1. Open book tests be conducted rather than closed book
2. Recommended fees for girls' basketball officiating in 1975 be \$15.00 for main contest and \$5.00 for the preliminary event.

Dates for the next meeting of the Board were set for 2:00 P.M. on January 25, and 9:30 A.M. on January 26 at Bismarck, with committee meetings to begin at 11:00 A.M. on January 25th.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 2:00 P.M. at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck on January 25, 1975, with all members present except Sunderland, McLain and Bard.

Each member was presented with a packet containing the agenda, a complete report of the year's business to January 17, 1975, a list of checks drawn on the General Fund since October 17, 1974, and the ABF report from July 1, 1974 to January 17, 1975. The Board reviewed the various reports and upon motion by Batterberry and second by Peterson voted to accept same.

John Sunderland, D. Allen Halley, and Donald Kolbo were declared duly elected members of the Board effective July 1, 1975, upon motion by Easton and second by Muckenhirn.

Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Batterberry, Martin Green was declared immediately eligible at Bismarck High School under the hardship rule.

A letter from the principal of the Forsythe, Montana, high school explaining reasons for the re-transfer of Mitch McCloud from Forsythe to Lisbon was presented to the Board. Muckenhirn moved that the boy be ruled ineligible at Lisbon for a period of 90 school days from the date of re-entry at Lisbon. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

Bids for supplying basketballs for the 1975-76 tournaments were opened and upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Anderson, the low bid of \$17.04 per ball submitted by Home of Economy of Grand Forks for the Wilson B1200 Jet ball was accepted.

The Board next reviewed a request for exemption from physical examination received by Larimore from the Christian Scientists. After some discussion, the by-law pertaining to required physical examinations was referred to the Ad Hoc sub-committee on eligibility.

A request for use of Mark Podoll as assistant wrestling coach at LaMoure was approved under the customary conditions, upon motion by Anderson and second by Easton.

A report relative to a Towner-Willow City basketball scrimmage which was written up in the Towner newspaper was reviewed next. Muckenhirn moved that a copy of the rule relative to scrimmages be sent to the Towner paper and copies of same be sent to the two school administrators. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Next considered was a request from Kenmare High School for approval for participation in the Worlds of Fun Festival for Choirs in Kansas City, Mo.

Reviewed in connection therewith was a notification from the Missouri Association that participation in same by Missouri schools had been denied along with reasons therefore. Muckenhirn moved that the request be denied because:

- 1) The event appears to be a contest and is beyond the 600 mile limit
- 2) It is not on the NASSP approved list
- 3) it has not been sanctioned by the National Federation

Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Some time was spent reviewing reports submitted by the various Ad Hoc sub-committees of their activities to date.

Discussion followed on the present ABF plan and whether another survey of schools should be made at this time concerning same. However, it was the consensus of opinion that such a survey was not necessary as yet since one had been made a comparatively short time ago.

The Board then recessed for the day and reconvened at 9:30 A.M. the next morning with all members present except Bard.

Plans for various Bi-centennial programs and activities and conflicts with existing regulations were discussed at some length. Easton moved that existing regulations pertaining to out-of-state or out-of-season participation in non-athletic programs be waived for Bi-centennial programs such as the Bi-centennial Youth Debates, that are funded or sponsored by the Federal government. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Discussion followed on the adding of additional staff personnel and the duties to be assigned to the various staff members. Easton moved that the action taken in December relative to the employment of an additional assistant secretary be rescinded and that an additional clerical person be employed instead. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

A communique from District 16 opposing Sheyenne's request for transfer from District 16 to District 13 along with a statement from District 13 supporting the request was read. Supt. Bubach appeared before the Board citing reasons for their request. Muckenhirn moved that the motion passed at the December meeting requiring the approval of both districts involved be rescinded. Seconded by Batterberry and carried. Muckenhirn then moved that Sheyenne be transferred to District 13. The motion was seconded by Batterberry but was defeated by a 6-3 vote.

Discussion followed on plans for the Class B District Chairmen's meeting in March. Norman Batterberry was appointed chairman for the meeting.

Reports were made on the National Federation Athletic Directors conference by McLain and the National Federation Mid-Winter Conference by Anderson, Smith, and Schindler.

Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Batterberry, the Board voted to continue the same mid-week basketball contest limitation rule in 1975-76 as was in effect this past year.

Next discussed was the eligibility status of a freshman boy who transferred from Fargo Shanley to St. Mary's of Bismarck to be with his father, a state legislator, for the duration of the legislative session. As the by-laws stipulate that the youngster would be ineligible upon making such a transfer and also upon re-transferring to his original school, since there was no change in legal parental residence, the Board felt that no special dispensation was permissible.

A request from KXMC-TV for permission to telecast the Northwest Class A regional basketball tournament under the same financial arrangement as a year ago was presented. Upon motion by Easton and second by Anderson, the request was approved.

Discussion followed on the problem of securing registered gymnastic officials. It was suggested that Mrs. Anderson bring this matter to the attention of the gymnastic coaches at their annual meeting along with a suggestion that possibly coaches should register as officials and help officiate their own meets.

The Board then scheduled their next meetings for 9:00 A.M. on March 14th at Fargo and 1:00 P.M. on March 21st at Bismarck.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at the Holiday Inn in Fargo on March 14, 1975, with all members present. Each member of the Board was furnished a complete financial report of business to date and an agenda for the meeting. Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Peterson, the General Fund and ABF Fund reports were accepted as submitted.

The Board also reviewed a written report concerning the Building Fund expenditures of \$35,644.50 to date for remodeling and addition to the office building, and approved the report as presented.

The executive-secretary next briefed the Board concerning disciplinary action taken by administrative officials at Rugby in connection with violation of the drinking rule by basketball players.

A request from the Donnybrook school for approval of a non-faculty individual as basketball coach and for which the secretary had granted temporary approval under the usual restrictions was reviewed and approved by the Board.

Next considered was a bill in the amount of \$1094 submitted by Robert Feder, attorney for the plaintiff in the Becky Dooley court case. Upon motion by Anderson and second by Peterson, the bill was disallowed.

A communique from KXJB-TV to the effect that they would not be able to show highlights of the Thursday evening games of the State Class B basketball tourney over Channel 4 as per contract but would be limited to showing of highlights of the afternoon games only because of the time element was presented. Anderson moved that approval for same be granted, providing that there be no reduction in contract fees or time allotted. Seconded by Bard and carried.

