1970 Class B Boys Basketball State Champions – New England St. Mary's Saints

By the time the 1970s rolled around, the New England St. Mary's boys basketball team was a regular participant in the North Dakota High School Activities Association's Class B State Tournament. The Saints qualified in 1962, 1965, 1966, 1967, 1968 and were back again in 1970 with a purpose.

Joining the Saints at the 1970 state tournament played at the Minot Auditorium were Beulah, Jud, Oakes, Northwood, Columbus, Munich and Belcourt.


St. Mary's and Beulah opened the tournament's quarterfinal round. The Saints, coached by Dave Wolsky, built an early lead and hung on to defeat the Miners 66-51. St. Mary's senior forward Dick Ryan led all scorers with 22 points. Senior guard Les Schroeder and sophomore center Gerard Baker added 18 and 15 points, respectively for the Saints, who would advance to the state semifinals for the third time in six seasons.

In the semifinals, St. Mary's would meet Oakes, who had bested previously undefeated Jud in the quarterfinals. Schroeder paced the Saints with 35 points as St. Mary's topped the Tornadoes 74-61. The Saints were in their first Class B state title game since 1962.

Belcourt would be the Saints' opposition in the championship. The title game went down to the wire. In the final 30 seconds of play, Schroeder hit a 10-foot jump shot to tie the game and later got a free-throw to fall with seven seconds remaining to give the Saints a 54-53 come-from-behind win. Belcourt had taken an eight-point lead into the fourth quarter and led 45-35 with six minutes, 20 seconds left to play, but St. Mary's was able to chip away and ultimately overtake the Braves.

St. Mary's junior forward Larry Gardner led all scorers with 18 points giving the Saints three different leading scorers in their three games at the state tournament.

Following the championship game, Schroeder was named the state tournament's most valuable player. St. Mary's finished the season with a 24-3 record.

1971 Class B Boys Basketball State Champions - Wyndmere Warriors

The 1971 Wyndmere boys basketball team was consistent. Five Players – seniors David Reese, Paul Muehlberg, Brian Veit and Dale Sellner along with junior Ronald Becker – started all 27 games for the Warriors during the 1971 season. All 27 of those contests were wins for Wyndmere including the final game of the season – a 70-69 overtime win over defending Class B state champion New England St. Mary's in the 1971 NDHSAA Class B boys basketball state championship game.

The 1971 NDHSAA Class B boys basketball state tournament field was made up of Wyndmere, Ashley, Parshall, Hillsboro, Mohall, Belcourt, New England St. Mary's and New Rockford.

Wyndmere – undefeated, yet unranked heading into the state tournament – was riding the momentum of a 30-point defeat over Ellendale in the Region 1 championship game. The Warriors would meet Ashley in the quarterfinals and defeated the Aces 76-68 behind the efforts of Becker (26 points) and Reese (21 points).

The Warriors mathched up with the Mohall Yellowjackets in the semifinals. Mohall had defeated No. 1-ranked Belcourt in the quarterfinals, but Wyndmere's combo of Becker and Reese struck again scoring 21 and 15 points respectively to lead the Warriors to a 58-55 win and a trip the title game.

In the championship against New England St. Mary's, the Warriors found themselves down nine points early in the fourth quarter, but a late comeback punctuated by a buzzer-beater jump shot made by Veit tied the game 67-67 and forced overtime. In overtime, Sellner hit a critical jump shot that ended up being the deciding bucket of the game.

Becker led the Warriors once again in scoring finishing the title game with 25 points and earned Tournament MVP honors. Becker and Reese were named to the All-Tournament team.

1972 Class B Boys Basketball State Champions - Mayville-Portland Patriots

1972 NDHSAA Class B Boys Basketball State Tournament saw a lot of new faces in the enter the Minot Auditorium as Mohall and Ashley were the only teams to return from the 1971 state tournament. Joining the Yellowjackets and the Aces in the 1972 state tournament field were Mayville-Portland, Fessenden, Dunseith, Oakes, Berthold and New Leipzig.

The squad that stood victorious in Saturday's state title game – Mayville-Portland – was 18-6 entering the tournament that featured plenty of scoring. Seven players in the tournament averaged 20 points or more during the three games played at the Minot Auditorium, but no one eclipsed the individual efforts of Mayville-Portland's senior John Rygg.

Rygg average 31.7 points per game at the state tournament and helped power the Patriots to state championship.

Mayville-Portland opened with a 73-68 win over Ashley in the quarterfinals. Rygg scored a team-high 29 points and the Patriots also had three other players Jeff Hoplin, Rick Soholt and Jeff Strand score in double figures.

In the semifinals, Rygg poured in 34 points and was 13 of 19 from the field as the Patriots cruised to an 87-57 win over favored Oakes. Strand and Soholt combined for 29 points in the win over the Tornadoes that sent the Patriots to the state championship game.

Mayville-Portland would meet Berthold in the title game. Rygg once again led the Patriots' charge scoring a game-high 32 points. Mayville-Portland led by as many as 16 points late in the first half, but by the time the game entered the fourth quarter the Patriots held a 49-47 lead. Rygg scored the first six points of the fourth quarter restoring the Patriots' cushion to keep Berthold at bay the rest of the way with the final scoring being 66-62.

