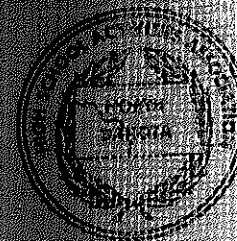

FOREWORD

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association is pleased to present the 53rd Annual Handbook which contains a historical and statistical account of the year's operation.

Attention is called to events and happenings which were new this past year and to certain trends and developments that have taken place.

1. We are still experiencing a slow decline in the total number of high schools in North Dakota with the number dropping from 267 to 265 this past year, 118 less than the peak enrollment of 383 schools in the mid-fifties. The trend is likely to continue as we still have 49 high schools with an enrollment under 50.

2. The number of Class A schools remained at 29 this past year. However, Park River and Fort Yates will be dropping back to Class B in 1978-79 and Cavalier in 1979-80. It is quite possible, with declining enrollments, that others will do likewise in the near future, which might necessitate a revision in the classification system currently in use.

3. The 1976-77 year even surpassed the 1975-76 year which previously had been the best year financially in the history of the Association. This was largely attributable to increased revenues from the boys' basketball program.

4. Ten sports for boys and six for girls were sponsored by the Association this past year. Five of the sixteen were revenue producing - boys' basketball, girls' basketball, hockey, wrestling and football. The other eleven were subsidized from revenues received from these five. Track was the most highly subsidized, with the boys' and girls' program costing the Association approximately \$40,000.

5. Net receipts from the boys' regional basketball program exceeded those of a year ago by approximately \$19,000. However, because of escalating costs, net receipts from the state tournaments were approximately \$1,000 less. Net receipts from wrestling also showed an increase of about \$2,500, but those from girls' basketball, hockey and football were down \$1,500, \$5,700 and \$2,200 respectively. Over all, net receipts from the five revenue producing sports exceeded those of a year ago by approximately \$11,000.

Because of escalating costs, subsidization of the non-revenue producing sports exceeded last year's figure by \$5,000, resulting in a net gain of about \$6,000.

6. Although revenues have increased considerably over the past few years, so have operational expenses. Costs of supplies, increased subsidization of non-revenue activities, additional programs, and increased office personnel because of expanded programs have all contributed to these expanding costs. However, your Association is in excellent financial condition as indicated by the Auditor's report, which is printed elsewhere in this Handbook.

7. The 8,807 ABF claims paid in 1976-77 was approximately the same number as in 1975-76 when 8,829 claims were paid, and the amount paid out for claims also was approximately the same, exceeding last year's amount by a little over \$1,000. The total paid out for claims plus administrative costs exceeded premium collections by approximately \$18,000. Included in this figure is a payment of \$5,400 from the catastrophic fund. However, because of interest earned on ABF investments, the program was able to just about break even.

8. Student participation in school athletic programs sponsored by the NDHSAA this past year showed an increase of 122 students and those in music and speech activities an increase of 686 and 251 respectively. Specifically increases were noted in chorus, debate, and drama, whereas band, orchestra, speech and student congress experienced a slight decline.

9. Member schools and the Association have made considerable progress towards compliance with the Federal regulations outlined under Title IX. However, further action is necessary and probably the most urgent is the addition of a winter sport for girls in most schools. Anticipating that volleyball will be the sport to be added, the Board of Directors adopted a rules book and established a season for the sport for the 1977-78 school year.

10. The use of advisory committees was expanded with the addition of golf and tennis committees. Through the use of such committees, a closer working relationship is established with coaches in the field.

11. Member schools evidently were not happy with the Constitutional amendment approved a year ago relative to voting on by-law amendments by mail ballot as they voted to revert back to the previous method of voting on same at meetings of the general assembly. Seven by-law amendments pertaining to junior and senior high school athletics were approved by the membership this past year.

12. Numerous law suits have been initiated against schools and State Associations in several states in recent years. Likewise, state legislatures in many cases have passed laws restricting their jurisdiction. North Dakota has been relatively free of same, having had no court cases or adverse legislation this past year. This might indicate that the citizens of our state feel that the Association is handling problems and adjusting to changing conditions in a fairly satisfactory manner.

13. Due to retirement from the field of education, three Board members submitted their resignations this past fiscal year. In addition, two members whose terms had expired were not eligible for re-election. As a result 5 of the 10 members of the 1977-78 Board of Directors will be new to their position and only two will have had more than two years experience on the Board.

In general, this has been another successful year. Again, we are mindful of the valued help and assistance given by many school people and others interested in the Association program. The Board of Directors and office personnel express their appreciation for the whole-hearted cooperation of each of you in making this another banner year.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Valley City, North Dakota - August 12, 13, 1976

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at Valley City at 9:00 A.M. on August 12, 1976 with all members present. President Muckenhirn welcomed the two new members, Clair Bergene and Donovan Benzie, to the Board.

The first order of business was the correction of two items in the minutes of the June meeting as previously published. Upon motion by Halley and second by Sunderland, the recommendation stipulating that golf coaches walk a few holes with each foursome in early season girls' golf meets to better acquaint contestants with rules of golf, which had been inadvertently omitted in the June minutes was included in the golf regulations. Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Fischer, the date for the 1977 boys' district track meets was corrected to read May 18 instead of May 19. The minutes were then approved as corrected following motion by Sunderland and second by Fischer for same.

The Board next reviewed the annual audit of the Association for the 1975-76 fiscal year as prepared and presented by R. B. Ludvigson, CPA, of Valley City. Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Fischer the report was approved.

The executive-secretary next made a complete report of all investments by the Association and amount of interest received therefrom the past years.

The Board next examined the financial report of the Association from July 1, 1976 to August 6, 1976 and approved same following motion by Batterberry and second by Bard.

Next reviewed were various bids submitted by Valley City car dealers to supply two 1977 cars to the Association. Peterson moved that the bid of McCurley's Chevrolet-Buick for two 1977 Buick LeSabres be accepted, seconded by Batterberry and carried. Fischer moved that the two present Association cars be advertised for sale on bids as in the past with the stipulation that the Association retains the right to reject any and all bids. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

A group of people from the Mapleton school district and Supt. Tjaden of Casselton appeared before the Board concerning an eligibility question. Mrs. Frank Kosowski of Mapleton acted as spokesman for a group of families who were considering sending their children to Casselton, and asked that they be granted immediate eligibility even though there was no change in parental residence. After presentation of facts and questioning by Board members, Sunderland moved that a letter be sent to Mrs. Kosowski outlining the by-law regulation concerning such transfers and explaining that the Board had no power to waive the by-law regulations, so consequently the students involved would be ineligible for 18 school weeks at Casselton unless their parents moved into the Casselton district or their land was annexed thereto. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Fargo school superintendent Vern Bennett appeared before the Board and asked that they reconsider their decision to hold both state basketball tourneys

in Bismarck in 1978, as he felt that both tourneys should not be held in the same city the same year. He stated that he would like to appear at a later meeting of the Board to pursue the matter further. No action was taken at this time.

Next considered was the eligibility status of Rick Armstrong of Arthur under the hardship rule. Muckenhirn reported that he and Mr. Bergene had investigated the case and that they felt that it qualified under the hardship rule. Bergene moved that the boy be declared immediately eligible, seconded by Halley and carried.

Halley presented a report on his investigation of records at the North Dakota School for the Deaf involving students Randall Waas and Robert Balzer and discrepancies shown on the annual eligibility reports submitted to the NDHSAA. Mr. Halley stated that as a result of said investigation he was confident that both boys had not participated more than 6 semesters in interscholastic sports as high school students and so moved that they be able to participate during the 1976-77 school year. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

Sunderland next reported in behalf of the finance committee and moved that the following action be taken:

1. \$25,000 be transferred from the general fund into the ABF catastrophic fund.
2. Expense allowances for teams at regional basketball tournaments be increased from \$80 to \$100 per game per day.
3. All athletic entry fees be eliminated for the 1976-77 school year.

The motion was seconded by Kolbo and carried.

The executive-secretary reported that 205 coaches had registered and attended the first annual coaches clinic, and that the clinic had an overall deficit of \$359.41 which based on previous action of the Board should be paid by the NDHSAA. Bard moved that the Coaches Association be paid said amount, seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The following proposed budget was then adopted upon motion by Bard and second by Batterberry:

Halley reported in behalf of the half-time entertainment committee and moved the adoption of the following guidelines for state basketball tournaments: The local half-time entertainment committee shall observe the following guidelines in selecting entertainment for their respective tournaments:

1. Selection of groups shall be on the basis of variety and audience appeal.
2. Each half-time shall have one (7-minute) performance or two (3½-minute) performances.
3. Recommend the committee select a minimum of 9 7-minute half-time performances, 18 3½-minute performances or a combination thereof for each respective basketball tournament from their own class.
4. An application guide shall be prepared by the committee which will serve as a criterion for selecting applicants.
5. Selection will be made from all applicants by the tournament half-time committee.
6. Consideration of equal groups shall go to the group which has not recently performed at a state tourney.

Supt. Perry Bakke of Thompson appeared before the Board concerning consumption of alcoholic beverages by some members of the Thompson baseball team following the conclusion of the 3rd and 4th place game at the state baseball tournament in Harvey on May 31. After considerable testimony and discussion concerning the incident, Peterson moved that the Thompson school be placed on probation for a one year period, seconded by Benzie and carried. Sunderland moved that a letter be sent to the Thompson school board requesting that they demand the return of the individual participation medals of those individuals involved. Seconded by Peterson and carried.

The Board next considered a request from the Fargo schools to allow two girls to compete in a National Junior Olympics swim meet during the school season as the two girls had qualified by winning regional titles during the summer months. Upon motion by Halley and second by Sunderland, the request was approved.

Next presented were letters from Dick Karlgaard and L. E. Faris requesting the Board to reconsider their action taken at the June meeting limiting Class A Wrestling entries to two from each region. After considerable discussion, Peterson moved that the plan as previously approved be retained. Seconded by Sunderland and carried. Fischer moved that the first round of the State A meet be held on Friday night with the remainder of the tourney on Saturday. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

The executive-secretary reported that with the increased number of Class B cross country teams, regional elimination tournaments would probably be necessary in the near future. The staff was instructed to report following the 1976 meet with recommendations relative to same.

Next under discussion was the advisability of conducting workshops for speech and debate teachers. It was agreed that four regional evening meetings should be held in the four geographic areas of the state and that the regular meetings with contest managers be held in conjunction therewith.

The Board then recessed and reconvened at 8:30 A.M. on August 13th.

The boy's father and Supt. Resell of Cooperstown were present and outlined additional facts in connection with the transfer. Following further discussion, it appeared that this case also did not qualify under the hardship rule, and upon motion by Sunderland and second by Bergene the boy was ruled ineligible for one semester.

Supt. Bennett and Athletic Director Pedersen of Fargo appeared before the Board concerning sites for the 1978 state boys' basketball tournaments and presented arguments in favor of holding the two events in different cities. They also suggested that input be received from A schools, like is done with the B schools at the district chairmen's meeting. Kolbo moved that a meeting of the four Class A regional chairmen be held in connection with the State A tourney in much the same manner as is done with the B district chairmen. Seconded by Fischer and carried.

The following applications for non-teaching coaches were approved under the usual restrictions:

Tim and Tom Marmon as assistant football coaches, Ted Reiter as assistant girls' basketball coach, and Les Williams as head wrestling coach at Beach.

Robert Westbee as assistant hockey coach at Bismarck Century and Richard Radspinner as girls' gymnastic coach at Wachter Junior High of Bismarck.

Larry Ziegler as assistant football coach at Drake.

Dave Kingsrud as girls' golf coach at Fargo North and Marilyn Barge as girls' golf coach at Fargo South. As this was the second consecutive year for such approval for Marilyn Barge, this would not be subject to re-newal another year.

A request for approval for a non-teaching individual as 7th and 8th grade girls' basketball coach at Plaza was tabled, pending further information concerning same. The secretary was authorized to approve same upon receipt of said information.

Supt. Henderson of Halliday appeared before the Board requesting that 7th and 8th grade students from Twin Buttes elementary school be permitted to participate on the Halliday 7th and 8th grade football team. It was pointed out that this would be in violation of Section V of Article III of the Junior High by-laws, and so the request was denied.

The secretary reported that several of the automobile bids received at the August meeting, including the bid for Buick LeSabres, were not according to specifications. Consequently after consultation with the executive officers of the Association, all bids had been rejected and new bids called for. Peterson moved that the motion in the August meeting awarding the bid to McCurley Chevrolet-Buick for two LeSabre Buicks be rescinded. Seconded by Halley and carried. After reviewing the new bids received, Kolbo moved that the bid of Christianson Motors of Valley City for two Delta Royale Oldsmobiles be accepted. Seconded by Bard and carried.

Next considered was the eligibility status of Wayne Rhode, a sophomore at Bismarck Century. The boy's parents reside in Bismarck High School attendance area, but the boy had been given permission by the Bismarck School administration to attend Century. Upon motion by Halley and second by Batterberry, the boy was ruled ineligible at Century for one semester.

Attention was called to discrepancies in starting dates for various fall sports in the junior high by-laws. The matter was referred to the by-law revision committee for study.

The secretary reported that the Board at their June meeting had approved changes in the junior high wrestling weight classes upon recommendation of the wrestling advisory committee, and pointed out that such action would not be legal as the weight classes were spelled out in the junior high by-laws, thus necessitating an amendment to said by-laws. Batterberry moved that the action in June be rescinded and the by-laws committee be instructed to take the necessary steps to accomplish the change. Seconded by Fischer and carried.