A request by the Minot College chapter of the FCA for permission to sell tee shirts on the parking lots at the State Class A basketball tourney and display of advertising posters relative to same in the Civic Auditorium was next taken under consideration. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Anderson, the request was denied.

In reply to a question submitted by Carrington High School, the Board ruled that participation in a weight lifting contest would not be in violation of the in-season or post-season wrestling competition rule.

Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Sunderland, a request by Minot College for introduction of certain individuals at the boys' state track meet was approved.

Discussion followed on the recently completed girls' state gymnastic meet. Muckenhirn moved that judges be paid an extra day's allowance because of the long hours put in at Friday's session. Second by Anderson and carried. Other items in connection therewith were tabled until the June meeting.

Considered next were complaints relative to the change of dates for the Northeast regional Class A basketball tourney. Easton moved that the dates for

regional tourneys as set by the Board be firm dates. Seconded by Batterberry. Peterson moved that the motion be amended to permit emergency exceptions by the NDHSAA Board of Directors. Seconded by Sunderland. The amendment and original motion as amended were then passed.

The policy concerning non-duplication of tourney officials for the boys' and girls' basketball tournament was next discussed. Upon motion by Easton, and second by McLain, the policy was continued for 1975-76.

Following discussion on the starting date for boys' basketball practice next year because of the lengthening of the girls' season by one week, Muckenhirn moved that the starting date for the boys' season be set for November 17th. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Some time was spent discussing items that might be brought up for discussion at the Class B district chairmen's* meeting at Bismarck.

Bruce Anderson, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that the office building project was now 90 to 95% complete.

Peterson moved that mileage fees for Board members be increased from 12¢ to 15¢ per mile. Seconded by Fischer and carried.

Anderson submitted his resignation as chairman of the Finance Committee and the Chair appointed John Sunderland as new chairman of the committee.

The executive-secretary recommended that regional meetings be held next fall prior to the meeting of the General Assembly to present recommendations of the Ad Hoc Committee to the membership. Easton moved that such be done if the Ad Hoc report is ready in time for same. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

Discussion followed as to the extent of the authority of district committees in regard to requiring of varsity basketball teams only in required district seasonal competition, as a result of a letter of inquiry concerning same submitted by Supt. Erickson of LaMoure. The secretary pointed out that the Board had previously ruled that such was the prerogative of the district committee in their meeting of March 9, 1973. As the schools in the district involved had already solved the problem by amending their own regulations, no further action was taken.

The secretary presented a request from the Nebraska Music Educators for permission to print verbatim sections of the North Dakota Music Manager's Handbook in their proposed new book. Motion by Batterberry and second by Peterson to grant the request. Motion carried.

A letter from the Northwest Class A regional committee recommending the discontinuing of Class A regional wrestling tournaments was presented. Some time was spent discussing this and other ideas relative to the format for the State A wrestling program. Action on same was deferred and the assistant-secretary was instructed to get an evaluation of the new Minnesota plan from the Minnesota High School League officials.

A request from Harold Pedersen, Athletic Director of the Fargo Public Schools, asking for an immediate decision on the format for the hockey program for next year was next presented. Upon motion by Anderson and second by Batterberry it was agreed that the same format as used in 1974-75 should be followed in 1975-76.

Several communiques from coaches recommending specific changes in the swimming program next year were reviewed. Action on same was deferred to the June meeting.

It was pointed out that deferring selection of sites for the 1975 girls' state basketball tournaments until the June meeting might be rather late because of the necessity of advanced booking of sites. Peterson moved that these two sites be selected at the meeting in Bismarck next week. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The Chair appointed Batterberry and Muckenhirn as Board representatives to attend the meeting of the NDOS Board of Directors on March 15.

The question as to whether participation of certain DesLacs basketball players in a get-together scrimmage in Minot was in violation of the rule prohibiting players from playing on other than a school team during the regular season was next discussed. Testimonials which had been received by the secretary concerning the matter were read, along with the secretary's interpretation based on said testimonials, that this had been a sand-lot type of play and so no penalty had been invoked. The Board concurred in the interpretation and no further action was taken.

A request from Bill Nieland of the Roughriders Sporting Goods for permission to film the 1975 boys' state track meet was next presented. The secretary was instructed to request that Mr. Nieland attend the Board meeting next week in Bismarck to explain particulars concerning same.

The secretary reported that Rugby had reported that they were converting to grass greens and so would not be able to host the eastern regional sand greens golf tourney this spring. Muckenhirn moved that the executive staff select a new site for this region after the entries are in. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Discussion followed on problems of commercial photographers at the state wrestling tournaments. Muckenhirn moved that no commercial photographers, other than press photographers, be allowed on the playing floor areas during any NDHSAA tourney or event. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The Board then recessed the meeting until 1:00 P.M., March 21, in Bismarck.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Bismarck, North Dakota -- March 21, 22, 1975

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association reconvened at 1:00 P.M., March 21, at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck with all members present except Bard.

Mr. Nieland of the Roughriders Sporting Goods appeared before the Board and outlined his plan and proposals for the filming of the Boys' State Track meet, and offered to make a copy of the film available to the Association. Muckenhirn moved that the request be granted, seconded by Batterberry, and carried.

A request from Almont for permission for the one girl they have interested in track to attend meets with the New Salem team under the supervision of the New Salem coach, but competing for Almont, was presented. McLain moved to approve same providing such an arrangement meets the approval of the New Salem school. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

Bids in the amount of \$800 as submitted by the World Cheerleaders Council and \$650 by the National Cheerleaders Association for the conduction of four cheerleader clinics in the fall of 1975 were presented. Upon motion by Easton and second by Fischer, the bid of the National Cheerleaders Association was accepted.

Invitations from Jamestown and Minot for sites for the 1975 State Class A and B girls' basketball tournaments, respectively, were presented. Anderson moved that the invitations be accepted. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The Board next reviewed the results of a survey conducted by the National Federation as to the make-up of the Board of Control in the various state Associations.

Mr. Robinson presented a report on costs of increases made in the ABF benefit schedule this past year and the effect it had on the number of pro-rated claims, along with a recommendation that the pro-rata figure be raised from \$25.00 to \$35.00 at a cost of approximately \$10,000.00. Upon motion by Sunderland and second by McLain, the report was approved and the recommendation adopted.

Batterberry next reported on recommendations adopted by Class B district chairmen. Action relative to same was deferred until later.

Some time was spent reviewing preliminary financial reports which had been received on tournaments held to date.