Rygg was named Tournament MVP and Patriots finished the season 21-6.

1995 Class B Boys Basketball State Champions - Carrington Cardinals

The 1995 Carrington Cardinals finished their championship season with a 26-1 overall record. The Cardinals opened up the season winning their first five games before picking up their only loss of the season at the Bismarck St. Mary's Holiday tournament where they suffered a 72-63 setback to the Class A Mandan Braves in the semifinals. The Cardinals finished the tournament beating St. Mary's, the host team for third place.

During the next twelve regular season games, several key district and regional matchups led to gymnasiums with standing room only crowds to watch Region 4 standouts battle on the court. Four Winds posed the toughest challenge in Carrington losing by a mere three points, 68-65. The last regular season game was highly anticipated as Dakota Prairie-Tolna traveled to Carrington. Jim Kleinsasser, Aaron Wick and Randy Habeck lead the scoring attack as the Cardinals prevailed 68-52. The Cardinals finished the regular season by posting a 17-1 record heading into district tournament play.

The Cardinals claimed the District 8 Championship in New Rockford by beating Pettibone-Robinson, Bowdon-Hurdsfield-Sykeston, and Harvey in the championship game 66-55. Four Cardinals – Kleinsasser, Habeck, Wick, and Rob March – were named to the All-District Team.

The No. 1-ranked Cardinals then took to the hardwood at Devils Lake looking to capture the Region 4 championship. Carrington's opening round opponent, New Rockford was no match as the Cardinals won 86-55. The semifinal matchup with Minnewaukan-Sheyenne stayed close for half the game, but a dominant second half put the Cardinals in the championship game by a 65-45 margin. The Cardinals then faced off against a District 8 foe, the Harvey Hornets for the third time of the season. Another close game for a half, but once again the Cardinals put together an impressive second half to win 75-59. All-Region performers included Kleinsasser and Habeck.

The Cardinals faced the Oakes Tornadoes in the State Tournament opener at the Minot Dome. It was a slow start for Carrington, but they put together an impressive second and fourth quarter to secure an 80-62 first-round win. Five Cardinal players scored in double figures.

The semifinal match-up ended up being the best game of the tournament. The young, athletic team from May-Port-C-G played very well in a closely-contested game. Late in the game, Habeck stole the ball from a Patriots player as they attempted to stall for the last shot. He was fouled while attempting to score the game-winning layup. Habeck proceeded to make both free throws to clinch a 54-52 victory. The Cardinals finished the night going 15 of 16 from the free-throw line.

In the championship game against Grenora, the Cardinals jumped out to an 11-3 first quarter lead and never looked back as they lead the game at all quarter stops. The final score of 41-30 represented a hard-nosed defensive effort by both squads. Jim Kleinsasser was voted Most Valuable Player of the tournament and Randy Habeck was also selected to the all-tournament team.

1996 Class B Boys Basketball State Champions - May-Port-CG Patriots

The Mayville-Portland-CG boys basketball team learned a lot from its appearance at the 1995 NDHSAA Class B state tournament. A 54-52 loss to eventual state champions Carrington in the semifinals was a heartbreaker, but it also put the state on notice that the Patriots had a team that could make noise in 1996.

Not only did May-Port-CG make noise, the Patriots took the next as a program – winning a state championship.

Anchored by solid, steady play from seniors Darren Klabo and Jeremy Macejkovic the Patriots were able to continue the development of its younger core of players – juniors Matt Swift, Andrew LeClair and Tom Jacobson; sophomore Chuck Klabo and freshman Travis Kraft.

By the time March rolled around, May-Port-CG was ready to make a run. The Postseason wasn't without challenges, however. The Patriots lost to Hillsboro 39-34 in the District 3 championship game, but recovered nicely at the Region 2 tournament defeating St. Thomas/Valley 56-40 in the championship game to return to the state tournament.

At state, the Patriots cruised to a 66-34 win over Enderlin in the quarterfinals and followed up with a 55-50 win over Langdon in the semifinals. Del Kessler's squad was back in the state championship game for the first time since 1987.

Waiting for the Patriots in the title game was Beulah. The Patriots trailed 41-37 entering the fourth quarter, but some clutch shooting from the perimeter would get May-Port-CG back on track. Swift hit a big 3-pointer to tie the game 44-44 and Kraft sent the Bismarck Civic Center into a frenzy when he hit a 3-pointer to give the Patriots a 47-44 advantage. Swift made another jump shot field goal to extend the lead to 49-44, but the Miners proved to be a tough out and had two chances late to go for the win thanks to the Patriots missing some late free throws.

With under 10 seconds to play, Beulah's second attempt to make the game-winner failed as Beulah's Jayden Olson drove into the lane and had his shot blocked by LeClair.

The buzzer sounded and the Patriots celebrated a state championship by the final score of 49-48. With a young core of players that were key contributors on the 1996 squad, thoughts already started to gravitate toward whether May-Port-CG could have the makings of repeat the following season.

