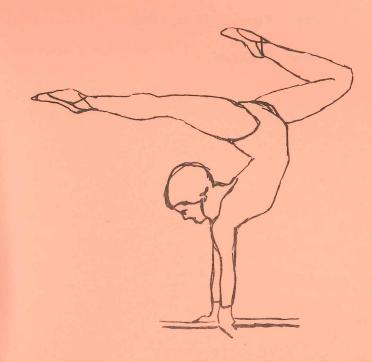

#### **TEAM COMPETITION**

The team's top five scores from each event will be totaled for the team score regardless of which division they may come from.

#### INDIVIDUAL ALL-AROUND COMPETITION

A girl must compete in all four events in order to be in all-around. Her score from each event is totaled for her all-around score.

#### INDIVIDUAL EVENT COMPETITION

The top six scorers in each event in the Novice, Intermediate, and Advanced Divisions will be recognized. The Novice Division will be doing compulsory routines, and the Intermediate and Advanced Divisions will be doing optional exercises.

#### JURY

The Jury for each apparatus consists of:

1 Superior Judge and 3 Regular Judges

For the duration of the competition, twelve Acting Judges and four Superior Judges will be used.

#### SCORING

Points will be awarded according to the Code of Points of the Federation of International Gymnastics and the National Federation of State High School Associations Gymnastics Rule Book. Out of the total of three sets, the average will be the final evaluation.

#### GYMNASTICS HISTORY AND BACKGROUND

Gymnastics is the world's most beautiful sport. Gymnastics is also the world's most physically demanding sport. "Gymnasts," writes Menke in his Encyclopedia of Sports, "execute in a single evening acts of greater daring and perform more valiantly than some baseball and football players are called upon to do in an entire season."

The sport of gymnastics had its origin in the gymnasia of Ancient Greece where the athletes trained between their Olympic Games.

Out of this background, gymnastics emerged as a competitive sport in which skill counted as much as strength, and grace as much as skill. The champion gymnast had to have the strength of a lion, the skill of an artist, and the grace of the artist's proudest creation.

Gymnastics was one of the few sports included in the first program of the Modern Olympics in 1896. Womens' gymnastics was added to the Olympic Program in 1936.

American gymnasts are now rated with the best, thanks to a strong development program—still in progress. Though the U.S. is improving in gymnastics, so are many other nations. They are all aware of the many values of the difficult, but beautiful, sport.

Besides developing agility, strength, suppleness, and endurance, gymnastics instills both self-confidence and self-discipline. It does all this while promoting sportsmanship and stimulating creativeness.

Gymnastic rules and traditions encourage originality, while the shifting trends of style and content add interest to this everchanging sport. They make it difficult to keep up with.

#### **DESCRIPTION OF EVENTS**

#### Floor Exercise

The floor exercise for women is truly the art of gymnastics. It is an Olympic event, performed in an area approximately 40 x 40 feet, involving a routine that lasts from one minute to a minute and a half. It contains elements of dance combinations, poses, acrobatics, and tumbling, all grouped in rhythmical patterns. Through these, the gymnast explores all the dimensions of speed, height, distance, direction, mood, and form. When she begins her exercise, the only restrictions are in space and time. Her music must fit with the movements of her routine and be appropriate in style. A talented gymnast will show through her performance an outburst of expressive energy and follows through with apparent ease.

#### **Balance Beam**

This event for women requires skill in body control, strength and coordination, as well as development of graceful feminine movement. The beam measures 16 feet 4 inches long, is less than 4 inches wide on the top surface, and stands 3 feet 11 inches off the floor. Besides performing various stunts, the gymnast must move to all parts of the beam. She uses runs, leaps, turns, and jumps to accomplish this. The routine should last 1 minute 20 seconds to 1 minute 45 seconds.

#### **Uneven Parallel Bars**

This is considered the most spectacular event. Because of the unequal height of the two bars, this apparatus allows

#### Uneven Parallel Bars (con't)

the gymnast an unlimited range of stunts and combinations. The unevens require considerable upper body development—shoulder, arm, and abdomen. It also requires balance, timing, and courage. The composition of a routine consists of swinging movements and vaults in which the hands release the bars.

#### Side-Horse Vault

This performance involves a long run to build up momentum; a strong spring from the board to carry the gymnast through the vault (the most important phase of the vault); the "on the flight" well above the horse; "after flight" looking smooth and controlled; and a soft landing in perfect balance. Of course, a perfect vault can only come if the performer has confidence in herself.

#### **OPTIONAL EXERCISE**

The optional exercises are evaluated from 0 to 10 points, by tenths of a point. They are divided as follows:

From this maximum of ten points, penalty points will be deducted.

#### Floor, Balance Beam, and Uneven Bars

All exercises must be executed in a continuous manner. Exercises with swing must predominate. The individual exercises must contain four elements of medium difficulty and two elements of superior difficulty. Failure to execute the following parts of the exercise results in the following deductions:

Routines on the balance beam and on the floor that are too short or too long, as well as stepping out of the floor area, also result in the deduction of points.

Every element of difficulty repeated in the course of the exercise will be considered as one difficulty unless it is a different type of combination.

#### Horse Vault

Two different vaults may be selected, the best execution of which will be counted for the evaluation. Each vault has a maximum number of points according to its difficulty. Penalty points will be deducted from this maximum for the following faults:

- (1) Execution
- (2) Posture
- (3) Landing (Stand)
- (4) Aid by Coach

If the gymnast does not execute the vault she has announced, she will be penalized by a deduction of 0.5 points.