Muckenhirn next presented the following recommendations of the finance committee:

- 1) salary increases of \$1,500 per year be granted executive-secretary and assistant-secretary
- 2) salary increase of \$1,200 per year be granted the assistant-to-the-secretary
- 3) the Association deposit an additional \$5,000 in the retirement trust fund for the executive-secretary and his monthly contribution to the fund be increased \$75.00 per month effective July 1, and revising the retirement payment to said employee to \$300.00 monthly for the duration of the trust fund
- 4) investigate cooperatively with the assistant-secretary a possible change in his retirement plan, so that he would contribute 4% of his annual salary each year with the Board matching said contribution, and revising monthly retirement benefit in accordance therewith
- 5) adopt a similar retirement trust fund for Mary K. Anderson, assistant-to-the-secretary, whereby she would contribute 4% of her salary annually to said fund with the Board matching this amount, the monthly retirement benefit amount to be determined later
- 6) adoption of the provision that no staff member be eligible for the Association's contribution to the retirement trust fund for said individual unless they complete 10 years of service to the Association.

McLain moved that the recommendations of the committee be adopted. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

The Board next adopted the following recommendations of the North Dakota Officials Association as amended, upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Sunderland:

- 1) adoption of a reciprocity system with Minnesota and South Dakota whereby registered officials in any one of the three states who desired reciprocity with one of the other states, could register with said state upon payment of a \$5.00 fee
- 2) executive-secretary of the NDHSAA should retain the power to excuse mandatory attendance at clinics or taking of test by officials in case of emergency situations
- 3) each local officials' association should set a date for a mechanic demonstration clinic and in areas where no locals were organized, a person should be designated by the NDHSAA to organize and hold such a meeting for officials in that area
- 4) differences between high school girls' basketball rules and college girls' rules be stressed at girls' basketball rules clinics next fall
- 5) permitting neighboring Canadian hockey officials to officiate in North Dakota by registering with the NDOA, attending clinics, taking test, etc.
- 6) mileage fee for officials be raised from 12¢ to 15¢ per mile effective with contracts for 1975-76 school year
- 7) fees for officiating games at state tournaments be increased to \$35.00 per game next year
- 8) an article be printed in the Bulletin next fall advising schools to take precautionary steps to prevent any incidents involving fans getting in dressing rooms, etc., and that district chairmen place said topic on their agenda at district meetings next fall.

A communique from the Southeast Class A Region requesting that the starting date for boys' basketball practice be set for November 10th was presented. No action was taken, as the date had been set for November 17th at the meeting a week ago.

Muckenhirn moved that H. L. McLain be designated as the voting delegate at the business meeting of the National Federation in San Diego in July. Seconded by Easton and carried.

The executive-secretary was requested to send in reservations for those attending the National Federation summer meeting and to attempt to secure rooms in the same general area for the North Dakota delegation.

Plans for the June meeting were discussed and formulated, setting the date for the trophy showing on June 11th, with the Board meeting on June 12 and 13. Named to the Athletic Review Committee as representatives of the Board were members Fischer and Anderson.

The Board then recessed, convening again at 10:00 A.M. on Saturday, March 22nd.

Harold Pedersen, Class A basketball tourney manager, appeared before the Board, and reported briefly on the recent state tournament held in Fargo and

raised the question as to whether the Association should sponsor a pep squad spirit award as such had been discontinued by the North Dakota Sports Review. He also requested that additional monies be allocated for paying help at the state indoor track meet.

Discussion followed on the question of a spirit award at state tournaments. Easton then moved that an investigation be made of the possibility of the Association making such awards at the boys' and girls' state basketball tournaments. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Next considered was the request for paying additional workers at the state indoor track meet. Easton moved that since there was no opportunity at this late date to adjust entry fees for this year's meet that the request be denied. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

A request from District 8 for re-assignment of their district to a different basketball region was next considered. Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Fischer, the request was denied.

Also considered was a request from District 2 that Kathryn be transferred from District 2 to District 6. Peterson moved that same be approved if Kathryn has no objection. Seconded by Bard and carried.

The question of two districts holding one combined district tournament for selection of regional representatives was next taken under consideration. It was moved by Muckenhirn that such not be allowed. Seconded by Bard and carried.

In response to a question, it was the opinion of the Board that the rule limiting an individual to 5 quarters of basketball in one evening did not apply to teams playing more than one game per day in district tournaments.

Muckenhirn moved that the recommendation of the Class B district chairmen providing for a meeting of district chairmen at the Class B girls' state basketball tournament as well as at the boys' event be adopted. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The Board next proceeded to organize itself for the 1975-76 fiscal year. Easton nominated Bruce Anderson as chairman. Sunderland moved that nominations cease and a unanimous ballot be cast for Anderson. Seconded by McLain and carried. Sunderland then nominated Muckenhirn for vice-president. Batterberry moved that nominations cease and a unanimous ballot be cast for Muckenhirn. Seconded by Fischer and carried. A rising vote of thanks was given Don Kolbo by the members of the Board for his loyal years of service as chairman of the Board.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Valley City, North Dakota — June 12, 13, 1975

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in the Association office building at 9:00 A.M. on June 12th with all members present. Each member of the Board was furnished a complete financial report of business to date, a financial report of the ABF to date, and an agenda for the meeting. Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Anderson, the financial report was accepted as submitted. Also approved was the ABF report upon motion by Easton and second by Fischer. The Board also reviewed a preliminary financial report of all activities that had been completed.

Following the recommendation of the Trophy Committee, the Board approved upon motion by Sunderland and second by Peterson, the awarding of contracts for a three-year period to the Billings Trophy Company of Billings, Montana, for team trophies, Allard Trophy Company of Valley City for individuals awards, and Balfour for participation medals.

The secretary reported that some late bills in connection with the State Class A wrestling tournament, the State Class B basketball tournament, and the Southwest Class A regional basketball tourney had been presented to the NDHSAA by tournament manager, Dick Karlgaard. Muckenhirn moved that the bills applicable to the wrestling and State B basketball tournament and one-half of the amount of the Southwest Class A regional basketball tourney bills be paid as submitted. Seconded by Anderson and carried.

A lengthy discussion followed as to whether guidelines or schedules of some type should be established to limit expense charges at various tourneys sponsored by the NDHSAA. Muckenhirn moved that tourney managers of state events submit a budget to the state office by September 1 as to what expenses will be charged to the NDHSAA and that a committee be formed to study this entire problem area and formulate a plan for the following year. Seconded by Easton and carried.