The Board next spent some time on the wording of the by-law amendments to be submitted to the membership at the October meeting.

The secretary reported that because of a conflict in dates, Marv Helling of the Minnesota High School League would not be able to be present at the annual meeting and that Brice Durbin of the National Federation had been secured as guest speaker.

The Board was advised that Woodworth High School had used a 6th grade student on their "B" team in a girls' basketball game vs. Cleveland. A letter to the Woodworth coach advising him that the game would have to be forfeited because of this violation of regulations was read. Peterson moved that a letter of reprimand be sent to the administrator of the school, seconded by Batterberry, and carried.

A letter from Fort Yates High School requesting Class B classification beginning with the 1978-79 school year was next presented. Upon motion by Peterson and second by Sunderland, the request was approved.

The Board then adjourned after scheduling their next meeting at Bismarck at 1:00 P.M. on October 20th.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Bismarck, North Dakota — October 20-21, 1976

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 1:00 P.M. October 20, 1976 at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck with all members present.

First reviewed by the Board was a financial report of all business transacted from July 1 to October 8, 1976. Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Fischer, the report was approved as submitted.

The following requests for approval of non-certified coaches were acted upon and approved:

Jack Saddler — assistant gymnastics coach at Valley City

Diane Gerig — junior high girls' basketball coach at Casselton

Susan Hitt — gymnastics coach and assistant girls' basketball coach at Minot Junior High

Beverly Kluck — assistant junior high swimming and gymnastics coach at Minot

Herbert Hofer — boys' basketball coach at Mapleton

Timothy Delmore — assistant basketball and assistant track coach at Grand Forks Red River

Denise Thompson — assistant girls' track coach at Grand Forks Red River

Becky Omdahl — assistant speech director at Grand Forks Central

James Nissen, Brian Qvammen and Frank Hutton — assistant junior high wrestling coaches at Grand Forks

Mark Johnson — assistant hockey coach at Bismarck Century

Clifford Salzwedel — 7th and 8th grade basketball coach at Sheldon

The Board discussed the merits of devising a form for schools to complete in seeking approval of non-certified coaches. The staff was instructed to draft a proposed form for consideration at the next meeting.

The secretary next presented a report on attendance at the 1976 cheerleader clinics. He was instructed to call for bids for similar clinics in 1977 and to alternate companies if the bids were close.

The Board next opened bids received for the sale of the 1976 association-owned vehicles. Upon motion by Peterson and second by Bard, the high bid of D. Allen Halley in the amount of \$5,137 for the brown Buick and the high bid of Al Larson of \$4,750 for the blue Buick were accepted.

The secretary next read a letter received from Dick Karlgaard, athletic director of the Bismarck schools, in which he acknowledged that Bismarck High School had used two ineligible contestants on their cross country team the first two meets of the season. Discussion followed. Fischer then moved that the two boys be declared ineligible for a period of 18 school weeks from the date of their last participation and that a letter of reprimand be sent to the athletic director and school superintendent pointing out their responsibility in checking scholastic eligibility of contestants since this same violation had occurred two years in a row. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

The secretary next reported on a hearing conducted at Fort Totten by himself and the assistant secretary concerning the misconduct of two Fort Totten girl basketball players in a game at Tolna, which involved the use of profane and abusive language toward the officials of the contest. Fort Totten had been instructed as to certain corrective and preventative steps to be taken in connection therewith, and subsequent reports since then have been favorable. Sunderland moved that a letter be sent to Fort Totten advising them that the Board had reviewed the matter and supported the action of the staff, along with the stipulation that events henceforth be properly supervised and a warning that further incidents of this type would be dealt with more severely. Seconded by Bard and carried.

Next reviewed was a report concerning a girl from Surrey who had participated in two invitational basketball tournaments. Peterson moved that the customary penalty of forfeiture of games in second tourney in which said contestant participated, deduction of 8 quarters from normal seasonal total allowed said individual, and said individual be required to sit out next two

contests. Seconded by Halley and carried.

Discussion followed on the interpretation of Section IV of Article III of the Junior High By-Laws as to whether the provision stating that once a competitor was elevated to a high school team he or she was no longer eligible for junior high participation in that sport applied to only that year or to the next year as well. Sunderland moved that it be applicable only to the current year and not be carried over to the next year. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Supt. Drummond of Glenfield-Sutton appeared before the Board concerning their use of 6th grade girls on a high school girls' basketball team in violation of regulations, pleading ignorance of the rule. Sunderland moved that all games won in which the 6th graders participated be forfeited and that a letter of reprimand be sent to the Glenfield School. Seconded by Bergene and carried.

A letter from Supt. Broton of New England suggesting that the Board give consideration to requiring of physical examinations for contestants every two or three years instead of annually, was next presented. Discussion followed, but as the present rule is a by-law of the Association, no action was taken.

Discussion followed as to whether the Association should furnish tennis balls at the regional and state tournaments, or whether contestants should furnish their own as in golf. Batterberry moved that the Association furnish tennis balls at both tourneys and in the future bids be called for supplying same. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

Discussion followed as to policy concerning footballs in the play-off games, but no action was taken.

The Board next conducted a hearing concerning incidents in connection with a girls' basketball game between White Shield and Washburn at Washburn. Representatives from both schools were in attendance and offered testimony concerning the matter, besides answering questions directed to them by the Board concerning the incidents which included scuffling and use of foul language which took place in the hallway and locker room areas following the completion of the A and B games. At the close of the hearing, Halley moved that a letter of reprimand be sent to the White Shield School. The motion died for lack of a second. Fischer then moved that the White Shield School be placed on probation for the remainder of the school year as the hearing had shown that the White Shield girls were in the Washburn locker room using vulgar and abusive language, and that a lack of proper supervision was in evidence - and that a letter of reprimand be sent to the Washburn school, pointing out their responsibility for keeping people out of the locker room, hallways and away from the players and that a plan for pre-game and post-game control be implemented. Seconded by Bard and carried.

Supt. Reiner of Balfour appeared before the Board concerning the non-attendance of their girls' basketball coach at a rules clinic for two consecutive years and explained the reasons therefore. A warning was issued by the Board as to possible consequences if the violation were to be repeated.

Coach Ralph Huebner appeared before the Board concerning his conduct at a girls' basketball game with Medina. Reports received from the officials of the contest were read which indicated improper conduct on the part of Mr. Huebner resulting in two technical fouls being assessed against him. Mr. Huebner gave his version of the incident and responded to questions asked by various

Board members. Halley moved that a letter of reprimand be sent to Mr. Huebner, pointing out his responsibility for setting an example for the students in his charge. Seconded by Fischer and carried.

An inquiry from District 30 as to the definition of basketball jamborees was next reviewed. The district had requested that they be allowed to have all district teams participate in a jamboree and charge admission for same. As the policy concerning jamborees and scrimmages was outlined in the Handbook, no further action was deemed necessary.

A request from the state Thespian director to allow students to take a theater trip to New York during the Christmas vacation was presented. The Board agreed that this proposal would not come under the jurisdiction of the Association, so no action was taken.

The executive secretary presented a report on the recently completed regional tennis tourneys and pointed out that because of number of teams in the eastern region, play could not be completed in one day as planned, necessitating use of a second day for the completion of the meet. Fischer moved that this problem be referred to the tennis advisory committee with instructions for them to make recommendations for correction of the problem another year. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The Board then recessed until 9:00 A.M. at which time they reconvened with all members present except Benzie and Peterson.

Halley reported concerning the work of the "Seasons Committee" and submitted a proposed questionnaire to be submitted to member schools. The results of the questionnaire would be used for information purposes by the Board when setting various sport seasons. Upon motion by Halley and second by Batterberry the report was accepted.

The upcoming National Federation Athletic Directors' meeting in San Diego in December was reviewed. Sunderland moved that the previous policy of sending a Board member and a staff member to the meeting be continued. Seconded by Fischer and carried. Bard moved that Muckenhirn be named as the Board representative, with Batterberry as first alternate, and Halley as second alternate. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

The Board next reviewed the agenda for the annual general assembly meeting and discussed the various proposed amendments to the by-laws.

The secretary was instructed to call a meeting of the Class A regional chairmen in conjunction with the boys' state basketball tournament in Fargo. Fischer and Sunderland were selected as chairmen for the meeting.

The chairman appointed the following to the officials assignment committee for the four state basketball tourneys:

The secretary reported the KXJB-TV might telecast all games of the boys' state Class B basketball tournament on a state-wide basis rather than just 3 games as contracted. The TV committee was authorized to negotiate a new contract if such becomes fact.

The executive secretary reported that the present association liability insurance on tournaments expires on October 21, but that a month's extension had been granted. The present carrier does not wish to renew the contract and at this point our agent had been unsuccessful in obtaining such coverage for the future. It appeared that coverage for invitational tourneys would not be included in any new contract, and possibly hockey tournaments would have to be excluded.

Mr. Batterberry reported on a hardship eligibility investigation conducted by himself and Mr. Kolbo concerning the status of Jim Crows Heart and Darrel Jacobs of Halliday, and moved that both boys be declared eligible under the hardship transfer rule. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

Batterberry also reported on a similar investigation conducted by himself and Mr. Bard concerning Terry Veo of Fort Yates and moved the boy be declared immediately eligible under the hardship transfer rule upon receipt of the necessary "no undue influence" reports. Seconded by Bard and carried.

Next under discussion was the regulation adopted in June which would qualify only two wrestlers in each weight class from each region for the State Class A wrestling tournament, because of complaints received relative to same. Fischer moved that the action taken in June be rescinded and that three qualifiers be allowed from each region in each weight class this year, and that the advisory committee be instructed to devise a plan which would advance 8 wrestlers in each weight class to the State A tourney in 1978. Seconded by Bard and carried.

Discussion followed concerning Board Member jackets, since two new members had come on the Board in July and four more would be replaced at the end of the current fiscal year. Bard moved that purchase of jackets be deferred until the June meeting and at that time new jackets be selected for all Board members. Seconded by Halley and carried.

The Board then set the time for their next meeting for 1:00 P.M. on November 19th at Minot.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting North Dakota High School Activities Association Minot, North Dakota — November 19, 1976

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in the Veterans Room of the Minot Civic Auditorium at 1:15 P.M. on November 19th, with all members present except Norman Batterberry.

The following requests for non-certified coaches were acted upon and approved:

Gary Horton as boys' swimming coach at Bismarck High
Andy Schneider as head wrestling coach at Max
Tim Lindgren as 7th and 8th grade boys' basketball coach at Park River
Michael Maxwell as 7th and 8th grade boys' basketball coach at Tolna
Richard Pieterick as assistant boys' basketball coach at Wolford

Upon motion by Peterson and second by Bard a form drafted by the office staff for application for approval of non-certified coaches was approved for use for future applications.

Discussion followed concerning timing of news releases relative to sanctions or penalties assessed schools or individuals following hearings relative to violation of standards or regulations. Peterson moved that news media releases concerning same not become public information until such time as released by the executive secretary. Seconded by Halley and carried. The timing of news releases concerning other actions taken at Board meetings was deferred until the January meeting, pending recommendations of the news media relative to same.

The bill for services rendered by the Zuger and Bucklin law firm of Bismarck was reviewed and approved upon motion by Kolbo and second by Sunderland.

Fischer and Bergene reported on their investigation of the "hardship eligibility case" concerning Kerry Nelson of Fargo South, and the boy was ruled immediately eligible upon motion by Fischer and second by Bergene.

Discussion followed concerning the expense allowance formula for football play-offs because of the distance traveled by some teams. Fischer moved that the formula be followed for this year's games and that the question concerning same for future years be referred to the football play-off committee for study, with the committee also reviewing the entire financial set-up concerning the play-offs. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

Kolbo moved that a \$50.00 check be sent to all football regional representatives who kept point totals during the 1976 season as a token of appreciation. Seconded by Bergene and carried.

John Gengler, Principal of Richardton High School, appeared before the Board, concerning the video-taping of their games at the girls' district basketball tournament in violation of regulations concerning same. The executive-secretary was instructed to send a letter of reprimand to the Richardton school administration.

The Board next reviewed a preliminary report on the results of the Sports Seasons questionnaire. Action on same was tabled until the January meeting, when complete results would be available.

Next reviewed were the recommendations submitted by the Class A regional chairmen and the Class B district chairmen. Peterson moved that appropriate consideration be given same at such time as all recommendations are acted upon. Seconded by Benzie and carried.

Discussion followed on the bid form to be used for calling for basketball bids for 1977-78. Bard moved that bids be called for at the January meeting listing the same four specific balls as was done this past year and that bids be called for on supplying tennis balls as well. Seconded by Sunderland and passed.

A communique from Supt. Bennett of Fargo listing the results of a survey he had made of Class A schools concerning sites for state basketball tournaments was presented, along with a request that he be permitted to speak on same at the January Board meeting. The request was approved.

An inquiry from Rugby concerning their curriculum offerings and the NDHSAA scholastic eligibility rule was presented to the Board. The executive-secretary was instructed to inform the Rugby Principal that students would still have to successfully carry three academic courses of ½ unit value per semester or equivalent in order to be eligible.

In response to a question raised by the Northwood High School Principal, the Board ruled that special education students would have to receive passing grades in the work assigned by the school in the required number of courses as outlined in the by-laws in order to qualify for eligibility under the scholastic rule.

Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Kolbo, the Casselton High School was granted an extension of time beyond the one year limit for final submission of an ABF claim for an injury sustained by Shari Barnes, because of complications developing necessitating surgery.