Following the championship game, Schroeder was named the state tournament's most valuable player. St. Mary's finished the season with a 24-3 record.

1997 Class B Boys Basketball State Champions - May-Port-CG Patriots

The Mayville-Portland-CG boys basketball team made it back to the Class B State Tournament in 1997 with the intent to defend its state championship won in 1996.

The Patriots were built to do just that as its starting five of Andrew LeClair (Sr.), Chuck Klabo (Jr.), Tom Jacobson (Sr.), Matt Swift (Sr.) and Travis Kraft (Soph.) all were contributors to the 1996 squad.

Expectations were high and the Patriots delivered, but it took some growth to get to the ultimate goal. The Patriots started the season 4-3 playing a tough schedule that included a rematch of the 1996 state title game with Beulah, which the Miners won 54-49 and four games against Minnesota opponents. May-Port-CG played Minnetonka (Minn.) at the Fargo Civic Center and lost 54-51 and would then travel to play in the Minnesota Timberwolves High School Holiday Tournament at Target Center. The Patriots opened that tournament with a 70-52 loss to Eagan, but recovered to pick up two wins against Anoka and Champlin.

The early season tests put together by May-Port-CG head coach Del Kessler proved to be just what the Patriots needed as the team would rattle off 23 straight wins following the loss to Eagan.

All along the way the team leaned on its experienced starting five that were all 6-foot-5 or taller. The starting group was versatile with LeClair and Klabo able to dominate in the paint and Jacobson, Swift and Kraft able to compliment with a range of skills that included precision perimeter shooting.

In the 1997 District 3 Championship game, the Patriots defeated Hillsboro 42-39, which avenged a loss to the Burros in the 1996 District 3 Championship. The Patriots and Burros would meet again in the Region 2 championship game and Patriots won that game 56-44 to punch their ticket to the state tournament that would be played at FARGODOME.

At state, the Patriots opened with a 57-41 win over Leeds/Wolford in the quarterfinals setting up a rematch with the Beulah Miners in the semifinals. By March, May-Port-CG was a different team than the one the Miners had played early in the season and the Patriots showed their might defeating Beulah 56-33. Undefeated Glenburn awaited May-Port-CG in the championship game, but once again the Patriots proved to be too much for their opponent sealing the repeat with a 69-53 win.

Gary Cederstrom - Minot

Gary Cederstrom began officiating North Dakota high school football and boys basketball in 1975.

In 1980 he added high school girls basketball to his officiating repertoire. In total, Cederstrom officiated 25 seasons of boys basketball, 20 seasons of high school football and 14 seasons of high school girls basketball in the state of North Dakota. As a high school official, Cederstrom worked 30 NDHSAA playoff football games, and 10-plus boys and girls baseball region tournaments.

Cederstrom's officiating talents eventually propelled him to a career as an umpire in professional baseball. From 1989 to 2019 Cederstrom was an umpire in Major League Baseball serving as a crew chief from 2007-2019. During his MLB umpiring tenure, Cederstrom umpired in the 2003 and 2014 MLB All-Star games, three MLB Wild Card Playoff games, nine MLB Division Series Playoff Series, eight MLB League Championship Series and four MLB World Series (2005, 2011, 2015 and 2019).

Prior to his 31 seasons umpiring in Major League Baseball, Cederstrom umpired in the Midwest League, Eastern League, and American Association. He was named Crew Chief of the Year by Close Call Sports (CCS) & Umpire Ejection Fantasy League (UEFL) in 2015 and 2019. Cederstrom also worked several seasons officiating basketball in the NDCAC, Mon-Dak and the IBA.

Cederstrom retired as an MLB umpire in February of 2020, but returned to North Dakota to officiate high school football games in his home state during the 2020 season. He is married to Theresa and has three children: Erin, Caitlin and Keaton.

Don Hanson, former editor of the North Dakota Hoopster Magazines, has been named a recipient of the Robert D. King Distinguished Service Award presented by the North Dakota High School Activities Association.

The NDHSAA's Distinguished Service Award recognizes individuals and organizations that have made positive contributions to interscholastic activities in the state.

Hanson began publishing the North Dakota Hoopster Magazine – a preseason high school and collegiate basketball preview magazine detailing in-depth looks at teams across the state – in 1983. He later added a Miss Hoopster Magazine in 1992. Along with team previews of every high school and collegiate team in North Dakota, Hanson's Hoopster Magazines also featured the always popular high school basketball power polls and his preseason picks for each district, region and state winners.

Hanson was a 1960 graduate of Sherwood High School. He played baseball at Minot State University and graduated in 1964. After college, Hanson coached and taught math in New Salem, N.D. for three years before moving his family to Mandan where he taught and coached basketball. Hanson became Mandan's head boys basketball coach in 1974 and led the program for 13 seasons including a NDHSAA Class A State Championship in 1981.

In addition to his career as an educator, coach and publisher, Hanson also was a sports official and a professional baseball scout for numerous teams in Major League Baseball including the Minnesota Twins.

Hanson passed away on September 17th, 2018. In his absence, his family, led by his son Perry, have kept The Hoopster Magazines in operation so they can continue to be enjoyed by basketball fans across the state.