Anderson moved that the Association allow district and state track managers \$100.00 for expenses next year so that they are able to pay the required track rental fee. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

The Board next studied requests from Beach and Dickinson High Schools to change the starting date for boys' basketball practice next fall or for special dispensations for permission to play their first game before the allowable date. No action was taken, thereby denying the requests.

Delegations from several cities appeared before the Board to extend personal invitations for hosting various events for the 1975-76 school year. Action on site selection was temporarily deferred, so that all written invitations could also be read and considered, as well as recommendations as to sites which had been presented by various districts and regions.

The Board next considered the problem of week-day district track meets and the possibility of shifting these dates to week-ends. Easton moved that such meets be held on a Saturday. The motion was seconded by Batterberry, but was defeated when put to vote.

Several letters requesting a later date for the State Music Contest were

presented. Anderson moved that the date be changed from April 23 to May 8. Seconded by McLain and carried.

The Board spent some time reviewing the Class A wrestling program along with letters received from coaches and the Northwest Class A school officials concerning same. Action was temporarily deferred pending review of recommendations of the Wrestling Advisory Committee the next day.

Next reviewed was a request from District 12 requesting that the Association add Curling as a sponsored sport in 1975-76. Muckenhirn moved that the request be denied until sufficient interest of the membership in such activity warrants such action. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Mr. Robinson reported on a survey he had conducted as to policies of various insurance companies and state plans concerning dental injuries to youngsters wherein treatment must be deferred until a later age. Motion by McLain that an allowance for same be paid according to schedule up to a maximum of \$40.00 per tooth and \$100.00 per injury. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

A request for approval submitted by Dick Limke, Principal of St. Mary's High School in Bismarck, for approval of a non-teaching hockey coach was presented, along with a letter from Fr. Becwar that said request be denied. Muckenhirn moved that the request be approved under the usual restrictions, seconded by Sunderland and carried. Bard and Peterson requested that the minutes show that they voted against the motion.

Next considered was a request from Bismarck High School for permission to run their junior high girls' basketball program in February instead of the regular time. Upon motion by Fischer and second by McLain, the request was denied.

The Board approved a plan outlined by Finley and Sharon for a trial merger of the schools for 1975-76 upon motion by Anderson and second by Easton.

A telephone request from Argusville for ruling on eligibility status of Gardner students who formerly attended Grandin High School but would be attending Argusville next year under an arrangement made by the Argusville and Gardner school districts was next discussed. Peterson moved that a detailed plan be submitted in writing prior to the August meeting and that a decision be postponed until such plan is received. Seconded by Bard and carried.

A request to allow boys to participate in more than five quarters per day during invitational tourneys was next discussed. Upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Easton, the request was denied.

John Sunderland, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported on recommended admission prices for 1975-76 events and recommended that a study be made to determine new team allowances for presentation at the August meeting. Upon motion by Peterson and second by Batterberry, the report was approved.

The Board next studied the proposed retirement plans for the executive staff members as presented by the finance committee in March and amended same upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Anderson to provide that one-half of the monthly retirement withdrawals from the fund would be from the employee's share and one-half from the employer's contribution with the

further stipulation that the employee may elect to withdraw his entire contribution or any portion thereof at any time after age 65, but that the employer's share could not be drawn out in less than a ten year period with said withdrawals to be made on a monthly basis and should both the employee and spouse die prior to exhaustion of the fund, any remainder in the fund which had been contributed by the employee shall revert to said employee's estate and that portion contributed by the employer shall revert to the Association.

The Finance Committee also recommended that the meal allowance for Board members and staff be increased to \$20.00 per day for out-of-state travel and \$15.00 per day in-state effective July 1, and upon motion by Sunderland and second by Fischer, said recommendation was adopted.

Salaries, as recommended by the Finance Committee, for office help for 1975-76 were set as follows: Alida Posein, bookkeeper, \$550 per month; Lucile Vandestreek, secretary, \$500 per month; Mariys Gronneberg, secretary, \$400 per month, upon motion by Sunderland and second by Muckenhirn.

Muckenhirn reported that the personnel committee had interviewed five people for the Claims Manager position, and had selected one. However, this individual was no longer available and the committee felt that additional applicants should be sought. Bard then moved that Mr. Smith check on qualified individuals in Valley City that might be interested and that he select one. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Harold Neis of Fargo South appeared before the Board in regards to the proposed football play-off plan and answered questions concerning same. Anderson then moved that the basic plan be approved on a one-year trial basis and that a committee be appointed to work out financial arrangements and other details. Seconded by McLain and carried. Upon motion by Bard and second by Fischer, rule 1-3-1 of the Alliance Football Rules was adopted.

The executive-secretary presented the recommendations made by the Class B District Chairmen in March. Action on same was deferred pending review of Advisory Committee recommendations.

Discussion followed on the track program for 1975-76. Muckenhirn moved that the Class A boys' and girls' district and state meets be combined and that the Class B boys' and girls' meets be run together. The motion was seconded by McLain but failed when put to vote. Fischer then moved that a study be made relative to same for the 1977 meets, seconded by Anderson and carried. The Board then adopted the following recommendations of the boys' Track Advisory Committee as amended:

1. Minimum qualifying standards be revised as follows:

- a. 880 yd. run from 2:04 to 2:03
- b. mile run from 4:40 to 4:36
- c. high jump from 5'10" to 5'11"
- d. pole vault from 11'9" to 12'0"
- e. Class B 440 relay from 47.0 to 46.5

2. State meet regulations:

- a. To qualify from semi-finals to finals in the 100, 220, 440, 440 relay and 880 relay:
 - If 2 heats, take 3 from each plus 2 fastest times
 - If 3 heats, take 2 from each plus 2 fastest times

If 4 heats, take 1 from each plus 4 fastest times

- b. In the mile and 2 mile run, use a 2 turn stagger with a maximum of 24 runners in the first heat. If more than 24 entrants, 16 put in first heat and rest in 2nd. Entrants to be assigned lanes by qualifying times with best time in 1A, 2nd best in 1B, 17th best in 1C, etc.
 - c. Flights to be set-up in field events as in running events so that top qualifiers would be in flight 1, 2nd best in flight 2, etc. Position within the flights to be drawn for.
 - d. When finalists are given their choice of lanes, this should be done as they report to run in the event.
 - e. Reverse order of mile run and 2 mile relays on 1st day's schedule.
 - f. A revised schedule of events be adopted so that proper time and recognition be given to field event performers.
3. Discontinue 180 yard hurdles in 1978 and add in place thereof the 330 yard intermediate hurdles. Teams to experiment with the 330's in 1976 and 1977.