The Board then set the time for the January meeting for 2:00 P.M. on January 29th at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck, with committee meetings to be scheduled in the forenoon.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Bismarck — January 29-30, 1977

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at 2:00 P.M. at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck on January 29, 1977 with all members present.

President Muckenhirn welcomed new board member, Howard Snortland, who had succeeded M. F. Peterson as State Supt. of Public Instruction.

Each member was presented with a packet containing the agenda, a complete report of the year's business to January 17, 1977, a list of checks drawn on the general fund since October 13, 1976, and the ABF report from July 1, 1976 to January 17, 1977. The Board reviewed the various reports and approved same upon motion by Bard and second by Kolbo.

Ken Rio of Grand Forks met with the Board concerning price of programs for the state hockey tournament. He expressed the feeling that more definite guidelines should be established by the Board concerning contents, charges, etc. After some discussion, Sunderland moved that no action be taken, seconded by Bard and carried.

Next under discussion was the question of requiring face masks for hockey competitors. Kolbo moved that beginning with the 1977-78 season, hockey players be required to wear an approved face mask and an intro-oral mouthpiece attached to the chinstrap. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The canvassing committee consisting of members Sunderland, Fischer and Benzie reported that they had canvassed the annual election results and found that a total of 253 ballots had been cast, with the following results for representatives on the Board of Directors:

Class B representative from Southeast area:

Duane Silseth 127 votes
Elbert Van Ornum 87 votes

Class B representative from Southwest area:

Walt Hoff 187 votes
Cal Sailer 1 vote
Jerome Enget 1 vote

Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Fischer, candidates Silseth and Hoff were declared duly elected members of the Board, effective July 1, 1977.

The canvassing committee also reported that the vote on the constitutional amendment to Article XI of the constitution providing for voting on by-law amendments at a meeting of the general assembly was as follows:

Yes — 218 No — 30

and that the vote on the various by-law amendments was as follows:

Section X of Article XIII — To permit interscholastic teams composed of both sexes in all sports sponsored by the Association.

Yes — 111 No — 135

Section IIg of Article V — Providing for "A school may be suspended for participating directly or indirectly in the management, supervision, player selection, coaching or promotion of bowl or all-star

type athletic contests, or permitting any of its employees to participate in any way directly or indirectly, when the players during the current or previous school year were members of a high school team."

Yes — 163 No — 83

Section IIg of Article XII — Amending the number of permissible mid-week basketball games from 5 to 7.

Yes — 163 No — 81

Section III of Article XIII — Providing for loss of eligibility for one year for those students who participate in an "all-star" before they have graduated from high school.

Yes — 172 No — 74

Section X of Article XIII — Allowing students to transfer from a junior high school at the end of the 9th grade to either the public or parochial high school in that city without loss of eligibility.

Yes — 161 No — 85

Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Fischer the amendments to Article XI of the constitution and the amendments to Section IIg of Article V, Section II of Article XII, Section IIg of Article XII, Section III of Article XIII and Section X of Article XIII were declared approved to become effective July 1, 1977 and that the amendment to Section X of Article III declared lost.

Also declared approved upon motion by Sunderland and second by Fischer was the amendment to Section V of Article III of the Junior High by-laws providing for the combining of students from two schools in certain cases to form an interscholastic football team upon receiving 166 affirmative votes and 75 negative votes as well as the amendment to Article VII of the Junior High by-laws deleting Sections II, III, and IV of said article which received 156 affirmative votes and 39 negative votes.

Chairman Muckenhirn next gave a comprehensive report on the Athletic Directors Conference which he and Mr. Schindler attended in San Diego in December.

The following requests for use of non-certified coaches were approved under the usual restrictions upon motion by Benzie and second by Bergene:

Vernell Lindeman — Assistant 9th grade boys' basketball coach at Enderlin
Elroy Christianson — Boys' grade basketball coach at Plaza

Mike Nelson — 7th and 8th grade boys' basketball coach at the Ojibwa school at Belcourt (for this year only as this is the second consecutive year for this request.)

Jim Nelson of the Jamestown Sun appeared before the Board concerning the timing of news releases concerning decisions reached at Board meetings. He reported that he had been in contact with a number of the daily newspapers and regardless of when the releases were made it would be impossible to satisfy all papers. No further action was taken.

Clair Bergene presented a report on the results of the investigation conducted by Mr. Muckenhirn and himself concerning the transfer of Greg Schmidt to the Hope High School under the hardship eligibility rule. Upon

motion by Snortland and second by Bergene, the boy was ruled immediately eligible for interscholastic activities as a representative of the Hope School.

Mr. Kolbo introduced a letter from the Crosby school requesting immediate eligibility for Warren Fahrbach's stepson at Noonan High School. Halley moved that the request be denied as the situation outlined would not qualify for eligibility under the hardship rule. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

Muckenhirn next presented a report on a meeting held by the TV committee with Jim Adelson, whereby he proposed to televise the four first round games of the State Class B basketball tournament state-wide rather than just over the western stations as outlined in the contract, and for which privilege an additional \$1,260 would be paid to the State Association. Upon motion by Kolbo and second by Sunderland, the offer was accepted.

The Board next discussed the policy of not allowing out-of-town bands to perform at state tournaments. A request had been received from Towner High School for a payment of \$50.00 for their band's performance at the girls' state Class B basketball tournament, whose appearance had been O.K.'d by the tournament manager. Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Benzie the request was denied. Bard then moved that the policy of allowing bands from the home city only be continued. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

The executive-secretary alerted the Board to two out-of-state contests. The first of these was the Shenadoah Apple Blossom Festival on April 29-30 in Virginia which involved band competition and so it would be contrary to NDHSAA by-laws for North Dakota schools to take part in same. The second was the Seventeen Magazine Tennis Tournament for girls on May 17-21. As this event was not being held in the girls' season for that sport, there would be no violation of Association rules if students participated as unattached individuals unless prizes being offered would violate their amateur status.

A request from the North Dakota Coaches Association for financial assistance in the conduction of their summer coaches clinic was presented. Motion by Batterberry, second by Halley, to grant such assistance as in the past.

A request from the Litchville Bulletin that press passes be allowed weekly newspapers at regional tourneys was presented. No action was taken.

Bids for conducting 4 cheerleader clinics in the fall of 1977 were received from the National Cheerleaders Association in the amount of \$700, and from the World Cheerleaders Council for \$830. Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Fischer, the bid of the National Cheerleaders Association was accepted.

Bids for supplying basketballs for the 1977-78 tournaments were opened and upon motion by Batterberry and second by Benzie, the low bid of \$18.49 per ball submitted by Our Own Hardware of Valley City for the Wilson B1200 Jet ball was accepted.

The Board next examined bids to supply tennis balls for the 1977 spring and fall state tournaments and upon motion by Bard and second by Bergene, the low bid of \$8.00 per dozen submitted by Austad's of Sioux Falls for the Penn X76YHD ball was accepted.

Next discussed were plans for the meeting of the Class B district chairmen's meeting and the Class A regional chairmen's meeting to be held in March.

Sunderland and Fischer were appointed to chair the Class A meeting and Batterberry the Class B event.

The Board then recessed until 9:00 A.M. Sunday morning, at which time they reconvened with all members present.

Sunderland presented the report of the Finance Committee who had drawn up general guidelines and procedures to be followed in connection with establishing staff salaries, retirement plans, and fringe benefits. These guidelines were as follows:

1. The finance committee shall be the body designated to institute and promote proceedings concerning salaries, benefits and related matters.
2. The specific items to be considered for review include:
 - A. Salaries
 - B. Fringe Benefits
 - (1) Retirement benefits
 - (2) Medical benefits
 - (3) Sick leave
 - (4) Vacation
 - (5) Personal use of NDHSAA-owned automobiles
 - (6) Other related matters
3. The time schedule is to be as follows:
 - A. The initial meeting of minds will be held at the annual meeting of the board of directors during the Administrator Midwinter Conference at which meeting the committee will hear recommendations from the executive secretary regarding staff performance and salary recommendations. The finance committee shall have by this time prepared itself through preliminary research regarding salary trends as well as accepted procedures in fringe benefit developments.
 - B. The second meeting on the matter will be during the board of directors meeting held in connection with the Class A tournament. At that time the finance committee will present to the board of directors as Item No. 1 on the agenda in the first session of the meeting their recommendations in the way of a definite proposal. As Item No. 1 on the agenda of the second session of the board meeting, the board of directors will make their offer to the staff.
 - C. Staff members will have the option of reacting to the offer at that time or reserving acceptance or rejection up to the time of Item No. 1 on the agenda of the regular meeting of the board of directors at the Class B tournament.
 - D. Opportunity shall be provided for individual members of the professional staff to negotiate with the board on all matters in this regard. Clerical staff members will communicate with the executive secretary who will in turn relay such sentiment and/or information to the board of directors.
4. It shall be considered a breach of ethics by staff members or board members to discuss salaries or fringe benefits with members of the opposing sides on an individual basis until negotiations have been completed.

Fischer moved that the policy outlined above be adopted in principle, seconded by Snortland and carried.

The Board next reviewed the various recommendations of the North Dakota Officials Association and upon motion by Fischer and second by Halley the following items were approved and adopted:

1. To raise the registration fees effective for 1977-78 school year to \$8.00 for one sport and \$5.00 for each additional sport except that the second basketball registration be \$2.00.
2. To set recommended maximum game fees to:
 - Class A varsity bb, fb, wr, and ho to \$25.00 per game (Boys' and Girls' BB)
 - Class B varsity bb, fb, wr, and ho to \$22.50 per game (Boys' and Girls' BB)
 - Preliminary basketball fee of \$5.00 for six minute quarters or less and \$7.50 for quarters over six minutes in length.
 - Regional tourney officials fees to \$35.00 per game and state tourney officials fees to \$40.00 per game.
3. Girls' basketball officials and head coaches must attend a girls' basketball rules clinic and that those officials and head coaches that are in boys' basketball only must attend a boys' rules clinic; however, those officials and head coaches that are in both girls' and boys' basketball may fulfill attendance requirements for both by attending the girls' rules clinic in the fall.

4. Allow officials that are registered in both boys' and girls' basketball to officiate in both boys' and girls' tourneys if selected by the regional committees or by coaches vote.
5. That boys' state basketball tourney game assignments be made out in advance for the entire tournament and given to officials prior to the tournament.
6. Beginning in 1977-78 all officials examinations, in which a score is recorded on permanent records, be sent directly to the official for completion and that the answer sheet be returned within a week.
7. NDHSAA to set up fourteen sites for football workshops and twenty sites for basketball workshops for officials in 1977-78. The workshops would be held for the purpose of training and trying to improve the overall caliber of officiating through work on mechanics and general rules knowledge. The local workshop would be directed by a supervisor who would set the time and place for the local meeting. All meetings to be held at night. A list of attendance to be furnished to the NDHSAA. The first local football meeting to be during the period of August 15-31 with the second meeting scheduled between September 6-15. The basketball workshops to be scheduled November 14-23 and December 7-15. The local supervisor would be paid \$25.00 per workshop and could use other officials to assist him as required. The sites for football workshops to be Bismarck, Bottineau, Devils Lake, Dickinson, Fargo, Grafton, Grand Forks, Harvey, Jamestown, Minot, Rugby, Valley City, Wahpeton and Williston. The basketball workshops would include all the football sites plus Bowman, Braddock, Kenmare, Langdon, Lisbon and New Town.

The football advisory committee recommendations were referred to the football committee for study, with a report concerning same to be made at the March meeting of the Board.

Batterberry next presented the report of the Sports Survey Committee. Upon motion by Kolbo and second by Halley the following items were approved:

1. Change girls' tennis to a spring sport and boys' tennis to a fall sport beginning with the 1977-78 school year.
2. Combine Class B boys' and girls' track at the district and state level and enlarge the number of district sites to 8 for 1977-78.
3. Combine Class A boys' and girls' track at the district and state level for 1977-78.
4. The State Class B track meet to be held the last weekend in May and the State Class A track meet the first weekend in June 1978.
5. Recommend to schools that if they play interscholastic volleyball that they use National Federation rules and that the recommended starting date be the Monday following Thanksgiving and extend for 10 weeks.
6. Have two Class B regional cross country meets on October 15, 1977 at which time qualifiers for the state meet would be determined. The State Cross Country meet for both Class A and Class B be held on October 29, 1977. The number of qualifiers from the Class B regions to be studied by the track advisory committee.

The Board next began work on drawing up the calendar of events for 1977-78. It was agreed to start all fall sports on the same date as football conditioning, with date for first allowable games to be the Thursday preceeding Labor Day in all sports except football which would be the Friday prior to Labor Day. Benzie moved that all spring sports be concluded by the last weekend in May — failed for lack of a second. Halley then moved that the State B track meet be held on May 19 and 20 in 1978, seconded by Batterberry and carried. Benzie moved that the State A track meet be scheduled on June 2 and 3, seconded by Kolbo and carried. Kolbo then moved to reconsider the dates just set for the State B track meet, seconded by Bergene and carried. Kolbo moved that the dates for this event be May 26 and 27. Seconded by Bergene and carried.

Gelaine Orvik of Fargo South, representing the track coaches, appeared before the Board requesting a change in dates for the state boys' track meet, because the NCAA had switched their date for the NCAA Division II National Track Meet to be held in Fargo and it now coincided with the state high school meet. He presented the results of a survey of schools he had conducted concerning the matter which indicated that 53% of those replying favored selecting an alternate date. After considerable discussion, Halley moved that the request be denied at this time. Seconded by Snortland and carried.