#### Compulsory Exercise

The compulsory exercises are evaluated from 0 to 10 points and tenths of a point. They are divided as follows:

## INFORMATION CONCERNING THE NORTH DAKOTA HIGH SCHOOL ACTIVITIES ASSOCIATION

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

The North Dakota High School Activities Association is a voluntary, non-profit organization of the high schools of the State of North Dakota. All 271 schools eligible for membership belong to the Association. Membership is granted upon application of the School Board, at which time the school agrees to enforce the rules which the members have established and to participate in the legislative processes of modification and revision of rules to fit changing needs of the member schools and students.

#### **PURPOSES**

To unify the high schools of the state in the promotion of pure amateur sports, music, and speech activities.

To standardize the eligibility rules and regulations under which interscholastic contests are held.

To provide the schools of the state with sound and adequate programs of extracurricular activities.

To promote the maintenance of standards which conform with the educational objectives of the schools.

To improve standards of play and to develop understanding of rules governing play.

To prevent the exploitation of the schools, the school activities, and the students enrolled therein.

The Activities Association was founded in 1908 under the name of the High School League and originally was concerned only with athletics. In 1923, the state organization became affiliated with the National Federation of High School Athletic Associations. A full-time executive director was employed in 1949, an assistant was added in 1963, a second assistant in 1969, and a girls' sports' supervisor in 1973.

In 1950, the Consolidated League, an organization of the smaller schools of the state, affiliated with the High School League, thereby uniting all high schools of the state under one organization. Music and speech activities were placed under the direction of the Association in 1955, and the name was changed to the North Dakota High School Activities Association at that time.

Schools in the League were all in one class for basketball competition from 1908 to 1932. A two-class system was used from 1933 to 1947 and a three-class system from 1948 to 1963. In 1964, the two-class system was restored. This arrangement has been in effect since then up to the present time.

Official state champions have been named in track since 1908 and in basketball since 1914. Official champions in other sports were later added as follows: golf and tennis, 1938; baseball, 1950; wrestling, 1960; cross-country, 1961; hockey, 1965; girls' track, golf, and tennis, 1966; and girls' gymnastics, 1969. State football championships were determined off and on between 1916 and 1959, when the practice was discontinued. Basketball tournaments for girls were conducted by the Consolidated League for a number

#### BRIEF HISTORY (con't)

of years, by the NDHSAA from 1952 to 1960, at which time they were discontinued because of the small number of schools fielding teams. Girls' basketball was reinstated as an Association-sponsored activity this year on a district level. Next year, a complete tournament series will be held.

#### **ACTIVITIES**

The following chart indicates the activities sponsored by the Association, the number of schools participating, and the approximate number of students participating in interscholastic competition during the 1972-1973 school year.

#### ACCIDENT BENEFIT PLAN

More than 143,000 students enrolled in member schools are protected in this plan. Allowances are provided for medical and dental services which result from injuries received or incurred while students are under the supervision and control of the schools.

Last year, 8,865 claims totaling \$193,987.60 were paid. Since 1936, when the plan was first offered to member schools, claim payments have amounted to over \$2,500,000.00 with more than one-half of this amount being paid since 1960.

## REGISTRATION OF OFFICIALS AND INTERPRETATION MEETINGS

More than 800 officials are registered with the North Dakota High School Activities Association. These men are furnished rule books for the sports in which they officiate, and examinations are provided annually in football, basketball, hockey, gymnastics, and wrestling. Upon meeting certain prescribed standards, the members advance from 'apprentice' officials to 'registered', 'approved', 'certified', and finally to 'master' classifications.

During the past year, 47 rules interpretation meetings have been held throughout the state, and more than 2,000 individuals attended these meetings. Meetings were held for football, basketball, hockey, gymnastics, wrestling, track, and baseball.

#### CHEERLEADERS' CLINICS

The Association sponsors cheerleader clinics every year for the training of cheerleaders. Over 2,000 cheerleaders attended the 1973-1974 clinics.

The clinics recognize the important service rendered by the cheerleaders. They improve skills and abilities and emphasize the responsibility of cheerleaders for sportsmanship and crowd control.

#### FILM SERVICE

The Association maintains a library of films dealing with sports, physical education, and recreation, and many of these films are of the instructional type. They are used throughout the state to advance and improve the standards of play and officiating.

All Association films are distributed through the Division of Independent Study at North Dakota State University in Fargo.

#### ORGANIZATION OF ASSOCIATION

#### **Board of Directors**

The Board of Directors consists of 10 members, three of which are superintendents of member Class A schools, three superintendents of Class B schools, and one superintendent and one high school principal as members-at-large. These representatives are elected by the membership as a whole, with each school having one vote. In addition, the executive-director of the North Dakota School Boards Association and the Superintendent of Public Instruction serve as members of the Board.

#### Representative Assembly

The superintendent or high school principal of each school serves as a member of the representative assembly, with each school being entitled to one vote. An annual meeting is held each year to adopt rules and regulations governing interschool contests and eligibility regulations. All such rules are made by the Representative Assembly.

#### **District Committees**

The district activities are controlled and managed by committees elected by school officials in each area.

#### **Executive Officers**

The administration of the various programs and the implementation of the policies of the Association are placed in the hands of an Executive Director and three assistants who are employed by the Association.