Fischer moved the adoption of the following recommendations of the Girls' Track Advisory Committee; seconded by Anderson and carried.

1. Minimum qualifying standards be revised as follows:
 220 yd. dash — 27.5
 mile run — 5:47.0
 110 yd. hurdles — 16.2
 880 yd. relay — Class A, 1:52; Class B, 1:54
 880 yd. medley relay — Class A, 1:58; Class B, 2:00
 mile relay — Class A, 4:24; Class B, 4:28
2. Add to girls' track regulations: The penalty for breaking one of the track regulations will be ineligibility of the individual for the next scheduled meet; however, if the violation occurs at the district meet, she could not qualify for the state meet but could participate in the state meet if she had previously qualified by minimum standards.
3. International marking system be recommended for all new tracks being built.

The Board next discussed all-star track meets and the various problems they are causing. Final action was deferred as it was felt that the matter should be brought to the attention of the general membership at the annual meeting.

Upon motion by Anderson and second by Fischer, the following recommendations of the Wrestling Advisory Committee as amended were approved:

1. Submit following amendments to the junior high by-laws to the General Assembly:
 - a. Revise Section II (a) of Article VII as follows:
 A minimum of two weeks practice must be held with at least ten daily sessions for team and individuals before any inter-school contests are conducted. Practice session should not exceed one and one-half hours in length.
 - b. Rewrite Section III of Article VII as follows:
 The weight classes for junior high are 70, 75, 80, 86, 92, 98, 104, 110, 116, 122, 128, 134, 140, 148, 158, and heavyweight.
 - c. Rewrite Section IV of Article VII as follows:

The low weight class for each boy will be established when he weighs in at a match beginning the Monday of weight certification week for high school boys. If a school has no matches that week or none prior to January 1st then they should establish low weight classes the last scheduled match prior to that date. Junior high wrestlers may not drop into lower weight classes after this weigh-in but must move up if they cannot make their established weight class on a future date. Junior high wrestlers need not be "certified" unless they wrestle on a high school team. A copy of the weigh-in when weight classes are established should be sent to all schools on the schedule.

Beginning January 1st and continuing until February 1st, two additional pounds will be allowed in each weight class; from February 1st to the end of the season one additional pound will be allowed.

- d. Renumber present Sections IV and V of Article VII as Sections V and VI.
2. At least ten daily practice sessions be required for each team and individual prior to their first interscholastic contest.
3. In Class B regionals, wrestle-backs be conducted between all wrestlers defeated by semi-final winners. No cross-bracketing.
4. In Class A regionals, wrestle-backs to be conducted between all wrestlers defeated by quarter-final winners. Cross-bracketing to be used.
5. NDHSAA furnish each regional manager with two sets of weight class posters.
6. Eliminate the statement "if the 2nd place finisher and the 3rd place finisher are both beaten by the champion" in the challenge matches.
7. High school weight certification to be the week of December 15 to 20, with the last date December 20.
8. Four individuals from each Class A regional tourney qualify for state tourney.
9. Five team trophies and five individual awards for each weight class to be presented at the state tourney.
10. Clarify definition of a tourney by stating that a tournament is a meet in which pre-arranged bracketing is provided and provision is made for advancement either by winning teams or individuals. A series of duals in which winning teams or individuals do not advance but points are awarded by some means is not to be construed to be a tournament.

The following recommendations of the Boys' Basketball Advisory Committee as amended were adopted upon motion by Muckenhirn and second by Bard:

1. Eliminate rule allowing only twenty nights of competition and add in lieu thereof a regulation to the effect that no games can be added to the schedule after December 1.
2. Propose an amendment to the by-laws which would allow the two scrimmages after five days of practice and that such scrimmages be counted in the ten days of practice required before the first game.

3. Four officials be selected from the East and four from the West for the State Class A tourney. Said officials to be paired one from East and one from West before the state tourney by the Association office and not split. Coaches to still have choice of pairs.
4. Set starting time for all games at regional and state tourneys at 1:00 P.M., 3:00 P.M., 7:00 P.M., and 9:00 P.M. Saturday consolation game at 1:30 P.M.
5. Adopt a regulation that the regional committees cannot officially contract officials for the next year prior to the Monday after the A regional tourneys.
6. Explore possibility of having the TV station make three 16mm sound prints of the final game of the two state tourneys — one for each team and one for the Association, with the teams assuming the expense for their own print.

The following recommendation of the Girls' Basketball Advisory Committee was approved upon motion by Anderson and second by Batterberry:

"Ten daily practice sessions be required before the first allowable game, with two scrimmages with other schools being permissible after five daily practice sessions and said scrimmages may be counted as practice sessions."

Fischer moved that the following recommendations of the Girls' Gymnastic Advisory Committee as amended be approved, seconded by McLain and carried:

1. The new intermediate compulsories be used for Class A and the new novice compulsories for Class B.
2. Two regional meets be held with schools allowed three entries in each event and five all-arounds. Top six contestants in each event and six all-arounds to qualify for the state meet.
3. Regional meets to be held on Friday and Saturday with Class B events on Friday and Class A events on Saturday. State meet to be a one day meet.
4. Five individual awards and one team trophy to be awarded for each class at regionals and five individual awards and two team trophies for each class at state meet.
5. Recommended gymnastic judge's uniform: navy blue shirt jacket, navy blue slacks, red mock-turtle neck long or short sleeved blouse or shirt, navy blue shoes, and nylons or socks. All patches to be sewn on blouse.

The following recommendations of the Hockey Advisory Committee as amended were approved upon motion by Anderson and second by Muckenhirn:

1. Number of players permitted on squad to 18 plus 2 goalies to conform with rule book.
2. Continue present regional set-up with Devils Lake being assigned to the South Region. First four place teams advancing from each regional tournament to the state tournament.
3. Define a jamboree as a scrimmage involving more than 2 teams limiting each team to no more than 3 periods of hockey or more than 4 quarters in basketball or football. A jamboree to be counted as a scrimmage.

Muckenhirn moved that the following recommendations of the tennis coaches be approved, seconded by Easton and carried:

1. Scoring for singles and doubles to be a one-to-one ratio
2. Consolation round to be played in each division, with no points being awarded except for the consolation finals.
3. First, second, third, and consolation individual awards in each division.
4. Third place trophy added in both singles and doubles (points to be awarded for 3rd place).