Supt. Bennett and Harold Pedersen of Fargo appeared before the Board relative to the Board's decision in June setting both boys' state basketball tournaments in Bismarck in 1978, and outlined reasons for not holding these two tournaments in the same city. Dick Karlgaard, George Smith, John Hunkele, and Doc Hill of Bismarck next appeared and outlined their previous stand relative to holding both tournaments in their city. After some discussion, Bard moved to reconsider the action taken in June in regard to the site for the 1978 Class A boys' basketball tourney. Seconded by Halley and carried unanimously. Sunderland then moved that Fargo be selected as the site for the 1978 Class A boys' basketball tournament, seconded by Bergene. Roll call vote was as follows: Halley, Benzie, Sunderland, Bergene, Fischer, Bard, and Muckenhirn all voting yes and Kolbo, Snortland, and Batterberry voting no. Motion carried.

Halley moved to reconsider the action taken in June setting the site for the Class A wrestling tourney at Jamestown. Seconded by Bard and carried.

Batterberry then moved that this event be awarded to Bismarck. Seconded by Kolbo and a roll call vote showed all members voting in the affirmative, except Fischer who passed. Motion carried.

The Board next considered a request from Oberon to transfer from Music district 5 to district 4. Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Fischer the request was approved.

The secretary next outlined a proposed invitational holiday basketball tournament to be sponsored by Reeder which would involve 4 North Dakota teams and 4 South Dakota teams. As the proposal was within regulations of the Association, no action was necessary.

Mr. Schindler reported on an incident involving violation of item 13 of the regulations and penalties for officials. Supt. Peterson of Verona, and the coaches from Fullerton, Marion, Jud, and Verona had all signed a statement that Tom Stadler of Kulm had been drinking prior to appearing to work a contracted game at Verona on January 20th. A letter from Mr. Stadler admitting to the fact, and requesting leniency, was read. Batterberry moved that Mr. Stadler be suspended from officiating for the remainder of the current season, that he be allowed to register for the 1977-78 season but that he be placed on probation for said season. Seconded by Bard and carried.

The executive secretary reported that there had been some misunderstanding at the Music clinics relative to the interpretation of rule 22 on page 21 of the Music Handbook. Halley moved that the executive secretary publish the correct interpretation in the next issue of the Bulletin. Seconded by Benzie and carried.

Next discussed were problems which had arisen because of misinterpretation by some schools of the rules relative to moving of 7th and 8th grade students to high school teams. Batterberry moved that the staff draft some guidelines and statements outlining the intent of the rule to be printed in the Junior High Regulations section of the Constitution and By-Laws Handbook. Seconded by Benzie and carried.

The secretary reported that an unsanctioned junior high wrestling tournament had been held at one of the Minot Junior Highs and that the violation had been reported by Duane Carlson, athletic director of the Minot School System. Halley moved that a letter of reprimand be sent to the Minot school officials. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

The Board reviewed the price structure for regional basketball tournaments and upon motion by Kolbo and second by Snortland the following modification was made:

If 3 games are conducted in a single session in the first round, the price for admission for that session be the same as that set for the semi-final and final sessions.

Next under discussion was whether or not various city delegations should appear before the Board in person in June to make requests for hosting various events. It was agreed that it should be optional on their part whether they make a personal appearance or submit their request by mail.

The secretary next presented a request from Oakes High School for a change of date for the Boys' State Sand Greens Golf Tournament. No action was taken.

A letter from a Bismarck parent protesting conduct and officiating at a basketball game at Dickinson between Dickinson and Bismarck was read. Mr. Benzie also made a report on the matter and outlined steps which had been taken by both schools in connection therewith. No further action was deemed necessary by the Board.

The Board then adjourned after scheduling the next meetings for 1:30 P.M. at Fargo on March 11 and 1:30 P.M. at Bismarck on March 18th.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
February 18, 1977 — Jamestown, North Dakota

The Board of Directors of the NDHSAA held a formal hearing in the Board of Education room at the Jamestown High School at 11:00 A.M. on February 18, 1977 concerning a formal protest lodged by the Tappen School Board against the Pettibone School for alleged failure to enforce Section XII of Article XIII of the by-laws relative to possession or use of alcoholic beverages.

Present at the hearing were Board members Muckenhirn, Fischer, Bard, Batterberry, Bergene, Sunderland, Halley and executive secretary F. U. Smith. Also present were Supt. Larry Klundt and Principal Elroy Hagen of the Tappen school, Supt. Howard Coughlin of the Pettibone school, and deputy sheriff Jim Brun of Kidder County.

Chairman Muckenhirn called on Supt. Klundt to outline the charges being made and the reason therefore. Mr. Klundt stated that one of the Tappen basketball players and Norbert Guthmiller of Pettibone had been issued citations for "minor in possession of alcoholic beverages" on January 23rd by Deputy Sheriff Jim Brun and that the boys had pleaded guilty in court to the charges.

A photostatic copy of the citation issued to Norbert Guthmiller as well as the report of the court action on February 2, 1977 relative to the case indicating the guilty plea along with a sentence of a \$35.00 fine, which was suspended if no further violation occurred within one year was introduced as evidence. Mr. Klundt stated that the Tappen youth had been suspended from extra-curricular activities by the Tappen school administration in accordance with the Association by-laws, but that the Pettibone school had taken no action against Norbert Guthmiller, although they had brought the matter to the attention of the Pettibone Superintendent, and that said Norbert Guthmiller had continuously represented the Pettibone school as a member of their basketball team since that time.

Supt. Coughlin of Pettibone offered the defense that "possession" as defined by North Dakota State law and by the NDHSAA in Section XII of Article XIII were not the same, and although containers of beer were found in the boy's car this would not constitute possession under the Association rule.

Questions were asked by the various Board members of the school representatives and the deputy sheriff concerning the matter.

Deputy Sheriff Jim Brun testified that he had found 2 six-pacs of beer in the car driven by Norbert Guthmiller of Pettibone, in which the student from Tappen was a passenger. He then issued a citation to said Norbert Guthmiller and read the printing on the back of the citation form explaining the rights of an individual to whom such citation is issued.

Following the close of testimony taken and discussion of the case by the Board, Batterberry moved that the protest be upheld, seconded by Bard and carried by a unanimous vote.

Sunderland then moved that the following penalties be assessed against the Pettibone school:

1. Norbert Guthmiller be declared ineligible to represent the Pettibone school in interscholastic competition for a period of six school weeks, commencing on February 18, 1977.
2. All basketball games in which said student participated since February 2, 1977 be forfeited.
3. The Pettibone school be required to forfeit championship rights in basketball by not being permitted to participate in the 1977 boys' district basketball tournament.
4. The Pettibone school be placed on probation for a period of one year, effective as of February 18, 1977.
5. A letter of reprimand be sent to the Pettibone superintendent.
6. A copy of the notification of said actions be sent to the Pettibone superintendent, and to the Pettibone School Board.

The motion was seconded by Fischer and carried unanimously.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Fargo, North Dakota — March 11-12, 1977

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met at the Holiday Inn in Fargo at 1:30 P.M. on March 11, 1977 with all members present except Snortland.

The first order of business was the report of the finance committee presented by Mr. Sunderland recommending the following adjustments relative to staff employees for the 1977-78 fiscal year:

- (1) Salaries of administrative staff be increased approximately 9%, establishing salary of executive-secretary at \$27,800, assistant secretary \$24,200, and assistant to the secretary \$14,000.
- (2) Salaries of clerical staff be increased approximately 12% establishing salary of claims processor at \$11,500; bookkeeper \$8,400; and secretary-clerks \$6,420.

- (3) As executive-secretary is not on the 4% matching retirement plan of the other employees, a sum of \$1,500 be contributed to his retirement plan.
- (4) The fee charged staff members for personal use of NDHSAA owned vehicles be increased to 6¢ per mile.

Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Bard the report was adopted.

The Board next reviewed the financial report of the general fund and the ABF fund from July 1 to February 28 and upon motion by Halley and second by Fischer approved same.

A request from Minot for use of the following non-certified coaches was presented: Beverly Kluck as an assistant junior high girls' gymnastics and track coach and Susan Hitt as an assistant junior high girls' gymnastics coach. Sunderland moved that the proper application forms for same be sent to Minot to be completed and submitted concerning same. Seconded by Bergene and carried.

A letter from a Dickinson fan protesting the fact that reserve tickets for single sessions of the State Wrestling Tournament were not available prior to the meet was read. The Board agreed that tourney managers should make specific mention of the fact that single session reserved tickets are not available prior to the start of the tournament in their publicity releases.

Mr. Fischer presented the report of the football play-off committee outlining the following revised plan for financing of the play-offs: Finances of each game are to be kept separate and payments to participating teams are to be made according to the following schedule:

- Traveling Team — \$10.00 per player in uniform (Semi-final game)
 - \$15.00 per player in uniform (Final game)
 - Limit of 27 players for 9-man, 33 for 11-man; plus 3 coaches in 9-man and 5 coaches in 11-man.
 - Mileage — \$1.25 per one way mile for traveling teams.
- Home Team — (Any team within 10 miles — one way — of the game site).
 - \$5.00 per player in uniform (semi-final game)
 - \$7.50 per player in uniform (final game)
 - Same limit on players as for traveling team, but no additional allowance for coaches.
 - No mileage allowance.
- Profit (if any) — Semi-final games — each team $\frac{1}{4}$, NDHSAA $\frac{1}{2}$
 - Final games — All profits to NDHSAA

The above team allowance is a one day allowance — allowance for traveling team(s) will be based on one-way distance from the game site as follows:

- 0-10 miles — considered as a home team
- 11-150 miles — 1 day allowance
- 151-250 miles — 1½ days allowance
- over 250 miles — 2 days allowance

Upon motion by Fischer and second by Halley, the above plan was adopted for the 1977 football play-offs.

Fischer then moved that the following changes be made in the basic football play-off plan for 1977:

1. To be eligible for a play-off berth each team must play a minimum of seven (7) qualifying games within its classification or above.
2. The regular season shall end on October 29, 1977, with semi-final play-offs to be scheduled on November 4 or 5 and final contests on November 11 or 12.
3. Tie breaking procedure: Criteria item No. 4 (concerning won-loss record) to become item No. 2 and present items 2 and 3 to be renumbered 3 and 4.
4. NDHSAA to set all sites for all Class B semi-final and final games.
5. NDHSAA adopt a financial plan for football as they have done in all other sports.
6. Recommend that visiting teams in play-offs wear dark jerseys and home team light if possible.
7. Teams are to furnish their own game ball for play-off games.
8. Recommend that a maximum mileage limit of 125 miles one way be used in selecting officials for play-off games and if possible entire crew be selected from one town or association.
9. Revised play-off plan be sent to all football schools in the spring with emphasis on submitting schedules to NDHSAA and regional representatives.
10. "Wild Card" Class A selection committee for 1977 to be composed of Bob King, Harvey Keeney, and Dallas Kopp.

The motion was seconded by Bard and carried.

The minutes of the meeting held in Jamestown on February 18th were reviewed to acquaint those Board members who were not present at said meeting with the proceedings which took place. The letter which was sent to the Pettibone school by the executive-secretary following the Board meeting was also reviewed and approved. Bard moved that the By-Law Committee come up with a more definite wording or guidelines relative to "possession" as it relates to the smoking and drinking rule and to report on same at the June meeting. Seconded by Halley and carried.

A letter from the Butte school outlining the problems they had with "drugs" and the action which had been taken by the Butte school board curtailing all interscholastic activities for a period of six weeks was next presented. Batterberry moved that a letter of commendation be sent to the Butte school for the action taken by the Board and the support given the Board by the community. Seconded by Fischer and carried.

The executive-secretary presented a report on the state hockey tournament and the action taken wherein Grand Forks Central and Grand Forks Red River were declared co-champions. Sunderland moved that the two teams be officially declared co-champs. Seconded by Halley and carried.

Bucky Maughan, NDSU Wrestling coach, appeared before the Board outlining a proposal for conduction of mini-summer wrestling camps in local high schools. Discussion followed with final action as to approval being deferred to the meeting in Bismarck the following week.

Don Dumais, Fargo North hockey coach, and Don Dehne, Fargo North Principal, appeared before the Board in regard to incidents which took place

following Fargo North's semi-final game at the state hockey tournament. The executive-secretary read letters of complaint submitted by the two officials concerning the conduct of Mr. Dumais. Dumais then responded to the charges and reported that he had telephoned both officials apologizing for his actions. Mr. Dehne summarized the position of the Fargo North School as to the incident. After some discussion, Kolbo moved that a letter of reprimand be sent to Coach Dumais with copies of same to be sent to the school superintendent, school principal, and athletic director. Seconded by Bard and carried.

The Board next reviewed several letters and communications which had been received concerning their action in January changing the site for the 1978 Class A State Boys' Basketball Tourney. No action was taken.

The Board then recessed, reconvening again at 9:00 A.M. on March 12 with all members present except Snortland.

Some time was spent discussing rental charges for district track meets. Fischer moved that an extra \$25.00 be allowed track managers to be used to pay a starter. Seconded by Halley and carried.

Next under consideration was the number of allowable girls' basketball games per week. It was agreed to hold off a decision on same until after the meeting with the Class B district chairmen in Bismarck next week.

The secretary next read a letter from Larry Rafferty of Dickinson in which he complained about the conduct of Supt. Hollinger of Beach at a basketball game. The secretary was instructed to contact Mr. Rafferty as to whether he wished the Board to pursue the matter at the Bismarck meeting.