Upon motion by Easton and second by Bard, the golf program for 1975-1976 was left the same as this past year.

The following recommendations of the swimming coaches as amended were approved upon motion by Sunderland and second by McLain:

1. State meets be scheduled as a two-day affair beginning at 6:00 P.M. the first day.
2. Change entry procedure so that entry forms and entry cards are to be submitted simultaneously one week prior to the state meet.
3. Use coaches as diving judges.
4. Use experienced meet officials (those that are used during the school year).
5. A representative of the NDHSAA be present for the seeding meeting.
6. No more than six lanes be used for preliminaries in the state meet.
7. Ballot computation be used unless a fully automatic system is available.

Peterson moved that the following recommendations of the Speech Advisory Committee as amended be approved, seconded by McLain and carried:

1. Oral Book Review be dropped.
2. Add Dramatic Interpretation in both Class A and B.
3. Speech and Drama be run as separate divisions at the district and state with no points being awarded for one-act plays toward the speech sweepstakes award. Contests to be held at the same site and date, but separate awards.
4. Speech manager's instructional meetings be put on by NDHSAA.
5. Verbal instructions be given all judges prior to start of contests.
6. Class B state speech meet be held at Minot State College next year.

Upon motion by Bard and second by Peterson, the following recommendations of the Music Advisory Committee as amended were approved:

1. All vocal events must be memorized.
2. Letters be sent by NDHSAA to all district managers and district chairmen notifying them that managers must attend instructional meet or be disqualified as a district manager.
3. Date for state music contest be changed to May 8.
4. Fees for solo events be \$3.00 and ensembles \$4.00.
5. A school to qualify for state competition must participate in its district as scheduled and cannot qualify in any other contest or at any other

time.

6. Add the following to regulations:

"Any event, solo or ensembles, involving an ineligible student at district level may not advance on to state competition".

After reviewing written invitations, district recommendations, and personal invitations presented the day before, the Board approved the following sites for the 1975-1976 events:

MINUTES — ANNUAL MEETING**North Dakota High School Activities Association****October 24, 1974 — Minot, North Dakota**

The annual meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held at the Ramada Inn in Minot on October 24, 1974, at 2:30 P.M.

Inasmuch as all members had copies of the minutes of the last meeting in the annual handbook, Supt. Howell of Bottineau moved that the reading of the minutes be waived. The motion was seconded by Supt. Broton of New England and carried.

Supt. Anderson of Valley City gave a brief report of the annual meeting of the National Federation held in Louisville, Ky., in July.

Supt. Sunderland presented three amendments to the by-laws, sponsored by the Board of Directors. The first proposal was to amend Article III by adding Section X, reading as follows:

Article III — Contests

Section X — Interscholastic teams composed of members of both sexes are permitted in the non-contact, non-collision sports sponsored by the Association, i.e., cross country, track, tennis, golf, and swimming, if a school does not provide for separate teams for each sex. Teams composed of members of both sexes shall follow the rules as outlined for boys and compete in said division.

Sunderland moved the adoption of the amendment as proposed, seconded by Anderson. Pedersen of Fargo moved to amend the proposal by adding gymnastics to the list of specified sports. Seconded by Bowman of Colfax but failed when put to vote. Peterson of Mott then moved to substitute the letters "eg" in the original motion instead of "ie". Seconded by Andrist and carried. The original motion as amended was then voted on and carried.

Mr. Sunderland then moved that Section I of Article VI of the by-laws be amended to read as follows:

Article VI — Sanctions

Section I — No member school shall be represented by any team or group in an interscholastic event where more than three schools are represented unless such event shall have received the sanction of the Board.

The motion was seconded by Herbel of Rolla and carried.

Mr. Sunderland then moved that Section I of Article XI of the by-laws be amended to read as follows:

Article XI — Physical Examination, Parents' Consent

Section I — No pupil shall be allowed to represent his school in high school athletics until there is on file with the superintendent or principal a statement signed by a participating physician, and his parents or legal guardian certifying that he has passed an adequate physical examination since June 15th of the current year; that in the opinion of the examining physician, he is physically fit to participate in such activities; that he has the consent of his parents or legal guardian to participate.

The motion was seconded by Karlgaard of Bismarck and carried.

Supt. Frank of Bowman next presented the following amendment to Section I of Article II of the by-laws and moved its adoption:

Article II — Classification of Schools

Section I — Class A Schools

- a) This group shall consist of all member high schools with a total enrollment of 325 or over, and/or an enrollment of 160 or more pupils in an all-male school in grades 9-12, inclusive as of October 1, 1974, plus any member high school that elects to choose Class A in paragraph (b), (c), and (d) herewith.
- b) Any high school with an enrollment between 200 and 324 in grades 9-12, inclusive on October 1, 1974, may elect to join Class A for interscholastic competition by written notice to the Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association before January 1, 1975.
- c) After classes are established on January 1, 1975, a member school having a total enrollment of more than 199 and less than 325 in grades 9-12 inclusive, must give two years notice to the Board of Directors to change its classification. Such choice must be made not later than September 1st of any year and shall become effective with the opening of the fall term two years later. Schools that elect to become Class A schools must remain in that classification for a minimum of three years before they may again apply for reclassification. Provided further, when the total high school enrollment in grades 9-12 drops below 325 and/or the enrollment in an all-male school in grades 9-12 drops below 160, that school shall have one year of grace in which to choose its class of competition. Should an A school drop below 200 for two consecutive years, this school must be reclassified as a B school. Should a school rise above 324 in enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive, and continue above that figure for two consecutive years, this school must be classified as an A school.
- d) Should a new high school be established in an existing district or area whose enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive exceeds 324, the two year waiting period stated in paragraph (c) above shall be waived and the school shall be immediately classified as an A school.
- e) This amendment shall become effective on the date of passage.

The motion was seconded by Peterson of Mott and passed on a roll call vote of 94 to 79.

Supt. Gjovik of McHenry moved that Article II of the by-laws be amended to read as follows:

Article II — Classification of Schools

Section I — Class AA Schools

- a) This group shall consist of all member high schools with a total enrollment of 376 or over, and/or an enrollment of 185 or more pupils in an all-male school in grades 9-12 inclusive as of October 1, 1974, plus any member high school that elects to choose Class AA as provided in paragraph (b), (c), and (d) herewith.
- b) Any high school with a total enrollment between 250 and 375 in grades 9-12 inclusive on October 1, 1974, may elect to join the Class AA for interscholastic competition by written notice to the Board of Directors

of the NDHSAA before January 1, 1975.

- c) After classes are established on January 1, 1975, a member school having a total enrollment of more than 250 and less than 376 in grades 9-12 inclusive, must give two years notice to the Board of Directors to change its classification. Such choice must be made not later than September 1st of any year and shall become effective with the opening of the fall term two years later. Schools that elect to become Class AA schools must remain in that classification for a minimum of three years before they may again apply for reclassification. Provided further, when the total high school enrollment in grades 9-12 drops below 376, and/or the enrollment in an all-male school in grades 9-12 drops below 185, that school shall have one year of grace in which to choose its class competition. Should an AA school drop below 250 in enrollment in grades 9-12 and continue below 250 for two consecutive years, this school must be reclassified as an A school. Should a school rise above 375 in enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive, and continue above that figure for two consecutive years, this school must be classified as an AA school.
- d) Should a new high school be established in an existing district or area, whose enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive, exceeds 375, the two year waiting period stated in paragraph (c) above shall be waived and the school shall be immediately classified as an AA school.

Section II Class A Schools

- a) This group shall consist of all member high schools with a total enrollment between 101 and 375 inclusive as of October 1, 1974, plus any member high school that elects to choose Class A as provided in paragraph (b), (c).
- b) Any high school with a total enrollment between 75 and 100 in grades 9-12 inclusive on October 1, 1974, may elect to join the Class A for interscholastic competition by written notice to the Board of Directors of the NDHSAA before January 1, 1975.
- c) After classes are established on January 1, 1975, a member school having a total enrollment of more than 74 and less than 101 in grades 9-12 inclusive, must give two years notice to the Board of Directors to change its classification. Such choice must be made not later than September 1st of any year and shall become effective with the opening of the fall term two years later. Schools that elect to become Class A schools must remain in that classification for a minimum of three years before they may again apply for reclassification. Provided further, when the total high school enrollment in grades 9-12 drops below 101 and/or the enrollment in an all male school drops below 50, that school shall have one year of grace in which to choose its class of competition. Should an A school drop below 75 in enrollment in grades 9-12 and continue below 75 for two consecutive years, this school must be reclassified as a B school. Should a school rise above 375 in enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive, and continue above that figure for two consecutive years, this school must be classified as a AA school.

- d) Should a new high school be established in an existing district whose enrollment in grades 9-12 inclusive exceeds 100, the two year waiting period stated in paragraph (c) above shall be waived and the school immediately classified as a A school.

Section III -- Class B Schools

All member high schools, other than those designated Class AA or A, shall be classified Class B schools.

Section IV

Class AA, A, and B schools shall compete in separate classes to determine state basketball championships. The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is authorized to combine classes in other athletic or non-athletic contests and festivals if it appears expedient and desirable.

The motion was seconded by Olson of Oriska but failed on a vote of 7 to 166 on a standing vote.

The report of the nominating committee was presented by Supt. Wm. Galloway of Park River, submitting the following names for vacancies on the Board of Directors for three year terms:

Class A representative -- John Sunderland of Cavalier
Class B representative -- D. Allen Halley of Cando
Director-at-large -- Donald Kolbo of Mohall

The following nominations were made from the floor:

Calvin Sailer of South Heart nominated Charles Wilz of Richardton as a Class B representative.

Kenneth Fry of Velva nominated Ray Pelton of Velva as a Class B representative.

Leary Getz of Trenton nominated Donald Strang of Ray as a Class B representative.

Willard Solberg of Beulah nominated O. D. Herbel of Rolla as the director-at-large.

Jerome Knopik of Golvla nominated Walt Hoff of Belfield as the director-at-large.

Ray Crommett of Warwick nominated Curtis Herman of Tolna as the director-at-large.

Supt. Kay of Dodge addressed the group relative to rule changes necessary in basketball because of advantages to tall players. No action was taken.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Ray Albrecht called the regular meeting of the NDOA Board to order at the NDHSAA office in Valley City at 11:00 A.M. with all members present.

Discussion opened concerning the shortage of football officials. Many suggestions were made concerning recruiting that must be done to get more people into football officiating. Local associations and member officials could do the most good.

Motion by Jack Brown that starting in 1975-1976 the classification system be changed to the extent that wherever closed book test was referred to it would be changed to open book test. Second by Taylor and carried.

Motion by Brown to emphasize "fast whistle" at football clinics to try to deter injuries from late hits. Second by Taylor and carried.

The location of the "Hall of Fame" plaques was discussed. It was agreed that board members were not satisfied with the present location and would be on the lookout for a more suitable location.

The Board reviewed the recommended officiating fees but made no recommendation for change.

The Board reviewed the lack of new nominations to the "Hall of Fame".

The March meeting of the Board was set for the Class A tourney in Fargo on March 15, 1975, at 3:00 P.M. at the Holiday Inn.

Motion by Brown that officials be given the Handbook and Officials Manual only every other year to cut down on publication expense. Second by Cameron and carried.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

NORTH DAKOTA OFFICIALS ASSOCIATION

Board of Directors Meeting

Fargo Holiday Inn, 3:00 P.M. -- March 15, 1975

Neil Amtzen called the meeting to order with all NDOA Board members present, also in attendance were Gerald Muckenhirn and Norm Batterberry of the NDHSAA Board of Directors.

The first item of business was a discussion involving a new system of obtaining reciprocity with Minnesota and South Dakota. These two states indicated they would like to approve a system whereby an official in North Dakota who desired to have reciprocity with either Minnesota or South Dakota would contact that state directly and upon payment of a \$5.00 fee would be granted reciprocity provided he was an official in his own state. Motion by Brown that the NDOA approve a new reciprocity agreement with Minnesota and South Dakota as outlined, second by Albrecht and carried.

The Board next discussed the problem of some officials missing either a clinic or test because of a legitimate emergency situation. The Board agreed that the Executive Secretary of the NDHSAA should retain the power to excuse mandatory attendance or the taking of the test if an emergency situation existed.

The Board next discussed the possibility of having mechanics demonstrations at the rule clinics. It was agreed that each local association should set a date for such a demonstration and that areas where no locals were organized a person would be designated by the NDHSAA to organize and have such a meeting for officials in that area.