Next reviewed were reports of various "business venture" concession stands in connection with various state tournaments during the past few weeks. The staff was instructed to clarify the wording of the present regulation so there would be no misinterpretation of its intent.

A letter from Wasu-Duta of Fort Totten, charging discrimination against Indian students by teams and officials was presented. Discussion followed with no particular action being taken. Also reviewed was a letter from Supt. Lee of Wildrose in response to a complaint filed by an official who worked a basketball game for him. No further action was taken.

The chair appointed Halley, Kolbo, Bergene, and Batterberry to serve on a Class B district alignment committee for the 1978-79 season. The committee was instructed to complete their work in ample time for schools to adjust their schedules for the 1978-79 season.

The Board next proceeded to organize itself for the 1977-78 fiscal year, naming Frank Fischer as president and D. Allen Halley as vice-president. John Sunderland was selected as the voting delegate at the annual Federation meeting in Milwaukee in July.

Discussion followed on the sanctioning of multiple team events when some of the teams involved were non-school teams. Halley moved that sanction approval for multiple team events be granted only when all competing teams are from member schools or members of the state high school association in their respective states. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

The chairman appointed Fischer and Bergene to serve on the jacket committee and instructed them to bring in their recommendations at the June meeting.

A letter from a gymnastics official outlining various complaints and suggestions was next presented. Discussion followed in which it was agreed that a firmer control on the entire program had to come from the NDHSAA. Fischer and Benzie were appointed to meet with the gymnastics advisory committee at their annual spring meeting when recommendations for the following season will be considered.

The Board then recessed the meeting until 1:30 P.M. on March 18th in Bismarck.

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association

Bismarck, North Dakota — March 18, 19, 1977

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association reconvened at 1:00 P.M. at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck with all members present.

Ken Rio of Grand Forks appeared before the Board concerning a problem he had encountered with the boys' state grass greens golf tourney scheduled for Grand Forks on Wednesday, May 25. He reported that mens' day had been scheduled for Wednesdays this year so the course would not be available on that date. Upon motion by Bard and second by Batterberry the state tourney was rescheduled for Friday, May 27th. Mr. Rio also requested that one of the Grand Forks football teams be permitted to play a football game on the Thursday prior to Labor Day because of a scheduling conflict that came up after West Fargo joined the EDC. Halley moved that one of the Grand Forks teams be permitted to play a Minnesota team on the Thursday before Labor Day for this year only. Seconded by Bard and carried.

The executive-secretary reported that Duane Carlson had reported that the date set for the regional grass greens golf tourney at Minot also conflicted with mens' day so a change of date would be necessary for said tourney. Fischer moved that the date be changed to Monday, May 16th for this event. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Harold Pedersen, state Class A basketball tourney manager, appeared before the Board and reported that both Minot and Williston had violated the 12 player rule at the 1977 state tournament, in that Williston had used 15 different players and Minot 14 during the course of the 3 games each team played. Coaches Hjelmstad and McPherson of Minot and Williston respectively were then called before the Board in regard to explaining their reasons therefore. Bard moved that a letter of reprimand be sent to the two coaches with copies of same to be sent to the athletic directors and school administrators of the schools involved. Seconded by Snortland and carried.

Halley moved that clarification be made in the regulation as to what constitutes disciplinary action by adding the following — "if disciplinary action is taken involving the Association rule relative to drinking, smoking and drugs, a

player may be replaced by someone else for the tourney, but if disciplinary action is taken by the coach for other reasons a player may not be replaced by another player on the roster." Seconded by Bergene and carried. Coaches and tournament managers are to be made aware of the regulations and any changes in the roster must be cleared with the tournament manager beforehand. An explanation of the regulation should be made at the rules clinics in the fall.

Mr. Pedersen also reported that the nets were cut down at the Class A tourney in violation of Association regulations. He explained that it happened so fast that they could not stop it. The regulation had been explained to all teams before the tourney and to the two finalists prior to their game. Discussion followed but no action was taken.

The executive-secretary reported that the office clerical staff had accepted the salary offer made by the Board, but that the professional staff felt that they should receive the same percentage increase as that offered the clerical workers. He also reported that both groups favored some changes in the retirement program. The Board went into executive session, but made no change in salary offers. The finance committee was instructed to meet with the staff relative to proposals concerning the retirement program.

Several members of the Maddock Alumni Association appeared before the Board concerning a problem they now have in not being able to schedule a basketball game with the high school in connection with their Homecoming reunion at Thanksgiving time. For years this had been done, but with the change in date for the start of basketball practice, schools were no longer permitted to schedule a game that early because of the by-law requiring a certain number of days of practice before the first game. They requested permission for a high school alumni game after 5 days of practice rather than the two weeks as required in the by-laws. Since the Board had no authority to grant such request, Snortland moved that the committee be notified that their school should bring in a proposed amendment to the by-laws to accomplish what they desire. Seconded by Halley.

The executive-secretary gave a report on attendance at various tournaments comparing them with those of a year ago. Preliminary figures showed that increases had been experienced in wrestling and the Class B regional basketball tournaments, whereas the Class A regional and state basketball tournaments and hockey were down.

Jim Nelson of the Jamestown Sun was present and was made aware that his article on the reprimand to Don Dumais had appeared in the Sun prior to official notice having been made to Mr. Dumais. Mr. Nelson stated that this had been an oversight on his part and apologized for same.

The Board next considered the request from Bucky Maughan of NDSU relative to holding mini-summer camps in area high schools and that part of the arrangement whereby the local school would share in the profits. Fischer moved that the NDHSAA policy on camps be left as is, but that there be no pre-camp advertisement that any profits would be given to the school. Seconded by Snortland and carried.

The Board then recessed, reconvening at 9:30 A.M. on March 19 with all members present.

A petition from Dunseith for transfer from District 12 to District 23, along with a letter from District 23 relative to same was presented. The petition,

was referred to the district re-alignment committee who will be meeting in June.

Schindler, Bergene, and Batterberry reported on the officials board meeting held in Fargo on March 12, 1977. Batterberry moved that the minutes of the meeting be approved. Seconded by Bergene and carried.

Fischer moved that the ticket prices for the semi-final football play-off games be set at \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for students. Seconded by Halley and carried.

A letter listing suggestions for improvement of the wrestling program signed by several parents from Grand Forks was read. No action was taken.

The executive-secretary reported that Larry Rafferty had been contacted relative to his protest concerning Mr. Hollinger and that he did not wish to pursue the matter any further at this time, but that the Dickinson Officials Association would file a letter of complaint should there be a similar re-occurrence. No further action was taken.

Mr. Sunderland reported on the Class A regional chairmen's meeting held in Fargo. Discussion centered on the recommendation that a challenge game be held between the 2nd and 3rd place finishers in the Northeast and Southeast regional basketball division and likewise in the Northwest and Southwest. Action on same was deferred pending receipt of recommendations from the respective regions concerning same.

The Board next reviewed minutes of the Class B district chairmen's meeting held on March 18 and the recommendations adopted by said group. Halley moved that beginning with the 1977-78 season that both boys and girls basketball teams be allowed to play 2 games per week on nights followed by school days and that the boys be restricted to no more than 7 such games for season total as specified in the by-laws. Seconded by Batterberry and carried. Action on other recommendations was deferred until the June meeting.

The executive-secretary next read the letter sent by him to Coach Dumais of Fargo North as a result of the Board action taken at the last meeting.

Next discussed was the question as to whether the Association should carry unemployment insurance. Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Halley the question was referred to the Association attorney for research.

Discussion followed relative to current practice of providing Board members with life-time passes upon their assuming their position on the Board. Halley moved that the practice be modified, granting temporary one year passes to new Board members each year during their first three years of service on the Board, and that the life-time passes be issued after three years of service. Seconded by Snortland and carried.

Next under consideration, was the policy concerning tickets for state basketball tournaments for former board members. Fischer moved the adoption of the following policy:

1. At least 30 tickets be reserved for former board members at the state basketball tourneys and that these tickets be sent to the NDHSAA office. Former board members to contact the secretary for tickets instead of the tournament manager as in the past.
2. Each former board member could request two complimentary tickets if done at least two weeks prior to the start of the tourney. Tickets

issued would be non-transferable, and if abused the privilege would be revoked for such individuals.

3. All uncalled for tickets two weeks prior to the start of the tourney are to be returned by the secretary to the tournament manager for sale to general public.
4. The seat section for said 30 tickets to be designated by the NDHSAA Board of Directors.
5. Only former board members who hold a permanent life-time pass are to be eligible for the two complimentary reserved seat tickets.

The motion was seconded by Kolbo and carried.

A letter from Mr. Cole, board member of the Kindred School district, concerning the philosophy of advancing losers into regional and state tourneys was next presented along with several alternate proposals as suggested by Mr. Cole. The secretary was instructed to thank Mr. Cole for his fine letter. No further action was taken.

The Board then scheduled their next meeting for June 27, 28, 29 commencing at 1:00 P.M. on the 27th, with committee meetings to be scheduled for 9:00 A.M. that morning. There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES

Board of Directors Meeting

North Dakota High School Activities Association
Valley City, North Dakota — June 27-29, 1977

The Board of Directors of the North Dakota High School Activities Association met in the Association office building at 1:00 P.M. with all members present. Each member of the Board was furnished a complete financial report of business through June 15, a financial report of the ABF through June 15, and an agenda for the meeting. Upon motion by Bard and second by Kolbo, the financial report was accepted as submitted. Also approved was the ABF report upon motion by Sunderland and second by Bergene. Discussion followed as to investment of the catastrophic fund reserves and upon motion by Halley and second by Bard, the Executive-Secretary was instructed to invest said funds in the best possible manner within the regular investment restrictions previously adopted by the Board.

The Board next reviewed a report showing profits realized from the revenue producing sports as well as a review of the non-revenue or subsidized activities. Upon motion by Fischer and second by Sunderland the report was approved. Also reviewed was a comparative report of revenues produced from various sports in North Dakota and South Dakota.

A letter of appeal from Supt. Galloway of Park River concerning an ABF claim which had been disallowed was next presented. The claim involved an injury to a kindergarten student which had been denied because the school had not taken out kindergarten protection. Mr. Galloway stated that the failure to submit the remittance for same had been an oversight and fees had been collected from the students for said coverage. He appealed to the Board that the claim be allowed as it had been an oversight on his part and the school had been in the kindergarten program for over 15 years. Sunderland moved that the request be allowed, seconded by Kolbo. Motion failed.

The Board also considered an appeal from Wachter Junior High of Bismarck for the payment of two claims which had been denied because of the failure of the school to file the preliminary notice cards concerning same in spite of two previous warnings. Upon motion by Halley and second by Bergene, The appeal was denied.

A request from Emilie Stordalen, Chairperson of the Music Advisory Committee, for reimbursement of \$40.00 spent for postage and stationery to advise music teachers of the existence of said committee and requesting input from said teachers to the committee was next presented. As the customary expense allowance for advisory committees has been limited to travel expense, and no prior approval had been secured from the NDHSAA for said expenditure, Bard moved the request be denied. Seconded by Snortland and carried.

The Executive-Secretary reviewed a letter from the Association attorney concerning the question as to whether the Association should elect to come under the tax rated basis of assessment for Unemployment insurance or not. Bard moved that this not be done, seconded by Snortland and carried.

The Secretary next informed the Board that written notification had been received from the Cavalier School District of their intention to revert to Class B status effective with the start of the 1979-80 school year. No further action was necessary.

Next presented was a letter from the NDASSP indicating that at their recent meeting their Association had taken a strong stand in favor of the Association alcohol, drug, and tobacco rule, pledging their continued support of the rule.

The by-law committee report was presented by Bard. He stated that the problem of "possession" in the Association alcohol and drug rule was being discussed and that the committee was working on a definition of said term for presentation at the August meeting. He also stated that the rule would be further clarified to include cheerleaders, student managers, and the like.

A request from Towner was next presented in which they asked for 4 duplicate state music key awards as a boy who had won 5 individual awards had given 4 of them to members of an ensemble group from the school. The mother

of the lad wanted all of the awards, but the boy didn't want to ask that they be returned. Motion by Bergene to deny the request. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

The Executive-Secretary reported that the Billings Trophy Company had made an error, sending out larger and more expensive trophies than had been ordered for these events, and billing the Association for same. The extra charge amounted to approximately \$970, and the company had requested that the Association consider absorbing part of this extra cost. Smith reported that he had contacted the company informing them that the Board felt that the entire amount should be absorbed by the trophy company as it was their mistake and following said communique a check for the full amount had been received from the Billings Trophy Company.

The Board next discussed the sale of items by various groups at state sponsored events, who set up just outside the doors leading into the gymnasium or track causing some problems for spectators and exploiting youngsters. Benzie moved that a contract be drawn when renting facilities barring the selling of anything but normal food or drink in the facility or areas adjacent to it such as parking lots, etc. Seconded by Kolbo and carried.

Gene Carr, C. Vandestreek, and Gary Wright, representing weekly newspapers, met with the Board requesting that the Board regulation granting two passes to daily newspapers at Association tourneys be modified to include weekly newspapers. Benzie moved that the request be approved. Seconded by Halley and carried.

Delegates of districts 3 and 4 appeared before the Board relative to the site for the Region I boys' basketball tourney, with district 3 expressing a preference for Wahpeton SSS and district 4 the Fargo Civic Center.