The difference in high school girls' basketball rules and college girls' basketball rules were discussed. The Board asked that the NDHSAA stress this difference at girls' basketball rules clinics next fall.

Arntzen pointed out that there appears to be a shortage of hockey officials in North Dakota and that some Canadian hockey officials had asked him about the possibility of working in North Dakota. Mr. Arntzen was instructed to inform these people that they may work in North Dakota by registering with the NDOA and paying the fees, etc.

Mr. Arntzen reported that he had also checked into the question whether junior college athletes could officiate and receive payment. He stated that these young people could officiate and receive normal officiating fees without jeopardizing their eligibility.

Motion by Taylor that the mileage fee paid to officials be raised from 12¢ per mile to 15¢ per mile effective with contracts for the 1975-1976 school year. Second by King and carried.

Mr. Arntzen asked each Board member to get nominations in for the Hall of Fame. Motion by Brown that if Bismarck does not put the plaques in the lobby of the Civic Center that contact be made with Bill Osmon of Valley City State College in regard to moving the display to that facility. Second by Taylor and carried.

Motion by Albrecht that fees paid by the NDHSAA for regional tourney be increased to \$35.00 per game and to \$40.00 per game at the state level. Second by Brown and carried.

The Board next discussed the annual question of how tournament officials for basketball should be selected and how they should be assigned for various games. Motion by Brown to recommend that the NDHSAA go back to the old system of the Board selecting officials and the tourney manager assigning them to the various games prior to the beginning of the tourney. Second by Albrecht and carried.

The Board next discussed the problem of crowd control and officials' protection at basketball games. It was suggested that the Bulletin carry an article prior to next season in which each school would be advised to take precautionary steps to prevent any incidents involving fans getting in dressing rooms, etc. It was also suggested that the district chairmen should bring this up as a topic of discussion at every district meeting next school year.

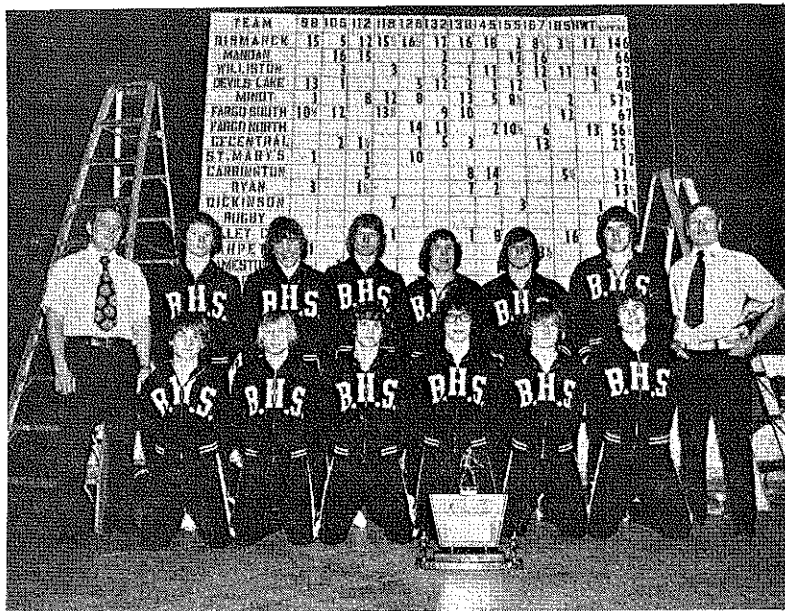

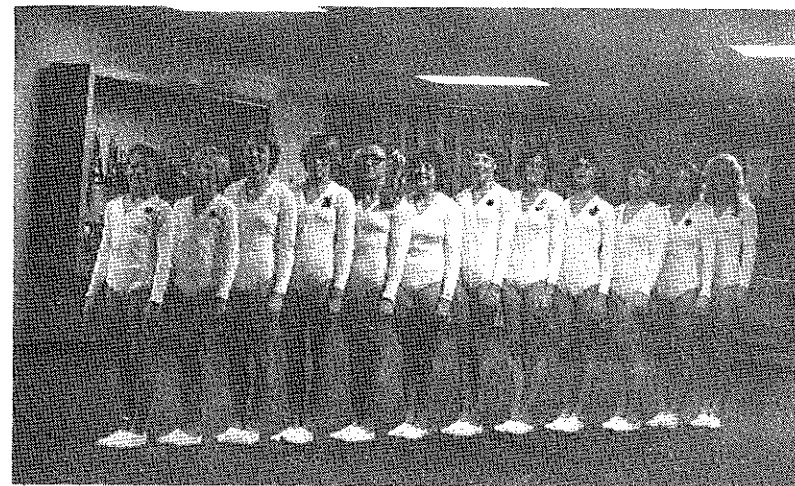

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, JUNE 30, 1975

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Fund Accounting: The association has adopted governmental fund accounting principles. A fund is used as an independent accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts recording cash and/or other resources together with related reserves and balances which are segregated for the purpose of carrying on specific activities, attaining budget objectives or complying with certain limitations.

Accounting Methods: In general, the cash basis method of accounting was originally adopted and is still in use. The following notes disclose how the accounting policies and methods are applied in specific areas.

NOTE 1: The association has invested its reserves and surplus funds for maximum yield and safety. On June 30, 1975 44.4% of the investments were in U.S. Treasury & federal agency obligations, 28.2% in a local savings & loan association, and the balance of 27.4% was divided among three local banks.

NOTE 2: On June 30, 1975, the association had \$93,870. invested in real estate and improvements, \$38,406. in office fixtures and equipment, \$1,886. in films and publications, and \$10,251 in two staff cars. Depreciation has been provided using the straight-line method with appropriate lives varying from 28 to 4 years. (See also note 7).

NOTE 3: Unclaimed checks issued, outstanding in excess of one year, were restored to the bank accounts to be carried as a liability as long as necessary.

NOTE 4: Encumbrances represent a provision for unpaid bills, estimates of the cost of goods and services on order, insurance claims in process, and an estimate of claims expected on preliminary injury reports.

NOTE 5: The association intends to return to the members the unappropriated balances in each fund. This is done by reducing future revenue charges, and/or by increasing the insurance benefits, contestants' expense allowances, and additional service. (See note 6 below for the effect of the board action taken on review of closing balances.)

NOTE 6: Within sixty days, the board reviews the audit report for the preceding year to determine how to allocate any excess funds. On August 15, 1974, the board made the following allocations from the June 30, 1974 balances --