Supt. Roster of Oakes requested that the district lines for Speech District 1 be changed or that Oakes be assigned to a group further east. Benzie moved that highway 281 be designated as the western boundary of district 1. Seconded by Halley and carried.

A communique from the National Federation relative to the conversion of track to the metric system was next presented. Following considerable discussion, Batterberry moved that beginning in 1980 state track meets be changed to the metric system, and be run on metric tracks. Seconded by Snortland and carried.

Discussion followed relative to summer camps and the fact that some of these camps were being held just prior to the start of practice for fall sports. Snortland moved that all summer camps for "fall" sports be concluded for North Dakota boys and girls by July 31 of each year. Seconded by Batterberry and carried.

Sunderland next presented the report of the finance committee and upon motion by Batterberry and second by Bard the following provisions were adopted:

1. Three additional payments of \$5,000 each from NDHSAA funds be added yearly to the employer's share of the retirement trust fund for the present Executive-Secretary, one before June 30, 1977, one before June 30, 1978, and one before June 30, 1979.
2. Further study be made as to vested interest rights of employees in the employer contributions in the retirement plan for the other employees.
3. The time schedule as previously adopted concerning employee salary negotiations be modified so that the first salary proposals by the Board to the employees be made at the January meeting of the Board to allow additional time for the consideration of same by employees.

The Board then recessed until 8:30 A.M., June 28, and reconvened at that time with all members present.

Halley presented the report of the Class B district re-alignment committee, outlining the make-up of the proposed new districts for 1978-79. Upon motion by Halley and second by Batterberry the report was accepted as submitted.

Bergene moved that the request of Dunseith for transfer from district 12 to district 23 for the 1977-78 school year be denied, since the new alignment would become effective the following year. Seconded by Halley and carried.

Snortland presented the report of the ABF committee proposing three areas for further study as follows:

1. Investigate the possibility of purchasing insurance for the catastrophic plan from a commercial company rather than carrying same by the Association.
2. The elimination of the reporting cards used by schools, substituting a triplicate claim form in lieu thereof whereby the school retained the third copy as a record of injuries reported.
3. Increase benefits under the casualty plan.

Bard moved that the report be accepted and that the committee study the proposals and report on same at a later board meeting. Seconded by Halley and carried.

Representatives from various cities next appeared before the Board extending invitations for the hosting of various Association events.

The Board next considered appointments to the Board to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of members Sunderland and Halley. Nominated as a Class A representative to fill the unexpired portion of John Sunderland's term were Donald Dehne, Principal of Fargo North; August Keller, Supt. of West Fargo; and Everett Knudsvig, Principal of Grand Forks Red River. A secret ballot was cast with Donald Dehne receiving the majority of the votes cast and

being selected. Nominated as a Class B representative to fill the unexpired portion of D. Allen Halley's term were Supt. Don Brintnell of Pembina, and Supt. David Schneider of Edmore. A secret ballot was cast with Don Brintnell receiving the majority vote and being selected.

The Board next examined several jackets brought in by the jacket committee for consideration for adoption and upon motion by Snortland and second by Kolbo selected the light blue Hardwick Regatta Model 114-22, and requested the two suppliers submitting samples of said model for consideration at the next meeting.

Some time was spent discussing qualifications for a successor to the Executive-Secretary upon his retirement and upon motion by Fischer and second by Halley the following criteria were adopted:

1. Between 35 and 50 years of age.
2. Been a school administrator in North Dakota for 5 years since 1970, and one who has exhibited an interest in high school activities.
3. Present assistant-secretary would also be considered as having the necessary qualifications to be eligible for the position

Snortland moved that January 1, 1978 be set as the deadline date for applications for the position should the present Executive-Secretary elect to retire June 30, 1979. Seconded by Sunderland and carried.

The Board next reviewed recommendations adopted by the district and regional chairmen in March. Action of specific items was deferred until after reviewing the recommendations presented by the various advisory committees.

Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Sunderland, the following recommendations of the Wrestling Advisory Committee as amended were adopted:

JUNIOR HIGH WRESTLING

1. Weight Classes - 74, 80, 86, 92, 98, 104, 110, 116, 122, 128, 134, 140, 148, 158, 168, Heavyweight.
2. A minimum of two weeks of practice must be held with at least 10 daily sessions for teams and individuals before any interschool contests are conducted.
3. Schools and individuals are permitted to participate in 3 tournaments and 8 duals per season, with the provision that a team be allowed two duals in place of each of the tournaments, thereby permitting fourteen duals if no tournaments are scheduled.
4. No wrestler may compete in more than one interschool meet per week, except that two meets per week are permitted for any three weeks during the season. A tournament is considered one meet.
5. Junior high matches shall be 1 minute for first period and 1½ minutes each for the second and third periods. No overtime periods will be wrestled. Ties at the end of regulation will be broken using the criteria found in the National Federation Wrestling Rule Book.
6. The low weight class for each boy will be established when he weighs in for his first interschool match beginning the same date as beginning weight

certification for high school boys. If a school has no matches scheduled following that date and prior to January 1st, then they should establish low weight classes the last scheduled match prior to that date. Wrestlers may not drop into a lower weight class following this establishment of a weight class. Junior high wrestlers need not be "certified" unless they wrestle on a high school "B" squad or varsity team. A copy of the weigh-in sheet used in establishing low weight classes should be sent to all schools remaining on the schedule.

7. Beginning January 1st and continuing until February 1st, two additional pounds will be allowed in each weight class; from February 1st to the end of the season, one additional pound will be allowed.
8. 7th or 8th grade students may not be "moved up" to a 9th grade team. Combining these grades would make the resulting team a junior high team.

HIGH SCHOOL WRESTLING

1. 9th grade teams follow high school regulations except they do not have to be "certified" unless used on a high school "B" squad or varsity team. 9th grade teams should be identified when the season starts so it is clear they cannot compete against combination junior high teams consisting of grades 7,8; 8,9; or 7,8,9.
2. High school teams and individuals be allowed 10 duals and 5 tourneys with the provision of trading one tourney for two duals and that one of the tournaments may be a "multiple" affair.
3. All weight certification must take place at a face-to-face weigh-in at a team's first interschool competition beginning December 16th. No certification may take place prior to that date. A competitor "certifies" when he competes at his first interschool match or exhibition beginning December 16th. Opposing coaches are to sign and send to the NDHSAA the opposing schools certification and re-certification forms.
4. ~~Delete~~ from present regulations: "Once a non-varsity wrestler does compete on the varsity team, he then must conform to all regulations for varsity wrestlers as outlined."
5. Adopt national Rule 4-4 which allows a one pound allowance for the second day of dual meet competition conducted on consecutive days.
6. To win a match by forfeit, a contestant must appear on the mat in uniform when his match is called, and have his hand raised by the referee.
7. NDHSAA realign Class B regional teams so that all regions have approximately the same number of teams.
8. If all Class B regions are 6 teams or less, allow all wrestlers defeated in the first round to be eligible for the wrestle-backs. Use cross bracketing in the wrestle-backs.
9. In Class B regionals have original 3rd and 4th place match be a regular six minute match but the challenge match be a normal five minute consolation match.
10. Have state tourney Saturday afternoon competition on 2 mats.
11. Delete the use of mat judges at the state tournaments.
12. Draw up a new state Class A tournament master pairing sheet so that only

first and second place finishers from the regions receive first round byes in the tournament. Wrestlers from the same region should not meet each other until the semi-final round.

Upon motion by Sunderland and second by Bard, the following recommendations of the Boys' Basketball Advisory Committee were adopted:

1. The NDHSAA publish a notice in the February Bulletin by request of the Coaches Association that the Coaches Association is scheduling a meeting of all Class A coaches on Friday morning at the boys' state A tournament and of all Class B coaches on Friday morning at the state B tournament.
2. A survey be made of Class A schools relative to the use of an inter-region (North vs South) game between the 2nd and 3rd place teams in their region for the right to advance to the state tourney.
3. A survey be made of Class B schools relative to the idea of sectional tourneys involving the 1st and 2nd place teams from one region matched against the 1st and 2nd place teams of another to select 8 teams for the state tourney.

Upon motion by Fischer and second by Shortland the following recommendations of the Girls' Gymnastics Advisory Committee as amended were adopted:

REGIONAL MEETS

1. Eight gymnasts are allowed per event with one of the following options:
 - a. 8 all-arounds 0 specialists
 - b. 7 all-arounds 1 specialist per event
 - c. 6 all-arounds 2 specialists per event
 - d. 0-5 all-arounds 3 specialists per event
 - e. Only gymnasts entered in all 4 events are eligible for the all-around event.
2. Compulsory and Optional routines will be performed at Regional and State meets.
 - a. The compulsory vault for Class A is the handspring.
 - b. The compulsory vault for Class B is the layout squat.
3. Finals for individual placement will be conducted with the top 8 gymnasts in each of the four individual events. (The all-around event is completed before finals.)
4. Regional sites should rotate with consideration being given to facilities and equipment sufficient to host such meets.
5. It is recommended that the top two teams in each region receive a team trophy.

STATE MEET

1. Individual events:
 - a. Class A: The top 8 individuals in a single event in the regional meet qualify for the state meet, plus the next 4 individuals who score a total of at least 16.0 in that event. (A maximum of 12 entries per event.) Refer to National Federation Rules Book on "tie breakers" page 120.
 - b. Class B: The top 8 individuals in a single event in the regional meet qualify for the state meet, plus the next 4 individuals who

score a total of at least 14.0 in that event. (A maximum of 12 entries per event.) Refer to National Federation Rules Book on "tie breakers" page 120.

2. State qualifiers for individual, all-around, and team are determined after the compulsory and optional competition. Finals are to determine individual placement only.
3. The all-around event:
 - a. Class A: The top 6 all-arounds in each regional meet qualify for the state meet, plus the next 6 competitors providing they score a total of 64.0.
 - b. Class B: The top 6 all-arounds in each regional meet qualify for the state meet, plus the next 6 competitors providing they score a total of 56.0.
4. A team may qualify through the regionals for the state meet as follows:
 - a. Any Class A or Class B team that places 1st or 2nd at the regional meet.
 - b. Any Class A team which scores a total of 186.0 points at the regional meet.
 - c. Any Class B team which scores a total of 162.0 points at the regional meet.
5. Those teams which qualify for the state meet may only use competitors that comply with one of the following:
 - a. The individual's score was used as one of the top three scores for her team's score. (No substitutions)
 - b. The individual has qualified as one of the top 8 individuals in an event or has met the score standards as outlined in item No. 1.
 - c. The individual is one of the top 6 all-arounds or has met the score standards as outlined in item No. 3.
6. Anyone qualifying in an event for the state meet qualifies to place in that event at the state meet. (Example: a gymnast entered in the all-around event can place in any of the other four events.)
7. Team Score:
 - a. The best 3 individual scores for each team in each event shall be totaled to determine the team's score for that event.
 - b. An all-around qualifier's score may be used in individual events for team score.
 - c. Team score is computed before finals.
8. State meet sites should rotate from east to west with consideration being given to facilities and equipment sufficient to host such meets.
9. The state meet will be a 2-day affair - Friday for Class B and Saturday for Class A.
10. The top three teams in each class receive a team trophy.

REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO JUDGES

1. Four rules clinics and two judge's workshops will be held on separate days. The judges are required to attend one rules clinic. It is strongly recommended that judges attend one workshop.

2. The recommended fees for judges, both acting and superior, and meet referee, at regional and state meets are \$35.00 per day.
3. It is mandatory that the judges meet the night before the regional meet and state meet.
4. Score sheets and judging sheets are to be uniform at all meets.

Upon motion by Fischer and second by Halley the following recommendations of the Hockey Advisory Committee were approved:

1. Length of playing period, 15 minutes; length of intermission between period, 10 minutes; minor penalty 1½ minutes; major penalty 3 minutes; misconduct penalty 10 minutes.
2. Face masks and intra-oral mouth protectors are required for all players.
3. During regular season play, if the score is tied after regulation play, an 8 minute sudden death overtime period be played after a 5 minute rest period. Teams do not change ends. If score is still tied, it remains so.
4. Overtime play in regional or state tournaments:
 - a. No changing of ends for overtime play.
 - b. First overtime to consist of a 5 minute rest period followed by 8 minutes of play. (Sudden Death.)
 - c. Second overtime, a 10 minute intermission to resurface ice followed by a 15 minute sudden death overtime.
 - d. Third overtime same as first, fourth same as second, etc. until tie is broken.
 - e. If score is still tied after two overtimes in first and second rounds, play be resumed next morning with an 8 minute sudden death overtime followed by a 15 minute sudden death overtime until tie is broken.

5. Third and fourth place games at regional and state tournaments be played Saturday afternoon.
6. North region to consist of following schools: Bottineau, Devils Lake, Grafton, Grand Forks Central, Grand Forks Red River, Minot and Park River.
7. South region to consist of following schools: Bismarck, Bismarck Century, Bismarck St. Mary's, Fargo North, Fargo South, Fargo Shanley, and Jamestown.
8. Full consolation round be played in regional tournaments.
9. The top three finishers in each region qualify automatically for the state tournament. The 5th place finisher in each tournament plays the 4th place finisher in the opposite region on the Monday of the State Tournament week on the home ice of the 4th place team or at a site to be selected by the 4th place team for the right to go to the state tournament. Expenses and receipts of the Monday games are to be shared by the two schools involved.

Upon motion by Halley and second by Batterberry, the following recommendations of the Track Advisory Committee as amended were adopted:

1. Adopt following district and state meet schedules for combined boys and girls meets in 1978.

- Set boys 330 yd. intermediate hurdle standards at 43.0.

Excluding the heat leaders, list all competitors numerically in random fashion separating competitors from the same school. Call first runner listed and if present assign to lane 1, second runner present to lane 2. First heat leader is then assigned lane 3. If a runner called is not present, cross out name and call next runner. The second heat leader will be assigned to heat 2 lane 3 etc. Substitutions are to be added to bottom of original list.
- Coaches to meet with manager at 8:30 A.M. to set up heats in the 440 dash, all relays and the 330 Yd. Intermediate hurdles. Use current best competitive time to put fastest individual and relay teams in same heat with lanes assigned as per schedule used at State.
- Finalists in the 100, 220, 120, and 110 yd. hurdles to have lanes assigned as per state schedule.
- In distance events put fastest times in 1st heat starting with lane one. No more than 3 runners in any one lane.
- In the shot put, discus, javelin, and long jump, competitors to be allowed 2 hours in Class B and 1½ hours in Class A to report and take preliminary throws or jumps from the 9:30 A.M. and 2:00 P.M. starting time.
- Schools within a district to recommend to the manager who they would like to have as a starter.
- 880 Yd. relay to be run in lanes all the way.

4. State Meet Regulations:

- In part 2-b add 330 Yd. Intermediate hurdles and change lane assignment to (3, 4, 5, 2, 6, 1, 7, 8.)
- In part 5 add except the 880 Yd. Relay which will be run in lanes all the way.
- In part 12 add either announce all preliminary times or have summary sheet etc.

- In part 14 - event judges and/or clerk to announce to all competitors prior to each event that adornments may not be worn during competition, if a competitor then competes with such adornment, he or she may be disqualified during or after the event.
 - New Item: Indicate all throws or jumps so spectators can keep up with the event.
 - New Item: Have a reserved area in stands for coaches near finish.
 - New Item: Use finish tape instead of yarn.
 - In part 10 - fouls also to be reported to jury of appeals.
5. Junior High Track - for page 106 Constitution & By-Laws Book: If separate meets are held for each of the junior high grades, then the 9th grade students may follow high school regulations and events. However, if 7th and 8th graders compete against 9th graders then the 9th graders must conform to limits set for junior high. 7th and 8th grade students may not be "moved up" to a 9th grade team. Combining these grades would make the resulting team a junior high team. 9th grade teams must be composed entirely of 9th grade students.
- Limit of 4 events only 3 of which may be track events or field events.
 - Distance events are the mile and 880. A competitor may run one or the other but not both in a one day meet. In addition to the one distance race, he/she may run one 440. If a competitor runs neither of the distance races, he/she may run two 440's and one race of a lesser distance.
 - Hurdles shall be 30 inches in height. The boys 80 and 120 yd. hurdles shall be spaced 10 yards apart with 15 yards from the start to the first hurdle and also 15 yards from the last hurdle to the finish line.
4. Suggested Events: (Boys and Girls) 100, 220, 440, 880, Mile, 8 lb. shot, 2 lb. 3¼ oz. discus, long jump, high jump, 440, 880, and mile relays.
- (Boys only) 80 and 120 yd. hurdles, pole vault, 2-mile relay.
- (Girls only) 110 yd. hurdles (varsity spacing), 880 medley relay.
- On metric conversion table, change 110 meter hurdles to 15.8.
 - In the cross country regionals qualify the top 8 teams and top 20 runners from each regional into the State Class B cross country run.
 - Continue to have 6 people on the advisory committee and meet in joint session.
 - State qualifying track meets to be allowed to sanction up to 15 days prior to the meet with a payment of \$50.00 as a late fee if they want a state qualifying meet and missed 30 day period.
 - Scoring at district and state meets - 10, 8, 6, 4, 2, 1.

Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Sunderland the following recommendation of the Swimming Advisory Committee as amended were approved:

- A slight change in: time schedule for state meets with the girls' meet to begin at 4:00 P.M. the first day and the boys' meet at 5:30 P.M. the first

day. The finals to be held on the second day beginning at 1:30 P.M. Warm-ups for the girls' meet to be scheduled for 2:30 P.M. on the first day and at 4:00 P.M. for the boys' meet. Warm-ups for the second day at both meets to be scheduled for 12:30 P.M. The scratch meeting for the girls' meet to be held at 2:30 P.M. the first day and at 4:00 P.M. the first day for the boys' meet.

2. Coaches are to serve as diving judges at the boys' meet. Qualified personnel to be used as diving judges at the girls' meet.
3. No qualifying times are necessary, but it is recommended that no entries be submitted which are slower than the 20th place time in last year's state meet.
4. Attendance at rules clinics to be mandatory for coaches and recommended for all officials.

Upon motion by Halley and second by Bergene the following recommendations of the Golf Advisory Committee as amended were approved:

1. Girls' state tourney to start at 10:00 A.M.
2. Boys' state grass greens tourney to be a 36 hole, 2-day event with no practice on the state tourney course the day before the meet.
3. More tourney supervision on rules and scoring be provided.
4. The NDHSAA conduct mandatory rules clinics in the spring.
5. The NDHSAA prepare a list of rule modifications for sand greens golf.
6. A study be made relative to holding a separate State Class A and B grass greens tourney.

Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Benzie the following recommendations of the Tennis Advisory Committee as amended were adopted:

1. Two-day regional tournaments be held, adding one more singles to team competition but not for individual competition. Team competition to be held the first day, plus at least the first round of the individual competition. Second day, the balance of the individual competition.
2. No scoring necessary for individual competition in regionals, only advancement.
3. Team scoring in regionals for team advancement:
 - 5 points for No. 1 doubles
 - 4 points for No. 1 singles
 - 3 points for No. 2 doubles
 - 2 points for No. 2 singles
 - 1 point for No. 3 singles
4. Advance the top 4 teams and the top 8 singles and top 8 doubles to the state as before.
5. Play consolation rounds in individual competition in regionals with the 4 semi-finalists and the 4 semi-finalists of the consolation round advancing to state (same as this year.)
6. Use the regional format in effect this past year (without point system) for individual play at state to determine true top 5.
7. Any changes in line-up from listing on original entry form must be sub-

mitted to meet manager in writing prior to seed meeting. Any substitute after that time because of illness or injury must replace that individual's spot.

8. It is not necessary that the same line-up be submitted for team day and individual day, but both have to be submitted in advance to the meet manager before seed day.
9. The same line-up of players is required at state as used at the regional.
10. No substitutions permitted for state singles; the player who qualified in the regional must compete or vacate the spot.
11. In case of illness or injury between time of regional and state of one player in a doubles entry substitution for said player may be made, however no individual who is already entered in the tournament may be substituted for this individual.
12. Recommended that players wear appropriate school identifying tennis uniforms in 1977-78. To be required in 1978-79.
13. The meet manager is not to be a coach of a competing team.
14. One person per set of courts be hired to police such items as swearing, throwing racquets in disgust, etc.
15. Fee for tournament manager be increased to \$50.00 as the tourneys are two day meets.
16. Increase number of team trophies at state from 2 to 3.
17. Schools may enter contestants in singles or doubles without entering a full team.

Upon motion by Snortland and second by Halley, the following recommendations of the Speech Advisory Committee as amended were adopted:

1. Add dramatic duo event.
2. Add poetry interpretation event.
3. Use 35 Extemporaneous Speaking Topics in January Bulletin for use at district level.
4. Use 35 Extemporaneous Speaking Topics in March Bulletin for use at state level.
5. Student Congress -- Sept. 23 - Western at Dickinson Trinity
Oct. 14 - Eastern at Fargo North
Dec. 9,10 - State at Bismarck
6. Debate -- A school must have been entered in at least 6 rounds of inter-scholastic debate within the state prior to the state tournament in order to qualify for participation in the state event.
7. Schools who do not furnish judges in the "B" and "Novice" division at state tournament will be assessed an additional \$40.00 for each team entered in these divisions. (Each school entering the "B" and "Novice" divisions of the state tournament is to furnish a judge for each division. Debate coaches may act as judges in these events.)

Upon motion by Batterberry and second by Bergene, the following recommendations of the Music Advisory Committee as amended were adopted:

1. Medals be awarded to all star-rated participants at State level.
2. A study be made relative to holding the State Music Contest on the third or fourth Friday in April beginning in 1979.

3. Judges' recommended fee be \$75.00.
4. All music and speech instructors shall be required to attend district meetings.
5. 7th and 8th grade students be eligible for solo competition.

The Board then recessed until 8:30 A.M., June 29th, when they reconvened with all members present.

Bard moved to reconsider item 5 of the music recommendations. The motion failed for lack of a second.

Halley then moved to reconsider the recommendation of the Boys' Basketball Advisory Committee requesting the NDHSAA Board of Directors to sponsor an amendment which would allow high school coaches to be involved in the selection of players and coaching of all-star games, which had been defeated the previous day. Seconded by Bard. The motion to reconsider failed.

The Board next reviewed the 1977-78 calendar of events, making the following changes or modifications:

1. Re-scheduled the State Student Congress meet, setting same on December 9-10.
2. Changed the tennis regional meets, the boys' state grass greens golf tournament, and the state girls' gymnastic meet to 2-day meets rather than one as originally scheduled.
3. Set the following dates for Board meetings for the 1977-78 fiscal year, with same to be listed on Association calendar:

August 18-19 at Valley City
 September 15 at Bismarck
 October 19-20 at Bismarck
 November 18 at Minot
 January 28-29 at Bismarck
 March 10-11 at Fargo
 March 17-18 at Bismarck
 June 19-21 at Valley City

The staff was instructed to prepare a tentative calendar of events for the 1978-79 school year and to present same to the Board at the August meeting.

Next reviewed were all written invitations and recommendations relative to sites for various Associations events for the 1977-78 and 1978-79 school years.

The Board then recessed until 1:30 P.M. and reconvened at that time with all members present except Snortland.

Chairman Muckenhirn reported that the TV Committee had met with Jim Adelson of KXJB-TV for re-negotiation of the contract for television rights for the 1978 boys' state class B basketball tourney. The original contract called for telecasting of the four first-round games over the western stations only, and the proposal was for state-wide telecast of these games as well as the semi-finals and final game. The original contract called for a fee of \$3370 and a figure of \$5000 had been agreed upon for the new proposal. Upon motion by Kolbo and second by Bard, the action of the committee was approved.

Next discussed was the question whether Mrs. Anderson should conduct a basketball rules clinic at the State Coaches Clinic in August or attend the Federation gymnastics clinic in Elgin which falls on the same date. It was agreed that since Dolores Paulson has conducted the state gymnastics clinics in the past and will be doing so again this fall, that Mrs. Anderson should conduct the basketball clinic rather than attend the meeting in Elgin.

Next reviewed were several amendments to be voted on at the National Federation meeting in Milwaukee in July, and instructions as to how to vote on said amendments were given to Mr. Sunderland, our voting delegate.

Kolbo moved that an expression of the appreciation of the members of the Board to the retiring Board members, Muckenhirn, Batterberry, Peterson, Halley, and Sunderland for their many contributions and dedication through their many years of service be incorporated in the minutes. Muckenhirn responded on behalf of the retiring members, thanking the Board and expressing their appreciation for a chance to serve and their hope for the continued success of the Association.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES — ANNUAL MEETING

North Dakota High School Activities Association
October 21, 1976 — Bismarck, North Dakota

The annual meeting of the North Dakota High School Activities Association was held at the Holiday Inn in Bismarck on October 21, 1976 at 2:00 P.M.

President Muckenhirn called the meeting to order, and then introduced Brice Durbin, Executive-Secretary Designate of the National Federation, who addressed the group on the subject "Is Our Slip Showing?"

Norman Batterberry gave a report on the annual meeting of the National Federation held in Nashville, Tenn. in July.

Chairman Muckenhirn then called the regular business meeting to order and pointed out to the group that discussion could be held on all proposed amendments to the by-laws, but that actual voting on the amendments would be by mail ballot in conformity with the new regulations adopted by the membership a year ago. M. F. Peterson outlined parliamentary procedure in regards to amendments submitted and amendments to the amendments.

Inasmuch as all members had copies of the minutes of the last meeting in the annual handbook, Supt. Clute of Adams moved that the reading of the minutes be waived, seconded by Nyhus of Devils Lake. Motion carried.

The first item of business was the consideration of several amendments to the by-laws, notice of which had been served to the members in the September issue of the Bulletin.

Dwayne Erickson of LaMoure moved that Section X of Article III of the by-laws be amended to read as follows:

"Interscholastic teams of both sexes are permissible in sports sponsored by the Association."

Seconded by Mann of Marion. After considerable discussion the motion and second were withdrawn, and Erickson then reworded his motion to read as follows:

"Interscholastic teams of both sexes are permissible in sports sponsored by the Association, if a school does not provide separate teams for each sex."

The motion was seconded by Mann of Marion.

Mr. Muckenhirn, on behalf of Supt. Swartz of Edinburg, presented a proposal that Section II f of Article XII of the By-Laws be amended to read as follows:

"All tournaments, other than Association-sponsored tournaments must end on a night not followed by a school day. However, when only four "B" squad teams are involved in an invitational tourney, said tourney shall be exempt from this provision if all participating schools are within a driving distance of 50 miles from the tourney site."

Supt. Flitschock of Munich moved that the amendment be adopted, seconded by Supt. McDaniel of Surrey.

Supt. Muckenhirn, at the request of St. Mary's School of Bismarck, moved that Section X of Article XIII of the by-laws be amended to read as follows:

"When some of the senior high schools within the same public school district are organized as three-year high schools and others are organized as four-year high schools, students finishing the ninth grade in the school system operating a three-year high school have the privilege of transferring to the four-year high school system without loss of eligibility if the transfer is made at the start of the first semester of the tenth grade. Such transfers are not permitted from the four-year high school to the three-year high school without loss of eligibility. This in no way abridges the right of a student to establish his eligibility in any high school of his choice at the beginning of the ninth grade."

Seconded by Batterberry. Discussion followed.

Supt. Muckenhirn, in behalf of the NDHSAA Board of Directors moved that Section II g of Article V of the by-laws be amended to read as follows:

"A school may be suspended for participating directly or indirectly in the management, supervision, player selection, coaching or promotion of bowl or all-star type athletic contests, or permitting any of its employees to participate in any way directly or indirectly, when the players during the current school year were members of a high school team."

Seconded by Halley. A motion was made to amend the amendment by inserting the word "officially" prior to the word "permitting", but the motion died for want of a second.

Supt. Muckenhirn, on behalf of the NDHSAA Board of Directors, moved that Section III of Article XIII of the by-laws as presently written be numbered as subsection "a" and the following be added as subsection "b".

"Students who have participated in athletics representing a member school and who have not yet graduated from high school shall not compete on an "all-star" team, or in an "all-star" game, contest, or meet during the school year in sports sponsored by the Association. An "all-star" team is one made up wholly or in part of players selected in any manner from two or more schools, teams, or areas. Violation of this regulation shall result in loss of eligibility of the student for a period of one year from the date of the last violation. Nothing in this regulation shall prohibit any student from participating as an unattached individual or as a member of a non-school team in these sports during the off-season for that sport in the school term providing the contest is not "all-star" in character."

Seconded by Supt. Fischer of Jamestown.

Supt. McGurran, on behalf of District 10 and the Pembina County Schoolmasters, moved that Section II g of Article XII of the by-laws be amended to read as follows:

"Not more than seven regular interscholastic basketball contests may be played by any team sponsored by the school on an evening followed by a school day. In case of postponement because of an "Act of God" the State Board may grant permission to reschedule the contest."

Seconded by Brintnell of Pembina. Supt. Buchholz of Anamoose moved that the amendment be amended by inserting the word "fourteen" in place of the

word "seven" in the original proposal. The motion was declared out-of-order and withdrawn. Considerable discussion followed.

Supt. Muckenhirn, on behalf of the NDHSAA Board of Directors, moved that Sections II, III, and IV of Article VII of the junior high by-laws be repealed and that Sections V and VI of the same article be re-numbered as Sections II and III respectively, and explained reasons therefore. The motion was seconded by Dick Karlgaard of Bismarck.

Supt. Hendrickson of Halliday moved that Section V of Article III of the Junior High by-laws be amended to read as follows:

"All students participating on a team registered in the junior high division must be enrolled in the same school and be under the supervision of the same administrative head, except that schools which have less than 50 students enrolled in grades 7-8 may combine with another school in their school district, or their designated high school district, that has less than 50 students in grades 7-8 for purposes of junior high interscholastic football."

Seconded by Supt. Sloan of New Town.

Supt. Nathan of Goodrich moved that Article XI of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Amendments to the Constitution may be made by a majority vote of the member schools in a mail ballot, and amendments to the By-Laws and regulation of the Association may be made by a majority vote of those present at any regular or special meeting if fifty or more Representatives are in attendance, provided in both instances that notice of the proposed amendment with its substance has been served at a previous meeting or by letter from the Secretary at the request of a Representative, and provided further, that there shall have been a lapse of thirty days between the time of presentment and the final vote thereon."

Seconded by Supt. Tooley of Lisbon.

Supt. Halley of Cando outlined the contents of a survey that will shortly be sent to all school administrators concerning sports seasons, the survey to be used as a guide to assist the Board in making future decisions in the areas of sports seasons.

The report of the nominating committee was presented by Supt. Broton of New England, submitting the following names for vacancies on the Board of Directors for three year terms:

Class B representative from Southeast area — Supt. Elbert Van Ornum of Edgeley

Class B representative from Southwest area — Supt. Walt Hoff of Belfield

The following nominations were made from the floor:

Supt. Tjaden of Casselton nominated Supt. Duane Silseth of Dakota High School of Arthur as a Class B representative from the Southeast area.

Supt. Christianson of Hillsboro nominated Arthur Morlock of Hillsboro as a Class B representative from the Southeast area.

This nomination was ruled out of order as Hillsboro is located in the Northeast area rather than the Southeast area.

Supt. Solberg of Bowman moved that nominations cease. Seconded by

Supt. Frank of Killdeer and carried.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned on motion by Supt. Batterberry of Max and second by Supt. Fischer of Jamestown.

Al Taylor called the regular meeting of the NDOA Board of Directors to order in the NDHSAA office in Valley City at 10:00 A.M. with all members present.

Motion by King to raise the registration fees for membership in the NDOA to \$8.00 for one sport and \$5.00 for each additional sport except that the second basketball registration be \$2.00 starting with the 1977-78 school year. Seconded by Harter and carried.

Seconded by Harter and carried.

Motion by Albrecht to set up fourteen sites for football and twenty for basketball workshops for officials in 1977. The workshops would be held for the purpose of training and trying to improve officiating through work on mechanics and general rules knowledge. The local meetings would be directed by a workshop supervisor who would set the time and place for the local meeting. The first local football meeting would be during the period of August 15-31 and the second between September 6-15. Every official within reasonable driving distance of a local meeting would be encouraged to attend. Harter discussed problems of officials in Fargo area getting considered for state B tourney as they work in such a small area.

The group then set the next meeting for Fargo Holiday Inn at 3:30 P.M. on Saturday, March 12th. Meeting adjourned.

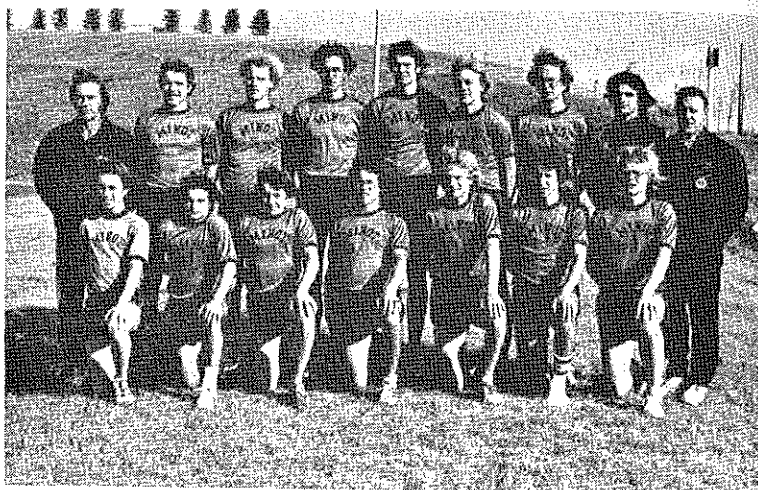

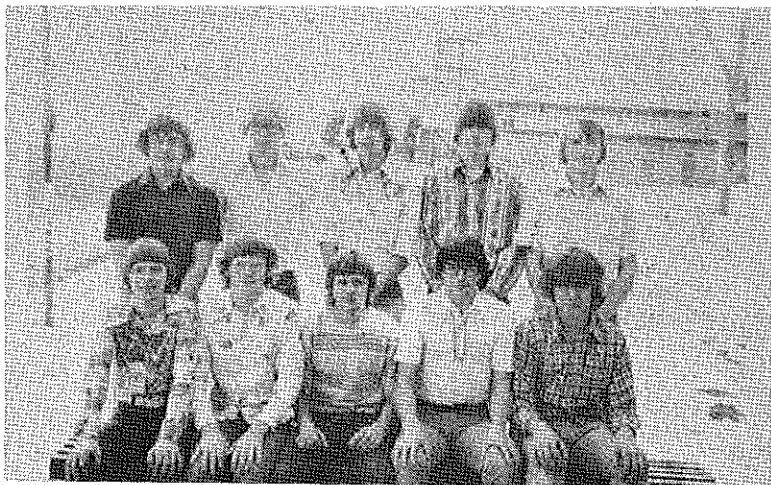

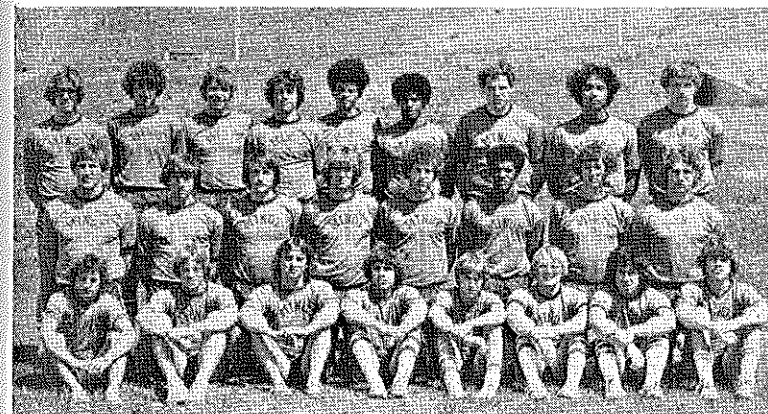

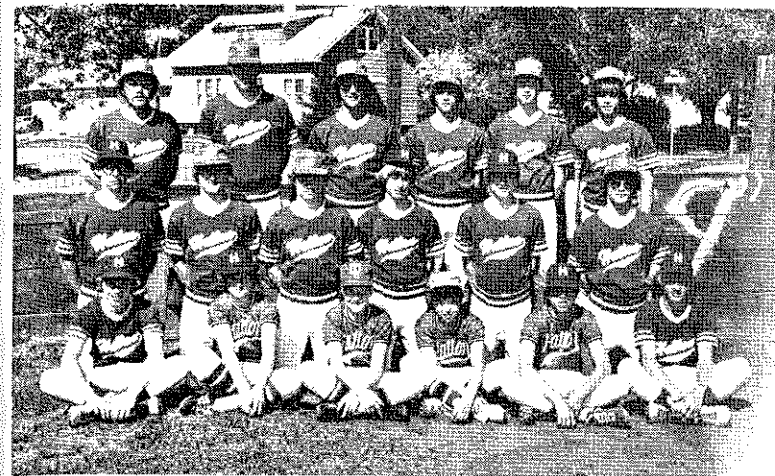

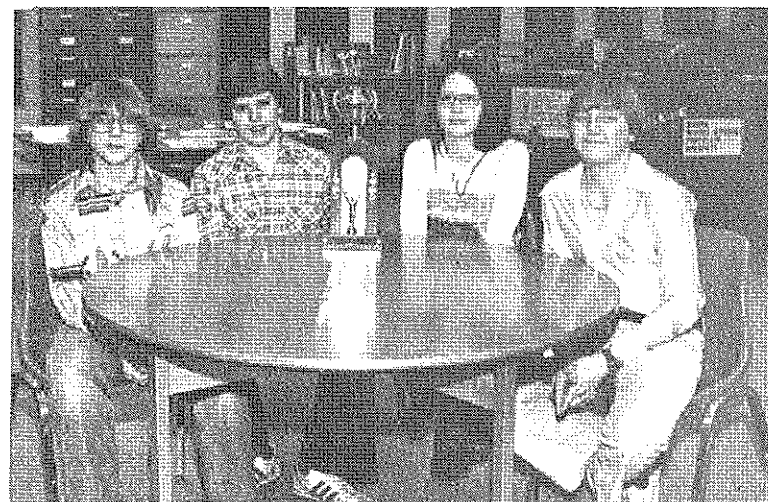

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS, JUNE 30, 1977

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

Fund Accounting: The association has adopted governmental fund accounting principles. A fund is an independent accounting entity for recording cash or other assets offset by related reserves and balances created to account for specific activities, budget objectives or to comply with certain limitations and restrictions.

Accounting Methods: In general, the cash basis method of accounting was originally adopted and is still in use. The following notes disclose how the accounting policies and methods are applied in specific areas.

NOTE 1: The association has invested its reserves and surplus funds for maximum yield and safety. On June 30, 1977, 32% of the investments were in U.S. Treasury & federal agency obligations, 47% in local savings & loan associations and the balance of 21% was divided among the three local banks.

NOTE 2: Unclaimed checks issued, outstanding in excess of one year, are restored to the bank accounts and carried as a liability for a period extending beyond the statute of limitations.

NOTE 3: Encumbrances represent a year-end provision for unpaid bills, estimates of the cost of goods and services on order, insurance claims in process, and an estimate of claims expected on preliminary injury reports.

NOTE 4: The association intends to return to the members the unappropriated balance in each fund. This has been done by reducing future revenue assessments, by increasing insurance benefits, by increasing contestants' expense allowances, by providing additional services, or by any combination of these actions.

NOTE 5: Fixed assets are capitalized when payment is made and straight-line depreciation is recorded annually based on the following ranges of estimated lives:

Building & improvements, 10 to 28 years;
 Fixtures & equipment, 8 to 10 years;
 Films & library materials, 4 years; and
 Autos, 1 year (write-down to estimated resale value).

NOTE 6: The association has provided various retirement plans for key employees in previous years. With the exception of the pre-existing plan for the executive secretary, the present retirement plans provide for a voluntary 4% of salary contribution by employees which is matched by the association. The funds are deposited with a local savings & loan association. Further particulars of the plans are available on request.
